DRIVE FOR PECAN TREES TO BEGIN NEXT MONDAY

Nine Counties Have Already Gone "Over the Top"; Campaign to Continue Through March 13.

Raleigh, March 6,-(AP)-The drive for the planting of a million pecan trees in North Carolina will begin on Monday. Nine counties have already "gone over the top" in this drive, it is announced.

H. M. Curran, forester of the State Department of Agriculture, Tired of the monotony of which is cooperating in this intentive campaign, today announced that a large umber of agricultural leaders had edorsed the movement. He also announced a number of prizes offered.

The campaign, opening on March 8, will continue through Saturday, in.

Forester Curran reported today that D. M. Swink, of Swan Quarter, is planting a 300-acre percan orchard. The Pecan Growers' Society is furnishing him with about 1.500 trees for immediate planting.

LEAGUE COURSE BE OUTLINED DURING MONTH

Conference To Be Held Between Kellogg, Ambassador Houghton, London, And Minister Gibson, Geneva, In Washington.

Washington, March 6 .- (AP.) The course to be followed by this country at the preliminary disarmament conference called by the League of Nations will be out ined here this month at a conference between Secretary Kellogg, Ambassador Houghton, from London, and Minister Gibfrom Geneva.

The two diplomats have been called to this country for consultation with the secretary and they will sail on the President Roosevelt tomorrow. By the time they open their conference with Mr. Kellogg about the middle of the month the league is expected to have announced the date and place of the arms meeting. Minister Gibson, who apparently will head the American delegation to the conference, was first summoned to Washington and later Ambassador Houghton's presence was desired by Secretary Kellogg because of his knowledge of the British and

OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

"FAITHFUL IS THE WORD"

Timothy 3; part verse 1: "This is a true saying.

A more correct translation would be "Faithful is the saying," or "Faithful is the Word."

This phrase was an in troduction of some wellknown aphorism or proverb that was commonly known in the days of the apostle.

We know there were such proverbs; as for instance, when St. Paul at Ephesus maid: "It is more blessed to give than to receive"; and when Christ quoted the sayings "Physician, heal thyself,' and "A prophet hath no honor in his own country."

These proverbs were car ried about from place to place because they were asily remembered. They became the "pass word' among the early Christians, the symbols of their brotherhood; the mutual greetings of their faith.

Armies have been encouraged in the face of overwhelming forces by a single word, and this apostolic expression is not a mere introduction to what follows, not a mere ejaculation, not a mere passing phrase. It is the bugle note and clarion call summoning to greater faith and fuller consecration: "Faithful is the Word"!

That "Word" was then unwritten. Jesus Christ did not write the New Testament, nor any part of it. It was not until years had passed, and the societies of believers were scattered, that His disciples penned those pages under the direction of the Holy Spirit. At the beginning of the Christian Church the word was preached-not written;


