Greek Troops Continue to Be Sent Toward the Bulgarian Border

Sofia, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Large contingents of Greek troops continued to be sent toward the Bulgarian border today. Bulgarian telegraph agency announced. It considers this an indication that the Greeks intend to enlarge the scope of their present offensives. The Government says that the Greeks have pierced Bulgarian territory to the depths of more than seven miles on a twenty mile front.

KIWANIANS WILL HOLD CONVENTION PINEHURST SOON

One of Outstanding Features Will Be a Golf Tournament in Which Golfers From Both Carolinas Will Participate

Raleigh, Oct. 24.—(AP)—One of the features which it is expected will contribute to the success of the Carolinas Kiwanis District convention at Pinehurst on November 5 and 6 is a golf tournament which has been arranged for. Kiwanians from both North and South Carolina will gather at this winter resort for those days for their annual convention.

Dr. M. R. Gibson, of Raleigh, has been appointed chairman of the golf committee for the district convention, and he announced today that his committee has made arrangements for the tournament, which will be played on the Pinehurst golf courses on the afternoon of Thursday, November 5.

Every Kiwanian of the two Carolinas has been invited by the committee to participate for the individual prizes and the clubs furnishing as many as four players, says Dr. Gibson, may compete for a trophy that will be awarded. It is the plan of the committee to stage a tournament at each of these annual conventions in future, the winner of the trophy to hold it for a year, the trophy to pass at the next convention to the winning club at that convention.

Already, says Dr. Gibson, eight or ten clubs have pledged a team for the tournament and more are expected to enter before the date of the convention.

In urging Kiwanians to enter the tournament, Dr. Gibson has stated that it will be mainly a handicap tournament and there will be a place for the good and the poor golfers. In fact, he has stated, the idea of getting the Kiwanians closer together is considered by the committee as equally important with the actual golfing displayed at the event.

Bull Fight Staged in Paris for Benefit Wounded Soldiers

Paris, Oct. 24.—(AP)—After nearly 2,000 years, an arena built by the Romans in Paris for their circus and gladiatorial combats returned to something like its original use today, when a bull fight was opened. It has been advertised as a spectacle equal in splendor to the shows in the royal arenas of Seville and Madrid, with the most prominent matadors of Spain taking part. It was also advertised that the bulls would not be killed.

The event has been organized by the press of Paris for the benefit of soldiers wounded in Morocco. The French red cross co-operated in staging the affair. Prizes for seats ranged from 400 francs for a box holding four persons to 20 francs for a seat on the stone tiers.

The hair bobs of Paris are prolific these days in the excuses they offer for the use of women who do not take kindly to short hair. Wilmington, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Loss of a barge and dredging equipment valued at \$50,000 in a seventy mile gale off Frying Pan Shoals Thursday evening was reported today by Captain John B. Whalen, of the Sanford Roff Company, of New Jersey. The dredge and the tug Wood towing her have put in here until the weather moderates. The dredge is bound for Miami, Florida, for land reclamation work.

Pitt County's First Thanksgiving Service Proves a Great Success

On Friday the 23rd at 11 o'clock giving service, in Greenville, N. C., in the morning, a crowd of Pitt County people assembled at the Fair Grounds and carried out the first Thanksgiving service of its kind ever held in the county. It was a special occasion to acknowledge the goodness of God to this part of the country this year in a material way, as well as in a spiritual way. The program as planned was carried out and all present expressed themselves as delighted with the idea.

The singing under the direction of Rev. R. F. Pittman, of Ayden, was very inspiring, especially the chorus singing by a group from Ayden, the Immanuel Baptist male quartette, and the Ayden male quartette. The period for testimonies and prayers was filled with fine responses by a number present.

The sermon by Rev. W. H. Horton, D. D., was full of fire and was a call to consecration to larger service for God on the part of His people. He emphasized the thought that oft-times suffering and hardship were blessings that we ought to be as thankful for as material prosperity.

The basket dinner, under the direction of Rev. D. W. Alexander of Bethel, was spread on a long table that had been prepared, and the whole crowd came together to do full justice to it as a big family.

The afternoon session was featured by the address of Judge E. H. Brooks, of Smithfield, who after giving some statistics of the wonderful material wealth and prosperity of North Carolina, gave some more startling statistics of the cost of crime, the alarming increase of murders and other forms of crime, which he laid at the door of the good people of the state and nation, the travesty on justice as evidenced in some recent trials, and above all to the need of the salvation of Jesus Christ, which is the only permanent hope of the nation and of the world. He called upon the Christian people to personally aid the ministers to give the gospel to the unsaved everywhere. His address was well received, and much commented on by the crowd that heard him.

After the address the following resolution was offered:
We, a representative body of Pitt county, assembled in a great Thanksgiving service, do hereby declare and set apart a day in each year, as a day of special thanksgiving and gratitude to God, for the material and spiritual blessings of life.
And be it resolved:
First: That we call upon all county and municipal officers, all business corporations and interprises, and every citizen of our county to accept and declare this day as a day set apart for special thanksgiving and praise.
Second: That we elect on each such annual occasion a general chairman and secretary, whose duties shall be to, in a general way, promote and direct such an organization.
Third: That the ministers, and one layman from each church in Pitt county, said laymen to be appointed by his respective church, be designated as the executive committee who shall act with and at the call of the general chairman.
This resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.
The following officers for the next service were elected: President, N. O. Warren; Secretary, K. W. Cobb. In addition all of the ministers and one layman from each county will be elected as an executive committee.
The offering, which was for the welfare work of the county, amounted to about \$90, and will be turned over to this department after some expenses are met.
On the whole, it is felt that a good start has been made to have this a permanent and yearly event. A suggestion was made that we should plan to enlist every county in Eastern Carolina in a similar movement, and at some time in the years to come to have all meet in some convenient place in the greatest services of its kind ever held.
The conclusions of this service with the singing of "Blest be the tie that binds" shows the good feeling and spirit that was present at this first Pitt County Thanksgiving Service.

ENDORSES SIX YEAR PLAN OF FEDERAL INHERITANCE TAX

Chairman Greene Opposes Immediate Repeal But Endorses Proposals for Immediate Reduction

Washington, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Proposals for immediate reduction in the Federal inheritance tax with repeal at the end of six years were endorsed today by Chairman Greene of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Such a scheme was presented to the committee yesterday by the National Committee on Inheritance Taxation composed of tax experts from every section of the country. In endorsing the six year plan, Mr. Greene said this time would give opportunity for the state to enact uniform inheritance tax law prior to withdrawal from this field of taxation of the National Government. Chairman Greene opposed immediate repeal but suggested that instead full credit might be allowed in settlement of the Federal levies for amount paid on state inheritance taxes. Secretary Mellon has proposed immediate repeal and his position was endorsed yesterday by a number of State Governors.

National Security League Opposed to Henderson Speaking

New York, Oct. 24.—(AP)—An invitation extended to Arthur Henderson, Home Secretary in the British Labor Cabinet headed by Ramsey MacDonald to address a Hartford Connecticut Y. M. C. A. luncheon of business men today was withdrawn because of a protest by the National Security League.

TOBACCO MARKET AVERAGED \$32.05 FOR ENTIRE WEEK

Market to Observe Holiday, Armistice Day; For Season, Market Has Sold 21,720,401 Pounds

According to official figures given by Secretary K. W. Cobb the Greenville Tobacco Market, for the week, sold 2,841,790 pounds for \$910,838.77, averaging \$32.05.

For the season the market has sold 21,720,401 pounds for \$5,048,596.19, averaging \$23.24.

The better grades during this week sold as high as 98 cents per pound.

For the entire season, last year, the Greenville market sold 28,064,226 pounds for \$6,799,811.93.

According to these figures it can readily be seen that for the entire season only about 7,000,000 more pounds were sold than have been sold during the two months of this season.

It is estimated that about one half of this year's crop has been sold.

The local market will observe holiday Armistice Day November 11th and will have no sales on that day.

Naval Court Inquiry Investigates Article Saturday E. Post

Washington, Oct. 24.—(AP)—The Naval Court of Inquiry into the Shenandoah disaster today asked the Saturday Evening Post whether its recent article on the Shenandoah appearing post humously under the name of the late Commander Zachary Lansdowne was authentic, accurate and complete as it came from his hand.

If the points are established it is the plan of the state to incorporate the article in its record. Great importance is attached to statement in the article as to the capabilities of the Shenandoah in all types of weather. Some of the witnesses before the court notable the widow of Commander Lansdowne, gave testimony indicating that the commander, who perished with his ship, was reluctant to take the fatal western trip during which the dirigible was wrecked.

The inquiry concerning the completeness of the article as published resulted, it was said at the Navy Department, from reports current in Washington that at least two paragraphs had been deleted from the original article and that they concern the feasibility of undertaking arctic explorations by dirigible, a project which it has been indicated the Commander favored.

Nine Tanks of Water Sent to Ashboro to Relieve Shortage

High Point, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Nine tank cars filled with water left High Point this morning for Ashboro to relieve that town's water shortage resulted from the prolonged drought. City officials of High Point said today that they have promised to supply Ashboro with more than 100,000 gallons of water daily until other arrangements are made for relief. The cars this morning were attached to the regular train, but beginning tomorrow the railroad officers have made arrangements to operate a special train of 15 tank cars.

Mrs. Lillian N. Duke Remains in Critical Condition Today

New York, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Mrs. Lillian N. Duke, divorced wife of the late James B. Duke, today remained in a critical condition at her home here. Her physician, Dr. Byron G. Clark, stated that his patient appeared weaker than yesterday. Mrs. Duke suffered two cerebral hemorrhages Thursday night and her entire left side is paralyzed and she lingers in a semi-conscious state, Dr. Clark said.

Body of South Car. Man Taken From Sunken S-51 Friday

New Port, R. I., Oct. 24.—(AP)—One of the two bodies taken from the engine room of the sunken navy submarine S-51 yesterday was identified today as that of James D. Hasel, Jr., Lieutenant Junior Grade, of Dillon, S. C.

Columbia Phonograph Announces Alliance of Four Companies

New York, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Alliance of four of the leading phonograph companies of the world representing total capitalization of approximately \$18,000,000 and operating factories in eleven countries was announced today by the Columbia Phonograph Company, one of the concerns involved in the transaction. The other companies included in the alliance are the Columbia Graphophone Limited of London, the Carl Lindstrom Company of Berlin, and the Trans Oceanic Trading Company of Amsterdam. Their alliance through a common holding company, the Columbia International Limited of London, constitutes a world wide manufacturing and trade arrangement whereby their laboratory and factory expects to co-operate in producing advanced types of phonograph records and radio equipment.

Bulgaria Sending Troops Into 'War Area'

Sofia, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Bulgaria is sending troops into the "war area" and has decided to make a stand so far as her limited military strength permits in case the Greeks continue to invade the territory granted her under the treaty of Neuilly. This is stated in authoritative quarters here. The artillery sent to the affected districts is limited to two field guns, but it is asserted that if brought into action they will fire upon the invaders until silenced by the superior long range guns. The moral of the officers and soldiers is said to be excellent and they have expressed themselves willing to die rather than allow the Greeks to advance further.

Weidemeir Forfeits \$5,000 Bond Today

St. Louis, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Accused of tricking or swindling six women, whom he met under various aliases, John W. Weidemeir failed to appear in the court of criminal correction here today to answer charges in connection with his career and his \$5,000 bond was forfeited.

Expects Negotiations Treaty With Panama Close in Few Days

Washington, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Secretary Kellogg expects negotiations for a treaty with Panama to replace the Taft agreement to be concluded within the next few days.

TAXES ON TOBACCO DISCUSSED BY WAYS MEANS COMMITTEE

Taxes of Automobiles, Admissions and Tobacco Discussed as First of Two Weeks of Public Hearings on Revisions of Revenue Law

Washington, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Taxes of automobiles, admissions and tobacco were up for discussion today before the House Ways and Means Committee as it concluded the first of two weeks of public hearings on revisions of the revenue law.

Reductions in all of these levies were sought by representatives of affected interests. No place for such cuts, however, is given in the \$300,000,000 reduction program suggested to the committee by Secretary Mellon except for repeal of the tax on automobile trucks, tires and accessories.

Mr. Mellon estimated that repeal of that levy would take up \$35,000,000 of the \$300,000,000 he allotted in his program for the reduction of miscellaneous taxes. The remainder should be devoted he thought to wiping out the taxes which yield but small rates, and were a nuisance to collect, such as those of art works. As to the admission levy, however, he believed that it would be retained since it applied only on tickets selling for more than 50 cents.

In a statement presenting the position of the Tobacco Market Association of the United States in favor of a cut in the tobacco tax, Charles Dushkin, of New York, declared that would permit sale of cigars at lower prices. A reduction of \$2.00 per thousand for five cent cigars, \$3.00 on the two for fifteen cent cigars and \$4.00 on the ten cent cigars, was proposed. Collections from tobacco levies next year as estimated by the treasury will be \$30,000,000, forming the greatest revenue producer among the miscellaneous taxes.

American Negro Labor Congress to Meet in Chicago

Washington, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Communists agitators are seeking to bring the American negro race into the revolutionary fold. The American negro labor congress, which is meeting in Chicago tomorrow is shown in the descriptive literature of which official note has been taken in Washington to have been organized chiefly by Communists, with backing from Russia, for the purpose of "awakening revolutionary significance" the negroes of America.

Negro Trade Unionists, whose participation in the congress has been solicited, have been warned by the American Federation of Labor through its President William Greene to refrain from any connection with it.

Of a congress which in the manifesto proclaims the purpose was of redressing what it regards as the social grievances of American negroes. Mr. Greene declared "it will not be held to benefit the negro, but to instill in the lives of that race the most pernicious doctrine—a race hatred." As uppermost among the social demands of the negro "workers and peasants" of the southern provinces of North America, to which the congress would address itself, the manifesto eludes the "Evolution of Jim Crowism or racial preparation."

International Schreider Trophy Sea Plane Race Will Open Tomorrow

Bay Shore Park, Baltimore, Oct. 24.—(AP)—The International Schreider Trophy sea plane race scheduled for this afternoon was formally postponed today and will be held tomorrow if the weather permits. The Chesapeake was covered with white caps and an increasingly strong easterly wind was blowing squalls of rain, and the contest committee decided to postpone today's program. The postponement will give the British team another chance to attempt to qualify their reserve plane tomorrow morning.

Automobile Races Called Off Account Weather Conditions

Washington, Oct. 24.—(AP)—The automobile races scheduled for today at Laurel, Maryland, were called off on account of weather conditions. They probably will be held Monday or Tuesday.

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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

"For God Hath Not Given Us the Spirit of Fear."—II Timothy, 1st Chapter, part of the 7th Verse

Before we can rightly understand this assertion of the Apostle, we must remember that "fear" is a word used in a double sense. It has two meanings—One, noble, the other, ignominious. This has caused ambiguity and misunderstanding in many minds.

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom," both David and Solomon tell us. But the Apostle St. John says, "there is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear, because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love."

All through the Bible we find this dual use of the word. In its noblest sense it is not "fear" at all, but reverence and awe—not fright, nor nervous shrinking. "There is forgiveness with thee that thou mayest be feared," that is, be revered, respected, revered. We are not "to fear God," but to "love God."

Neither does "the fear of the Lord" mean fear of the consequences of the breach of His laws, for no man is made wise by that. We may fear the consequences of a sin, and still commit it. It rather means that reverence for life's truth and beauty which will not allow them to be sacrificed and marred.

It is not of this exalted reverence that the Apostle writes, but of that "fear" which is the damnablest demon this side Hades, and possibly on the other side, too. "Fear," properly so called, has always stood in the way of human progress. It has always parted man from his maker, and man from his brother man. And of this "fear" the Apostle states, it was "not given us" by God.

Where, then, did "the spirit of fear" come from?

1. The origin of physical fear leads us back into the jungle. The mighty elephant still trembles at the sight of a tiny mouse, because ages ago the little rodent would crawl into the trunk of the sleeping giant, causing exquisite pain and annoyance. Fear of their forest foes developed swiftness in the antelope, cunning in the fox, agility in the ape, bristles for the hedgehog, the ability to change color for the chameleon and lizard, and all those protective coverings for the scaly monsters of the slime and bog.

2. The origin of mental fear, similarly, carries us back into the child age of the world. Our prehistoric ancestors ran for shelter to their cave dwellings at the approach of the food-hunting beasts; and cowered before the majestic forces of Nature—the thunder and lightning, the earthquake and the storm.

It was, perhaps, ages before a few of the brighter of the sons of men realized that these terrific displays did not prove as disastrous as they feared; and that it would be a good thing, for them, if they could make their fellows believe they had influence with these terrible forces. These embryo politicians and

priests pooled their interests as the chieftains and medicine men of the various tribes; and, as long as they could keep the majority in fear, they found easy food and shelter. For their own protection they made their followers prostrate themselves in their presence, and extend open hands showing no concealed weapons. An unarmed man on his knees was not a very dangerous foe. They conjured up fictitious stories of the gods and of their own sanctity; and faked wondrous exhibitions of their superiority to the common people. So through the long ages of cannibalism, slavery, serfdom, up to the present, man has had to struggle against debilitating, enervating fears which are only false shadows, and illusions which are only false lights.

Even to-day, some so-called Christian parents, as soon as their children are able to learn anything, educate them into a belief in unseen dangers, just as the Central Africans teach their young to fear the evil spirits lurking in the trees. Bogey-men and nocturnal bears, and hideous frightful creations of a diseased imagination are conjured up to make the little one lie still and go to sleep. Indeed, few of us can truthfully say we have reached middle age without knowing what it is to be afraid in the dark, afraid to be left alone, and that we have kept our inner-selves undaunted and fearless.

3. Spiritual fear is like some gigantic upstree spreading gloom, poison and dread all over our existence since we learnt to know right from wrong. Very young children do not suffer from it. Its roots lie back in memory and conscience. It is associated with our sense of short-coming and sin. The earliest reference to this "fear" in the Bible is found in the confession of our first parent, Adam, to God:—"I heard Thy voice in the garden and I was afraid, because I was naked, and I hid myself." Thus, as Shakespeare's "Hamlet" says:

"Thus conscience doth make cowards of us all."

After this we find men cowering before God, having no trust or confidence, afraid of what God will do next. The result of this "fear" is a network of sacrifices and observances in which the chief motive is to please, placate, and alter His attitude toward us; and a morality which is not so much a rule of life that man believes in, as a body of laws which God ordains and which man fears to disobey.

Man then develops a craven spirit in which his conduct is determined by the terrors which fill his mind. Preachers portrayed the offended Deity in lurid colors. Isaac Watts taught our fathers to sing:

"His nostrils breathe out living flames,
He's a consuming fire.

His jealous eye His wrath inflames
To raise His vengeance higher."

"Infants not a span long" would indeed be "a dainty dish" for such a Being!

And when, to the vicious vengeance of God you add the horrors of Hell and the tortures of the damned, so vividly described in the pulpits of a few years ago by men of culture—like Jonathan Edwards—you do not wonder that they crept to the feet of God with crushed and cringing spirits, and lost sight of the Father whom all should love.

Jesus never laid the burden of "fear" on the people in order to startle them into the acceptance of His message. He respected the delicacy of the human mind too much to turn the balance of choice by weighing it down with threats. It seems an incredible thing how out of the teachings of Jesus men could ever have built a doctrine of fear. It may have been necessary to rouse men from their lethargy with all this fire and thunder, but it is surely the lowest appeal that can be made to the hearts of men. When you have converted a soul through "fear," you have gained a coward; not a man; and a coward is of little use in the Kingdom of God.

Thus we rejoice in the assurance St. Paul gives to Timothy that "God hath not given us the spirit of fear"—it arose in our weakness, our ignorance, and our sinfulness.

The practical question for you, to-night, is: "Am I fearing God, or loving God?"

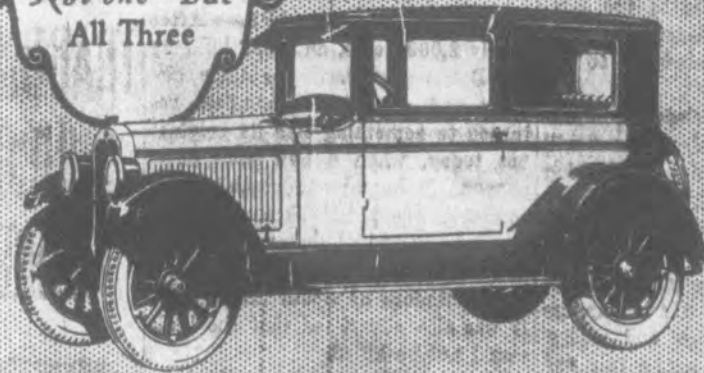

Millions of Pounds Tobacco Killed

Danville, Va., Oct. 12.—The frost which fell over the Danville area Saturday night, according to the observation of many farmers who are on the local tobacco market today, had a destructive frost such as has not been known in many years. The standing tobacco has been left blackened and worthless, and it is said that practically no attempt will be made to house it. Farmers are saying that just as soon as the physical condition of the soil will permit, the ploughs will be put in the fields and the standing stalks turned under.

On account of the seasons prevailing during the development of the crop, it is agreed that more of the weed was on the hill in some of the counties than in years at a corresponding date. The counties of Henry

and Franklin and the northern tier of the Pennsylvania section appear to be the greatest sufferers, although in numerous localities elsewhere, the weed was bitten and blackened.

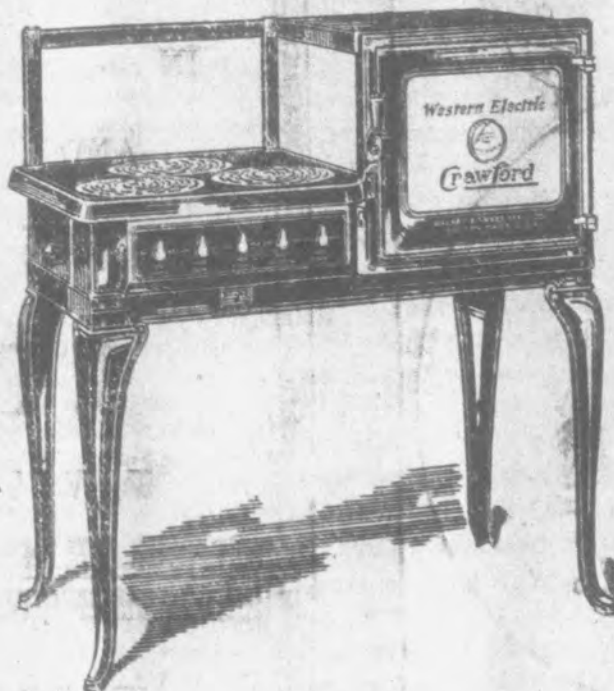

Dark Pool Members
Released Contracts

Hopkinsville, Ky.—October 13.—Seventy thousand members of the Dark Tobacco Growers' Co-operative association today were given privilege to dispose of their 1925 crops as they may wish.

This revolutionary action followed the acceptance by the board of directors of a resolution to that effect introduced by Aron Sapir, general counsel, by a vote of 18 to 6. The plan, a surprise to most of the members, was adopted with astonishing suddenness, the members said, and declared its effect a matter of conjecture.

Beside this change in policy, numerous offices were abolished at an estimated saving of \$150,000 annually. Geoffrey Morgan, general manager, had his salary cut from \$15,000 to \$6,000.

The following officers were elected: R. D. Farmer, secretary-treasurer; Roy Garrison, chief legal department; Claud R. Clark, director warehouses; W. H. Mears, chief accounting department; C. K. Eleven men comprising the field service department were eliminated.

Resolutions prepared by Mr. Sapir reaffirmed the belief that the association is of advantage to the grower; but realized thousands of members had become frightened by antagonistic propaganda and were refusing to deliver tobacco to the pool. Any attempt to enforce contracts, the resolutions read, would involve enormous expense with little hope of judgments from juries.

Members are urged to deliver crops to organizations as voluntary and loyal performance of "sacred contract" and warned their interests in tobacco on hand and warehouse properties will be jeopardized otherwise, but the resolutions assured, if members insist on selling crops outside the association channels no legal action will be taken against them to collect damages.

Announcement was made that sufficient facilities would be retained by the board to handle tobacco of loyal members.
