



## DID MONA LISA GET HER SMILE IN EGYPT?



THAT Leonardo de Vinci was not the inventor of the strange, alluring, mysterious smile which has made "Mona Lisa" the most famous painting in the world is a new charge which has

caused wide-spread interest among artists. An unknown Egyptian who lived between 1600 and 1370 B. Cais now credited with being the first man to conceive the smile which has been for years the increasing subject of comment by critics and

Cecil B. De Mille, motion picture producer, who made this discovery, uncarthed the "Fgyptian Mona Lisa" during weeks of research for material for elaborate Egyptian scenes in his Paramount picture "The Ten Commandments" now showing in this city. He was the first to recognize the remarkable resemblance between Leonardo De Vinci's "Mona Lisa" and the strange smile on the face of a statue of the Egyptian Goddess Isis, now reposing in the Birmingham Museum, Birmingham, England.
