COLE PLEADS SELF DEFENSE ANSWER TO ORMOND SUIT

Denies Willful, Unlawful, Malicious, or Felonious Killing of William W. Ormond

Raleigh, Jan. 5.—(AP)—William B. Cole, acquitted in Richmond county Superior Court on the charge of killing William W. Ormond, today filed his answer to the complaint of Rev. Arthur L. Ormond, father of the dead boy, in the \$150,000 damage suit brought by Rev. Ormond.

The answer denies willful, unlawful, malicious or felonious killing of Ormond, and pleads self defense. Cole's answer alleges that the death of Ormond was "proximately caused by the wrongful conduct and acts by the plaintiff and his in-state," which "immediately and directly contributed to his death."

Defense attorneys, in filing the answer in Wake Superior Court did not make the expected move to transfer the civil case to another county.

In addition to denying all paragraphs of the complaint, the wealthy Rockingham man, whose trial last fall was one that attracted wide interest, alleges that he was acquitted by a jury of being guilty of any crime, whatever in the killing of Ormond.

Program Is Announced for Little Rock

Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 5.—(T. N. S.)—An extensive program of advancement for Little Rock has been outlined by Mayor Charles E. Moyer in an announcement of the municipal program for 1926.

The chief executive particularly turned the erection of an 1,000 watt radio broadcasting station for the city, through which the advantages of Arkansas and Little Rock may be broadcast to the world. EVELYN N. THAW DRINKS POISON

Attempts Suicide By Swallowing Eight Ounces of Poison; In Serious Condition

Chicago, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Evelyn Nesbit Thaw is in a serious condition in a hospital here today as a result of a suicide attempt made when she swallowed eight ounces of poison. She had been expected to leave for Florida Saturday night after finishing an engagement at a local cabaret.

Little hope was held out for her recovery. She drank the poison about five o'clock this morning in her apartment. Apparently regretting the act she telephoned for a physician who rushed to her apartment and had her removed to a hospital. Physicians said early today that she was unconscious when taken to the hospital. She drank nearly eight ounces of a powerful disinfectant.

Although it was reported that Evelyn had taken about eight ounces of disinfectant and was in a critical condition when she reached the hospital five hours later, her physicians said there was some hope for her recovery.

Her negro maid said Miss Nesbit's engagement at a local cafe was abruptly ended recently because of excessive drinking, but New Year's eve brought further celebration of the holidays and when Evelyn returned to her apartment after the New Year's noticed that her nose had been broken. She had not ceased to seek liquid diversion since that time, the maid said.

Provision Tax Reduction Bill Approved Today

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The provision in the House Tax Reduction bill increasing from \$10,000 to \$20,000 the limit of income on which the 25 per cent reduction on account of "earned incomes" might be applied, was approved today by the Senate Finance Committee.

Mass of Evidence Against Veteran's Bureau Collected

Charlotte, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The Charlotte News today says that a "mass of evidence" relating to the charges of irregularity in connection with the operation of the North Carolina Regional Office of the United States Veterans' Bureau has been collected by federal agents arriving here four days ago, from Washington.

The News adds that "reports said that two officials from the Civil Service Commission at Washington were engaged in making the inquiry." According to the stories the investigation has been conducted with great secrecy and "excellent progress made."

The News last week published stories that charges of irregularity were to be brought against the Veterans' Bureau. Officials, however, have denied the charges.

Professor McDuff, British, warns the Eugenics Congress not to push higher education too far. Not enough appropriate jobs for the well educated now, says he. Raising the general average of intelligence as much as ten per cent might be disastrous. The world needs more rough hands, fewer white collars.

All of which is as wrong as anything could be. Huxley's day laborer, to whom he sent a good microscope, would not have been ruined by education. And except in our aristocratic universities, the object of high education should not be merely making rich filaments and "pulling off a good job." Education, the rich find, produces results more important than a white collar.

When Aristotle, at seventeen, arrived in Athens, bringing the fortune inherited from his father Nichomachus, physician to the king of Macedonia, he came for knowledge. But his idea was not yet set polished up and hurry home to change his education into more money.

He hunted up Plato, studied with him, for as long as Plato lived about twenty years, and then set up teaching on his own account. He did get a job, for four years as private tutor to Alexander the Great, but not for the sake of cash. That Greek student from St. Agira developed what was probably the most powerful and remarkable brain in all this earth history. And that is worth while, although he never had a white collar around his neck.

The French will build to Sarah Bernhardt a monument well deserved.

Monuments to Joan of Arc and other female imitations of fighting men ought not to be the only monuments to women. Why not a few monuments to the mothers that have produced great men—Olympia, Nancy Hanks, "Bertha with the big feet," Lulie Ramoniz and the tanner's daughter who, son, William, took the Normans to Britain.

You would give Raphael a monument because he painted great pictures. Lincoln is to Nancy Hanks what the Statue Madonna is to Raphael. But nobody ever heard of the mothers that do the real work, and if you mention Nancy Hanks, men think of a trotting mare that broke records.

M. Celestine Fabbetti, marriage clerk in Rome, for 23 years, says marriage is an art, to know a man well watch him closely, when he pronounces the fatal "yes." Men are more afraid of marriage than women, says Fabbetti, and a child might know that.

Schopenhauer calls marriage a female conspiracy to make every man support some one woman at her life. That, says he, is why women are mercilessly cruel to other women that do not insist on marriage.

The fact is that marriage is a training school for men, women are the professors, and progress is slow. But since this world is it last, as Professor Moulton of Chicago University says, 1,000,000, 000,000,000 years more, there will be plenty of time to train husbands, assuming that we come back here, to live over again and that the marriage institution lasts which it will, by the end of a few billion years, every man, in one incarnation or another, will have married every woman on earth. After that, men and women should know their minds and live happily for the last billion years, at least.

The scientists that heard from the learned Chicago astronomer Moulton about the earth's probable age, one million billion years, practically all of it still ahead of us, heard also about the size of our corner of space, our "galaxy" in which the sun is a grain of sand.

It is shaped like a watch, its dimensions are thirty thousands light years through from front to back, two hundred million light years through the wide way, across (Continued on page 6)

MRS. TRINKLE IS RESTING QUIETLY AFTER OPERATION

Seriously Burned Yesterday When She Risked Her Life to Save Her Infant Son

Richmond, Va., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Mrs. Edward Lee Trinkle was reported as "resting comfortably" this afternoon after an operation this morning, and dressing of the injuries received yesterday when she was seriously burned about her hands and arms and received less serious burns on her face and neck in the fire which damaged the executive mansion here.

The Governor's wife underwent the operation with the same calmness that has characterized her every action since she risked her life yesterday in climbing to the third floor to awaken her son, Dr. A. M. Willis performed the painful operation today and Mrs. Trinkle watched him as he worked. Her nerves, which were on edge yesterday, after her harrowing experience, were steady and she is reported as much calmer today.

Dr. Willis, after the operation, expressed the belief that the burns on her face and neck will not leave scars, but the others were more serious.

Raleigh, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The coroner's jury, investigating the death here of Preston Rodger, Jr., on the night of December 30, will continue its investigation tonight at seven o'clock, at which time it is expected that the boy's mother will be questioned.

After examining five witnesses at the hearing last night the jury will continue its investigation tonight.

Solicitor Evans said that he wished to make further investigations before questioning Mrs. Rodger.

Grady L. Gilbert Is Being Sought Thruout States

Charlotte, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Searches today were being instituted throughout the two Carolinas for Grady L. Gilbert, of Rutherfordton, N. C., whose absence since Saturday morning is unexplained, and which was followed by the sudden death of his wife last night at Asheville. Mrs. Gilbert was taken to Asheville Sunday in a state of collapse and died last night.

Nashville Street Car Operators Make Record

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 5.—(T. N. S.)—Nashville street car operators established a world's record during the year 1925 for safe transportation. During this period they operated their cars a total of 1,025,000 miles in absolute safety. National recognition was given this feat at a mass meeting held in the Employers' Mutual Benefit Association auditorium, when a telegram of congratulation from J. W. Walsh, secretary of the Electric Railway Association of America was read.

Nashville street cars traveled an average of 6,577 miles for each chargeable accident during 1925, compared with a national average of only 2,500 miles, the telegram stated.

Bradley Stables to Build Finest Barns in World

New Orleans, La., Jan. 5.—(T. N. S.)—Colonel E. R. Bradley, vice-president of the Louisiana Jockey Club, has announced that the Bradley Stables will build the finest barns in the world on the site of those destroyed in the recent fire near the Mystery Street entrance to the Fair Grounds. The barn will be built during the coming summer and will be ready for occupancy when the Bradley stables are moved south next Thanksgiving day.

The new barn will embody the ideas worked out by special study of the conditions to be met. The structure will be steam-heated throughout and will have hot and cold water with shower rooms for the horses, and modern sanitary and plumbing fixtures for the employees.

Living quarters no longer will be "barn-like," but will be as comfortable and home-like as possible. An additional touch of luxury will be added with the construction of a miniature grandstand and pavilion from which the stable employees can watch the progress of a race. Colonel Bradley, in making the announcement, stated that five months each year was spent at the Fair Grounds by the horsemen of America, thus giving every reason for making their quarters a real home.

TOBACCO MARKET WILL RE-OPEN ON NEXT TUESDAY

Three Sets of Buyers Will Be On Sales With Every Company Represented

The Greenville tobacco market which has been closed since December 18th, for the holidays, will reopen on Tuesday, January 12, with three complete sets of buyers, and with every company represented. The market will remain open until the crop in Eastern Carolina is so d.

Several of the factories have been running during the holidays and everything will be ready to handle the tobacco at the opening of the market. The policy will be the same as heretofore—"Sell the farmer's tobacco for the highest dollar."

When the market closed at Christmas, it had a record of the best season in the history of the market, having sold \$5,000,000 pounds more than during any other season.

The farmers are urged to market their tobacco as soon as possible, even if the market is to remain open for several weeks.

Many improvements are contemplated for next season, which will place Greenville in a position to handle 75,000,000 pounds of tobacco.

80,857 Pupils Enrolled Rural 2-Teacher Schls

Raleigh, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Eighty thousand, eight hundred and fifty-seven white children, or more than one-fifth of the children enrolled in the rural elementary schools of the state, attend the 1,279 two-teacher rural schools in the state, it is shown by the current issue of State School Facts, a publication of the State Department of Public Instruction, just issued here.

Nearly one-fourth of the teachers employed in these two-teacher schools, which are attended by one-fifth of the rural school population of the state, held non-standard certificates. The average of scholarship attainment of these teachers was slightly higher than high school graduation.

Of the 80,857 pupils enrolled in these rural two-teacher schools an average of 56,774 were in daily attendance—70.2 percent of the enrollment.

The average enrollment per teacher during the school year 1924-25, was 31.6 pupils, and the average daily attendance was 22.2. The average length of term was 126 days.

Teachers in these two-teacher schools received an average salary of \$76.23 per month. The daily cost of instruction per pupil enrolled was 12.1 cents per day, and the average cost per pupil in attendance was 17.2 cents per day.

On an enrollment basis, the cost per pupil was low, comparatively. The cost on an attendance basis was comparatively high, because of poor attendance.

The number of two-teacher negro elementary schools, on the other hand, increased during the same period from 338 to 709, so that the total decrease in the number of schools of this type was only 58—from 2,046 to 1,982.

Two counties last year had no two-teacher schools. They were Scotland and Wilcox. Richmond, with only one, came next. Wilkes county, with 51, had the largest number of schools of this type.

Johnston county, where there were 3,429 children enrolled in two-teacher schools, led in enrollment in this type of school. Wilkes and Surry followed in order, with 3,268 and 2,046, respectively. Thus about one-eighth of the entire two-teacher enrollment of the state was in these three counties.

The publication makes a comparison of salaries in elementary two-teacher schools and other schools. The average monthly salary paid teachers in the elementary two-teacher schools was \$76.23, as compared with an average in the one-teacher schools of \$71.40. The elementary teachers' \$71.40.

Says Operators Have Not Receded Inch Since July

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The anthracite operators' conference consisting of 31 members at a meeting today approved every action so far of its club committee in the joint negotiations with the miners, who settled the coal strike.

Major William W. Inglis, chairman of the operators, negotiating committee, who called the meeting, said after the session: "The operators have not receded one inch since the negotiations started on July 9th in Atlantic City."

ROBERT SCOTT IS LOCATED IN SAN QUENTIN PRISON

Hiding Under Assumed Name of John Radding; Shows Considerable Emotion When Addressed as Scott

Chicago, Jan. 4.—(AP)—An invalid father last summer made frantic appeals by radio through newspapers, and friends for Robert Scott to come home and save his brother, Russell, doomed to die for a murder he said Robert committed. The pleas were unheeded, and Russell, once rated as a millionaire in Canada, was snatched from the gallows by a last minute insanity ruling. Robert Scott could not have answered the appeal even had he heard it. Hiding under the assumed name of John Radding, he was serving a sentence in San Quentin California prison for robbery committed in July, 1924. Now he will be brought back here to face trial on a murder indictment with prosecutors determined to fight for his death.

Photographs in a police bulletin broadcast in the nation-wide search for Robert led to the identification which California authorities regard as "positive." The man showed considerable emotion when addressed as Scott and told he was wanted in Chicago for the killing, but refused to talk.

A Christmas parole for good conduct which was to be his when he had a job to go to has been indefinitely postponed, and Chicago prosecutors have arranged to send him to the coast to bring him here.

Russell Scott, the Chester, Ill., asylum, showed little surprise and refused to comment when told that his brother had been found. He declined to discuss the assertion he made during his trial that Robert had done the killing for which he was sentenced. Russell Scott must stay in the asylum until he dies, unless he regain his sanity, in which event he is to be returned here to be hanged.

Persistent Rain Causes Rivers of France to Rise

Paris, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Further rises in France's already flooded rivers are feared as a consequence of the persistent rain falls. The Seine in particular, which had been at a standstill and even had begun to fall slightly, again has started to rise. The authorities, however, still insist that the peak of the flood will be reached tomorrow or Thursday, and without serious harm to the capital.

The situation in the suburbs is far from reassuring. The water is beginning slowly to come over the banks of the streams and is sweeping toward low-lying towns and villages. In the Northwest, still in grave, there has been some improvement.

In Belgium the worse seen over with the exception of the river Escaut, which is menacing. The work of repairing the damage already is well under way in Belgium.

One Defendant Convicts Another

Durham, N. C., Jan. 5.—(T. N. S.)—Charles Lomas, a Greek, took the stand in his recent trial with very fixed opinions in the case. He was jointly charged with John Estruella, Filipino, with an affray in a downtown restaurant. "Do you plead guilty or not guilty?" questioned the prosecutor. "Yes, sir," replied the Greek. "I think he's guilty," and he pointed his finger at the Filipino.

The strange part of the case was that the Greek was proven right. The Filipino was fined and the Greek released with a reprimand. The two youngsters, neither able to do much with the English language, had attempted mutual communication with the canned words in a local code.

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SUPERSTITION

When Kepler, one of the
greatest of astronomers

ing" in the heavens good
fortune for Napoleon. With
the money with which Napo-
leon endowed the pseudo-
science astrology Kepler ad-
vanced the true science of
astronomy.

This generations is less
fortunate. The science of
astronomy is not retarded
by lack of funds, but the
public is fleeced of vast
sums annually by fake as-
tologists, palmists, phrenol-
ogists and other so-called
fortune-tellers. Thousands
of the mountebanks and im-
postors thrive on American
gullibility, and they are even
more numerous in other
countries. It is significant
that as the general intelli-
gence increases the prestige
of the fortune-tellers wanes
until it finally disappears en-
tirely.

Those who have faith in
the soothsayings of fortune-
tellers usually believe in
"sings," swear by the alma-
nac and patronize the quack
doctor. They live in con-
stant dread of that "break"
in the "life line" on the palm
of the hand, plant their
gardens by the signs of the
zodiac, avoid black cats,
throw spilled salt over the
shoulder, never open an um-
brella in the house, blame
their hard luck on the mir-
ror they remember or think
they remember having brok-
en years back.

A century or two ago
superstition actuated the
whole life of all humanity.
Today a relatively small mi-
nority of mankind has cast
out all superstition from its
mind, but the great major-
ity is still guided through
life in greater or less degree
by superstitious belief.
When reason enters the hu-
man mind superstition must
ever be crowded out.

HINDSIGHT IS COSTLY

A large percentage of
community effort and
wealth is employed without
cessation in undoing the
mistakes of the past, and
posterity will spend as much
or more in correcting the
mistakes of the present.
Foresight and the courage
and means to meet the needs
of the future would end this
tremendous economic waste.
Railroad men estimate it

would cost \$10,000,000,000
to eliminate all highway
grade crossings in the
United States. This is about
half the original construc-
tion cost of the nation's en-
tire system of railroad
tracks.

When the railroads were
built labor, construction ma-
terials and land were cheap.
And, then too, even disre-
garding the difference in
building costs, it would have

structed the railroads with-

ings are established at each
one eliminated at great
cost to the public.

forgiven its failure to build
for future traffic needs. This
defense is denied this gen-
eration.

Statesmen of Europe Plans Arms Meeting

London, Jan. 5.—(I.N.S.)—European statesmen, well pleased with their accomplishments at Locarno in the interests of world peace, and busy with plans for a new limitation of armaments conference in which it is hoped to include the United States, are puzzled by the demands of the War Department at Washington for funds to carry out an elaborate program of land and sea defenses.

In responsible quarters the plans of Secretary of War Davis are interpreted as revealing that while Europe is looking forward to a long period of peace, America sees war ahead and is getting ready for it.

One of London's leading political journals sums up the situation in this manner: "The idea of an attack on America from Europe is fantastic, but the idea of a clash with Japan, with her 50,000,000 people penned on her island, and brooding fast is not fantastic, and today the prospect of Britain immediately coming in on the side of America, in the event of Japan seizing the Philippines and challenging the American Navy to a fight far from its bases, is more problematical than it was. Looking at Europe in an unsentimental way, the War Department sees a conglomeration of nations which owe America

money, fear American competition and have every reason for wishing to see American power diminished or at least curbed. It sees underlying the Locarno Pact a new determination on the part of European statesmen to sink their differences in order to make common cause against American groups and individuals, seeking to obtain a stranglehold on the world's markets and on the economic resources of Europe; and it asks how this economic struggle between Europe and America will affect America in the event of war with Japan.

"America feels convinced that the next decade or so will see a League of Nations functioning less as a vague association of nations claiming a world-wide field and concerned mainly to prevent war, than as a council of European nations meeting at Geneva chiefly to reach understandings for a united front against the menace of economic and financial assaults from outside.

"Policies alter, and world conditions shift and change, and the present trend may not be so definitely and unswervingly in the directions the American nationalists see today. But at present it is evident that Europe is thinking exclusively about Europe, and the menace of American gold power and surplus production; and America has come to the conclusion that for better or worse she is isolated in a world which she has been concerned to leave to its own devices."

Paris, Jan. 5.—Lipsticks guaranteed not to stick and show the trace of kisses are the latest novelties of Paris beauty barbers, who say have come to them from German hands. No matter who is the author of the invention, it will not go begging. Kiss-proof rouge sticks have long been demanded for much labor as well as money is lost by having to renew the paste many times a day. The new variety comes in all shades and flavors and is of such good quality that one application a day is all that is necessary. Betraying the smudges will now be done away with. Chaperones will please take warning!

The lamplighter will soon have to look for another job in Paris. For, before many moons, the old-fashioned gas lamps which flicker and flutter over the theatre billboards (which are columns in the French city) and light up as best they can many of the old crooked streets of the capital, will be replaced by modern electric bulbs. The lamplighter in his long blue smock and red-banded cap is one of the picturesque touches of Paris which everyone will dislike to see disappear and many an old winding street will not seem the same without the familiar "bec de gas."

More tears will be shed when the great Central Markets, well-known to lovers of quaint spots and the dancers from Montmartre, who stop there on the way home for a bowl of onion soup and the market-women, disappear underground. Plans are on foot to follow the example of Rome and construct a new system which will put the meats, vegetables and fruits out of sight. The present markets are much too small for Paris' increasing needs and as there is no more land around the present location, this seems to be the best way out of the difficulty unless they are transferred to the site of the old fortifications of Paris.

is on the outskirts of the city limits. If the former plan is adopted there will be a network of underground railways connecting "Les Halles" with the main lines coming into the city.

Deaf people in Vienna will soon be provided with yellow arm bands in order to avoid many street accidents which are thought to be largely traceable to the subnormal hearing of many pedestrians.

The start was made by the "Vox" society of the deaf which has given all of its members the badge and requested all institutions of the same kind to do the same. This organization which numbers 70,000 members and protects the interests of all persons with defective hearing, has greatly increased since the war. The large number of canon and heavy calibre used during the operations is thought to have resulted in many middle-ear affections.

A restaurant for the French, with real French prices—this is the cry of the newspapers as the dollar and pound mount higher.

Since the invasion of American tourists early last spring, restaurants have increased their prices from 25 to 30 per cent inasmuch as their clientele is almost entirely composed of people with dollars in their pockets. They found it ridiculous to continue to offer a good dinner for 10 or 15 francs which meant a mere 50 cents for a Yankee. He would be compelled to pay \$3 at least for such a dinner in his own country, why not here?

As a consequence prices went skyward and the French were driven away from almost all of the restaurants of importance. The cover charge alone, which is supposed to pay only for the bread and the laundry of the napkin, now amounts to the price of a good dinner in a brasserie, on the boulevards before the war.

"American Prices" ought to be posted outside of nearly every restaurant these days," says Henry Geroule in L'Oeuvre. "French salaries, of course have increased, but not in proportion to the increase of living."

"What if we eat and where? have become the important questions for many a Frenchman since La Fayette, here they are! has become the cry of many a French waiter as the crowds of Americans troop in. French prices for French people are what we demand."

the face of the watch. To get the distance across our galaxy, multiply the number of seconds in two hundred thousand years by one hundred and eighty six thousand miles, which will give you something over a quadrillion of miles, written, with one followed by eighteen zeroes, according to rapid, probably inaccurate figuring on the edge of a newspaper.

Let your little boy do the sum. But, remember, there are in that galaxy of ours about one billion suns, many of them a million times as big as our sun, which is a million times as big as our earth. And two billion suns move about like bees in a swarm. If two of them come too close together, the planets of both suns are instantly wiped out of existence. That happens any day, therefore it is well to be always prepared with a clean slate.

After you have digested the thought of a galaxy something more than a quadrillion of miles wide, with a billion great suns whirling in it, our sun dragging the earth and you through the ether, three to four million miles per year, there is more to digest.

What we used to call the "spiral nebulae" are really other galaxies, other "universes," some, probably, vastly greater than our own, and divine wisdom alone knows how divine wisdom alone knows how many of them there are floating in space, as you have seen clusters of frog eggs, floating on a stagnant pond, no wonder it says in the Bible, "In My Father's House Are

U. S. Musicians
Enviied Abroad
London, Jan. 5.—(I.N.S.)—American musicians are much bet-

ter off than their brethren in England because of the large and generous measure of financial support given them by wealthy American patrons of music, according to Sir Henry Wood, the famous English conductor, who recently toured the United States.

Speaking at a luncheon given in his honor here by the English-Speaking Union, Sir Henry contrasted the conditions under which American musicians work and the conditions with which the English musician has to contend.

"Where in America," he said, "conductors of orchestral bands can hold owing to financial support, seventeen or more rehearsals for a concert, the English conductor here must be content with two or three. This is due to the lack of financial support given in England.

"In the United States very rich men and women who are really devoted to music spent a great deal of money supporting orchestras. In fact, in California, I found a gentleman who was supporting an orchestra to the extent of \$750,000 a year."

Illustrating the difficulties of getting money in England, Sir Henry said that on numerous occasions when a wealthy man was asked to give something he would round \$1.00, while perhaps a poor musician would contribute \$250.00.

Johnson City Has Whole Mountains Corporate Limits

Johnson City, Tenn., Jan. 5.—(I. N. S.)—Recent realty developments here have called attention to the fact that Johnson City is one of the very few cities in the country which have whole mountains within their corporate limits.

In Johnson City, within three hundred yards of the business section, there rises sharply what is known as "Carnegie Knob," towering several hundred feet above the city and completely surrounded by business, residential and manufacturing districts.

A local realtor has secured this virgin forest, and has announced that he will construct a winding scenic boulevard to the summit, whereon he will erect a resort hotel.
