ICY BLASTS OF WINTER BACKED BY WARM SUN

"Slow Rising Temperatures" Forecast From Every Section of State Today

Charlotte, Dec. 29.—(AP)—A warmer sun beamed down today and relentlessly backed the icy blasts of winter that have held North Carolina and its neighbors for the last few days. "Slow rising temperatures" were the forecast that came from every section of the state this morning. Already this prediction was being born out when the lowest reading of the day at Charlotte was 13 degrees above at 5:30 a. m., compared with 9 1/2 degrees at 5:00 o'clock yesterday.

Raleigh found relief with 16 degrees registered at seven o'clock. Other cities of the state also were more comfortable. Asheville, Winston-Salem, Wilmington, and Greensboro all looked forward to the promise of "fair and warmer."

Temperatures for other cities include:

Gastonia 13 degrees at six a. m.; Salisbury eight at six a. m.; Winston-Salem nine at seven a. m.; and Hickory nine at six a. m., while at Asheville it was light above at six o'clock.

China in Throes Birth of a Spirit of Nationalism

Nashville, N. C., Dec. 29.—(AP)—China is in the throes of the birth of a spirit of nationalism, and, like the young boy, just coming to manhood, who thinks he knows more than his father or any older head, China wants to run her own affairs without advice or interference from other nations, declared Rev. Wesley E. Smith, returned missionary in a lecture here.

Mr. Smith, who is a Southern Methodist missionary stationed at Changshu, has been a resident of China for the past fifteen years. He is now in this country on furlough.

Referring to China's nationalistic birth, Mr. Smith declared: "To be a good father to a son at such a time of life means allowing the boy to go his own way, even if he does make mistakes, and yet standing by to help him out of trouble. And that is what a real friend to China must do in the face of the situation today."

"Unless a man is ready to lay aside his pride and self-conceit and to stand by and help without letting the Chinese know he is helping, he is not the man to go to China today as a missionary," declared the speaker.

The first demonstration of the student movement, said Mr. Smith, made in 1919 against the inroads of Japan upon China, was led largely by Chinese students and was popularized by the patriotic demand for honesty and integrity among Chinese officials. Mr. Smith's personal belief is that the labor element was introduced into the movement in 1925 for a two-fold reason—to pull together all the warring Chinese factions, and to burn off foreign nations. It was not necessarily the result of the spread of Bolshevistic ideas, he said.

"The idea of China for the Chinese, was one that would appeal to all classes, high and low, and for this reason it has been stressed in an effort to unite all Chinese against a common foe. The question in China today is, 'Shall a man be a patriot or a foreign slave?'"

Missionaries are in sympathy with the spirit of nationalism, the speaker said. And he cited, as an example, the fact that at a recent meeting of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, missionaries unanimously voted to waive all claims to protection under the "toleration clauses" in treaties with foreign countries, and that this act has been officially approved by the board of missions of the church.

PREDICTS RISE IN STONE MOUNTAIN MEMORIAL COINS

Gibbs Thinks Coin Will Sell for \$2 by February First

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 29.—(AP)—Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial coins will be sold for \$2 instead of one dollar after February first, it was predicted today by J. Wilson Gibbs, director of the Harvest Campaign for South Carolina.

Although no official announcement to this effect has been made by the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial Association, Mr. Gibbs said he based his prediction upon his knowledge of the plans of the Association.

"The Harvest Campaign will close January 23," Mr. Gibbs said. "On that date the South will have had one year in which to purchase the memorial half dollar for one dollar."

"My judgment is that the Association will advance the price to \$2.00."

An Apology to Judge A. Dunn

Old China is becoming modern, industrialized by western money machinery, in China, with her labor army at twenty cents a day, will make other nations think hard about protection.

That is a nation on wheels, how long will the gasoline last. What will take its place?

Twenty million two hundred thousand automobiles are in use here now. New York State comes first with 1,500,000 cars and trucks. California in second with only a third of New York's population has almost as many. Perfect roads, thousands of miles of them, perfect of garages explain that.

Locomotive and Five Coaches of A. C. L. Passenger Train No. 181 Leaves Track

Wilmington, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Thirteen persons were injured, none seriously, in the wreck of Atlantic Coast Line passenger train number 181 early this morning near Cades, S. C. The locomotive and five coaches left the track, the derailment being caused by a broken rail. Five passengers, the engineer and fireman, and six other employees of the A. C. L., were slightly injured. The passengers were derailed and continued on their journey.

HOPE FOR EARLY END COAL STRIKE REVIVED TODAY

Representatives of Miners and Operators Gather for First Meet Since Deadlock Last Summer

New York, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Hope for early resumption of miners in the Anthracite Coal Fields of Pennsylvania, was revived today as Representative of miners and operators gathered for their first meeting since the deadlock at Atlantic City last summer.

Separate informal conferences of the two groups of six men each preceded the actual meeting between the negotiators, scheduled to begin at three o'clock this afternoon here. Alvan Markle, chairman of the joint negotiations Committee, who called the meeting, was designated to preside over the joint session. Mr. William Inglis, chairman of the Anthracite Operators headed the operators' delegation and John L. Lewis, international president of the United Mine Workers, headed the union group.

New York, Dec. 29.—(AP)—William W. Inglis, spokesman for the Anthracite operators' conference and chairman of its negotiating committee, said today that the operators were willing to open their books for public inspection.

Separate conferences were held by the operators and the miners representatives today preparatory to the joint session scheduled to begin at three o'clock here.

Mr. Inglis said he thought the differences between the two groups would be settled during the negotiations in this city without future conferences being held anywhere else.

He revealed that since the negotiations were broken off at Atlantic City he had held three secret conferences with John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America. He said the operators had come to New York in a hopeful spirit, being neither optimistic nor pessimistic.

When Mr. Lewis arrived shortly before noon at the hotel where the miners held the separate conferences, he declined to discuss the impending negotiations. The general attitude of the miners' representative was neither that of optimism nor pessimism.

Results of the Federal Trade Commission investigation into the condition of marketing Virginia and Carolina Tobacco, investigating and special reports have been placed before President Coolidge and by him have been transmitted to the Attorney General for study.

While the president has felt it desirable to obtain the Justice Department views upon the Commission's report, it was emphasized that no inference should be drawn that disclosure of criminality in the trade has been made. Originally the Trade Commission was engaged in investigating charges that monopoly existed in purchases of the bright tobacco leaf. The Commission examiners however also investigated the handling of tobacco by the Co-operative Association of growers with the result that a reconsideration of the entire work was demanded and granted to the Co-operative organization.

The report to the president is understood to include findings both as to the method of the manufacturing purchasers and those of the local co-operative societies which assembled the tobacco from the farmers.

Along with the dismissal of the Wheeler indictment, the court also threw out the charges against Edwin S. Booth, former Solicitor of the Interior Department, and Gordon Campbell, of Montana, who were indicted jointly with him. The three men were charged with conspiring to defraud the Government in connection with the obtaining of oil and gas land permits.

Today's decision leaves Senator Wheeler free of all charges unless the Government should succeed in winning an appeal to the higher court. Whether such a step will be attempted was not made clear, but the Wheeler case is expected to be developed, the court, Mr. Dutton said.

OCEAN CITY, MD. APPEARS DOOMED BY FIRE TODAY

Two Hotels and Several Residential Blocks in Ruin; South West Gale Is Fanning the Flames

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 29.—(AP)—A section of Ocean City, Md., including two hotels and several residential blocks appeared doomed by fire at noon today. The Ocean City Central Telephone office was out of commission shortly after the fire started. Reports from the near telephone to the fire said that the Seaside Hotel and the Atlantic Hotel both were in flames. Officials of the telephone company here also received reports later that the Atlantic and Seaside Hotels had been destroyed, and that the resort pier, the water works, and the electric plant were in ruin. The telephone exchange was still standing they said, but cables had been burned through. A south west gale was reported fanning the flames.

WHEELER WINS IN LONG FIGHT

Succeeds in Having All Prospective Settlers Ask About Climate

Washington, Dec. 29.—(AP)—What is the first question a prospective settler asks about a new state or section? One of the first it would seem, is "What about the climate?" At any rate, that is the question that many persons outside North Carolina are inquiring about with reference to this state. "I am thinking of locating in North Carolina. Can you give me information about the climate in that state," and generally there is some question with reference to a particular locality. That is the general tone of literally hundreds of letters received by the local weather bureau during the past year.

Hardly a day passes without one or more such inquiries, said Lee A. Denson, meteorologist. It would appear, therefore, that outsiders are interested not only in North Carolina roads, North Carolina schools, North Carolina farming advantages, but also in North Carolina weather conditions, and of course, with North Carolina's wide variety of climate, the meteorologist's replies are as varied as the inquiries about which inquiries are made. A particularly large number of inquiries are received asking about climatic conditions on the coast, Mr. Denson said.

SAYS PERSHING'S PRESENT HEALTH IS SATISFACTORY

Contemplates a Visit to Washington for Purpose of Dental Treatment

Tacna, Chile, Dec. 29.—(AP)—The health of General Pershing at present is satisfactory. Although a visit by him to Washington is contemplated, it will be dependent entirely upon the Tacna-Arica Plebiscitary situation. General Pershing is the neutral chairman of the Plebiscitary situation. It is understood that General Pershing during the past two or three months has been in contemplation of a visit to Washington, but it is asserted in authoritative circles here that an absence from his duties will take into consideration developments here since he does not desire in any way to hinder the proceedings of the Commission until it is absolutely necessary. It is understood that General Pershing's health is such as will enable him to continue full activities on the Commission and that there is not the slightest ground for anxiety regarding him.

Washington, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Formal announcement of return of General Pershing to the United States was made today by the State Department.

The purpose of the trip of General Pershing from Africa, where he was endeavoring to settle the Chiloé boundary dispute, was officially at the Department of the Interior for the purpose of allowing him to receive dental treatment, and that of his general health was known to have been poor during his long sojourn in South America.

The position was taken that the condition of General Pershing's blood pressure, which has caused some anxiety among his friends here, was a subject upon which the Department could not comment. It was emphasized that General Pershing's return had no particular diplomatic significance and that was every indication that he would return to his work at Africa.

Says Football Comes First in University

Chicago, Dec. 29.—(AP)—Football is first and mathematics is not even a poor second in the American University, in the opinion of Professor William J. Miller, of Amherst. His analysis was made before the American Association of College Professors meeting here.

"Football builds stadium. Mathematics can't even build residence hall," he said. "Colleges have taken over the appearance of country clubs in full blast where students may expect to find recognition and build future tomes."

"Mummi should be kept away from the student body because they emphasize too much the world of money."

"The students have lost respect for learning. Even if public looks askance at the teacher. No self-respecting man with ability would be caught teaching school. That is a refuge for the incompetent. The man goes out making money. He condemns the public demand for education that teaches practical business at home making. New Haven, Conn., Dec. 29. (I. N. S.)—Yale's new Gothic building for the Peabody Museum of Natural History was formally dedicated on December 29 with ceremonies attended by many scientific organizations, including the Geological Society, the Society of American Naturalists, and the American Association of Museums.

On the preceding day President Angell delivered an address of welcome to the delegates on behalf of the University. On the 29th, Henry Fairfield Osborn, of the American Museum of Natural History spoke on the development of paleontology, especially in its relation to biology, and Dr. Schuchert, Emeritus Professor of Paleontology, and Secretary of the Museum Trustees on the historical aspect of the building and institution. Professor Edward Salisbury Dana, President of the Board of Trustees, formally presented the Museum to the University, and Professor Lull, director of the Museum, explained the layout of the building.

the Pierson-Sage Square, with spacious lawns about it, replaces the historic Peabody Museum at High and Elm Streets, which was demolished in 1917 to make room for the Memorial Quadrangle. The collections, which have been in storage since then are completely re-installed and the Museum is now ready to resume its full activity.

Distinctive features of the Peabody Museum include the collections of fossil backboneed animals, largely assembled by Professor Marsh, which are among the most noted in the United States and second only to those of the American Museum of Natural History in New York.

The museum possesses the second largest collection of fossil footprints in the world. It possesses an almost unique collection of the jaws and teeth of tiny animals which existed during the Age of Reptiles. Its collection of invertebrate paleontology has few equals among American museums. It has one of the largest collections of meteorites in this country representing more than 200 distinct falls and including the famous, Gibbe meteorite from Texas, weighing more than 1,000 pounds. It also possesses the only Aztec calendar stone outside of Mexico, one of the only three in existence.

The Peabody Museum contains the first dinosaur ever mounted in America, the first flying dragons ever unearthed in America, and the first fossil horses ever found here. Among these is a specimen of a mature and perfect fossil horse not over two feet in height, which scientists have recognized as unmistakable evidence of the change in living animals from one genus to another.

These last-named treasures were unearthed in the Rocky Mountain region by Professor Charles Othniel Marsh, a graduate of Yale in 1860, and later for over thirty years professor of paleontology at Yale, in a series of expedition undertaken between the years of 1869 and 1874.

Among the early collectors of material for Peabody Museum was Professor A. E. Verrill, who,

with his associates, made an extensive study of marine life on the Atlantic Coast, and collected more than 200,000 specimens for the Museum's Zoological cabinet. Many of these were obtained while Verrill was in charge of dredging for the United States Fisheries Commission. The University secured the complete Verrill collection in 1898.

The new Peabody Museum is to a greater extent than any other American institution, a museum of ideas illustrated by specimens, rather than a mere collection of curiosities, as the old fashioned museums used to be. Its collections are arranged not solely as a series of strange and phenomenal specimens but as a series of exhibitions through which the processes and law of nature may be observed and comprehended. A visitor to the Museum need not be a scholar to understand the scientific significance of what is being shown. The utmost pains have been taken to arrange labile and describe every exhibit so as to make clear the particular natural law or principle involved.

The rental collection has been under circulation all the time. Two of the books have been out three times during the week. Parade by Emily Post which is a story of New York Society, seems to be the best liked of the collection. Women by Tarkington also seems popular, and of course Zane Grey's Vanishing Americans is going to be off the shelf most of the time. In another week we hope to have other new books on the Rental collection shelf and also several new girl's and Boys books besides a few non-fiction books.

The new book cards also readers cards have come so we expect to be busy now for a while giving each book a new card, and hope soon to go over the list of readers cards and discard any that are not in use and give new cards to all library patrons.

Just a word about over due books. We find many books are out that should have been back in the library weeks ago. See if you have a library book over due and if so bring it back at once. Two cents per day doesn't seem great amount of money but it counts up to fourteen cents per week, so a few weeks negligence on your part and you have the price of a book to pay in fines, again we have had three definite complaints lately about persons coming to the library for books on some other card than their own. One person had a fine of about forty cents to pay because the book charged to her was taken out by some one else without her knowledge. We object to this practice, and as far as possible, we shall refuse to send books out except to owners of readers cards. Then there are persons who have borrowed a book and in turn have loaned the book to some one else who neglected to return the book, consequently the book is kept over time and in some cases lost. The library is the medium of exchange and gladly makes the exchange or notifies a patron when a called for book is in. Please be careful about using your own card only and about loaning a library book without the knowledge of the library.

Bainbridge Most Healthful City In the World

Bainbridge, Georgia, Dec. 29 by I. N. S.—Bainbridge a city of 7,000 inhabitants, is the most healthful city in the world, according to R. C. Ulmer, leading undertaker whose report on deaths among the white citizenry shows only 21 deaths within the city limits for 1925.

Five of these deaths were of persons around or above 80 years of age. Five deaths were due to automobile accidents, chronic diseases, child birth 2, 2 of colitis, 3 in infancy. One of peritonitis, making an average of a little less than two deaths a month.
