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BELIEVES BUSINESS SITUATION WARRANTS OPTIMISM FOR FUTURE

Mellon Foresees Early Accomplishment of Complete World-Wide Economic Stabilization

Washington, Dec. 11.—(AP)—Early accomplishment of a complete world-wide economic stabilization is foreseen by Secretary Mellon.

Both at home and abroad, the Secretary declared in the annual report submitted to Congress today, developments of the last year have been so satisfactory that "the way is now clear for a more complete world recovery." Mr. Mellon believed the underlying factors of the business situation here were fundamentally sound and "warrant optimism for future."

Reviewing the events which had influenced conditions for the better, he mentioned, with respect to the United States, restoration of confidence, tax reduction and reform, removal of various factors of uncertainty and instability, steady employment in farm and factory, and employment generally augmented purchasing power.

Across the seas, he saw the improvement reflected by 11 foreign debt settlements here and a number of interrelated funding arrangements, the return of a dozen nations to the gold standard, revival of industrial activity with its consequent employment, the reorganization of the currency systems of nearly all of the smaller powers, and the promised benefits of the Locarno agreement. "All of these," he said, "lend support to the optimistic view regarding the economic rehabilitation of Europe."

Mr. Mellon suggested that the revision of Congress was feeding new stimulus to business, but he entered a complaint against exemptions proposed by the House Ways and Means Committee. These narrowed the foundation of the taxing system, he thought, declaring it should be broader if the program were to be successful in times of depression as well as in days of prosperity.

While the Secretary saw no approaching cloud on the economic sky, he warned against expansion and speculative tendencies. The program of public economy has had its effect, he said, but "there is some tendency for the consuming public to buy every conceivable commodity 'on time' and mortgage future earnings." On the other hand, he found business men conducting their affairs with restraint and caution in order that the prosperity may not bring on carelessness.

"It is hoped, furthermore," he added, "that the speculative tendency in real estate in some communities may not proceed to the point of undermining the spirit of caution in business."

Although Mr. Mellon was convinced that the promised tax reduction had added impetus to business plans, he counseled against too great a cut, declaring that some of the reductions advocated were dangerous and would involve the Treasury in new borrowings. He asserted that it was unsound for any nation not to reduce its outstanding obligations as rapidly as possible, and he regarded the good effects of the Treasury's program in this respect as having been fully demonstrated.

"The country is prosperous now and well able to liquidate its debt at a reasonable rate," he continued. "That will gradually reduce the tremendous interest charges. The perpetuation of a large public debt has never proved to be a sound policy. On the contrary it has often been a great handicap in an emergency."

Mr. Mellon reviewed the department's work in enforcement of prohibition and expressed the belief that progress had been made in reducing the supply of illicit liquor through the reorganization directed by Assistant Secretary Andrews. He suggested that expansion of the Coast Guard was necessary if it were to continue efficient work in its dual capacity as a conservator of life and property and a guard against rum smuggling, and reiterated that the department's policy was to attack sources of supply rather than to attempt local police work.

With reference to funding of the foreign debts, Mr. Mellon reported "satisfying progress" and pointed to the 11 arrangements under which \$7,434,504,000 will be paid back to the United States. That leaves \$4,699,365,000 on which no action has

ROBBERS HOLD UP BANK OF EFLAND ESCAPE WITH 2,500

Cashier, Robert Riley, Forced Into Vault At Point of Three Pistols

Efland, N. C., Dec. 11.—(AP)—Three robbers held up the Bank of Efland here about ten o'clock this morning, forced the cashier, Robert Riley, into the vault and escaped with \$2,500.

Riley was the only person in the bank when the men entered. Each man leveled a pistol at him and he was ordered into the vault, which was then locked. It was more than a half hour after they left before he was freed from the vault. He said the men drove up to the bank in a small closed car and described them as wearing long overcoats and caps. One of the men, he said, was a blonde, while the other two were dark of complexion. The eldest of the three was slightly stooped shouldered and appeared about 35 years of age, and the other two appeared to be about thirty. Parties who saw the closed car leave town said it proceeded in a westerly direction.

GOVERNMENT COULD NOT START. FILL RUN. THE HIGH CITY.

Murder is a hideous thing, but some things are worse, and the Macri jury will have public approval.

The President says the nation is "more in danger of being retarded by mistaken government activity than it is from lack of legislation."

Generally speaking, that's so, especially with some modern kinds of government. Nevertheless, while selfish private initiative is useful, intelligent government initiative COULD be a thousand times more useful.

Private initiative could not have built the Panama Canal, or established the national postoffice, which sends a letter from Florida to Alaska for two cents. It could not without legislation and government help have established railroads across the continent.

Government "fussing" is not desirable, especially when it is done by order of Wall Street's "big butter and egg men," but it is wholly desirable when it is based on real intelligence and independence of the plutocracy, so powerful an agency in the United States just now.

Uncle Sam, it seems, is to be "eased" into the world court because some of our statesmen are afraid of what dear old ladies may think if we stay out. As he goes in, sideways, looking behind him, Uncle Sam will say: "If you start anything I'll run." That is what you might call a dignified entrance into the European muddle.

George Washington, with fewer than 4,000,000 Americans behind him, thought that he and the United States could stand on their own feet without help from Europe.

Today's brand of statesmen backed by 115,000 Americans and about all the money there is in the world, think this country CAN'T take care of itself. The trouble is with them, not with the country.

America's biggest city, New York, does things on a big scale. So do dozens of other American cities, from Seattle to Miami and from San Diego to Portland, Maine.

Our European friends read with amazement that a young American, Arthur S. Williams, boss of the electric light industry, sells in New York City more electricity than is used by twelve European countries with a combined population of 100,000,000.

The twelve countries that use less electricity than New York City alone are: Greece, Denmark, Latvia, Yugoslavia, Poland, Hungary, Norway, Rumania, Turkey, Switzerland, Sweden and the Netherlands. New York uses 5,000,000,000 kilowatt hours per year.

High fashion decrees that ladies from now on must get stockings that match their complexions.

There will be no trouble about that. Modern fashion makes it easy for a lady to change her complexion to match her stockings if she can't find exactly the silk stockings she wants.

We are able at making laws in this country—Not so good obeying laws when the laws don't suit us.

53 BODIES TAKEN FROM THE OVERTON MINE DURING TODAY

Rescue Workers Make Final Effort to Remove Three Remaining Bodies

Birmingham, Ala., Dec. 11.—(AP)—With a death list of 53 definitely determined rescue workers today were making final efforts to remove three bodies remaining in Overton Mine number two which was badly wrecked by an explosion of gas yesterday morning. The bodies are those of two white men and one negro. Of those already recovered 43 were negroes and seven white men.

Birmingham, Ala., Dec. 11.—(AP)—48 bodies had been recovered today from Overton Mine number two near here which yesterday was rocked by an explosion of gas that trapped and brought to death more than half of the workers in the pit. All hope had been abandoned that the remainder of the men would be found alive. Rescue crews worked patiently through the night but progress was retarded by advance conditions in the mine. Fire, gas and debris met the workers at every turn. The fire was not of a dangerous character, however, and the gaseous conditions cleared up toward daybreak. It was expected that the last body would be recovered before midnight. Mine officials believe that the death list will not be over 53.

Worried watchers kept vigil about the pit's mouth throughout the night of sorrow for the little mining community. The color line was obliterated, white and negro were united in a common grief and each tried to assuage the other's loss. Rain began falling at daybreak, but women hoping against hope of finding their loved ones alive, never budged from behind the guard line. As the morning sun rose on the sun came pouring through the clouds, but it brought no ray of hope to the silent throng of watchers. The stretcher bearers told the sad story as they emerged now and then.

COLLEGE OF BISHOPS FOREIGN INTEREST M. E. CHURCH SOUTH GETS CONTROL AIR HOLDS FALL MEET OPERATIONS IN S. A.

Paramount Question is the Official Canvas of Vote on Unification

Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 11.—(AP)—The College of Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church South convened here today for its fall meeting, which probably will last for two days. The paramount question before the Bishops is the official canvas of the vote on unification with the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Only one member of the college Bishop A. Boaz, in charge of the Methodist interest in the Orient, was detained from attending. In addition to the canvas of the unification vote, matters pertaining to the general conference of the Church next May were to be considered.

To Erect New Mill Kannapolis House 50,000 Spindles

Conrad, N. C., Dec. 11.—(AP)—Officers announced today that the Cannon Manufacturing Company will erect a new mill at Kannapolis that will house 50,000 spindles. Cost and plans were made public, but a conservative estimate placed the cost at \$2,000,000. The mill will employ 1,000 persons.

It is understood also that plans are before the Company for an electric power plant for the entire group of mills at Kannapolis.

Plans Announced Creation \$275,000 Hotel H. Springs

Hot Springs, Ark., Dec. 11.—(INS)—Definite plans for the erection of a modern six story hotel here, to cost more than \$275,000, were announced by J. Will Howe, general manager of the Rockefeller Hotel, of this city. Construction will begin immediately after January 1.

Beirut, Syria, Dec. 11.—(A. P.)—News came today that bandits had been repelled in two invasions of Damascus. A force of 200, after entering the city yesterday, was driven out by policemen by machine guns and artillery. Seven bandits were killed. Later in the day another party of ten men entered the city, but was speedily put to route.

Rev. A. J. G. Banks Returns New York

The Rev. A. J. Gayner Banks, who has been the guest of Judge and Mrs. W. A. Darden for several days, returned to New York this morning. Dr. Banks was driven to Rocky Mount by Miss Hennie Long and party, and expressed his warm appreciation of his reception in Greenville. The Healing Mission which closed last evening was a success in every sense, and Dr. Banks has promised a return visit next year.

Action Completed Resolut'n Continue Pres. Postal Rates

Washington, Dec. 11.—(AP)—Congressional action was completed today on a resolution to authorize continuance of existing postal rates until the next session of Congress convenes in December.

Abd El Krim Is In Camp Fifteen Miles From Adjir

El Arish, Spanish Morocco, Dec. 11.—(AP)—Abd El Krim, Rifian Chief, is in camp about 15 miles from Adjir, his former capital, which he abandoned before the advance of Spanish forces. Meanwhile political negotiations designed to bring about the surrender and subsequent disarmament of all tribesmen, are being made by both the French and Spanish authorities and it is said with some success.



Farmers Being Taught Importance Small Woodland

Raleigh, Dec. 11.—(AP)—“We are working as rapidly as possible to bring our farmers to realize the importance of their small areas of woodland,” said Commissioner of Agriculture William A. Graham today. Each farmer has comparatively little, but the aggregate is a vast amount.

“We feel that each acre in forest at this time should produce at least \$10 in timber and fuel each year, and the entire holdings in farm forests amount to around 10,000,000 acres. So, farm forestry in North Carolina bears a very important relation to its economic development.”

“I have been in conference with H. H. Curran, forester,” said Mr. Graham, relative to co-operative work with State College in starting demonstration work on some of the test farms.

Raleigh, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Indication of the widespread interest in co-operative marketing, as practiced by 280,000 cotton growers, says the United States Department of Agriculture, are the requests being received by the department for the motion picture film, “Co-operative Marketing Cotton.”

Among the agencies that have been authorized to purchase copies of this film since its release in January of this year, says the Department, are the Indian Central Cotton Committee, Bombay, India, and the Department of Agriculture and Stock, Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. It has been exhibited privately to numerous representatives of foreign governments, bankers interested in financing co-operative enterprises, and others with varied interests in the co-operative movement.

In 12 cotton growing states borrowed copies have been shown by co-operative associations, colleges, county agricultural agents, and other agencies. Five of the state-wide cotton marketing associations have purchased one or more prints for extensive use in their field service work.

The organization and operation since 1920 of 15 state-wide or regional cotton marketing associations in 13 states, says the Department, is recognized as one of the outstanding achievements in the co-operative marketing movement in the United States.

No Mail Deliveries Will Be Made On Christmas Day

Widespread approval has greeted the recent announcement of the Postmaster General that there will be no mail deliveries on Christmas Day.

Almost without exception the American public has agreed with the inherent justice of the ruling which gives to the army of postal employees some of the holiday privileges enjoyed by others, but so long deferred them.

Of course the ruling applies only to the coming Christmas being in the nature of an experiment, the success or failure of which will determine the procedure next year.

The Postmaster General was enabled to take the course he did as a result of the success of early mailing campaigns conducted in past years through the press and the “movies” and over the radio, which had the effect of moving the peak of holiday mailing back far enough to justify the experiment.

Officials of the Department who are watching the experiment closely have the utmost confidence that it will go through without hitch and that Christmas Day of the future will be a day of rest for the postman and the postal clerk.

To accomplish this purpose and it is believed a laudable one—the American public must mail holiday tokens and greetings in time for delivery at least before the close of business, December 24.

If there is any appreciable mail left over for delivery on December 26, it will militate against the chances of postal workers for a similar holiday in 1926.

Moonshiner's Mash Proves Deadly Fish Seneca River

Anderson, S. C., Dec. 11.—(INS)—Men may drink the liquor brewed by South Carolina moonshiners, but the mash from which it is made proved deadly to fish in the Seneca river near here recently. Sheriff Clump and his deputies raided a moonshiner's layout, found 500 gallons of working mash, and dumped it into the river. Almost immediately large numbers of fish rose dead, to float on the surface of the river, the officers declared. The addition of lye to the mash, too “cook” it, a common practice among whiskey makers, is believed to have killed the fish.

San Jose Scale On Fruit Trees Being Given Attention

Raleigh, Dec. 11.—(AP)—The State Department of Agriculture has been giving considerable attention the control of the San Jose scale on fruit trees, and is encouraging the use of combative methods. It has been announced at the Department. The work is being carried on through the division of entomology.

“The application of a spray to control the San Jose scale on fruit trees must be made while in the dormant stage,” said J. A. Harris, of the division of entomology, who has been giving the subject definite study. “A strong spray is required to kill the insect, and if applied while the tree is in the growing stage, the twigs and buds may be severely damaged.”

“The dormant application may be made anytime during the winter, but it should be finished by March 1. Every part of the tree should be well covered with the material, because good coverage is necessary for thorough control of the scale.”

“Either of two materials may be used satisfactorily to control San Jose scale. A concentrated lime sulphur spray or an oil spray will give good control. Experiments conducted during the past few years show that the oil sprays will give about a 10 percent higher kill of the scale than the sulphur sprays. There is one advantage in using the sulphur spray in that sulphur sprays will control such diseases as leaf curl or peach trees and, generally speaking, the oil sprays have no value in disease control.”

“If an orchard is heavily infested with scale, it would seem advisable to use an oil spray for at least one year. Oil sprays may be made at home or bought from commercial insecticide dealers. More satisfactory results will, in all probability, be secured by using a soluble oil prepared by the manufacturers rather than a home-made oil emulsion. Directions for making the oil have been prepared by the Department of Agriculture.”

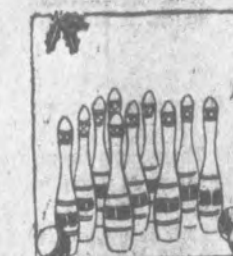

Alabama Mine Disaster Recalls One Glenn Coal

Charlotte, Dec. 11.—(AP)—The Birmingham Alabama mine disaster which is reported to have caused the death of 61 miners, recalls the mine disaster at Coal Glenn, N. C., on May 27th this year, which claimed a toll of 53 lives.

The explosion in the mine of the Carolina Coal Company at Coal Glenn resulted from circumstances similar to those reported at Birmingham, was having been held responsible. Similar, the mine had only one opening. However, not any of those caught in the Coal Glenn disaster escaped from the mine, while nearly 30 of those caught in the Birmingham mine yesterday escaped with slight injuries.

One negro miner owes his escape to his mule. From somewhere in the pit when the gas was worse and conditions appeared darkest for the entombed men, through the slope opening came the ears and then the balance of a big fat mule. Clinging to the mule's tail was a negro, who had been blinded temporarily by the blast and took this means of saving himself. He said he knew the mule would "get out of there if there was any getting out."

With the work of rescue practically completed, the sorrowing community turned its thoughts to burial of its dead and help it might give the bereaved. A long row of coffins rested at the mouth of the pit to receive the bodies. Of the 53 men killed outright, only three were not married and most of them were parents of large families. Among the victims was Rev. A. C. Collins, pastor of the negro Baptist church.

PEPPERMINT PROFITABLE CROP FOR THIS STATE

Chapel Hill, Dec. 11.—Peppermint of one variety or other can be grown successfully in any section of North Carolina with monetary profits that will compare favorably with other crops, according to G. A. Russell, chief of the Research Department of the Vlek Chemical Company of Greensboro, who addressed the University branch of the American Pharmaceutical Association on the production of all of peppermint.

Dr. Russell referred to the peppermint planting in this state near Elizabethtown which is said to be producing a large volume of oil per acre of a very good quality.

"We may look for expansion of the acreage in this section of the state when the value of the crop is fully demonstrated," he said.

The speaker said that "the planting of peppermint is not difficult, and requires only the usual attention of such crops as corn, potatoes, and so forth. The methods of planting

Stone Mount. City and Studio to Be Connected Bus Line

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 11.—(INS)—A motor bus line is to be established between the city of Stone Mountain and the studio at the base of the cliff being carved for the Confederate Memorial, it was announced by Preston S. Arkwright, president of the Georgia Railway and Power Company.

The motor buses are to be placed in operation by the power company as soon as the city of Stone Mountain gives its permission for such service. A 10 cent fare will be charged, and regular schedules maintained.

This plan was decided upon, the president stated, when it was brought to the attention of the power company that visitors going by electric car must depend upon privately owned cars to carry them to the mountain proper, the owners of which were charging relatively high fares.

State Department Aids Marketing 2,413 Head Cattle

Raleigh, Dec. 11.—(AP)—Since January 1, this year, the State Department of Agriculture, through its division of markets, has aided in the marketing of 2,413 head of cattle, which brought the total sum of \$106,654.50, and comprised 76 carlots, it was stated at the Department today.

These cattle were marketed as follows: shipped to state butchers, 17 carlots, \$18,742.51; bought for North Carolina farmers, 13 carlots \$16,937.99; sold to North Carolina feeders, 15 carlots, \$19,549.44; feeders sold to other states, 31 carlots, \$51,424.56.

The first work undertaken was in marketing of cattle placed on feed during the fall of 1924 through the division of markets, and which was ready for the markets in the spring of 1925. The division assisting in shipping 29 carlots of these cattle, 465 head, bringing \$58,877.

Next, the division assisted in handling co-operative shipments of sheep and lambs, three cars being at satisfactory prices, considerably. It is said, above the prices of local buyers.

During May and June co-operative livestock shipping associations were organized in Maywood, Buncombe, Jackson, and Madison counties. Over 1,000 cattle were shipped from Marshall by the association in Madison county, at prices varying from 50 cents to \$1. per hundred weight over the prices at central markets.

The division, it is stated, has served the people in getting markets for their stock in the following counties: Madison, Yancey, Buncombe, Maywood, Jackson, Swain and Transylvania.

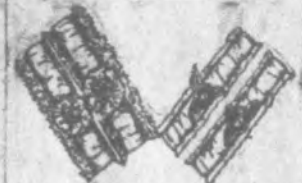

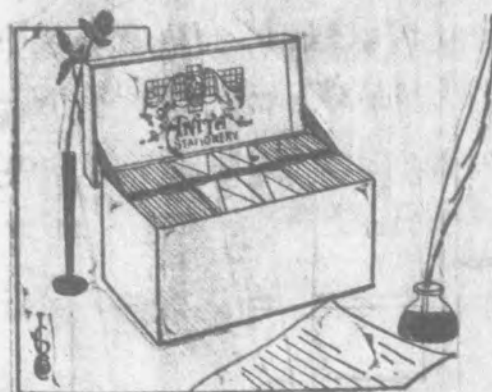

St. Paul, Dec. 11.—(INS)—Fur ranching is a new industry in the Northwest.

Stirred by reports of success of silver fox farms and with the supply of wild fur-bearing animals dwindling, trappers and others with an eye to business are planning fur ranches of varying nature. The State provides they must operate under regulations with regard to equipment and care of animals. Such ordinarily dependable fur bearers as the raccoon and muskrat are almost extinct in the Northwest. J. F. McGill, State Game and Fish Commissioner, declares. The season is now closed to everything except the skunk and fisher.

CHAMBERLAIN GETS ORDER OF MERIT FOR EFFORT AT LOCARNO

London, Dec. 11.—(INS)—In recognition of his work at Locarno, Austen Chamberlain, the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, will receive some mark of appreciation from the King, according to information in official circles.

It is understood that Chamberlain is adverse to receiving any titular degree, being content to remain "Mr. Chamberlain," and that in view of this desire he will receive the Order of Merit, which carries neither title nor rank.

HONEST DRIVER FINES SELF FOR VIOLATION OF TRAFFIC STATUTE

Akron, Ohio, Dec. 11.—(INS)—Akron has one dyed-in-the-wool honest motorist. The police pension fund is \$5 richer today because of that fact.

Charles Esselbain drove past a safety stop in a moment of abstraction. When he realized what had happened, he arraigned himself before himself, pleaded guilty to a charge of violating a traffic ordinance and fined himself \$5.

The next mail brought a \$5 check and a letter to Frank Boss, secretary of the Police Pension fund. Both bore Esselbain's signature.

CANCER SHOWS GROWTH AMONG BRITISH MALES

London, Dec. 11.—(INS)—Male mortality from cancer is increasing in England, according to statistics issued by the Registrar General's department.

The standardized rate of mortality for men from cancer is now about equal to that of women, according to the statistics, which say that the figures per 100,000 are 97 and 98 respectively. Before 1914 the cancer mortality rate among men in England was 91 per hundred thousand. The statistics reveal that more men die of cancer in the large towns than in the rural areas.

WOMEN OF PLYMOUTH WANT WOMEN POLICE IN WAR ON CRIME WAVE

Plymouth, Eng. Dec. 11.—(INS)—Indignant at recent comments on the excessive immorality in Plymouth and at the fact that the authorities have refused to appoint women police to patrol the town, 2,000 women inhabitants propose to organize a march to deliver an ultimatum to the municipal authorities.

Recently Plymouth has been the scene of many assaults upon women and young children, and the demand for greater police protection is being supported by religious bodies and social organizations.

The increase in immorality is attributed to the serious overcrowding in the local tenements—which are a blot on the town—and the lax control by parents.

Nashville Women Sell 2,000 Stone Mt. Coins One Day

Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 11.—(INS)—With 2,000 Stone Mountain Memorial coins sold by Nashville women volunteers in a single day, indications are that Nashville will be the first city in the state to go "over the top" in the state's campaign to sell 200,000 coins.

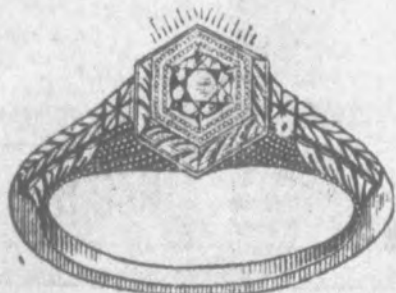

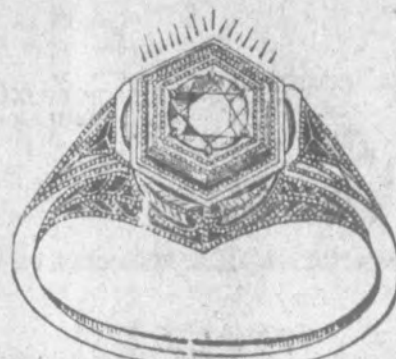

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Paris, Dec. 11.—(L. N. S.) If Shakespeare could come to Paris again he would see that there really seems to be something in a name, after all, especially when it has to do with the women taxi-cab drivers. "Cheminette," the feminine of chauffeur, does not meet with their approval. It is ugly, the women say, and is already used to designate a low chair put near the fire and at the same time, it is a slang term for the ladies who are not so very particular about their morals.

"Mecanette" has been suggested and strongly criticized since it comes from the masculine "mecano" which is disliked by all the men drivers.

"Cheminette" really has the right meaning in the root of the word, "chemin" signifying road, but it is also the feminine for a chimney-sweep in this country. "Autovatrice," "antoreine," "autoductrice" are all a bit too long for convenience. In the mean time, the Parisienne drives along the boulevards under any name one wishes to give her.

However, changing its name from the "Mount of Pity" to the "Credit Municipal" has made the business of Paris' "Circus de la Rue" jump by leaps and bounds. Recent statistics show that the annual turnover is now three

millions of francs, ten times as much as it was five years ago. French people who, a short time ago, disliked being seen around the front doorsteps of the great national pawnshop, now enter it as they would a great bank. And, as a matter of fact, this is what the institution amounts to on this side of the water. "Tante Marie," Aunt Mary, as she is called by the French, will advance a little money on everything you happen to have, from a flat-iron up to a piano. Of course she prefers bigger game and she does get them too. Lately she has had to build many new sheds for motor cars, pledged at the beginning of winter very likely to avoid garage charges.

It costs to have bobbed hair in the Tyrol mountains. And this means not only the cost of the upkeep which is by no means negligible, what with higher coiffeur's prices for waving and trimming. But now, ladies with short hair will pay higher prices than their long-haired sisters for places in theatres and cinemas. A certain society, especially organized to look after the customs and morals of the young women of the Tyrol, have succeeded in bringing about a special tax for all women cut "a la Ninon" and the city treasury is none the emptier for the measure.

The Paris "poubelle," in other words, the old garbage can, will have to go if the proposal of a French engineer for more sanitary disposal of rubbish and garbage is accepted by the city authorities. The use of the "poubelle" by every Parisian householder was made obligatory by Eugene Rene Poubelle while he was Prefect of the Seine Department and the can was named after him.

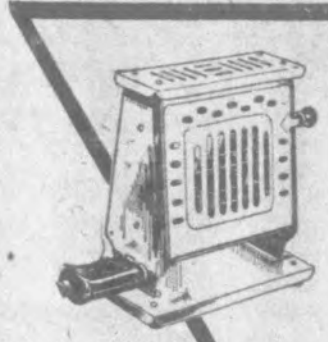

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A REMARKABLE MAN.

The story of the Rev. Dr. Russell H. Conwell, dead in Philadelphia at the age of 82, is one of the most remarkable in the history of the race. It is of a man who earned millions of dollars on the lecture platform and devoted the money to helping others as fast as he earned it.

In addition to his work as a lecturer, he built up a great congregation in Philadelphia as a Baptist clergyman, founded Temple University, two hospitals and helped thousands of worthy youth to an education. His experience was of the broadest. He had lived the life of a soldier, serving as an officer in the Civil War, had practiced law, served as a newspaper man and immigration agent, and had traveled throughout the world. It has been estimated that he earned more than \$1,000,000. He had delivered his lecture, "Acres of Diamonds," 6,152 times. One of the names given him was "the penniless millionaire." As he was constantly giving away his earnings, it is assumed that at his death he was almost penniless, but the wealth of the regard in which he is held by his fellow men is beyond estimate.

The career of Russell H. Conwell is one of those records in which the race must ever take pride.

PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL.

To "Red" Grange, genius of the public is indebted for two things: He has given a new thrill to hundreds of thousands of old football fans in addition to making thousands of new fans for the sport. And, by becoming a "pro" on the very day his college football career ended, he extracted from college football the admission that its monopoly of the sport is being seriously challenged by the professional branch of the game.

Grange's decision to enter professional football in the same season he closed his spectacular career as an "amateur" did not place the brand of "professionalism" upon collegiate football, nor did the fear of such a charge actuate those who censured the Illinois star for his act. Collegiate football knew the "iceman's" possibilities for swelling the gate receipts and was not blind to the fact that his acquisition by the professional department of the sport would give great impetus to the increasing popularity of the latter.

That these predictions and misgivings were correct was verified by the instantaneous success of Grange's "pro" eleven. Grange had filled college stadiums, but as a professional player he has filled larger sta-

diums at higher admission prices.

The 1925 football season has established professional football as a popular sport and there seems no reason to doubt every succeeding year will give it a higher position in the estimation of the sport world. But does this hold any threat to collegiate football? Evidently not. College football has kept pace, if not a little ahead of the professional game up to this time and in the future will probably be of mutual benefit. One vital phase of National Capital affairs—indeed, it would be quite proper to say national or even international affairs—seldom gets mentioned in the press dispatches. Yet femininity everywhere would read of the social life of Washington with deep interest. Perhaps the great news distributing agencies do not realize what they are missing in failing to tell of the luncheons and teas and dinners and parties almost nightly in this city with people of world fame as participants.

Last week, an average of four dinners a night marked the social undertakings of diplomats here as representatives of foreign governments. And in addition there were smaller gatherings of equally prominent folk almost without number, for Washington is probably the second city in the universe in the frequency and genuine interest of its social entertainments. The filled names on the guest lists of many of these functions would make an old world society novel seem a modest thing, indeed. And, of course, there is more than society's concerns in a large share of Washington's dinners. National and world politics underlie the pleasant and colorful activities to a marked degree. Kingdoms may not be made and unmade about the formal dinner table here, but some undertakings of such import are "by-products" whose influences extend around the earth.

Maybe the Civil Service Commission had best look into this, or perhaps the Bureau of Efficiency could take jurisdiction in the matter of finding out if Federal officialdom is really so careful weighed in the balance of "the hired help" as was suggested in a happening in the home of a Michigan Congressman a few days ago.

The regular "help" being indisposed, a black friend of the invalid came in to temporary serve the household. The day following her arrival, the substitute servant appeared before the Congressman's wife and coyly suggested drawing pay for the week.

"But you've worked only two days," gasped the lady of the house. "I always supposed a week's wage was due at the end of the week."

"Praps dat's so," agreed the denizen of the kitchen. "But sense I kum to dis yere town, I foun' out some folks don' allus pay when de week's up, so I gits my wages in advance, er I don't stay."

And a Michigan Congressman's wife has something different now to write to her friends back home.

One of the important happenings of the last Congress not given much publicity because it was disposed of in committee hearings had to do with the definite establishing of lines of the famous old "Oregon trail." The whole matter of outlining the actual route taken by the explorers who opened up the Northwest to settlement was considered, and in the many committee hearings much new light was shed on historic phases of the project.

An interesting sidelight was the development of the important part the Mormons of distant Utah had in this pioneering work. It was found that Brigham Young's people did much to keep open the long, long trail binding east and west, ere the first transcontinental railway was built. The committee has just published the report of its inquiry in a readable booklet entitled, "The Old Oregon Trail," of which Uncle Sam has printed a large issue.

"Young Bob" LaFollette is attracting at least a lion's share of attention from visitors to the Senate side of the Capitol. Just as his shaggy mop marked the elder LaFollette for notice by even the most casual caller on Capitol Hill, so the son's youth and good looks and developing popadoui win him many glances and much admiration—particularly from parties made up largely of members of the feminine sex. The new Wisconsin Senator is a busy young man already. It is expected that he will find even more to do as the session moves along.

While "Young Bob" is now the representative of the state of Wisconsin in its innumerable affairs at Washington, he really is a most confirmed National Capitalite, for nearly all of his life has been spent here. He attended the grade and high schools of Washington, and got much of his university training within the city.

Business crowds on the heels of of holiday circles here. Senator Capper acquired a handsome home on Sixteenth street some few years ago, having for a neighbor Rear-Admiral Tichenor whose wife was the daughter of James G. Blaine. These two families now find a real estate office next door to them. A shoe-shining establishment uses the basement of what a few years ago was the proud domicile of Rear-

Admiral Evans, known as "Fighting Bob." And the smith occupies the quaint little stone building in which George Washington made his quarters while surveying western Washington after the close of the Revolution.

HIGH SCHOOL BAND

I. C. C. DEMANDS FULL CONTROL IN CONSOLIDATIONS

Asks Broad Powers to Give Assent Or Deny Rail Unification in Interest of the Public

Washington, Dec. 11.—New light on the problem of consolidating the railroads into a limited number of systems was made known in the annual report of the Interstate Commerce Commission doubts the wisdom of the present law requiring the Federal body to adopt a complete plan to which all future consolidations must conform.

The report reveals for the first time that the Commission months ago addressed a communication to the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce stating the Commission believes that better results are likely to be accomplished with less loss of time if the process of consolidation is permitted to develop under guidance of the Commission, in a more normal way.

The Commission suggested a new amendment to the Interstate Commerce act making unlawful any consolidation or acquisition of the control of one railroad by another in any manner whatsoever, except with the specific approval and authorization of the Commission.

"The purpose of this provision," the Commission explained, "is to make certain that the process of consolidation will in all respect be subjected to the control and guidance of Federal authority. Without such a prohibition it will be claimed that such consolidations or acquisitions of control as are not in conflict with the Federal anti-trust laws may not be effected, as was done in the Nickel Plate case, under State authority and without Federal approval."

"Whatever the merits of the Nickel Plate consolidation, it must be obvious that the possibility of consolidations or acquisitions of control thus consummated means a division of authority which is likely to be destructive of any well-ordered and consistent control of the process of consolidation in the public interest."

The Nickel Plate consolidation is the plan of the Van Sweringen brothers, of Cleveland, O., to bring five large railroad systems into a single large railroad system and is known as the "Billion Dollar Nickel Plate merger." It is now before the Commission for approval and is the first big consolidation scheme presented for federal authorization since the enactment of the Transportation act of 1920.

The Commission also asked that it be given broad power to approve or disapprove such consolidations or acquisitions.

Will be in the interest of better service to the public, or economy in operation.

Will not unduly restrain competition or be in any other material respect inconsistent with the public interest.

Will conform to the provisions of paragraph 4, which prohibits a capitalization of the consolidated company in excess of property value.

The Commission also asked that it be specifically authorized to disapprove a consolidation or acquisition upon the ground that it does not include a railroad, or all or any part of its property, which ought to be included in the public interest and which it is possible to include upon reasonable terms.

"One of the criticisms of such consolidations or acquisitions as have been proposed or suggested has been that they do not take care of the weak lines, although the merger of weak with strong lines is one of the ends which Congress has apparently had in mind," the Commission said.

This specific provision, it was pointed out, will enable the Commission to require attention to be directed to this phase of the matter which otherwise might be neglected.

The Commission further asked that it be specifically authorized to make it a condition of any consolidation or acquisition that "existing routes and channels of trade and commerce shall be maintained." This provision was suggested to remove such doubts as have been raised with respect to its power to attach such a condition.

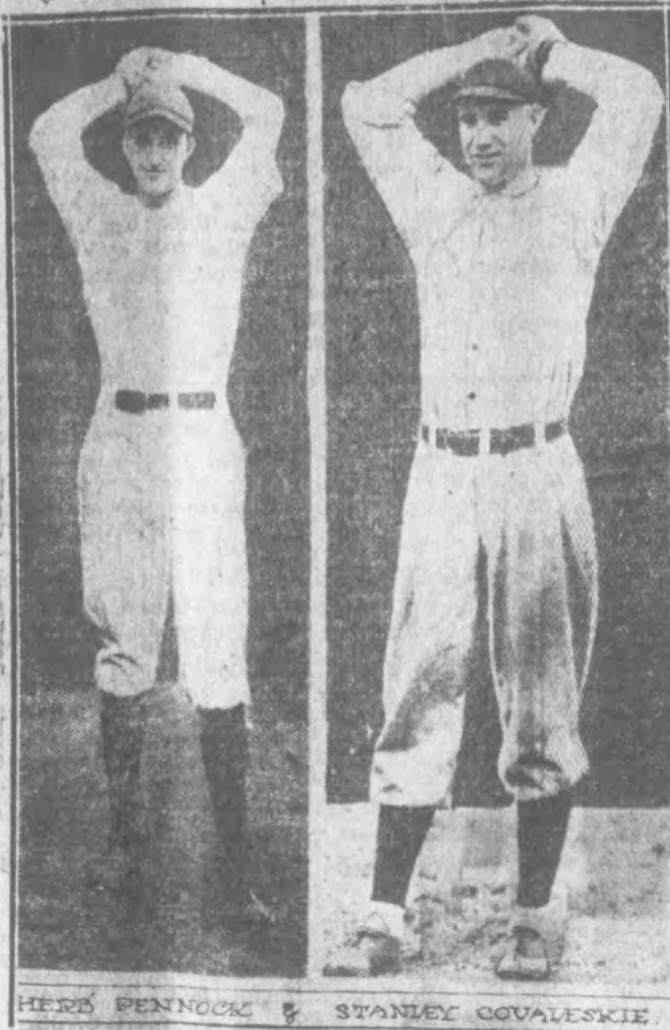

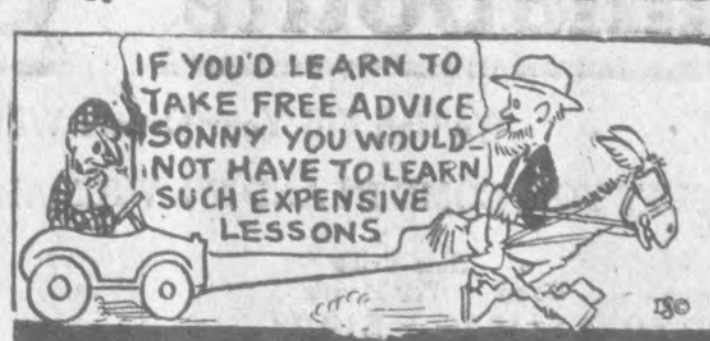

Construction Work Starts Ammiston's \$25,000 Industry

Anniston, Ala., Dec. 11.—(INS)—Construction work has been started on Ammiston's new \$25,000 industry, the M. & H. Valve Company. Ground has been broken for the first unit of the new plant, and the buildings, four in number, will cost approximately \$25,000. The buildings are to be completed by March 1. The largest of the four buildings will be 390

feet long by 100 feet wide, with all provisions made for additions. The corporation is headed by J. W. Conway, of Atlanta, and will employ around 250 men when operations are started. Pipe line valves will constitute the main output of the plant at the beginning. BONFIRE ON VESSEL
STARVING CREW'S SOS
Boston, Dec. 11.—(INS)—Life on

COLLEGES OF AUSTRIA IN BAD FINANCIAL SHAPE

Vienna, Dec. 11.—(INS)—The universities throughout Austria are in a bad financial plight, according to appeals for assistance, which have recently been issued.

The three biggest Austrian universities, those at Vienna, Graz, and Innsbruck, have recently issued appeals for money which show that they are completely hampered for lack of funds. The professors are only receiving half pay, while the equipment of the universities is entirely inadequate for up-to-date demands.

PRIMITIVE MIND STUDY IS SAVANT'S OBJECTIVE

Nairobi, Africa, Dec. 11.—(INS)—A six months' residence among the primitive Bagishu tribe of Mount Elgon is to be undertaken by Dr. C. J. Jung, of Zurich, and Dr. H. E. Baynes, of London in order to study the primitive mind.

They hope to discover evidence of common primitive mental phenomena among civilized and uncivilized man. They also intend to observe their reactions to constant contact with the natives, and, if their studies prove profitable, a larger expedition is contemplated.

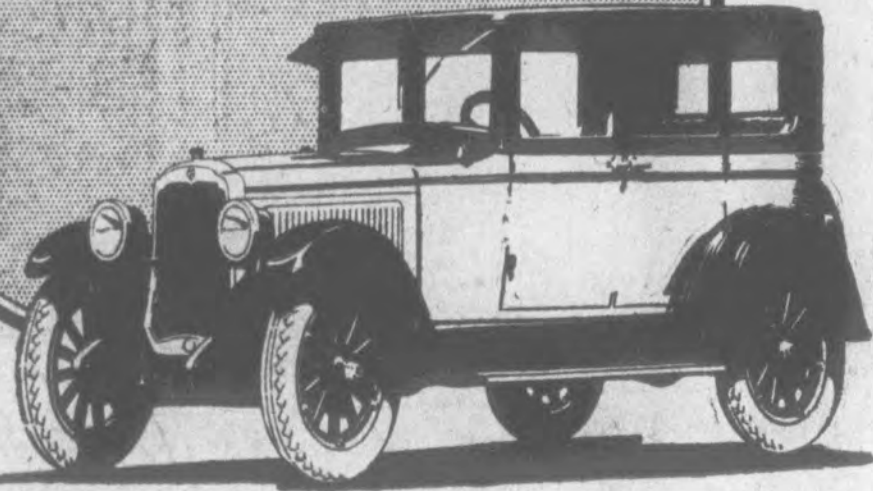
