TWO YOUNG MEN BADLY CUT IN AFFRAY HERE ON LAST SATURDAY NIGHT

Messrs. Hogan Gaskins and Guy Evans in Local Hospital Suffering From Cuts Alleged to Have Been Inflicted By Frank Taylor.

Messrs. Hogan Gaskins and Guy Evans, two young men of this city are in the local hospital as a result of several serious cuts, alleged to have been received Saturday night at the hands of Frank Taylor, farmer who lives about four miles from this city. Taylor is in the Pitt County Jail, without bail, pending developments in the condition of the two young men.

The affray occurred in front of White's theatre about 9 o'clock Saturday night, and was the result of abusive language by Taylor directed at Mrs. Gaskins who was in charge of the theatre office.

According to information, Mr. Mr. Gaskins, accompanied by Mr. Evans, appeared upon the scene in midst of Taylor's abuse and told Taylor that Mrs. Gaskins was his wife and that he wanted him to be careful with his language. After a few words had been exchanged, during which time the men had gone a short distance from the ticket window, Mr. Taylor struck Mr. Gaskins in the back with his knife. Mr. Evans then took Mr. Gaskins' part, receiving his cuts.

At the time no one knew who Taylor was, but after a thorough investigation of the affair, one of the men who were with Taylor, told who he was. The arrest was made about 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning. Mr. Taylor denied being the guilty party, and has maintained the same attitude throughout yesterday and today. Officers, however, found in his possession a knife with blood stains on it.

Feeling ran high following the affair, due to the popularity of the two men.

Mr. Gaskins is the son of Mr. J. C. Gaskins, Register of Deeds, and holds a position with the Imperial Tobacco Company. Mr. Evans is the son of Mr. G. T. Evans.

Mr. Gaskins received two long cuts which required more than thirty stitches and Mr. Evans received two head cuts in addition to being stabbed in the left lung.

Reports state that they are getting along as well as can be expected and passed a rather quiet night.

47 Persons Killed Auto Accidents During Last Week

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 7. — (AP) — Forty-seven persons met their doom in the south from automobile accidents during the week just ended, while more than a quarter of a thousand were injured in accidents in which motor cars figured. These figures were revealed today in a survey of eleven southern states made by the Associated Press. Florida heads the death column for the week with fourteen and Arkansas comes second with nine. Virginia is the only state reporting no deaths, although the Old Dominion reported 53 injured.

In North Carolina there was one death and twenty-one injured.

Farmville Men Shot At By Unknown Party

Messrs. J. W. Holmes and F. G. Smith, of Farmville, had a narrow escape from being killed Friday afternoon when unknown parties shot at them while they were riding in an automobile. The bullet went through the upper left corner of the door, passed six inches from the faces of the men and passed out through the right door. Aaron Peed is being held under a \$500 bond, on circumstantial evidence, while the officers continue their investigation.

Messrs. Smith and Holmes were en route to Washington to attend a stockholders' meeting and the shooting occurred about two miles below Grimes land.

Tobacco Market Averages \$28.10 for Entire Week

According to official figures given by Secretary K. W. Cobb, the Greenville Tobacco Market during last week sold 2,188,284 pounds for \$614,913.82, averaging \$28.10. For the season the market has sold 36,888,498 pounds, averaging \$28.58.

OTTO WOOD AGAIN IN HANDS OF LAW

Convicted Slayer After Breaking Way to Freedom for Two Times Is Captured Near Mooresville

Mooresville, N. C., Dec. 7. — (AP) — Otto Wood, convicted slayer, of Greensboro, N. C., and who has twice broken his way to freedom from the State Prison at Raleigh, today was captured near here enroute to Charlotte.

Officers said there was no doubt of the man being Wood. When arrested Wood was driving a roadster with a West Virginia license, and had three guns, and was dressed with a corduroy suit with a fur lined overcoat. Chief of Police Woodside, of Mooresville, made the arrest.

Wood had been at large for nearly two weeks since he escaped from state prison by hiding in a concrete culvert made in the prison yard which was hauled away in a box car.

33 ARRESTED WHEN THE OFFICERS RAIDED TEN ROAD HOUSES

Twenty Members of "Dwyer Syndicate" Still Missing While 23 Are Arrested; Largest Rum Running Syndicate Ever Found

New York, Dec. 7. — (AP) — Enough evidence of rum running and corruption of Government officials by the alleged "Dwyer syndicate" is on hand to keep the grand jury, which convenes today, busy for a month, United States Attorney Buckner believes. Twenty members of the gang still are missing, although 23 have been arrested. The syndicate, it is charged, is the largest ever found operating on the Atlantic seaboard, its business being said to run into millions of dollars annually.

New Jersey state police yesterday raided ten road houses in the northern part of the state, arrested 20 men and thirteen women. In addition to these arrests six of the men arrested last week were United States Coast Guardsmen, and they gave the Government in a confession, much of the information concerning how Coast Guardsmen aided the rum runners in landing their liquor. Mr. Buckner declared this to be the most sensational evidence involving corruption of Government officers yet revealed.

Says Air Invasion of U. S. By Asiatic Power Is Impossible

Washington, Dec. 7. — (AP) — The Navy today drew near the end of its testimony before the Army Court Martial trying Colonel William Mitchell as a result of his charges of incompetency in the management of aviation. Lieutenant Commander Henry H. Frost, naval expert, testified that in his opinion "an air invasion of the United States by an Asiatic power is impossible without use by it of Russian and Canadian territory." "Even with Russian and Canadian assistance," he said, "the invading power would require a very superior naval strength, at least three to one over that of the United States. We have no reason to be concerned over the possibility of a naval force attacking the United States across the Atlantic."

Farmers' Position Best Since 1920 Says Secretary Jardine

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7. — While the farmers of the nation have not yet reached an economic parity with other great groups of producers, their position now is more favorable than any time since 1920, Secretary of Agriculture W. M. Jardine declared in his annual report, made public today.

"The heavy net movement of rural population away from farms has been checked," Jardine said. "Noteworthy progress has been made in the liquidation of indebtedness among farmers. Purchase of supplies and materials for farm use has been resumed over the country on a scale contributing materially to general business prosperity."

Jardine pointed out that the crop year 1924-25 represented an advance in total gross income from \$11,300,000,000 to \$12,100,000,000, or an increase of 7 per cent. The farmers, he said, are receiving better prices for their products than at any time in the past five years. The average of all farm prices for October was 143 per cent of the pre-war average as compared with 138 per cent in October, 1924.

"The real significance of this improvement in prices is better indicated by the relation of this change in prices of farm products to the changes in the wholesale prices of non-agricultural products," he said. "The purchasing power of the prices of farm products in terms of the prices of non-agricultural products has risen from 66, the lowest point of the depression period, to 87 in October, compared with the pre-war average of 100."

There must be substantial readjustments in freight rates, because high freight rates constitute one of the many causes that have contributed to the depression in farm prices, Jardine declared. It is generally conceded that the entire freight-rate structure needs overhauling, he said. He expressed the opinion that a careful study should be made of the entire freight-rate structure, as freight rates the country over have grown up in a haphazard way and as a result of all sorts of local considerations.

"On the basis of such a study it should be possible to make rate adjustments that take into account the market value of farm products as reflected over a reasonable period of years and likewise the influence of freight rates on the economic development of different regions and of the country as a whole," he said. "I realize that adequate income to the carriers must be fully reckoned with as a factor in rate making, because efficient and adequate railroads are indispensable to a profitable agriculture."

"There have been only minor changes in the freight rates on farm products in the last year. Our index showing changes in freight rates of 50 representative agricultural commodities stood on January 1 at 158.2, or 58 per cent above the 1913 level. Since then there have been no change great enough to affect the index. "In relation to pre-war conditions, the prices of farm products are not on a par with freight rates. The level of farm commodity prices in

September was 144 per cent of the pre-war average, whereas freight rates on agricultural commodities were 158 per cent of the pre-war average. Moreover, the prices of agricultural products fluctuate greatly from year to year, whereas freight rates are stable and are not frequently changed. The burden of the post-war increase in freight rates fell heavily on agriculture because the rates were increased just as agricultural prices started downward and remained high while agriculture was undergoing a very severe depression. The ability of agriculture to pay transportation charges should not be reckoned on the conditions of any given year, but on probable future conditions, unless freight rates can be made more flexible, being raised when prices are high and lowered when they decline, within reasonable limits.

"The most significant fact about our wheat situation is that with a large world crop the United States apparently has little more than enough wheat to meet domestic requirements. The wheat crop of the North American Hemisphere, outside of Russia and China, is estimated to be 11 per cent greater than the 1924 crop. It is larger than the pre-war average of production in the same countries, but not equal to the record crop of 1923. Russia is reported to have some wheat for export. Although it is not expected that Russia will contribute as much wheat for export as before the war, it is possible that she will export more wheat this year than she has exported in any other year since the war. Prospects are also good for the wheat crop in Argentina, but a short crop in Australia may offset the prospective increase in Argentina.

"The world's supply of rye is also an important factor in the wheat situation. The rye crop, too, is much larger than last year. Estimates in the Northern Hemisphere outside of Russia, amount to 981,000,000 bushels, as compared with 711,000,000 bushels last year. Russia is reported to have a good crop of rye. The effect of a good crop of rye in Russia is to encourage exports of wheat, and the effect of good rye crop in Germany and Poland is to reduce the import demand for wheat.

"The influence of this increase in production of wheat and rye as compared with last year is offset to some extent, however, by lower stocks at the beginning of the year and by the location of the increases in production. At the beginning of the year European stocks of old wheat were reported to be very low, and the stocks in exporting countries as well as the quantity of wheat afloat were very much lower than at the beginning of last year. Most of the increases in production of both wheat and rye are in Europe, where increased production will cause some

Wife and Son of Local Store Proprietor Arrive From Russia After Many Unsuccessful Attempts

Last Friday night brought to a close a period of more than eleven years separation of Tom Goor, local shoe store proprietor, from his wife and son the latter now nearly fourteen years of age. The separation was brought to a happy end when Mrs. Goor and her son, arrived in this city after travel and unceasing efforts for years to rejoin her husband.

"This is the fair to be the happiest Christmas for me spent in nearly a dozen years," Mr. Goor said this morning as he told briefly of the untiring efforts to have his family join him since the time he left Russia to cast his lot with the American people and become a citizen of the United States.

In 1914 Goor left Russia to come to America and upon arrival came to North Carolina and established himself here. His arrival in the United States was followed by the World War and all efforts to have his family join him then were futile he said. In 1920, however, when the World War had begun to become history the efforts to bring his family to America were renewed and during that year his wife and son began their first journey toward the new land to join husband and father. In the meantime more stringent immigration laws had been enacted and entry into this country made more difficult. Pitt county has to its discredit 18 one teacher schools and 14 two teacher schools. As long as these inefficient school exist, our larger schools will possess a down-cast look. Bethel cannot have a wonderful working school as long as the county is carrying the load of thirty-two ungraded and carelessly organized schools. CONGRESS CONVENES 68TH SESSION TODAY

Nicholas Longworth Elected Speaker of the House; Receives 229 of the 420 Votes Cast

Washington, Dec. 7. — (AP) — Nicholas Longworth, of Ohio, today was elected speaker of the House. He obtained the necessary majority over Representative Garrett, of Tennessee, the House Democratic leader who was a candidate, and Henry A. Cooper, of Wisconsin, who lead the LaFollette attack on President Coolidge and his policies at the Cleveland Republican convention last year.

Longworth received 229 of the 420 votes cast. The vote for Garrett was 173, and for Cooper 13. Five voted present.

Washington, Dec. 7. — (AP) — Congress came back into session today after its largest recess in years. With the opening ceremonies at noon, the big Republican majority rolled up in the Coolidge landslide of 1924 took the saddle in both Senate and House, but kept the reins on the Democrats and Insurgents, who again were threatening in coalition against some of the pet projects of the administration.

Washington, Dec. 7. — (AP) — The 69th Congress assembled today for its first session with the House facing another three-cornered contest over the speakership as a result of the new challenge of the Republican leadership by the insurgent group of that party. Reorganized with the refusal to "compromise" with the regular Republican forces in the House, the insurgent group has put its own candidate for speaker into the field, Representative Cooper, of Wisconsin.

This move, which was coupled with a declaration of war by the group on the Mellon Tax plan and intention to urge real farm legislation, will cost the Insurgents all of their committee chairmanships and ranking places if the program of some Republican leaders to make "heartly regularity" is carried out. Despite the insurgent move, Republican leaders, going ahead with the plan to organize the House in the open session today, were confident of the necessary votes to elect Nicholas Longworth, of Ohio, as speaker of the first ballot. Representative Garrett, of Tennessee, is the Democratic candidate.

Warehouse Property Purchased By J. M. McGowan and Others; Redrying Plant Not Included in Sale

One of the largest real estate deals in this city for some time was consummated Saturday when Mr. J. N. Gorman sold his tobacco warehouse property located on Ninth street to J. Madison McGowan and others for \$120,000. Papers recorded Saturday call for completion of the transaction and transfer of the property early next spring following the close of the present tobacco season. Mr. Gorman and his sons will continue to operate the warehouse the remainder of this season. The sale does not include the steam redrying plant adjacent to the warehouse property this being retained by Mr. Gorman.

Mr. Gorman's future plans are not yet completed but he stated this morning that announcement of same would be made in the near future. Whether Mr. Gorman, together with his sons who have been interested with him in the warehouse business, will go into the leaf tobacco business as is rumored, has not yet been definitely decided said Mr. Gorman.

Mr. Gorman is one of the pioneers in the tobacco industry in this section having been buyer on the local market the second year that it was in operation more than thirty years ago and having brought to eastern North Carolina its first steam redrying plant. For the past fifteen years with the exception of one year he was with the Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association. Mr. Gorman has operated an auction tobacco warehouse here and with the exception of the year following his season with the cooperative association has led the local market in the number of pounds sold.

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MAIL EARLY!

The approaching holiday season is heralded by the usual request of the postoffice department that the public do what it can to aid in the prompt handling of mail matter which will be increasing in volume each day from now until Christmas.

In sending gift packages two things are important if disappointment is not to be invited—careful wrapping, and mailing as soon as possible. Holiday package mail may be marked to indicate it is not to be opened until Christmas, and this permission should result in an increase in early mailing.

It is a mistake for any person to feel that the small amount of mail which he sends does not delay the transmission of mails, but the aggregate of mail matter in a community like Greenville severely tests the facilities of the postoffice force at each holiday season.

Even if an individual does not take the broader view of making his contribution toward the handling of mail, he should think of the personal advantages in obtaining the best results in his own shipments by turning them over to the postal force early enough to avoid the inevitable rush of the holiday season, thereby having reasonable assurance of prompt delivery.

THE MERRY SHOPPER

The Yuletide is this year responsible for one of the largest bodies of eager people bent on accumulating Christmas joys for big and little folks that America has known since way back in 1914, when war clouds had gathered over Europe and the shadows had already begun to cast their sinister reflections upon the United States.

To this end the holiday may be expected to display much of the old time recognition of its distinctive appeal to the young. Its best celebration is that which gives the foremost thought to the children. It is only when this idea is enlarged and expressed that the season secures its happiest celebration. The disposition to make the season one for the indulgence of extravagant adult practices and dissipations is destructive of the real joy and meaning of the season.

The displays that greet us from shop windows serve more than a practical or commercial value for shoppers. They recreate in mature minds the eternal joy of childhood. The coming season's memories are the grown people's chief joy, or should be. No other season so stirs the heart of those who are now the providers of those same joys that were once theirs. If this spirit is not confined to the mere selfish and narrow limits of those "of our own" but is expressed in mak-

ing richer and fuller the lives of those who need our help. This Christmas tide will be the happiest and most useful of our lives.

FOOTBALL'S TOLL

The football season only just come to a close was not unlike its innumerable predecessors except for two, and not unrelated, facts. The first of these was the announcement, not uncommon in itself, that more players were killed and seriously injured this year than in any previous season, and the second was that in spite of the first there was lacking the viewing-with-alarm which here tofore was an inevitable post-season event.

A census of scholastic, collegiate and professional football teams shows twenty players killed and forty-three players with serious or major injuries. While the number of fatalities is larger than that of any other season, the whole number of football players was even larger, so the percentage of accidents is smaller this year than for some other seasons.

It is significant that life insurance companies have not included football among the hazardous occupations and that statistics prove systematic football training makes for a diminution of injuries. Although professional football is the most ruthless and brutal, only one player in this class was killed this season.

Taking into consideration the vast number of boys and men and even girls in mole skin this year, there is greater license by far for wondering at the paucity of gridiron accidents than for being alarmed by the sport's casualties. Compared with some other sports, such as swimming, football can not be classified as hazardous.

HUGE GRANITE BLOCK FOR LENIN'S STATUE FOUND IN CITY STREET

Leningrad, Dec. 7.—(INS.)—Erection of the gigantic statue to Lenin planned here as the crowning memorial to the Bolshevik leader, was held up for lack of a big enough base to hold the twenty-six-foot figure, but the discovery just made of an immense granite block, which for fifty years diverted traffic in one of the city's business streets and there was buried by an industrious peasant has solved the difficulty.

The block of solid granite, weighing more than 200 tons, was originally brought to St. Petersburg in 1912 to form the cornerstone of the of the Kazansky Cathedral, then in process of construction. But the block fell off its rollers in the middle of Apteker street, and Russian fashion, the engineers decided to let it lie.

cratic candidate. Meanwhile in the Senate, which virtually completed its organization last March and where there will be no serious contest of any officials, Republican leaders were awaiting indication from Senator LaFollette of his own desire of being assigned by the majority to the standing committees before taking action with respect to the treatment to be accorded him. Despite the clear cut majority of the Republicans in the House he reaffirmed attitude of the insurgent group undoubtedly will complicate matters somewhat for the majority parties in putting a legislative program through the two Houses. In the Senate, the record of several Republican Senators from Western States infrequently opposing administration measures and policies makes the much narrower Republican majority there even more uncertain.

Notice of their intention to oppose the tax bill, which was ready for report to the House today, and to vote on all other legislation as they saw fit, was given to the insurgent group in a statement issued last night.

Washington, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Representative Hill, Republican of Maryland, and leader of the wet forces in the House, introduced today a joint resolution proposing the repeal of the 18th amendment.

DIRIGIBLE BEST IN LONG FLIGHT, ECKENER HOLDS

German Pictures Regular
Trips Between West Coast
of United States and Japan

Berlin, Dec. 7.—(By I. N. S.)—"Without deprecating the value of a regular air service by means of airplanes I hold that distances larger than 2,000 kilometers should be covered by dirigibles only," said Dr. Eckener in a speech held at the Colonial Society in which he reviewed the possibilities of a world-spanning net of dirigible airlines.

Dwelling on his favorite scheme of a regular airship connections between South America and Southern Spain, Dr. Eckener declared that, as an average, only three days would be required for covering the distance of 8,000 kilometers between Spain and Rio de Janeiro.

He then proceeded to explain his ideas of a regular service by dirigibles between the West Coast of the United States and the Hawaiian Islands, or Japan and claimed that the distance between the two continents, amounting to about 10,000 kilometers, might be covered within seventy-six hours.

"By the establishment of proper hangars in the neighborhood of suitable ports, it should be possible," declared Dr. Eckener, "to cross the Pacific from South America to China within three days and to reach South America from Spain via Australia within seven days."

"Great care, however, must be taken in picking out districts which are especially favorable meteorologically speaking."

"It is also essential that the air routes are adjusted in a way that the landing is always arranged for during night-time. Thus, there would be no difficulty whatever in landing properly."

After a few remarks on the possible cause of the Shenandoah disaster, which he believes is due to the failure of approaching vertical gusts with an adequately balanced ship, Dr. Eckener appealed to the audience to do everything in their power to make the "Eckener Fund," raised for the purpose of building a new airship for an Arctic expedition, a full success.

While Miller finds the office not greatly different from lieutenantancy to a man governor, he nevertheless is undergoing strange reactions. In earlier years, he was a crusader against the woman movement. He never dreamed he would see a woman become governor. Yet, in the turn of life, he finds himself wholeheartedly supporting one.

In 1917, Miller coted for the impeachment articles against Mrs. Ferguson's husband, then governor. Later, he made a speech attacking Ferguson. When the Farm-Labor Union brought out Miller for lieutenant governor, however, he found the Fergusons were fighting the same opponent, the Ku Klux Klan, and this situation brought them together.

The lieutenant governor believes his captain is making a good gov-

ernor.

Incidentally, when Miller was a young lawyer, a New York street railroad company offered him a position. He declined on the ground that he always had lived where he could see 60 miles in every direction. He still lives in a country home near here.

24-MILE SPANISH RANCH TO BE SPLIT UP AT LAST, REPORT

(By Associated Press)
Santa Monica, — Passing of the last frontier in the southern California coast district is heralded in the announcement that the Malibu ranch, near here, consisting of 18,000 acres, is to be subdivided into home sites.

The ranch has approximately 24 miles of frontage on the Pacific ocean and is the only original Spanish land grant of a century and a quarter ago to remain intact.

Strife marked the history of the Malibu since 1804, when the king of Spain set his seal to the first grant. At present more than a score of cowboys ride the range of mountains and beach, caring for 5,000 head of cattle roaming the vast tract.

To whom the king of Spain granted the land in 1804 probably will remain a mystery, for the original grant has long been lost, but authentic records of 1895 indicate that the ranch was given to Don Jose Bartolome Tapia by the Spanish governor of California.

Don Tapia ruled his acreage with an iron hand, frequently driving off invaders. He died in 1828, leaving the ranch to his widow and two sons. His will, containing one of the strangest paragraphs in California's history, declared indebtedness to the padres of San Fernando mission to the extent of \$300 "more or less, or any sum they claim." Directing the payment, he also gave the fathers three pounds of sugar, a valuable bequest in those days.

The Tapia family held the ranch until 1848, when they sold it to Don Leon Victor Prudhomme for \$400 half of which was paid in "metallic currency," the rest in "goods at current prices."

S. A. and its relation to other countries. We understand the third volume of this biography is now out.

pair journeyed as far as Ellis Island only to be barred again from this country and returned to foreign lands. During this time, Goor said, his family has journeyed to many of the European countries with the hope of gaining admission into the United States through such channels but each time it was the same story and the same unhappy return. During the World War and the years immediately following, Mrs. Goor said, the lands in which she and her child sought refuge changed con-

tinuously from one government to another and that nine times had they been residents or refugees in captured lands. Many times, she said, she and her child had hidden in cellars for days without food to escape capture and probable death at the hands of captors.

April of this year was the beginning of the final chapter of the prolonged separation when Goor was successful in obtaining his citizen-

ship papers from the United States Government and immediately steps were taken through governmental departments to bring his family to this country. The wife and son at this time were in Russian Poland and through the efforts of the American Consul passage to America was secured. The pair reached New York Wednesday morning aboard the S. S. Paria and arrived in this city Friday night.

Decrease in Marriages Increase in Divorces Reported for 1924

Raleigh, Dec. 7.—(AP)—A decrease in 1924 of marriages in the United States and an increase in divorces was reported today in a survey released here by the Department of Commerce. Marriages decreased 45,718 or 3.7 percent from the 1923 figures while divorces increased 5,771 or 3.5 percent over the 1923 totals.

The figures showed, however, that there were approximately seven times as many marriages as divorces in the country. There were 1,178,206 marriages and 170,867 divorces. For 1923, 1,223,924 marriages and 165,096 divorces were reported.

Eighteen states of the Union showed decreases in the number of divorces, one had the same totals for both years and one state showed no divorces either year. The balance showed increases which more than offset the decreases reported in the 18 states. The only state where there were no divorces was South Carolina which has no provision in its laws for granting divorces.

Thirty-six states of the Union showed decreases in marriages last

year with the others showing increases. The increases however, failed to offset the decreases.

The State of North Carolina showed a decrease in marriages of 838 and a decrease in divorces of 43. There were 23,190 marriages in 1924 as compared with 24,028 in 1923 and 1,461 divorces as compared with 1,504 in 1923. North Carolina's showing, however, as to the ratio of marriages and divorces, was better than that of the nation as a whole. While there were approximately seven marriages in the entire country to every divorce, in North Carolina there were 16 marriages to every divorce. New York led the list of states in marriages with 106,312 with Illinois coming second with 81,918. Pennsylvania took third rank with 73,331.

Texas led in the number of divorces with 15,375 and Illinois came second with 13,658. Ohio took third rank with 11,946 divorces. The State of Nevada, wherein is situated Reno, widely known as a divorce center, trailed far down the list with but 1,037 divorces.

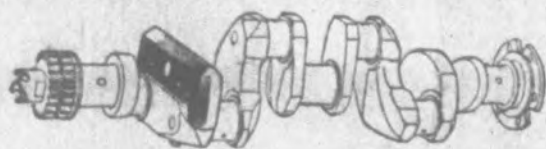

increase in consumption. Latest estimates indicate that the total European crop of wheat outside of Russia and a few unimportant producers not yet reported is 323,000,000 bushels greater than last year and that the total European rye crop outside of Russia and a few small producers is 281,000,000 bushels greater than last year. Records of past years indicate very clearly that the European import requirements will not be reduced nearly so much as this increase in production. The fact remains, however, that the world's supplies for the year appear to be somewhat larger than last year in relation to the world's demands.

"The situation in the United States is markedly different from what it was last year. The total production of wheat is but slightly greater than the quantity utilized in the United States last year. Out of an estimated production of 873,000,000 bushels last year, the balance of exports amounted to 252,000,000 bushels, leaving 621,000,000 bushels in the United States. In addition to this balance about 44,000,000 bushels were drawn from stocks, indicating a total utilization in this country of approximately 665,000,000 bushels. Should the

same quantity be utilized in the country this year, there would be only 32,000,000 bushels of wheat for export without further reduction of stocks.

"Looking ahead, according to the 'intentions-to-plant' report, high prices have encouraged farmers to consider increasing the wheat acreage of the United States. In planning wheat production the situation both in the United States and in the whole should be considered. Even with the same acreage as last year, a good average yield would place the United States on an export basis for most if not all classes of wheat. The trend of production in many countries that compete with the United States is upward. Production in European countries affected by the war is rapidly approaching pre-war status. Russia, a large exporter before the war, is recovering. The wheat-producing areas of Argentina, Australia, and Canada are now 53 percent above pre-war average, and these countries have not yet reached their limit. Under these conditions, only poor crops in important foreign wheat-producing countries can result in a situation comparable to that of last year, when the farmers of the United States had a good crop which they sold at high prices.

"Cotton production outside the United States has increased rapidly in the last two seasons, as a result, no doubt, of the stimulus of favorable economic and weather conditions rather than of concerted effort, though there has been much of the latter. A further increase of foreign production will bear careful study, since it may lead to a competitive situation in which the advantage will rest with the producer whose costs of production are lowest or who produces cotton of a quality most in demand. Under such conditions, the shorter staples grown in this country would probably feel the competition of cotton grown with cheap labor in India, China and elsewhere.

"The Department of Agriculture is giving close attention to the possible competition which foreign cotton production may force upon our short staples. It is particularly concerned with cotton breeding and testing, so that a more general production of prolific cotton of high spinning quality may be facilitated. Studies have been made of production costs in 15 countries typical of as many distinctive areas in the Cotton Belt. Scientific investigation has been made of the less obvious properties of cotton fibers which contribute to their spinning value. The results of this work have been made available to breeders of seed and to other cotton growers. Spinning tests are being carried on to determine the relative waste content and the strength and evenness of yarns from cottons of various varieties, and from cottons of the same varieties grown under various conditions of soil and climate. Tests of the same sort have been made of cotton of different grades. These tests have demonstrated the relative superiority of higher grades over lower grades, from the standpoint of waste percentages and values, yarn strength and evenness, bleaching, finishing, and mercerization properties, and efficiency of machine operation.

"Concurrently the work of quality standardization has been carried forward. New agreements have been negotiated with foreign markets with the year, which assure the use of the grade standards throughout the world, thus solidifying their establishment and adding to their usefulness in our own country. The staple standards have also been reviewed in the light of past experience and certain slight modifications projected in the physical representations, all of which are calculated to make them more workable and dependable as measures of length. There are few problems of an economic nature either in cotton production nor distribution, to which fixed and accepted standards of quality are not fundamental."

WASTE OF MONEY BY PITT CO. SCHOOLS

by the smaller type schools of our county. A ten minute drive from Greenville will carry one to a two teacher school wherein the inefficiency is just as marked as it is in the one teacher school. There the seventh grade children read like they were just beginning the fifth grade and the sixth grade read like third grade children. This story of poor teaching can be produced by almost every small school in the county. The sixth grade each of the schools mentioned above was three years below the ordinary sixth grade ability in a standard elementary school. To really complete the seventh grade in a school of this type, a child must stay in school year after year and so long that he is then ashamed to go to high school.

As stated above, there are thirty-two of these schools weighing heavily on the educational status of Pitt county. We must remember that we rank thirty-third among the counties in a state that ranks forty-second, and that other states of the nation are refusing to stand still while we measure race with the national progress in education. Pitt county's task educationally is stupendous.

We must not hand down to Pitt county's children a load of stale dollars. Good tenants are rightly refusing to settle where the small schools exist. They want their children to be in a school where good habits are formed and where high principles are instilled. The tenants who are willing to live close to the school whose sixth grade reads like a third grade child of a standard school, are the careless kind, the type that cares only for a scant livelihood. It is he that will let your land go idle, your buildings go to rack, your fences fall down, and your vegetables go to waste.

Up to 1900 our state was largely in the hands of outsiders. We were somewhat as Mexico is today. We stood under the financial lash of capitalist who exploited the resources of our state. Education began however, to permeate within our state and now we no longer depend upon northern capitalists for the development of our industries and since 1900 the annual value of our manufactured products has increased from \$40,000,000 per year to more than a billion. If we sit idle, however, while other states are improving so rapidly the status of 1900 will be sure to return.

The county is wasting money each day that it spends it on the small inefficient schools. A new educational era is needed. Our schools are failing to give to the boys and girls good training in study and lofty ideas toward life. Our schools are weak and feeble. The entire county is loaded with a heavy and weighty educational burden. Fountain, Arthur, Williams, Cannon Swamp,

Fall-Doheny Bribery Indictments Held to Be Valid Today

Washington, Dec. 7.—(AP.)—The Fall-Doheny bribery indictments which were quashed several months ago in the lower court here, were held to be valid today by the District of Columbia Court of Appeals. A plea in abatement filed by former Secretary Albert R. Fall, Edward L. Doheny and his son, Edward L. Doheny, Jr., which the lower court granted, was over-ruled by Chief Justice Martin on motion of the government special counsel. Two indictments were covered by the court's decision, one charging Fall with receiving a bribe of \$100,000 to influence his official action respecting certain oil leases and the other charging the Doheny with giving the bribe. The appellate court held that the act of Congress taking the prosecution of the oil cases out of the hands of the Department of Justice meant only to deprive the Attorney General of control of the mitigation and would not interfere with the right of the special counsel to make use of the assistance of District Attorneys. The defense had argued that the presence in the grand jury room of a special assistance to the Attorney General violated the sanctity of the proceedings, and nullified the indictment, and this view had been accepted in the lower court. Counsel for the defendants had not decided today on their future course, but it was regarded as certain that the case would be carried to the highest courts.

Urges Senators Favor Repeal Auto Excise Taxes in Revenue Bill

Greensboro, Dec. 7.—(AP.)—At the eve of the convening of Congress Coleman W. Roberts, vice-president of the Carolina Motor Club today

issued a statement calling on automobile owners to urge their respective senators and representative to favor repeal of the automotive excise taxes in the revenue bill.

Mr. Roberts pointed out in his statement that the house ways and means committee would recommend to Congress that the exercise tax be left out of the new revenue bill and that the tax on new cars be reduced from five to three percent. He added, however, that the fight now would be on the floor of Congress and direct a plea to the Congressmen was necessary to have them support repeal of the tax.

"This is a matter that vitally concerns every motor vehicle owner, whether he be a passenger car, truck, or bus owner," asserted Mr. Roberts. "It appears that the majority sentiment in the committee favors the application of \$200,000,000 of the available surplus to the reduction of income and inheritance taxes. This would benefit only four million taxpayers while 17,500,000 motorists would benefit if the excise tax is lifted. Manufacturers say an average reduction of \$29 per car will accrue if the tax is repealed. Intensive personal contact with members of the house by their constituents is imperative if the levy is to be repealed."

3 Southern States Aid Neighbors Made Homeless by Storm

New Orleans, Dec. 5.—(AP.)—Residents of three southern states, Mississippi, Kentucky, and Arkansas, today were lending aid to neighbors made homeless yesterday by wind storms and tornadoes which exacted a toll of six lives, injured more than a score of persons, and caused property damage conservatively estimated at more than \$500,000. Loss of lives and property was heavier in Mississippi than in the other states.
