RED CROSS SEALS

There are numerous pleas in a general way and in each community in a particular way for worthy causes, but there is none more worthy or quite so unobtrusive as the annual sale of Christmas Red Cross seals, the returns from which are used for the fight against tuberculosis.

Investment in these seals requires only such a sum as the individual requires to spend, from one cent upwards. Even the poorest may have a real part in making up a fund that in other years has done so much in relieving sufferers and in fighting the physical foe of so many persons. The penny seal speaks eloquently of the power of small things when they are gathered together and applied in the mass. The child who invests a penny in a Red Cross seal has made a direct contribution to its spirit of benevolence.

Plans should be made early for the distribution of the Christmas seals and this distribution should be as widespread as possible. Not only will this plan increase the revenue to the organizations engaged in fighting the white plague, but it will enable more persons to receive the benefit that comes from participating in raising the money. The campaigns in which the Red Cross seal plays a prominent part were not planned together for the raising of money, but for the educational value that accompanies them. It is important that the attention of the public be called periodically to the importance of adopting methods of prevention in the warfare on tuberculosis.

The Christmas seals stand for better health which comes from better living conditions and proper sanitation. The seals should be sold for the millions this year in order that the excellent work made possible through their sale may not be curtailed, but extended everywhere.

When asked, on his death bed, to forgive his enemies, a Spanish despot of the Middle Ages replied, "I have no enemies. I have killed the mail."

And now in a supposedly more enlightened age Premier Mussolini, dictator of all Italy, boasts, "Today, Fascism is the only live force in Italy." Is the world to infer that Mussolini and the Rascist have killed all other forces in Italy?

Evidently the "only live force" is hungry for new walls upon which to test its rivalry. From the present Roman parliament Mussolini asks that he be made responsible to the king only, instead of to king and parliament as at present, and that the authority be vest-

ed in him to expatriate and confiscate the property of those who criticize the Italian government, whether the criticism be made on Italian soil or less blessed ground. Main Street in the U. S. A. is to be gagged with Via Garibaldi, Rome.

If the wishes of the Italian dictator are carried out by his "putty parliament" citizens of Italy living in this country will be placed in the paradoxical position of being deprived, by their mother country, of that freedom of speech given them by their foster country.

In one sentence Italy's premier speaks contemptuously of the "half dozen fools" who have rebelled against his dictatorship, and grandiloquently boasts that "this century must be, as we have termed it, the century of Italian power."

OLD SON SLIDE ARTISTS FIND A PLACE IN MOVIES

Hollywood, Cal., Nov. 23.—Where are the song-slides of yester-year, and where are the earliest American picture actors who posed for these quaint, sentimental stereopticon views?

Most of the song-slides no doubt have been thrown away long ago, save for a few still hoarded as souvenirs by the theatre folk of a passing generation; but as for the "picture actors" who posed for them, some are just where one might expect to find them—in the movies.

For instance, a search of the Famous Players-Lasky lot here revealed Tom Fortune, who was headlined in the nineties as a singer of popular songs. Fortune claims to have been the first entertainer to sing song-hits to the accompaniment of stereopticon slides.

It was in 1896, in the American theatre on Chicago's north side, that he was engaged to introduce this startling innovation to the play-going public. Between the acts of a comedy being presented at the American, he sang "After the Ball" and other compositions of the day. The lantern slides illustrating his songs were a big hit. Soon the making of song-slides became a small industry.

Fortune posed for many slides. Usually a slide had to be made for each line of the song. First one posed with one's partner for "In the Shade of the Old Apple Tree," and then snapped into the tableau for "Where the Love In Your Eyes I could See," and so on through the sentimental itinerary of the ballad.

From this posing for song-slides to acting in motion pictures was a natural transition. When Edison produced "The Great Train Robbery," Tom Fortune was in the cast, and by the time the song-slide as an institution had slipped into oblivion, Fortune and most of the other song-sliders had slipped safely into the films.

FEAR DAY WHEN MOTORS MAY DISPLACE THE ROYAL CARRIAGE

London.—What would happen to the Royal carriages and the Coronation coach, should the motor displace the horse, is a question Londoners frequently ask. There are only about 70 horses in the Royal Mews now, whereas before the war they numbered upwards of 150.

The cream ponies, which were bred at the Royal stud farm in Hampton Court Park, have gone; so too have the handsome blacks which had been the admiration of the crowds on state occasion. Only the bays remain. Many citizens have expressed the hope that horses would always be used at national functions.

The Coronation coach probably would remain at Buckingham Palace. It has been used for six coronations and is one of the show sights to all favored visitors. It is drawn by eight horses in red and gold harness. The Royal train, which King George and Queen Mary use in traveling about England, is the finest in the country. It consists usually of 11 coaches of the Pullman type, and two engines are employed to draw it. Running always as a special, the train generally is on non-stop schedule. Full speed is never maintained after nine or ten p. m., so that the motion may be reduced to a minimum and not disturb the slumbers of their majesties.
