



# DE VALERA MEN LOSING GROUND IN FREE STATE

Members in Party Is Split And Leaders Send Out Call to Party Meeting; Congress Government Takes Precedence As Old Enemies Fight Among Themselves.

By HANDEL O'CONNELL, L. N. S. Staff Correspondent, Dublin, Feb. 3.—The Republican front has definitely come to a head.

During the past two years there have been a large number of De Valera's followers who favored the Congress, but the extreme section, led by Mary MacSwiney, has been successful in opposing the Congress.

At all times it has been doubtful as to which side De Valera will support. Sometimes he was with the Congress, sometimes the other.

Then came the crisis upon the Irish boundary commission. For a day or two it looked as if the Congress ministry was about to fall, but the situation was so well handled by the Free State Ministry that the crisis passed with added credit to their prestige.

The Republicans entered the field at that time, they are scarcely a year old, but they have already won a number of seats. There are, however, on all sides, and if the Republicans had taken their seats they could have defeated the Congress party. As a matter of fact there were a number of Republicans ready to break away from the Congress party to join the Free State.

At a week before the London settlement, De Valera committed himself to the statement that the Free State was under obligation to pay £25,000,000 per annum indefinitely. If that were the

# LIFE OF PAPER BEING STUDIED BY U. S. BUREAU

Permanence of Records Is Dependent on Finding New Everlasting Material; Department Will Continue Investigation of Fibers That Enter Into Manufacture.

By ROBERT S. THORNBERG, L. N. S. Staff Correspondent, Washington, Feb. 3.—With a view to the permanency of paper upon which official and private records may be maintained for long periods, an investigation has been started by the United States Bureau of Standards.

Little is definitely known of the permanency of modern papers. Although the Bureau has not been able to complete the intensive study required to obtain exact information, some research work has been done.

Numerous requests have been received by the Bureau from departments, State governments, the Library of Congress, public libraries and from business concerns seeking advice on the durability of paper.

In view of the demands for information the following observations have been made public by the Bureau:

From records of the printing of papers it appears that wood-pulp papers, in general, have given poor service in respect to permanency.

Hand-made papers, in general, have proved suitable for permanent records, but the fact that a paper is made entirely of rag fibers does not in itself insure permanency.

The materials entering into the paper must be chosen with care, so that no materials will be present which in themselves will not be permanent or which will induce deterioration of the paper.

It is quite well established that if fibers themselves are to be permanent they must be reduced to as pure a form of cellulose as possible. The purity of the fibers is commonly measured by determining the copper number.

As rosin sizing induces decomposition of paper fibers it should not be used. Judging from past records and from results of accelerated aging tests, the sizing should consist of glue only, as when properly applied such sizing is very permanent and has no injurious effect upon the paper fiber.

Starch sizing appears to be of doubtful permanency. Chemical residues, especially those of an acid nature, are very harmful.

Used in paper sizing and care must be taken that residues of this material in the paper are kept at a minimum. Other chemical residues, such as those derived from the cooking and bleaching operations, should also be reduced as much as possible.

In applying coloring materials, only those of established permanency should be used, and only those which will not react chemically with other constituents of the paper.

The need for more definite information is keenly realized and it is the hope of the Bureau to carry on further research this year.

### CAROL'S REBELLION SIMILAR TO MANY ROYAL EPISODES

Budapest, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Prince Carol's row with Queen Marie and renunciation of the throne to the Rumanian throne is no novelty in European royal families, to most of whom Carol is

the harsh treatment of his father, King Frederick William I. His effort to get away to England was frustrated by his father who had two of his son's accomplices executed.

But Frederick the Great's affair with Barberina, the Italian dancer, after he had ascended the throne of Prussia, was kept under far better control than the love affairs of Prince Carol. When Frederick suspected the dancer was mixing politics he dismissed her from the court.

Ludwig I. of Bavaria, told his wife he would rather give up the throne than break off his relations with Lola Montez, the dancer. One of Ludwig's ministers was called the "Lolaministerium" because Lola Montez had named it and directed affairs of state at will. She finally lost her political hold and had to flee. A little later Ludwig had to surrender his throne to his son because of the scandal.

Lola Montez became a wanderer, appearing on the stage in most world capitals. Her notoriety, however, soon lost drawing power and she died in obscurity and was buried in Brooklyn.

Princess Louise, of Saxony, tired of life at the Dresden court eloped with the French tutor of her sons, M. Girou, in December, 1892. Two years later, her husband succeeded to the throne of Saxony as King Frederick Augustus III. Like Prince Carol, of Rumania, she apparently was not constant in her love. She divorced the Frenchman and married an Italian musician whom she also divorced. She now is living in straightened circumstances in Belgium.

Princess Louise of Belgium who died at Wiesbaden in 1914, married Prince Philip of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, but deserted him in favor of an Austrian cavalry officer. This apparently was a true love affair, as Princess Louise endured poverty with With Captain Mattiasch and nursed him during his final illness in Paris, a short time before her own death. She tried without success to break the will of her father, Leopold II, who left much of his property to his mistress, the Baroness Vaughn.

Grand Duke Cyril, the Romanoff who holds court at Coburg and has solemnly been proclaimed czar of all the Russians by his faithful White Russian followers, figured in a divorce case which his opponent would disqualify him for the Russian throne should the Soviet government be replaced by a monarchy. The Grand Duchess Cyril, or a princess of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, was first married to the Grand Duke of Hesse, whom she divorced to marry the Russian nobleman.

The Austrian archduke, John Nepomuck Salvador, renounced all his titles and took command of a sailing ship. He is supposed to have been drowned off the coast of South America in 1891, but there have been numerous rumors that he is still alive. At one time he was reported to have been seen in Denver.

### South's Greatest Barbecue Being Prepared for Doctors

Dallas, Tex., Feb. 3.—(AP)—The fatted calves are now being prepared for the Southwest's greatest barbecue which will be served members of the American Medical Association at its national convention here in April. Seven tons of meat to feed 10,000 doctors is to be prepared. Out on the Staked Plains of Texas, 80 pure blooded beefs are being nursed and fed a diet that will turn them into the most succulent of steaks. Down on a farm in Navarro county, 20 cords of hickory and pecan wood is being seasoned for the fire over which the meat will sizzle. This wood gives the beef a much desired flavor.

From his herd of 2,000, Dr. John H. Dean, of Dallas, has selected 80 cows and calves and has turned them into a separate pasture where the grass is knee deep. The calves will not be weaned, because the milk is adding to the succulence of the meat. Their mothers are being fed sorghum and cottonseed cake, and by the time the baby calves are dressed it is expected they will weight 500 pounds each.

Ten days before the date of the barbecue, April 20, the calves will be shipped to Dallas, slaughtered and placed at once in cold storage. The meat will be cooked in specially constructed pits at Fair Park, and an expert staff of barbecue chiefs, aided by 10 carvers and 80 waiters, will cook and serve the meat.

New York, Feb. 3.—(AP)—The National League began the 51st year of its existence with the echo of its golden jubilee celebration carrying a message of fair play, sportsmanship, and high ideals for the future.

A banquet last night tribute was paid to the games, pioneers, and the keynote of its present day position was sounded.

### ARTIST REVEALS REACTIONS OF PORTRAIT SUBJECTS

Boston, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Women like to have their portraits painted but men do not. This is the opinion of John Young-Hunter, a Scotchman who is a medalist of the Royal Academy and who has painted many of America's and Britain's great. Men usually have their portraits painted because their families "have pushed them into it," women because they have adroitly persuaded their families to push them into it, he said.

As to which sex displays the more vanity during and after the process of painting a picture, Mr. Young-Hunter is doubtful. "They're so different," he explained. "A man usually is concerned about his hair, no matter how small an amount he may have, and his moustache. Usually, nothing else matters. Women sometimes like to have their ropes of pearls made a little larger than they really are."

One well known banker, however, emphatically urged the artist not to paint the wrinkles in his coat sleeves.

Children and very old persons are the easiest to paint, Mr. Young-Hunter finds. Children know so little and old folks know so much that they do not embarrass the artist with criticisms and suggestions and are not over-worried over the outcome of his efforts.

One disadvantage in painting children, however, is that their parents are so hard to satisfy. No artist could make them as beautiful as their parents believe they are.

Husbands also, sometimes are critical. One woman looked at her finished portrait and exclaimed, "Am I really as lovely as that?" He husband's comment was, "That isn't my little Mary."

A seemingly harmless bit of flattery on the part of their friends sometimes tends to make men and women dissatisfied with pictures of themselves that they themselves have admired. It is a trite saying but lots of folks believe it when their friends say "It doesn't do you justice."

Besides his artistic ability the portrait painter must possess some of the qualities of a diplomat. Mr. Young-Hunter does not permit his subjects to see their pictures before they are finished, and sometimes it requires consid-

erable tact to hold off the anxious captain of finance or industry, who is used to having things his own way.

The Scotch artist works rapidly. He usually completes a portrait in three or four sittings of from an hour and a half to two hours each. He has painted under varying conditions, the portrait of a well known figure in American life, having been done aboard a yacht. The late John Singer Sargent told him it could not be done.

When the portrait was finished the subject, something of an eccentric who had refused to take any interest in the proceedings, gazed at his picture for a few moments, and asked for his advice, exclaimed, "Don't touch it!" "Sometimes I think I'll paint only rivers," said the artist, "for they have no comeback when the picture is finished."

### BLOODSTOCK INDUSTRY SHOWS RAPID GROWTH

Newmarket, Eng., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Breeders of race horses and bloodstock generally are of the opinion this industry has developed into one of Britain's best. Export demand has grown to such an extent of late years that England is said to be supplying the world with bloodstock.

At the December sales here there were fifteen buyers from no less than fifteen countries including the United States and South America. American buyers are said to be the keenest and buy only the very best thoroughbred animals for stud purposes.

### Better Homes in America Camp'n. Be Held April 25

Washington, Feb. 4.—Plans for the 1926 Better Homes in America campaign in Greenville got under way this week with the acceptance of Mrs. E. W. Harvey as chairman of the local volunteer Better Homes Committee for Greenville.

The appointment as local chairman was made by Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, who is president of Better Homes in America.

The 1926 campaign culminates, as have other annual Better Homes campaigns, in many hundreds of demonstrations of fully equipped small homes in cities, towns and rural communities throughout the country. Starting in 1922 with a few hundred demonstrations, this educational movement has grown by leaps and bounds until this year two thousand communities celebrated "Better Homes Week" with lecture

programs, contests and demonstrations of new or remodeled houses. The week of April 25—May 1, 1926 has been set aside for the year 1926 for this purpose.

Strongly endorsing and aiding the Better Homes movement are many departments and bureaus of the Federal Government, and more than a score of national organizations of men and women of great numerical strength and meritorious influence. President Coolidge himself is chairman of the Advisory Council of Better

Homes in America, which includes executives of more than a score of organizations of national scope which are co-operating with the Better Homes movement.

This movement, entirely non-commercial in character, originated in a suggestion by the late President Harding, who had a keen interest in it. His successor, President Coolidge, while he was Vice-President and in his present office as our Nation's Chief Executive, has warmly endorsed the movement, and identified his name with it. Begun

as a private enterprise, it soon reached such proportions that its founders realized that it must be put upon an independent basis. A reorganization was effected, Mr. Hoover becoming president of Better Homes in America, and Dr. James Ford, of the faculty of Harvard University, was secured to assume active direction of the movement, which past he still occupies.

Beer reports indicate increased beer drinking in Mexico. Breweries paid almost 2,500,000 pesos in Federal income taxes for 1925, according to recently announced figures. This exceeds former records.
