COL. MITCHELL ASKS COURT TO SUMMONS DAVIS AND WILBUR

Name of President Coolidge Not on List Named by Defense of Those it Would Like to Appear as Witnesses

Washington, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Col. Mitchell on trial by court martial as a result of his criticism of the conduct of the Government air services, today asked the court to summons Secretary Davis of the War Department, and Wilbur, of the Navy Department, as witnesses. Several other high officers of the two departments, several members of Congress, and more than 60 army and navy officers also were named by the defense in a list of those it would like to question.

The name of President Coolidge did not appear on the list. The Colonel and his counsel had made up their minds not to try to summon him.

It was apparent from the Colonel's actions in seeking to bring cabinet officers and members of Congress in to the trial that he hoped to thrash out in court the whole range of issues involved in the service controversy and thus present a justification of his charges that the services had been administered with "criminal and almost treasonable" negligence. Whether the court will admit that procedure is questionable.

The court proceeded with the actual opening of the trial without indicating whether it would summon those named for Colonel Mitchell's defense. Another motion by Mitchell's counsel to compel the court to have the ground that the court had no jurisdiction, was quickly rejected. Then the prosecution called to the stand as its first witness Arthur W. Yeager, recorded for the San Antonio Texas Light, to whom Colonel Mitchell gave a copy of his San Antonio statement containing the accusation which led to his arrest.

The prosecution called to the stand Lieutenant Colonel George L. Hicks, Adjutant General of the Eighth Corps Area in San Antonio. He testified that he had submitted newspaper copies of the Mitchell statements to Colonel Mitchell in San Antonio and had obtained from him in the form of official army correspondence an admission that he had prepared them for publication.

Representative Reid, of defense counsel cross examined Colonel Hicks to the extent of one question—an interrogation based on the fact that the General charge against Colonel Mitchell is that his conduct was prejudicial to "good order and discipline."

"Did any disorder or bad discipline result in the eastern corps area from publication of these statements?" Reid asked.

"They did not," Colonel Hicks replied.

"That's all," said Reid.

PITT COUNTY PLANS UNDERTAKE FOREST FIRE PREVENTION

District Forester of State Forest Service Visits City in Interest of Work Which Begins January 1

Mr. Chas. H. Flory, District Forester, of the Department of Conservation and Development, State Forest Service, was in Greenville today looking after the Forest Fire Prevention work which Pitt county expects to undertake, beginning January, first.

The State and Federal Governments realizing the great importance of Forest Fire Prevention gives to each county the same amount of money which the county raises. This is the first time that Pitt county has undertaken this work which will not only prove an invaluable aid in preventing fires.

Mr. Flory will explain in detail to those interested the plans for the work and show just what is necessary in accomplishing great results.

LINCOLN'S NAME ADOPTED BY ILLINOIS CITY BEFORE FAM

Lincoln, Ill.—Of the 24 cities in the United States which bear the name of Lincoln, this city alone took the name during the life time of Abraham Lincoln and when he knew no fame historians here say. He christened this city with two water melons.

When the railroad, which later became the Chicago and Alton, was laid through Illinois in 1852, Robert La. them, Virgil Hickox and John D. Gillett, all famous pioneers of Illinois purchased a section of land adjacent to the railroad right of way, as a prospective town site and county seat.

They were personal friends of Lincoln who was a traveling circuit lawyer. He was their legal adviser in the location of the proposed town. In Lincoln's office in Springfield on Aug. 24, 1853, the pioneers discussed the name for the proposed town. One of the proprietors said:

"Let's name the town for Abe and call it Lincoln."

The others agreed. Lincoln's own modest humor then rose to the occasion and he said:

"All right, boys, go ahead—but I think you are making a mistake. Nothing named Lincoln, as far as I know ever amounted to much."

Five days after the new town was named, a sale of lots occurred on the new town site at which the future President attended. At the noon hour Lincoln purchased two watermelons at a vendor's booth. With a melon under each arm, he called the proprietors of the new town to the proposed court house square, cut the two melons in halves. He gave a half to each proprietor and retained a half himself, with the remark:

"We will proceed now to christen the new town."

INCREASE IN EXPORT RATE OF TOBACCO IS HELD UNJUSTIFIED

Railroads Which Proposed to Revive Their Schedules Ordered to Maintain Existing Rates

Washington, Nov. 2.—(AP)—An increase of five cents per 100 pounds in the export on tobacco moving from Carolina territory to New Port News for storage and warehousing, is held unjustified, the Interstate Commerce Commission ordered today.

Railroads which proposed to revise their schedules were ordered to maintain existing rates.

The increase has been under suspension during the Commission's investigation. The proposal to raise the New Port News charge was supported in part by Norfolk interests.

The railroads proposal to increase the rates to New Port News appeared to be inspired by their decision to obtain a larger share of the tobacco traffic than they now receive. The Commission's decision said after pointing out that the railroads instituting the increase mainly served Norfolk and by pressure of owners of interior warehouses of Norfolk, who have lost to the warehousemen of New Port News a considerable amount of the business they formerly enjoyed.

Italian Debt Funding Commission Ready to Re-Open Conference

Washington, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The Italian Debt Funding Commission was ready to re-open here today with the American Commission, the conference on a settlement of the Italian Debt to the United States after an interval of several months devoted to study of Italy's financial and economic situations.

Treasury figures placed the Italian debt at \$2,138,543,852 including both interest and principal.

The first joint session with the American Commission was scheduled for four o'clock this afternoon.

Southern Medical Ass'n. to Meet in Dallas Nov. 9-12

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Physicians and surgeons from every state below the Mason-Dixon line will gather here for the annual convention of the Southern Medical Association November 9 to 12. The general meeting and scientific addresses are expected to take place in the First Baptist church Sunday school building recently completed an eight story structure near the business section.

The Bible class rooms of the new building will afford ample room for the large number of visitors expected. This will be the first time in the history of the association that all lectures will be given in a single place, it is announced. The meeting place is only two blocks from the new Medical Arts building.

The most elaborate course of lectures and clinics ever held in the South has been scheduled for the convention, according to Dr. George L. Carlisle, of the local committee on arrangements. He explained that medical gatherings of a convention nature are in reality brief intensive courses in post-graduate work, in which every branch of medical science is represented.

"Medical science has progressed," Dr. Carlisle declared, "more in the last 50 years than during the entire period from the time of Hippocrates, the father of medicine, 460 B. C., until the middle of the last century. As each new fact in the treatment and prevention of diseases is discovered, the way is opened by this discovery to investigation in other fields."

"Everywhere in the various research laboratories of the country, medical men are working in unknown fields in their search for more light on the cause, prevention, and cure of every disease to which man is heir. New discoveries are being made with startling rapidity."

SLAIN BANDIT IS IDENTIFIED TODAY DUTCH ANDERSON

Identification Made of Finger Prints of the Slain Bandit Compared With Those of Anderson

Muskegon, Michigan, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The bandit slain here Saturday night after he had fatally wounded Charles Hammond City Detective, was positively identified today as "Dutch" Anderson, notorious thug and Pal of Gerald Chapman, the Bandit. The identification was made by finger prints, of the slain bandit when compared with those of Anderson. Secret services operators who landed here this morning also aided in the identification. Anderson went to his death fighting. So did Detective Hammond, who although fatally wounded wrestled the revolver from the bandit's hands in an alley in the shadows of the police station and then killed Anderson with the latter's own weapon.

The arrest was made after Anderson, who had \$2,200 in counterfeit \$20 bills on his person, had passed one for a box of candy at the Colonial Cafe.

SIX KILLED WHEN TRAIN CRASHES INTO LOADED SCHOOL BUS

Driver of Bus and At Least 20 Children Injured at Rail Road Crossing in Georgia

Nahunta, Ga., Nov. 2.—(AP)—Six were killed and at least 20 children injured when the Atlantic Coast Line fast train No. 81, New York to Florida, crashed into a loaded school bus at the grade crossing here shortly after eight o'clock this morning.

The bus which collected rural children in this vicinity was nearing the town school when it was struck by the train. The force of the impact scattered the children about the track and road. The bodies and the injured children were placed on board a special A. C. L. train and hurried to Way Cross where they were sent to a hospital. The driver of the bus is said to be seriously injured. Up to 10:30 o'clock families of the children were unaware of the tragedy. Parties were being organized here to go to the families, who live two to seven miles away, and inform them of the crash.

Traffic Accidents Claim Heavy Toll Killed and Injured

Atlanta, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Traffic accidents in southern states claimed a toll of at least 21 deaths and 50 injuries over the week-end. The slippery condition of pavements in the cities due to the general rain of the south was blamed for a large portion of the accidents.

North Carolina reported the heaviest toll in deaths. Charlotte reported four killed and three injured, while Greensboro reported four dead and 11 injured.

Guerilla Warfare Spreads Over Vast Areas in Syria

London, Nov. 2.—A message from Jerusalem to the National Political League says that Guerilla warfare has spread over vast areas in Syria between Damascus and Homs, 80 miles north of Damascus on the railroad and is shaking French control of the mandated region. Another message says that eleven villages in the Damascus district have joined the Guerillas, who are besieging four towns.

Damascus reports also say that foreigners and native women are leaving Damascus by the thousands, but that native men are forbidden to leave. One district reiterates the report that 1,200 prisoners were killed at Damascus when following a revolt in the prison, the French bombarded it.

Collections of State Dept. of Revenue Totaled \$1,047,496.77

Raleigh, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Collections of the State Department of Revenue for the month of October totaled \$1,047,496.77. This does not include the collections of the Motor Vehicle Department. The collections, the largest ever recorded during October, according to Commissioner of Revenue R. A. Doughton, show a big increase over those a year ago, when the collections were \$843,322.95.

The largest single item in the month's collection was the amount from corporation franchise taxes. This item during October this year totaled \$740,558.96 as compared with \$269,442.89 for October of 1924.

Floyd Assumes Duties Extension Agronomist At the State College

Raleigh, Nov. 2.—(AP)—E. Y. Floyd, who assumes his duties as extension agronomist in tobacco work at State College on December 1, graduated from State College with a bachelor's degree in 1920. Mr. Floyd is a native of Hester, in Granville county.

Mr. Floyd was reared on a tobacco farm in Granville county, and has always taken much interest in community development in his home section. He made excellent grades in his studies at State College, it is stated at the college, and since his graduation has been a successful tobacco farmer.

Mr. Floyd, who will be located at the college, will work with county agents and tobacco farmers all over North Carolina, and will devote a large part of his time especially to aiding farmers in improving the yield and quality of the weed produced.

He takes the place made vacant by H. A. McGee, who resigned to enter the service of a large tobacco growing corporation in southern Australia. Mr. McGee recently sailed from San Francisco for Sydney, where he will be located in his new work.

The new agronomist is well equipped both by practical experience and training for his work, says Professor B. C. Williams, chief of agronomy at the college. Mr. Floyd will work closely with E. G. Moss, director of the tobacco branch station near Oxford.

BETHEL YOUNG MAN IS BADLY INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Mr. Clarence Carson, Suffering Serious Injuries Found in Corn Field Near Overturned Car

Mr. Clarence Carson, son of Mr. Sam Carson of Bethel, is in the Rocky Mount hospital, in a serious condition as results of injuries received in an automobile accident early Sunday morning.

Just how the accident occurred is not known. Mr. Carson left his home about mid-night Saturday night and early yesterday morning he was found in a cotton patch in an unconscious condition, suffering a badly cut arm, and an ugly cut above his right temple. From the condition of the car it appeared that it had swerved from the right side of the road, overturning three times before it finally landed in the field. Physicians stated that the cold atmosphere had checked the flow of blood from the wounds, no doubt preventing him from bleeding to death.

To Investigate Possible Existence Shoal Water Cape Hatteras Region

Washington, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The possible existence of Shoal water in general region of Cape Hatteras where charts show nothing but deep water will be investigated by the survey ship Nakomis this month by orders of the Hydrographic office of the Navy.

The Nakomis is to leave Philadelphia for survey work in Cuban waters about the middle of the month and on the way south will stop in the Nakomis region. Reports have been made by the American steamer West Heler that 20 fathoms was encountered 20 miles off Frying Pan Shoals to the south east of Cape Hatteras where the chart showed over 100 fathoms.

Naval officers said that in the past 90 years reports have been received from steamers on three or four occasions of shoal water in the Cape Hatteras region where the chart showed practically no bottom.

Captain Paul Foley, now technical aid to the Secretary of the Navy told today of an extraordinary experience he had in that region in 1922. A British steamer, he said, that year had reported six fathoms 90 miles slightly northeast of Diamond Light Ship, almost directly off the tip of Cape Hatteras where 1200 fathoms were shown on the chart.

By order of a Fleet Commander, Captain Foley proceeded to the spot of the Prometheus and was unable to locate the shoals reported. The second day of the test, however, the vessel was steaming in the vicinity and was overwhelmed by a wall of water 80 feet high, being a virtual tidal wall.

NEGROES HEAVILY GUARDED AS THEY GO ON TRIAL TODAY

Alvin Mansel and Preston Neely, Charged With Attack on White Women Arraigned in Asheville Court Today

Asheville, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Surrounded by a detachment of National guard troops and deputy sheriffs, Alvin Mansel and Preston Neely, negroes charged with attacks on white women were arraigned in Superior Court here this morning. Shortly after Judge Arthur M. Stack took his seat on the bench, he ordered the court room cleared and told the deputy sheriff to re-admit the audience one by one after they had been searched for weapons. Every precaution is being taken to prevent violence against the prisoners. Members of troops F. North Carolina National Guard, under command of Major Edward F. Jones, mobilized at the Armory yesterday and remained under arms all night. The troops passed through the business section this morning and a detachment of ten troopers went to the jail to accompany the prisoners to the court room. A half dozen deputy sheriffs accompanied them and all were heavily armed.

The method used in returning the prisoners to the city was not disclosed, but it was learned this morning that both Mansel and Neely were in the local jail. Mansel had been at Charlotte and Neely was kept in Greensboro where they were taken to await mob attacks.

Judge Stack charged the grand jury this morning that it is to investigate the case where Neely is alleged to have attacked a woman in the west Asheville section on Thursday, October 22. A special venire was ordered for the trial of Mansel, who was indicted several weeks ago.

AMERICAN WOMEN'S MEANS OF HOME SAVING TO FRANCE

New York—French housewives who still do most of their household drudgery by hand will soon have a chance to study methods of American housewives who accomplish the same results with little electrical and mechanical servants.

A "model American home" now being exhibited here will be dismantled and shipped to France to take its part in the International Exhibition of Household Appliances at the Grand Palais of Paris in December.

Electricity, although used extensively in France and available in almost any quantity, is confined almost entirely to lighting purposes.

The American exhibition, sponsored by 90 prominent manufacturers, is the result of a plea made last spring by Albert Bro'sis, who was sent to the United States by the French Department of Public Instruction to exhibit in 1925.

"The French people know that you Americans have mastered the art of getting your household and office work done with a minimum of human drudgery," he said, "but they do not know how you manage this. The French housewife who still does her washing, ironing, cooking, sewing, scrubbing and cleaning with her own hands has much to learn from the American woman who uses little electrical servants for such work."

The interior of the model home, which in fact will be an ambassador from the American hearthside, is designed along the lines of a modest, early American home. It is a two-story, shingle, frame house with ten rooms and four baths. The kitchen and laundry are likely to prove wonder spots for the French housewife.

After the Paris exhibition, the model home will be awarded to the French citizen who has made the greatest contribution to humanity in recent years as a gift from the American people. It will then be dismantled a second time and erected on a site selected by the winner.

AN AUTO DANGER

Carbon monoxide gas—the deadly fumes thrown off by the exhaust of an automobile—has become so great a menace to the automobile-using public that government agencies and life and accident insurance companies are taking preventative measures. There is a real

cause for concern in this invisible peril.

Knowing the evil is half its extinction in this era of invention and scientific research and the motorist may confidently expect the early elimination of the treacherous monoxide gas. Science will eventually solve the problem.

But while the chemists and automobile engineers are scratching their heads over the solution the public can attain the same desired result by the exercise of a little care. Ventilation is the arch enemy of the poisonous exhaust gasses. There is danger in running the engine in a closed garage. Keep the garage doors open while the motor is running.

Caution has solved many problems created by the growth of the automobile and is just as effective in the monoxide gas problem. Lives are being saved by those organizations which have undertaken to inform the public of this menace.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT PLANS IN KANSAS CITY ASK \$27,000,000

Kansas City, Mo.—To speed civic improvements Kansas City proposes to spend \$27,000,000 within the next few years.

Voters will have an opportunity November 3 to act upon 25 bond proposals adopted by the city council.

To cope with growing traffic congestion an expenditure of \$7,500,000

is proposed for opening and widening traffic ways. This is the largest single item, but other proposals bring the traffic bill up to more than \$11,000,000.

Parks and beautification would cost another \$7,000,000, with more than \$4,000,000 to be spent in acquiring and beautifying the section around the union station and the Liberty memorial, which has been envisioned as a civic center.

Singn boards perched on hills overlooking the \$2,000,000 memorial and union station plaza will go if the bond issue is authorized by the voters for the purchase of adjacent property.

Another proposal calls for \$800,000 for a municipal auditorium.

For a municipal air field, bonds of half a million dollars would be issued and \$50,000 would be added for a better tourist camp.

Another item of \$1,500,000 is for the city's share of the cost of a free highway bridge across the Missouri river.

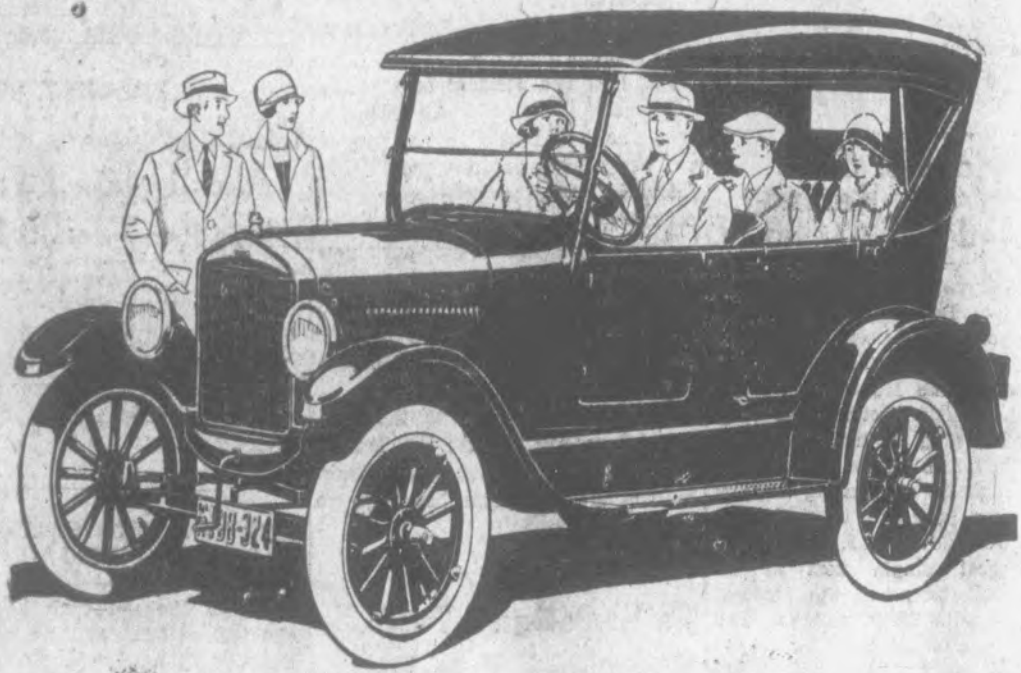

Dublin.—The Free State is becoming sick and tired of politics and politicians.

Political observers state that not since President Cosgrave assumed office has his government been so unpopular, and that, if he were compelled to seek a mandate from the people at the present time he would be defeated.

Indicative of the trend of public feeling in politics, however, is the fact that no matter what party succeeded him, it would be publicly unpopular.

The people are beginning to get wise to the fact that the professional politicians in all the Free State parties are only office hunters, and have not intention of serving the people.

It is asserted that the Sinn Féiners who were elected to the Cosgrave Government have drawn large salaries and lived in the lap of political luxury, while they have pitchedforked their relatives into easy and lucrative positions in the various state departments.

Day after day instances are being brought to the notice of the public of positions to which they are wholly unsuitable, their only qualification being a political connection.

One such case is that of a young man who has been appointed to be a school inspector at a salary of \$3,500 yearly and traveling expenses. I know from personal experience, the writer said, that he would barely pass a third grade examination.

It is safe to say, however, that the public is not interested, and that if a general election does come it will be one of the most apathetic on record.

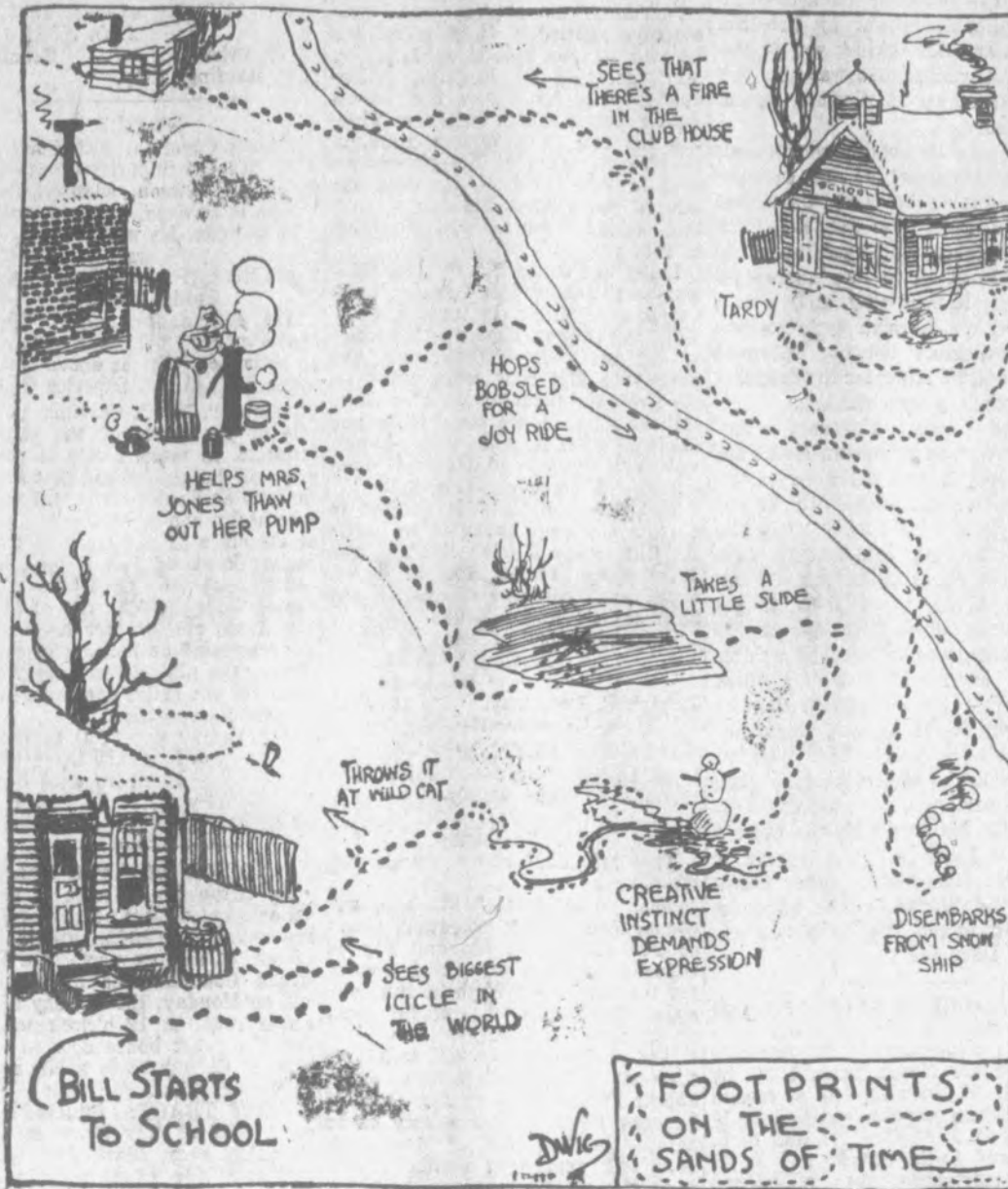
