GERMANY SEEKS STEADY POLICY POLITICAL LIFE

Two Party System Along Anglo-American Lines Is Deemed the Safest Course

Berlin, Dec. 21. — (INS) —
Strong political forces are at
work to give Germany a two-party
system along Anglo-American
lines. More and more the necessity
is felt by responsible politicians
to free political life from the
vicissitudes of a fluctuating
majority and to guarantee a steady
course of foreign and domestic
policy by adopting such system.

The fluctuating majority in the
Reichstag resulting in innumerable
crises during the past years
is primarily due to the revival of
the political constellation after
individualistic tendencies, one of
the revolution, partly to strong
the main characteristics of German
political life.

But gradually two groups of
parties, one of a more or less
conservative character, the other of a
democratic-socialist character, are
rising from the labyrinth of political
parties. Although, at present,
split over the Locarno issue, the
German National Peoples Party,
the German Peoples Party, and the
Zentrist Party has such strong
affinities concerning internal,
especially economic issues as to
guarantee co-operation some time
hence when the excitement and
in fighting over the Locarno Treaty
will have yielded to sober,
common sense considerations.

The bloc of the left is almost a
reality. Socialists, Democrats and
the left wing of the Zentrist
Party under ex-Chancellor Dr.
Wirth co-operated in many political
issues and the bloc is, though
loosely, united in the Republic-
can militant league, the "Reichs-
banner."

Influential circles of Stresemann's
German Peoples Party, to drop its
monarchical issues out-
pointing to that party that the
economic recovery of Germany
must be safeguarded by Co-operation
of all conservative elements.
Stresemann's party
though leaning on the support of
the Socialists for the Locarno
Treaties, is not at all inclined to
join a coalition of the left bloc,
chiefly as a matter of principle,
because it is strongly opposed to
the devastating, utopian doctrines
of the Socialists.

Chancellor Luther in his govern-
ment declaration about the
Locarno Treaties stated that "the
future Government should be
composed of such elements as will
safeguard the execution of the
Locarno Treaties." It is there-
fore probable that an interim
government including German Peoples
Zentrist and Democrats
might be formed, excluding the
nationalist negators of the Locarno
Treaties, but also the Socialist
supporters of the party, why do
not feel inclined to join the Govern-
ment as they are afraid of
losing their followers to the Communists
when joining a "bourgeois"
cabinet.

This will be the signal or the
German Peoples to resume its
efforts to win back the German
National Peoples Party and try
to form a bloc of the right again.
Although the Zentrist Party is
still an unknown quantity in this
political game, a two-party system
is in the making.

ORDERS INQUIRY RUB. MONOPOLY BY BRITISH GOV.

Representative Hull Declares Europe Is Laughing at Way U. S. is Being Held Up for Rubber

Washington, Dec. 21. — (AP) —
Investigation of an alleged man-
ipulation by the British Colonial
Government of the price of crude
rubber and other raw material was
ordered today by the House.
A resolution directing the
House Commerce Committee to
conduct the inquiry was adopted
without a roll call after Represen-
tative Hull, of Tenn., former
chairman of the Democratic Na-
tional Committee had charged
Great Britain with acting in bad
faith in the matter.
"The British Government is
laughing out loud at us," Mr. Hull
said. "It is openly proclaimed
that it intends to collect \$4,000,
000,000 from us in increased rub-
ber prices to pay its war debt."
"Europe is laughing up at us
because the way we are being
held up for rubber. The resolu-
tion was introduced by Represen-
tative Tilson, of Connecticut, the
Republican leader after the confer-
ence with Secretary Hoover.

Mitchell Appears Shenandoah Court of Inquiry

Washington, Dec. 21. — (AP) —
Freeless of the advice of his coun-
sel, Colonel William Mitchell ap-
peared as a witness today before
the Naval Court inquiry into the
Shenandoah disaster.

Before testifying the stand Colonel
Mitchell offered a written state-
ment which Rear Admiral Jones,
President of the Court, declined
to accept until after the officer
had been sworn.

Colonel Mitchell then offered
the statement to the court and did
not read the document in which
Colonel Mitchell called attention
to his recent sentence of five
years suspension from the army
because of his attack on Govern-
ment aviation policies, but point-
ed out that the sentence "is not
in effect until approved" by the
President. Until such approval
is given, he said, his statutory
right should not be curtailed.

39 PERSONS LOST LIVES LAST WEEK IN ACCIDENTS

North Carolina Leads the List With Seven Deaths While Geor- gia Leads the List of Injured

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 21. — (AP) —
Thirty-nine persons lost their lives
during the past week in accidents
and 227 others suffered varying
degrees of injury, some of whom
are expected to die. These figures
were revealed today in a survey
of traffic accidents by the Associated
Press in 11 southern states.

North Carolina with seven
deaths lead the list, while Flori-
da and Mississippi reported two
each as the lowest number. Geor-
gia again lead the list of injured
with 49. This was one less than
a record with 44 and Florida
reported none having been in-
jured. There were no outstanding
accidents during the week and the
toll was taken from scattered ac-
cidents. The tabulation by states
includes North Carolina seven
deaths and 44 injuries, South
Carolina three deaths and 4 in-
juries, and Virginia three deaths
and 44 injuries.

Bank Robber Dies From Ht. Failure Caused by Fear

Philadelphia, Dec. 21. — (AP) —
Death hastened by fear of ap-
prehension for a bank robbery has
written the final chapter in the
lawless career of Edward F. Keller,
Central figure in the famous
McNichal trunk mystery of a de-
cade ago.

The end came while he was
fleeing in a taxi cab with more
than \$13,000 in bank notes and
checks stolen a few hours earlier
from a well known bank here
where he was employed as a night
watchman. Physicians said that
heart failure superinduced by fear
was the cause of his death.

V. L. Johnson Badly Cut By Johnnie Moore

Johnnie Moore, white man, is in
the Pitt county jail, awaiting bond,
on the charge of assault with a
deadly weapon to-wit: a knife, on
V. L. Johnston. Johnston who's
face was badly lacerated is in the
Pitt Community Hospital.
Affray occurred Saturday night
at Fleming's Cross Roads, the ar-
rest being made by Sheriff A. C.
Jackson and police officer, J. L.
Whitfield. The small amount of
\$6.50 was the cause of the argu-
ment which resulted in Moore be-
coming so angry that he attacked
Johnston with the knife.

mond District), has been appoint-
ed the National Federal Reserve
Board, it was learned here today. Colonel
Bruton succeeds John M. Miller,
of Richmond, as a member of the
National Federal Reserve Board,
which is comprised of one
member for each Federal Re-
serve District. Colonel Bruton
served as a member of the Fifth
District Board for more than 11
years and resigned several months
ago.

Salisbury Woman Dun Down, Killed By Street Car

Charlotte, Dec. 21. — (AP) —
The body of Miss Annie Fisher, who
was run down and killed by a
street car here Saturday night,
has been sent to Salisbury, her
former home, where funeral ser-
vices will be conducted today.
Miss Fisher was a member of a
prominent North Carolina family,
her sister, Mrs. John H. Turner
having been a writer of notes un-
der the pen name of "Christian
Reid," while her father was a
Colonel in the Confederate Army,
and first President of the North
Carolina Railroad.

RADIO SOLVED IN INDIA NEARLY 1000 YEARS AGO

Records in Palmyra Leaves Treat Wire- less, Cotton, Em- balming and Geolo- gy

London, Dec. 21. — Many com-
plex scientific problems, including
that of wireless telegraphy, had
been solved in India nearly a thou-
sand years ago, according to an-
cient books and manuscripts which
have just come to light in Calcutta.

These records, the property of
Dr. Syed Mohammed Kassim,
constitute the rarest and most val-
uable library in India, according
to information reaching London.
The library contains numerous
manuscripts of palm-leaf leaves,
dealing with religion, philosophy,
arts, science, history, medicine,
astrology, palmistry and many
other subjects. It is believed to
have had its origin long before the
Bijapur kingdom in India.

Many Subjects Treated
Among the subjects treated are:

Embalming—The process de-
scribed is so elaborate and of sim-
ilar character that there is reason
to believe that the ancient Egyp-
tians learned this art from the In-
dians.

Wireless Telegraphy—It is said
that communications can be car-
ried from one place to another
thousands of miles away by means
of two stone plates, specially con-
structed.

Cotton growing—Processes are
described by means of which it
is possible to grow cotton of any
color desired.

Geology—Operations are ex-
plained by means of which it is
possible to know what things are
hidden below the surface of the
earth, so that the location under-
ground of such things as precious
metals, hidden treasures, buried
cities, etc., can be easily ascer-
tained.

Glass—Processes are given to
prepare a kind of glass, which,
held over the surface of the sea,
will clearly show all its contents
at the bottom.

Snow fall—Waves are shown to
cause snow to fall in hot countries
and prevent its fall in cold re-
gions.

Methods are also set forth to
level big mountains; to keep
water hot continuously for thou-
sands of years, and to convert
base metals into gold and silver.

Many tourists from America
have inspected this famous library
and there is a possibility that
it will be purchased for removal to
the United States. To prevent
the removal of the manuscripts
from India, efforts are being made
at Calcutta to raise a fund to
purchase the records and place them
in a museum.

VARSER RESIGNS AS JUSTICE OF SUPREME COURT

Governor Appoints William J. Brogden As Successor; Var- ser Returns Practice of Law

Raleigh, Dec. 21. — (AP) — An-
nouncement of the resignation
from the North Carolina Supreme
Court Bench effective December
31, of Associate Justice Lonnie
R. Varsar, and the appointment
by Governor McLean of William
J. Brogden, of Durham, to suc-
ceed Varsar, was announced here
last night.

Justice Varsar was a law part-
ner of Governor McLean in Lum-
berton at the time the latter be-
came Governor. He will return
to the practice of law in Lum-
berton. Mr. Brogden, Durham attor-
ney, was Governor McLean's cam-
paign manager in the primary
when J. W. Bailey, of Raleigh,
was the Governor's opponent for
the Democratic nomination.

Judge Varsar, the junior mem-
ber of the court, was appointed to
the bench on March 16 last to
fill the vacancy caused by the el-
evation of Chief Justice W. B.
Stacy, following the resignation
of Chief Justice W. A. Hoke. In
his letter of resignation Judge
Varsar stated his decision to
return to his law practice was
largely the result of the urgency
of his friends in Lumberton.

Mr. Brogden was born in Golds-
boro, October 16, 1877 and edu-
cated at the Goldsboro graded
school, and the University of
North Carolina. He received his
legal education at Trinity College
and the University. He entered
the practice of law in Durham and
has been county attorney of
Durham County 1908 to 1911 and
Mayor of the city of Durham 1911
to 1915.

TABLET TO MARK LAND GRANT ORIGINALLY GIVEN LAFAYETTE

Tallahassee, Fla. Dec 21 (AP) —
An echo of an historic incident
was heard here when a report
was submitted to the legislature
on preparations for the placing of
a tablet at the southwest corner
of a section of land granted by
Congress to General Lafayette, in
1824.

The property intersection is
just outside Tallahassee, and is
on the identical spot where a
monument has been placed, mark-
ing the Florida meridian.

According to historical data,
Congress, on December 28, 1824,
"in consideration of services and
sacrifices," ordered the payment
of \$20,000 to General Lafayette,
and a grant of land, "in any of
the unappropriated lands of the
United States." General Lafayette
and his heirs, the latter sharing
in the grant, chose a section in
the northern part of Florida, just
east of Tallahassee.

The tablet to be placed on the
Lafayette grant is one of three
to be affixed to the monument.
The other two will be used in con-
nection with the meridian mark-
ing.

The Lafayette grant has long
since passed into the hands of
private owners. There is a natu-
ral "monument" to the distin-
guished French soldier still there,
however. It is Lake Lafayette.

FLOWERS AFFECTED BY LIQUOR SAME WAY AS HUMAN BEINGS

Berkeley, Cal., Dec. 21 (AP) —
Alcohol has much the same effect
on flowers that it has on human
beings, members of the botany
faculty at the University of Cali-
fornia have learned.

Six California poppy buds were
used in an experiment. They
were placed in jars containing
liquids varying from straight
water to whiskey. The only flower
to bloom was the one in the
water. The others became tipsy
and leaned over the edges of their
glasses—not wilted, but just in
a stupor, varying in the degree
of unconsciousness with the
amount of liquor. Later poppies
were introduced and their effects
marked.

Photographs of this work were
taken by Alfred E. Pillsbury,
using a movie machine, plus a
camera for the stills. A micro-
scope lens and a synchronizing
motor were included in the equip-
ment.

GIRL BALL STARS, BROKE IN JAPAN, GET FARES HOME

Team Managed by Ainsmith,
Johnson's Old Catcher Is Victim
of Poor Publicity

Tokyo, Dec. 21.—The baseball in-
vasion of Japan by the Philadel-

phia Bobbies, an organization of
feminine ball tossers, has ended in
disaster. The Bobbies are now
en route home, traveling on tickets
provided for them by N. H. N.
Mody, a Kobe business man who is
not an American.

The plight of the Bobbies and
the treatment accorded them dur-
ing their stay in Japan has aroused
considerable indignation against
the American managers of the team
and the Japanese promoters, who
were responsible for bringing them
here.

Billed as the champion women's
ball team of the United States, the
Bobbies came to Japan in October
with Eddie Ainsmith, the former
Washington and St. Louis catcher
as their manager. Earl Hamilton

the southpaw pitcher who perform-
ed for Pittsburgh, St. Louis Cardi-
nals and other big league clubs a
few seasons ago, was also a mem-
ber of the party.

Arriving in Tokyo, the Bobbies
failed to attract the patronage that
had been hoped for, despite a lot
of sloppy publicity in the Tokyo
newspapers, both vernacular and
English language. A few people
came to see them out of curiosity,
but most of these came to the first
game only and after that the lines
of ticket-buyers before the admis-
sion gates were noticeably attenu-
ated. The girls could not play ball
after the fashion Japanese are ac-
customed to watching, even with
Hamilton and Ainsmith perform-
ing as a battery.

After a few games in Tokyo and
vicinity, the team moved on to
Kobe where they played numerous
games with teams around Kobe
and Osaka, managing to win one
of them. The patronage there,
however, was no more extensive
than it had been at Kobe.

Affairs soon reached a point
where regular "eat" for the girl
ball player became a problem.
There was no money for hotel bills
and not one of the girls had been
provided with transportation
back to America. The girls got
desperate and refused even play any
more until tickets home were pro-
vided for them.

Henry Stanborn, a hotel-keeper,
of Kobe, took the battles of the

the promoters come across. They
did not succeed. The promoters
had not taken in the money at the
gate and they would not pay it
out. A suit might have been filed
but it would have taken two years,
perhaps, to settle the issue and the
Bobbies were getting hungrier all
the time.

Finally Stanborn tried to obtain
assistance from the United States
Consul in Kobe and others, but had
little luck until Mody heard of the
situation and volunteered to pay
\$6,000, the cost of steamship pas-
sage to the United States and rail-
way tickets to Philadelphia. Mody
declared he was acting merely
through sympathy with the plight
of the Bobbies. He did not ask
for any guarantee of repayment
and probably will never get a cent
of the money back.

HELIUM GAS NEW FACTOR IN DEEP SEA DIVER TEST

Washington, Dec. 21 (AP)—Experiments with helium, the non-inflammable, inert gas used in inflating navy dirigibles, hold promise of increasing the depth to which divers may descend and of decreasing the danger from pressure to divers, Rear Admiral J.

D. Beuret, chief of the Navy Bureau of Construction and Repair, said today in his annual report.

Experiments are being conducted to reduce the dangerous effects from the absorption of nitrogen by the blood in deep sea diving. These indicate, it was said, that "a mixture of helium and oxygen may permit the diver to descend safely to greater depths than have hitherto been reached and may also permit a more rapid ascent without danger to the diver."

Other inventions reported include a rescue breathing apparatus and a mine sweeping rope. Gas chambers have been constructed at the New York and Mare Island Navy Yards, for "a new type of rat," initial lots of which have been issued to the vessels of the fleet. The mine-sweeping rope is "a domestic type," tests of which have indicated that "it may prove superior to the British serrated wire-rope hitherto used for mine sweeps."

Discussing construction, the report said that during the last fiscal year two light cruisers, five submarines, one fleet submarine and three auxiliaries were completed. Including one additional fleet submarine, started during the year, there remained under construction on July 1, last, the Saratoga and Lexington, both airplane carriers, which will not be completed before the end of the calendar year 1926, and one submarine, three fleet submarines, and one auxiliary.

FLAMES MYSTERIOUSLY SHOOT OUT OF COLD WATER POOL

Seattle, Dec. 21 (AP)—Flames which shoot high in the air from a pool of cold, salty water, in Green river canyon, 36 miles southwest of Seattle, are attracting much attention.

Water in the pool, which is about six feet in diameter, sometimes sinks almost out of sight. Then it rises, troubled with the gas passing through it. If a lighted match is thrown in while it is turbulent, fire rises.

At times the eruptions are particularly violent, throwing out rocks and sending flames 100 feet high. At rare intervals the geyser fails to work at all. These variations have not been explained.

A short distance from the geyser, flames play for two weeks at a time over water which bubbles up between rocks in a stream. Although the water in the geyser pool is salty, and contains many

minerals, it is within ten feet of a perfectly fresh brook. Sulphur and fresh water springs are found near by.

This phenomenon is near the bank of Green river, from which Tacoma gets its water supply. Although rumors of "water that burns" had been spread by Indians and hunters, the place was inaccessible until a road was built in last year.

BIRTH RATE FALLS OFF AS DEATHS MOUNT IN ENGLAND AND WALES

London, Dec. 21.—(AP)—A de-

creasing birth-rate and a rising death-rate are the two outstanding features of the Registrar-General's statistical review for England and Wales for the year 1924, just published here.

The returns show that the birth-rate in England and Wales last year was the lowest on record, except for the last two years of the World War. Since 1920 the birth-rate has shown a steady decline, and in 1924 the rate was 18.8 per thousand living persons. With regard to the death-rate, this, the

review shows, reached the lowest point ever recorded in 1923, but during 1924 it rose by .04 per 1,000 to 12.2 per thousand, the increase being general at all stages of life.

MEN WOMEN LIBRARIANS ON SICK LEAVE ABOUT SANE

Chicago, Dec. 21 (AP)—The belief that women engaged in public or industrial work are a-

sent from duty because of illness to a much greater extent than men is not entirely true so far as workers in public libraries are concerned.

A questionnaire conducted by the Bureau of Public Personnel Administration in cooperation with the American Library Association, shows that in sixteen public libraries in the United States there was little difference in the number of days women were on sick leave with pay and those of men library workers.

Chicago, Dec. 21 (AP)—By constantly enriching and rounding out her characterization of the role of unhappy "Sadie Thompson," Miss Jeanne Eagels believes the Sadie of today is a far more human and living person than the

one she created nearly four years ago as the titular part in the stage play "Rain."

Miss Eagels is approaching her twelve-hundredth performance of this same Sadie, and she is not tired of the part. Although it is an exacting role, one demanding an emotional intensity and nervous concentration beyond the average, the portrayal of this

character has not become mechanical. Sadie is always refreshed by inspirational small changes in the wording of her lines.

Since the play opened at the Garrick Theatre in Philadelphia on the night of October 10, 1922, Miss Eagels has not missed a performance. Her only vacation came during the Actors' Equity strike in New York in 1924, when

"Rain" ran for 96 weeks in New York, was stopped by the Actors strike, returned for another sixteen weeks' engagement after the strike, and has since been played in twelve of the larger cities.

The creator of the inimitable

"Sadie" first stepped before the foot-lights as one of the grave-diggers in a children's performance of "Hamlet," in Boston, when she was twelve years of age.

GREAT FIGHT IN

JARAMOUNT FILM
Traveling all around the world with one objective in view to find the man who had caused his father's death culminates into one of the most sensational screen fights ever filmed by the camera.

WOULD CONVERT SCRAP SHIPS TO WORLD WELFARE VESSELS

Topeka, Kan., Dec. 21 (AP)—The United States government would save millions of dollars and give a tremendous impetus to world brotherhood by literally "beating its swords into plowshares," in the opinion of Dr. Charles M. Sheldon, editor of The Christian Herald and for thirty years a Congregational church pastor here.

Doctor Sheldon is advocating the use of discarded navy vessels as "university ships," and a "secretary of peace" in the president's cabinet.

"Battleships that cost millions were scrapped after the disarmament conference at Washington," he declared. "Old shipping board vessels are still being destroyed. How much better if they could have been converted into university ships, to take the pick of our college students around the world on an educational tour."

"Wouldn't it be fine to remove the guns and munitions and fill the holds with provisions and merchandise; take aboard 5,000 students and professors, and go from continent to continent studying daily as they would at home? Their cargo could be exchanged for foreign exports, and the expenses of the voyage largely defrayed in this trading."

"Perhaps there would be an

earthquake in Greece. The ship would go there and leave provisions. A famine in China—our university would hasten to Chinese ports with food. Pestilence in the Near East—relief, would be rushed on our 'dreadnaught of peace.'

"If we could send our college students on such a journey, bringing the friendship of America to every country in the world, we would never have to use the navy for any mission of war. Soon the other countries would send their university ships to us, and real world fellowship and complete disarmament would come."

SEATTLE MUNICIPAL TROLLEY SYSTEM TO BUY ANOTHER LINE

Seattle, Dec. 21 (AP)—Negotiations are under way for the city to buy the last privately owned street car line in its limits. This would provide the city with a total mileage of 260 and would leave Seattle second only to Detroit as a municipal transportation owner.

The city has offered \$1,200,000 for the private line, which was appraised at \$1,239,440. The main system was bought in 1919 for \$15,000,000, of which \$3,382,000 has been paid.

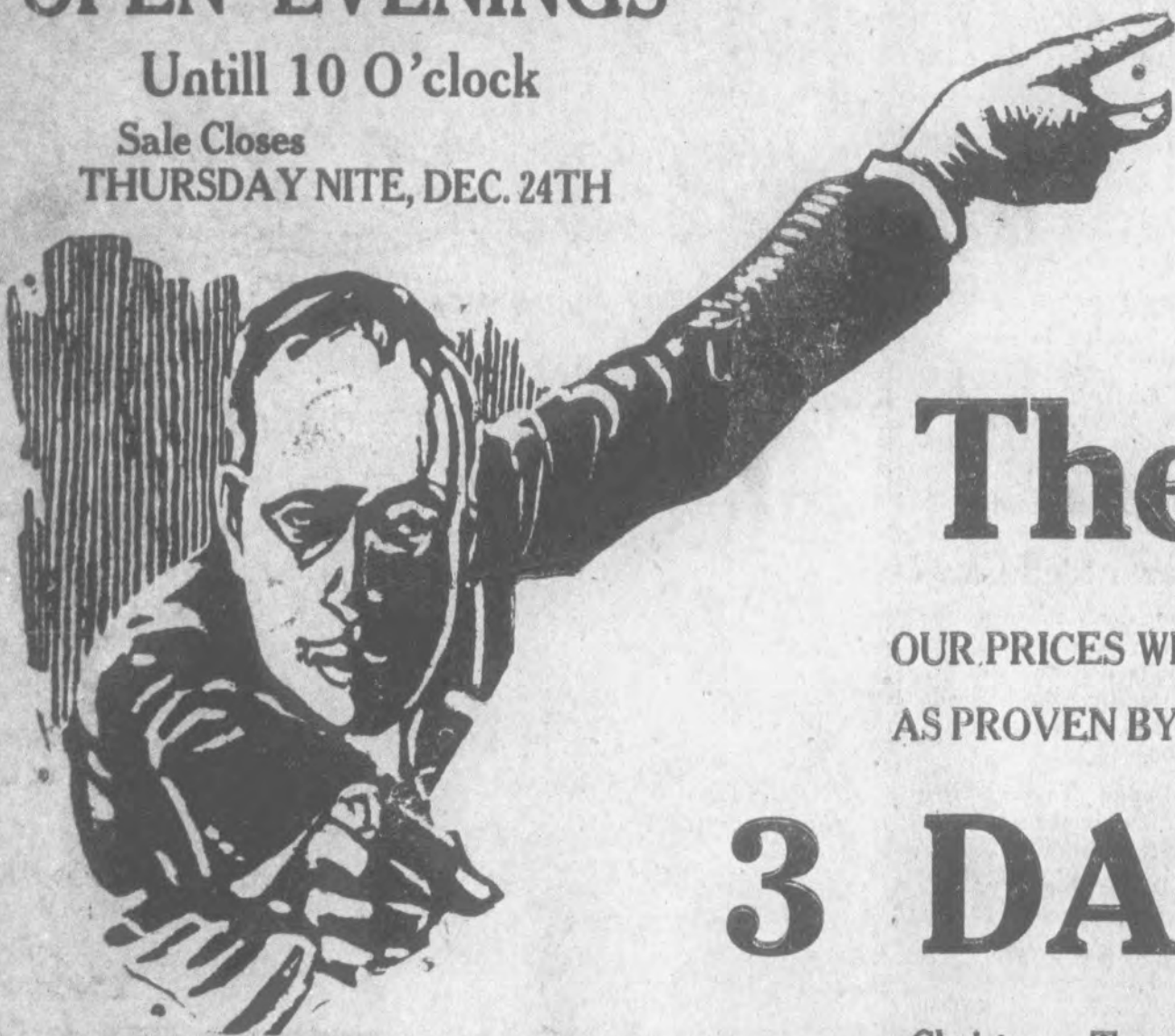

HUMOR, TRAGEDY BACK OF THE ART COLLECTION SALES

New York, Dec. 21.—(AP.)—Many stories of humor and tragedy are behind New York's celebrated art sales, with their gatherings of the country's social elite.

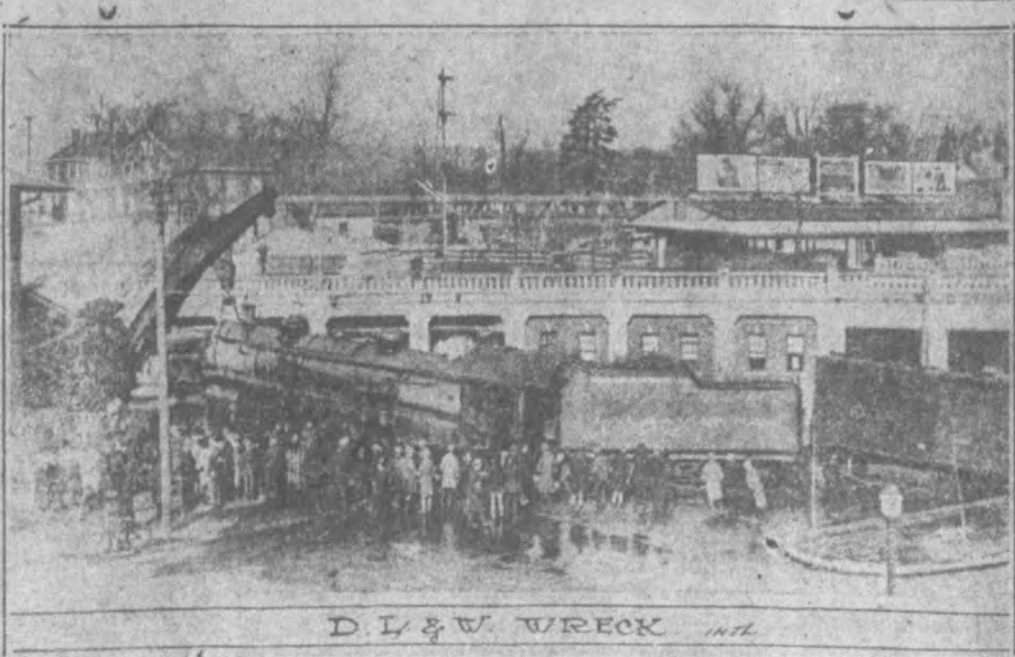
The newly rich provide much of the comedy. They notice their more cultured friends' art collections and learn that it is well to be known as a lover of art. So off they go collecting various and sundry objects, many of them amusing.

These expeditions frequently result in a real knowledge of art, however, for with the purchase of the first treasure comes a fascination which leads a person to further buying. This creates a desire to know what it is all about.

When the Achille Chios a monument was sold here recently it marked the end of collecting by the Chios family. Achille Chios, a man who had made a fortune at the bank, devoted the faculty of astuteness that had brought him wealth to the study and acquisition of works of art. He died and his son inherited part of the fortune and a great share of the collector's instinct.

Achille bought until the collection reached a remarkable high total in dollars. He made his purchase, however, largely on credit and the time came when commitments of bankers and other creditors were formed. The Italian government tried to save the collection, but finally it was sent to the American Art Galleries in New York for disposition.

Derailed Train Goes on Rampage



Leaping from the rails of a siding at East Orange, N. J., this train ploughed across the street, smashed parked automobiles to pieces and was halted only by the embankment of the elevated structure. None was injured.

Death of collectors and the passing of their collections to relatives or friends who have not the same love for art often is the cause of sales. Numerous collectors also designate how their property is to be disposed of after death.

Sales of old homes also are responsible for the disposition of art objects. C. K. G. Billings, known throughout the country for his love for horses, had a large collection of treasures at Fort Tryon Hall in this city. When he sold the place to John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and moved to California, he decided to dispose of a few of the greatest modern masterpieces in his possession. The sale will be held next

month here.

Art auctions are marked by great formality. The floors of exhibition rooms are covered with rugs and carpets so deep and thick that there is no sound of the tread. Comments on various subjects must be given in hushed tones.

Bidding, however, creates a subdued excitement. Two are lovers and for a few minutes the situation is tense as the bids mount higher. An eight and a half inch Staffordshire tray brought \$1,800. On another occasion a suit of armor sold for \$13,400.

Some collectors have agents to do their bidding or buy under as-

signed names to protect themselves from thieves and an avalanche of letters from all parts of the world. For once it becomes known that a person has acquired a valuable object, it becomes subject to the attention of art lovers who desire information and thieves who desire more than information.

To one who has witnessed horse sales and auction land sales, where the auctioneer talks like a machine gun and conducts himself with dignity common to a three-ring circus, the appellation "auctioneer" appears as a misfit for the commonplace and quiet-mannered salesman who officiates in art auction pulpits.

But regardless of surroundings,

an auctioneer is an auctioneer and no movement for a change in the art auctioneer's title is evident.

DEAD COMRADE'S ASHES CARRIED IN SHELL BY RACING CREW IN JAPAN

Toyko, Dec. 19.—(INS)—Take my ashes with you and do your best to win the race.

This was the injunction placed upon the crew of the Otara Middle School by one of their comrades who died a few days before the oarsmen were to leave for Tokyo to compete in athletic contests at Meiji Shrine. In compliance with the dying wish of their late crewmate, the Otara oarsmen carried a small urn containing his ashes in their shell as they entered the race.

Although the Otara crew gave their best throughout the contest, it was not enough. Honsho Middle School swept across the finish line a few inches ahead of them. After the race the Otara oarsmen placed the urn containing the ashes of their former comrade before a shrine in their training quarters and offered apologies to his spirit for failing to win.

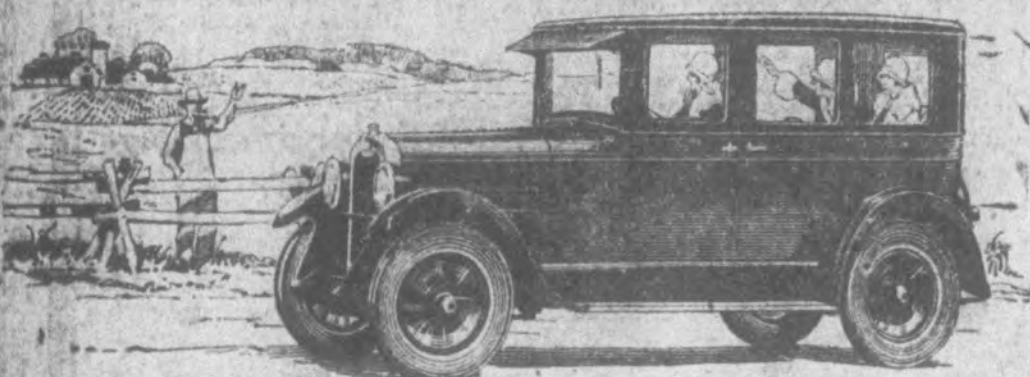

Teachers Meeting Held Recently a Great Success

(By Lucy Cherry Crisp)

The meeting of all Pitt County teachers in the High School Building in Greenville on December 12th marked an important milestone in the educational year in Pitt county. The definite purpose of the meeting was to check the program of work being carried on in the school this year as mapped out in the very excellent Pitt county Teachers' Handbook, which was put into use for the first time in Pitt county at the beginning of the present school year. With this in mind, talks were made by school principals and superintendents on definite school problems: School Housekeeping, The Lunch Period, Pupils' Reading Circle work, Worthwhile Observance of Special Days, Increasing School Attendance, How to Make our Group Center meetings better, Principal's score card, Good Schedules, School Equipment, and Professional Reading for Teachers. Talks on the General Progress of the Work and on Improving the teaching of English were made by Supt. Fitzgerald and Miss Brogdon. Mr. Meadows, from the E. C. Teachers College, gave a splendid address on the Teaching of English. There were divisional and special meetings of interest and help to all groups of teachers. Then when the groups came together again in the afternoon, it was to hear an address filled with helpful inspiration made by Dr. Jones, pastor of one of Greenville's Baptist churches. "The public school of America can make this country what it ought to be," said Dr. Jones. "Many have a part in education, but it is specifically the teachers' duty. Therefore it is the teacher's greatest duty to make character." In enumerating some of the elements which go to make character, Dr. Jones named control, giving the child vision, purpose, standards of living, and a different outlook on life. "It's a thousand times better to form than to break, and ours is the

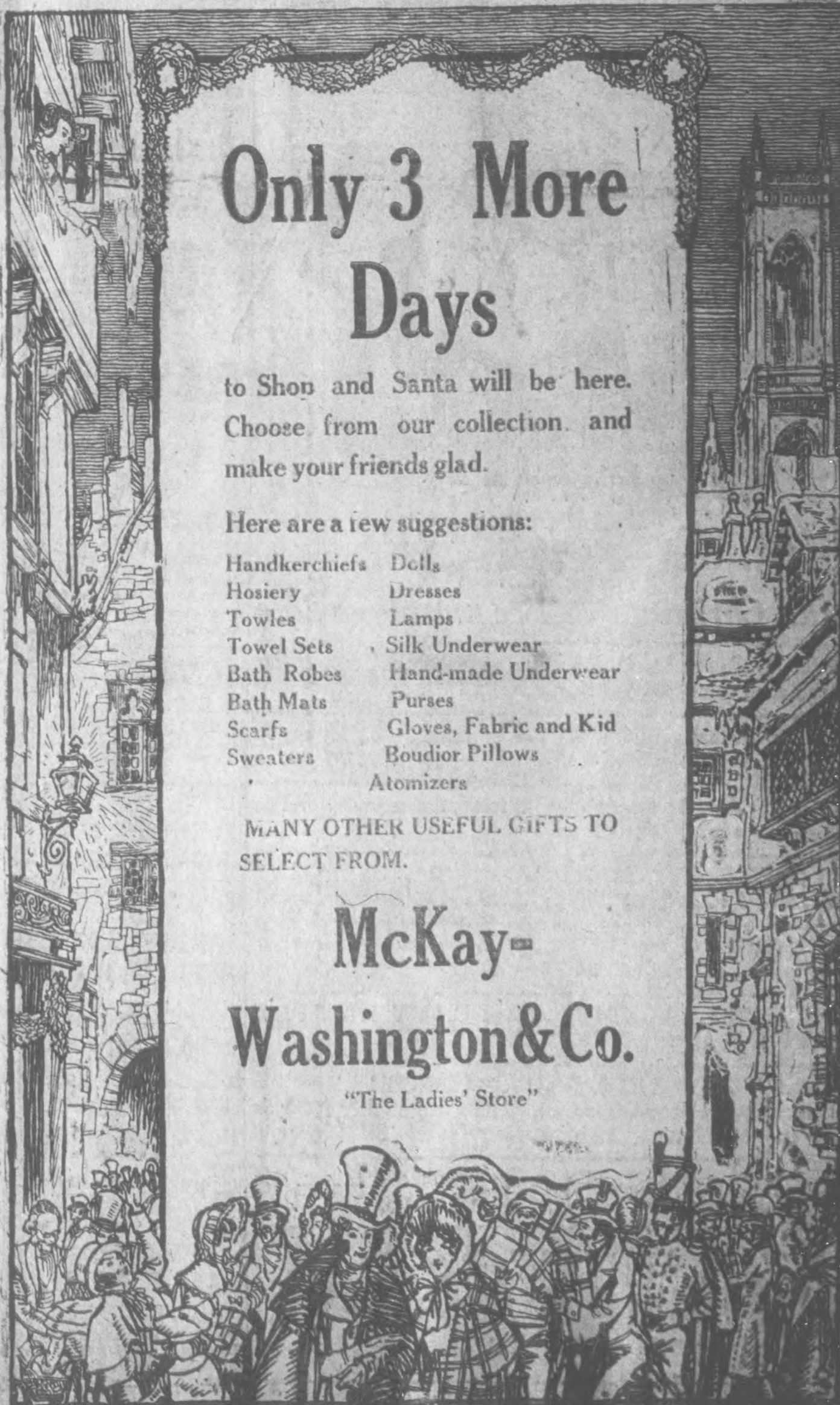

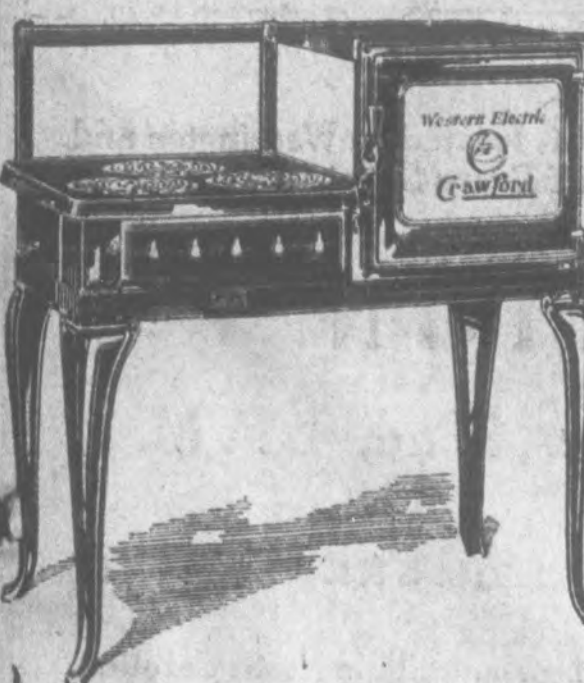

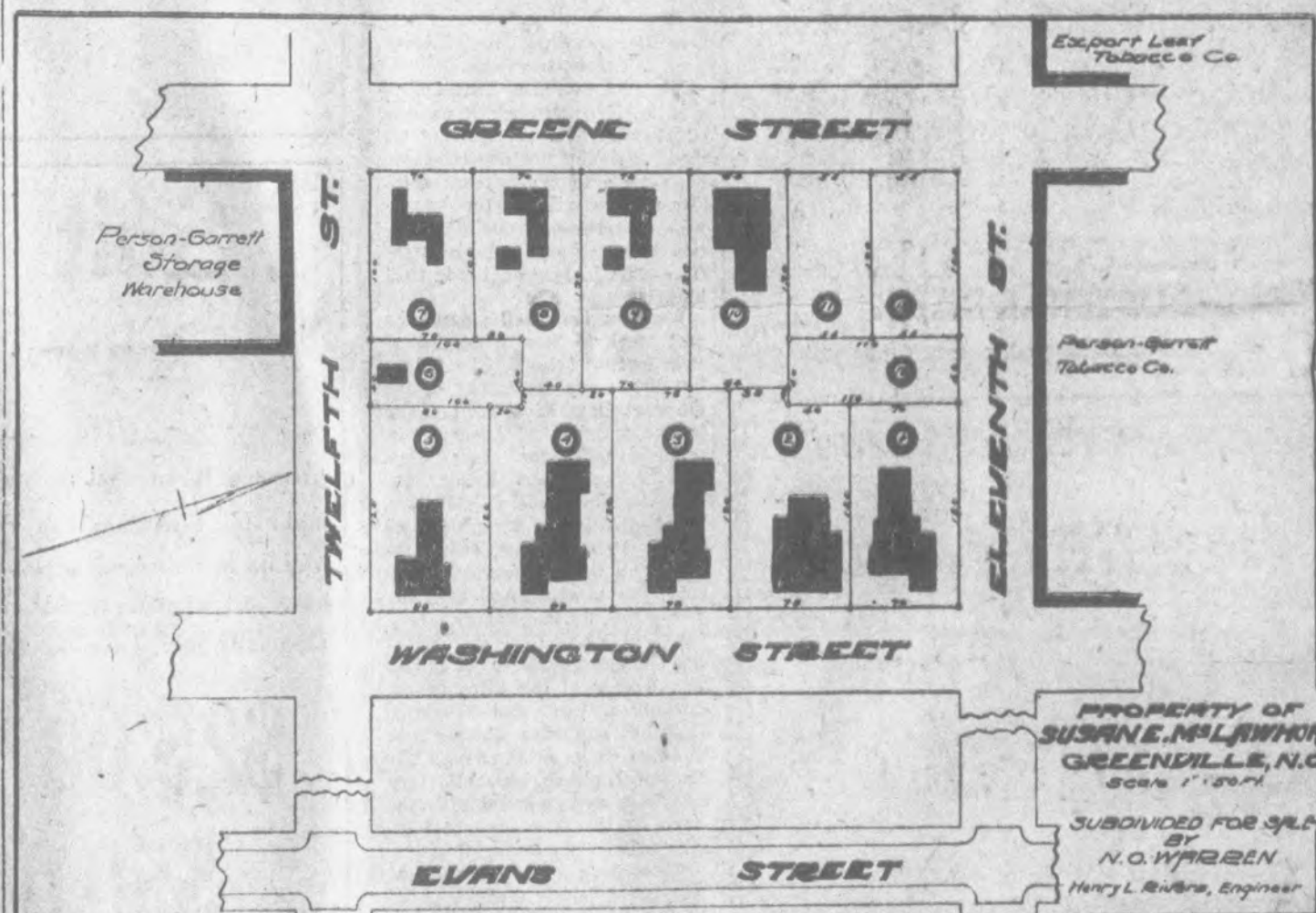
