MANSEL'S VICTIM PLEADS THAT HIS LIFE BE SPARED

**Plea Also Made That
Members of Mob Who
Stormed Buncombe
Co. Jail Be Paroled**

Raleigh, Dec. 12.—(AP.)—The plea of the Buncombe county white woman victim of the attack by Alvin Mansel, negro, that Mansel's life be spared and that those given sentences for participation in the storming of the Buncombe County jail be paroled, has been given no consideration by Governor McLean, he said today.

There has been no formal presentation of the case to the executive and he understands that appeals in these cases are pending in the Supreme Court. For this reason he has not given the matter consideration.

While the governor stated that when the case came up for a hearing in due order it would be given consideration "upon its merits," and he added that the "only consideration that would influence me to extend executive clemency would be evidence that would convince me that those in whose behalf clemency was asked had been improperly convicted."

The governor was strong in his praise of the court and county officers and the jury that convicted the members of the mob and expressed his gratification "that the outstanding evidence is that this state has determined to suppress the mob violence."

Mansel is sentenced to die in the electric chair here on January 13 for the attack on the woman who has written the governor and several members of the mob, which stormed the Buncombe County jail in an attempt to rescue Mansel shortly after the attack and drew long sentences in the penitentiary.

Near Tragedy Closes 2nd Performance "Song of the Flame"

Wilmington, Del., Dec. 12.—(AP.)—Near tragedy last night closed the second performance of the "Song of the Flame," a musical play produced by Arthur Hammerstein at the play house here last night when an iron girder buckled allowing the scenery to sag and shiver the stage and performers with brick, water and plaster, torn from the walls. The action occurred while the Russian Air Choir numbering 60 persons were on the stage. While many of the players were injured only 11 required medical care today. Miss Cherokee suffered a slight concussion of the brain when struck by falling debris, but was said to be in no danger today. Damage to the theatre and stage property at first estimated at \$60,000 probably will not reach that amount, it was said.

Twenty Americans Caught in Midst of Battle Last Night

Peking, China, Dec. 12.—(AP.)—Twenty Americans and several British passengers on the International train which left Peking for Tientsin yesterday were caught in the midst of a battle between the troops of Feng Yu Hsing and Chang Tso Lin, near Yangtzu last night.

The train also carried 50 Italian marines on their way to the coast after doing guard duty in the Capital. The passengers, including women and children, are reported to have lain between the tracks under the train to escape the Chinese shells. During the night the train was sent back to Langfang.

No Permit Granted Sell Florida Real Estate in Virginia

Richmond, Va., Dec. 11.—(AP.)—The Virginia Corporation Commission "has granted no permit to any person or corporation to sell Florida real estate in Virginia." It was declared in a statement issued at the Commission office here this afternoon.

**Council of League of
Nations Issues Invita-
tion for American Par-
ticipation**

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP.)—Should the invitation issued from the Council of the League of Nations today for American participation in the arms limitation discussion in Geneva be found acceptable by the administration, such a conclusion, it is expected, would go only so far as a recommendation to be passed upon finally by Congress.

President Coolidge meanwhile, is forming no definite opinion upon the question until he has had full opportunity to study the text of the invitation to the United States to join in the work of the special committee to prepare for the convocation of the International Arms Conference. What ever his decision, he feels strongly that any practicable undertaking in that direction can count upon the full sympathy from the United States with almost identical ones to Germany and Russia, was reported in Geneva dispatches to have been agreed upon in final text at a secret session of the council last night and made ready for dispatch today. None of the texts will be made public, it was said, until they have been received by the Governments to whom they were addressed.

This government in the next fiscal year will spend \$3,494,222,308. What becomes of the one hundred cents in each dollar of government expenditure?

TOBACCO MARKET SOLD OVER FORTY MILLION POUNDS

**Market to Close for the
Christmas Holidays on
Dec. 18; Largest Sea-
son in History**

The Greenville Tobacco Market will close on Friday, December 18, for the Christmas holidays and will re-open on Tuesday, Jan. 12th.

According to official figures the market during this week has sold 3,295,844 pounds for \$9,000,102.07, averaging \$27.31. During the season 40,114,244 pounds have been sold for \$10,687,631.05, averaging \$26.65.

The market this season, has sold more pounds than ever before in its history, and expects to go beyond this next season. Arrangements are being made for four sets of buyers and the warehousemen are preparing to increase the capacity of their houses. The drying plants will also be enlarged.

It is estimated that the market has lost at least 10,000,000 pounds on account of not having four sets of buyers.

POWER CONFERENCE HELD LAST NIGHT

**Representatives
of Eastern Carolina
Gather Here to Discuss
Electric Power**

A conference of great importance to Eastern North Carolina was held here last night. Among the towns represented was: Washington, New Bern, Goldsboro, Wilson, Tarboro, Farmville, Robesonville, Winterville and communications from several others.

Production of electric power was the subject of the conference. It had been suggested that consideration, by citizens, is being given to a suggestion that electric power producing plants and equipment, now owned by the several municipalities be offered for sale and franchises granted to, and electric power purchased of a power producing corporation and thus have the towns' continuous producing and selling electric current.

Another suggestion considered is that the several towns in Eastern Carolina so situated, geographically, as to make it economical, and which own and operate electric power plants, extend their transmission lines to connect with one another and thus make one circuit, and the several plants now operating, supply current to this circuit, and thus giving, approximately, 30,000 horse power supply of current for general use.

This latter suggestion of joint municipal ownership and operation found unanimous support of those in conference. It was brought out in conference that electric power is being produced by the present plants of the several towns at approximately, 3c per Kw., that light consumers are paying about 12c per Kw., that the power consumers are paying, on an operating scale, something more than one-half that paid by the light consumers. That the several plants have earned large sums and paid over to the General Fund, or Bond Fund of their respective towns. For instance Washington light plant has paid to the General Fund of the Town, recently, approximately, \$35,000. New Bern, approximately, \$50,000. Greenville has applied a considerable sum on bonded indebtedness and has a surplus, in cash, of approximately, \$27,000.00. All of these profits are in addition to expensive extensions of service equipment. Such circuit would make, immediately available to every small town within, or near this circuit the same efficient and high power service that the largest city in the circuit enjoys, and at approximately the same cost, that the cost of connecting the towns and forming the circuit would require an expense that would be relatively small.

UNIVERSITY VA. NOT BE GOVERNED RULES CHARLESTON MEET

**Engaged Live Under
Rules of Southern Con-
ference and Cannot Be
Controlled by Any
Other Body**

University Station, Virginia, Dec. 12.—(AP.)—Whatever the action of other southern conference members may be the University of Virginia will not be governed by the rules adopted at the Charleston meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary schools, is the opinion here following the announcement last night of Dr. George O. Ferguson, faculty representative on the executive board of the Southern Conference.

The University is engaged to live under the rules of the Southern Conference and cannot be controlled by the enactments of any other body. Dr. Ferguson said last night in announcing that the University of Virginia would not regulate its athletics by the recent rulings of the Southern Association of colleges and secondary schools.

The rule, which is causing the most concern, is that which prohibits an athlete from engaging in two consecutive sports until he has maintained an average of 85 per cent in his class work. The mark of 85 at Virginia represents a mark of unusual merit and those attaining this grade are placed upon what is called the "Dean's list." Relatively few athletes are able to attain it and the mark is above the average student.

Lenroot, Darrow Debate Entrance Into World Court

Princeton, N. J., Dec. 11.—(AP.)—Marked by the production last night of Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin, that the Senator would approve American entrance into the world court next February with a favorable vote of from seventy to seventy-five of the National Collegiate World Court Conference at Princeton University is continuing its deliberations today.

Representatives of 215 educational institutions seek to formulate a representative under graduate opinion on American entrance into the court. At the opening session the delegates heard Senator Lenroot and Clarence Darrow, Chicago attorney, debate the matter.

Stream of Ancient Toys Being Made Into New Ones

Orangeburg, S. C., Dec. 12.—(I. N. S.)—From houses rich, from houses poor, from dirt and dusty garrets a veritable stream of ancient toys is pouring into fire department headquarters here today.

Toy soldiers with broken legs and twisted arms, battered trains, bedraggled, headless dolls, and tricycles with bent and useless spokes have been salvaged from the Quasimodan treasure chests of distant childhood days and forwarded to Fire Chief Fischer, who expects to turn them into bright new toys to gladden the hearts of the underprivileged children of this city.

From now until a day or two before Christmas the firemen will be busy retouching this sad offering of playthings.

They will mend the broken legs of the little tin soldiers, straighten their tiny bayonets and enable them once again to parade before children's eyes in all the glory of their glistening new uniforms of paint.

Chief Fischer conceived the idea a few hours after announcing his plan, the toys began to arrive. After they have been repaired and painted they will afford pleasure to little folks who otherwise would spend a very dull and drab holiday.

Buzzard Shatters Aeroplane Propellor

Orangeburg, S. C., Dec. 12.—(I. N. S.)—An aeroplane passing over this city recently was forced to make a landing when the propellor was shattered by a buzzard. The machine inadvertently passed through a flock of these birds and one struck the wooden blade, completely demolishing it. The machine landed without further mishap and the damage was repaired at a local garage.

MITCHELL'S COURT MARTIAL EXPECTS CLOSE NEXT WEEK

**Remaining Evidence to
Be Offered in Early
Part of Week Under
Present Plans**

Washington, Dec. 12.—(AP.)—The Mitchell Court Martial concluded today what it confidently expected to be its last week of the air officer's trial.

All the remaining evidence is to be offered in the early part of next week under present plans and other requirements disposed of so the court can close its public sessions before the week-end.

The testimony of additional prosecution witnesses today touched on many points raised by Colonel Mitchell in the attack on aviation policies which lead to his court martial.

Mr. W. E. Proctor Injured When Car Overturns

Mr. W. E. Proctor, of Grimesland, received slight injuries, and a negro, who was with him, received serious injuries, when Mr. Proctor's car overturned on the Grimesland road late yesterday afternoon. The extent of the negro's injuries has not yet been ascertained. Mr. Proctor received only slight injuries and is getting along all right.

Persistent War to Be Waged San Jose Scale

A. & M. College, Miss., Dec. 12.—(INS.)—A persistent war is to be waged in Mississippi on the worst orchard pest of the south—San Jose scale, according to advance information from the state plant board.

During January, February and March, the most favorable time for spraying operations, an intensive program of education and aid for the orchard owners will be carried out. The plant board will recommend the use of lubricating oil emulsion in preference to other sprays, because of its low cost, effectiveness and harmless when brought into contact with the human skin.

In order that all fruit growers may have no difficulty in securing equipments and spray materials promptly, the plant board has prepared lists of dealers and manufacturers in this and surrounding states, which will be distributed during the campaign.

OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

New Testament Names for Christians.

(IV). "THE BROTHERS IN CHRIST JESUS."

Colossians 1:2 — "Brethren in Christ."

This name St. Paul uses constantly in his Epistles. He uses it of himself; loves to think of himself as one of the brethren in Jesus. He is an Apostle of the Lord, he has great and wonderful gifts; he has rendered signal service to the Church;—but all this does not lift him out of the ranks. He does not, because he is a great man and a useful man, demand for himself rights and privileges. He is not above any man nor beneath any man. He sits in unconscious dignity and makes tents beside Aquilla and Priscilla; and he talks with perfect ease and freedom to Agrippa and Bernice on their thrones.

St. Paul valued the principle of Brotherhood because a greater than he had come among men and had not been "ashamed to call them Brethren."

The Son of God, when He came into the world, was careful to come not only as the Son of God, but also as the Son of Man. And it was His manhood that was most in evidence during His earthly life. His Divinity was for the most part hidden; His humanity was ever in sight. In all things He was anxious to share the common lot of man. He was born, indeed, of royal blood; but that royal blood had flowed obscurely, and now ran in the veins of the carpenter of Nazareth.

Jesus came out of the great middle-class which has always given to the world its greatest men. He was at neither extreme of the social scale; neither a prince nor a beggar. He was a common working man. And when He became a Teacher, He did not affect the Rabbi's robe nor the Rabbi's titles. He went out in all the simplicity of His early life and was but a man teaching men. He walked to and fro in the earth. He was tired, He was sad, He was glad, He suffered and He died just as every brother man of His had walked and grown weary, been cold and hungry, had smiled and wept, had suffered and died since the world began.

Brotherhood had been known long before Christ came. The family was the unit of the earliest civilizations. What the Christian ideal did was to make the brotherly relation universal. It grasped the very simple fact that the common nature of man proves a com-

mon origin and carried the origin back to its ultimate source in God. It was the common Fatherhood of God that made the common Brotherhood of man.

It was time for this new conception of Brotherhood to enter the world. The brotherhood of the family had been lost in that of the tribe; the brotherhood of the tribe had been merged in that of the nation; and now nationalism itself had been lost in the universalism of the Roman Empire.

The Roman Empire was only the cover for the most intense and competitive individualism the world has ever seen. Individualism was everywhere rampant. The family relation was gone. The men of Rome mated like creatures of the air and field; a man would find his solace with a concubine like a beast, and divorce his wife with more than the facility of a bird. He did not know his own children. They were the offspring of obscure amours, often children of slave girls whom their father sold in the market.

Unless one has studied the subject he can have no conception of the utter dissolution of the family that came to pass immediately after the great Civil Wars of Marius and Sulla.

At the bottom of the social scale in the Roman Empire was the slave dependent upon his master for life, compelled to yield his body to dishonor and outrage, and to submit to every caprice. Next after him came the freedman, hardly better than the slave, the pimp of his patron, doing the meanest actions for the smallest reward. There was a crowd of debtors, living in daily dread of creditors, who might at will send them to imprisonment and slavery. The

cities were crowded with an idle rabble, which the ruin of husbandry had driven from the country, parasites eating out the heart of the commonwealth, crying for free bread and free shows. At the top of the social world were the Senator, the Knight, and the Publican, spending their days in fawning on Caesar, their nights in feverish debauch; fearing every hour that Caesar would rob them of wealth and life.

It was into such a world as this that the Kingdom of God came with its ideal of universal Brotherhood; and in the Christian Church of the 2nd, and 3rd, centuries the Roman world recovered its lost manhood.

In the Christian community there was law, order, self-respect. There was justice, piety, wholesome love.

Some poor slave beaten by his master would escape by night and go early in the morning to the Christian assembly. There he would be greeted by a clasp of the hand; he would hear from the lips perhaps of some patrician the word "Brother," and that word would thrill his soul. Then the Brethren would take him and wash his wounds and tell him not to be ashamed, for the Son of God had suffered like things.

Some poor slave girl would drag her outraged body to the Christian Church, and there hear how Jesus had been put to an open shame, and in the Church found the purity of which she had been robbed in the world.

Some matron, fleeing from Caesar's lust; some man of Consular rank from his degraded friendship; would find in the company of the Christian community the personal decency and dignity which the heart improved as the necessity of life. So the Brotherhood increased

and multiplied until it was the mightiest force in all the Roman Empire.

Apostles were sent to seek the lost and bring them into the fold. Bishops were appointed to watch these sheep and keep them in the fold. And the Christian Brotherhood will again grow strong and invincible, when all the ministers, clergy and leaders of the Church realize that they have only one right and one privilege. They have the right of service, and the privilege of sacrifice.

There are in the history of man's redemption only two permanent factors. Papacies, prelacies, patriarchates these all change and pass away. Church governments are but for a season and a time. Books have their days of power and their days of weakness. Rituals are subject to use and disuse.

Only two forces are permanent, working on from age to age to accomplish the task of bringing in the Kingdom of everlasting righteousness;—these two forces, ever working and ever the same, are God and the People of God:—"The Brethren in Christ."

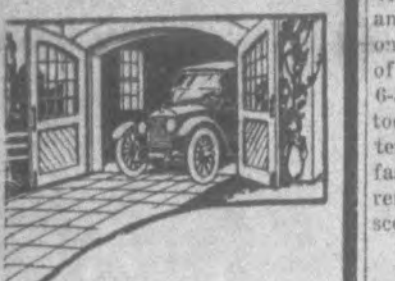

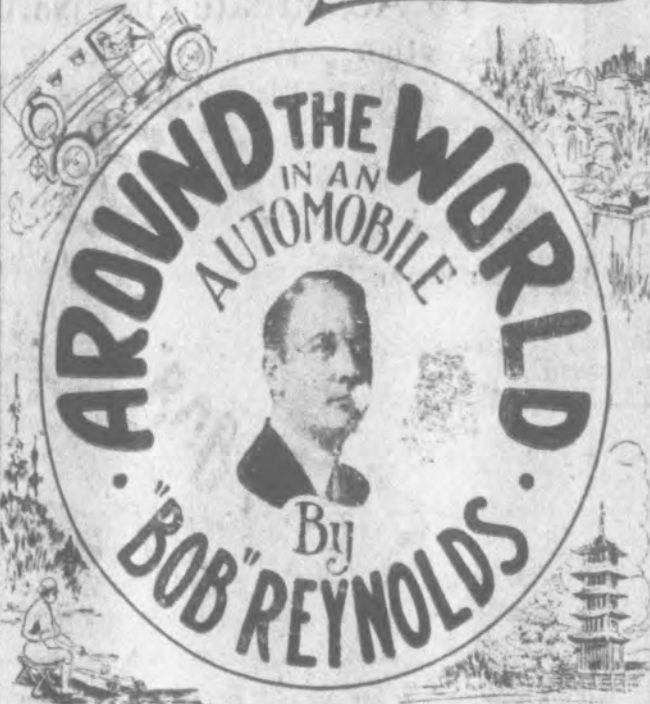
