GERMAN DEEP SEA DIVERS HELPING TO LOCATE M 1

Regarded By Some Persons As A "Striking Act of Humanity;" Germans Sole Possessor of the Wonderful Apparatus

London, Nov. 16.—(AP)—The people of London feel that there is some pliancy in having the German deep sea divers aid in the attempts to locate the British Monitor submarine M 1, which last week in the English Channel made a dive with 68 officers and men on board and failed to come to the surface. Whether it is a business proposition on the part of the Germans, or voluntary service, is not quite clear, but some persons prefer to regard it as a "striking act of humanity and worthiness of being considered the first fruits of the Locarno pact."

The newspapers today are filled with descriptions and pictures of the wonderful apparatus of which the Germans are the sole possessors. The machine weighs one half ton and is equipped with electric lights and telephone.

Cannot Force Joint Rates By Way of Wilmington

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Railroad and steamship South Atlantic territory can not be forced to make joint rail and water rates by way of Wilmington, N. C., to Interior North Carolina points, J. A. Cassidy, special examiner, reported today to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The finding was made upon the complaint of the North Carolina Corporation Commission which alleged that the railroad and steamship companies, particularly the Clyde Line, among the Ocean carriers, combined to make joint rates into North Carolina from other southern ports than Wilmington, but would not do so through Wilmington. The North Carolina authorities alleged this to be undue discrimination against their own port.

Reviewing the evidence in support of the complaints the examiner concluded that distances by way of the other ports which enjoyed the joint rates were shorter. The carriers were justified in confining the joint rate operations to the shorter distances. The decision must be approved by the whole commission.

SEEK AMERICAN MOVIE STARS TO BOLSTER BRITISH PRODUCT

London.—English moving picture producers are attempting to gain a place in the movie sun with the aid of American experience, directors and actors. The producers here are about ready to admit that British films cannot successfully compete with American productions principally because England lacks movie "names."

Arrangements have been made to bring some of America's foremost producers to England to produce some of the great English classics in the natural surroundings of the stories. In most cases the leads will be taken by American stars. These productions in the makers' hope, will be able to meet the American films on an equal basis and at least open a market for British films in the Dominion and European countries.

A shortage of money for large productions also has contributed greatly to the mediocrity of British pictures which will not have to be considered in the new productions, it is said. The Americans heretofore have used British studios and equipment but these already have been outgrown and plans are underway for the erection of two large studios, one in the heart of London and the other in Surrey country.

Miss Dorothy Gish, who is making her second English picture, has declared that she will spend much of her time in the future in making pictures over here.

FARM BUREAU TO COMBAT LOSS BY FIRE IN RURAL DISTRICTS

Chicago.—Because far property destroyed by fire each year in the United States, if in one group, would make a city as large as Kansas City, the American Farm Bureau Federation is out to smother the torch of carelessness that is responsible for most of this waste.

A campaign of education among rural communities will be one of the many subjects to be taken up at the annual meeting here December 7, 8, 9, J. F. Hendren, Elkin.

PHYSICIAN KILLED PISTOL DUEL WITH ALLEGED RIVAL

Love for Same Woman and Rivalry in Politics Leads to Pistol Duel in Which Dr. O. V. Burnett of Mars Hill, is Killed

Asheville, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Love for the same woman and rivalry in politics lay at the bottom of the sensational duel to death between Dr. T. V. Burnett, prominent Mars Hill Physician and Wallace Ray, alleged blockader of the Carolina Mountain at Shelton Laurel in Madison County late Saturday afternoon.

Dr. Burnett was buried yesterday at Mars Hill and Ray is desperately wounded in the Greenville, Tenn. Hospital riddled with bullets from the gun of the physician.

Following the funeral of Dr. Burnett, yesterday federal officers said the code duello of Madison County again had been indicated leaving nothing to the courts of the county to decide if the second man to the duels in the Tennessee hospital.

At the last primary election in Madison County both men sought the nomination for sheriff and it is said as a result of the strife engendered in that race, in which both lost, a feud started between the physician and Ray. The disagreement of the two was fanned into greater flame by the infatuation developing for the same woman of the mountain country. The young woman is said to have refused one of the men when marriage was proposed and this decision resulted in the two resorting to the code of the duel, the first sensational affair of its kind that has rocked the mountain hereabouts in several years.

Saturday afternoon in the mountain fastnesses near Shelton Laurel the two men met armed with pistols, faced off a few yards and began firing at each other. The physician was killed in his truck and Ray was seriously wounded with several bullet wounds in his body.

Manila Women Like Pharmacy

Manila.—Prescription filling by women is on the increase in Manila. In the latest crop of 119 new pharmacists, who took the oath before the Board of Pharmaceutical Examiners, 30 percent were women. Virtually 50 percent of the students of pharmacy in the leading colleges of Manila are women.

MRS. L. C. H. BROWN DIES IN WINSTON

Former Greenville Resident Dies in Winston-Salem Hospital; Funeral Services Conducted Today

Mrs. L. C. H. Brown died yesterday afternoon in the Winston-Salem hospital, following an illness of two weeks from pneumonia. Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the home of her brother, Mr. W. M. Hendren, by Dr. E. K. McLarty, of High Point, and Dr. C. C. Weaver, of Winston-Salem. Interment followed in the Winston-Salem cemetery.

Mrs. Brown, nee Miss Flora Hendren was a native of Winston-Salem and made her home in that city, with the exception of a few months during the tobacco season when she accompanied Mr. Brown on different tobacco markets. She was living in this city when taken ill and was carried to the Winston-Salem hospital. Although Mrs. Brown had been in declining health for two months her death was great shock to her loved ones and friends. She was well known throughout North Carolina and was popular with a host of friends. During her stay in Greenville she won many friends who will regret to learn of her passing. She possessed a strong Christian character and was a devoted mother and loyal friend.

SOUTH ADVISED TO BE ON ITS GUARD

Board of Temperance Prohibition Considers Walker's Visit to South as "Astonishing Affront"

Washington, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Constructing the southern trip of Mayor-Elect Walker, of New York, as a move to obtain the support of that section for Governor Al Smith as a proposed presidential candidate, the board of Temperance Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church used it as "astonishing affront" and advises the south to "be on its guard."

Assailing Governor Smith and Tammany Hall in general, the board declared in a statement published today that it "was exceedingly doubtful if the democrats could carry a single southern state under the Smith banner. 'It is not certain,' it added, 'that they could carry any state at all.'

Attacking Mr. Walker's record also the board declared the South would be "interested to know of his connection with New York's notorious prize fighting games and with those elements in New York which are doing their best to murder American Standards of Morality." The Mayor elect the board said, "need not be misled by courteous hospitality now given Mr. McAdoo's southern delegates in New York into believing that the South will support the country's foremost champion of the liquor interest."

LEMPEREUR REACHES TOP OF HER ART BUT STILL OBSCURE

Paris.—After twenty five years in theatrical obscurity, Madame Lempereur has reached the top of her profession, but the public still will see nothing of her.

Madame Lempereur is a theatre prompter. She has been appointed to officiate at the Comedie Francaise France's leading State theatre, otherwise known as the House of Moliere.

"A good prompter is as rare as an actor with talent" said Andre Antoine, manager of the Odéon, second State theatre, where Madame Lempereur previously served. "Many's the time my old comrade has pulled me out of a hole. I was only free from anxiety when she was in the prompter's box."

CHRISTIAN GENERAL OF CHINA SHEARS HIS WIFE'S TRESSES

Shanghai.—The "Christian general," Feng Yu-shiang, who baptizes his men before leading them into battle, is reported to have played the part of barber and cut off his wife's long tresses.

Apparently it was done with the same quick stroke that the general made in overturning the Peking government last year, because he had been stubborn to his wife's wishes for bobbed hair.

Mrs. Feng was formerly Miss Lee Teh-chuan, a Y. W. C. A. worker in Peking. Reports said she finally convinced the general that short hair was most practical and useful.

3000 Members of Russian Brigade Fired on By Mutinists

Tsingtao, China, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Marshal Chang Tso Lin's Fifth Shan Tung Division becoming mutinists yesterday fired from the rear on the Russian White Brigade attached to Chang's forces. It is reported that the majority of the Russians were killed. The wounded lay without medical aid until foreign doctors entered the fighting area and brought them out. The Russians were endeavoring to stem the advance of the Marshal Wu's troops when fired upon. The Russian Brigade fired on by the mutinists numbered 3,000 all of which are said to have been killed.

CAPT. FOLEY TAKES STAND TUESDAY

Will Give His Version of His Communication With Mrs. Margaret Lansdowne

Washington, 16.—(AP)—Investigation into the charge that Captain Paul Foley as Judge Advocate sought to influence the testimony of Mrs. Margaret Lansdowne before the Shenandoah Naval Court of Inquiry was deferred today by that court until tomorrow.

The postponement was made on the motion of Major Henry Leonard, appointed last Saturday by Secretary Wilbur to succeed Captain Foley as Judge Advocate. Major Leonard said he had not had time to complete examination of the record of the court made during its hearings at Lake Hurst and Washington.

Captain Foley will take the stand to give his version of his communication with the widow of Commander Zachary Lansdowne of the wrecked Shenandoah.

GREENVILLE MAY GET CHAUTAUQUA

Representative of Swarthmore Association Here; Guarantor System Has Been Done Away With

Miss Grace Hershey, representative of Swarthmore Chautauqua Association, is in this city in the interest of bringing this popular form of high class entertainment to Greenville again next season. Heretofore the Chautauqua appearance in Greenville has been underwritten by a group of citizens known as guarantors but the plan under which efforts are being made to bring Chautauqua to this place next season is under a new financial arrangement and will no doubt be more satisfactory.

In order to secure Chautauqua for Greenville it is necessary that 750 tickets be subscribed by the people of Greenville and it is to secure these subscriptions that Miss Hershey is here. Under this new plan no person is liable for any other than the tickets personally subscribed. The tickets can be subscribed for in any number and already two hundred of the necessary seven hundred eighty have been subscribed. No orders for tickets are binding unless the full number of tickets are subscribed.

PUBLISHER OF BOOKS OF DEAD WAR HEROES REWARDED BY DEBT

Amiens.—Publication of books written by French writers killed in action during the World War put M. Edgar Malfere in financial straits, but it may obtain for him the decoration of the Legion of Honor.

The publisher ventured all his fortune in posthumous writings, which in part was a labor of love, because Malfere's brother, an author of promise and a host of author-friends, met death in war. Wishing to provide a literary memorial to them, Malfere got out expensive collections. Their sales did not reward him.

Former poets writers of France, for the most part too poor to assume the loss of their publisher friend, have asked the minister of fine arts to decorate Malfere with the Legion of Honor for unselfish and patriotic service.

N. C. LEAD SOUTH DURING PAST WEEK IN TRAFFIC DEATHS

Six Deaths and Eleven Injuries Recorded in This State; Mississippi Continues Her "No Death-No Injuries" Record

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 16.—(AP)—North Carolina lead the south during the past week in traffic deaths, while Georgia lead in injuries, tabulations compiled today by the Associated Press from eleven states revealed. There were 29 deaths and 173 injured in the territory.

Mississippi continued her "no deaths, no injuries" record of the week before. Georgia also reported no deaths this week.

There were no outstanding accidents recorded during the week, the totals being made up from a number of scattered accidents. For North Carolina there were six deaths and eleven injuries, with Kentucky next in a tie with Alabama, each having five deaths.

TWO SHOT PISTOL DUEL ON STREETS OF RALEIGH TODAY

Deputy Sheriff Mangum Chases Unidentified Robber Into Alley and Both Receive Wounds in Exchange of Bullets

Raleigh, Nov. 16.—(AP)—An unidentified robber was shot and probably fatally wounded, and a deputy sheriff sustained serious wounds in a pistol duel on the Main Street here this afternoon after the robber had held up the store of King and Holding, and rifled the register of about \$100.

The robber entered the store and said he wanted to try on some suits. He tried several suits and then awaited the opportunity when only three persons were in the store, and brandished a pistol and ordered the men to throw up their hands. He then took the money out of the register and fled. The alarm was given and within a few minutes Deputy Sheriff Will Mangum was on the trail. The robber was overtaken in an alley at the rear of the Raleigh Hotel and after a pistol duel, fell with what doctor's said probably would be fatal wounds through the stomach. The shooting of the robbers is a culmination of a series of day light burglaries which had taken place in the city during the past week. These followed closely on an autumn in which it was a rare occasion that one or more houses were not entered and robbed during each night.

At the hospital it was said that Mangum's condition was also serious.

SCHOLARSHIPS IN PLUMBING NOW IN CARNEGIE CURRICULA

Pittsburgh.—The plumber may now have a degree tacked to the end of his name.

The Carnegie Institute of Technology here has added to its curriculum a professorship and two scholarships in plumbing, heating and ventilating, and Dr. Thomas S. Baker, president of the school, says he hopes they will result in a further improvement in standards of living in America.

The scholarships, each valued at \$500, are available to Carnegie Tech students. They are the gift of the National Association of Master Plumbers and the Women's auxiliary.

MEXICAN RAILWAY OIL OUTPUT IS MORE THAN IS USED FOR FUEL

Mexico City.—Lands of the Mexican National Railways are producing more oil than the railways use for fuel so an oil company, a subsidiary to the railways, has been organized to develop the rail ways' oil properties.

Raleigh, Nov. 16.—(AP)—A special two-weeks term of Superior Court in Johnston county for the trial of civil cases has been called by the Governor, to begin this morning. Judge C. C. Lyon, of Elizabeth town, has been named by Governor McLean to preside.

In addition to this special term, regular terms of Superior court open this morning in 11 counties in this state.

Two weeks terms open in Edgecombe, Bertie, Harnett, Franklin, Granville, Mitchell and Henderson counties, while terms of one week will open today in New Hanover, Hoke, Anson, and Catawba.

The civil term in Franklin county has been ordered converted into a mixed term, and the civil term in Henderson will try criminal cases only, the change having been made because of the reported congested condition of the criminal docket.

The special term for trial of civil cases in McDowell county has been cancelled, and Judge M. V. Barnhill, who had been named by the Governor to preside at this term will continue this week with the Lenoir county term.

LOCARNO AND RUSSIA

Moscow's reaction to the Locarno security pacts was to describe them as a European bloc against Russia. They are a bloc, but not in the sense Russia sees them. The nations of Europe will not send their armies against Soviet Russia nor conduct economic warfare against the Russians.

The Locarno bloc is moral. It has deprived Moscow of what vague hopes it had of alliance with Germany against the other European powers. Germany won't fight with the Russian government and alone, Moscow has consistently shown an unwillingness to challenge Europe.

Through Locarno also Soviet Russia is put to a test before the world. In giving Europe greater economic stability it affords a more accurate measure for economic conditions in Russia. Then also it permits a clearer comparison between the new democracy of Europe and the minority dictatorship in Moscow as measured in what each has accomplished for the well-being of their respective people.

If Russia is to appear at all favorable in this

competition with the rest of Europe it will be because the Moscow government is no longer communistic. In its eighth year the soviet government is still strongly entrenched, but one reason for that is that it has departed from "war communism." Lenin sanctioned the restoration of internal private trade. Money has been restored. Taxes are again being levied, although collected with difficulty.

EDUCATION

Could there be any better reason why America should observe Education Week than the census figures showing that one out of every twenty persons in this nation is an illiterate, that there are more than 500,000 people in this country who can neither read nor write? If the literate public finds it expedient to stamp out illiteracy, there is an abundance of it for them to bring under the beneficent rays of education.

Illiteracy is traced chiefly to unlettered immigrants, those thousands of native Americans who live in isolated mountain and rural sections and to the survivors of those early generations to which free schools and other educational advantages were denied.

Schools and colleges are posterity's guaranty against illiteracy, but the opportunity is not their's to educate the living army of mature illiterates. Here lies the work of those educators and organizations cooperating in Education Week. If, in these seven days, they can impress upon the public the stupendous task ahead it will be a week well spent in the service of the country.

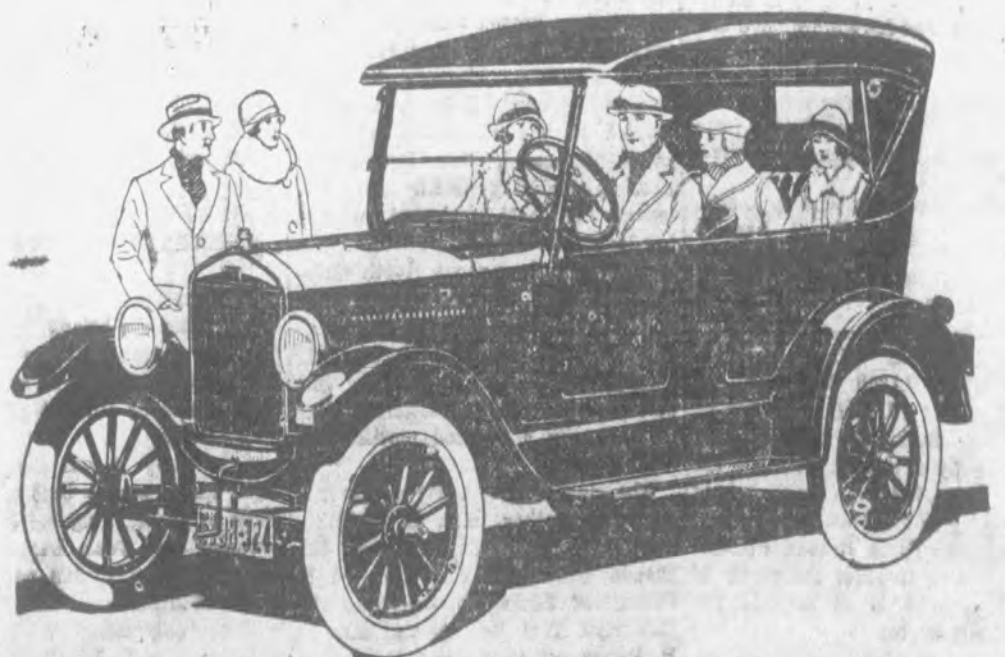

CABLE LETTER

London, Nov. 14.—(AP)—The woes of the organist in the village of Steeple Barton, near Oxford, have been considerably lessened by the removal from the church organ of a swarm of bees and 30 pounds of honey, three umbrellas and a number of carefully written sermons.

Difficulty had been experienced for some time in the intonation of the Vox Humana reed which hummed a little out of tune and continued to perform for some little time after the organist had stopped, often leading slow witted members of the congregation to continue into the first verse of the next hymn. Although learned men who have consorted long with bees maintain that these useful insects can hear no sound save their own buzzing, it is said that the bees of Steeple Barton clearly distinguished between various musical compositions, greatly preferring to add their humming contribution to bright and lively tunes. The honey obtained is of a very superior quality.

The presence of umbrellas in the melodious bowels of church organs is a continuous silent annoyance to the English users and clergy, and can only be effectually prevented by having the organ pipes open downward instead of upward. No one has yet been apprehended in the act of inserting his umbrella in the organ, an act which would probably come under the jurisdiction of the court of arches, but as a number of the umbrellas found are of the curved variety, not easy to drop accidentally, it seems probable they are inserted in a worldly and malicious spirit.

American students are among the most active and staunch supporters of the league of nations at Oxford University. They had a large part in organizing the Oxford international assembly, a body modeled upon the league form and representative of all states and nations, and several have presided over its meetings. A number of Rhodes scholars have conducted league meetings and rallies in the rural and industrial districts in aid of the movement to popularize the league and make it a real force in the guidance of English foreign policy.

No work. — New York's food is suggestive of everywhere except New York. The visitor returning home from a visit to the Metropolis may of ten speak of fine cookery, found there, but praise for the most part will be for the carrying out of another recipe, rather than for originality. But one name of New York's food is to be found — the Delmonico steak. The rest either is of foreign birth or in that nameless category represented by the roast beef and such. Except for a few lone sentinels, the city's restaurants have lost their individuality. The cuisine of a cafe in many a Con-

timonial city has made it famous, and the diner may choose from many of them memorializing their chef, along with their statesmen and writers, but in this respect New York stands out as the one erratic child, although it feeds the most. It seems to many a traveler that New York is always eating. Restaurants are legion.

Those catering to the public taste have attempted to put a finger on the reason for New York trying to feed each man the food to which he is accustomed rather than endeavoring to teach him new delights. Some have argued that it is the cosmopolitan character of the clientele; others that the "typical New Yorker" is the cause. Doubtless the Gotham menus are but another item in this, a melting pot of the sates.

One of the most common dishes claims two ancestors. In restaurants which do not bear the dignity of a convert charge it is Hamburger, as German as Limburger cheese. Elsewhere one orders a Salisbury steak and pays honor to that English Lord who, by having his meat chopped before cooking, approached closest in his day to pre-digested food.

Strictly French is the preparation of a dish "en Casserole" and a continued reading of menus leads one to believe that French left out neither meat, fish or vegetable when the goodness of foods cooked in a "gravy" was learned.

Otherwise the gourmet may choose the Italian spaghetti, the Spanish chili con carne; the English roast beef with the sauces from the same country; the Hungarian goulash; Mulligan stew; the cheese from almost any European country. In the more do-

gatherings and in the schools, of essays on the Constitution, and by the presentation in the schools, and before civic organizations, of tableaux of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the Birth of the Flag, and other settings of similar nature.

Wednesday will be given over to a special effort to have parents and business men visit the schools to learn more of actual teaching conditions.

CREATE FORE SCHOOLS FOR VAGRANT RUSSIAN CHILDREN

Moscow. — Vagrant children in Russia number more than 300,000, the commissar of education has found. He characterized it as a situation menacing the welfare of the country and accordingly has organized a new system of factory schools for homeless children.

The big centers, like Moscow, Leningrad, Kharkow and others are overrun by homeless waifs who sleep on the sidewalks, half naked and half starved. The "Central Lenin Fund" for vagrant children, to which the government contributed several million roubles and to which another few millions have been added by voluntary contributions, has been found insufficient.

The factory school intends to teach the waifs various trades in addition to their general education.
