WHISKEY VALUED

McGinnis Government Warehouse Is Robbed of 75 Barrels of Whiskey, After Seven Guards Had Been Overpowered

Westminster, Md., Jan. 4-(AP) -Federal operators for prohibition headquarters in Washington began today an investigation of the wholesale looting of the Mc-Gis Government warehouse, four miles from here where a hand of 50 men seized more than ! 75 harrels of whiskey valued at \$80,000 after overpowering zeven guards Saturday night.

Although federal agents had blocked the main road to the warehouse, the seizers drove their loaded machines through field around the barriers. An advance guard of three armed men captured and bound three guards as they appeared for duty Saturday night. Four others was soized near the warehouse an', hour !. and all telephone lines to the warehouse then were cut.

The remainer of the band then appeared in machines and trucks and worked throughout the night transferring the whiskey by elevator from the seventh floor of the building to the loading plat and 32 cases.

PRESIDENT ASKS APPROPRIATION ARMS CONFAB

\$50,000 Needed to Cover Expense of Participation in Disarmament Discussion

Washington, Jan. 4 .- (AP)-President Coolidge requested Congress today to appropriate \$50,-000 to cover the expenses of participation by the United States to the League of Nation's preliminary disarmament discussion.

"Participating the work of the preparatory Commission," the president said in a special message, "involves no commitment with respect to attendance upon any future conference or conferences on reducttion and limitation ences on reduction and limitation of this government in that regard can not be defined in advance of the calling of such meetings."

He added that "whether the conditions and circumstances will prove such as to make it desirable for the United States to attend any conference or conferences, which may eventually take place as a result of the labors of the preparatory commission, or otherwise is a question which need not now be considered.

'It is my judgment that so far as this preliminary inquiry is concerned, we ought to give our aid and co-operations to the fullest extent consistent with the policy which we have adopted."
