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OUR SATURDAY  
NIGHT  
MEDITATION"FAITHFUL IS THE  
WORD"

1 Timothy 3; part verse 1:

"This is a true saying."

A more correct transla-  
tion would be "Faithful is  
the saying," or "Faithful is  
the Word."

This phrase was an in-  
troduction of some well-  
known aphorism or proverb  
that was commonly known  
in the days of the apostle.

We know there were such  
proverbs; as for instance,  
when St. Paul at Ephesus  
said: "It is more blessed  
to give than to receive";  
and when Christ quoted the  
sayings "Physician, heal  
thyself," and "A prophet  
hath no honor in his own  
country."

These proverbs were car-  
ried about from place to  
place, because they were  
easily remembered. They  
became the "pass word"  
among the early Christians,  
the symbols of their brother-  
hood; the mutual greet-  
ings of their faith.

Armies have been encour-  
aged in the face of over-  
whelming forces by a sin-  
gle word, and this apostolic  
expression is not a mere  
introduction to what fol-  
lows, not a mere ejacula-  
tion, not a mere passing  
phrase. It is the bugle note  
and clarion call summon-  
ing to greater faith and ful-  
ler consecration: "Faithful  
is the Word!"

That "Word" was then  
unwritten. Jesus Christ  
did not write the New Tes-  
tament, nor any part of it.  
It was not until years had  
passed, and the societies of  
believers were scattered,  
that His disciples penned  
those pages under the di-  
rection of the Holy Spirit.

At the beginning of the  
Christian Church the word  
was preached—not written;  
and of that message from  
mouth to ear St. Paul says,  
"Faithful is the Word."

The apostle's life was  
ending; his work was fast  
drawing to a close; and that  
is his emphatic statement as  
he nears the end of his pil-  
grimage. The experience  
of a life lay behind the  
words. This is not the lan-  
guage of a novice. He had  
tested the word and had  
tried its truth. He had  
seen what it could do in  
Jerusalem and Athens and  
Corinth and Rome. He had  
witnessed its effect on Jews  
and Greeks, Romans and  
Africans, in hundreds of

cases, and both on land and  
sea. The tone of certainty  
rings through his utterance.  
"The Word" had satisfied  
his needs, and he asserts  
and re-asserts: "Faithful is  
the Word."

A statement like this  
gathers much of its force  
from the lips that utter it.  
St. Paul was probably in  
prison, suffering pain and  
incarceration for the cause  
of Christ. And looking on  
the fetters that bound him,  
the chains on his arms and  
the shackles on his feet, he  
could think of the Gospel  
he had freely preached, and  
gladly exclaimed, "But the  
Word of God is not bound!"

"I am in prison; but no  
dungeon can make a pris-  
oner of the Truth. I am  
bound, but the Gospel is  
free!" And this is his Selah!  
his Amen! his Hallelujah!  
"Faithful is the Word."

There are three things  
St. Paul states, respecting  
this Word.

1. He declares it is all  
sufficient for all classes,  
"Faithful is the Word," and  
worthy of all acceptance,  
that Christ Jesus came into  
the world to save sinners."

There is nothing narrow  
or limited in it. There is  
nothing parochial or clan-  
nish in it. It is neither  
eastern nor western. It  
is catholic, or universal,  
and "worthy of all accepta-  
tion."

2. St. Paul states that this  
Word is capable of fashion-  
ing and moulding human  
lives, and clothing them  
with a divine beauty.

To Titus he wrote:  
"Faithful is the Word! for  
if we be dead with Him, we  
shall also live with Him. If  
we suffer, we shall also  
reign with Him." That is  
the hope kindled by this  
"watchword," a hope that  
makes the present endur-  
able and the dark future  
bright.

My readers, we need the  
"Printed Word," as well as  
the "Spoken Word," in  
Greenville today. But we  
need for more the "Lived  
Word."

The apostle gathered his  
evidence from the converted  
lives of those who had been  
brought under the saving  
power of the gospel. To the  
converts at Corinth he  
wrote: "Ye are our epistle  
written in our hearts,  
known and read of all men:  
for as much as ye are man-  
ifestly declared to be the  
epistle of Christ ministered  
by us, written not with ink,  
but with the spirit of the  
living God; not in tablets  
of stone, but in fleshy ta-  
blets of the heart." They  
were the incarnate Gospels,  
the living epistles, the vol-  
umes of the evidences of the  
power of the Gospel, and  
they called forth the tri-  
umphant shout: "Faithful is  
the Word!"

Make this your own!

"The grass withereth,  
and the flower fadeeth, but  
the Word of our God shall  
stand forever; and this is  
the Word which by the Gos-  
pel is preached unto you."

San Francisco, March 6.—(INS.)—A gun that killed 65 wild animals, arrows that flashed their way clear through the bodies of 500 round lions, and a cut down violin that brought forth soothing music in the African jungle were the souvenirs brought back to San Francisco recently by Arthur H. Young, San Francisco newspaper employee, who spent several months on a hunting expedition in British East Africa.

Young had for his companions on the hunt Dr. Saxton Pope, world famous bow and arrow expert, and Stewart Edward White, the writer.

The gun that made the record is a .30 government '06 Winchester. It was purchased by Young from Leslie Simpson, former Oakland man, who has lived for many years in the Tanganyika territory of Africa.

Young and his companions spent their days in strenuous chase of big game and in the evening cheered themselves with music of their own making.

Young played his violin, Pope played a mandolin and White worked on a guitar.

Young says that the musical efforts of his party failed to make any too great an impression on the African blacks. The hunters, however, according to Young, were deeply impressed by the music played by the natives. They played five fingered lutes and sang very rapidly, he says, in the truest notes he ever heard, with turns, grace and triple notes so fast he couldn't make notes of the music when he tried.

Employment of soldiers at menial tasks not in line with their military duties was criticized here recently by Colonel Frank C. Bolles, commander of the San Francisco Presidio and the 30th Infantry.

"American soldiers who join the army to learn to fight in defense of their country are too often found pushing lawn mowers or brooms instead of being perfected in military arts," he said.

"Such employment not only detracts from military efficiency, but lowers morale which is a most important factor in training," Colonel Bolles continued.

In line with Colonel Bolles' belief, he has issued strict orders that soldiers of "San Francisco's Own" regular army regiment, are not to be employed at tasks not related to military training.

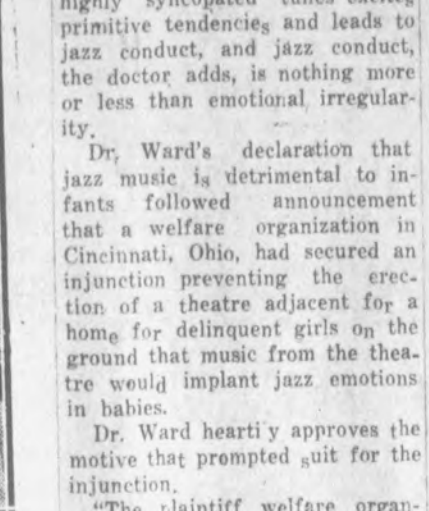

## GROWTH OF COMMUNISM AMONG BRITISH TEACHERS

Charges have been made that the teachers are being guided by the communist international, to whom they are affiliated, to teach the scholars to be class conscious.

Addressing a meeting on the behalf of the National Citizens Union here, Lady Askwith, a member of the union, urged that the teachings of the 500 must be stopped, adding that it was up to patriotic members of the community to refuse to pay salaries to teachers, holding such views.

"I consider that those who are paid by the state should be loyal to the state," Lady Askwith said. "All teachers should be required to take the oath of allegiance to the state."

## MRS. MATTEOTTI TRYING TO ESCAPE TESTIFYING AGAINST ITALIAN FACIST

Rome, March 6.—(INS.)—Velia Matteotti, widow of the Italian socialist deputy, who is alleged to have been murdered by members of the Fascisti, is seeking to be excused from appearing in court against those accused of slaying her husband.

"I have not rancor to vent or vengeance to invoke," Mme. Matteotti wrote to the president of court. "I want only justice. Mankind has refused it to me, but I will have it from history and from God."

Her letter, which has not been published in Italy, continues: "I demand, therefore, the permission to stay out of a trial which does not concern me any more. My lawyers can represent

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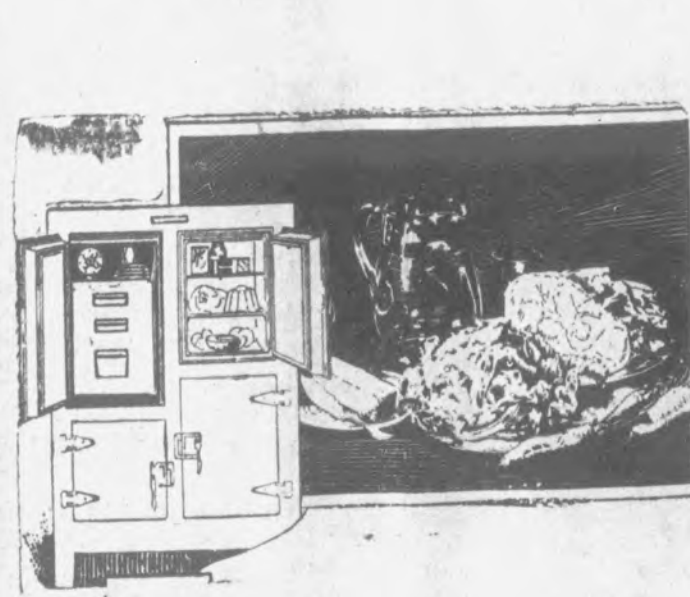
