STATE SCORES IN FIRST CLASH TRIAL MEMBERS OF MOB SET BY TREASURY TOTAL TAX CUT MAY ELABORATE PLANS GO ABOVE LIMIT FOR ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATION HERE

Overrules Point Defendants Had Committed No Crime Because Negro Had Been Removed When They Arrived at Jail

Asheville, Nov. 10.—(AP)—In an effort to secure conviction of 37 defendants on trial as alleged participants in the mob that stormed the county jail on the night of September 19 in an effort to lynch a negro, the state today introduced Captain Edward A. Hall, of the police department, to give detailed testimony.

The officer gave the name of defendants who he said were present at the jail when the cells were entered and locks broken. On account of his physical condition brought about by a long period of illness, the court permitted the state attorney to ask the witness leading questions. This ruling brought forth strenuous objections on the part of the defendants, but their motions were over ruled promptly by Judge A. M. Stack.

Captain Hall told the court that he went to the jail about eleven o'clock on the night the institution was stormed, stating the mob had gone there a short time after Alvin Karpis, the negro they sought, had been taken away. Defense attorneys made the point that the prisoner had been removed at the time the defendants searched the institution, and therefore the defendants had committed no crime. This point was over ruled by the court.

The officer said there were cursing and shouts from the crowd to "Go in and get the negro." The officer then listed both of the defendants as being members of the mob and also added the names of several others who are not under indictment.

Captain Hall told the jury he heard Sam Troupe say, "Let's go in and get the negro," and Troupe entered the jail when the inside gate was broken. He then described what took place within the jail and named various members of the defendants as being those who broke the lock on cells and went through the halls and cells of the jail. The officer expressed the opinion that there were about 200 members of the mob who entered the jail.

Vienna, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A communist attempt to assassinate the King of Roumania has been thwarted. Lying in wait in a country inn for the King to return from hunting, a band of Communists was captured by troops today.

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Reduction of the automobile taxes and repeal of many of the special excise levies was voted today by the House Ways and Means committee.

URGES TEACHING OF CHESS AS STEADYING EFFECT ON WOMEN

London.—Chess as a steady influence for girls who seek the excitement of a hectic life is urged by Mrs. Arthur Rawson, president of the Imperial Chess Club, in furthering her contention that teaching of the game should not alone be confined to boys.

Many English secondary schools are teaching boys to play chess on the ground that it is a splendid exercise in logic and mental training.

"Chess develops the power of concentration, ordered thinking and foresight, and above all, trains the mind to work logically," said Mrs. Rawson, who believes that with character thus developed there would be less dissipation among men and women.

Final Decision on Program for Reduction or Repeal of Miscellaneous Taxes Given Consideration

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Final decision today on a program for reduction, or repeal, of many of the miscellaneous taxes was the aim of the House Ways and Means Committee in giving further consideration to these levies in its preparation of a new revenue bill. Although a number of tentative decisions were understood already to have been reached the numerous appeals for relief on the various excise levies still presented a problem as to how far the committee should go in granting them. There was some likelihood that the committee would decide to go above the limit of \$300,000,000 set by the treasury and tentatively accepted by the committee for the total tax cut, thus giving more relief in the miscellaneous taxes than would be possible if that figure were used.

Chairman Greene and other committee members expressed the opinion that the treasury could stand a total reduction of \$250,000,000, which would leave approximately \$150,000,000 for reduction in the miscellaneous levies. The committee has not announced many of its tentative decisions, but changes understood all ready to have been approved were a cut of from five to three percent in the levy on automobile passenger cars and repeal of the taxes on automobile trucks, tires, and accessories.

The tentative program is reported also to carry a fifty percent cut in the alcohol tax and a reduction in the levy on cigars in addition to outright repeal of a number of other taxes.

Capital Levy Decided As Fifteen Pct. Tax On Securities Defeated

Paris, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A capital levy described as a fifteen percent tax on securities was defeated today in the finance committee of the Chamber of Deputies which is studying Premier Painleve's plan for financial restoration of the French Treasury. This was considered a heavy reverse for the government.

The failure of M. Painleve to include real estate and landed property and confining the levy to securities alone annoyed the Deputies representing towns and cities against him. Following the vote he decided it was necessary to consult President Doumergue and left the Chamber at once for the President's palace.

Despite the defeat in the Chamber Committee, it was declared this evening that the government would carry on feeling that the final decision must rest with Parliament.

Tall Oaks Grow From Larger Specimens

Asheville, Nov. 10.—(AP)—An old adage will have to be modified, for tall oaks appear to grow not from "little acorns," but from the larger specimens.

This is the announcement of Silviculturist Clarence F. Korstian, of the Appalachian Forest Experiment Station, of the United States Department of Agriculture. His conclusion is the result of recent experiments in oak regeneration at Canton.

A larger per centage of large acorns produce seedlings, and these in turn are taller, sturdier, and more vigorous than the seedlings of smaller acorns. Mr. Korstian is also engaged in testing the effect of excessive heat upon acorns, reproducing in the laboratory the degree of heat that would be experienced in forest fires of various intensity. The results of these tests will explain to the silviculturist many of the phenomena observed on lands where stands of oak have been damaged by fire.

Col. John Monroe Johnston, of Rainbow Division, to Deliver Address; Free Dinner for Veterans of All Wars

At 10:30 o'clock veterans of all wars will meet at the Atlantic Coast Line depot. Form a parade, and led by the High School band, will go to the Teachers College where Colonel John Monroe Johnston will deliver the address of the day. In addition to his address many other interesting numbers will feature the program at the College.

Immediately after the exercises dinner will be served at Forbes and Morton's Warehouse to Veterans of all wars Col. Johnston and others who have a part in the day's exercises.

In the afternoon at 3:30 o'clock at White's Theatre, that great war picture, "The New Commandment," will be shown. This picture screened from the novel "Invisible Wounds," by Col. Frederick Palmer, was released for the first time in New York yesterday and is absolutely a new production. Greenville is indeed fortunate in being able to receive one of the first releases of this wonderful picture. Miss Blanche Sweet and Ben Lyon are featured with an all-star cast. It is the big Armistice Day special.

The afternoon will also be featured by a foot ball game at the Pitt County Fair Grounds, when the local High School team meets the team of the Tarboro High School. Preceding the foot ball game, horse races will be staged, and these promise to be especially enjoyable.

A celebration worthy of the event has been planned and with the program which has been arranged, and Col. J. Monroe Johnston's address, the day should be a great success.

Paris, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Efforts to affect a compromise between the conflicting elements in the Painleve majority failed this morning and the block of the left is now thought to be disrupted beyond repair. A cabinet meeting has been called for five o'clock this afternoon to consider the situation.

Headquarters of Armistice Celebration Committee is Raided

Dublin, Ireland, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The undying Anti-British sentiment among the extreme Sinnfeiners, which seems to have been especially aroused by the preparation to revive the Armistice Day scene which surprised and angered them in 1924, is attributed a series of armed raids on two moving picture shows and the headquarters of the Armistice Celebration Committee.

TAILTEANN GAMES WILL BE HELD AGAIN IN DUBLIN IN THREE YEARS

Dublin.—The festival of the Tailteann Games, which proved successful in Dublin last year, is to be repeated in 1928, and preparations are well under way.

Lieutenant Bell of the United States Army, who last year had charge of the American team, recently visited Dublin and conferred with Postmaster General Walsh, who is the Chairman of the Tailteann Council. Lieutenant Bell reported much American interest in the festival and said American teams will be organized for the 1928 festival.

Wife Balks Queer Divorce Pact

One of the queerest love tangles on record came to light in Chicago when Mrs. Bradford Whiting, wife of an immensely wealthy Chicago man, filed suit for separate maintenance, but refused to bring suit for divorce. It was alleged that at a breakfast, following a New Year's Eve party, Whiting, with his wife present, told Richard Tompkinson, his former friend, that he was in love with Mrs. Tompkinson and desired to marry her. Tompkinson is said to have permitted his wife to secure her divorce, but Mrs. Whiting declares she will not live her husband to marry the other woman.

CONFERENCE MAY RESULT IN ENDING ANTHRACITE STRIKE

Governor Pinchot Requests Lewis and Inglis to Meet Him Separately to Discuss the Suspension

Philadelphia, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A determination to bring about renewal of the wage conference between operators and miners was seen here today in Governor Pinchot's request to join John L. Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers and Major William W. Inglis, chairman of the Operators Wage Committee, to meet him separately to discuss the anthracite suspension. The Governor expects to see Mr. Lewis here on Wednesday and Mr. Inglis the next day. Mr. Pinchot brought about a settlement of the anthracite controversy two years ago and observers of the present situation expressed the opinion that he would make a strong effort to at least bring the two sides together again in the conference room.

Governor Pinchot has been in daily touch with the suspension since the 158,000 miners laid down their tools on September 1. He has conferred several times with regard to the situation.

Both Mr. Lewis and Major Inglis withheld comment on Governor Pinchot's request until receipt of his letter which were mailed from Philadelphia last night.

Fourth Annual Radio Conference in Session

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Recommendation that no more licenses be given broadcast casting stations until there has been a reduction in the number now in operation was today in a resolution adopted here today by a sub-committee of the fourth annual radio conference.

Admit Mrs Rhinelander Has Negro Blood

White Plains, N. Y., Nov. 10.—(AP)—Counsel for Mrs. Alice Jones Rhinelander, now being sued for annulment of her marriage to Leonard Kip Rhinelander, on the ground of fraudulent representation of her race today admitted in open court that their client had some colored blood.

The admission was made by Lee H. Davis, chief of the defense counsel, at the opening of his outline of what the defense expects to prove. He said, "The defense counsel hereby withdraws the previous denial as to the blood of this defendant and for the purpose of this trial and to shorten the trial, admits that the defendant has some colored blood."

Federal Government to Pause 2 Minutes On Armistice Day

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—A Cessation of Governmental activities and industrial commercial and business activities of the country for a brief space at eleven o'clock tomorrow in observance of Armistice Day was recommended to the country by President Coolidge.

The President's desire was made known at the White House where officials said that method of observing the anniversary had been universally approved by the cabinet at today's meeting. The Federal Government itself will set an example and pause for two minutes.

Biological Survey Issues a Directory Concerning G. Laws

Raleigh, Nov. 10.—(AP)—For the convenience of game authorities bird protection organization, and others in procuring information concerning game and game laws, the twenty-sixth annual Directory of Officials and Organizations Concerned with the Protection of Birds and Game has been issued by the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is announced in a bulletin of the Department just received here.

The organization and personnel of governmental establishments in this country, Canada, and Mexico concerned with game matters are given, together with the names and addresses of officials of state-wide game and bird protective associations and societies, and of the principal national organizations interested in bird protection, including the advisory board, migratory-bird treaty act.

Legislative changes affecting game administration made during the year are noted, especially the appointment of the Alaskan Game Commission of five members.

AIR POLICIES AT HOME AND ABROAD ASSAILED TODAY IN FAYETTEVILLE METHODISTS TO HOLD ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Captain Oldys, Quotes From Aviation Report of '23 Which Describes Air Service "Unfortunate and Critical"

Washington, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Government's air policies both at home and in far off American possessions were assailed today in defense testimony before the Mitchell court martial board. Captain Robert Oldys, of the air service, called to support Colonel Mitchell's charge of treasonable disregard of National interest in aviation, declared he had in his possession a letter written by the American Minister Quinquella in 1923 warning of a scheme by "Alien interests" to establish a foot hold in Central America near the Panama Canal.

The minister, the witness said, unsuccessfully urged the American Government to establish an air mail service to Central America.

Actual presentation of the letter in evidence was delayed, temporarily at least, by objection by the prosecution.

Captain Oldys also quoted at length from the aviation report presented in 1923 by the Lasser Board of army officers containing recommendation for air defenses on the Philippines and Hawaii which the witness said had been approved by the Secretary of War, but never carried into effect. This report, he said, described the situation in the air service as "unfortunate and critical."

So many objections were interposed by the prosecution that Colonel Blanton Winship, law member of the court, reminded Colonel Sherman Mooreland, the prosecutor, of his previous statements that he would not object to testimony intended to prove the truth of Colonel Mitchell's charges if it was offered in extenuation or mitigation.

Colonel Mooreland said he must continue to object on the grounds that the evidence being offered was incompetent and irrelevant and not obtained from the best sources. Major Henry H. Arnold, in charge of the information division of the air service, testified that there were 38 air service deaths in 1924 and 45 thus far in 1925. The official record showed the causes to be from fire, lack of weather information, collapse of the craft in the air and motor failures.

In an effort to prove Colonel Mitchell's charge that high army and navy officers had given Congress misleading information, defense counsel directed Major Arnold's attention to statements made by Rear Admiral Jones and Spraus, and Brigadier General Drum, to the House Committee.

The Major testified that the United States Air Service did not compare favorably with those of other major powers as General Drum had reported to the House investigating committee. Under cross examination by Colonel Mooreland the air service officer said he did not take geographical differences into consideration in estimating comparative air strength.

Several Collegiate Debates for Davidson Are Now Pending

Davidson, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Collegiate debates for the Davidson College teams with the Universities of Pennsylvania, Arizona, South Carolina, William and Mary, Sewanee, and Virginia Poly Tech are pending. It has been announced here.

The Davidson debating team manager is in corresponding with these teams, and expects to complete arrangements with most of them for debates during the present year.

Davidson has seven varsity debaters in school this year. They are Hollinsworth, Parker, Shaw, Bowie, Ratchford, Williams, and Wharton.

In preparation for the intercollegiate arguments, the Junior-Senior and Freshman-Sophomore intervarsity debates will be held in the near future, it is understood.

Conference Will Begin Its Six-Day Session Tomorrow Morning at 9 O'clock

Fayetteville, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Meeting preliminary to the convening here tomorrow morning of the annual North Carolina conference of the Methodist Episcopal church South, were expected to be held here today.

The conference which will begin its six-day session tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, will be featured by the vote on unification of the northern and southern branches of the Methodist church, and by the election of delegates to the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, next May.

During the day, various meetings of boards and committees were expected to be held, as was a meeting of Bishop Denny, who will preside at the conference, and his cabinet, composed of nine presiding elders, who act in an advisory capacity to the bishop. And this evening, according to a long established custom, there will be a public meeting of the Historical Society, to be featured by addresses.

The presiding elders of the conference, who compose the bishops' cabinet, with their districts, are: Rev. M. Bradshaw, Durham district; Rev. C. B. Culbreth, Elizabeth City district; Rev. R. H. Willis, Fayetteville district; Rev. J. C. Wooten, New Bern district; Rev. M. W. Taylor, Raleigh district; Rev. C. L. Read, Rockingham district; Rev. S. A. Cotton, Washington district; Rev. S. L. Mercer, Weldon district; and Rev. H. A. Humble, Wilmington district.

Prior to the first business session tomorrow morning, Bishop Denny will administer the holy communion.

On Sunday, during the conference, local pulpits will be filled by visiting ministers. Sunday afternoon, a memorial service for the members who have died during the year will be held.

The North Carolina conference represents a constituency of approximately 115,000 members; 288 Epworth leagues, with 8,475 members; 725 Sunday schools, with 7,236 officers and teachers and 84,575 pupils enrolled; and 332 women's missionary societies, with 11,202 members.

Among the educational institutions in which the conference is directly interested is Duke University, said to have one of the largest endowments of any educational institution in the country, since the recent bequests of the late J. B. Duke. Other colleges include Greensboro College, at Greensboro; Lenoir College, at Lenoir; and Carolina College, at Maxton.

The North Carolina conference contributed approximately \$26,500 annually to these institutions.

The official organ of the conference is the North Carolina Christian Advocate, published at Greensboro, of which Rev. A. W. Plyler is editor. The Advocate is also the organ of the Western North Carolina conference.

Northern Methodists Votes for Unification Southern Methodists

Chicago, Nov. 10.—(AP)—The Northern Methodist church has voted for unification with the Southern Methodist. The vote has been underway for months and passage by a constitutional majority necessary was announced today as 16,135 for and 811 against. The Southern Methodist are still voting with a result in doubt.

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ATHLETICS AND LONGEVITY

In contradiction of a quite popular belief an investigation by college officials has disclosed that athletic training does not shorten life. The announcement is peculiarly timely, coming shortly after the death at a relatively early age of Eugene Sanow, famous strong man.

This study in the relationship between athletic training and the mortality rate was made over a long period of years and from a large number of athletes. It shows that of 152 Harvard oarsmen in a period of thirty years 122 lived beyond the average age and that of the thirty who died prematurely six were war victims and only two died from heart disease and but one succumbed to tuberculosis. Two were in poor health but 37 per cent never had

been ill in bed and 37 had been confined in bed through illness but once. Ninety-four per cent were free from any organic disease of deflection.

An examination covering 807 Yale letters men disclosed four deaths from heart disease two of which occurred after the age of 68. The death rate among the athletes was 7.2 per cent, compared with 12.9 per cent among non athletic students.

Here is a persuasive demonstration that the popular notion that athletes die young is a fallacy. There is the danger of accident and there have been athletes who have overindulged in their strenuous profession, but on the other hand health-giving exercise afforded by athletics has fortified others against the ravages of disease and strengthened weak bodies for life's struggle. The one probably balances the other. Wisdom recommends that one take neither strenuous exercise nor inactivity in excess.

Presbyterians Will
Observe Home Mission
Week Nov. 15 to 22

Chattanooga, Tenn., Nov. 9.—The week of November 15-22 is home mission week with the southern Presbyterian church. The topic for study is the Indian. An attractive program has been arranged by the Assembly's Home Mission Committee at Atlanta, Georgia, and mailed to all the secretaries of the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the church. Sunday, November 22nd has been designated as children's day in the Sunday School, at which time a public program will be rendered. The Assembly's Home Mission committee has the responsibility for the evangelization of the Indian, people of the mountains, the negroes, the jews, immigrants and for evangelism and church erection. 802 workers in 894 churches, schools and missions are engaged in the work. This committee has imperative need for at least \$100,000 a year for the next five years to supplement the work in the local churches in launching new churches in Florida alone. Two entire Presbyteries are conducted in foreign languages, Indian in Oklahoma and Texas-Mexican in Texas and are supported entirely by this committee. 150,000 people are instructed each Sunday through the workers of this committee.

TWO LIVING BUDDHAS
OF TIBET SPLIT,
THREATENING WARFARE

Tatshoin, Province of Szechwan.—The two "Living Buddhas" of Tibet are at odds. One had fled the country and strife threatens.

Intrigues, political rivalries, and the superstitions of the Tibetan people are woven into the fabric of the troublesome situation. The unrest is not apparent on the surface of things for Tibet is ruled by the "lamas," or priests of Buddha, but there are signs of disunion among the lamas themselves.

Under normal circumstances the spiritual and temporal powers are divided between the two men accepted among the followers of the religion as the living representatives of Buddha. The Dalai Lama is looked upon as a spiritual head and the Panchen Lama as temporal ruler. The present Dalai Lama, however, has taken upon himself without surrendering the spiritual leadership. The Panchen Lama has been forced to flee to China, where he wanders from place to place while his followers in Tibet plot for his return to power or the overthrowing of the Dalai Lama.

The political aspects of the situation result from the position of Tibet as a buffer state between India and China one of the two Tibetan political parties is pro-British and anti-Chinese while the other is anti-British and pro-Chinese. The leading political question is that of Tibet's attitude toward the two greater nations. The Dalai Lama inclines toward India and Panchen toward China.

One reason why people are using more milk is because they are learning its true food value. The facts have been worked out by the United States Department of Agriculture, by the State experiment stations, and in various public and private laboratories, and these facts have been carried to our people, on the farms and in the cities, by means of publications and through the activities of extension workers. In this connection one type of extension work that has had great influence in bringing about increased consumption of milk deserves special mention, and that is the milk campaigns that have been conducted in many cities and counties in different parts of the country. Where these have been properly advertised, thoroughly organized, and well conducted, with an efficient follow-up, they have resulted in an increased milk consumption of from 10 to 25 per cent over a long period of time; sometimes the effects have been very marked over a period of several years.

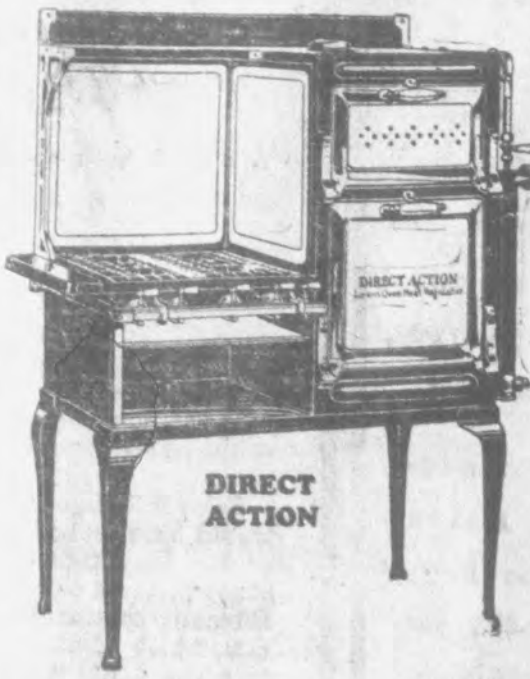

Mexico, Lower Calif. Four hundred years after the desert of here and surrounding the Gulf of California had baffled the undaunted Fernando Cortez, an American railroad is being built across those sands that promises to wrest unestimated wealth from the waste which baffled the Spanish conquistador.

The line, 170 miles long, which will connect this town on the California-Mexico border with San Felipe, the nearest point on the Gulf of California where a deep water harbor is available, must be completed, according to contract, in 1927.

Residents of the desert don't look to the railroad to spin the wheel of progress with three great changes:

Connect the Lower Colorado River basin with tide water.

Provide a new system of defense through levees on which the road will travel, against the floods of the Colorado.

Open the way for reclamation of 250,000 acres of fertile delta land.

Cortez, the daring Spaniard who brought Mexico under the heel of America, sent expedition after expedition into this waste between the years 1527 and 1541. He wished to discover a northern route around what he called the "Island of California," and he desired above all else to locate and loot the fabled rich "Seven Cities of Cibola."

He failed in both his quests, but where the Spanish adventurer with his sword went down to defeat, the American engineer with his theodolite is registering victory.

The railroad originally was started by the Mexican government in 1923, but after ten miles of roadbed had been cradled the De la Huerta revolution broke out and the construction stopped.

In 1924 Harry Chandler, of Los Angeles, and a group of associates obtained a contract from the Mexican government under which they were given a 99-year lease, and allowed three and one-half years to complete the line. It will be known as the Mexican and Gulf Railway.

The builders' concession includes the right to construct wharves, cotton gins, compresses and oil mills at San Felipe, which will become a shipping outlet to the Eastern United States via Panama, and also to Europe and Asia.

To sportsmen a fishing paradise will be thrown open, for the Gulf of California abounds in hundreds of varieties of fish, great and small.

ADVENTURE SAILING AROUND WORLD IN THIRTY-FOOT YAWL

Manila. — Otto Karl Friz Pahl, sailing into Manila Bay, completed the first leg of a voyage which he hopes to make around the world in 30-foot yawl.

Starting from Shanghai June 7 with two companions, Pahl reached Hongkong June 29 after a rough voyage. Here his two comrades left him, but an American named Richard Lofstadt joined him and sailed across the China Sea to San Fernando, province of LaUnion, P. I., where he too deserted the vessel on account of the hardships experienced on the 13-day trip from Hongkong.

Pahl sailed for Manila alone, making the 150-mile journey in eight days.

PROHIBITION MAKING WORKER CAPITALIST SAYS THIS LAWYER

Chicago. Prohibition is making a capitalist of the worker, creating a general ownership of the means of production and solving a strife that once seemed perpetual, in the opinion of Congressman John G. Cooper of Ohio who addressed the national convention of the Anti-Saloon League here tonight.

Mr. Cooper, who is a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, asserted that the greater gains had been made by labor since the adoption of the 18th amendment, with fewer strikes, than in any other period of time.

"When the saloon closed, the 'poor man's club' may have vanished," he said, "but we are replacing it today with comfortable homes, fine labor temples and a chain of strong labor banks. There are some who want to go back to the old days when the beer saloon was the center of a slum neighborhood where labor lived, but they are becoming fewer yearly."

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers was fighting the drink evil a decade before the churches began, he asserted.

"When men began buying groceries, clothes, houses, autos, etc., instead of beer and booze, it meant more work for the workers who produced those things," he said. "The slogan invented by the brewery press agents of 'No Beer — No Work,' should have read 'No Beer — More Work.' The American worker does not have to limit production or resort to sabotage to ensure continued employment. Slack seasons are rare today and are limited to a few industries. Once they were common on nearly every trade except the brewery group."

"Prohibition has made the settlement of the perennial capital-labor disputes easier. It is not so easy to get a strike vote through a sober meeting. Strikes are the ultimate weapon of labor, but today we arbitrate instead of striking and we are making steadier advances toward industrial justice. The chip fell from labor's

shoulder when the beer pail dropped from labor's hand. Booze caused and lost more strikes in the past than any dozen other factors."

INTERCOLLEGIATE GOLF CHAMP IS AS VERSATILE IN F'BALL

New Orleans. Fred Lamprecht, National and Southern Intercollegiate golf champion, is as versatile in football as he is in golf. He has played more positions on the Tulane football team than he has clubs in his golf bag.

Now is his fourth year of varsity football, he has appeared in action competition at every place football offers. He seldom uses 11 clubs in a round of golf. The one-year rule came into Southern football after Lamprecht entered Tulane, so he has an extra year of participation.

Lamprecht declares that his golf game is improved by his football. He also thinks golf has made him a better football player. Playing different positions, he says, is comparable to using different golf clubs under the changing conditions of play.

Lamprecht, who will be graduated in June, is 25 years old. He shot great golf to win the National Intercollegiate title at Montclair, N. J., being better than even four in his semi-final and final rounds. He won the Southern Intercollegiate from a field not lacking in class at Birmingham.

Other minor golf titles include the Gulf States championship, won three times in succession, New Orleans district title, Louisiana state championship in 1924 and runner-up this year and Cleveland district championship last year. He was semi-finalist in the Western Amateur in 1925, losing to Keefe Carter, the sensational young golfer who won the title.

"It's football record does not include any championships but covers much territory."

BIRTH OF ALIEN BABIES IN GIBRALTAR PROHIBITED

Gibraltar. — No baby of alien parentage may be born on the rock of Gibraltar, a state of one and seven-

eights square miles that has no public debt, no land capable of cultivation, no railway and no trams. When a birth is to take place in an alien family, the expectant mother must move beyond the British lines.

The last census showed 'The Rock' to be inhabited by 8,471 men and 8,689 women. About one-fifth of the population is the military.

WELFARE OF INMATES IS ONE FEATURE OF PRISON CONGRESS

Jackson, Miss. — The American Prison Congress opens tomorrow evening for consideration of a number of matters relating to the welfare of inmates of the various state and federal prisons. Among a number of notable persons on the program for addresses is Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson of Texas.

On succeeding days the subjects of medical and surgical problems, juvenile agencies, criminal identification and criminal law and statistics, will be discussed by experts in these branches of criminology.

SAN FRANCISCO'S CHINA TOWN IS QUIET TONG WARS

San Francisco. — While several large cities were scenes of sanguinary tong wars, resulting in scores of Chinese being deported, San Francisco's Chinatown, the largest in the country, remained at peace, despite the fact that one of the warring tongs, the H. P. Sing, has headquarters here.

Detective Sergeant John J. Manion, head of the Chinatown police squad, explained why.

"Keep out gambling houses. Prevent traffic in slave girls and in narcotics and you'll have no tong wars with the cooperation of the peaceful elements—the merchant class and the Christians—we have largely eliminated those causes of trouble. Watch for hightiders, or gunmen, and try to keep them out of Chinatown."

The other tong concerned in the recent war, the On Leong, has no organization in San Francisco at present, but, according to Sergeant Manion, it arranged through another tong to have some H. P. Sing members slain here. Money was paid for the transaction, but the police learned of it in time to prevent it.

Sergeant Manion, known at police headquarters as an encyclopedia of Chinese affairs, added: "Gambling

most frequently is the cause of tong fighting. Gambling houses invariably are run by tongs. — Rival tongs come in to play, there are disputes charges of cheating, and soon two tongs have set their gunmen on each other."

The officer estimates that 65 per cent of the Chinese in America do not belong to highbinder tongs and have no sympathy with them.

Yet the tongs still have a strong hold here. Eight of them have national headquarters, and several others have branches. The tong or society, usually is a family clan in China, started in the early days of Chinese immigration to America. At the Chinese immigrants went into business, the representatives of smaller families were oppressed by more powerful families and organized for protection. Out of these tongs, formed without regard to family or affiliation, grew the highbinder menace. Whenever there were disputes, lives would be forfeited.

The typical highbinder Sergeant Manion described as an all-around criminal, cowardly, sneaking about shooting without risk to himself. The police have found that such gunmen usually are entirely Chinese in their associations and habits. The young Chinese educated in America or exposed to American influence is extremely unlikely to become a tongman.

Where the highbinder are active there is a "captain of gunmen," the go-between, taking orders and money from the tong leaders, who have no direct connection with the assassins. Where there is a "job" to be done, a gunman volunteers his services and

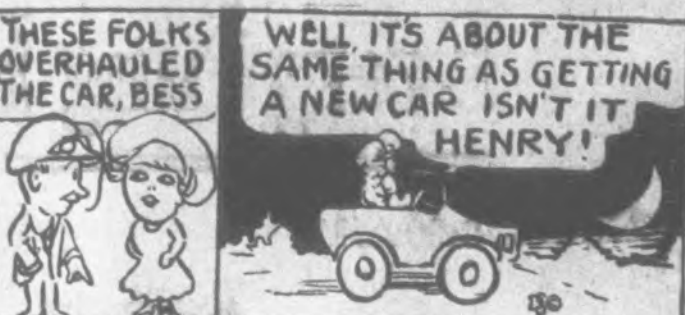

NATURE LOVERS INTERVENE TO SAVE TREE 2300 YEARS OLD

Seattle, Wash.—Washington's old-
est inhabitant, a cedar tree 2300
years of age, has been spared the
ax through the generosity of nature
lovers of this state. It stands 200
feet high, is 58 feet in circumfer-
ence, and 18.4 feet in diameter.
The Washington Natural Parks
Association raised \$2,000 by popular
subscription to buy the monarch, to-
gether with 20 of its companions,
which stand 35 miles from here. The
land occupied by the grove will be
set aside as a state park.

VARIETY OF CORKS AFFECTS LONDON CHAMPAGNE MARKET

London.—Used champagne bottle
corks are collected by waiters in
large restaurants here as eagerly as
are tips. The corks are worth money
and figure strongly in the quotations
of the champagne market.

Wine merchants established a cork
clearing house that is known to all
city cafe waiters. It is designed to
boom the particular brands of cham-
pagne which the wholesalers or re-
tailers want to "unload."

Waiters in all the large restaurants
where champagne is served receive
daily quotations on the clearing
house rates, the cork prices varying
from two pence to six pence each.
The price of corks fluctuate weekly
according to the brand of the wine
and its popularity.

At times when sales of any brand
shows signs of falling off the price
of its cork rises, as an incentive
to waiters to aid in stimulating the
sale of the particular kind. Waiters
everywhere here now collect cham-
pagne bottle corks as eagerly as they
do tips.

ANOTHER YORKSHIRE VILLAGE DESTINED FOR THE BOTTOM OF SEA

Kilnsea, Eng.—This ancient little
village appears destined for the bot-
tom of the ocean, a fate experienced
by other Yorkshire towns of cen-
turies past.

The sea for some time has been
working its way toward Kilnsea at
the rate of about 13 inches a month.
Coast erosion, due to high seas, has
been causing concern all along the
east Yorkshire coast. It is being
washed away at the rate of 2.27 feet
annum near Brindlington, increasing
to 15.5 feet at Kilnsea, which is near
Spear Point.

Asks 1,000 New Cuban Schools
Havana. — Secretary of Public
Instruction Mascaro, to provide for
the 424084 children of school age
who do not now attend classes, will
ask for 1,000 new schools in next
year's budget.

Of 275 primary schools in the 79
school districts 5 of them are still
served by "circuit riders," who teach
in two or more schools.
