COLONEL MITCHELL IS FOUND GUILTY BY COURT MARTIAL

Suspended From Service for Five Years Upon Being Found Guilty of Insubordination

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Vigorous methods pursued by Colonel Mitchell in ten years of criticism of what he regards as inadequate air defense, have resulted in any army court martial verdict finding him guilty of insubordination and suspending him from the service for five years. Still under technical arrest, the Colonel marked time today while the court's decision passed through regular channels to the Secretary of War, thence to President Coolidge for review and approval. After deliberating less than three hours late yesterday the court found Mitchell guilty of violation of the 96th article of war "to the prejudice of good order and military discipline. Eight specifications in the charges were made on the Colonel's public statements of September 5th and 9th in which he accused the War and Navy Departments of incompetency, criminal negligence, and a most treacherous administration of the national defense, and disgraceful administration of aeronautics.

In suspending Mitchell from "rank, command, and duties" in the army for five years, the court viewed the military record of the accused during the world war as a mitigating factor and described the sentence as "lenient."

With the same non-chalance that has marked him during the long controversy of the air service, Colonel Mitchell received the verdict with a smile, his wife standing beside him. While the court was deliberating Mitchell had munched chocolates with Mrs. Mitchell and her father and mother. Colonel Mitchell's friends believe he will remain silent until President Coolidge takes final action on the Army Court's verdict and that he might offer his resignation if the suspension is upheld. If his resignation should be accepted, these friends think Colonel Mitchell might consider entering politics next year in Wisconsin and possibly try for a Senate seat in opposition to Senator Lenroot, who is to stand for re-election.

Says Prohibition Agent Spent Mnth. Mayflower Hotel

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—How a prohibition agent lived at the Mayflower Hotel here for a month entertaining women and dinner dances and buying whiskey to strengthen his role as a real sportsman in the eyes of hotel employees for the purpose of obtaining evidence against them, was told today in published statements given a House Appropriation subcommittee.

The two employees, Julius H. Vance, former chef, and Ricardo Blazie, his assistant, were acquitted yesterday in criminal court.

The case recently was called to the attention of Secretary Andrews of the Treasury Prohibition Field Marshal by Representative Gallivan, Democrat of Massachusetts, who complained that two agents on the case had spent nearly \$1,000 in getting evidence. Appearing before the House Sub Committee during executive hearings on the treasury appropriation bill, Mr. Andrews said he had "never heard of the case before," adding that it "astonishes me."

Mr. Gallivan asked the Assistant Secretary if he knew that one of the Congress Agents had registered under the name of "one of the most eminent members of Congress" and asked Mr. Andrews if he knew this to be a fact, replied he "was shown the registration."

"All such conduct as that is absolutely taboo in our organization," Mr. Andrews said.

WOULD CURTAIL THE AUTHORITY OF COURTS MARTIAL

Undear Measure 30 Days Suspension Would Be Maximum Penalty Violation 96th Article

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The first Congressional echo of the court martial conviction of Colonel Mitchell of the air service took the form today of a bill by Representative Laguardia, Socialist of New York, to greatly curtail the authority of court martial in pronouncing sentences on those convicted of violating the 96th article of war.

Under the measure 30 days suspension would be the maximum penalty from the army for violation of that article, under which Colonel Mitchell was convicted. The present statute leaves the punishment to the "discretion of the court."

The 96th article of war is "the general article" which provided for unenumerated offenses against the military service.

Since the Mitchell verdict is not completed and effective until approved by President Coolidge, the limitation proposed by Mr. Laguardia presumably would apply to that case if the proposal became law before the President acted.

CHARGES DIEHL STORY AS BEING WHOLLY UNTRUE

Lockwood Places the Blame for Sinking of S-51 Entirely on the City of Rome

Boston, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A charge that the story told by Captain John H. Diehl, of the City of Rome, concerning sinking of the submarine S-51 in collision with his vessel September 25, was "wholly untrue," was made today by Lieutenant Commander Charles A. Lockwood, Judge Advocate, before the Naval Board of Inquiry investigating the disaster.

Summing up his case at a session of the court convened today Commander Lockwood said the S-51 was not at fault in any way for the collision and that the City of Rome was entirely to blame. The Judge Advocate said the conduct of the City of Rome was "reprehensible." The S-51, he maintained, was a "crossing vessel" and as such has observed all the rules of the road. Commander Lockwood said that the fact that the S-51 ship was allowed to approach within 600 feet of the City of Rome without any action showed a lack of attention on the part of the officers and crew of the latter vessel. He described the City of Rome as a "blind ship" with only one man in the pilot house to steer and keep a lookout.

Movement Started for Asso. Charities Organization

At an informal meeting of ministers and ladies from various organizations of the town, and the County Welfare Officer, held Thursday morning at the office of Faith Mission, the question of the need of some kind of an associated charities organization for the city of Greenville was discussed. All present at the meeting expressing themselves as believing in the need of such an organization, action was taken in the form of a motion that Mr. K. T. Futrell, county Welfare Officer, be asked to call a meeting of representatives of the various churches and charitable organizations of the town some time the first of the new year for the purpose of discussing the advisability of such an organization. A majority of the members of the Ministerial Association being present, the chairman called a brief session of the Association and the ministers endorsed the movement, in order to get it before the public. Mr. Futrell announced that he would call the meeting right after the holidays are over.

High finance denounces Governor Finchot's suggestion that the coal fields be declared "a public utility." "A dangerous coal panacea," say spokesmen for "big business." Is the coal business not a public necessity? Can people live without heat? Is it not the business of government to protect the public welfare putting that ahead of other duties? The real objection is not that Governor Finchot's suggestion is a dangerous panacea, but that it would interfere with the plans and profits of "big business," which is the real government of the United States.

Young Senator La Follette was cut when elder statesmen of the Republican Party presented an olive branch and places on good committee. They swallowed his fierceness, although he told them he "would be the same kind of Republican his father was."

That did not frighten the Republican elders. A young lion born in the lion house is not the kind of lion his father was, caught full grown in the desert.

La Follette is an able, earnest young man. But he lacks the experience and enthusiasm of the first twenty years in his father's life.

What about the late Mr. Battling SISK? That black gentleman from Senegal came to this country openly as a professional prize fighter. Every newspaper printed the fact that his business was committing assault and battery for pay and knocking men unconscious.

HE WAS NOT HELD UP, but made welcome by this glorious country that turns away women and children.

Other prize fighters are welcomed for they come in as "professional gentlemen," quite different from miserable women with dependent children.

Firpo, the giant Argentine prize fighter, arrived in this country accompanied by a lady whose presence the immigration authorities could not quite explain. Nevertheless he was admitted.

This doesn't surprise you. There is PROFIT in prize fighters. Disreputable officials that legalize and share the profits of prize fights need more prize fighters to increase the profits. And where profit is concerned Uncle Sam forgets his objects to immigrant.

SAVED FROM THE NOOSE 90 MINUTES BEFORE TIME TO DIE

Defense Attorney contends Negro Had Become Insane; Granted Stay of Execution

Chicago, Dec. 18.—(AP)—90 minutes before he was to die on the gallows for murder today, Campbell McCarthy, 19 year old negro, was granted a stay of execution on defense attorney's contention that the negro had become insane.

The attorney raced in an automobile to the county jail, arriving as deputies were preparing McCarthy for the noose. Judge McGorty, who granted the stay at his home early today, had as a precedent the eleventh hour delivery from the gallows of Russell Scott, convicted murderer now in the Chester Illinois penitentiary, after being adjudged insane by a jury.

What Has State in Way Unusual Mus. Instruments

Greensboro, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Just what has North Carolina in the way of old and unusual musical instruments?

Dr. Wade R. Brown, dean of the school of music at North Carolina College here has set out to find out. He is making an effort to build up a museum of such instruments at the college. He hopes to find many different kinds of instruments illustrative of the mechanisms used in days gone by. He believes there may be some very old violins in the state, as well as other old and unusual instruments, and, in any case, he has set out to learn just what North Carolina has of this kind.

BATTLE OF WORLD COURT GETS UNDER WAY IN SENATE

Borah Undertakes Establish Relations That World Court Bears to League of Nations

Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The battle of the world court got under way in earnest today in the Senate when Chairman Borah of the Foreign Relations Committee fired the first salvo into the pro-court ranks.

Replying to the opening shots from Senators Swanson and Lenroot, the Idaho Senator undertook to establish what relations the world court bears to the political institution known as the League of Nations.

"There is so much difference of views on this particular subject," he said, "that it seems advisable at this outset to determine that relationship."

The Foreign Relations Committee Chairman, who was one of the irreconcilables in the League fight, spoke after Senator Lenroot had delivered a prepared address in which the court was declared wholly independent of the League so that by adhering to the court protocol the United States would not involve itself with the League.

Senator Borah said in reply that those who organized the court had sought to create an "organization a legal part of the League" and if the court is not a part of the League of Nations "it is because they failed in their efforts."

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TESTIMONY SHOWS DOUGHTON DREW SALARY FROM MILLS

Former Officer in Mecklenburg Mills Says Mills Supplemented Salary Paid J. K. Doughton

Greensboro, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Testimony showing that the Mecklenburg Mills, Incorporated, supplemented the salary paid to John K. Doughton, vice president of the Doughton People's National Bank of Salisbury, although the witness stated that Mr. Doughton was not an officer or director in the mills, was presented this morning in the United States District Court. The witness was John C. Lawson, a former officer in the mills testifying at the trials here of Doughton and John D. Norwood, former President of the Bank, for violating the National Banking laws in connection with its failure.

United States District Attorney Linney introduced letters at the opening of the day's session, among them being one from a New York Bonding house criticising the unsatisfactory manner in which the Mecklenburg Mills met its obligation to the bonding trustees, and another letter from Doughton to the Bonding company in which he declared he had no official connection with the mills.

He declared that the huge prices now being paid for spruce in Maine and other New England states could not be borne indefinitely by the producers of paper. Railroad rates at present almost equal the cost of the timber when placed at the mills, he said, and these two factors would soon cause a change to more heavily wooded sections of the country.

Young People of Pres. Church to Hold Meet Soon

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 18.—(INS)—Atlanta has been selected as the convention city for the first great meeting of young people of the Southern Presbyterian church, to be held Dec. 29, 30, and 31. The convention is to be held in the interest of the causes of home missions and foreign missions.

The convention will be held under the direction of the executive committee of home missions Presbyterian Church. Interest in the gathering is becoming churchwide. It is expected that the attendance of delegates will reach a total of 1,000 to 1,500, representing every section of the church.

The speakers who will take part in the convention will include many of the prominent ministers and laymen of the church at home, and several missionaries from foreign fields who are now home on furlough.

Construction Work Created New High Record, November

Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 18.—(INS)—Construction work in the Southern states for November created a new high record, according to a report by the F. W. Dodge corporation. New construction for that month represented an increase of 50 percent over the record of November, 1924, and the total for 11 months of 1925 represent an increase of 23 percent in building activities for the entire year of 1925.

Building and engineering contracts awarded during the month of November, 1925, totaled \$464,683,100. This is the highest amount recorded for any month of the year, and an increase of 23 percent over the record for November, 1924.

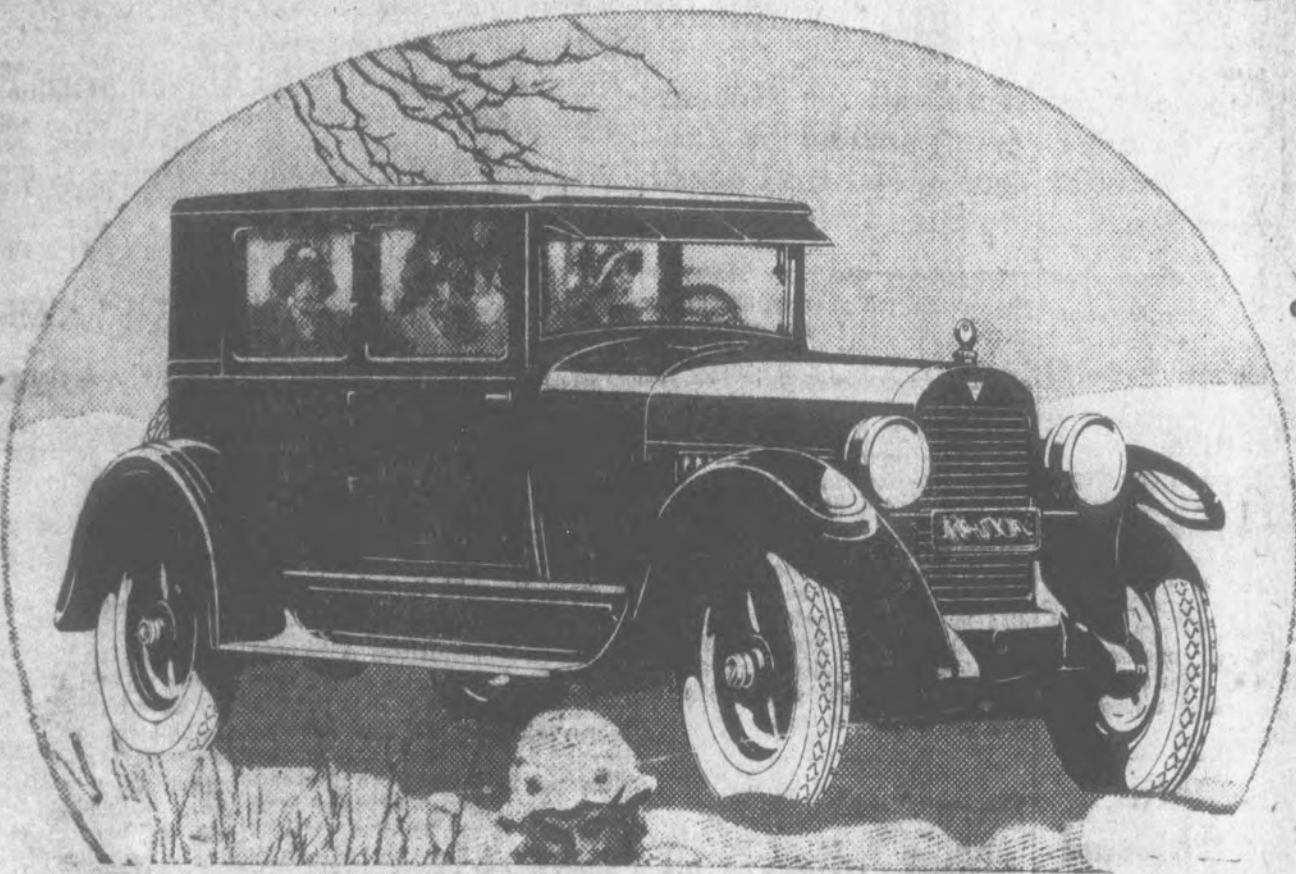
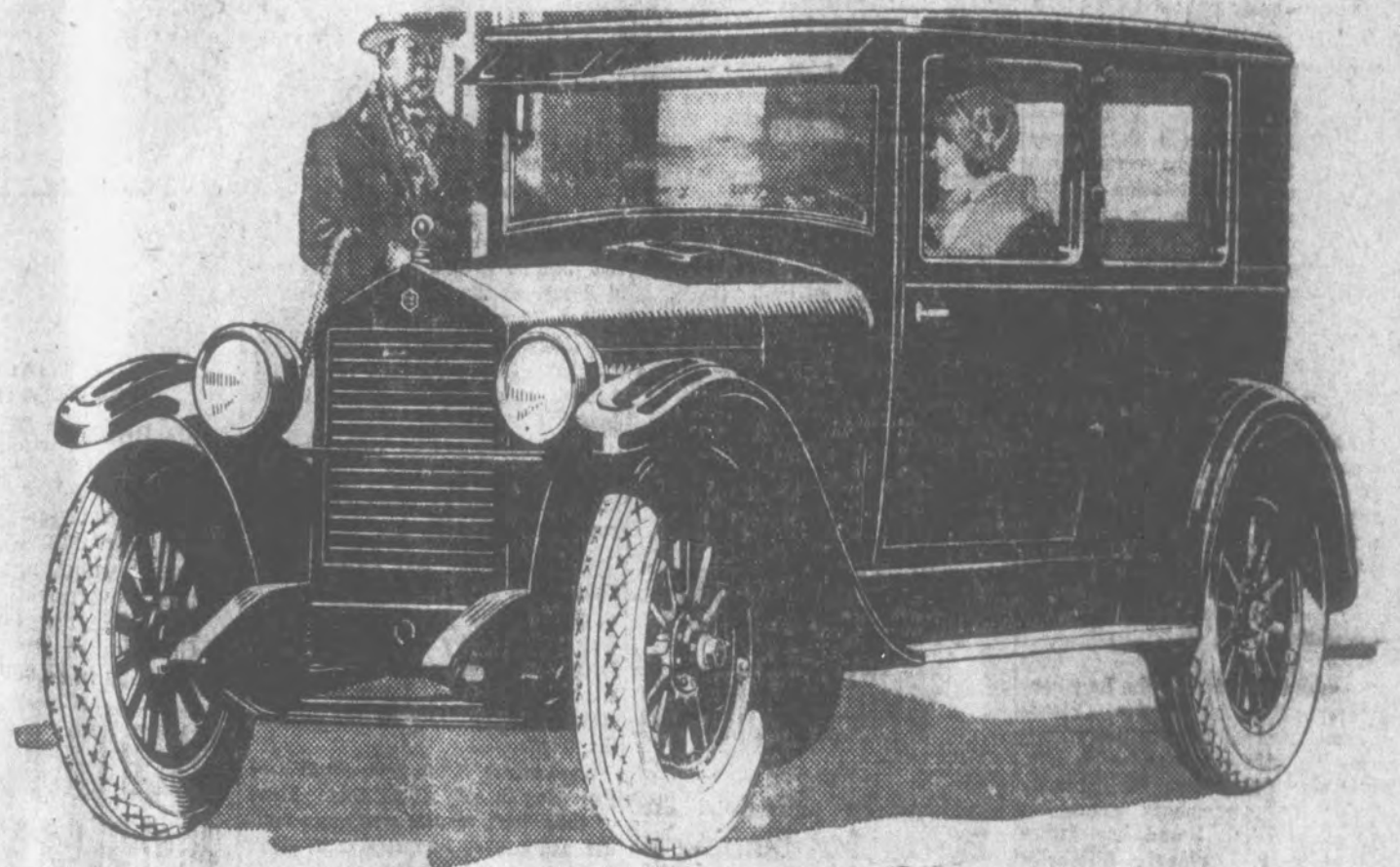

"The Messiah" Is Nearly 200 Years of Age Now

Greensboro, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Handel's oratorio, "The Messiah," is nearly 200 years old, it was pointed out at the North Carolina College for Women, here recently, when the "Messiah" was presented at the institution.

Handel directed the first performance of his masterpiece in Dublin, April 23, 1742. It was written in 24 days, during the year 1741. Its first appearance in this country was at Boston, at Christmas, in the year 1818, since which it has made thousands of appearances before American audiences.

Peppermint Can Be Grown Any Section of N. C.

Chapel Hill, Dec. 18.—(INS)—Peppermint can be grown successfully in any section of North Carolina, with profits that will compare favorably with other crops, according to C. A. Russell, chief of the research department of Vick Chemical Company, of Greensboro, speaking before the American Pharmaceutical Association here recently.

Peppermint beds in North Carolina this year produced a large volume of high grade oil per acre, Russell stated.

The speaker said that the planting and raising of peppermint was not difficult, requiring less than the usual attention of such crops as corn, potatoes and other vegetables.

The cost of producing peppermint oil has been estimated by the United States department of Agriculture at \$55 per acre for the first year, and \$30 per acre for the subsequent years. The returns in oil yielded run as high as 60 pounds of oil per acre. The average price paid for peppermint oil during the last three years was \$3.02 per pound.

November Shipping Gulf Post Harbor Is Unusually Large

Gulfport, Miss., Dec. 18.—(INS)—November shipping through the Gulfport harbor was unusually large, according to figures compiled by the harbor board and made public recently.

A total of 20,000,000 feet of lumber and timber was shipped through this port to all parts of the world. A total of 7,351 tons of cottonseed cake, all consigned to European ports was handled; 709 tons of crushed oyster shells, a Biloxi product, was shipped to England, where it is highly valued for road construction, and a total of 18,940,000 feet of lumber was exported to South American ports during the month.

Greene, secretary and treasurer of the Florida Association of the A. A. U.

This is the second year in succession that the national championships for mermaids have been allotted to St. Augustine. It will be a five-day meet, from February 9 to 13. The premier girl swimmers and divers will compete including Ethel McGary, Agnes Geraghty and Helen Meany.

Helen Washington, now the professional champion, will be the only champion of 1925 who will not defend any of her titles. The defection of Allen Riggan and Gertrude Ederle from the amateur ranks will not decrease the field of defending champions, as neither of these stars was able to annex a title last February.

Eleanor Garratti, the San Rafael girl, who was the sensation of the last meet at St. Augustine, is coming from the Pacific Coast. She will try to retain the fifty-yard championship and will make an effort to add the 100 and 220-yard titles to her list.

INDIA REDS HOLD ALOOF FROM OTHER EXTREMISTS

Cawnpore, Dec. 18.—(INS)—The British Government's campaign against Communists in England has led leaders of the Indian Communist Party to declare that they are not in a position to "maintain relations with other similar organizations."

The secretary of the party pointed out in a formal statement that any dealings with the Communists of England would cause the Government "to crush the party then and there," and also warned against communicating with the Communist Party of Russia.

EXPLAINS PURPOSE OF FAITH MISSION

**Rev. L. E. Ballard
Makes Statement Re-
garding Movement**

To The People of Greenville:

In view of the fact that there seems to be some little misunderstanding or rather lack of understanding regarding the purpose and plans of the Faith Mission organized this week here, I desire to make some statements regarding this movement. First, this is not, as some have supposed, an organization brought about through action of the various churches of the town, but is merely an organization among a group of Christian workers, who belong to various churches, who desire to join their efforts together in this way to do mission and social service work, as calls may come, and to co-operate with all organizations of the town in the work of advancing social service and spiritual work, but not to conflict with the work of any other organization. The Mission welcomes any who are interested. It is not to be confused with the movement now on foot for the establishing of the Associated Charities, or a like organization supported by the churches, though the mission is heartily in sympathy with such a movement, and ready to co-operate in a movement of this sort.

Second, the movement is not in anyway connected with the Society of the Nazarene, as some have been led to believe, and the word "Faith" as used in our name has no refer-

ence to "faith healing," but is merely expressive of the plan of the organization, an organization founded upon the idea of "faith in God," as a source of sustenance.

Following are some of the things which we plan to do: Systematically visit and conduct services in the jail, the county home, the prison camps and other public institutions; compile a directory of the poor, the shut-ins and the sick, which will be at the disposal of any organization in town seeking such information; to provide an established place where any person can come who is in need, and be referred to the proper place for aid; to solicit and distribute aid to worthy and needy not otherwise provided for; to co-operate with the welfare department of the county in caring for the unfortunate; and, in general, to minister, wherever and whenever we have opportunity in the name of Christ. We do not desire to conflict with the work of the King's Daughters, the Red Cross, any church society or committee, or any organization in the town; but rather we place at the disposal of these organizations our services and desire to co-operate, and every person associated in this work is ready to co-operate in any general movement that will do systematic social service and welfare work in our city and county.

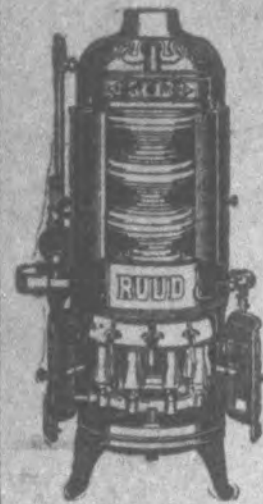

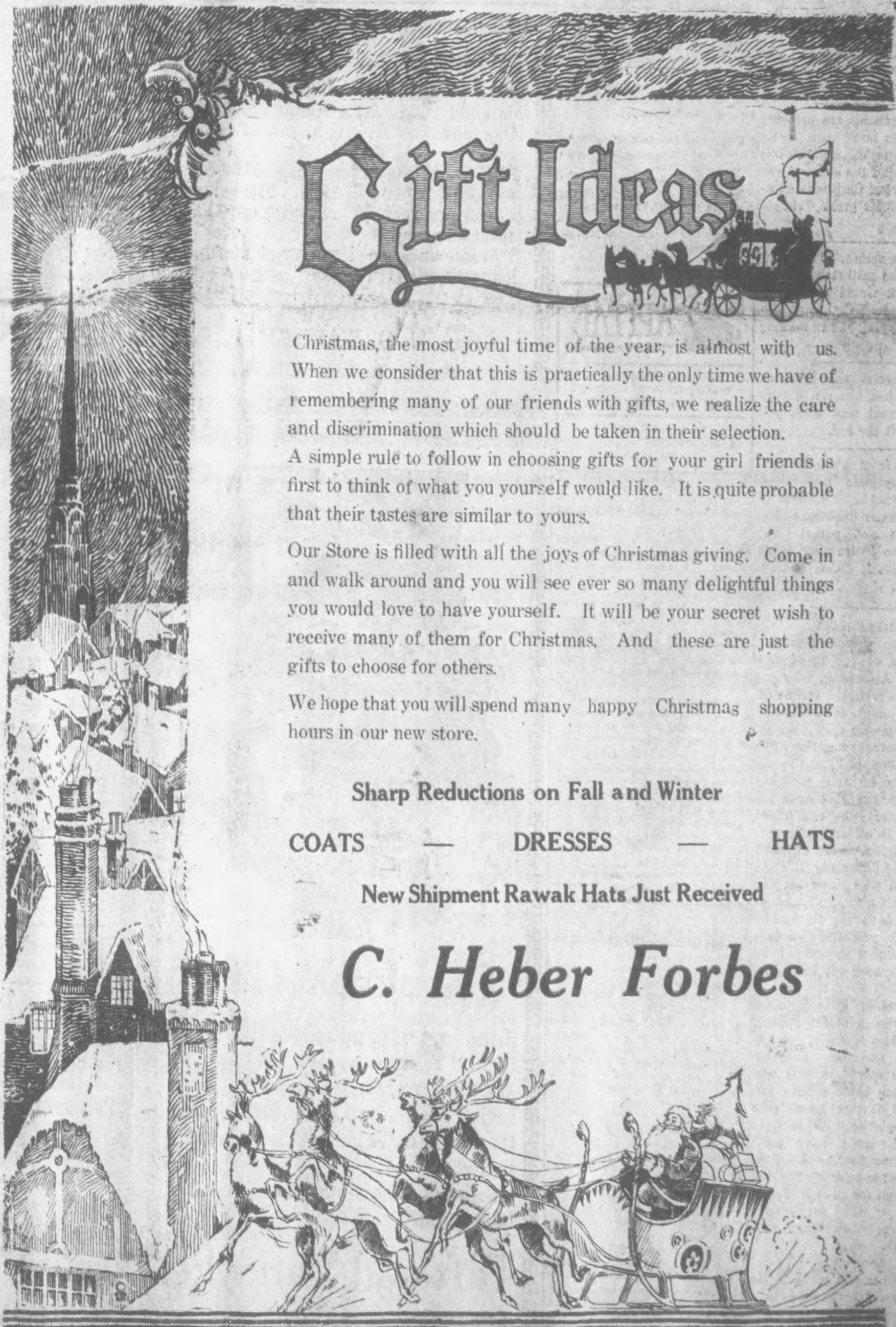

Much, however, can be and is being done to mitigate the evil. Some states claim to have partially closed the fake security flood gates by means of

"blue sky laws" and acts against fraudulent practices, but probably the most good is being accomplished by the nationwide publicity given all fake stock promotions through the co-operation of the press and legitimate financial and commercial organizations.

While the shady promoter of less certain securities may argue to his intended victims that the bankers and businessmen condemning his stocks are goaded to action by competition, he can not refute the fact that what the banker and merchant offer has an intrinsic value far in excess of that of the promoters "gilt-edge" securities of which even the engraving may be and usually is spurious.

Washington, Dec. 18.—"I'm here to listen to the Senate debate on the World Court," says a Texas visitor in Washington to his host on arriving last Sunday for a visit with the friend and former Lone Star state resident. "I couldn't think of missing it when I could come at this time."

"Well," the Washington man replied. "I'll wait till they have up the employees' salary and pension increase bill. We're all anxious about that."

Of course, the Texan's host was speaking from the viewpoint of a worker for Uncle Sam. World court discussions meant little to him so long as his fortnightly pay envelop contained less cash than he wants to find in it. Not an unnatural state of mind, to be sure, but that southern visitor exclaimed disgustedly:

"Jim, they don't make 'em any more unsentimental than you are. Think you can take time off to respond to Gabriel's trumpet if you federal employees happen to be in a campaign for more pay when the angel of the Lord toots his horn?"

Senator Swanson is a popular orator on the Democratic side—and in the camp of the opposition, too. He causes fewer laughs than punctuate the speeches of Senator Pat Harrison, but shoots as sharp darts and clouds the forensic skies with them. The Democratic minority really is rich in Senatorial orators who can command intense interest these days from floor and galleries alike. The Republicans number their big guns less frequently, due to the fact that responsibility for legislation makes it safer to say less in order that fewer mistakes of pledge and prediction may arise later to confront the party's candidates. There is, of course, greater freedom on the minority side, and the spellbinders of that region delight in laying down a barrage against the enemy which cannot always be met with answering fire as heavy and as telling.

The senior Senator from Iowa, Hon. Albert E. Cummins, was explaining to a few Tawkeye state visitors to the capital how it goes. "We transact the business, and the other fellows have the fun," he said. "Now and then we wish we were the under dog, politically, so we could get back at them. But, of course, we can't let our party get whipped at the polls in order that

we may wallop those Democratic orators for pulling our hair while we work. But if the administration and when the plans now being carried out of these times—well, Pat Harrison and Jim Robinson and some of the others had better look a little closer of the District of Columbia to a spot known as Hains' Point, down on the Potomac river, a distance of some fifteen miles, and use park roads all the way. Such a trip will provide the city's modern structures towering above the great trees, and then the broad sweep of the mighty river, with the monument, the Lincoln Memorial and other magnificent architectural piles along the way. In all the world there will be no such other municipal pleasure-place as this.

One of the most beautiful city parks in all the world, and probably the most unusual, is that vast expanse of forest wilderness stretching down through the very center of the National Capital and known as Rock Creek Park. The region takes its name from the boulder-bound brook that tumbles and roars its entire length, emptying itself at last into the Potomac but a short distance from the Washington monument.

In this park, whose drives wind in and out among the hills dark with virgin forests of oak and elm and pine, every President of the United States has loved to ride or drive. Washington surveyed a portion of the tract. His successors delighted in its cool quietude. Lincoln found there some comfort from Nature when political man became a sore trial to him. Roosevelt composed many a stirring article as he galloped along the park bridge path. And here Wilson was taken for frequent drives in the last months of his illness, to have his headache healed for a time, at least, by the charm of hill and dale and forest and stream.

Congressman Blanton of Texas takes a pessimistic view of statesmanship. "Now, what's the use trying to save the country on \$10,000 a year?" he demanded of a group in a House cloak room yesterday. "Prize fighters earn \$250,000 in a single battle, football stars get \$50,000 for signing their names to an advertisement, and baseball idols can have anything they ask for. I'd like to know if people really want to be governed, or merely entertained in the grandstand."

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Paris, Dec. 18.—(U. N. S.)—Next to good eating the thing which every Frenchman loves and cherishes, is dancing. Every year finds tongues wagging and saying that dancing is going out of fashion and that one by one the old dance-halls are going—but no one notices it around the French capital.

Each class of society has its special circle which does little else but dance, from the top of the social scale to the bottom, from the very rich to the very poor, everyone "jigs." Each quarter has its dozen little "Bals Musette" in the heart of the faubourg and in the heart of the people. It is a little establishment similar to the ordinary wine-shop, save for the plaintive note of the accordion and the sound of the dancing feet which fills the alleys. Then, too, there are brighter lights, usually little red and green ones like those on Christmas trees, to make things as bright as possible.

The little rue de Lappe, a stone's throw from the dancing angel of the Bal Musette. The balls actually seem to touch one another and the music from the dozen little orchestras melt into one and form an exciting but sweet symphony for the workmen, soldiers and girls.

A celebrated one is the "Petit Bal-cony," which was quite a terror in its day, but is now comparatively safe. However "bluecoats" about the door but then they are the usual accompaniment of the Bals Musette. It is in the center of the deserted ill-lighted street. One pushes open a green shutter to find himself in a long room with tables and deal benches.

Against the chalk-like walls the pale girls of all ages sit with their "correct gentlemen," competent derelicts who may count many crimes but never a "faux pas." Suddenly the accordion bursts forth and they leave their glasses of red, green or orange liquid and glide to the square of slippery floor. Each dance is paid for in advance, five sous for a rather short one, but no one seems to think it is dear.

There are girls in jerseys with bobbed hair struck with flashy jewel-studded combs and pins. Some wear bed-ragged looking silks and satins in light shades. The men are nearly all muscular gamins in soiled kerchiefs and checkered caps. They may have a knife or a revolver in their hip pockets, but there is no fault to find with their dancing—which is more than one can say of many of the chic "dancings" in the gay city, and very likely of any other city.

Government betting booths in every clear store will soon put out of business the private bookmakers who are making huge inroads upon the official pari mutuels at French tracks. Receipts from the pari mutuels have been falling off alarmingly for the last few months and the reason has been the activity of private bookies who will quote odds at any time before the horses go to the post. The system now in existence prevents any bets being made on the very day of the race.

Although there is no means of determining the total sum placed with the individual bookmakers, unofficial figures estimate it to be well in excess of 100,000,000 francs. The Government which levies a tax of 15 per cent on all racetrack wagers thus loses more than 10,000,000 francs.

This rake-off will come back to the state if the pari mutuel system is so broadened to include the conventional placing of bets under the same conditions that made the bookies' ring rich and famous. As the Government already controls all the cigar stores under a State monopoly, it was proposed that bets be made in all branches exactly as they are handled at Autell or Longchamps.

The winner in the third race will then come as easily as a box of matches. Another plan is also being studied. This will officially recognize the bookmaker, but will compel him to pay a huge tax and in addition turn over part of his profits to the state.

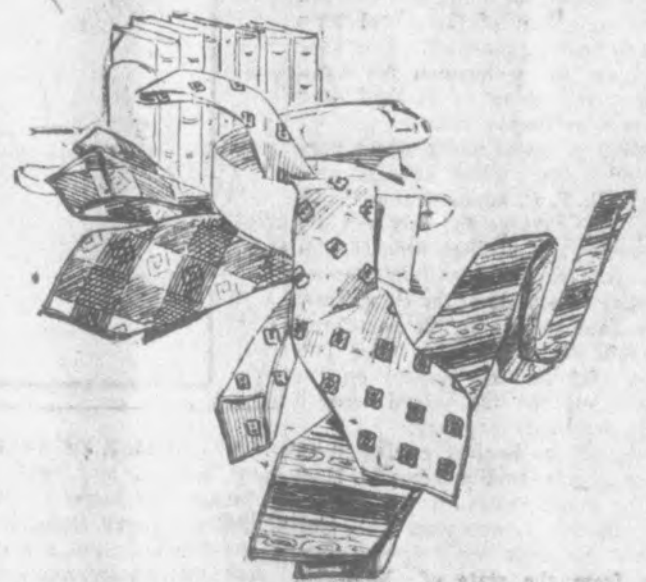

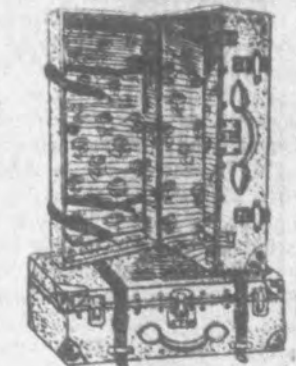

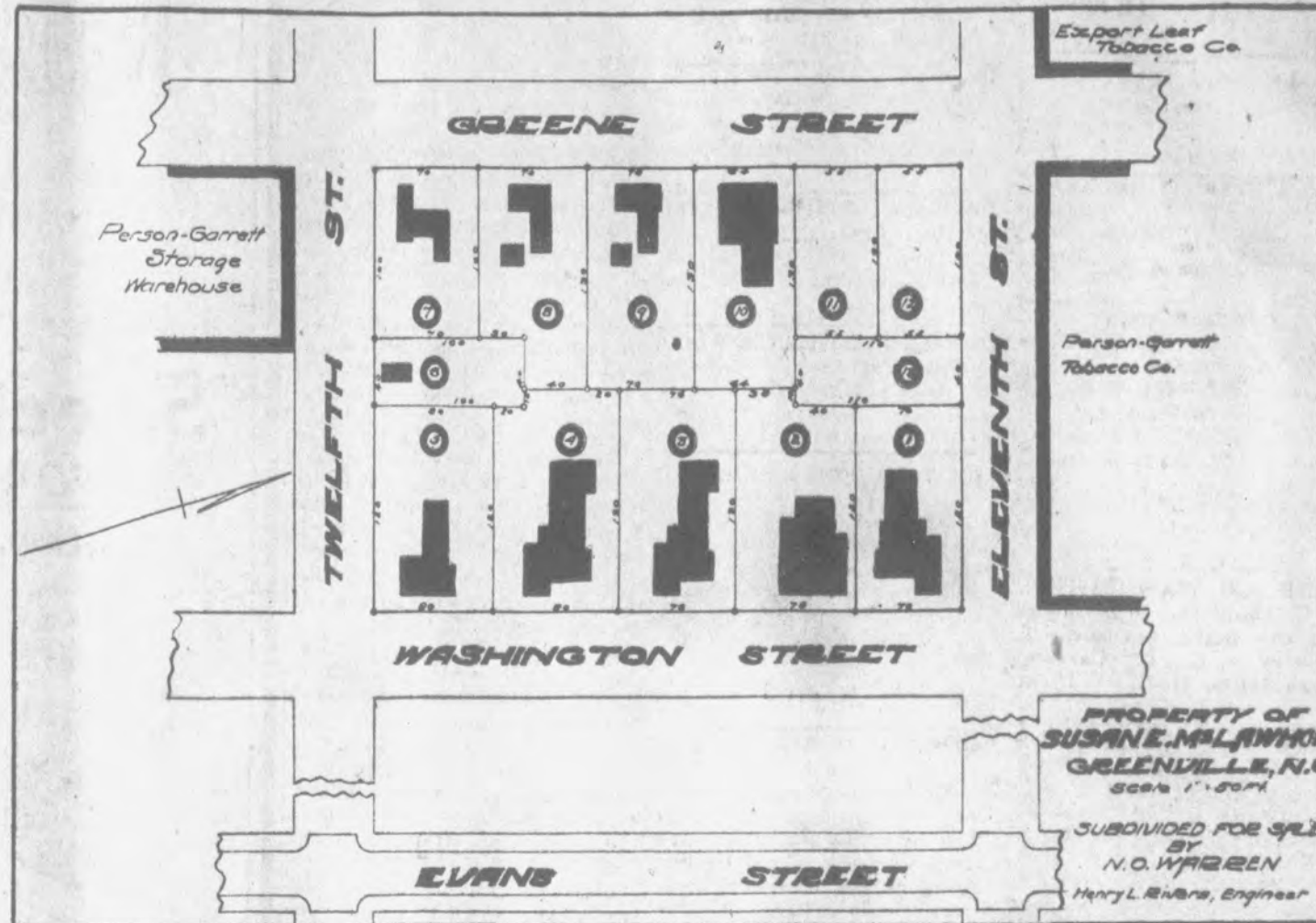
