URGES PRECAUTION IN PREVENTION OF CHRISTMAS FIRES

Stacey Wade Issues Plea to Public to Use Caution During the Holidays to Prevent Fire

Raleigh, Dec. 22.—(AP)—A plea for the use of caution during the Christmas holiday season, in order that "fires and resultant tragedies" may be prevented was voiced here today by Stacy W. Wade, insurance commissioner of the state.

Mr. Wade emphasized the danger of allowing children to have fireworks, pointed out the danger of candles and combustible material on Christmas trees, and made suggestions for safe guarding life and property during the season.

"Candles on Christmas trees, flimsy, combustible decorations and fireworks have all turned Christmas mirth and merriment into sorrow and gloom by causing fires during the Yuletides of the past."

The Insurance Commissioner emphasized in this statement the excitement of children during the Christmas holidays, and especially on Christmas morning, and urged the importance of parents' close watching them.

"Christmas of 1925 will soon have come and gone," reads the Insurance Commissioner's plea for a safe Christmas, "therefore may the Christmas joy, happiness, and contentment be ours as never before, with no fires or untoward circumstances to mar the Yuletide spirit and pleasure. To help bring about these conditions, let us be careful with everything that tends to cause fire or accidents."

"Keeping fires and resultant tragedies out of the home during the Christmas holidays means eliminating, as far as practicable, the causes which have been the beginning of such occurrences in the past."

"The greatest danger in this part of the country has been due to the use of fireworks by children, and the answer to this is obvious. Do not let the children have fireworks, and to keep them from having them, tell them of the danger and of the depravity of using them as a means of celebrating the birth of Jesus. Add to this a little watchfulness."

"Next in order, come the Christmas tree, in my opinion one of the most sacred and beautiful customs of the home."

"A green pine tree will not burn readily and light on it makes a beautiful reflection. Cedar and holly will both burn rapidly, and should never have highly inflammable decorations. Untreated cotton should never be used as snow, the tinsel bought in the stores being cheap, much more effective, and not so subject to rapid combustion."

"Candles on Christmas trees, flimsy, combustible decorations, and fireworks have all turned Christmas mirth and merriment into sorrow and gloom by causing fires during the Yuletides of the past. To what extent and where this shall be in 1925 depends on each one of us—all of us. Will you do your part to prevent it?"

"Electric lights are far better than candles, but if a long string is used, have the wiring inspected by a competent person before attaching. This will eliminate overloading the wires and fuses. It is dangerous to use lighted candles on cedar and holly."

"If there is an open fire or stove in the room where the tree is, it would be best to protect it with metal screens and be very, very particular when the little fellows in winter pajamas and nighties run in Christmas morning, and do not let them get close to the open fire or hot stove while so dressed, as their clothing might catch fire. DOUBLE TRACK SYS. COMPLETED

Track Extends From
Richmond, Va., to
Jacksonville, Fla.

New York, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad today announced completion of the double track system between Richmond, Va., and Jacksonville, Fla., the main project and a \$104,000,000 improvement program which has been carried out since the closing of the war without any new financing.

Scheduled originally for completion in 1917, the work on the project has been advanced two years to keep pace with the traffic demand resulting from the Florida boom.

Vice President Borden, of the Atlantic Coast Line, also announced that 29 additional miles of second track south of Jacksonville and three miles near Atlanta would be ready for use in a few weeks, that approximately 160 miles of new line in Florida territory was under construction, and the work on an additional 40 miles opening a Florida gateway to the northwest would begin for January 1.

FRANK A. MUNSEY DIED TODAY AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Veteran Newspaper Publisher Dies From Peritonitis Following Operation for Appendicitis

New York, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Frank A. Munsey, newspaper publisher, died shortly before seven o'clock this morning in the Lenox Hill hospital.

Mr. Munsey had been suffering from peritonitis, which developed following an operation for appendicitis on December 13. Up to the last his physicians held out hope for his recovery, but early today he suffered a sinking spell and the end came within a short time.

Mr. Munsey rallied apparently from the operation for appendicitis, but peritonitis set in shortly afterward, but Mr. Munsey continued to make a valiant fight. Last Sunday he underwent a secondary operation and seemed to be holding his own until yesterday when he suffered a relapse. The publisher rallied from a sinking spell at midnight, but again suffered a relapse about four o'clock this morning. The end came peacefully and apparently without much suffering.

Mr. Munsey retained his faculties until the final relapse. He requested that his sister not be sent for because of her great age and weakened condition.

Young Americans Competing Produce Best Short Cotton

Adana, Southeast Asia Minor, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Correspondence of The Associated Press.—Three young Americans, who have faith in the future of Adana, are engaged in a competition with the Belgians and Turks to attain the highest efficiency in producing the best short cotton. They are Robert H. McDowell, of New York; Thomas H. Bower, of Midvale, Pa.; and Ivy E. Valentine, of Waxahatchee, Texas.

Under the name of the Anatolian Cotton Corporation, the Americans are completing the construction of a \$100,000 plant designed to gin 15,000 bales of cotton monthly. It stands between a Belgian and a Turkish owned plant.

All three plants are equipped with the latest American machinery, but all of different types and by different makers. All three are guarded jealously, lest a rival should discover the type of machinery and the degree of success the competitor is making in producing the best cotton after it is ginned. The cotton is the short "bolly" variety and the annual crop is 150,000 bales.

Adana was once on the Roman military road to the east and its only reminder of ancient days is a magnificent stone bridge of the time of Justinian. It has 20,000 people, and is enjoying a revival of commerce, owing to its growing importance as a cotton center.

Picking Out Genius

Professor Terman, assisted by psychologists, has selected, in California, the 1,000 most highly gifted children of the state, and now asks for \$5,000,000 for educational facilities, "to give genius a chance."

The professor, and many other, think too much is spent to educate "stupid and mediocre" children that never will amount to much any how. The suggestion is to begin at the beginning and discourage the birth of so many children, both of ordinary, inferior people.

How the 1,000 young geniuses are selected is not generally known. But it is probable that some of the California youthful geniuses have escaped attention.

Genius is often unrecognized even in adults, until after death. As for recognizing it in childhood, how would you have picked out Lincoln, Edison, or Marconi among other children.

And as to discouraging the birth of children among "mediocre" people, how will you recognize mediocrity? Do you judge by the outside of the bungalow, or the at parent financial prosperity? If so, you might have kept off the cart that same Lincoln, born in a shanty with no windows and in a bed resting on a dirt floor.

Better, perhaps let nature alone. She is the best judge of genius and the best children are those brought into the world by the strongest affection.

It is not the size of the automobile or bank account that tells.

To stabilize the French franc and protect French property owners is a great patriotic French task, suggested it would be a first mortgage for \$400,000,000 on all French industries. BUTLER RESIGNS COMMISSION IN MARINE CORPS

Resignation Will Have to Be Acted Upon by President Coolidge

Brigadier General Medley D. Butler today announced he had resigned from the Marine Corps in order to remain in Philadelphia as director of Public Safety and an hour later Mayor Kendrick made known that he would not accept the General in the position "as a resigned officer of the Marine Corps." The General was called into conference with the Mayor after his resignation became known. When he left the Mayor's office the General hurried to his own office and announced "the Mayor refused to accept me as a resigned officer of the Marine Corps." "Then you don't want me?" Butler said he asked the Mayor. "Not as a resigned officer," he quoted the Mayor as saying. "Now we see who has been smoked out," General Butler said.

"He refused to elaborate at the moment on this part of the Mayor's remark except to say that his resignation from the Marine Corps could be recalled."

Philadelphia, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Brigadier General Medley D. Butler today announced that he had resigned his commission in the Marine Corps and would remain in Philadelphia as director of the Department of Public Safety. The General sent his resignation to Washington last night.

Washington, Dec. 22.—(AP)—A resignation of Brigadier General Medley D. Butler from the Marine Corps will have to be acted upon by President Coolidge.

Officers at Marine Corps headquarters, while having no definite knowledge that the resignation was eminent, expressed no great surprise as it had been apparent that the General wished to continue his Philadelphia post. The most recent instance which might be accepted as a precedent for action by the President was his acceptance of the resignation of Lieutenant Colonel Clarence Sherrill, who was made City Manager of the City of Cincinnati.

STATE LEADS IN NUMBER ACTIVE SPINDLE HOURS

Indicates Improved Business Conditions in Cotton Mill Industry in N. Car.

Raleigh, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Indicative of improved business conditions in the cotton mill industry in North Carolina, and of the comparative absence of labor troubles in this state, is the fact that, though North Carolina had only slightly more than half as many spinning spindles in place on November 30 as Massachusetts, she led that state in the total number of active spindle hours during November.

Figures compiled by the United States Department of Commerce, and just received here, show that on November 30, the Bay State led all others in the number of spinning spindles in place, with 11,614,324. North Carolina came second, the figure for this state being 6,937,396.

But North Carolina led Massachusetts in the active spindle hours for November by nearly 100,000,000 hours. The figure for this state was 1,624,177,089 hours, while that for Massachusetts was 1,566,991,584. South Carolina, third in the list of state in the total number of spindles in place, also led Massachusetts in the number of active spindle hours, with 1,567,314,136 hours.

North Carolina also showed a better percentage of spindles active during the month than did the Bay State, her rival in the industry. Of Massachusetts 17,614,324 spindles, 6,693,516 were active during the month, as compared with 937,396 spindles in North Carolina, of which 5,708,862 were active. South Carolina showed an even larger percentage of active spindles. In that state, 5,267,314 spindles were in place, out of 5,328,724 in place.

South Carolina also led in the average number of active spindles hours per spindle in place during the month. The average in that state was 294. North Carolina came fifth, with 269, while the figure for Massachusetts was 135.

In the entire United States, there were 37,919,358 spinning spindles in place on November 30, of which 32,892,394 were operated at some time during the month, compared with 32,425,296 for October, 31,551,630 for September, and 31,358,088 for November of 1924.

The aggregate number of active spindle hours reported for the month was 7,832,792,613. During November, the normal time of operation was 24 1-2 days. Yellowance being made for the observance of Thanksgiving Day in some localities combined with 26 3-4 for October, 25 1-2 for September and 26 each for August, July, and June.

Based on an activity of 8.73 hours per day, the average number of spindles operated during November was 6,417,612, or at percent capacity on a single shift basis. This percent compares with 89.4 for October, 83.8 for September, and 87.8 for November of 1924.

Project for Polar Flight Presented to War Dept.

Washington, Dec. 22.—(AP)—A project for a Polar flight had been presented to the War Department by William D. Munn, chief engineer for Henry Ford, but officers have decided that Congressional authority would be necessary for Government participation.

Mr. Munn discussed the project with both Secretary Davis and Major General Patrick, chief of the Army Air Service, suggesting that the army should send flying equipment and personnel. The question was referred to the Legal Bureau of the War Department and an adverse opinion was given.

The proposal was for a trans-polar non-stop flight from Alaska to Spitzbergen next spring. On the basis of legal opinion, Mr. Munn was advised that if Congress acted favorably on the resolution authorizing the War Department to lend equipment and personnel it would do so.

420 Persons Are Given Work During Week

Raleigh, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The State-Federal Employment service placed 420 persons in employment during the week ending December 19, the report of the week's activities made public by the Commissioner of Labor and Printing today shows.

RAW MATERIAL WASTED IN U. S., WRITES GERMAN

Paul Loebe, President of Reichstag, Gives His Views After His Tour of America

Berlin, Dec. 21.—"Europe's mission has been taken over by America. The United States of America is steadily and persistently dislodging Europe as the technical and economic pioneer of the world and a capitalistic civilization of gigantic dimensions is not opposed by an efficient political labor movement."

With these words, Paul Loebe, president of the German Reichstag, in an article of the Vorwarts, summarizes his impressions gained during a visit to the

United States as a delegate to the Interparliamentary Union.

Call U. S. Wasteful
Dwelling on the "amazing" activity in house building, road construction and development of transport systems, describing the Ford works as "putting out motor cars like grasshopper swarms."

Loebe holds that the United States wastes its raw materials. "It still looks as if the enormous natural resources were inexhaustible. The land is in firm hands, we were told, but we rode through districts for miles and miles, which no hand seems to have touched, to say nothing of the swamps of New Jersey, Virginia, and the deserts of Ontario."

"Over there in the west, we were told by Chicagoans, who look down a bit on the easterner as influenced by European culture, over there New America grows up, where the land is more fertile and the climate more favorable."

"Technique, organization, maximum efficiency and success is everything. The standard of life of our American colleagues is undoubtedly higher. The bulk of the masses can afford to dress better and take better and more food than our workers."

"But beyond that?—With gramophone, radio and films the American worker's claim to life is exhausted. The rest belongs to the manager, proprietor, trust or banking magnate. Down in the ground floor a butcher kills pigs by the thousands, soaked with blood all over, and upstairs, in the fifteenth floor the monarch of the factory occupies his throne, a gentleman with distinguished manners and well-cultivated hands, who draws millions from the gruesome work of his employee."

"And all this is poured over with a strange mixture of piety, placing a Bible on the bedroom table of every hotel guest, opening every parliamentary session with a prayer, a piety, however,

which is symbolized by the fact that four office buildings of about 200 metre height look down with pity upon a church tower of some seventy metres."

Call Labor Weak.

"In this mammoth atmosphere labor movement, contrary to the assertions of clerical congregations, is, politically speaking only a very light counterweight opposite Almighty capital. The world war and discord shattered the beginning of a political labor movement. Some time ago Socialists occupied seven amongst forty-two aldermen seats in New York City, today they have none. The same goes with all other big cities. Social papers fight a laborious, hopeless battle against the big capitalist papers. Election meetings of our American comrades, which we attended, revealed that the present status of the American Labor Movement is not much better than ours."

"What is the reason for this weakness?—The active part of German and British labor in the United States stakes all its hopes on reaching its aims by individual activity. It has, therefore, no interest in class-war. Success of some individuals of lower class, singled out by fate, intoxicates the masses. The influx of working masses incapable of organizing themselves, continues, Negroes, Chinamen, Greeks, Italians and other Balkan natives form a large percentage of American labor."

"Europe's mission has been taken over by America. I forecast that the Social powers, still latent, may one day develop as eruptively as business today."

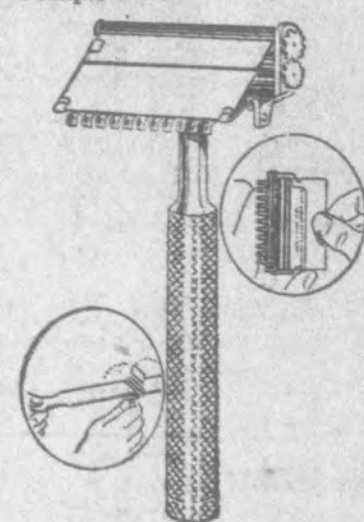

FEW REFORMED MEN IN CONGRESS

Washington, Dec. 21. (AP.)—
The village youth who pastes a pic-
ture of his "best girl" on the wind
shield of his automobile, would
think he had a lot of love-love com-
pany if he stood on the sidewalk
outside the White House grounds
while guests were entering for a
formal party at the Executive Man-
sion. One of the invariable rules
is that people arriving in cars must
have the card invitation to the af-
fair displayed on the windshield.
This is to facilitate handling the
line of traffic by the police posted
about the premises. No card a-
gainst the glass, no getting in to
the party.

Two youths garbed in brand new
hand-me-downs and conspicuously
from out of town paused at the
northwest entrance to the White
House lawn the other evening as
guests were spinning through to
attend a social gathering at which
the President and Mrs. Coolidge
were hosts. "Must be something
going in," said one lad. "We came
down to see everything; let's go
right in."

But an officer at the gate asked
politely, "Your card, please?" The
boys looked blank. "Ain't it free?"
one demanded. "Not tonight," the
guard replied in kindly tone. "Come
around tomorrow and stay as long
as you like." Which seemed to
square things with the young visi-
tors from out of town, for they de-
parted in fine fettle.

A little unusual missionary work
is being done at the National Cap-
itol just now by confidential agents

of the traction interests of the
land. This new activity—for it is
new so far as relation of the mat-
ter to federal legislation is con-
cerned—results from the efforts of
Washington's new traffic director
to compel traction lines to obey
the "boulevard stop" regulations
laid down for autos.

Director Eldridge has made stren-
uous efforts to have street cars halt
at designated boulevards, but offi-
cials of the two systems here have
refused to obey his orders. There-
fore, the thing goes to Congress,
which is the board of aldermen for
Washington, Rep. Blanton of Tex-
as, who loves a rough-and-tumble
fight, is espousing the cause of El-
dridge and there are predictions
that the traffic director will win
out. Hence the interest of street
cars company officials elsewhere
in the situation. They argue that
if lines here are required to obey
rules generally applied to auto-
mobile only, it will be but a short
time until the Washington prac-
tice spreads throughout the coun-
try.

"It's a funny situation," declared
a Buffalo traction representa-
tive here for a conference on the
subject. "We got lambasted 25
hours of every day for not carry-
ing passengers faster, and the other
hour sees us catching it be-
cause we don't want to slow up
travel."

The gored individual who sizes
for "something else to read" might
come to town and start in on the
offerings of the Library of Con-
gress, which contains at this time
a little smaller of 6,400,000 publi-
cations. This institution is said to
be the greatest, if not the oldest,
library in all the world. It is, in-
deed, one of the newest, for only
a little more than a century ago
Congress started in with a small
collection of volumes—nearly all
official reports of its own sessions
—and the Library of Congress has
thrived since suffered from disas-
trous fires. Yet today it is one of
the true marvels of the earth's
capitals. And it is no staid re-
sident for merely the lovers of heavy
literature. The boyish devotee of
Diamond Dick tales, the maiden
who does on love fiction, the sharp-
nosed and bespectacled dapper into
erotic French "classics"—all these
will find as much to enthral them
in the Library of Congress as does
the most erudite student of politics,
the arts, science and philosophy.

Recently a second-hand book
store manager was approached by
a caller who asked for a rare nov-
el of Washington life, published
some two years ago. "Never heard
of it," the expert declared, al-
though these owners of many sec-
ond-hand books know about all
there is to learn concerning liter-
ary output. "Better go to the li-
brary of Congress for it." The vis-
itor looked alarmed. "Holy smoke!"
he exclaimed. "They wouldn't have
it over there, I hope." But he
wanted to read the volume, so he
wended his way to the stately pile
under the gold dome across the
street from the Capitol. And he
found his book.

That extra \$20 a month which
members of Congress are drawing
now in salary increase as a result
of their generosity to themselves
last session is appreciated, of
course. It may not pay rent, nor
most luncheon bills for the enter-
tainment of all constituents who
drop in on their Representative
when "doing" Washington, nor
really balance any of the many big
items of expense which a Congress-
man must meet. But the additional
cash is handy to have around, any
way it is figured.

On the other hand, the increase
voted cabinet members is the same
bill isn't of much moment. The
expenses of the members of the
President's official family are so
great that tacking a little matter
of a few hundred dollars to the
portfolio income makes slight dif-
ference.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

London, Dec. 22.—(L. N. S.)—Two Royal cradles are expected to have new occupants in the near future.

Princess Mary, Viscountess Lascelles, is expecting a further addition to her family which will make her the mother of three children. The Duchess of York is hoping for her first born.

In the case of Princess Mary, the happy event is expected to take place at the new house at Newmarket. This house formerly belonged to Richard Marsh, King George's former trainer of horses, but when Viscount Lascelles took on this job, then, Egerton House, as it is known, was enlarged and made over to the young royal couple.

The house has just been newly decorated and furnished and it is now one of the most charming country houses near London. The style of the interior is very simple but a beautiful note of color is struck throughout, and Queen Mary, always a great collector of furniture, has contributed many of her choicest pieces.

While Princess Mary has chosen to go to the country, the Duchess

of York is in residence at Curzon House, London, one of the most beautiful mansions in the metropolis. The expected event will be very popular throughout Britain because the young Duchess has made herself extraordinarily popular everywhere and her wit and pleasant manner have made her a most useful addition to the royal family.

A part from this, with the Prince of Wales still unmarried, the Duke of York stands next in the succession to the throne and a child of his would take precedence after him. So it is well within the range of probability that the child of the Duchess may succeed to the throne of England.

High hopes of a similar event were raised a year ago, but were disappointed. After that the Duke and Duchess had a long tour through the healthy areas of East Africa and it is hoped throughout Britain that no disappointment will occur on the present occasion.

Dusky inhabitants of the wilds of Uganda, Africa, whose liking for human flesh was once so strong are to be taught American industrial education methods.

Archdeacon Henry Mathers, who has established more than 300 schools among the Bagishu tribes of Uganda, and who has recently been in the United States studying industrial education there, is shortly returning to Uganda to put the ideas he has gleaned in the United States into force there.

He plans to build further schools for the natives, and the go-ahead methods of the United States will be as far as possible incorporated in the curriculum.

The Bagishu tribe is numerous and cannibalistic at heart, and it is suspected that cannibalism is still secretly practiced for not more than 5 per cent of the clan chiefs are Christians.

The natives who attend the schools have to pay a fee of so many bananas per week, according to their age and teaching. When the Archdeacon first went to Uganda he had much difficulty in persuading the natives that he did not make delectable eating, but states that now he has them well trained and they wear at least a little clothing.

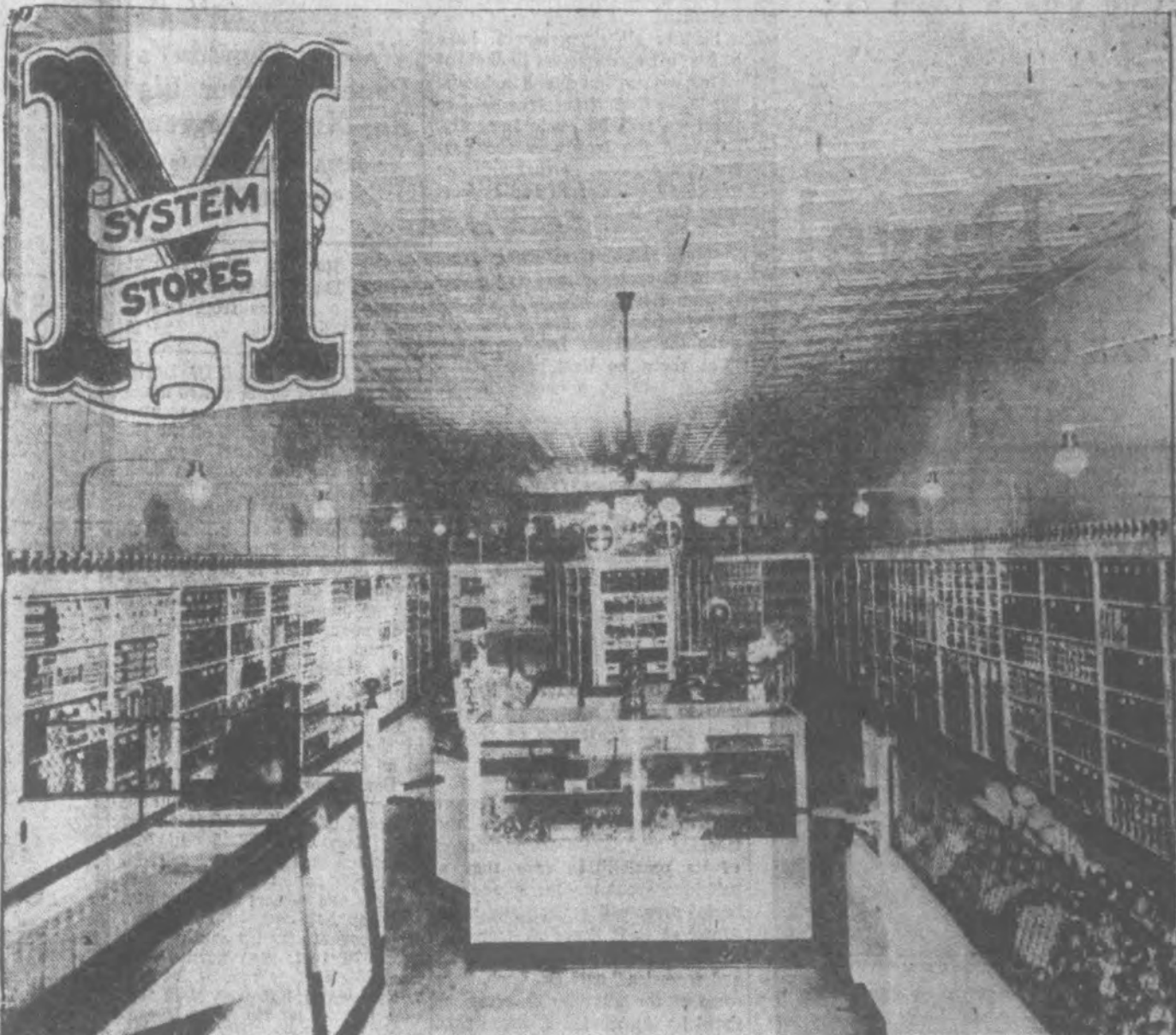

after them.

"Take care of the paper and other inflammable wrapping when taken from around the packages when opened, and do not let this accumulate anywhere in the house see that the furnace room, if you have a furnace, is not made a receptacle for much wrappings and keep it clean and clear of all rubbish during this season, when you will have big fires going.

"By all means have the Christmas tree erected by a grown person and made secure, the falling Christmas tree being the great danger, and as far as possible, let grown persons detach the presents, instead of letting the children tug and snatch at the tree.

"If, after all the warning you have had, you still persist in using lighted candles, do not let the children light them, and do not leave the room while they are lighted.

"Under all circumstances, have a fire extinguisher or bucket of water with a dipper and a broom handy, so that if the tree catches fire, you will be ready instantly.

"Place the tree near the center of the room, so that you can get to all sides of it, and be certain that it is away from any open fire or hot stove.

"Keep decorations away from all lights and fires and remember that an electric light bulb will set tissue paper on fire. Do not wrap the globes. Let 'em shine. "Let there be light."
