
Such is the ruling of the King's Bench Cort in an appealed case involving the liability of the owner of a cat for damage to a neighbor's pigeons and poultry,

The effect of the decision is that, since the cat cannot resist the temptation to bloodshed offered by pigeons, it is the duty of the pigeon owner to protect his possession. while no owner of a cat is expected to know that his cat would kill a hird until he has had proof of its

The case came before the King's Bench because of the owner of the ear in question refused to pay eight pounds damages denuanded because the cat had disposed of ceight pigeons and two bantams belonging to George Arthur Buckle of Leeds. The pelition for damages had been dismissed by the County Court at Leeds because the "roam Ing character of cats was a recog nized habit and the custom was to allow them to roam about freely." so the responsibility was on the owner of the pigeons.


