COLE PLEADS SELF DEFENSE ANSWER TO ORMOND SUIT

Denies Willful, Unlawful, Malicious, or Felonious Killing of William W. Ormond

Raleigh, Jan. 5 .- (AP) - William B. Cole, acquitted in R chmond county Superior Court on the charge of killing Wil iam W. Ormond, today filed his answer to the complaint of Rev. Arthur L. Ormond, father of the dead boy, in the \$150,000 damage suit brought by Rev. Ormond.

The answer denies wilful, unlawful, malicious or felonious killing of Ormand, and pleads relf defense. Cole's answer alleges that the death of Ormond was "proximately caused by the wrongful conduct and acts by the rlaintiff and his inestate" which 'immediately and directly contributed to his death.'

Defense attorneys in filing the answer in Wake Superior Court did not make the expected move to transfer the civil case to

ROBERT SCOTT IS LOCATED IN SAN

Hiding Under Assu ed Name of John Radding; Shows Considerable Emotion When Addressed as Scott

QUENTIN PRISON

Chicago, Jan. A .- (AP) - An invalid father last summer made frantic appeals by radio through newspapers, and friends for Robert Scott to come home and save his brother, Russell, doomed to die for a murder he said Robert committeed. The pleas were unbeeded, and Russel, once rated as a millionaire in Canada, was natched from the gallows by a last minute insanity ruling. Robert Scott could not have answered the appeal even hed he heard it Hiding under the assumed name of John Radding, he was serving a sentence in San Quentin California prison for robbery comm'tted in July, 1924. Now he will be brought back here to face trial on a murder indictment with prosecutors determined to fight for his death.



After you have digested the thought of a galaxy something more than a quintrillion of miles wide with a billion great suns whirling in it, our sun dragging the earth and you through the other, three to four million miles per year, there in more to digest.
