BALMY DIXIE IS VISITED BY COLD **BLAST FROM NORTH**

Three Deaths From Cold Reported From Kentucky, Florida Also Affected by Cold Wave.

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 28 .-- (AP.) -A decidedly cold blast from the frozen north prevailed today in the unusually balmy and pleasant Dixie. The entire south was affecte by the chilling breezes, even to Florida, which boosts a summer temperature the year around. The western portion of the south bare the blunt of the cold wave but the temperatures in the eastern portion were steadily dropping, indicating that it would feel the cold wave before another day was done. Zero weather and even sub zero temperatures were felt in some places, principally those toward the border line and in the mountains. Louisville, Kentucky. the northern out coast of Dixie, reported six below, while Bristol, Va., and Asheville, N. C., both raw the zero mark nearby. At one o'clock this morning the temperature at Bristol was two

Comparatively little suffering was reported from any portion of the south, although such low temperatures are rare and found defective a little prepared for it. Three deaths in Kentucky from the cold were reported.

Charlotte, Dic. 28 .- (AP.) --The coldest December 28 in 47 years was registered here at five a. m., the thermometer showing 9 1-2 dgrees above zero. No relief from the cold wave was promised today by the local weather bureau.
