BANDIT KILLED IN PISTOL DUEL WITH CONDUCTOR

Greensboro Street Car Conductor Shot At By Two Men After They Had Blocked Track; One Bandit Killed, Other Escapes.

Greensboro, March 9.—(AP)—The body of an unidentified bandit lies in a local funeral establishment awaiting identification. He was shot down last night near Lindley Park while engaged in a pistol duel with L. E. Maness, street car conductor. The incident occurred shortly after 11 o'clock, when the car was making its last run to the city.

The scene was in a thick pine grove. The wounded man was taken by ambulance to a local hospital where he died this morning without gaining consciousness. The only clue to his identity was the name "Bill Bonich" carved on his belt. Maness said that the bandit had a confederate and that both opened fire on him. The other man is still at large.

The two men were making an effort to hold up the conductor of the car, investigating officials said. They had blocked the track near the park, which was in a sparsely settled neighborhood. The conductor was alone in the car at the time. He told officers that three shots were fired at him from the darkness and that he returned the fire twice, one of the shots taking effect.

Stands On Budget Recommendation Shipping Board

Washington, March 9.—The senate appropriations committee in reporting today the independent offices appropriations bill stood on the budget recommendation of \$13,900,000 for the fiscal year notwithstanding the house in passing the bill had increased that sum by nearly \$5,000,000.

The senate committee, however, at the request of the president, urged that the board be given a fund of \$10,000,000 to enable it to operate the lines taken back from purchasers in the face of foreign competition.

The total decided by the entire bill is \$512,670,876, or \$5,391,108 more than carried by the house measure and approximately \$60,500 above the regular estimates of the budget bureau.

Pittsburgh Plans For Big Ceremonies

Pittsburgh, March 9.—(INS.) While the world champion Pittsburgh Pirates are limbering up in Paso Robles, California, for another drive toward a National league pennant, Barney Dreyfus, venerable president of the club, is spending much time at Forbes road, preparing for the opening of the 1926 season.

The Pirates will waste no time in hoisting the league pennant they earned last season, Dreyfus said, although no definite date for the unfurling of the world series bunting has been set.

On the opening day, April 22, the lesser flag will be pulled up to position beneath the American flag, with the aid of President Heydler, of the National league. It will be the fifth such ceremony participated in by the Pirates.

Raising of the world series pennant is contingent upon the convenience of Baseball Commissioner Landis to be present here and take part in the ceremonies. The Pirates' double victory last season already has begun to pay dividends, Dreyfus said, all season box seats have been sold, very few of the holders in the season relinquishing their claims.

ATHLETIC DAY TO BE STAGED HERE IN NEAR FUTURE

Greenville To Be Given Opportunity To Help Support Athletic Program Of City.

The Greenville High School Athletic association is planning to have in the near future a Tag Day or an Athletic Day, whereby all of Greenville will be given an opportunity to help support the athletic program of the city schools.

Thus far the athletic teams have made a very good record in the number of games won and lost. Especially has this been true in regard to the past basketball season. Greenville has just closed one of the most successful seasons ever recorded in the history of the high school, yet the support, due perhaps to the dust and undesirability of the court, was not representative of a city the size of Greenville, and for this reason the members of the G. H. S. Athletic association felt that the people of Greenville would heartily support such a day with both their moral and financial efforts.

The baseball season will open in a few days and equipment is needed for the outfitting of the team. The prospects for a winning team are very bright and with proper support and encouragement the Greenville High should come through with just as brilliant a season as the one just closed in basketball. Warns Against The Unlicensed Insurance Cos.

Raleigh, March 9.—(AP)—In advising people of the state to avoid doing business with insurance companies which are not licensed by the state of North Carolina, Stacey W. Wade, state insurance commissioner, calls attention to the fact that the state is being flooded with literature offering insurance policies in the Federal Reserve Life Insurance Company, of Kansas City, and the Union Mutual Casualty Company, of Des Moines, Iowa, two unlicensed companies.

These companies, says Mr. Wade, are not licensed in North Carolina, and those who purchase insurance from unlicensed companies, run considerable risk because, in case of the failure of the unlicensed company to meet its obligations under a policy, the policy holder has no redress in the courts of the state.

"I would strongly advise," says Mr. Wade, "that our people purchase insurance only from licensed companies. The best insurance companies of the United States are licensed to do business in North Carolina and they offer every line of insurance, at standard rates, and they are safe and sound."

There is no good reason for any citizen of the state running any risk whatsoever in connection with his insurance and I hope that they will do no business with companies that are not properly licensed in this state.

No Date Set To Take Up Germany Application

Geneva, March 9.—On the proposal of Sir Austin Chamberlain, the British foreign secretary, the commission named by the League of Nations assembly to consider Germany's application for membership adjourned this afternoon immediately after it had convened. No date for a new meeting was set. Sir Austen pointed out that the situation concerning allotment of council seats has not yet been clarified.

President Calles, of Mexico, in a speech to labor organizations in Mexico City, reveals considerable excitement concerning the religious situation. He says, "the religious flag must go; the devils know that the flag is dead."

President Calles says, "we have increased rural schools now functioning by 3,000 have started more than 3,000 schools for primary education."

The Mexican President declares that the people are with him and the new constitution, but the aristocrats "who produce nothing, but consume," are united with religion against the government.

President Calles denounces the press for "trying to take up the religious flag," and accuses the church of trying to stir up interference of outside nations and organizations in Mexican affairs. That very old fight now revived in Mexico is one that never did any good to any country.

At Sonora, Mexico, it seems you get a divorce in one week, with few questions asked. Paris cannot compete with that. The Mexicans get divorce-quick machinery is bad from the moral point of view. But it may help the "see America first" campaign.

On the way to their Mexican divorce ground prosperous Americans can see Arizona, the Grand Canyon, the painted desert, the petrified forest and cliff dwellings. Some of them may even forget their new interests—the other lady or gentleman whom they intend to marry later.

One husband or wife is much like another in the divorce court. But the Grand Canyon is totally unlike the petrified forest, and both would help married people to forget trifling quarrels.

Alfred Reeves, of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, says the motor industry has been boomed "by mass salesmanship." He praises the manufacturers' method of laying down all over the country an advertising "barrage" to clear the way for local dealers when the cars are ready for distribution.

Mass advertising, with the aid of MASS CIRCULATION, represents a great power in business. The automobile industry and the oil industry know it. The steel, copper and many other industries haven't heard about it. They will later. Intelligent national advertising of copper products on a really big scale would add hundreds of millions a year to the demand for copper.

President Coolidge thinks the "stock shake-up" is a good thing for the country. There is no lack of employment, prosperity is going right ahead. And if "somebody" lost a million dollars in the shake-out the loss hit speculators, not regular business men.

That would have made a great difference to our stock market gentlemen in days when England, with her surplus income, was the big buyer of American stocks. The war changed that.

We buy our own stocks now—and collect interest, very moderate interest, on billions that Britain owes us.

FIVE COMPANIES PROPOSE MERGER

If Power Merger Is Approved Company Will Be Known As Carolina Power And Light Company.

Raleigh, March 9.—(AP)—Stockholders of five power companies of North Carolina will vote in April on a merger of their companies into one, involving a total capitalization of between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000. The directors of the companies met yesterday in New York City and approved the plan for the merger, and decided to submit them to the stockholders as soon as possible.

The five companies proposing the merger are the Carolina Power and Light company, the Carolina River Power company, all with headquarters at Raleigh, and the Asheville Power and Light company and the Pigeon River company, of Asheville. If the merger is approved the plan is for the company, to be known as the Carolina Power and Light company, immediately to proceed with the investment of \$20,000,000 in power facilities in North Carolina with a view to extending its operations in various sections of the state.

The five companies have been affiliated for some time and the proposed merger is a logical step, says an announcement of the plan given out here last night by the Carolina Power and Light company, the parent organization. Hydro-electric expansion on the Yadkin river and the Pigeon river near the Tennessee line, is proposed as the first step after the merger is proved.

The merger is another step in the country wide consolidation of power companies. At the present time the five companies operate as subsidiaries of the National Power and Light company and this organization operates in a number of states under the supervision of the Electric Bond and Share company. This corporation in turn is a subsidiary of the General Electric company.

CONSIDERATION OF AVIATION RESUMED

Washington, March 9.—(AP)—The house military committee today resumed consideration of aviation legislation with D. W. Morrow, of New York, who headed the president's board as witness.

Mr. Morrow urged the importance of commercial aviation as a factor in national defense. An embracing bill covering the subject has been promised by the committee.

COUNTY SCHOOL MEETS BE HELD WEEK MARCH 15

Great Interest Being Manifested In Pitt County Literary And Athletic Events.

Much interest is being manifested in the literary and athletic events which take place during the week of March 15. The school and the people of Stokes will serve as host to the children and citizens from the Piny Green, Barnhill, Gurganus, Wearda, Briar Swamp and Mason communities. Twice during the school year the Stokes school has received the teachers from the above mentioned schools and each time a hearty welcome has been given them.

Monday, March 15, this fair to be a day of high interest in the little town of Stokes for the other six schools of Carolina township meet here to contest in five literary events and several athletic events. Judges for the literary events will come from Greenville, at the request of the county board of education, while the field meet of the afternoon will be under the direction of the lively Rotary club of Greenville.

A similar program will be held at Winterville on Tuesday, March 16, upon which date Reaton, Tucker, Liberty, Hope, Pierce and Harden schools and communities will meet for friendly contests in literary and athletic events. On Wednesday, March 17, Nobles, Sheldermine, Elks, Tarkle Hill and Galloway schools and communities will meet at Black Jack. Friday, March 19, is the date for the athletic meet between Greenville and Ayden.

Mrs. T. K. Weyher, of Dannelon, Florida, formerly Miss Mary Cowell, of this city, won second prize in a contest recently conducted by the Peoria, Pea company and was awarded a \$500 check. Mrs. Weyher lost the first prize, \$1000, by one point.

The contest consisted of four words, "Unbreakable Red Feather Pens." From these words, the contestant was to make as many words as possible. The rules contained much red tape, very very rigid and most complex. Mrs. Weyher saw the announcement of the contest in a Chicago paper. She was notified several weeks ago that she was the successful contestant, having won the second prize, but she received the check only a few days ago.

Thinks Shoals Should Be Used Make Nitrate

Washington, March 9.—(AP)—President Coolidge feels that any lease for Musc Shoals should make definite provisions for production of nitrate for use in munitions and commercial fertilizers.

The president is gratified at the adoption in amendment form yesterday by the senate of the house resolution providing for a commission to receive bids. He believes that it is adequate for the proper disposal of the government property.

The president feels, however, that the public has not adequately realized how dependent on foreign countries the United States is for its nitrate supplies. It will be a grave mistake in his opinion to lease the property unencumbered so that the United States would be assured of an adequate supply in a war emergency.

League of Women Voters Holding Meet Charlotte

Charlotte, March 9.—(AP)—The sixth annual convention of the North Carolina League of Women Voters, convened here today with delegates in attendance from every section of the state.

Mrs. Phil McElhannon, of Charlotte, the state president, called the assembly to order for its first regular session with reports of officers and standing committees to be heard during the morning. Miss Gertrude Weil, of Goldsboro, the first vice president presided over the presentation of the president's report.

A feature of the session this afternoon will be an address by Clyde R. Hoey, former congressional representative of the Ninth district. An important standing committee report to be heard during the day is that on the "legal status of women," according to officials. The convention will adjourn tomorrow night.

Briand Accepts Mandate Form Ninth Cabinet

Paris, March 9.—(AP)—Aristide Briand, veteran French statesman, today accepted a mandate from President Doumergue to form his ninth cabinet to succeed the one which fell last Saturday. The veteran statesman was called in after M. Herriot, the radical leader, had declined to attempt the formation ministry and had recommended that Briand be called so that he might go back to the League of Nations meeting at Geneva with all his former power. The Briand ministry resigned Saturday after failure of the vote of confidence on the sales tax provision of its budget program.

Mr. Briand announced this afternoon that he was leaving for Geneva Thursday. This was interpreted to mean that the makeup of the cabinet was decided upon with the exception of the post of finance minister, and that this would be filled late this evening, or tomorrow.

Nine Killed In Mine Explosion

Eccles, March 9.—The known dead in the mine explosion here last night was increased to nine today as rescue workers broke through a barrier of debris and found eight additional bodies near the shaft bottom of the Crab Orchard Improvement company's number five mine. Workers redoubled their efforts to get into the damaged works, hoping to find alive some of the 29 other miners who were entombed by the blast.

TANGLE CAUSES RECESSING OF ASSEMBLY TODAY

Four Countries Demand Seats In League Council, While Germany Requests Membership.

Geneva, March 9.—(AP)—With the League of Nations assembly in a tangle arising out of Germany's request for membership and the demands of four other countries for permanent seats in the League Council, the Assembly was in recess today. The four countries are Poland, Spain, Brazil and China.

Only sub-committees of both the assembly and the council were at work today and they were dealing with routine matters. There was, however, no cessation in the conversation among the delegates regarding the situation surrounding permanent council seats.

When adjournment was taken yesterday no time was set for the next session. It is possible there will be none until the return of Aristide Briand, who left Sunday night for Paris to discuss the crisis brought about by the downfall of his cabinet.

There has been no abatement in claims by the representatives of the various countries, which are seeking permanent seats in the council. The Germans hold steadfastly to their ground that no seats shall be awarded until after Germany has been installed. The only permanent members now are Great Britain, France, Japan and Italy. Spain's representatives have reiterated that if she is not honored simultaneously with Germany she will leave the League.

Police Showered With Ice And Snow By Boys

Pacific, N. J., March 9.—(AP)—After trying in vain since Friday to have Passaic and Paterson constables serve warrants on Chief of Police Zober and two patrolmen charged with clubbing persons in the Woolen Mills zone, Justice of the Peace Katz has at last found a way. He turned the warrants over to the sheriff and they were served last night.

Some disorder occurred yesterday when 600 pickets, and the police of Clinton clashed. The strikers were on their way to picket two mills when stopped. Small boys showered the policemen with chunks of ice and snow. There was no disorder on the part of the mill workers, although the situation was tense. Finally police began to move the crowd. The leaders of the picket forces were pushed down the street and the crowd slowly followed, while bringing up the rear boys and girls howled and cheered.

DECLARES CO-OPS WILL CONTINUE DURING NEXT YEAR

Richmond, March 9.—(AP)—Co-operative marketing of tobacco in Virginia and North Carolina will be continued next year regardless of the defection of South Carolina growers, Oliver J. Sands, a chairman of the executive committee of the Tri-State Tobacco Growers' Co-operative association declared today. Mr. Sands declined to make further comment on the failure to get the necessary number of growers in South Carolina to sign up with the association as to insure the continuation of its operations in that state.

The directors of the co-operative association are now making a drive in the old belt of Virginia and North Carolina to sign up a sufficient number of growers for the new five year contract so as to insure the continuance of the association in those states. The contract under which the association is now operating expires with the harvesting of the 1926 tobacco crop.

BRIAND'S DEFEAT

Premier Briand fought a
gruelling battle for the fi-
nancial rehabilitation of
his country. He held on
grimly even after the
Chamber rejected his first
proposals and carried the
fight to the senate. Suc-
cessful there, and with pub-
lic opinion steadily growing
against the dilatory tactics
of his opponents, he went
back to the chamber in the
hope of obtaining its con-
sent to a compromise mea-
sure that would give France
a balanced budget. He was
defeated by the machina-
tions of a group which has
most to lose by his over-
throw.

Some eighty nationalists,
joining forces with radicals,
communists and disaffected
socialists, helped to vote
down the temporary sales
tax, on which M. Briand
had staked the existence of
his ministry. The nation-
lists cared little if this tax
was proposed by M. Dou-
mer, of their own political
faith; that opposition to it
was hardly consistent with
their political tenets; that
their own following had a
peculiar interest in the
prompt settlement of
France's financial troubles;
and that above all else it
was desirable to support
the government on the eve
of the important League of
Nations gathering at Gene-
va.

These considerations were
of little moment compared
with an opportunity to
overthrow a government
which they opposed. So
the nationalists joined with
the groups from which they
were farthest removed po-
litically, even being taunt-
ed by their new allies for
their lack of principle as
they did so, and forced
what may prove to be the
greatest crisis in France
since the war.

It is easy to say that the
whole trouble is merely po-
litical, but that does not
mitigate its gravity. In
France political considera-
tions now predominate.
They reflect the divergent
views and interests of peas-
antry, wage earners and the
various groups of the bour-
geoisie. The multiplication
of political parties has
made it impossible for any
government in recent
months to get a working
majority behind its finan-
cial plans, and the political
differences which hamper
legislation are so deep seated
that the financial situa-
tion may become even
worse than it now is before
party differences can be
sunk in the face of national
necessities. — New York
World.

Many "Dead Men" Practicing Medicine Now

Chicago, March 8.—(INS.)—Not only do dead men tell tales, but the yule in Illinois, make a lot of money—and practice medicine. So says Dr. Frederick C. Waite, professor of histology at the Western Reserve University School of Medicine at Cleveland, Ohio. In shattering the belief so popular in the days of the late Captain Kidd, Professor Waite declared that several hundred "dead men" were practicing medicine over the United States. By the simple procedure of appropriating the license of a young doctor who has died, incompetents have no difficulty in getting away with it, he asserted.

The professor made these charges before the annual Congress on Medical Education, held here recently, together with astonishing revelations of medical quackery perpetrated in this country.

Diploma mills came in for a round of exhortation. One of the most noted diploma mills in California, he said, in some cases had granted licenses to practice to students after one day's schooling. Missouri turns out more incompetent doctors than any other state. He said and in this statement he was supported by various speakers from Missouri. Dr. Waite recently conducted inquiries in "diploma mills" in that state.

Pison terms of five to twenty-five years for all vendors, receiving others connected with issuance of "potentially fraudulent" medical diplomas was urged by Dr. Waite.

TELEPHONE WILL BE FIFTY YEARS OLD WEDNESDAY

On tomorrow the telephone will celebrate its fiftieth birthday anniversary. The local telephone company will observe the event and the office will be open to visitors from 11 to 2 o'clock, and from 4 to 6 o'clock. Visitors are invited not only tomorrow but any other day this week on which they can call.

In honor of the occasion men and women in the telephone industry will wear an attractive the numerals 50. These workers but, showing a telephone and during the 24 hour period of celebration will enable telephone subscribers to complete 67,700,000 messages, an almost unbelievable expansion from one sentence on March 10, 1876, to the millions of conversations March 10, 1926.

There are 20,000 Bell telephone workers in the southern states who will join in the nation wide celebration. The south can claim with pride that the telephone owes a part of its development to the reception given it in the south in its infancy.

The first building ever erected to be used exclusively as a telephone exchange was constructed in Louisville, Ky., some fifteen years before the close of the nineteenth century.

On March 10, fifty years ago, the first sentence was transmitted over the telephone by Alexander Graham Bell, from his laboratory on the top floor of an old house in Boston, to Thomas A. Watson, his assistant, in another room on the same floor. The first words transmitted were, "Mr. Watson, come here, I want you." These two men were the sole active telephone workers at that time.

Development in business and organization backed by the patient toil of the scientists in the Bell research laboratories has featured the telephone's progress in recent years.

Steamship Nile Comes To An Inglorious End

San Francisco, March 8.—(AP)—Thirty-three years ago at Thompson-on-the-Clyde the steamship Nile took the ways. It was 420 feet long, had a breadth of 52 feet and a draft of 35 feet, 5 inches—called a triumph of engineering. Its majesty of line and awesome proportions seemed to presage a new era of American-Oriental shipping to which it was consigned.

Instead there lay ahead years of vicissitudes, a gradual slipping away from the affections of shipping men, numerous sales, then a dip into the illicit drug trade which brought a court fine that was a factor in putting the line then operating out of business. Finally there came a sentence to the junk yard and now workmen are ripping it apart.

Pacific coast shipping men say that the chief reason why the Nile failed to justify the expectations of its builders was its coal bunkers, which took up so much of its carrying capacity that it could not compete with ships more deftly but less pretentiously constructed, in freight transportation. Its last sale was reported to have been \$42,000, an insignificant fraction of its initial cost.

BRITISH EMPIRE'S OLDEST CITIZEN HEALTHY AT 125
Belfast, Ire., March 9.—

(INS.)—Claiming that he is the oldest individual in the British Empire, William Smith, venerable looking resident of County Down, has just celebrated his 125th birthday.

Official papers he has in his possession show that he was born in Smithfield Square, Belfast, on January 3, 1813. Smith still walks half a mile each Friday to draw his old age pension from the state.

Nogales, Mexico Builds Big Arena

Nogales, Ariz., March 9.—(INS.)—Following the signing of Jack Johnson, erstwhile world champion heavy weight fighter, for a boxing match in this city on May 5, preparations are now going forward on the erection of an arena in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico, with 20,000 seating capacity.

Arrangements with the Mexican authorities have been successfully made, according to the promoters, and permission received not only for the building of the arena, but for the importation of materials and supplies, duty free. Every co-operation is being extended by the Mexicans who are backing the Johnson fight with both moral support and finances. The fight pa-

pers signed with Johnson in Chicago, followed similar successful negotiations with Pat Lester, of Tucson, whom the dusky brawler will meet.

Lips That Touch Liquor Cannot Marry In Takase

Tokyo, March 9.—(AP)—At least one village in Japan is "dry" in the accepted prohibition sense of the word. The young women residents, by refusing definitely to marry any young man who has not taken the pledge, are declared to be responsible.

The members of the Young Women's Association of Takase noticed that an abnormal quantity of Sake, the national Japanese drink, was being consumed by the "young bloods." They organized and voted unanimously to have nothing to do with any youth who drank Sake.

Experiment On Dogs For Diabetes Cure

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The doctors said that while method of transplanting are not yet sufficiently practical to be used for the cure of diabetes in man, they indicated that their findings had been such as to give hope that such would be the ultimate result.

TRY TO POPULARIZE EVENING VEST STUDDIED WITH ROSES

London, March 8.—(AP)—Silk manufacturers are trying to popularize evening vests for men which have tiny pink roses and other flowers in their natural colors on a background of white or green.

A similar style was started in the time of King Edward's youth, and the Prince of Wales wore the bright vests in an effort to boom the dying silk industry in certain parts of England. But the style

was short lived. It was too Dickensian for the Victorian Age, and the task he has set himself is West End tailors now say that vests in the pastel shades will never be used by modern men of taste.

SEEK TIMBER WOLF WITH MOVIE CAMERA

Montreal, Quebec, March 8.—(INS.)—The moving picture machine is trailing the Canadian timber wolf, among the most shy and cunning of wild animals, to his haunts in the big timber country of northern Canada.

Frank Doudera, veteran trap-per and hunter, is the man back for his operations.

His plan is to lay mechanical flares on the ice of Lake Timiskaming and, lying in wait with his camera, fire the flares when the wolves appear.

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Real Old Time Spelling Bee Is Newest Sport

Des Moines, Ia., March 3.—(INS.)—The old-fashioned spelling bee is Iowa's newest indoor sport.

The Charleston has been crowded out of Iowa parlors while training is on for a big spelling match. Spelling "coaches" are becoming the vogue.

Dictionaries with frayed edges from the heyday of the cross-word puzzle craze are now in danger of becoming total wrecks.

Seventy-nine of the ninety-nine counties in the State are enlisted in a State-wide spelling contest, with 251,000 participants. They range all the way from 10 to three-score-and-ten in age and include all vocations from farmer to manufacturer.

The State-wide contest revolves around more than 5,000 schools in the State, but more than one meeting of a bridge club has been turned into a spelling contest.

The younger generation is going into the game hard. A bunch of school pupils stepped out near Adel and won from the adults of the community. At Nashua business men started a come-back for the older generation by taking the honors at a contest held in the town opera house.

New York, March 3.—(AP.)—Chorus girls of today are of a much higher type and from better families than those of the old days, believes Ned Wayburn, who has directed the dancing in five hundred Broadway shows.

This he attributes to the more rigid requirements of audiences and the resultant necessity of real talent and proper training on the part of the girls.

"Why, today more ability is required of a chorus girl than was demanded of a principal five years ago," he said. "The modern chorus is highly trained and in many musical comedies each member is really a solo dancer."

"With so many girls seeking places, it is only natural that the best trained are selected. The training is more expensive than formerly, which may explain why many families well-fixed financially are represented in the chorus."

Fifth Avenue Easter Parade To Be Newer

New York, March 3.—(INS.)—The Easter parade, a one Fifth Avenue this year will reveal the return of American womanhood to the feminine in dress, according to the advance spring styles.

The frills and furbelows in vogue before the war have reappeared and the masculine effect in woman's dress, popular heretofore, is to be banished from the world of fashion.

Large hats with trimmings of ostrich, lace, flowers, and maline are in again and the tight fitting hat, and the untrimmed, tailored hat, are bound for oblivion except when worn with an ensemble suit.

The sophisticated waist line of the continent will supplant the "clapper" figure that entered the arena of fashion with the boyish bob.

Full skirts, fitted bodices, fullness about the hem and hips, again is the straight up and down effect. The new frocks are trimmed with the most feminine of materials, taffeta, ruchings, ruffles, with flowing, rippling effects.

Skirts remain, as short as before, a few inches below the knee. The favorite color in stockings continues to be nude. The prevailing colors in the spring frocks range the gamut of the rainbow, but generally combined with black.

U. S. Growers Are Urged To Improve Cotton

Washington, March 3.—(INS.)—Cotton growers of the country were advised by the government to grow better cotton in order that they may get "the natural premium" that cotton of exceptional spinning value should command.

Cotton spinning tests made by the department of agriculture indicated that the production of superior varieties of cotton is an advantage not only to the grower but to the cotton trade, "which latter does not always appreciate." These tests have demonstrated that the pure strains of cotton are better from a manufacturing as well as from a production standpoint.

"They have a distinctly high-

er spinning value than ordinary gin run cotton," the department's experts declare.

"As yet the farmer's market does not recognize and pay for this superior spinning value," department experts said. "Farmers are not getting the natural premium that cotton of exceptional spinning value should command. They have an incentive to plant pure seed of good strains in the fact that such seed yields more and better cotton than other kinds of seed. They lack, however, the additional incentive to the production of superior cotton which would come from a market in which variations in spinning value were accurately discriminated."

Comparative spinning tests of five Texas varieties have been made by the department of agriculture to determine the relative economic values of these cottons. These tests were the first of a series to be made on successive crops of each variety. Results have now been obtained on the crops of 1925. While not offered as conclusive, they are extremely significant, it was stated.

FLIVVERS URGED TO OPEN 'EM UP ON THIS HIGHWAY

San Antonio, Texas, March 3.—(AP.)—There is one paved highway in Texas on which there is no speed limit. Such signs as "Flivvers do your best" and "Boys, let the girls drive" erected by a San Antonio auto repair shop, greet the motorist at intervals for thirty-five miles.

The road is not a state highway but a private one, built by San Antonio sportsmen. It leads to Medina Lake, a hunting and fishing resort, in the hills west of here. A charge is made against every car as it enters and leaves the vicinity of the lake.

VETERAN MINSTREL SAYS CHARLESTON IS NOT NEW

Hollywood, Cal., March 3.—(AP.)—George Marion, of the original Dockstader minstrels, who is engaged in the films here, says to declare that the Charleston, instead of being a new dance, is as old as minstrelsy itself.

Marion, who is celebrating his golden anniversary as an actor, says the leg throwing, knee shaking dance of today was evolved from the twist, a step popular with the black faced minstrels a half century ago. Except that it is done to a slower tempo, the Charleston is much the same as the "Twist," which Marion asserts, is an adaptation of the negro "Essence," a barbaric ritual of Africa.

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

By H. K. REYNOLDS, I. N. S. Staff Correspondent
London, March 9.—The extreme leniency of the debt-funding terms which Great Britain granted to Italy has led to charges here that political considerations entered into the debt agreement and that Italy has promised some political advantage in return for the favors received from the British treasury.

This has been denied by the foreign office, which also stated that there is no truth in reports that a secret agreement regulating policy in the Near East had been reached between Sir Austen Chamberlain, the British foreign minister, and Premier Mussolini.

Not content with these denials, however, Viscount Cowdray's Westminster Gazette, one of the leading organs of the liberal party, declares that "there is evidence that some political consideration weighted the scales in favor of Italy," and has called upon the government to give the public some information of what is behind the debt settlement made with Italy.

The Gazette says that there has been no official bargain so far as the foreign office is concerned, but that the foreign office has a way, on occasion, of officially remaining aloof from matters that it does not want to openly be identified with, pointing out that Chamberlain re-

mained on the continent while the debt negotiations were in progress here, leaving their direction to the chancellor of the exchequer.

Urging English trade unionists to get ready for the crisis, Miss Ellen Wilkinson, of Manchester, laborite member of parliament, declares in a statement published here that the final objective of the trade union movement in this country must be the destruction of the government so that the workers may come into absolute power.

Victory in the struggle thus envisaged will be impossible, she pointed out, unless a definite campaign of action is decided on in advance and strictly adhered to. There is too much quarreling, she believes, over minor questions, "when the whole question of capitalism and socialism is at stake."

"Can we not, all of us," said Miss Wilkinson's appeal, "make an honest effort to get our internal disputes squared up, so as to present a united front to the common enemy?"

"Let us, then, get out of our little groups and coteries, and rally around the one body in which men of all groups are used to working together, the trade union movement. The local trades council has been too long a debating society. Let us make it a fighting reality. And let us make up our minds to fight, not merely in resistance to the employers' attack, for, if we beat them off now, it will only be renewed a little later. Let us fight for the overthrow of the government and for the immediate assumption of power by the workers. Short of this, there is no way out."

CANADA WAR MEMORIAL TO BE BUILT IN OTTAWA

Ottawa, Ont., March 6.—(INS).—Erection of a \$100,000 national war memorial of Canada in Ottawa, the federal capital, will be undertaken immediately, according to a government announcement issued here.

The memorial which will be 45 feet in height, will be in the form of a triumphal arch, somewhat similar to the Washington arch in New York city. The base will be 26 feet long by 24 wide. The arch will be surmounted by two female figures of heroic size in bronze bearing laurels of victory in their outstretched hands. Figures of soldiers charging through the arch in battle formation will give a martial effect. The memorial was designed by Vernon March, English sculptor, of Farnborough, Kent.

Schipa Approves Jazz And Writes Comedy, Too

Tampa, Fla., March 9.—(AP).—Occasionally a grand opera star places the stamp of approval upon jazz. Tito Schipa, one of the world's greatest tenors, has gone a step further. He is writing a musical comedy in which syncope runs riot.

A tentative score of this comedy, said Schipa, while on a concert stop here, is now in the hands of Gene Buck, impresario of Ziegfeld's Follies. Its title is to be "Mimi."

Schipa was careful to explain that he does not consider jazz the highest type of music. However, he looks upon devotees of jazz as true followers of Pan, and sees in the saxophone a medium for interpretation of real harmony.

"The saxophone in grand opera, why not?" he asked. "Have you heard the saxophone in interpretations of the score of Madame Butterfly? Was it not beautiful, colorful, harmonious, stirring? Yes. Were there not one, two, three, maybe, saxophones contributing to a theme of exquisite beauty?"

"I will tell you something. Music. What is it? It is harmony and any instrument that blends into a perfect symphony of sound cannot be less than beautiful."

"The saxophone, the banjo, where used in truly expressing emotions, are a part of music, too."

The tenor thinks there are possibilities for the advancement and popularizing of grand opera through the medium of radio.

"It will augment rather than decrease attendance at performances," he said. "Someone hears an artist over the radio. Hears, but sees not. Perhaps they will not be content, hearing. Some will want to glimpse something of the personality behind the voice."

Four Veteran Dentists Yank Loads Of Teeth

Bloomsburg, Pa., March 9.—(INS).—How many wagon loads of teeth have been pulled by four veteran Columbia county dentists is not known, but according to the four D.D.'s if the teeth had accumulated in the more than fifty years of their practice there would have been many wagon loads.

The four veteran teeth extractors are: R. I. L. Rabb, of this city; Dr. J. B. Laubach, Benton; Dr. T. S. Chapin, Berwick, and Dr. James T. Fox, Catawissa.

Dr. Rabb, who has been practicing for 52 years, declared in that time he has pulled bushels of teeth. When he began his practice, he said, bridge work and capping teeth were almost unknown. If a patient's teeth were bad little thought was given in saving them, he just "yanked them out."

Dr. Chapin and Dr. Laubach formerly visited their patients as physicians and did their plate-making in the homes of their patients.

When the patients visited the office to have teeth pulled and could not come in again while plates were to be made, the physicians started to visit their patients at their homes. The dentists mapped out a route that would require a week, and with their instruments loaded in their buggy started out. Board and lodging the dentists received at the patients' homes without charge.

Dr. Chapin began practice in Benton, but went to Berwick 30 years ago. He has been practicing for 52 years.

Dr. Laubach has been a dentist for 54 years and has made, he said, more than 6,000 sets of teeth in those years.

Dr. Fox has been practicing for 55 years. He said he has pulled more than one wagon load of teeth.
