Step Makes Certain a Vote on the Court Issue Within a Few Days

Washington, Jan. 25 .- (AP) --The Senate invoked its drastic cloture ru'e today to limit debate on the world court. The step makes certain a vote on the court issue in a few days when adoption of the resolution of American adhesion to the Fibunal a foregone conclusion. The vote for cloture was 68 to 26, or five more than the necessary two-thirds.

36 Republicans and 32 Democrats voted to invoke the rule with 18 Republicans, seven Democrats, and one former Labor, opposing it. Both North Carolina Senators voted to impose cloture.

Pro-court leaders declared the vote could not be regarded as a test of strength of the court issue itself. A number of Senators who voted against c'oture, they said, will vote in favor of a resolution.

A roll call followed an hour's debate during which Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, declared it was not only the right, but the duty of the majority to force action on the

Referring to charges by Sonator Reid, Democrat of Missouri, and Johnson, Republican of Californian, that the country had been flooded with pro-court propaganda, the Arkansas Senator declared that the Ku Klux Klan had been stimulated in some localities to oppose the court. Senator Reid, with whose name the Klan agitating had been linked by Senator Robboson, immediately advised the Senate that he had no conrection with the Klan, did not know its views, and did not care Senator Johnson replied briefly to the speech of the Democratic leader, and Senator Reid said ha did not want to reply "because there is nothing for me to reply

Senator Varrison, Democrat of Mississippi, offered a unanimous consent agreement to limit debate after February 10th, but Senator Borah, Republican of

Idaho, rejected. The first time the cloture rule was used was to limit debate on the treaty of Versailles, the vote then was 78 to 16, and a vote on the treaty followed four days later. The first proposal to invoke the rule was made on July 9. 1917 when the war time food control act was before the Senate. Copeland, Democrat of New York,

1910 to 1920. The former added 3.75 years, while the gain of the latter was only 2.71. But during that decade there was an exodus of women from the shelter of the home. More are engaged in business, in office work or factory work than ever before. Perhaps if this change had not occurred woman's average length of life would have increased as much as man's.




