TWO WEEKS SPECIAL TERM CIVIL COURT OPENS HERE TODAY

Judge A. M. Stack to Hold First Week's Session; Nineteen Superior Courts in Session During This Week

Raleigh, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Nineteen Superior courts will be in session in as many North Carolina counties during this week. Ten regular terms of court opened this morning, terms of court begun this week or last will continue next week in eight counties, and Governor McLean has called a special term to begin in Pitt county today.

The special term in Pitt is for the trial of civil cases only, and is called for two weeks. The court will be opened by Judge A. M. Stack, of Monroe, but as Judge Stack has a term of court opening in Davie county on December 7, it is probable that the Governor will name some other judge to hold the second week of the special term.

R. B. Redwine, of Monroe, has been named by the Governor as emergency judge to hold court this week in Mecklenburg, relieving Judge Thomas J. Shaw, of Greensboro, who will open a two-weeks mixed term of court in Caldwell today.

Judge N. A. Sinclair, of Fayetteville, will preside over the one-week mixed term opening today in Tyrrell, and Judge Thomas H. Calvert, of Raleigh, will open the two-weeks mixed term in Halifax county, Judge Calvert and Judge Sinclair having exchanged. As a result of the exchange, Judge Sinclair will go to Chowan county the week of December 7, in place of Judge Calvert.

The Nash county term which opens today is for two weeks, the first to be devoted to the criminal docket, the second to the civil. Judge F. N. Crammer, of Southport, will preside.

Two weeks mixed terms will open today in Wayne, Scotland and Haywood, with Judges Devin, McElroy, and Webb, respectively, presiding. Judge G. E. Midyette, of Jackson, will preside at the two-weeks civil term opening today in Wake.

In Alamance, Judge H. A. Grady, of Clinton, will open a one-week term for the trial of criminal cases. Buncombe's one-week mixed term, which opens today, will be held by Judge John M. Oglesby, of Concord.

Courts previously opened will continue in session this week in Craven, Onslow, Columbus, Rockingham, Davidson, Mecklenburg, Rowan, and Clay counties.

Defense Rests Case Without Calling Mrs. Rhinelander to Stand

White Plains, N. Y., Nov. 30.—(AP)—The defense in the Rhinelander annulment suit rested its case five minutes after court convened this morning without calling to the stand Alice Beatrice Rhinelander, defendant in the proceedings.

Young Rhinelander was recalled to the stand by his attorneys and he made sweeping denial of the testimony of Ross Chidister, former chauffeur of the Rhinelander family. Chidister had said that he told young Rhinelander of Alice's negro blood long before Rhinelander married her, but that he had answered "I don't give a damn."

The case was expected to reach a jury by tonight after being in progress three weeks. Alice's mother was recalled briefly to the stand this morning to testify whether Alice's body was the same color at birth as it is now. She asserted that it was. Counsel for the defense then answered that the defense would rest its case.

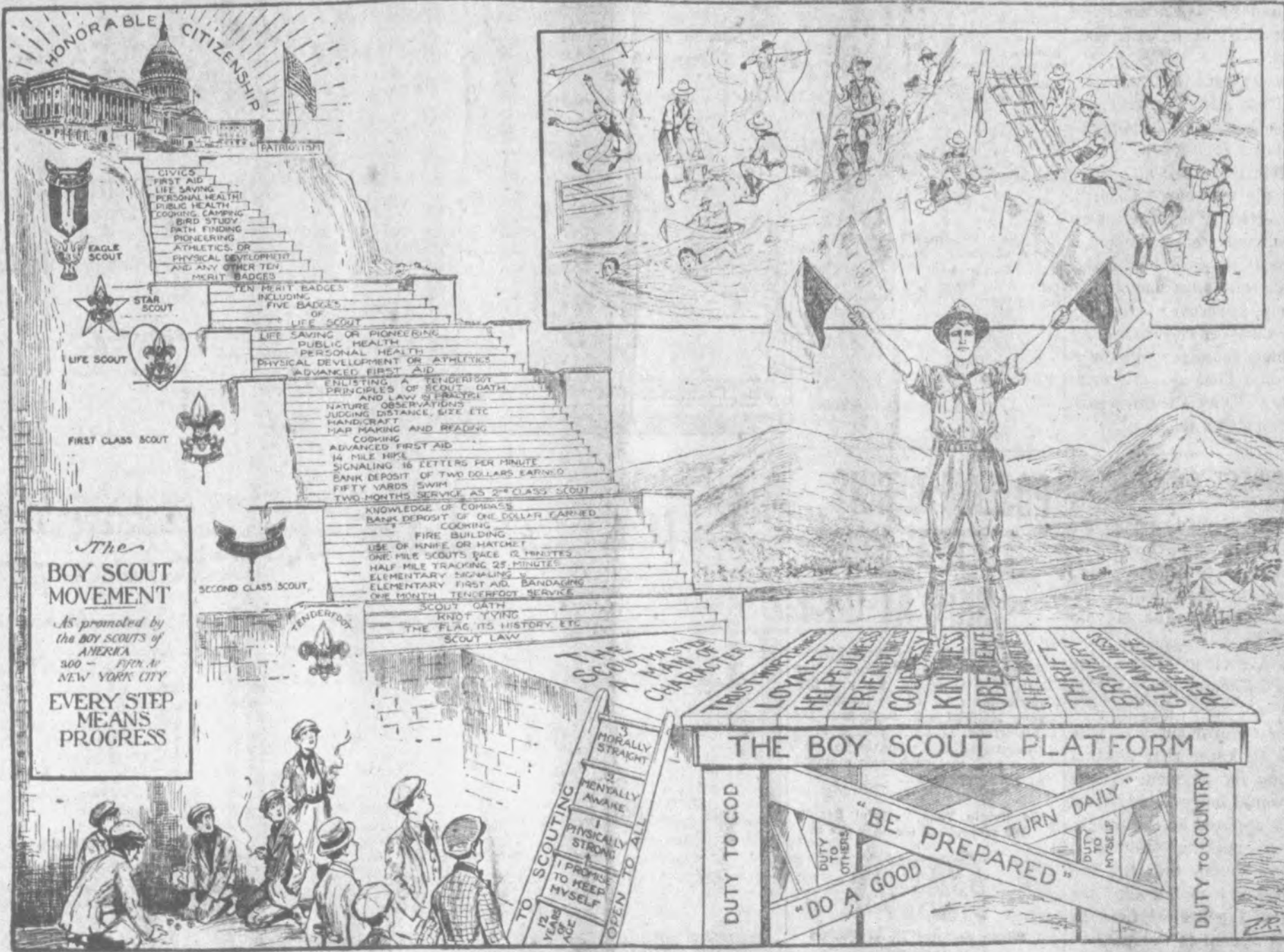

The Poorest Township In Pitt County; Quality Of Its Citizenship

At the Pitt County Fair many interested eyes viewed an educational display of work presented by the school children of the poorest township in the county. Two years ago this division of Pitt county could not have made such an attractive entry into educational society. Many people came by the booth and remembered that this Blue Ribbon Educational Exhibit stood for the place which formerly called Monkey Den but can now be proudly called Belvoir High School.

This township of Belvoir from the standpoint of taxable wealth is the poorest in the county. Their land is poor, swampy, and hence yields a small acreage. About one third of the citizenship of this township are tenants while the remaining two thirds own their own houses.

During the school year of 1922-1923 there existed in this division of the county four sordid, unattractive, money-wasting schools. There arose dissatisfaction on the part of some of the citizens in regard to the type of teaching that their children were receiving, but others of the township could only see bankruptcy ahead of any move that would lead this poor section of the county into a better school era. The final election, however, gave to the entire people a school building and a corps of teachers of which every citizen of Pitt county can be proud.

A committee from the town of Greenville on a recent visit to their school found the Belvoir township possessing school conditions almost as favorable as those furnished the Greenville City children. The classrooms were not only in a good sanitary condition but they bespoke the hand of a teacher who had had training and who took pride in her work. Nine classrooms were visited and without a single exception the committee found a busy atmosphere which can only be found in a well organized school.

This school was open for business the first of October, 1924. Little bright eyed fellows came sneaking from the woods to make their appearance for the first time into a decent, human school building. To be sure it may be said that many of them combed their hair for the first time. But a few days ago as some interested onlookers viewed these same Belvoir children, their hair was well brushed, their dresses and suits were neat, and their general physical condition was good.

The interior of the Belvoir children's workshop is clean, artistically decorated with flowers and the children's work, and attractive generally he was caught with the dead man's within. However, the teachers and wife.

parents are not satisfied to make only the interior appeal to the pupils for "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy." They want now an attractive playground, and it remains to be seen how beautiful these yards will be made. Foundation plans are being made now to beautify them. An interested citizen of Pitt county who has had a great deal of experience with natural shrubs is planning to aid in the selection of suitable native plants and no doubt this township will soon have a playground which will be just as attractive as the condition now existing within the school.

Good teaching, attractive surroundings, sanitary conditions, and an interesting social atmosphere is being furnished the children of the poorest township of Pitt county. Only the school which stands gloriously in the center of this township is good enough for the children of Belvoir. Only a school of this efficient type is good enough for any child in Pitt county.

The citizenship of the Belvoir township three years ago were called Dreamers. Truly they were. They saw a great vision.

They made this vision come true and it will increase their material wealth, their fund of happiness, and their ability to live fully.

HEAVY RAINS IN MIAMI CRIPPLE PUBLIC UTILITIES

Principal Thoroughfares Under Water While Everything Along Business Line is At a Stand Still

Miami, Florida, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Torrential tropic rains beginning last night and continuing through this morning in a steady down-pour crippled the city's public utility and prevented issuance of newspapers.

One morning newspaper failed to publish and another issued an early edition only. The two afternoon newspapers faced prospects of going all day without being able to turn a wheel. Power Company officials said that a force of men is kept in readiness to begin drying out generator coils as soon as the rain stops. Services may be resumed after four hours of such work, it was estimated.

Down town street intersections were miniature lakes and home office workers are putting their clothes in water proof bundles and going to their office in bathing suits. Principal thoroughfares in both Miami and Miami Beach are under water some several inches to three feet in some places, and hundreds of automobiles line the streets on both sides with their motors gone dead because of the water. The rain showed no sign of stopping during the forenoon and business generally was at a stand still.

Body of Man Found Today in Auto Near Raleigh Ball Park

Raleigh, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Coroner Waring today was investigating the death of a man whose body was found early today in an automobile parked near the local base ball park. The man apparently had been dead some time. The body was wrapped in a heavy automobile robe and police said that they were without any clue as to its identity except that the automobile carried a Durham license.

Chamberlain Awarded Order of the Garter

London, Nov. 30.—(AP)—The British Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain has been awarded the Order of the Garter in recognition of his part in negotiating the Locarno Security Pact.

NEWARK VISITED BY \$250,000 FIRE

Flames Sweep Through Eight Combination Tenement and Business Buildings

Newark, N. J., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Fire sweeping through eight combination tenement and business buildings on Springfield Avenue between Boston and Beacon streets early today drove 100 occupants to the streets and caused damage estimated at more than \$250,000. The flames were brought under control at four o'clock after two hours' fight, in which the entire block in the thickly populated section was threatened. Before the Department got the blaze under control the roof of all eight buildings crashed in completing the destruction.

Declares Expenses Legislative Session Will Be Cared For

Austin, Texas, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Intimation that a fund of \$500,000 had been pledged to defray the cost of a special legislative session marked the Sunday interim in the Texas political situation along with the unexpected sequel to the Governor's liquor law proclamation defying of charges against a negro butler at the Executive Mansion.

Reports of the fund raising followed declarations of speaker Lee Satterwhite that the expenses of the session would be cared for. Mr. Satterwhite is leader of the movement to bring official acts of Governor Ferguson's administration before the legislature. George Brady, the butler who said he was the beneficiary of an extended parole and conditionally pardoned by Governor Ferguson, was arrested when officers said he was attempting to sell liquor to white men at a street corner. Charges of possessing liquor for sale were made against him and another negro, in whose automobile officers found a supply of whiskey nearly, was arrested.

Chapman's Appeal Writ of Habeas Corpus To Be Heard Wed.

State Prison, Wethersfield, Connecticut, Nov. 29.—(AP)—After the state of Connecticut had offered its answer to the petition of Gerald Chapman, twice reprieved murderer, for a writ of habeas corpus at a hearing in Federal court today, the defense asked for an adjournment because it was unprepared to argue the case and the request was granted, court being adjourned until Wednesday morning.

CENTRAL EUROPE UNDER A BLANKET OF SNOW TODAY

Low Temperatures Recorded Everywhere in Europe While Violent Storms Rage From South Italy to Scandinavia

London, Nov. 30.—(AP)—From South Italy and Spain to Scandinavia and from Poland to the Bay of Biscay violent storms raged during the week-end. Snow lies virtually throughout Central Europe and everywhere low temperatures are recorded. For the first time in many years snow fell along the French River but according to an official communication it thawed out as soon as the sun came out. Temperature of between four and five degrees below freezing was reported.

There was much destruction of property and loss of lives in the storm areas. The reports received showed there were storms over the whole of the Italian Peninsula from Naples to Southern Sicily. They were more violent than ever known before. Huge waves from the sea deluged the shores, wrecking houses and damaging harbors and railroads, while swollen rivers flooded the country sides and doing damage to crop and cattle and causing damage to many lives. Deep snow falls are reported from Austria, Germany and Switzerland, but England suffered little damage.

Commerce Body Will Stage An Industrial Tour

The first real Industrial Tour ever attempted, as a section, in Eastern Carolina, is set to begin January 12th and run four days. This movement is being sponsored by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, with headquarters at Kinston. The purpose of the tour, as stated by the officials of the organization, is to acquaint the people of Eastern North Carolina with the great industrial section of Piedmont North Carolina. It will be an educational trip, pure and simple, according to the announcement coming out from headquarters.

The trip will begin Tuesday morning January 12th and will end Friday afternoon or night. The towns to be visited will probably include Raleigh, Durham, Burlington, Greensboro, High Point, Winston-Salem, Charlotte, Salisbury, Rockingham and other points of interest. Eastern North Carolina is beginning to think as never before in industrial terms. It is the belief of those who have given the matter more or less thought that there is room in Eastern North Carolina for forces of industries more than there are here. "While the industries are moving Southward, we want to get our share" Secretary Bartlett stated recently in a meeting at Benson. Two things we need now, Bartlett continued, are Publicity and Power. Both are within our reach. The mere fact that capital is interested in developing our power resources, makes it easy to see that there are real possibilities ahead. This industrial tour will give our people an opportunity, according to the officials of the sectional organization, to make investigations for themselves along industrial lines. Towns that are interested in making this trip may get all the information by writing to the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce.

Auto Thief Who Escaped State Prison Arrested Last Night

Winston-Salem, N. C., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Percy Newsum, auto thief who escaped from state's prison some months ago, was arrested by the local police here at midnight last night. When arrested Newsum attempted to draw a pistol, but was overpowered by officers.

There seems to be much "reverse English" on that "courtesy" of the Texas legislators in asking Governor Miriam Ferguson to call a special session in which impeachment proceedings against her may be begun.

LIFTING THE BAN

When the students of Bryn Mawr college petitioned President Marion Edwards Parks for the repeal of the anti-smoking rule of 1897, what did Miss Parks do? Did she sternly announce that laws are immutable? Did she adopt new enforcement measures instead of abolishing the unobserved law? Did she tell her student body that what was good for 1897 is good for 1925 or that the student of 1897 knew best?

No, she did the quite extraordinary thing of replying that the students at Bryn Mawr have always been self-governing; that school rules have ever been based on the public opinion of the moment; that laws are based on conscience, convention and the needs of the time and that when conscience, convention and needs change laws also should change.

There is a moral for all in Miss Parks' dictum: "If a regulation prohibiting anything can no longer depend on the authority of conscience and convention, which make up public opinion, then it is no longer effective and there is no health in it."

The sooner civilization grants to each generation and each group the right of fixing its own rules of conduct the less need will there be for government by force. Much less than half of the girls at Bryn Mawr college smoke, but those who do see no wrong in it and defy others to deprive them of their cigarette. The fact that the non-smoking majority voted for the repeal of the anti-smoking rule is evidence that intolerance, bigotry and majority arrogance have passed from at least one educational institution, and that one girl's school.

A KEY THAT OPENS MANY DOORS

The classified advertisement when published in the daily newspaper not infrequently shows a "pulling power" astonishing even to those who are familiar with what can be accomplished through this agency. Though occupying little space and inconspicuous both as to position and size of the type used, every want ad in the daily news paper is read by hundreds of persons. And in that manner there will almost certainly be some who are interested in the advertiser's announcement, no matter what it may be.

It is not surprising, therefore, to find the classified columns being put to strange uses. One of the most novel is revealed in the report that an eminent psychologist, desirous of making a sociological study of women occupying high school and financial position, used want ads in American and British newspapers as a means of getting into touch with such persons.

This suggests that more extensive use might be made of the classified advertisement as an adjunct to science. If information is desired and there are people who can furnish it, it is practically certain that a want ad will reach them. It may be desired to buy something or sell something, to obtain help, to recover something lost or discover the owner of something found; whatever it is, the classified advertisement is likely to bring it within reach if anything can do it.

INDIRECT TAXATION

When the Italian government went about to raise the \$5,000,000 down payment on its war debt to the United States it capitalized one of the idiosyncrasies of human nature.

Italy has not escaped the high taxes made necessary in Europe and here by the war and her government was wise enough to know that another tax jump for payment of war debts would be resented, if not forcibly opposed by the public. It was nothing short of a stroke of genius that the Roman treasury undertook the raising of the needed fund by a direct appeal to the patriotism and national pride of the people. That the money would be over-subscribed was assured from the first. Taxpayers cheerfully gave dollars which they would have surrendered reluctantly as taxes.

A dollar is a dollar whether it is assessed as a tax or collected as a contribution, but with most people there is a wide difference between "taking" and "asking" for that dollar.

This same human trait explains the relative popularity of indirect taxes in comparison with direct taxes. The income tax is unpopular with those who pay it directly and is innocuous to the exempt, and yet it not infrequently happens that the man who makes the return ultimately collects the tax from the fellow with the exempt income. The tenant seldom protests against high property taxes, and yet his rent pays that tax for the landlord who constantly storms against this tax.

As governments by the majority strive to please the majority it is not surprising that indirect methods of taxation so often are adopted in preference to more logical and effective direct taxes.

NEW ORLEANS' OLD FRENCH QUARTER TO BE PRESERVED

New Orleans. — Vieux Carre, French quarter of Old New Orleans, where memories of yesterday abound on every side, will be protected from Modernism.

A commission of seven members has been created to act in an advisory capacity with city council to see that no buildings or repairs "out of character" crowd into the historic section now 60 years old.

Here stand the Cabildo, where transfer of the Louisiana Purchase took place; St. Louis Cathedral, built in 1794; the French market, dating from 1723; Napoleon House, built by Girod for the Emperor's residence when Lafayette's men should bring him from St. Helena; the shop of Lafitte, the pirate himself, and the Old Absinthe House, no longer selling absinthe, but still hale and hearty after a hundred years.

The Pontalba Buildings, facing Jackson Square on either side, have known such residents and guests as William Makepeace Thackeray, Jenny Lind and Lafayette.

Preservation of the quarter means that Jackson Square will continue to look out on scenes little changed from 1856, when the monument to

"Old Hickory" was erected. Here General Jackson was crowned hero of Chalmette by the Creole girls of Louisiana and it was in this same place D'Armes that Don Antonio Ullon received the keys of the city and took possession of it in the name of the King of Spain.

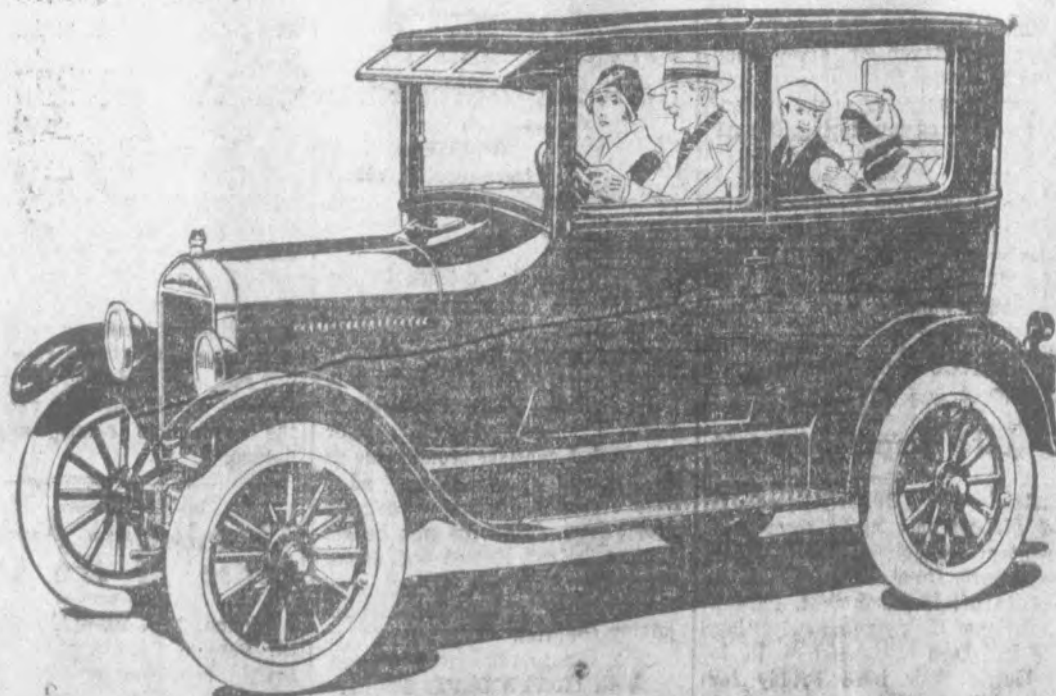

Slight Decrease Number of Death Traffic Accidents

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 30.—(AP)—A slight decrease in the number of deaths and a small increase in the number of injuries from traffic accidents in the South during last week are shown in a survey made by the Associated Press today. There were 35 deaths as compared with 37 the week before and 220 injuries as compared with 170 the week before. The reports came from eleven states. North Carolina took the lead in the number of deaths with eight, followed by second with six, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana reported no deaths.

There seems to be much "reverse English" on that "cousin" of the Texas legislature in asking Governor Miriam Ferguson to call a special session in which impeachment proceedings against her may be begun.

LIFTING THE BAN

When the students of Bryn Mawr college petitioned President Marion Edwards Parks for the repeal of the anti-smoking rule of 1897 what did Miss Parks do? Did she sternly announce that laws are immutable? Did she adopt new enforcement measures instead of abolishing the unobserved law? Did she tell her student body that what was good for 1897 is good for 1925 or that the student of 1897 knew best? No, she did the quite extraordinary thing of replying that the students at Bryn Mawr have always been self-governing; that school rules have ever been based on the public opinion of the moment; that laws are based on conscience, convention and the needs of the time and that when conscience, convention and needs change laws also should change.

There is a moral for all in Miss Parks' dictum: "If a regulation prohibiting anything can no longer depend on the authority of conscience and convention, which make up public opinion, then it is no longer effective and there is no health in it."

The sooner civilization grants to each generation and each group the right of fixing its own rules of conduct the less need will there be for government by force. Much less than half of the girls at Bryn Mawr college smoke, but those who do see no wrong in it and defy others to deprive them of their cigarette. The fact that the non-smoking majority voted for the repeal of the anti-smoking rule is evidence that intolerance, bigotry and majority arrogance have passed from at least one educational institution, and that one girl's school.

A KEY THAT OPENS MANY DOORS

The classified advertisement when published in the daily newspaper not infrequently shows a "pulling power" astonishing even to those who are familiar with what can be accomplished through this agency. Though occupying little space and inconspicuous both as to position and size of the type used, every want ad in the daily news paper is read by hundreds of persons. And in that manner there will almost certainly be some who are interested in the advertiser's an-

nouncement, no matter what it may be.

It is not surprising, therefore, to find the classified columns being put to strange uses. One of the most novel is revealed in the report that an eminent psychologist, desirous of making a sociological study of women occupying high school and financial position, used want ads in American and British newspapers as a means of getting into touch with such persons.

This suggests that more extensive use might be made of the classified advertisement as an adjunct to science. If information is desired and there are people who can furnish it, it is practically certain that a want ad will reach them. It may be desired to buy something or sell something, to obtain help, to recover something lost or discover the owner of something found; whatever it is, the classified advertisement is likely to bring it within reach if anything can do it.

INDIRECT TAXATION

When the Italian government went about to raise the \$5,000,000 down payment on its war debt to the United States it capitalized one of the idiosyncrasies of human nature.

Italy has not escaped the high taxes made necessary in Europe and here by the war and her government was wise enough to know that another tax jump for payment of war debts would be resented, if not forcibly opposed by the public. It was nothing short of a stroke of genius that the Roman treasury undertook the raising of the needed fund by a direct appeal to the patriotism and national pride of the people. That the money would be over-subscribed was assured from the first. Taxpayers cheerfully gave dollars which they would have surrendered reluctantly as taxes.

A dollar is a dollar whether it is assessed as a tax or collected as a contribution, but with most people there is a wide difference between "taking" and "asking" for that dollar.

This same human trait explains the relative popularity of indirect taxes in comparison with direct taxes. The income tax is unpopular with those who pay it directly and is innocuous to the exempt, and yet it not infrequently happens that the man who makes the return ultimately collects the tax from the fellow with the exempt income. The tenant seldom protests against high property taxes, and yet his rent pays that tax for the landlord who constantly storms against this tax.

As governments by the majority strive to please the majority it is not surprising that indirect methods of taxation so often are adopted in preference to more logical and effective direct taxes.

NEW ORLEANS' OLD FRENCH QUARTER TO BE PRESERVED

New Orleans. — Vieux Carre, French quarter of Old New Orleans, where memories of yesterday abound on every side, will be protected from Modernism.

A commission of seven members has been created to act in an advisory capacity with city council to see that no buildings or repairs "out of character" crowd into the historic section now 60 years old.

Here stand the Cabildo, where transfer of the Louisiana Purchase took place; St. Louis Cathedral, built in 1794; the French market, dating from 1723; Napoleon House, built by Girod for the Emperor's residence when Lafayette's men should bring him from St. Helena; the shop of Lafitte, the pirate himself, and the Old Absinthe House, no longer selling absinthe, but still hale and hearty after a hundred years.

The Pontalba Buildings, facing Jackson Square on either side, have known such residents and guests as William Makepeace Thackeray, Jenny Lind and Lafayette.

Preservation of the quarter means that Jackson Square will continue to look out on scenes little changed from 1856, when the monument to

"Old Hickory" was erected. Here General Jackson was crowned hero of Chalmette by the Creole girls of Louisiana and it was in this same place D'Armes that Don Antonio Ulloa received the keys of the city and took possession of it in the name of the King of Spain.

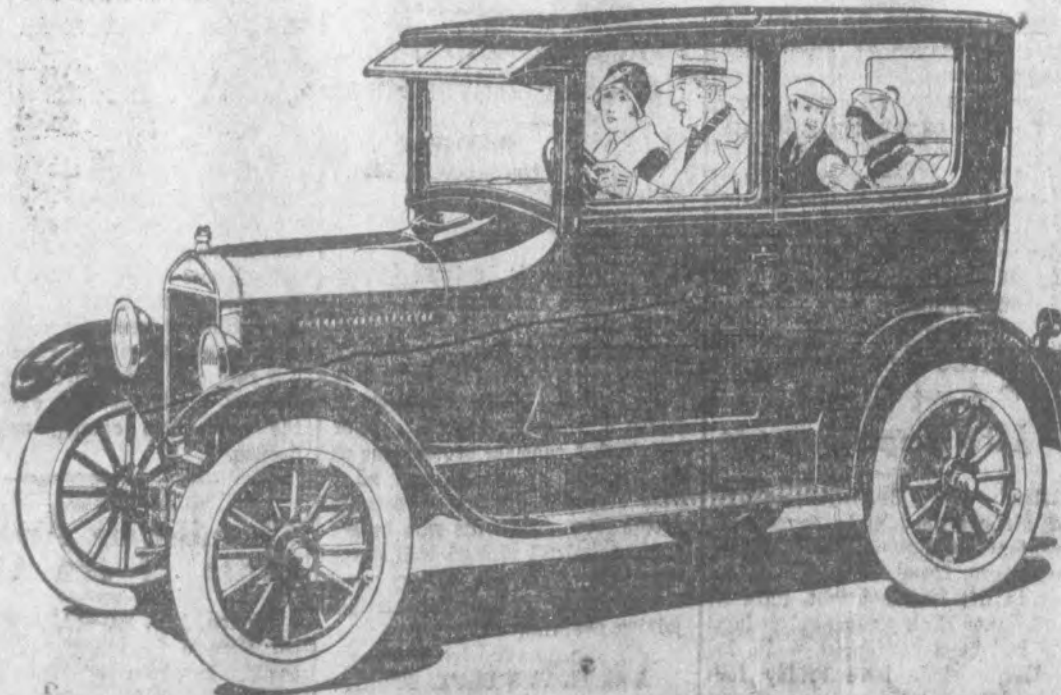

Gov. Ferguson Asks For Resignation of Armond Carter

Austin, Texas, Nov. 30.—(AP)—The resignation of Armond G. Carter, as a member of the board of directors of the West Texas Technological College, was requested in a letter today by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson.

The letter says the task is unpleasant to the Governor and states that she is informed that in December last year Carter "fitted up a building owned or controlled by you in the old fashioned bar room way, provided a bar with a foot rail, and the saw dust on the floor, and behind the bar you had a man dressed in the old fashioned bar tender white apron style for the old men's association henceforthwith."

LA COLLETTE WILL BE FIFTH YOUNGEST SENATOR

Washington.—Robert M. LaFollette, of Wisconsin, who at the next session will take the place in the Senate so long held by his father, will be the fifth youngest man ever to sit in that body and the first under 31 years of age to hold a seat there in more than half a century.

When he takes the oath of office at the opening of the session on December 7, he will be aged 30 years, 10 months and on day, having been born on February 6, 1895. The Constitution provides that no person under 30 years of age may qualify as a United States Senator.

Search of the musty records at the Capitol discloses, however, that despite this constitutional inhibition all of the Senators younger than Mr. LaFollette took the oath before they had reached the age of 30 and that their presence as members was not seriously questioned.

When Henry Clay presented himself for the oath for the first time on Nov. 19, 1800, at the age of 29 years, 7 months and 7 days, some Senator inquired as to his age.

"I hope my colleague will propound that question to my constituents," Clay replied, and there the matter dropped.

Three others even younger than Clay qualified. They were Armistead Thomson Mason, of Virginia, aged 28 years, 5 months and 30 days when he took his seat on January 3, 1816; Elias Kent Kane, of Illinois aged 28 years, 8 months and 28 days when he was sworn in on March 4, 1825, and Stephen Wallace Dorsey, of Arkansas, who was sworn in on March 4, 1873, at the age of 29 years and seven days.
