CHAMBER DEPUTIES VOTES CONFIDENCE BRIAND MINISTRY

After Hearing the Premier
Read His Ministerial Decla-
ration Vote is Cast 415 to
154

Paris, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Premier Briand although coolly received when he read the declaration of policy of his new ministry before the Chamber of Deputies, today won a partial victory by inducing the chamber to change its methods of procedure and consider the proposed increase of \$7,500,000 francs in the monetary circulation before discussing interpellations.

The bill was introduced today and referred to the finance committee which demanded a suspension of the session until nine o'clock tonight. Upon the question the chamber decided to allow the suspension by a vote of 415 to 154.

The declaration presented to the Chamber today admitted that the situation is particularly grave, but says it can not have irreparable consequences provided the confidence of the entire country and the collaboration of both houses of Parliament.

The declaration promises that inflation will be limited to the immediate needs of the treasury. It also says that realizing that the restoration of French finances can not be accomplished without loyal agreement with the great nations, which are French creditors, "the government will continue earnestly and promptly the negotiations with the allies concerning debt."

Chicago.—When President Coolidge comes to Chicago Dec. 7 to speak to the farmers attending the convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation, his headquarters will be in a two-story Georgian residence on top of the twenty-story Hotel Sherman, 300 feet above the street.

The midwestern sky white house or Presidential suite has downstairs a wood paneled living room with a real fireplace, a small dining room, and a kitchen where all the President's meals will be prepared.

Upstairs—there are no elevators in the little house—are four bedrooms on the floors today.

SCOUT FINANCE DRIVE POSTPONED

Due to Inclement Weather
Committee Decides It Best to
Wait; Dat to Be Announced

Due to the inclemency of the weather the Scout finance campaign has been postponed for a few days. Chairman J. B. Kittrell announced this afternoon. Orthopaedic Clinic to Be Held in Wilson Saturday, Dec. 5th

All cripples as well as those interested in the treatment of cripples, will be interested to learn that the North Carolina Rehabilitation Department, together with the aid of the Wilson Lions Club, will hold an orthopaedic clinic for the examination and treatment of all needing the attention of an Orthopaedist. This clinic will open Saturday, December 5th at Wilson and will be conducted monthly at that place for next year. It will be in charge of an expert Orthopaedist, who will examine all cases regardless of age, sex, or color. All cases which can be treated in the clinic will receive free treatment. It has been found that much effective treatment can be given in this way, as many cases do not require hospitalization, but only corrective methods. This is especially true of young children. Cases needing surgical operations will be advised regarding their needs and provision made for the free hospitalization of those unable to pay for it.

It is requested that all those who are afflicted with such common deformities as club foot, curvature of the spine, withered arms, undeveloped limbs due to disease in childhood or accident, or anything preventing full use of the limbs, attend this clinic. It is also true that a member of the Rehabilitation Dept. will be present for the purpose of outlining vocational training programs for all handicapped persons above sixteen years of age and the state will give valuable assistance to all in need of this aid.

This clinic will be held in the offices of the County Health Dept. at the new Court House at Wilson during the entire day, Saturday, Dec. 5th. It is intended to serve Wilson, Pitt, Edgecombe, Greene, Wayne, Johnston, and Nash counties.

Chapman Fighting for Life Goes on the Witness Stand Today

Wethersfield, Conn., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Gerald Chapman, fighting for his life against the desire of the State of Connecticut to hang him for murder, took the witness stand today and testified that he had had no warning of his transfer from Atlanta prison, nor of the state's action in securing from President Coolidge commutation of his federal sentence for mail robbery. Chapman was a witness but for a few minutes and was not cross examined.

Attending Masonic Meet in Enfield

Mr. Curtis Perkins this morning drove his father, J. W. Perkins, of Stokes, and W. Hill Horne and Rev. James E. W. Cook, to Enfield, N. C., where they will attend the Dedication of the New Masonic Temple in that town.

The ceremonies will last three days and the representative officials of the Grand Lodge, Knight Templars, and Scottish Rites Bodies will be in attendance.

Degree work in the Scottish Rites will form the principal feature of the two last days, and a large class is expected in the Lodge of Perfection and in the Chapter of the Rose Croix.

COAST OF STATE SWEEP BY HIGH WINDS LAST NIGHT

Gale Reaches Mark of 25
Miles, But No Loss is Known
to Have Resulted; Ships
Remained in Port

Wilmington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—High winds which swept North Carolina Seaboard last night and early today apparently passed without damage, reports from along the coast this morning indicated.

New Bern, Beaufort, and other towns were visited by the winds, but no loss is known to have resulted. The gale reached a mark of 25 miles an hour here, it was officially announced by the weather department.

Along the coast the velocity was reported as 40 miles an hour. Ships warned in advance remained in port.

The rising barometer indicated clearing weather before tonight.

Member White House Police Subjected to Mutilating Operation

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Paul A. McDuffie, 32, a member of the White House Police detachment, was subjected to a mutilating operation last night, or early today, at the hands of unidentified persons, and is in a critical condition in a local hospital. McDuffie, who wandered into the hospital in a dazed condition several hours later, was unable to give the police any information as to who subjected him to the operation. He recalled, they said, only that he had gone to a house while off duty in company with four enlisted men. Sometime after, the police said, he left the house in the mutilated condition, and wandered around the streets in a dazed condition before going to the hospital. Detectives are trying to trace his assailants.

Rescinds Proposal for Retroactive Reduction Inheritance Taxes

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee today rescinded its proposal to allow a retroactive reduction in the inheritance taxes.

The provision was taken from the tax reduction bill after the treasury had estimated it would mean a loss of \$70,000,000 in revenue rather than \$20,000,000 as originally estimated. The committee's decision for lower inheritance rates in future years however remains unchanged.

New Highway Costing \$800,000 to Be Built Charlotte to Gastonia

Charlotte, Dec. 2.—(AP)—A definite decision was announced today to build early in 1926 a new highway linking Charlotte and Gastonia at a cost of approximately \$800,000. Announcement was made by William C. Wilkinson, commissioner for the sixth state highway district.

PAN-AMERICAN EXHIBITION OPENS WITH 500 PAINTINGS

Los Angeles.—Marking the first time South American art has been placed on exhibit here since 1915, the Pan-American Exhibition, with 500 oil paintings and etchings on display, opened today.

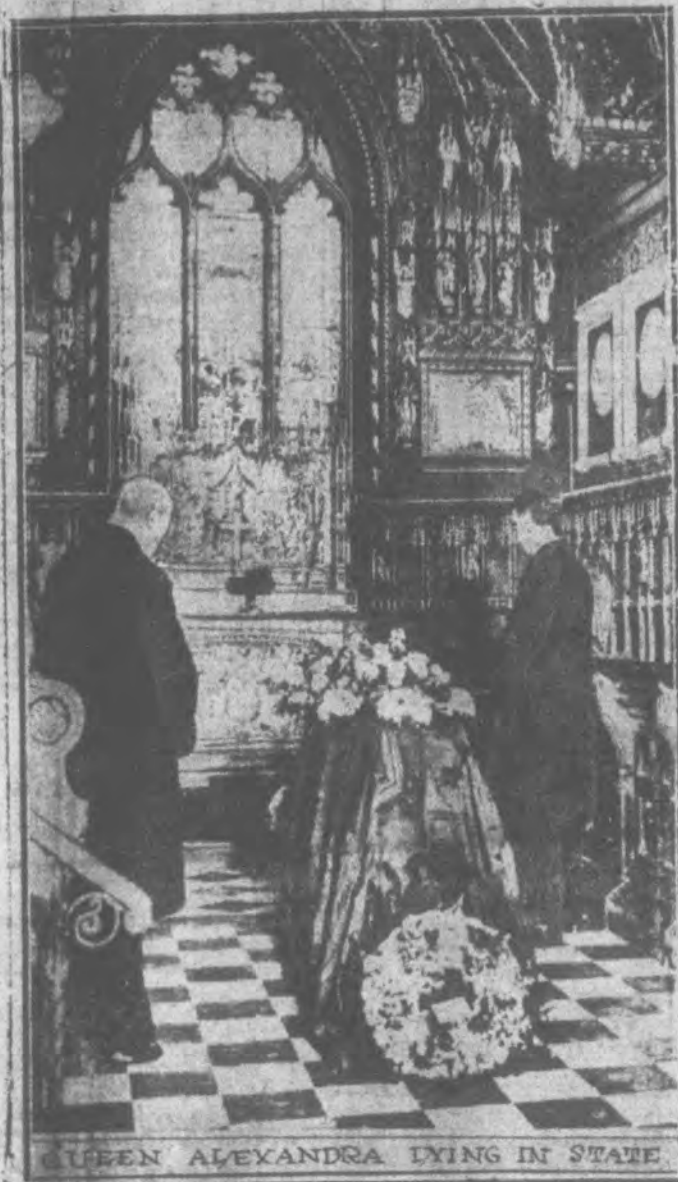
The opening was in conjunction with the dedication of the first unit of a series of eight additions to the Los Angeles Museum in Exposition Park.

Says Ferguson's Statement Attempt Mislead the Public

Austin, Texas, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The statement of James E. Ferguson that the state in the end will lose because of the \$600,000 judgment he gained against the American Road and Transportation Builders, is a deliberate attempt to deceive and mislead the public, Attorney General Moody said today. "The findings of the court show that there is no basis whatever for Ferguson's charge," he said.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 2.—(AP)—James E. Ferguson defended today the acts of his wife, Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, in connection with the administration of Highway matters in Texas, which precipitated agitation for a special session of the legislature.

In a detailed statement he asserted that the settlement and judgment in court of the American Road Company case was not the victory for opponents that they had claimed. He charged Dan Moody, Attorney General who has clashed frequently with the Fergusons, with entering into a private agreement with the road company and stated that the state would lose \$900,000 to this agreement. The statement declared that if the Highway Department had not been disturbed the road company's profit would not have exceeded more than \$25,000.

Says Rebel Druse Tribesmen Advancing Attack Damascus

London, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The Evening News Cairo correspondent says an unconfirmed report is published there stating that the rebel Druse tribesmen in Syria are advancing to attack Damascus and that a big battle is imminent.

SPANISH QUEEN MINGLES WITH LONDON CROWD WHILE SHOPPING

London.—When Queen Victoria Eugenie of Spain comes to London to do her shopping she thinks nothing of taking a taxi and being hustled to Kensington Palace with her arms full of bundles.

Princess Ena of Battenburg, as she is known here, combats a tendency to plumpness by taking vigorous exercise, and on her fall shopping tour she bought many sport clothes.

On one occasion she accompanied Queen Mary of England and Queen Maud of Norway on a shopping trip, but the tour had been pre-arranged so carefully that few persons in the busy centers were aware that three queens of as many countries were in their midst.

MORSUL DISPUTE TO BE TOPIC BEFORE LEAGUE NATIONS

Hope Expressed That Difficulty
Between Great Britain and
Turkey Over Boundary Be
Straightened Out

London, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Yesterday's rumor of the possibility of war between Great Britain and Turkey over the Morsul boundary question failed to cast a shadow on the general rejoicing of the signing of the Locarno treaty, but the ugly problem was not forgotten and was discussed informally in the lobbies of Parliament and Chamber. Nothing developed however to give more solid form to the rumor. The delegates of the nation now are starting for Geneva where the Morsul dispute will be one of the main topics before the council of the League of Nations. Hope is expressed here that the difficulty will be straightened out at Geneva.

League of Nations Informed Controversy of Chile and Peru

Geneva, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The year's old controversy between Chile and Peru over the sovereignty of Tacna, and Arica has been brought to the attention of the League of Nations by the Chilean Minister, who had deposited with the League Secretary General, a memorandum regarding the delay in holding the Plebiscite provided for in the award of President Coolidge as arbitrator to end the dispute.

The memorandum is regarded by some as a protest against General John Pershing, President of the Plebiscitary Commission, regarding the vote on the question at issue. The memorandum expresses the belief of Chile that a postponement of the Plebiscite would increase the animosity between Chile and Peru and says that Chile ordered its representative at Arica not to take part in the sittings of the Commission until General Pershing was willing to discuss a date for the Plebiscite. It charges that Peru is obstructing the Plebiscite and making trouble so cleverly that General Pershing considers inadvisable the fixing of an early date for the voting.

"If General Pershing persists in not hastening the Plebiscite," the memorandum added, "He is playing the game of the Peruvians and becoming involuntarily the best collaborator of Peruvian obstruction."

McLean Appoints Delegates to Attend Forestry Association

Raleigh, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Governor McLean tonight announced the appointment of 37 North Carolina citizens as delegates to attend the joint meeting of the American Forestry Association and the Southern Forestry Congress, to be held in Richmond, January 6 and 7.

Warns American Residents Damascus Keep Off Streets

Damascus, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The American consul today warned the American residents of Damascus to keep off the streets after 6 o'clock at night. The fanatical feeling here is running higher than it was late in October.

TROPICAL STORMS ON ATLANTIC COAST MOVE NORTHWARD

Gale Warnings Displayed
From Beaufort to Virginia
Cape; Highest Wind Velocity
Reported at Land Station
Was 52 Miles An Hour

Washington, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The tropical storm, which has been attended by gales along the Atlantic Coast from the Virginia Capes to Jacksonville, Florida, and by rains in the South Atlantic States, was reported to the weather bureau today to be apparently central a short distance east of Wilmington, N. C., and moving slowly northward.

Whole gale warnings were displayed today from Beaufort, N. C., to the Virginia Cape and storm warnings were still out elsewhere along the Atlantic Coast from Charleston, S. C., to Eastport, Maine. Two vessels in the vicinity of the storm center were said to have reported winds of hurricane force. The highest wind velocity reported at a land station was 52 miles an hour from the north east at Norfolk and Cape Henry, Virginia, and the same velocity from the northwest at Charleston, S. C.

"WHAT'S YOUR HURRY?"

Automobile and other street accidents have become so numerous in many cities that campaigns have been commenced to teach the public, pedestrians as well as drivers of vehicles, the wisdom of exercising care on the public streets.

Investigations of accidents on the streets have developed that a large per cent of them are avoidable; that they are the result of carelessness on the part of the driver of the vehicle or the pedestrian who is the worst sufferer when a collision occurs.

Men and women rush across the streets or between street cars and vehicles, apparently without any thought of the dangers they face in doing so. Many persons can be seen leaving a street car at the rear door and crossing the street behind the car, thereby running the risk of being struck by a car passing on the "blind" side.

Automobile drivers are not blameless in the matter. Many of them take chances in rushing across a street ahead of a street car or another automobile, all for the evident purpose of saving a few seconds, as if the saving of time justified them in running the risk of being struck.

Even without the aid of a traffic officer at the street crossing, travel would adjust itself if every person exercised good judgment in crossing. "Go with the traffic" is advice which may be followed with safety under almost every condition.

The drivers of vehicles are blamed for many more accidents than should be charged to them. Pedestrians have a responsibility which they should not attempt to evade. It is much easier for the individual to wait a few seconds than it is for the driver of an automobile to stop to prevent striking a person who has rushed into the middle of the street in thoughtless haste.

Every person, driver or pedestrian, who uses the streets has it in his power to aid in making the streets safe for all.

BROADWAY CARNIVAL IS MERELY AN OVERGROWN COUNTY FAIR

New York. — The six way current of Times Square North was blocked at the height of its flow.

From the rear seat of an automobile of expensive make, driven by a liveried chauffeur, a man in faultless attire arose and rendered an operatic cornet solo. His execution must have been better than fair, for there was generous applause at the conclusion.

"Real music lovers will recognize that as a selection from Moteverde's 'Straciana,' explained the artist. 'He is sadly neglected by our impresarios and so this gem of melody is unknown to thousands. So, these gems (and he produced a velvet box) these pure Snake Valley Sapphires—'

It was just another sideshow on the two mile daily carnival which is Broadway. Staged, according to the New Yorker, for the benefit of the 300,000 visitors who come each day to the city's hospitable doors, an overgrown County Fair holds forth from 30th to street to the late 60s.

Changing with every short city block and yet unchanged throughout its length in the foundational motif which is a candid combination of the

world's latest offerings. The Orange Trail has supplanted the Cocktail Route—this is the biggest physical change in Broadway in the last decade.

Instead of Martin's and Monquin's and Maxim's there are flaring white and pink booths on the corners with alluring piles of the yellow fruit, and often complicated machinery, palpably designed to convey the impression of having been used to transmute the piled fruit into the golden, frosty drink. The shaded light and private tables and comfortable footfall are missing.

But except for the missing bacchanalian temples, the Broadway carnival continues to offer its sideshows as of old. Three diminutive negroes appear from side street, push their way into the solid stream and to the tinkle of a home made uke, stage a native interpretation of 'The Charleston.' to the delight of a throng which includes more than a few formal costumes. The flurry of small change is hastily garnered as a stolid member of the City's Finest strolls into view. The jam of humanity breaks, flows

a block and concentrates again before a Zibbongued merchant who stands guardian over two uncannily dexterous dancing dolls. Half the watcher sees the tiny silk thread which furnishes the motive power but none are so unsportsmanlike as to spoil the game. A few quick sales and this 'show' also liquidates before the approach of John Law.

Opponent and proponent of the evolution theory held adjoining corners in a soap box debate on a recent night and each drew large crowds. A deep breathing enthusiast gave his 'mes sage' with personal illustrations and insisted to the end that just his 'love of his brother' was the recompense sought—but at the end, produced a patented easysliding suspender which would aid the seeker of ozone.

Strollers on Broadway pass, with little apparent notice, windows full of diamonds, curios to make an antiquarian dream, and ornate mechanical devices, to congregate in a solid mass before the latest cafe window showing a sculptured watermelon.

The tides of Broadway are influenced by kilowatt and ampere, rather than by luna rays. Its trend to the Rear, in Forties is south from Washington Heights and North from Washington square as soon as the first electric signs flicker into life. The flow becomes vertiable 'rips' of humanity as theatre-time approaches, to recede gradually from then, as the crest splashes into the dinner and dance club belt.

Famous Polish Painting Undergoing Restoration

Warsaw. — Poland's most-revered picture, the celebrated Madonna of Chensobova, is under restoration in the hands of John Rutwiski.

For centuries this madonna has hung in the monastery of Chensobova. The legend concerning the picture holds that it was painted on a table by St. Linc. It passed, according to the legend, from Byzantium to South Russia and was stolen there by a Polish prince who intended to take it home. But while he was passing the Chensobova monastery his horse refused to go further. The prince accepted this as a divine order to leave the madonna in the monastery.

When the Czechs espoused the creed of John Huss they are supposed to have plundered the monastery. They tried to carry away the famous madonna, but their horses refused to move, and in their anger the Czechs cut the face of the madonna. A wound appeared on the face, from which blood flowed, according to the legend. Traces of the cut still remain on the picture in spite of repeated efforts to remove them.

It is historically established that King Jagiello ordered the picture repainted in 1430 and the restoration was made by an unknown artist who was familiar with the original technique of the picture and did his work with much skill.

This celebrated madonna is supposed to have delivered Poland from the Swedes in 1655. When all the rest of Poland was in the hands of the invaders the Chensobova monastery held out. After long siege the Swedes were exhausted and the Poles were so encouraged by the stubborn resistance of the monastery that the entire country was aroused and expelled the invaders.

This made the madonna the patron of Poland and prayers are directed to her in all crises.

Rutowski, who has a wide training in the restoration of pictures at the Louvre, was commissioned to treat all the art objects which Poland recovered from Russia under the Riga treaty. He believes the madonna is the work of a great artist of the beginning of the Christian era.

AMERICANS IN EUROPE LONG FOR HOME DISHES AND MENU Paris. — Although Europe may boast the best cooks in all the world, hundreds of Americans here are starving for American dishes. Even the American woman who diets has her troubles. For European chefs have not learned how to make that extremely thin and brittle toast which enables one to give a pretense of eating.

In France, sauces and butter and flour used as ingredients in the cuisine, are terrible enemies to the waist line. In England, boiled unseasoned vegetables offer little temptation to the palate. No medals can be awarded in Italy and Germany for no woman who wants to wear fashionable gowns dares to eat much macaroni, spaghetti or vallohi. Wine and beer do not go with the slender boy-like figure.

Follow a party of American tourists, or go to a luncheon of American business men, or to a gathering of American women, and hear these pleas and complaints:

"My kingdom for some cornbread"

"If I could only get some nice brown waffles with Vermont maple syrup."

"Oh, for some real huckwheat cakes."

"When a Frenchman can cook chicken in nine hundred and ninety different ways, why can't he fry it starv-t-dkzctnAkchicemfwyphrdlun like we do at home?"

"The cook who learns how to make corn fritters in Paris will make his fortune."

And to cap the situation, French kitchen artists can not make the kinds of soup which Americans like best.

Millions in Jewelry to Grave.

Atlanta.—The practice of burying jewelry with the body of a relative or friend is an expression of sentiment that morticians do not seek to discourage, explained Fred W. Patterson, President of the National Selected Morticians. While most of the jewelry buried with bodies is expensive, averaging about \$10 a thinklet in each case, Mr. Patterson estimated that the 2,000,000 Americans who die annually carry approximately \$20,000,000 worth of jewelry to the grave with them.
