PEACE

With the will for peace that underlies the security agreement signed at Locarno fixed and permanent, the outlawry of war in Europe will be realized.

In the midst of the hostilities that ended, only so far as armed conflict was concerned, with the Armistice in November, 1918, a

shrewd observer warned the nations that until the nature of states was changed it were futile to talk of permanent peace. The old order prevailed when the guns were silenced and it was confirmed in large measure by those who dictated the peace terms. To post-war disappointments and hardships suffered by the victors as well as by the vanquished is to be attributed the essential change that has made possible the most important diplomatic achievements of all times.

True, complete faith in the pledged word of government is lacking. This accounts for the British-Italian guarantee of the Franco-German Rhineland pact, by which the guarantors pledge themselves to take up arms against either France or Germany become aggressor. But the fact that these latter nations have found a basis of agreement for their mutual safety is indicative of the change in the nature of states that has taken place in the last seven years.

There are solid reasons for believing that France and Germany in future will abide by the decisions of arbitral tribunals to which they have agreed to submit any differences arising between them. Incidentally, arbitration treaties between Germany and Belgium, Germany and Poland, Germany and Czechoslovakia, are drafted, or in course of drafting under favorable conditions. Germany is slated for admittance to the League of Nations within a few months, and will have a permanent seat in the League Council. The example given by the major Powers of the Continent is expected to be emulated by the lesser nations that have kept alive war-breeding differences among themselves.

This settling of disputes and removal of grounds of fears will afford Europe a season of peace in which its energies may be turned to the important business of economic rehabilitation. Devoting itself to this and becoming reconciled to the duty of paying for the great war, the will for peace may be developed to the point that thoughts of war will not again enter the minds of either statesmen or people. It is hoped this will be the lasting fruit of the Locarno conference.

AMERICAN APPETITE FOR EAR CORN PUZZLING TO FRENCH

Paris.—The American appetite for green corn, a delicacy almost unknown in France, caused the Paris Midi to comment in a paragraph that was headed with the French proverb "there is no arguing about taste and color."

The head waiter of a leading restaurant brings in with ceremony a weird dish which he lays before his American customers, observed Midi. He places before them great white cylinders which the people from across the Atlantic seize and eat with relish.

"What ever is that they are eating?" asks a Parisian. The waiter explains that it is boiled maize. He brings a green head to the Parisian and

shows him the contents. "And you are asked for many of these?" "Thirty or forty a day." Why cross the ocean to eat boiled maize in a Paris restaurant, concludes Midi.

OXFORD COLLEGES CRUMBLE BUT ALWAYS GET NEW FACE

Oxford—Oxford colleges are crumbling away, but they have never done anything else. Nearly all Oxford is built of a soft local stone which carves easily into rich and fanciful shapes but begins to flake and rot away after the first decade. After a century or so it is necessary to dress down the whole outer surface of the buildings and lay on an outer surfacing of new slabs.

Some of the larger colleges are never without builders' scaffolding. One Oxford firm has been occupied for eighty years in mending the stone work of a single college.

The great expense of rebuilding led to the destruction of all college ivy. Before it was stripped from the

walls this hardy climber had done an immense amount of damage, often destroying the stone to a depth of several inches below the surface. After the ivy is removed its work still remains and there is grave danger of falling stones until the wall is resurfaced.

"PAID IN FULL BY GOD" HIS RECEIPT TO POOR DEBTORS

Santa Fe.—Treasured in many a humble adobe house in the mountains of Rio Arriba county, New Mexico, is a little soiled and wrinkled slip of paper.

On it appears a Spanish: "Juan Sanchez, for whatever the name may be) to Felix Garcia, Dr." Then an itemized list of purchases of chili, coffee, sugar, flour, beans, and at the bottom the endorsement: "Paid in Full by God."

It is the tale of the country merchant who died a rich man, despite the fact that he never pressed a debt or for payment, crossed the obligations of poor people off his books, and left among his papers bills receivable

and promissory notes amounting to \$100,000. Garcia, once a nominee of the Democratic party for governor of New Mexico, died from a bullet accidentally discharged. Few men in New Mexico were more widely or sincerely mourned. The esteem in which he was held was based entirely on his honesty and humanity. He was not a brilliant man but was gifted with sound business judgment.

Garcia started a typical small Spanish-American merchandise store. He made a little money and acquired a number of small ranch properties. But the poor people did not contribute to his increasing fortune. If a customer fell sick or had bad luck on his little mountain farm, or was out of work, Garcia promptly dug out his account and sent him the bill marked "Paid in Full by God."

He ran two stores in the little village of Lumberton, one a cash store, the other a "credit store" where he let his needy patrons run accounts as long as they wished. It is not of record that his generosity was often taken advantage of by those able

to pay and the bulk of the \$100,000 left unpaid on his books really represented charity to the poor.

ALLEGED NEGLECT OF HOMES BY WOMEN IS CALLED "BOSH"

PITT COMPARED EDUCATIONALLY WITH OTHERS

The following paper written by William Small, of the Belvoir High School won the blue ribbon at the Pitt County Fair.

Pitt county can boast of the facts that it has more hard surface roads than any other county in the State, that Greenville is the third largest tobacco market in the world, and that its toll is surpassed by only one county in fertility. However, in the field of rural education our county cannot claim such honors. Here though we have many things of which we may be justly proud and rapid strides are being made in the development of better rural education in our county. In this era of educational development it is the duty of every citizen to know how his county compares educationally with its neighbors.

In order to understand exactly what is being done for the children in the rural districts of our county we must know the advantage that are being offered. Of the nine hundred ninety five (995) one-teacher schools in the state of North Carolina, Pitt county has twenty-one (21) of them, or a fraction more than two percent (2 per cent). We readily see that this is more than our share. The standard of instruction in these schools is very low. In Briar Swamp school, seven pupils attempted the seventh grade examination, seven failed. At Tucker school three pupils attempted the seventh grade examination, three failed. Both of these were one-teacher schools. In the eight-teacher school at Fountain, thirty-four (34) pupils attempted the seventh grade examination and of this number thirty-two (32) passed with some conditions.

Standard tests of rural grammar schools in our county, showed that most of the grades are from four months to a year behind in their subjects. In reading, the grades measured very near the standard, but, in reasoning they were very low.

In Pitt county there are about two thousand (2000) white children going to one, two, and three-teacher schools for a term of six months. That is about two fifths of the enrollment. Only sixty percent (60 per cent) of the children of our county go to an eight or nine month school.

Transportation of pupils was first undertaken in this state in 1912-13. Pitt county in 1924 had thirty trucks transporting nine hundred fifty-six (956) pupils and costing twenty-eight thousand two hundred eighty-one dollars and eighteen cents (\$28,281.18). At that time Alamance county had twelve trucks (12) transporting two hundred ninety-eight (298) pupils, and costing eight thousand four hundred dollars and fifty-two cents (\$8,454.52). Yancey county had one truck transporting one hundred (100) pupils and costing one hundred seventy-seven dollars (\$177).

In 1901 the legislature first took into consideration the varying abilities of the counties to support the public schools for the term required by the constitution and an equalizing fund was provided. Our county has participated in this equalizing fund for six (6) years, and during this time has borrowed forty-three thousand five hundred ninety-three dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$43,596.67) which is six tenths per cent (6 per cent) of the total amount borrowed by counties. Wilkes has participated twentythree (23) years, and has borrowed three hundred fifty-eight thousand one hundred fifty-nine dollars and seventy-one cents (\$358,159.71) which is four and nine tenths per cent (4.9 per cent) of the whole fund. New Hanover, Haywood, and Currituck were found to be the most self sustaining educationally. They have borrowed only one tenth per cent (1 per cent).

In 1903 the "Liberty Fund," an act created by the legislature in 1825, was put under the control of a board. This board was required to invest this fund for the instruction of youth. It was soon converted into a permanent revolving loan fund for the purpose of securing comfortable school houses in every rural district. Under this system Wilson county borrowed most, one hundred thirty-one thousand five hundred dollars before June 30th, 1924. Watauga county borrowed the least, one thousand seven hundred forty (\$1,745) dollars. Our county borrowed fifty thousand three hundred fifty-nine (\$50,359).

Pitt is one of the fifty eight counties to pay its white rural teachers smaller annual salaries than the state average for white rural teachers. It is one of the sixty-six counties to pay its colored teachers lower annual salaries than the state rural average for colored teachers. teachers an average annual salary of one thousand one hundred eighty-four cents (\$1,184.84), which was a larger annual salary than that of the state. The average annual salary for colored teachers in New Hanover, was above the state average also. At this time Pitt county paid its white rural teachers an annual average salary of seven hundred sixty dollars and forty cents (\$760.40) and its colored teachers three hundred seventy-one dollars and eighty-one cents (\$371.81). Surry paid the smallest annual salary, which was four hundred seventy-five dollars and seventy-three cents (\$475.73) for white teachers. In teacher's salaries and cost of instruction, New Hanover ranks first, paying thirty-six dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$36.39) per capita for teaching and supervisors. Pitt ranks seventy-fifth, paying fourteen dollars and fifty-three cents (\$14.53) per capita. Scotland comes last, paying nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$9.91) per capita. However, Pitt is one of the twenty-six counties in North Carolina having a rural supervisor.

The basic items state school accounting are current expense and capital outlay. Taken together these give the total expenditures in a given year. Current expense embraces the expenditure for teaching, supervision, administration, operation and maintenance. Capital outlay covers the cost of sites, new buildings and repairs.

An attempt has been made to measure the educational efficiency of the white rural schools of North Carolina. The schools are divided into four groups, A, B, C, D. New Hanover comes first with a score of seventy-five and seven tenths (75.7), Pamlico ranks second with a score of seventy and one tenth (70.1); Pitt falls in group C number thirty (30) with a score fifty-six and two tenths (56.2). Surry comes in group D, number one hundred (100) with a score of thirty-six and three tenths (36.3).

If our county would continue to grow in wealth, it must grow in intelligence for, "where there is no vision the people perish." The greatest undeveloped resource of our county is not our timber, nor agricultural possibilities, but our greatest undeveloped resource is the mind and soul of the generation that is to follow us. May our county in its educational program ever, "sail on, sail on, sail on."

SCARCITY OF WHALES CAUSES STATION TO BE DISMANTLED

Seattle.—The Bay City whale station of the American-Pacific Whaling Company, one of a few remaining in the United States, is being dismantled. Lack of whales in the ocean tributary to Grays Harbor necessitated the shut-down. Only 21 whales have been brought into the station since the opening of the season last April. In previous years the catch averaged from 200 to 300 whales a season. THREE MILLION FASCISTS NOW ANSWER MUSSOLINI'S CALL

Rome.—When Benito Mussolini stretches his right arm forward in Roman salute and calls: "Fascists, attention!" the answer "Present!" is a chorus of voices of about 3,000,000 men, women and children.

Fascism, only a handful of men some ten years ago, is now a formidable army, according to an official report made by Roberto Farinacci, secretary general of the Fascist Party. Here are his figures:

68 Provincial Federations
6,317 Communal Organizations.
317 National Trade Unions.
18 Children's Organizations.

16 Vanguard Organizations.
590 Women's Groups.
9,000 Men's Groups.

MAY WITHDRAW PUPILS FROM SCHOOLS TEACHING IRISH DUBLIN.—The Technical Committee of County Mayo has reduced from 67c to 40c pounds the money provided for the teaching of the Irish language and forecasts a further reduction next year.

Monsignor D'Alton who introduced the motion said that he knows mothers who threaten to withdraw their children from school if the teaching of Irish is not dropped. He declared that the spoken language is losing ground, even in districts where it was generally spoken till comparatively recently.

The government recognizes this, but thinks it regrettable, and is taking steps in all directions to remedy it. Irish is now made a compulsory subject in the primary schools all over the country and the government has appointed a Commission which is taking evidence as to the condition of the language in the Irish speaking districts and the reason for its decay. The chief reason is economic.

COMMISSION URGES AUSTRALIA TO CONTINUE SEARCH FOR OIL MELBOURNE.—While the prospect of the discovery of oil in commercial quantities in Australia are generally unfavorable, indications in the Roma district of Queensland and the Kimberley district of western Australia justify the recommendation that further detailed geological mapping should be undertaken and trail boring conducted, says a report of the federal joint committee of public accounts on oil exploration in Australia and Papua.

The prospects in Papua are generally hopeful and the report adds work should continue to be carried out by a private company on behalf of the federal government such as the Anglo-Persian Oil Company which is now operating in Papua.

GREAT NUMBER OF WOMEN IN SUMMER SCHOOL AT OXFORD

Oxford.—The Oxford Summer School was outstanding for its great proportion of women students. They were numerous in all lecture rooms and often well outnumbered the men, especially in the libraries. Oxford experience shows that women in a university are more conscientious and work harder than do men, without

winning proportionate honors in final examinations. This fact tends to reconcile the men to the admission of women, for they now are losing their fear of female predominance. It is often remarked that several Oxford colleges were founded by women, either alone or with their men relations, but that in no case were women students admitted to the foundation. This fact is the more noticeable in that coeducation was not unknown at that time.

STIGMA OF "FOREIGN" REMOVED FROM THE CHRISTIANITY IN CHINA

New York.—Christianity is no longer a religion in China upon which the stigma of "foreign" may be placed, despite the attacks upon it made by some advocates of the "new nationalism," said Ralph A. Ward of Peking for 16 years a Methodist Episcopal missionary in China, in a report to the Board of Foreign Missions here. Dr. Ward pointed out that many of the leading men of the republic are well known as Christians, and that 2,300,000 Chinese, many of them prominent in public and private life, are enrolled as members of Christian churches.

FIVE RING CIRCUS REALIZED AT LAST Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Enlarged to Accommodate New Big Acts.

At last the five-ring circus! For years reporters have used this figure of speech to describe the bigness of the Greatest Show on Earth. Now, for the first time in history patrons will actually find five rings when the greater Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey circus of 1925 comes to Goldsboro, Oct. 22 and Rocky Mount Oct. 23.

With the addition last winter of enough performing horses to bring the Big Show's total to three hundred and fifty the problem presented to the Ringling Brothers was, "How to handle five troupes of them in a single display?" The limits of the show grounds in many cities forbade lengthening the main-tent. None of the stages could be spared. All were needed for the collective groups of human actors. A goal of 800 members this year has been set by the local Chapter. "If everyone could know intimately the work that the Red Cross is carrying on," Mrs. Viola stated, "there would be no trouble in enrolling twice that number. Into communities devastated by tornadoes, floods, fires, and other disasters, the Red Cross carries your message of mercy. Into our government hospitals it goes to brighten the long days of our wounded soldiers. Day in and day out its public health nurses are caring for the sick, protecting the well, and teaching the principles of good health to all. And in countless other fields it is proving itself worthy of the recognition it has gained as the official relief agency of the American people."

Only Three Days Remains for Work General Conference

New Orleans, Oct. 21.—(AP)—With only three full days remaining for the work of the General Conference of Protestant Episcopal Church both Bishops and Deputies today were seeking to clear the calendar of the two houses. The first of a series of night sessions was inaugurated by the House of Deputies last night and the Bishops may follow suit.

With consideration of the revision of the book of Common Prayer, the most pressing matter before the Bishops, there was a feeling that no time should be lost if the task was to be completed. Well informed bishops suggested that no matters other than the Prayer Book revision and the burden of proof would be on the sponsors to show their importance.

An executive session yesterday afternoon was believed to have relieved the bishops of one duty preparation of the Triennial Pastoral Letter which will go to churches as a voice of the convention at its close. It is understood to have been completed.

The House of Bishops has appointed a committee to study the question of the duty of Christians in relation to the problems of war. In the House of Deputies there was created a Committee of three lawyers to report to the next convention on procedure regulating the trial of a Bishop or Clergyman.

New Orleans, 21.—More active participation in the Federal Council of Churches by the Episcopal Church than is proposed by the House of Bishops was voted today in the House of Deputies of the General Conference. The action came on a resolution brought forward by George W. Wickersham, of New York, proposing that co-operation be established through the various committees of the National Council with corresponding commissions on the Federal Council.

The Wickersham resolution was substituted as the position of the Deputies for a resolution previously adopted by the House of Bishops that the status can be maintained. The question will not be brought

again before the Bishops with possibility of the Committee of the conference finally defining the relations of the Episcopal Church and the Federal Council of Churches.

Gate Receipts State Fair \$2,500 Less Than Last Year

Raleigh, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The gate receipts of the North Carolina State Fair this year were about \$2,500 less than those of last year, Manager E. V. Walborn states.

The fair was hard hit by rain this year. Wednesday and Thursday, ordinarily the two big days of the fair, it rained. Friday, the weather was not settled, and it was muddy underfoot. The fair continued through Saturday, in the hope of making up for lost time during the rain, but again Saturday prospective fair visitors were discouraged by rain.

Urges Sportsmen Guard Against Forest Fires

Raleigh, Oct. 21.—(AP)—With the hunting season getting underway in the northeast and south, the forest service of the United States Department of Agriculture has issued an appeal, just received here, urging all sportsmen to guard against forest fires.

Ordinarily, says forestry officials, a great number of devastating forest fires are caused each fall by hunters. These fires not only destroy valuable timber but also the better forms of game animals, and thereby defeat the plans of the hunters themselves, officials point out.

Hunters, says the appeal, are frequently careless with matches, smoking tobacco, and camp fires. A great many sportsmen's organizations however, have for years been taking measures to prevent this carelessness by

their members, and other clubs and associations are following suit. "The federal government," says forestry officials, "employs its rangers, guards, and lookouts to protect the national forests. Most states likewise have fire wardens and rangers with police powers. Hunters should take warning and be the first to protect the woods. They should erase from the records any reference to forest fires traceable to hunters. The citizens of no community wants its beautiful autumn landscape blotted out with smoke from burning woodlands."

American Ins. of Architects to Meet in Fayetteville

Fayetteville, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Fayetteville is to be the scene of a first of a series of annual craft exhibits here next January, when the North Carolina branch of the American Institute of Architects holds its bi-annual convention here.

Plans for the convention are already being made, and committees have been appointed to take care of every detail of the convention, which is expected to bring about 125 architects to the city. W. H. Peeps, of Charlotte, has been appointed head of the program committee, with Stiles Dixon, of Fayetteville, in charge of the architects' exhibit, and Sam Rankin, of this city, in charge of the material men's exhibit. Other committees will take care of the entertainment and attendant publicity of the convention.

The old F. I. L. L. armory will be turned into an exhibit hall, and here all the craft of construction will show their exhibits for a week.
