BUSINESS MEN IN
SPLENDID SESSION
HERE ON THURSDAY

Men Engaged in Bottling Carbonated Drinks Hold Convention at Rotary Club

Men of a large section of Eastern Carolina who are engaged in bottling carbonated drinks held a convention in the Home of the Rotary Club here on Thursday.

This branch of commerce is comparatively new, yet it has grown to be one of the largest and most beneficial of the whole group. It now engages many of the most substantial and successful business men. At this convention these men considered their business interest and the public's need for their products on a high plane. They realize that the bottle drinks, made and distributed by them, plays a large and important part in the health and life of all the people; that almost every man, woman and child consumes, within his stomach, their products, and that any dishonesty, or even carelessness in the manufacture of their products necessarily tends to affect human life. Their affairs were discussed in the light of this realization of importance.

This convention had as its guest, Mr. Homer Thompson, of Charlotte, who is connected with the Coca-Cola Company. Mr. Thompson made a short talk relative to the bottling business in this state and adjoining States, and discussed problems which have confronted this branch of business and the manner of handling them. His wide experience enabled him to hold the attention of the convention on details of their business which come up every day.

Mr. H. C. Neil, of Atlanta, Ga., connected with the Southern Bottlers Association as General Counsel, made a strong address, calling attention to the consumers of carbonated drinks; that the prevailing price of five cents is extremely important, in that it puts the healthful and pleasing drink within reach of every man, woman and child that can be repeated any day and not consume much money; that the question of taxation, as applied to carbonated drinks should be carefully guarded that the prevailing price may not be advanced and the bottler not put out of business.

Judge F. M. Wooten was another guest and addressed the convention, calling attention to the extra ordinary natural resources of Eastern Carolina, making it possible for the people to buy drinks at five cents each and thus maintain prosperity for the bottlers. He called particular attention to keeping the people economical free and on the march of progress: That soon the towns in this section will extend their electric lines from one to another until a complete circuit is formed and the City of Wilson can supply the City of New Bern with electric current sufficient for any demand, that when this comes into existence electric current will become available, at a cheap rate, to almost every home in Eastern Carolina and lead to an agricultural development not yet imagined. SODA DISPENSERS
TO INSTALL SYSTEM
FOR STERILIZATION

Board of Health Will Require That Ordinance Be Observed or Sanitary Cups Will Be Required

The regular meeting of the Board of Health was held in the court house on Friday, December 4th, 1925.

The matter of segregation of prisoners suffering with contagious and communicable diseases was taken up and the Board recommended that the State ordinance in regard to this be enforced, and that the county commissioners be requested to make arrangements for handling same.

The matter of greatest importance to be taken up was that of sanitation in the fountains and other soft drink dispensers of the county. A petition signed by 90 per cent of the druggists in the county was presented to the Board, asking that they be allowed to put in a hot water system for sterilizing the drinking glasses and other dispensers used in handling soft drinks. After some discussion the following resolution was passed:

Be it resolved by the Pitt County Board of Health in session December 4, 1925 do enact the following ordinance: All dispensers of soft drinks in Pitt County shall on and after February 1, 1926 install a system of hot water sterilization for all drinking cups or any container used at fountains as per plan submitted by Pitt county druggists and soda dispensers, which plan is made a part of this ordinance.

In lieu of the above ordinance, any dispenser shall use sanitary drinking cups.

Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of \$50 and all persons guilty of violating the above ordinance shall be prohibited from using any dispensers except sanitary drinking cups.

The druggists and Board of Health are co-operating to give to the people of the county the best sanitary way practicable for handling soft drinks. The public should see that when they call for a drink that it be served in a clean and up to date manner.

The next meeting of the Board will be on or about January 15th, 1926.

Belvoir Township
Man Attempts to
Shoot Neighbor

Roger Stancil, white man, of Belvoir Township was brought to Greenville yesterday and confined in the local jail, charged with attempt at assault on Dave Hathaway, to wit: A shot gun on Thursday night.

According to information Stancil accused Hathaway's son with disposing of a still in which he was supposed to have been interested. Failing to receive any satisfaction out of Dave Hathaway, the boy's father, he shot at him. Hathaway ran around the house and returned the fire. He then entered the house. Stancil then went to a window and shot through it, the entire load entering the head of a bed, in which three children were sleeping.

He was arrested and brought to Greenville and placed in jail.

Believes Arrest of 21
Men Smashes Rum
Smuggling Syndicate

New York, Dec. 5.—(AP)—United States Attorney Buckner is anxious to learn about the inland distribution system of the huge rum smuggling syndicate he believes has been smashed with the arrest of 21 men Thursday. The arrest of William Dyer, widely known sportsman and race track owner, and 20 other men. Mr. Buckner feels he has disposed of Atlantic Seaboard operations of the alleged ring, but today he turned his attention to the disposal of liquor after it was landed.

A complete confession from one of the six coast guardsmen arrested in the round-up, which began Thursday, involves prohibition agents, and New York policemen, Mr. Buckner has indicated.

RHINELANDER LOSES FOX HUNTER'S ASS'N.
ANNULMENT SUIT HOLD ANNUAL MEET
AGAINST HIS WIFE AT PACTOLUS TODAY

Jury Finds That Mrs. Rhinelander Did Not Deceive Her Husband As to Her Negro Blood

White Plains, N. Y., Dec. 5.—(AP)—Leonard Kip Rhinelander, wealthy member of a New York family, lost his annulment suit against his molatto wife, Alice Jones Rhinelander, in a verdict returned today by a jury which heard the case.

Answers favorable to the negroes were returned to all questions except the first and seventh. The first, that of whether she was of negro blood at the time of the marriage had been conceded as the fact of the defense during the trial. The jury made no answer to the seventh question, "Did the plaintiff co-habit with the defendant after he obtained full knowledge that the defendant was of colorful blood?"

After five questions found that Mrs. Rhinelander did not deceive her husband either positively or negatively as to her negro blood, that she did not conceal this fact to induce the plaintiff to marry her, and that he would have married her even had he known she was of negro blood.

Defendants of the jury were limited to answers to seven questions propounded to it. Before the case went to the jury Justice Morschauer had indicated that his decision relative to the annulment to be based on the findings of the jury would not be made for several days. After Justice Morschauer had made his ruling, the entire case must go to the Supreme Court for final review.

Immediately after the jury's findings were made, Anne N. M. Morschauer, counsel for Rhinelander, moved to have the verdict set aside as being contrary to the weight of evidence. On this motion Justice Morschauer also reserved decision, instructing the attorney to return a brief within a few days.

Hunt Held on 77th Birthday of Mr. J. R. Barnhill, Oldest Member of Ass'n; Two Foxes Caught

The Pitt County Fox Hunters' Association held its annual hunt at Pactolus this morning followed by the annual picnic dinner. The hunt resulted in the capture of two "Brier Fox" and much fun for all those who attended.

The hunt began at 7 o'clock when fifty hounds were turned loose and began the chase followed by the same number of hunters. Shortly after the dogs had been loosed the first fox was jumped and the chase continued for an hour and half before the capture. The hunters then crossed the railroad to a point near the river where the dogs were loosed for the second time and the second chase was begun. Like the first it continued for about an hour and a half resulting in the capture. The entire party returned to Pactolus where a picnic dinner was spread and greatly enjoyed. Mr. Gus E. Forbes, president of the local association, was toastmaster and extended a cordial welcome to all those present. Rev. H. Frederick Jones, Master of Hounds of the Virginia Fox Hunters' Association, who has just moved to this city from Portsmouth, Va., and who is an honorary member of the Pitt County Association delivered an address at today's gathering. Among other speakers of occasion was W. T. Lipscomb, of this city. Following the dinner the club presented Mr. J. R. Barnhill a handsome silver spectacle case as a token of honor and esteem on his 77th birthday. Mr. Barnhill is the oldest member of the Pitt County Fox Hunters' Association and has been a fox hunter for the past 65 years.

At 1:30 the party disbanded each to carry away with him many fond memories of the occasion which was declared the best of its kind ever held in this county.

SOUTH ATLANTIC
COLLEGES HOLDING
SESSION ATHENS

Indications Are That Southern Conference Will Remain Intact With No Dismembership of Organizations

Athens, Ga., Dec. 5.—(AP)—That the Southern Conference will remain intact and that there will be no "dismembership of the organization" was indicated here today by Representatives of the colleges in the South Atlantic session.

Opinions of Representatives of institutions in this section were to the effect that there are more obstacles in the way of such a split than at present exists in the operation of the wide spread organizing of collegiate institutions.

Virginia members of the conference were whole-hearted in their praise for the conference during last night's banquet, and North Carolina delegates said they had heard of no move for the formation of another group of colleges other than at a meeting held in Richmond last year by smaller colleges of the Old Dominion.

Durham and Raleigh
Show Increase in
Trade Last 4 Wks.

Raleigh, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Durham, and Raleigh, of the larger cities of North Carolina showed an increase in fall trade for the four weeks ended November 11, 1925, as compared with the previous four weeks. The increase was based on the debits to individual accounts and firm and corporation accounts in the larger cities as indicated by reports to the Federal Reserve Bank at Richmond.

Durham's increase was from \$22,914,000 to \$23,032,000 while that of Raleigh was slightly more than a million dollars from \$526,475,000 to \$27,696,000. The other cities showed decreases.

22 MEN ENTOMBED
IN FAIRVIEW MINE
EMERGE ALIVE

One Half Stagger Unaided From Smoking Tunnel While Others Were Carried Out Unconscious; Death Claims Two

Nederland, Colorado, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Twenty-two miners entombed in the flaming subterranean passages of the Fairview mine near this little mountain town for nearly eighteen hours emerged today from their underground tomb—alive. One half of them staggered almost unaided from the smoking tunnel, while the others were carried out unconscious. The fight is now shifted from the fire swept chambers to a little but where a temporary hospital has been thrown up to receive the twenty-two miners and ten volunteer workers who collapsed from the fumes that emerged from the mine.

Death claimed two of the miners, Robert Stevenson, and Charles Herquist. Most of the others are expected to recover.

One of the first rescue workers in the main tunnel of the mine saw Walter Swanson, one of the entombed men, staggering toward him, and shouted to those above that the men were safe.

Joy was short lived, however, for the rest of the men failed to follow Swanson. The rescuers continued their way down the main tunnel and then encountered a gas pocket, which overcame the rescue party. The stronger of the men carried out those who had collapsed. A few hours later the rescuers penetrated the workings and reached the entombed men.

The miners escaped death primarily through the building of a bulkhead in a wing of the western section of the main tunnel, 4,100 feet from the earth surface. Behind this shelter they escaped the deadly gas fumes and smoke by using their clothing, stones, and dirt to plug up the holes in this bulkhead.

Bankruptcies Show
Increase in October
Over Same Month '25

Raleigh, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Bankruptcies increased in October 1925 over the same month of last year, the report of the Federal Reserve Bank for the states of the Fifth Federal Reserve District shows. In this October there were 149 insolvencies for a total of \$2,524,656 as compared with 111 last year involving \$1,705,371.

While there was an increase in the Fifth District, the United States as a whole had 1,581 failures which was the smallest total reported since October, 1920 and compares with 1,496 for October, 1924. The decrease in the number of failures throughout the nation carried with it a decrease in the amount involved from last year and the lowest since 1919. Last year the amount involved in October failures was \$36,098,801 and this year \$29,643,370.

Favors Material
Strengthening Hawaii
Fortification

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Material strengthening of the Hawaiian fortification is favored by members of the House Naval committee, which recently visited the island, and is expected to become a part of the committee's program for the coming session.

The proposals in their present form contemplate the addition of two sixteen-inch guns to the armament of the island, improvement of the Pearl Harbor channel to facilitate the passage of battle ships in and out, construction of a sea wall and dry dock facilities, and increased storage space for ammunition.

The necessary legislation is being prepared by Representative Stephens, Republican of Ohio, who has the support of Chairman Butler, of the committee, and Representative Britton, the ranking republican member.

Col. Andrew Hero, Jr.,
To Succeed Cove

Washington, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Colonel Andrew Hero, Jr., of the Coast Artillery Corps, has been selected Chief of the Corps with the rank of Major General. He succeeds Major General Frank W. Carr, who is to retire at his own request. Colonel Hero is now on duty at Fort Mifflin, Pa.



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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

The New Testament Names for Christians.

(III.) "THE SAINTS"

"To all the saints in Christ Jesus which are at Philippi."—Philippians 1:1.

This name, given by the Apostle to the Christians of Philippi may well be called "the new name." The sound of it, in the sense in which he used it, had never before been heard on the earth.

Men had known before what it was to be "called" of God, not only men of the Hebrews, but men of all the nations of the earth.

We make a great mistake if we suppose that the great pre-Christian religions, the Indians, the Scandinavian, the Greek, the religions which we now call mythologies were the work of devils, or the creations of diseased and insane imaginations. These religions had in them the Voice of God. They were man's first efforts to hear that Voice and to give it articulation.

Nor was "faithfulness" a new virtue in the earth. It was one of the great civic virtues of antiquity. For its performance Rome gave the Consulship; for its violation, the Tarpeian Rock.

But this name, "the Saints," was in reality a new name and signified a new quality in humanity. And of all the qualities of the Christian character this was that which he valued most. It was that gift of God to him which won his lasting gratitude and made him a devoted servant of God and of Jesus Christ his Lord.

As a man who has travelled all day long, has made his way through some foul bog, where death and decay were all around, where hissing serpents and deadly cypresses strewed his path with poison, where dark and stagnant water was not fit to drink, nor could he wash his hands and face in it, where the air was heavy with the breath of death;—when this man at eventide drags his almost exhausted body upon some upland and breathes pure air again, and comes upon a spring of water and washes his face and hands; then that man is happier than he has ever been. He has escaped from death; he has seen the sky again; he has water to drink, and has washed and is clean.

Now this was the feeling that was in the heart of the man who came out of the world into the Christian Church.

The world from which he came was an unclean world, a world lying in wickedness, a

world of moral and spiritual death.

We cannot look back to the world as it was when St. Paul was preaching Christ to the Gentiles, without a pitiful horror for the men and women who lived at that time.

The world as it was then was a world in decay; a world smitten with moral leprosy; and was sloughing off into a shameful and dishonored death.

Whatever there had been that was good and noble in the ancient religions was gone; only the base and degrading, the meaningless ritual, the senseless doctrine, the unclean ceremony, was left to satisfy the heart of man. The orgy was the ceremony that men and women practised as most pleasing to the gods. To drink till a man was drunken; to dance till a woman was mad; to gratify lust till lust became a frenzy; was counted among the highest duties of religion.

All the ancient religions lacked two essential qualities:—they were without mercy and purity. There were brave gods and beautiful gods and wise gods, but save only Athene, there were no pure gods, and no wise gods.

From the death of Julius Caesar to the death of Nero the dissolution of Roman society went on with frightful rapidity; and when human society goes to pieces it lets loose the primitive passions of man, the passion of lust and the passion of cruelty. And these passions ran riot in those days, and there was nothing to stop them. Lust took on the most unnatural and revolting forms. Mere ordinary sins and crimes no longer satisfied the jaded senses and depraved imaginations of a worn-out race. The simple prostitution of woman was sweet and wholesome and almost a virtue in comparison with darker deeds of uncleanness. Men and women were in despair; they did not know what to do. The Stoic fled for refuge into his cold and hopeless austerity. The Epicurean sought to satisfy his conscience with a philosophy that made sensual pleasure the supreme good. But neither the Stoic nor the Epicurean found peace. Men ran from themselves as from a horror, and suicide was the fashion of the day.

Now out of this world a man came into the Christian Church. No sooner had he done so than he found that he had passed from death unto life.

In the Christian community he found not only the purity the Roman knew in the days of Lucretia and Virginia, he saw for the first time what men call holiness. It was a revelation to him. It took possession of his soul as light takes possession of the eyes, and it filled him with joy and gladness.

Do you wonder at what brought men into the Church when the whole world was against them? To become a Christian then meant to become an outcast. A man entered the Church at the hazard of his life. He severed the noblest ties of humanity; he became an object of hatred to his father and mother; the wife of his bosom despised and forsook him; at any moment he might hear the cry—"ad leones"—to the lions!—and find himself in the jaws of the beast.

Yet men and women crowded into the Church by the thousands!

The power that brought them to Christ and held them there was the power of holiness.

To-day the doors of the Church are wide open. It is easy and popular to enter.

Why then do not the people throng and press to enter as they did in the primitive days?

In these latter days we have tried every expedient to get men to Church. We have fine music and eloquent preaching and Church teas, and Church dances; and I know not what schemes have been left untried to attract the people.

Why not try again that which was so successful in the days of our Lord, of the Apostles, confessors and martyrs?

Let us try holiness. Let us ask God to give us back again the "new name." Let us earn and deserve the name of "the Saints in Christ Jesus."

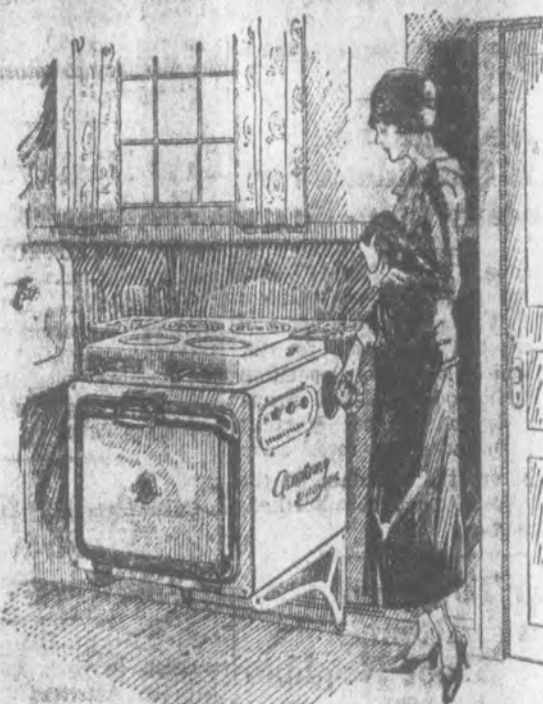

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CABLE LETTER

London, Dec. 5.—(AP)—Marlborough house, which for many years has been the London home of the late Queen Mother Alexandra is expected to be taken over shortly by the prince of Wales.

The mansion is a famous link with London of two hundred years ago and it contains one of the most wonderful apartments in the world. This is called the "treasure room" in which are kept many gifts of great value, gold and silver plate and jewels, including the treasures which came to England with King Edward VII, then the Prince of Wales, when he returned from his Indian tour of 1875. It has been estimated that the value of the gold and silver alone in these gifts, not considering the craftsmanship or the historical associations is more than 1,500,000 pounds sterling (\$7,500,000).

The first building on the site of Marlborough House was a home built for Henrietta Maria, the queen of King Charles The First. Marlborough House itself was begun in 1709 by John Churchill, Duke of Marlborough the victor of Blenheim. Bolshevik boots is the name which seething Englishmen are giving to the boots women are now wearing in London and throughout English cities. But in spite of the malefactors women are still buying the high topped boots in such quantities that English factories, working overtime, are unable to keep up with the orders.

Letter writers told papers are heaving all sorts of abuse on the new footwear. It is hinted by some contributors that Russian boots are used to conceal thick and ungainly ankles. Others object to having women cover their dainty ankles with such ungainly loose leather tops. But most writers are agreed on the fact that the gap between the high boot top and the bottom of the short skirts with which they are usually worn needs to be remedied. This gap widens as boots become old and wrinkle down and it has been suggested that women must keep their boots up by straps around the knees similar to those worn by officers.

"Get thin" lunches have become the fad here. The idea was introduced through writings of Mrs. Charlotte Cameron, traveler and authoress, who told of their introduction in California where she has been the guest of the Adolph Spreckels family in San Francisco, and other friends at Los Angeles, and Hollywood. She is one of England's most travelled women, having visited most countries of the world.

Mrs. Cameron was entertained so lavishly at so many dinners that she

would not be able to undergo the strain of giving a series of long-drawn-out course meals to get even and this led to inauguration of the scheme of lighter refreshments for her guests.

Menna for Mrs. Cameron's lunches were made out, not by head waiters or chefs, but by a Los Angeles doctor who specializes in reducing. Her parties became immensely popular and now "thinning" lunches are very popular in Mayfair. There are indications the idea will extend to dinners.

Paris, Dec. 5.—(AP)—France's summer tourist season resulted in the leaving of 10,000,000,000 francs in the country by American and British visitors. That was the sum spent by tourists of these two nations during June, July and August, according to figures published by the tourist bureau.

The summer tourist season lasts approximately 100 days and experts have figured it out that at least \$500,000,000 or \$5,000,000 a day, was spent by France's visitors during that period.

With the winter season along the Riviera now in full swing, and with dollars and pounds flowing into the banks of southern France, Le Figaro says: "This situation constitutes a bright ray of sunshine in France's otherwise cloudy financial affairs, and should dissipate some of the hesitations of the holder of the cabinet portfolio of finance."

The Paris winter theatrical season is marked by the popularity of musical comedy, as distinct from the native French operetta, and by the number of melodramas of modern life. The influence of the motion pictures is apparent in many plays of the latter type, in several of which the heroines are distinctly modern women. For instance, one runs a garage while another is a book publisher.

There have been few failures this season. The young author has no room for complaint against the Paris producers' treatment of him, for many play by new men are being put on. New theatre near the opera recently opened with a play by a 24-year-old playwright, Jacques Natanson, who previously had two plays produced in important theaters.

The Odeon theatre has produced a play based on Florence Barclay's novel of some 15 years ago, "The Rosary," which promises to be an unusual success. It has caused many critics to lament that a play of this sentimental character should survive and occupy the stage of France's second national theater.

Berlin, Dec. 5.—Siegfried Wagner, dramatic producer, and son of Richard Wagner, the great composer, has published a fiery protest against the invasion of jazz in Germany.

"The Blue Danube is nearer and dearer to us than Cuba and Santo Domingo," he declared. The national dignity, Herr Wagner continues, demands that the youth of Germany waltz to the dainty and vivacious melodies of Johann Strauss instead of dancing to negro tunes, especially in view of the national resentment over the French employment of black troops in the occupation of the Rhineland.

Jazz is all right for the United States, Herr Wagner believes, because it is indigenous there, because of the evolution of negro native.

Following the custom of William the First, founder of the modern German empire, President von Hinden-

burg immediately on his return from a tour of the country writes in his own hand letters of thanks to the heads of governments, state and municipal, who have entertained him.

The president scorns assistance from secretaries and typists. With a firm hand, which in no way betrays his age, he writes out his appreciation, insisting that gratitude is a personal matter which cannot be expressed by proxy or rubal terms, or with the aid of such a mechanical device as the modern typewriter.

The Cologne carnival, gayest of all the German fairs, is to be revived next year after 11 years of inactivity. With prospects of complete evacuation of the Cologne territory by allied troops next spring, directors of the carnival are at work on plans for 1926. Opposition of the Roman Catholic clergy has waned. It was charged that the fairs endangered the morals of young men and women.

The famous horse fair will probably give way to an automobile show at the coming carnival. The war and disorganization of German cavalry regiments has left the province without its former choice selection of horses. Street parades with huge floats will also have to be curtailed because of the low-hanging trolley wires on the principal streets.
