TEXT OF SECURITY PACT MADE PUBLIC IN EUROPE TODAY

Momentous Decisions Reached at Locarno Believed to Make Future Wars in Europe Impossible

London, Oct. 20.—(AP)—London awoke today to find emblazoned on the front pages of the newspapers the text of the momentous decisions reached at Locarno which virtually it is believed make further wars in Europe impossible.

The security pact guarantees inviolability of the French and Belgian and German frontiers. There are also treaties between Germany and France, Belgium, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Germany is to set up machinery for the arbitration of disputes which can not be ironed out through ordinary diplomatic handling. The engagement between France and Poland and Czechoslovakia provide that if Germany shall resort to arms against any of the three countries they shall immediately go to the aid of one another.

The treaty of mutual guarantees by Germany, France and Belgium stipulates that Germany must never invade the soil of France or Belgium or attempt to create war in the demilitarized Rhine Land Zone, while on their parts France and Belgium agree never to violate Germany's western front. If either one or all countries should violate the pact, it will be the duty of Great Britain and Italy to lend aid to the parties attacked.

Arbitration of all disputes is necessary. None of the agreements outlaw war and it is clearly stated that in some circumstances war is legitimate. The treaties seek to provide so far as is possible to prevent war-like conditions from arising.

If it is possible for Europe to reach an agreement for the reduction of land armaments, it was said at the White House that Mr. Coolidge would favor such a step. He realizes that the United States had little if anything to offer in the way of reductions of its own forces, but at the same time holds that any question involving further limitations of Naval armaments could be considered by a conference in this country with greater hope of successful agreement. The President recognizes that no step can be taken by the Washington government in the direction of a naval limitation conference until the interested nations have been sounded out. In the meantime he is willing that the Washington government should do all in its power without jeopardizing the national interest to help in the European situation—presumably in enforcing an agreement in the question of land forces.

The fact that the Security pact was drawn by statesmen, who had political conditions to keep in mind, and that they were able to reach an agreement, is held by the President to be of outstanding importance. For that reason they contend it is a step in advance of the Dawes plan.

SAYS COLLINS WAS 'UPPITY DARKEY'

Negro Doctor Recently Flogged in Farmville Had "Bad Record" in Whiteville

The following from the Columbus News, Chatham, N. C., of October 7, 1925 throws some light on the former record of Dr. J. S. B. Collins, negro doctor, who is alleged to have been flogged recently in Farmville by a band of hooded men.

"Dr. J. S. B. Collins, negro physician, who had his shingle hanging out in Whiteville for several years prior to 1918, and who left here without any great amount of regrets being expressed or tears shed over his departure, is again in bad. This time at Farmville in this state.

"The record of Collins in Columbus county was by no means to his credit. He is a British subject and was some 'uppity darkey.' His favorite occupation while at the county seat was in making speeches to the colored citizens, urging them not to work for white folks, and he dealt in a long line of general cussedness that did not endear him to the white people or to the better element of the colored citizens.

As a result of his activities as a physician, Dr. Collins ran afoul of the law at Whiteville, and resided in jail there for some time until he could be tried on a charge of criminal practice, of which he was convicted. The notoriety gained at this time and his past record was such that he saw the need of pulling up stakes and seeking a more healthy climate. He first went to Wilmington, thence to other parts of the state, and for some time he has been located at Farmville, where he became almost as obnoxious as he was at Whiteville.

Recently a Ku Klux parade was staged at Farmville and following it Dr. Collins regaled his colored brethren with expressions of an insulting nature against the whitefolks and the Ku Klux as an organization. He has been making public speeches in negro school houses and elsewhere in an effort to fill up the minds of the negroes with a feeling of social equality between them and the whites.

His activities became so pronounced that a few days ago the doctor was taken out by a hooded band and soundly thrashed and warned to leave Farmville. Instead of leaving Farmville the negro appealed to the British consulate at Wilmington for protection on the grounds that he was a subject of that country. The matter is now being investigated and if it turns out that Collins is really entitled to the protection of the British government, it is hoped that at the same time the fact will be revealed to him that he has no right to wag his tongue concerning good American affairs."

Says Police Stations Should Have Radio

Fayetteville, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Every police station in the country should have a full radio receiving and sending set, with a full time operator on duty.

That is the opinion of Chief of Police Jones, of this city, who declares that radio would be made a great factor in the apprehension of criminals, if the full benefit of its development were placed at the disposal of police headquarters throughout the country.

Every hour of the day, happenings of police importance should be sent in from every city to police headquarters in Raleigh, the local police officials believe. From Raleigh, happenings of national importance or where outside assistance was needed, could be sent to radio headquarters in Washington, to be broadcast over the country. Thus, he says it would be more practically impossible for a criminal to escape.

ELLIOTT BELIEVES AIR PLANE CRASH WAS UNAVOIDABLE

Three U. S. Army Aviators Killed in Crash; Operations Officer of Mitchell Field Conducting Investigation

Cape May Court House, N. J., Oct. 19.—(AP)—The air plane crash near here yesterday in which three United States army aviators were killed, was unavoidable in the opinion of Lieutenant Matthew O. Elliott, operations officer at Mitchell Field, who was here today investigating the accident. The victims were Captain Robert A. Kinlock, of Charleston, S. C., Lieutenant Abbot C. Martin, of Reading, Mass., who was the pilot, and staff Sergeant Joseph Caulston, of Norristown, Penn. They were flying from Mitchell Field, N. Y., to Langley Field, Va., in a Martin Bomber plane and carried a number of suit cases, children toys, a bicycle, chairs, and clothing for fellow officers who had been transferred to Langley Field for the winter. The big plane was first seen to be in trouble while over Wildwood. It then turned in land and after wavering in the air made a nose dive into the woods. The men were dead when members of the coast guard, who saw the plane fall, reached the scene.

"One of the motors" said Lieutenant Elliott, "apparently developed trouble soon after the plane left Ocean City. Over Cape May Court House it is believed to have gone dead and hampered by a stiff wind the plane went out of control and was tossed like a leaf into the tree tops. The men never had a chance to escape. There is no field where a plane of this size would land within a radius of 20 miles.

Captain Kinlock was on his way to South Carolina, having been granted a 30 day leave of absence. He had planned to make the remainder of the journey from Langley Field by train.

STRIKE OF RAILWAY TELEGRAPHERS NOW APPEARS BROKEN

Telegraphers Return to Work Voluntarily; Situation Being Handled Without Difficulty

Wilmington, Oct. 20.—(AP)—The back bone of the strike of railway telegraphers of the Atlantic Coast Line Railway so far as North Carolina was concerned appear today to be broken. Reports from both union and railroad headquarters indicated that about one half of the personnel of 460 men in the first division from Richmond to Florence, S. C., answered the strike call yesterday afternoon and a majority of these had returned to work voluntarily today.

A railroad official stated that there had been no interruption in services and that they had been able to operate afternoon without difficulty long distance telephones being used at some points.

According to railroad officials the telegraphers answered their call to a much greater extent in Florida than at other points along the coast line system and emergency men were rushed to Florida points to care for the situation today.

WAGE COMMISSION MAY BE BESIEGED BY MANY APPEALS

Ex-Service Men Protest Against Abolition of Armistice Day as Holiday

Raleigh, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Indications today are that the State Salary and Wage Commission when it meets on Thursday to hear appeals from its rulings in the first report published recently will find plenty of appeals to consider.

Appeals from the Commission's rulings appearing to center about the abolition of Armistice Day as a holiday of state employees and alleged inequalities which it is said will grow out of the Commission report. Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing, although he has signed no formal protest against the abolition of Armistice Day as a holiday, announced bluntly that his department would not be opened on Armistice Day.

Henry Stevens, State Commander of the American Legion has been asked by the Raleigh Post of the Legion to appear before the Commission at its meeting Thursday and the Raleigh Post has signed a formal protest against the abolition of the holiday. The Adjutant General's office has filed a request that the Commission recognize all holidays that has been set as do by the General Assembly. It was pointed out in this connection that should the Commission not reconsider its action in this particular and if the department heads refused to comply with the rulings of the Commission, the state auditor might refuse to honor the salary vouchers of employees in such departments if a department head is required to certify monthly that its department has complied with the rulings of the Commission.

Chief department heads believe that highly trained men in the department should be placed on a salary parity with engineers of the State Highway Commission, who have a maximum salary of \$1,500 a year. Changes in salaries for classification have been requested by the Corporation Commission, the Insurance Department and Attorney General's office, and appeals from cuts in salaries of members of the Automobile Bureau of the Department of Revenue are said to have been filed.

SEEING PARIS IN A DAY TIES PHYSICAL POWER OF YANKEES

Paris—Whatever view the visitor may have on the deliberateness of French foot and vehicular traffic, the business of "seeing Paris" has been so speeded up that it has exceeded the physical power of many of the American tourists, recognized in the profession as the most rugged of all.

To "see Paris right" formerly required eight days. It is now done in one day and evening. Many of the French people believe leisure is not in the American vocabulary. Apparently they have fitted the sightseeing to the rapidity with which the Frenchman has observed the American devour his food and hasten about his business.

The average American doing Paris even by motor gives out at the Cathedral of Notre Dame near the middle of the afternoon, said a guide in one of the principal tourist agencies. The guide is asked by sturdy folks if "any one ever goes through to the end." The whole program consumes about eight hours—the legal limit of the working day in Paris. One Chicagoan said the work is heavy and the tourist earns all he gets out of it.

The hour of starting "the day in Paris" has been moved back a little, another concession to the business. The morning is devoted to the Triumphant Arch and the Unknown Soldier's Grave, Napoleon's Tomb, the Eiffel Tower, the Trocadero, the Chamber of Deputies and the Decorative Arts Exposition. The afternoon itinerary comprises the Louvre, the Pere la Chaise cemetery and a number of lesser attractions.

The whole program includes a night ride through the boulevards and Montmartre.

The party that included the Chicagoan, which the guide said was typical without the morning grip in fairly fresh condition. After lunch they tackled the afternoon job with zest. After a 20-minute fox trot through the

Louvre to begin with, they had been the Mint, the Fine Arts School and the French Institute. They had been made aware of the existence of the Bank of France and the Central Markets from the guide's vague remarks that they were on his left or right. They had a fleeting glimpse of the Palais Royal which the guide said was built in—but all the dates were lost in the hum of traffic. The Luxembourg palace and gardens were done on the fly, then there was a stop at the Pantheon.

Here were the first signs of lassitude. About a quarter of the tourists remained outside, to the discomfiture of the guide who had paid for their admission. "They won't get me that way again," he remarked as the car started for Notre Dame. With a knowing smile the chaperon of the party rose to inquire how many would prefer to see the cathedral and how many would prefer a drink at the cafe opposite. With revealing unanimity the party rushed for the cafe.

"Here's where they flinch," said the guide, and the proprietor of the cafe agreed cheerfully that it was so. The balance of the tour was completed by passive consent. At the Pere la Chaise cemetery, one of the most curious and interesting attractions on the program, the guide again asked how many wanted to go thru. The response was given only by signs which meant "for everybody's sake let the car move on."

ASK STATESMANSHIP COME FORWARD LEST ENGLAND MAY SINK

London.—Almost the entire English press is waiting for statesmanship to come forward, lest this country lose her traditional greatness. One and all the papers seem to conclude that economically and otherwise the nation is bogging down, and that something must be done.

The editorial writers have even ceased their past-war practice of looking around for some foreigner on whom to put the blame for England's woes. They no longer lecture the French morning and evening, nor growl of "unfair competition" from Germany. For the moment they have even ceased to complain of America's attitude toward the war debts. There is evidenced a growing realization that England has her own house to put in order.

The papers are beginning to pan the Prime Minister. That is one straw showing how the wind blows. The chatter, noisier and most widely circulated ones opened their offensive against him weeks ago. They did not like his "surrender" in the mining dispute, in which the government bought a truce between coal diggers and coal owners at the cost of 2,000,000 pounds a month. Then Mr. Baldwin went to Aix-les-Bains for a holiday. When he came back, after four weeks of rest, he gallantly remarked that he hadn't read an English newspaper for a month.

None of the newspapers took kindly to this, or saw any joke in it. A great many things of importance happened while he was gone, they have been in forming Mr. Baldwin. For one thing unemployment became still worse and under the surface there is a great deal of talk about Bolshevik uprisings and all sorts of possible trouble next May when the coal truce ends. And more talk of mobilizing the manhood of the country to protect "British standards and traditions." Youngsters and grown-ups of the middle classes, ex-army folk and such, are organizing branches of the British "Fascisti."

The serious journals are beginning to cry for statesmanship, and to inform Mr. Baldwin that he has not lived up to the hopes they placed in him when labor was thrown out and Conservatism put back in power. G. K. Chesterton, in his weekly, has been pounding away at a campaign for small ownership, for the return of English peasantry to till a rich soil that is more and more neglected while the country keeps buying larger proportions of food from overseas.

Sir Philip Gibbs, writing in the Sunday Times, inquires "Is England Done?" and says the Government is

has been one of drifting, of temporary makeshifts in emergencies; niggling measures to reduce unemployment (which hasn't been reduced), turning to the gold standard without counting its cost in impairing trade "subsidizing laziness," as an American termed the dole. Sir Philip thinks the "rot in our social state" can be stopped only by an all-round reduction in the standard of life, "not asking labor to get back below the poverty line while we keep all our luxury."

Someone, he said, must show how to get a few million to emigrate out of England. His call for leadership is echoed by J. L. Garvin, the distinguished editor of the Sunday Observer. The nation does not want to replace the government, for the alternative is probably labor with a working majority; it contends, but "the country intends without mistake to awaken the Government to a more real sense of the magnitude and urgency of the public crisis, to invigorate its action, and to force it out of conventional habits of mind."

Other journals and lesser men are expressing the same thought daily. Mr. Garvin, who confesses that he joined heartily in the "Te Deum" that welcomed the Conservative government less than a year ago, writes: "Unless the Baldwin Government as regards trade and unemployment can rise above nullity or mediocrity of attempt or the subsidy spirit, John Bull will resort to the newspapers and advertise a vacant situation."

First Water Mains of Wood

Fayetteville, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Detailed descriptions of the various soil types found in Cumberland county, their extent and distribution, is contained in a report of a soil survey of the county, conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture and the North Carolina Department of Agriculture. The report, just published by the departments, which contains 40 pages of text and a large color map, has just been received here.

In addition to the descriptions of the soil types, there is also a general discussion of the topography and drainage, roads and other transportation facilities, markets, climate, and agriculture of the county. The leading crops, the report says, are cotton, corn, oats, truck crops, tobacco peanuts and some peaches. Cotton and corn are, respectively, the principal cash and subsistence crops. The county has a mild climate, along growing season, and an ample and well distributed rainfall.

The soils and climate are described by the report as "general conducive to vegetable production." The sandhill section, once considered practically worthless for agriculture, has come into favor as a peach region, and this county promises to become one of the fruit growing sections of the South.

The yield of cotton averages approximately three-fourths of a bale per acre, and the average corn yield is about 15 bushels per acre.

A successful crop rotation, says the report, based on experiments made by a very progressive local farmer, and which appears to be a good one for nearly all the soils of Cumberland county is as follows:

The first year a crop of wheat or oats is harvested, and is followed by a crop of cowpeas; the cowpea seed is picked, the vines plowed under, and lime applied at the rate of 1,000 per acre; the second year cotton is grown followed by crimson clover or rye; the third year corn or some other crop is grown.

The United States Department of Agriculture states that it is in position to furnish copies of the report to those desiring it.

Sixteen Regular Terms Sup. Court Being Held Now

Raleigh, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Sixteen regular terms of Superior Court opened in this state yesterday morning. Outstanding is the one-week term in Buncombe county, at which members of the mob which stormed the Buncombe county jail on the night of September 19, with the intention of lynching Alvin Mansel, negro, identified as the assailant of a white woman near Asheville, are expected to be tried. Trial of the score or more indicated in connection with the storming of the jail is expected to begin on Wednesday.

Judge John T. Oglesby will preside over the court term at which these cases will come up.

Also beginning yesterday morning in Buncombe, a special two weeks for the trial of civil case will be held. In calling this special term, the Governor named Judge Albion Dunn to preside for the first week. The court calendar calls for Judge Dunn to hold a one-week term of civil court in Bladen county during the coming week, but the Bladen county court term has been postponed, it was stated at the Governor's office. Gov. McLean has appointed G. V. Cow-

per, of Kinston emergency judge to hold the second week of the special term.

Of the 16 regular court terms, 13 are for the trial of both civil and criminal cases; two will try criminal cases only; and one will be devoted exclusively to the civil docket. Eight of the terms are for one week, eight for two weeks.

In Hyde county Judge Thomas H. Calvert, of Raleigh, will preside over a one-week term for the trial of both criminal and civil cases.

A one-week term for the trial of both civil and criminal cases begin yesterday in Buncombe county. Judge E. H. Crammer, of Southport, will preside.

Judge N. A. Sinclair, of Fayetteville, will hold the two weeks term opening tomorrow in Hertford. Both civil and criminal cases will be tried at this court.

In Carteret Judge W. M. Bond, of Edenton, will hold a one-week term opening Monday. Both civil and criminal cases will be tried.

Judge M. V. Barnhill, of Rocky Mount, will preside over the one-week term in Lenior county. Criminal and civil dockets await disposition.

In Franklin county criminal cases only will come up during the one week of court opening Monday. Judge G. E. Midyette will preside.
