FIRE BALL OVER N.Y. UNHERALDED COMET IS BELIEF

Blazing Meteorite Believed to Have Fallen Near Ottawa.

New York, Dec. 30.—(AP)—A blazing meteorite or "fire-ball" which flashed out of the east across New York and New England yesterday leaving in its wake a trail of reports that an unheralded comet had paid the earth a visit, is believed to have fallen near Ottawa, Canada. Ralph Bellamy, Canadian Government Astronomer, said he would attempt to locate it today.

Reports that a comet was abroad in the heavens, were spread by thousands who saw the flaming trail left in the early evening sky and mistook it for a comet's tail. Scientists along the route asserted it was only a meteor, or perhaps a "fire-ball" whose appearances are frequent. It was scarcely luminous than the stars when it appeared over New York City about 5:30 p. m. Soon reports came that it had flashed over northern and central New York State, leaving behind a wisp of undulating pinkish "smoke" in the sky.

Astonished inquiries traced its course over New Haven, Conn., Providence and Boston, where it was said the meteor was visible for three minutes.

44 Children Unable Raise Funds To Bury Aged Father

Huntersville, N. C., Dec. 30.—(AP)—Although he was the father of 44 children, most of them living, when "Uncle" George Lynch, 83 years old, here, a few days ago, all the children were unable to raise enough funds among them to bury the old man, and it was necessary to call upon some of his "white folks" to finally raise the required sum.

After one of the sons had canvassed the two-score offsprings for funds with which to bury the old man, \$5 was still lacking of the amount needed, and white citizens subscribed this remaining amount.

The old man is believed to have had at least 150 grand-children, and his fifth wife, who survives him, was younger than some of the grand-children. He married the fifth time when he was 80 years old. His surviving wife is now 35. All the children were born of the first four unions.

"We have a list of 104 grand-children," John Lynch, a son of the fourth wife, and himself the father of 12, explained, "but that list was made a good many years ago, and since then I have had three more myself. I reckon don't nobody 'actly know how many grand-children the old man had, but—it is sho a big bunch of 'em."

He further explained that he knew there were at least 44 children, although he "couldn't call all their names," and wouldn't be sure he would know all of 'em.

MAY ESTABLISH BRANCH FEDERAL RESERVE BANK

Hearing on Proposal Announced for Jan. 15th; Will Serve South Western Portion District.

Washington, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Hearings on the establishment of and location of a branch of the federal reserve bank of Richmond, Va., to serve the south western portion of the fifth federal district, were announced for January 15th today by the Federal Reserve Board.

Announcement of a hearing January 15 by the Federal Reserve Board on the proposal to establish a branch of the fifth federal reserve bank of Richmond, was received with interest here.

It was recalled that more than a year ago the board of governors of the fifth district recommended the establishment of a branch bank in some city in the Carolinas, and the name of the January date for a hearing was accepted as in accordance with the understanding given district officials. No particular attention has been given yet to the sight of the bank, it is understood.

MR. S. T. EVERETT DIED YESTERDAY

One of Oldest Survivors of the Civil War Dies at Home Near Greenville.

Mr. Simon T. Everett, 83, died yesterday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at his home about twelve miles from Greenville near the Martin County line. Funeral services were conducted from his late home this afternoon, with interment following in the family burying grounds.

Mr. Everett, one of the oldest survivors of the Civil War, was one of the most prominent citizens of the county. He was a devout member of the Primitive Baptist Church and attended its services as long as health permitted. During the war of the Sixties he served three years and nine months without a furlough, the entire time being under Stonewall Jackson's command. He never failed to attend the Confederate Re-Unions held in this county. Notwithstanding his advanced years, the deceased was always active in his business affairs.

Mr. Everett is survived by two daughters, Mrs. John Parker and Mrs. Dora Everett. Among relatives who survive are two nephews, Senator S. J. Everett, of this city, and Representative R. O. Everett, of Durham.

Officers Capture Two Stills and Arrest One Man

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CHARGES AGAINST OFFICE PERSONNEL VETERANS BUREAU

Charlotte News Says Charges Against the Personnel of Bu- reau Located There Are of Sensational Nature

Charlotte, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The Charlotte News says that a formal complaint is now being drawn charging irregularity in "some cases" reprehensible conduct on the part of the office personnel of the North Carolina Division United States Veterans Bureau located here.

The information, according to the News, was obtained in some indisputable source.

The story says the charges are of a sensational nature, and that they "will inevitably lead to an investigation by the Government, is accepted as a matter of course by the few people who have learned of the incident and the charges that are to be made."

The story continues: "It can be stated positively that an investigator from the Civil Service Bureau at Washington was here recently and

visited the Veterans Bureau. That he has found has not been ruled, but it is known that he came here on the strength of complaint made to Washington. The officer was C. C. Hertzog, of the United States Civil Service Department at Washington."

"It can also be stated that Mrs. Carrie V. Paxton, who was formerly employed at the Bureau here, and who is reported to have been discharged without a cause so far as she knew, has been reinstated in good standing with the Civil Service Commission. Mr. Hertzog, visited here and that she now is filling a better position in the Otten Hospital near Asheville than she had with the Veterans Bureau here."

The News said that because of the fact "that the persons here having knowledge of the situation can not be quoted at present, the nature of the charges can not be divulged fully," but they included "irregularities in handling the applications of ex-service men who came to the Bureau for aid," and the further allegation that "relief for needy ex-service men in North Carolina is being seriously crippled by petty inner office jealousy and inefficiency that would cause surprise to the people of North Carolina."

Farm Machinery Subplants Horse American Farm

Washington, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The extent to which modern farm machinery continued to subplant the horse on American farms, was revealed today in figures made public by the census bureau showing that the number of horses on farms decreased 16 per cent during the past five years, or from 19,767,161 in 1920 to 16,555,759 in 1925. The number of mules however increased more than five per cent or from 5,432,391 to 5,730,608 during the same period.

tle do not do so conspicu-
ously, while many of those
who grow worse do not do
so at a rapid rate. The re-
sult depends on the kind of
a groove in which one is
running; for we do run in
grooves very largely. The
person moving on a plane
surface without any ruts to
hold him in his course is an
exception.
