CRIMINAL COURT CAME TO CLOSE LAST SATURDAY

Large Docket Disposed of; Sessions Featured With Road Sentences

Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases, Judge Albion Dunn, presiding, closed Saturday after a most successful week. The following cases were disposed of Friday and Saturday:

Lettie Langley, charged with boisterous language, was adjudged not guilty.

Neda Caton was adjudged guilty of the charge of driving car in reckless manner. Judgment was continued to April term 1926 of this court, and defendant was required to give bond in sum of \$50.00 to appear at April term 1926 to show that she had paid to Mrs. Ruby McArthur the sum of \$62.50 and the cost of this action to be taxed by the clerk.

Raymond Jones, was adjudged not guilty of the charge of forgery.

The case against Pedro Boyd, charged with larceny, was not pressed.

Willie Knox was adjudged guilty of the charge of forgery and was sentenced to jail for four months to be assigned to work on roads or to pay a fine of \$50.00 and cost.

Israel Hardy, charged with rape, not a true bill.

Sara Heath was adjudged guilty of possessing liquor for sale and was sentenced to jail for a term of one year to be assigned to work on roads.

Hugh Webb, charged with manslaughter, not a true bill.

The case against Clemmie Stancil charged with larceny and Mack Stancil charged with larceny were not pressed.

Jesse Adams charged with murder was adjudged not guilty.

The sentence of Frank Taylor who was tried on Monday on a charge of assault with deadly weapon and which was 12 months on the roads, was changed to a fine of \$50.00 and costs, and to pay hospital bill of Hogan Gaskins and Guy C. Evans, and to pay Hogan Gaskins the sum of \$20.00 for repairs to clothing.

G. T. Pock, Bennie Arnold and John Ross, were adjudged guilty of larceny. Pocks and Arnold were given one year each on the county roads, and Ross was given six months.

The case against Walter Williams and Wesley Baker, charged with possessing liquor, continued.

Will Evans, charged with larceny, cause continued until April term 1926 of this court, and both Will Evans and W. G. House are required to give bond in sum of \$50.00 each to appear at April term, \$20.00 each to appear at April term that the matter may be disposed of.

MADAME SNOW PAYS A SECOND VISIT TO STATE

Fleecy Down Pour Continues Through Morning Hours; Fall Ranged From 3 to 4 Inches

Charlotte, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The Modiste, Madame Snow paid her second visit of the season to North Carolina last night and today. Her design was a cloak less elaborate but more charming than the first. Its border of steel was missing, but instead it bore a deeper softness with the flake like veil over it. The southern section of the state was clad in its new garment at day break with its fleecy down pour still continuing. Charlotte was an inch or more deep at eight o'clock this morning with no sign of a let up. From Greensboro, Winston-Salem, High Point, Asheville, and Salisbury in the western section came reports of snow. The fall ranging from three to four inches. From Raleigh, Rocky Mount, Greenville, New Bern, Fayetteville, Goldsboro, and Wilmington there were also reports of snow. In Wilmington only a few flakes fell and there, as in New Bern and Fayetteville, the snow gave place to rain.

Greenville Highs Win From Wilson

The undefeated quint of the Greenville High School added another victory to their string Saturday night by defeating the first team of the Wilson High. From the sound of the first whistle of play to the close of the game there was no sign of action, and both teams fought hard taking advantage of every opportunity to gain a point. It was one of the prettiest as well as one of the closest seen on the local court for many seasons. The final count being 15 to 13.

At no time during the game were the quints more than two points apart, and at the close of the first and second quarters only one point separated them. The two points which gave Greenville sufficient margin to win were scored by Doug West with a field goal from the middle of the court, which was tossed in the basket from a long distance over two rafters. It was one of the prettiest shots scored this season.

The guarding of both teams far exceeding any witnessed here in any preceding contest of the year, but the usual roughness that accompany close guarding was absent. The members resorting only to clean tactics in both the defensive and offensive work. Fred Forbes with five points lead his team mates, but he was closely followed by West with two field goals to his credit. Adams for Wilson was the outstanding star of his team, being responsible for eight of their thirteen points.

This is Greenville's fourth consecutive win in as many games played, and while Wilson and Farmville are considered their most dangerous contenders, they have yet some strong quints on their schedule.

UNIFORM CRIMINAL CODE TO BE COPIED FROM OHIO

Columbus, O., Jan. 25.—(I. N. S.)—Plans for a uniform criminal code for all states based upon that planned for Ohio will be discussed at the annual mid-winter conference of the Ohio State Bar Association to be held in Cincinnati January 28, 29 and 30.

That Ohio leads in urging re-codification with a view to elimination of technicalities is shown by widespread attention among jurists and lawyers and by the fact that the American Bar Association is now seriously considering the advisability of sponsoring a uniform code along the lines outlined by Ohio.

CONFESSES THAT HE DISMEMBERED BODY OF WOMAN

David L. Marshall Declares Death of Anna May Dietrich Was Suicide

Philadelphia, Jan. 27.—(AP)—David L. Marshall, a chiropractor, confessed today that he had dismembered the body of Anna May Dietrich. Sobbing and unmoved Marshall denied that he murdered the 35-year old milliner, declaring she had taken poison in his Philadelphia office because she had been afflicted by a wealthy New Yorker.

Half an hour before he broke down and confessed, Marshall bent over and looked into the disfigured face of the body in the Morgue and said "I wish she could speak, she would tell you that I am guiltless."

The confession made in the office of District Attorney William Taylor, came in frantic words after the chiropractor had been examined for four hours.

Duke Rutland Prepares Plans Haddon Hall

London, Jan. 25.—(I. N. S.)—Haddon Hall, which has been visited by thousands of Americans because of its romantic associations with Dorothy Vernon and Jack Manners, is to be closed to sight-seers and used again as a residence for the Duke of Rutland, after being unoccupied for nearly 200 years.

The present Duke of Rutland is having extensive alterations made in the famous old Derbyshire mansion, including the installation of electric lights.

Haddon Hall passed into the possession of the Manners family in the sixteenth century, and the last of the Manners to live there was John, the second Duke of Rutland, who died in 1779. It was the marriage of Dorothy Vernon and John Manners which brought the mansion into the Manners family.

Architectural experts have expressed the opinion that the old Norman parts of the house were extensions of an earlier Saxon building, thus making Haddon Hall one of the oldest mansions in England.

BODY OF WOMAN FOUND HANGING IN WOOD SHED

Miss Constance Cline, Former Supervisor of Concord Grammar School, Found Dead Today

Concord, N. C., Jan. 25.—(AP)—The body of Miss Constance Cline, former supervisor of the Concord Grammar School was found hanging in a wood shed here this morning.

Miss Cline, 7 years of age, was missed early this morning and a search was instituted by neighbors and shortly thereafter the body was discovered. She had been in ill health for some time.

Miss Cline for twenty years was a teacher in the local schools and had served as an officer for the State organization of the Lutheran Church.

19 Superior Courts to Be in Session During This Week

Raleigh, Jan. 25.—(AP)—A total of 19 Superior Courts will be in session this week. A special term in Mecklenburg opened this morning, and 14 regular terms began at the same time. In addition, four terms in session during the past week will continue during this week.

The Mecklenburg term is for one week, for the trial exclusively of criminal cases. Governor McLean has named Judge J. L. Webb, of Shelby, to preside.

Regular terms opened today in Tyrrell, Nash, Halifax, Carteret, Duplin, Wake, Columbus, Robeson, Person, Davidson, Union, Iredell, Transylvania, and Buncombe counties. Courts continuing in session this week are those in Wayne, Gaston, Lincoln and Johnston counties, the latter being a special term. The Cherokee term, which was to have opened last Monday and to have continued through the present week, was postponed on account of the burning of the court house on January 16th.

The transfer, which took Judge G. E. Midyette, of Jackson, to the third judicial district and Judge E. H. Cranmer, of Southport, to the eighth, for the first three weeks of the year, was terminated last week, and Judge Midyette, goes back to the eighth district today to open a one-week mixed court term in Columbus county. Judge Cranmer, returning to the third district, will preside at the two-weeks mixed term in Halifax.

Judge A. M. Stock, of Monroe, and Judge J. L. Webb, of Shelby, who have also been in exchange, return to their respective districts now. Judge Webb has been assigned to the special term in Mecklenburg. Judge Stock goes to Transylvania to hold a one-week criminal term.

A new exchange is that of Judge Thomas H. Calvert, of Raleigh, and Judge M. V. Barnhill, of Rocky Mount, for the next three weeks. As a result of the exchange, Judge Barnhill will preside at the one-week civil term in Wake, while Judge Calvert goes to Nash county. The court in the latter county is a mixed term, lasting one week.

As a result of two other exchanges, Judge Albion Dunn, of Greenville, will preside in Carteret, and Judge W. A. Devin, of Oxford, in Person; and Judge P. A. McElroy will go to Buncombe, in lieu of Judge W. F. Harding, of Charlotte. All three of these terms are for one week, with mixed dockets.

The terms in Duplin, Robeson, Davidson and Union are all for the trial of criminal cases, and each is for one week. Judge W. M. Bond, of Edenton, will hold the Duplin term; Judge F. A. Daniels, of Goldsboro, goes to Robeson; Judge T. B. Finley, of North Wilkesboro, will preside in Davidson; and Judge Michael Schenck, of Hendersonville, will hold the Union county term.

The Tyrrell term is for one week, for the trial of civil cases only. Judge H. A. Grady, of Clinton, will preside.

Judge T. D. Bryson, of Bryson City, will hold the Iredell term, which opened today for two weeks, with a mixed docket.

A Cowardly Tax.

This congress should change the unwise inheritance tax that discourages effort.

A punitive inheritance tax is cowardly, because it takes money from a dead man. Why not take it from him while he is alive, instead of waiting to take it from his widow and children?

It is an unwise tax, because by such a tax business men of middle age at the height of their constructive ability but facing possibility of death, dread new undertakings.

The death tax collectors might find their affairs too much "spread out," and destroy their estate by excessive tax collecting.

To take taxes from the living and let the dead alone would be a good plan. Mr. Mellon and President Coolidge recommend it.

A particularly vicious proposal which would make the inheritance tax worse than it is now, is that the national government should discriminate against states like Florida, that collect no inheritance tax. The plan would be to give a dead man credit for his local state inheritance tax. The nation collecting only as much as the state failed to collect, of the total federal tax.

In other words as Colonel Peter O. Knight, of Tampa points out, the scheme would be for the federal government to collect from a dying in Florida, five times as much as from a man dying in New York State. Even if such a tax were constitutional it would be extremely stupid.

To punish the citizens of Florida, or of any other state, because their local government has the decency to leave its hands off the property of a dead man, is a strange suggestion.

This is written in Fred Harvey's hotel at Barstow, California, on the Mojave Desert. W. T. Kester of Pasadena brings you here from Pasadena driving a high powered car, in three hours and a half, over a road that runs above the base of Giant Mountain, over the Cajon Pass, four thousand feet high. Then down upon the floor of this desert, which is two thousand feet above the level of the Pacific.

No matter where you live in the United States, make up your mind to see this country as soon as you can, of all the country that lies between the two oceans. Whoever will can do it, expensively and gradually, or economically, and with infinitely greater enjoyment.

One man in Chicago read about the Dodge Brothers alfalfa ranch, near the Dodge postoffice and railway station just west of Barstow. He made up his mind to see the desert land on which you can raise seven crops of alfalfa per year, by giving water to the marvellously fertile land. GREENE OPPOSES THE REVISION MEASURE TAX REDUCTION BILL

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Already facing stiff opposition in the Senate where it will be considered this week, the tax reduction bill had new troubles before it with notice from the House of its unacceptability as revised by the Senate Finance Committee.

Chairman Greene, of the House Ways and Means Committee, which drafted the bill, opposes the revision measure.

Chairman Greene said he opposed the revision measure on the ground that its additional reduction would mean an ultimate annual loss in revenue of \$467,000,000, or \$167,000,000 more than Secretary Mellon previously stated could be allowed.

Describing the estimates of reduction prepared by the Finance Committee in its report of the bill as contained from "very misleading inferences, to say the least," Mr. Greene protested vigorously against the proposed repeal of the inheritance and capital stock taxes as contained in the Senate measure. Unless the Senate itself revises the bill to suit the House views, Mr. Greene indicated that the fight on such provisions will be resumed when the measure, after passage in the Senate, goes to conference for adjustment of differences with the House.

To assure tax reductions by March 15th, when first income tax payments are due, Chairman Smoot, of the Finance Committee, therefore has set February 15th as the deadline for final action on the bill by the Senate.

Stepp Arrested Sunday Charge Possessing Liquor

Sheriff A. C. Jackson, accompanied by Chief of Police Lester Jones and Police Officer Brewer, on yesterday raided the store of Mr. George Stepp, and a few feet back of the store they located 13 bottles of whiskey. Stepp was charged with receiving, transporting and possessing liquor, and was placed under bond for his appearance here tomorrow in county court.

Man and Woman Charged With Murder Today

Asheville, Jan. 25.—(AP)—True bills charging Lawrence Tritt and Mrs. Naomi Norris, of Brevard, with the murder of Mrs. Norris' husband, William, were voted by the Pennsylvania county grand jury at Brevard shortly before noon today. Norris, an engineer, on a log railway operated by a lumber company, was shot to death early Sunday morning, December 27, while he bent over a fire place in his home at North Brevard. Tritt surrendered to the sheriff shortly afterward and confessed, according to the sheriff, that he was the slayer. He had been living in the Norris home.

Mrs. Norris, the mother of four children, was arrested on the strength of testimony given at the preliminary hearing.

Munford's Name Forwarded for Re-appointment

Among the Presidential nominations made today was that of Alexander L. McCaskill, of Fayetteville, N. C., to be customs collector at Wilmington, N. C. This was a re-appointment. For postmaster at Greenville, N. C., the president forwarded the name of Heber R. Munford.

Naval Appro. Bill Amended

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The House today amended the Naval Appropriation Bill to withhold for six months a fund of \$300,000 for contracting for an all metal airship. The air craft development corporation backed by Ford interests was to have had the contract which will now be held up pending investigation of the whole subject by the House Naval Affairs committee.

CLOTURE RULE TO WORLD COURT DEBATE INVOKED

Step Makes Certain a Vote on the Court Issue Within a Few Days

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The Senate invoked its drastic cloture rule today to limit debate on the world court. The step makes certain a vote on the court issue in a few days when adoption of the resolution of American adhesion to the tribunal a foregone conclusion. The vote for cloture was 68 to 26, or five more than the necessary two-thirds.

36 Republicans and 32 Democrats voted to invoke the rule with 18 Republicans, seven Democrats, and one former Labor, opposing it. Both North Carolina Senators voted to impose cloture.

Pro-court leaders declared the vote could not be regarded as a test of strength of the court issue itself. A number of Senators who voted against cloture, they said, will vote in favor of a resolution.

A roll call followed an hour's debate during which Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, declared it was not only the right, but the duty of the majority to force action on the court.

Referring to charges by Senator Reid, Democrat of Missouri, and Johnson, Republican of California, that the country had been flooded with pro-court propaganda, the Arkansas Senator declared that the Ku Klux Klan had been stimulated in some localities to oppose the court. Senator Reid, with whose name the Klan agitation had been linked by Senator Robinson, immediately advised the Senate that he had no connection with the Klan, did not know its views, and did not care Senator Johnson replied briefly to the speech of the Democratic leader, and Senator Reid said he did not want to reply "because there is nothing for me to reply to."

Senator Varrison, Democrat of Mississippi, offered a unanimous consent agreement to limit debate after February 10th, but Senator Borah, Republican of Idaho, rejected.

The first time the cloture rule was used was to limit debate on the treaty of Versailles, the vote then was 78 to 16, and a vote on the treaty followed four days later. The first proposal to invoke the rule was made on July 9, 1917 when the war time food control act was before the Senate. It was withdrawn the day afterward and unanimous consent agreement for a vote was made. Last March a petition was put in to end a filibuster by Senator Copeland, Democrat of New York, on the Isle of Pine Treaty, but the Senator ended his own filibuster and the petition was never acted upon.

Soon after the Senate had voted today to invoke the rule and expedite its discussion on the world court, Senator Reid of Missouri, made a motion to adjourn. A quorum call intervened and when quorum was established Senator Reid said he would not insist on his motion. "The Senate is here now," he said, "and it can proceed with its business. When I made the motion there were only about six Senators in the Chamber, and since it already had adjourned I thought it might as well do it formally." He said he was determined to keep Senators on the job.

Asks Information Building of All Metal Dirigible

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The House Naval Court today asked the Navy Department for all its correspondence with the air craft development corporation backed by the Ford interest concerning the building of an all metal dirigible.

PUPILS MAY NOT BUY
TEACHERS WITH GIFTS
Minneapolis, Jan. 25.—(I. N. S.)—No one may become a teacher's pet in the future in Minneapolis by sending teacher nice presents. Superintendent W. E. Webster has ruled against acceptance of them and ordered presents received to be returned.

Ambrose Ross, convicted murderer, under death sentence at Sing Sing, escaped the electric chair twice in two days, each time just before he was to start the death march. First reprieve was granted for an appeal, then discontinued. Then Governor Smith issued a last minute stay of execution. Now Ross hopes to escape with his fiancée, Christine O'Brien, his fiancée, who was joyed at the news received after she had bade him a last goodbye.

MITCHELL'S COURT MARTIAL RECORD IS SENT TO PRESIDENT

President Coolidge to Decide Whether the Five Year Suspension to Become Effective

Washington, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The Court Martial record of Colonel William Mitchell has been forwarded to President Coolidge for final action.

War Department officials who transmitted the papers to the White House declined today to intimate what recommendations they had made. The court's trial record was approved early last week, by the War Department Board of Review and it now rests solely with the president to decide whether to make effective the five year suspension to which the air officer was sentenced for his public attacks on government aviation policies.

Loses Trace of British Freighter

New York, Jan. 25.—(AP)—The liner President Roosevelt wireless-ed the United States lines today that she had lost trace of the British freighter Antiope, after answering an SOS call from her yesterday in mid Atlantic. The President Roosevelt was alone side the freighter for several hours, but lost trace of the vessel in a heavy snow squall. All of the freighter's boats were gone the message said, water was in the fire room, and her radio was out of commission. The Antiope sailed from New York January 4 for Queenstown with a cargo of wheat.

AGAIN NO LIGHTS

Saturday two young men of this community were in the Pitt Community Hospital suffering painful injuries because of the evil of unlighted vehicles upon the public highways. So long as animal drawn vehicles are permitted to travel at night without lights just so long will there be serious accidents from that cause and yet Legislatures in the past have not seen fit to enact a law requiring every kind of vehicle to carry lights. In the past Pitt county's representatives in the State Assembly have favored the measure requiring lights and now that we are on the eve of another primary it is to be hoped that those who seek seats in the next assembly will pledge themselves to again support the vehicle light bill. Not until the majority of counties throughout the state, however, realize the need of such legislation can this ever present evil and danger be removed and it is to be hoped that those citizens throughout the state who believe in making the public highways safe for travel will insist that those who they support in the coming election pledge themselves in favor of this safety measure.

LIVING LONGER

Figures issued by the census bureau as to the average length of life in the United States offer some interesting material for speculation. Women live longer than men. The average life of an American man is given as 55.23 years, that of a woman as 57.41 years. Why is this?

One unacquainted with the facts might have supposed that women were the shorter lived of the two sexes. They are traditionally the "weaker sex." Their physical organization is more delicately balanced than that of men, and is more easily thrown out of "kilter." They take risks of death or disability which the other sex is not required to take. Probably it is the fact that they lead more sheltered lives than men which gives them the advantage indicated by the figures, an advantage so great that it more than counterbalances the physical disadvantages of their sex.

Color is given to this view by the disparity between the increases in the average lengths of life of men and women in the ten years from

1910 to 1920. The former added 3.75 years, while the gain of the latter was only 2.71. But during that decade there was an exodus of women from the shelter of the home. More are engaged in business, in office work or factory work than ever before. Perhaps if this change had not occurred woman's average length of life would have increased as much as man's.

The Washington Progress, a paper published in Washington, N. C., by Carl Goerch, came out this week with sixteen pages, devoted to detailing the advantages and resources of Washington and Beaufort county.

The edition was profusely illustrated and is a distinct credit to Beaufort county. There is no question but that it will prove beneficial in giving that section some splendid publicity. The business men of Washington are to be commended for co-operating with Mr. Goerch in having such an edition published.

Whether or not Ronald Amundsen's assertion that Dr. Cook's claim to discovery of the North Pole is as plausible as that of Admiral Peary, will restore the former claimant to his place in the hall of fame cannot be told, but at least he is bringing the name of Dr. Cook back from the prison cell into the spotlight of public discussion.

LIBRARY NEWS

Our Slogan: "Let the Library Serve Greenville."

The Library is open from two until six P. M., and from seven until nine-thirty P. M.

We have been pleased to have a number of people in the community outside Greenville become patrons of the library during the past month.

It is interesting to us to watch the steady development of different departments of the library and we think it will be of interest to the public to know something of the development, so we have been comparing figures of the non-fiction circulation for November, December, and part of January.

In November, the entire number of non-fiction was 5,442; for December, non-fiction came up to 14, with fiction 1,149. We have taken only ten days beginning with January 11th, and find the total distribution of non-fiction for the ten days to be 130, with fiction for the ten days at 593. Beginning today, we shall keep an account of the calls for reference work done in the library. The above report on non-fiction included Biography, History, Travel, Science, Essays and Religion.

If "Wild Geese" was worth thirteen and a half thousand dollars and the "Perennial Bachelor" ten thousand, just combine the two figures, then add heaps more and you may have an idea of the relative value of "A Bush That Burned" by Marjorie Berkeley McClure. It seems to us that Harmony Hale, the heroine of "A Bush That Burned," is a true likeness of any girl reared in the purely American home. The story tells of her struggles against modernism as she finds it displayed among her associates. She goes through the struggle of fighting rather than submitting to the looseness of the times.

Perhaps her greatest struggle is against Morton French, whom she loves but whose ideas of personal liberty in drinking she abhors. Harmony discovers his "personal liberty" idea during a visit to his mother's home and frankly tells him she will not marry him until he gives up drink.

But Morton is stubborn and in egotistical pride tells Harmony she will have to trust him enough to marry him as he is; and so the struggle begins, and keeps up, outwardly, until Harmony almost loses herself, not knowing that Morton secretly is breaking away from his old habits.

The story carries the heroine, Harmony, straight through a clean character which is indeed, refreshing, with the present day novels, too many times making the unclean the most prominent and heroic. We liked especially the author's idea of carrying Harmony through her struggles with the home background as a help. Her aunt Lizzie and her grandmother are the ever constant strength and comfort, aunt Lizzie, in her loving sympathetic way, and grandmother in her blunt, puritanical style, but both human and just like "home folk."

Read "The Bush That Burned," by all means, it costs only ten cents, but worth twenty-five.

Paris, Jan. 23.—Peace and prosperity during the new year of 1926 is the prophecy of Mademoiselle Lallemand, celebrated French clairvoyant.

She affirms that the coming year will be one of progress and national pride, with better things in store for the French nation. This means, above all, the betterment of the financial situation and thus, better conditions throughout the country. The cost of living will gradually go down and little by little the work-a-day world will take on its prewar aspect.

When asked if she dared throw a hint upon what would happen in politics Mademoiselle Lallemand shrugged her shoulders and threw up her hands in true French fashion: "Mon Dieu! that is the most difficult. However, I see Briand disappear only to return again to his cabinet."

Three celebrated old men are destined to die within the next twelve months, but the prophetess prefers to retain their names. A noted comedienne will leave the Comedie Francaise Theatre, making a great stir in the theatrical world, and long hair will be back before the robins sing again.

Of all this Mademoiselle Lallemand seems very certain, and one is inclined to believe the prophecy coming from this French woman, who foretold the offensive of Abdel-Krim in 1925, the success of the Tokio-Paris air race and the return of Monsieur Briand to political power.

Official Paris is so afraid to discuss the subject, the Government Theatre Francaise refused to accept a play written by Francois Lenormand, entitled, "The Dictator."

Severe measures may soon be taken to check the growing tendency to disregard the Constitution. Conservative political writers are urging a speedy return to a vigorous nationalistic policy with severe punishment for any revolutionary propaganda.

Sumner Hospital Destroyed by Fire

Rock Hill, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Fire, which seriously damaged the Sumner Hospital here early today, was without fatal results as no patients were in the building at the time of the blaze.

The structure was an entire loss, although a godly portion of the furniture was saved. The damage is in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

60 Years Royal Barber, Still Plies The Scissors

Swettisham, Eng., Jan. 25.—The publicity that has befallen the Sandringham estates and vicinity since the death of Queen Alexandra, has resulted in the discovery of the oldest haldresser in England.

He is Charles Howlett, the eighty-five-year-old Royal barber, who for nearly sixty years has been shaving and cutting the hair and beards of practically every male member of the British Royal Family.

Four days a week he shaves and cuts hair for the local cowmen and farm hands. The other two working days he harnesses up his rickety old pony and buggy and drives over to the Sandringham estate to shave and cut the hair of the members of the Royal Family who may be in residence.

Howlett was appointed Royal Barber in 1868, and ever since then he has plied his "queerly mixed trade of attending to the tonsorial requirements of kings, princes, and cowmen."

On November 10, 1885, he gave the present King George of England his first shave, and also cut his hair. Four years later King George began to grow a beard, and Howlett was also the first man to trim this.

Since then many kings and princes have sat under the scissors or razor of this venerable barber, among them being the King of Norway, the late Duke of Clarence, the late Prince John, the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York, Prince Henry, Prince George, the late Duke of Teck, and the Crown Prince of Norway.
