SNOW AND SLEET STORM VISITS STATE TODAY

Asheville Covered By Eight Inches Of Snow; Nickle Size Flakes In Raleigh.

Charlotte, March 11.—(AP)—Snow flanked by sleet and rain today winged its way over North Carolina and left a mantle of white to tell of its visit. Asheville reported a depth of eight inches at 9:45 o'clock with the fall still coming down. It began to snow in the mountain city at seven o'clock tonight.

Nickle size flakes were falling at Raleigh, but the snow melted as fast as it struck. One inch of snow was recorded at Greensboro at nine o'clock after a three-hour fall.

A dash of sleet and then a drizzle of rain followed snow at Charlotte this morning, and then the snow began again and at ten o'clock was still falling. High Point and Winston-Salem each reported one and one-half inches of snow and a hard fall still in sight and the temperature hovering around freezing point. Gastonia had two inches of snow at ten o'clock and the fall had not ceased, while at Salisbury it was also snowing.

State Income Tax Collections Are Pouring In

Raleigh, March 11.—(AP)—State income tax collections at noon today approximated \$326,000 for the first 11 days of March. Collections during the month of March, 1925, totaled \$3,600,454.22, so that \$2,689,000 is yet to be collected this month if collections of March this year are to equal those of a year ago.

The major portion of the income taxes are expected to be paid by the night of March 15, and after that date tax payers are subject to a penalty except where extensions are granted.

Collections are pouring into the State department of revenue however, and the next four days may put an entirely different aspect on the total collections. When the book closed last night the collections this month totaled approximately \$201,000. At noon today collections for today were announced as \$125,000.

One Killed, Two Injured In Mob Shooting Affray

Royston, Ga., March 11.—One man is dead and two seriously injured, one perhaps fatally, as the result of a shooting affray here last night, which was precipitated by the visit of the band of 50 or more white-robed men to the home of H. L. Bigby, a lumberman. Sheriff Moss today expressed the opinion that the members of the band who had surrounded Bigby's house became confused when he opened the door and began firing, and shot each other and Bigby.

Walter Adams, a farmer, was killed, and Ben Harrison seriously wounded. They are believed to have been members of the band. Bigby was shot through the head, and little hope was held out for his recovery. The sheriff said the band had visited Bigby's because of alleged attention he paid to a married woman here. He also added that a secret organization had recently sent Bigby warnings to cease his attentions to the woman. Bigby is a married man.

Valera Resigns The Presidency

Dublin, March 11.—(AP)—Eamon de Valera, Irish Republican leader, has resigned the Presidency of the Sinn Féin following rejection by the Republican General Assembly of his motion favoring Republican representation in the Dail Eireann and Ulster Parliament.

PACT IN BALKANS SAID TO DEPEND ON MACEDONIA

Appeal Made To Stop Opposition To Central Europe Peace By Revolutionists.

Sofia, Bulgaria, March 11.—(INS)—The whole problem of the successful conclusion of a Balkan pact hinges around the Macedonian question, according to Professor Mitkoff, the well known Russian political observer. Writing in his newspaper, "Todorina Novosti," the professor declares that in his view the Macedonian problem is the greatest drawback to the consummation of such a pact, and appeals to the Macedonian revolutionary organization to change its revolutionary methods and do all it can to avoid obstructing a Serbo-Bulgarian rapprochement.

Professor Mitkoff's article has caused some irritation in Macedonian circles, and a circular has been sent to him informing him that the Macedonians are not hindering the negotiations, but are trying to help the formation of such a pact in every way possible.

The circular states that the Macedonians do not desire to mix in Bulgarian politics, but they desire it to be known to all the world that Macedonians and their patriotic organizations will always oppose such governments as the late Premier Stambolisky's which, they assert, did great harm to the Macedonian cause and its interests.

Replying to the charge of its adoption of revolutionary methods, the circular draws attention to the fact that the Macedonians believe that if they laid down their arms they would immediately be persecuted to a great extent, and perhaps, massacred, by their enemies.

"The Macedonians' refugees will lay down their arms as soon as the Serbian government changes its tactics and allows us the same freedom as its own citizens," the circular states. "All we desire is the elementary right of freedom granted to us by the League of Nations."

"We are ready to lay down our arms and form an autonomous province under the Serbian regime," the circular declares, "but we cannot lay down those arms while the Serbians have derived us of our churches and schools, suppressed our local language, and otherwise persecuted us. The change of tactics must first begin at Belgrade."

Sen. Committee Is Against McCamant For U. S. Judgeship

Washington, March 11.—(AP)—The senate judiciary committee voted seven to two today against the nomination of Wallace McCamant, of Oregon, to be a federal court judge.

Seven members of the committee were absent and it was agreed that they should be polled before a report on the nomination was returned to the senate.

Mr. McCamant is the man who six years ago at the republican convention nominated Calvin Coolidge to be vice president.

Negotiations By League Council Resumed Today

Geneva, March 11.—(AP)—Members of the council of the League of Nations went into a secret unofficial session late this afternoon to resume negotiations on the problem of reconstructing the council and of Germany's election to a permanent seat, which broke up sensationally last night. Premier Briand replaced M. Boncour as French representative.

ASK FOR RECEIVER TOBACCO CO-OPS DIED LAST NIGHT

Seventy-One Tennessee Members File Suit Against Dark Tobacco Association

Louisville, Ky., March 11.—(AP)—While suits were being filed to dissolve two co-operative tobacco marketing associations yesterday, farmers were being advised not to overplant tobacco this year and today they were wondering what effect, if any, these actions will have on the price of the product.

Seventy-one Tennessee members of the dark tobacco growers' Co-operative Marketing association filed suit here asking that a receivership be appointed for the association and the subsidiary corporation. They charge the association is insolvent and ask for a dissolution, accounting and settlement of affairs.

Five members of the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Cooperative Marketing association residing in Virginia asked that a hearing be given to show why receivership should not be appointed. Their complaint, which was filed at Raleigh, N. C., charges fraud and misrepresentation.

A large tobacco crop this year will bring low prices and financial ruin for the farmers, the board of governors of the Tobacco association of the United States meeting at Richmond yesterday decided. They advised the farmers to be sure there was no surplus of tobacco on the market this year.

Similar suits, previously had been filed against both associations from which they successfully emerged. Five weeks ago the Tri-State Association was cleared in a suit filed by Wiley Person, of North Carolina. A month ago Judge John P. Gregory decided in favor of the tobacco pool in an action brought by the Tobacco Growers of the Green River Kentucky district.

SHOWDOWN NEAR ON DAM PLAN IN COLORADO RIVER

Big Bond Issues Provide For Raising \$100,000,000—Dam To Cost \$40,000,000

Washington, March 11.—(INS)—A showdown is rapidly approaching on the giant Colorado river development project which has been a congressional bone of contention for many years.

Solidly backed by the administration, as a result of last minute amendments, the Johnson-Swain bill, calling for expenditure of more than \$100,000,000 by the federal government was conceded an excellent chance of passage during the next 30 days.

Despite the universal need for ample water supplies throughout the arid southwest, a variety of complications have halted action on the project during the many sessions it has been before congress.

Not the least of these was disagreement between the seven interested states over allocation of water. Entrance of the federal government into the electric power business was another criticism leveled by opponents of government operation of utilities.

Under amended regulations approved by the administration, agreement between six of the seven states will be sufficient for enactment. Arizona, which refused to ratify the compact has now the alternative of approving it or seeing the measure go through regardless. With the exception of California, Colorado, Wyoming, Nevada, Utah and New Mexico have approved. California is expected to swing into line.

The Colorado river alternately floods agricultural lands, through which it passes and then, during the summer drought, dries up to a mere trickle.

Wastage of the huge volume of water which flows almost unused to the Gulf of California has aroused thousands of farmers whose lands are regarded as among the most fertile in the country, provided they are irrigated.

The giant dam, 550 feet high, would impound the flood waters, holding them until the long summer seasons when they would be gradually released.

One of the important provisions of the bill is an All American canal which would divert Colorado water into the rich Imperial Valley (California). The present irrigation canal flows part way through Mexico and that country is gradually acquiring water rights which in time might force the United States to allocate considerable portions to Mexican farmers, even though all of the cost of development were borne by Americans.

The amended legislation provides for bond issues aggregating more than \$100,000,000 to be floated by the interior department. The dam, it is estimated, will cost \$40,000,000, the power installation \$30,000,000, and the All American canal \$30,000,000.

The populous Los Angeles district and Southern California generally would be beneficiaries of the development. Los Angeles, is confronted with an immediate need for additional domestic water supplies because of the phenomenal growth of the past few years.

The electric power would play a large part in the industrial growth of California, is believed, Los Angeles officials have assured the interior department that they will contract to use all of the power they can get.

URGE FARMERS TO CUT THIS YEAR'S TOBACCO ACREAGE

Bumper Crop Would Mean Collapse Of Prices And Disaster For Farmers, Car- rington Declares.

Danville, March 10.—A. B. Carrington, president of the Tobacco Association of the United States, today issued a statement here in the name of the board of directors warning producers of tobacco in the dark and bright belts of the south that the planting of a full sized crop will inevitably mean the collapse of prices at the next marketing season.

The tobacco trade as a whole has a surplus on hand from other years at the present time, and the statement adds, the American dealer, will be unable to absorb the excess.

A survey made by the association indicates that an abnormal large crop is being planned in the dark and bright belts, and the directors, viewing this with apprehension, have adopted resolutions urging curtailment. The warning applies more particularly to the dark tobacco belt in Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia, the statement says, has in former years made an annual purchase in this country of about 40,000,000 pounds, and is now trailing tobacco in such quantity that some is being exported.

Italy is considered off the dark market in the United States this year and England because of its increasing consumption of dark tobacco grown in her colonies, will curtail her purchases in America fully twenty per cent, leaving an unoccupied field. Production of a normal sized crop of dark would be ruinous, it is argued.

In the large district embracing Virginia, North and South Carolina, a crop in excess of 600,000,000 pounds will constitute a surplus, which the trade will not be able to handle, thus creating a disastrous financial situation, the statement says. It is also pointed out that foreign countries are now producing twice as much tobacco as is grown in the United States, hence a depreciation in demand and the necessity of scaling down the supply to meet the demand.

Interment will take place in the family burying ground, with services at the grave being in charge of Greenville Lodge 284, A. F. and A. M.

Mr. Barnhill was a native of this county and was a son of Mr. J. Richard Barnhill. He was a prominent and successful farmer and was held in high esteem by a host of friends. He will be greatly missed by people throughout his community.

The deceased is survived by his wife, who was Miss Ebbie Langley, of this county, three sons, Edwin, Durwood and John Edward Barnhill, his parents, three sisters, Mrs. Charles Mcintosh, Avder; Mrs. A. BUTLER CHARGES WILLIAMS WITH INTOXICATION

Commander Of Marine Base Under Technical Arrest As Result Of General Butler's Charges.

San Diego, Cal., Mar. 11.—(AP)—Under technical arrest as a result of charges of intoxication brought against him by Brigadier General Smedley D. Butler, of the Marine Corps, Colonel Alexander Williams, until recently commander of the local Marine Base, is maintaining strict silence to newspapers and to any other officers interested in the case.

The large navy colony in and about San Diego, however, is doing a lot of talking about the case, although not for publication, either. The incident arising from a dinner party given in General Butler's honor by Colonel Williams, who relinquished his command to General Butler on the latter's arrival here from his tour of duty, as head of Philadelphia police, has caused keen interest.

The filing of charges by General Butler followed the dinner party at Colonel Williams' home in Coronado last Saturday night, at which General Butler was guest of honor. It is said that cocktails were served at the dinner and that General Butler commented on the fact. A number of Marine Corps officers and their wives were attending the dinner. The charges, however, were said to be based upon a hotel party later at which the dinner guests were invited.

Several affidavits, some declaring Colonel Williams was intoxicated, and other that he was not, accompanied the General's charges. Regulations are said to require the affidavit of a navy physician in case of drunkenness. No such affidavit has been reported at the district headquarters. Speculation today among Navy and Marine officers centered in the action likely to be taken on the charges, which have been turned over to Rear Admiral Robertson, Commanding the Eleventh Naval District, for transmission to Washington.

France Re-Opens Discussions For Settling Debt

Washington, March 11.—(AP)—France has re-opened discussion with this country for settlement of her \$4,000,000,000 war debt. Ambassador Berenger, the newly appointed French envoy here, has been in conversation on the subject with Secretary Mellon.

While the secretary declined to discuss the negotiations today it was disclosed that he had advised President Coolidge that settlement of the French debt hinges to some extent upon the action of congress on the Italian agreement now under fire in the senate. It is believed therefore that the French negotiations will not be hastened unless the senate acts on the pending pact. The French debt is the largest remaining to be settled by the debt commission.

Several ineffectual attempts to make a settling agreement have taken place since the close of the World War.

Several Injured In Bus Wreck At Ft. Barnwell

Several persons were injured today when the large bus, operating between Morehead and Kinston, skidded off the wet pavement near Fort Barnwell and turned on its side in a ditch. A report from Kinston this afternoon stated that a man by the name of Britt, representing the United States Chamber of Commerce, was in a Kinston hospital suffering a sprained back and other injuries. Two or three other passengers on the bus received only slight injuries, the report said.

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HEART OF PEACH BELT WAITS BURSTING BUDS TO CELEBRATE

Fort Valley, Ga., March 11.—(AP)—Fort Valley, the heart of the Georgia peach belt, is awaiting the time of bursting buds and blossoms, to stage its annual spring festival.

The clouds of pink and white bloom, reaching in many sections as far as the eye can see, frequently remain unshaken on the trees for more than a week. The festival will be held when the orchards are at their loveliest.

The Creek Indians, middle Georgia aboriginals, used to dance against a background of pines, their thanks to the Great Spirit, giver of maize, health and good hunting. Nowadays, in similar annual rites, middle Georgia youth interprets the coming of spring, mild winds, and peach bloom, the back drop being a horizon wide expanse of shell pink petals and lily white peach tree green.

Miss Dorothy Hale, high school girl in the title role, "The Peach Festival," will re-enact the history of the fruit for which Georgia is famous.

ISLAND JAPANESE GO TO LANGUAGE SCHOOLS DAILY

Honolulu, March 11.—(AP)—Three fourths of the Japanese school children of Hawaii, after public school hours, attend Japanese language schools for an hour daily, the census discloses. The total school enrollment for the territory was 56,801, of which about 20,000 are Japanese.

The large percentage is the basis for effort by the territory to gain further control of alien language schools by compelling payment by the schools of a dollar for each child enrolled and adoption of textbooks prescribed by the territorial school department.

Most of the children were born on the islands and are potential American citizens.

NEW MASK ENABLES GUNNER TO SEE BULLET MOVEMENT

Los Angeles, March 11.—(AP) Army tank gunners now may watch machine gun, rifle and pistol muzzle firing, gaze at oncoming bullets and see them deflected within a foot of their eyes.

A new bullet proof screen developed by officers of the army ordnance department makes it possible.

It is a mushroom like cap of steel, with a series of saw cut, an inch apart. These cuts are too narrow to permit vision when the shield is at rest, but when in use it rotates at high speed. The saw cuts blend into a band of light through which the operator in the tank turret sees perfectly. Bullets striking the whirling steel are shattered and flung aside, even if they land directly on one of the cuts in the steel.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Washington, March 11.—(INS)

The demand for sectional representation on the interstate commerce commission has grown so insistent in the halls of congress that indications now point to the enactment of legislation forcing the selection of commission members from different sections of the country.

One of the latest proposals was offered in the senate by Senator Trammell, democrat, of Florida. It would provide for the appointment of one commissioner from the New England states, one from the North Atlantic states, one from the South Atlantic states, one from the Gulf states, one from the Great Lakes states, one from the Central West, one from the Northwest, one from the Pacific coast states, one from the Central Interior states, and one from the United States at large. Only one member could be appointed from any one state.

To back up the birth control campaign against mosquitos recently launched, authorities of the Dominican government re-

cently purchased a consignment of 15,000 top minnows, at Orangethorpe, S. C. The minnows are champion mosquito destroyers, according to the bureau of fisheries, obtaining their food at the top of the water and hence destroying the mosquito larvae.

One thousand minnows were planted near the governor's mansion in the Dominican republic, and other consignments at the Harris Agricultural College and Nigua National prison.

Co-operative buying has been extended to department stores in Ontario, according to advice to the United States department of commerce.

A corporation known as Federated Distributors, Inc., has undertaken to buy all required department store commodities from the manufacturers and sell them directly to the shops, eliminating middlemen's profits.

Resident buyers will be maintained in New York, Paris and London, so that by importing direct the store, in the chain, can effect economies which will be reflected in retail prices.

The federation will devote itself at first to staple lines such as dry goods and shoes, but as the business grows, operation will be extended to other lines, according to the information.

In another effort to permit the union of families of immigrants upon American shores, Senator Copeland, democrat, of New York, has proposed an amendment to the immigration laws.

permitting the entry of unmarried brothers or sisters of an American citizen exclusive of the immigration quotas. Under existing laws, these relatives are barred unless they can get through Ellis Island under an immigration quota.

The interstate commerce commission would be authorized to reduce freight rates temporarily in cases of national emergencies, under terms of a bill introduced in the senate by Senator Mayfield, democrat, of Texas.

Mayfield would add to the existing law a new clause, reading: "Nothing in this act shall prevent any carrier or carriers subject to this act from giving reduced rates for the transportation of property to or from any section of the country with the object of providing relief in case of earthquake, flood, fire, famine, drought, epidemic, pestilence, or other calamitous visitation or disaster, if such reduced rates have first been authorized by order of the commission."

The Charlotte Observer will give \$175.00 in cash rewards to the best spellers in the state, and many county champion spellers will get free trips to Charlotte.

The spelling bee is to be state wide, and the schools of Charlotte and in the one hundred counties have been invited by The Observer to participate. Each school will pick its best speller in a regular spelling bee. Then all school winners, city and county, are to meet at the county seat to select in an old-fashioned spelling bee, the county champion. This lucky boy or girl may be among those who will come to Charlotte in May as the guest of The Observer. He or she will stop at the city's best hotel, will be royally entertained and will enter the state-wide finals. Then The Observer is offering the following prizes at the all territory finals in May: first, \$100, second \$50, and third, \$25.

In addition, the champion speller of North Carolina will be sent to Washington, D. C., in

June to take part in the Second National Spelling Bee Contest. All expenses of both the winner and a chaperon will be paid by The Observer. In the event that the winner is a girl, her mother will act as chaperon. In Washington more than twenty spelling champions will compete for \$2000 in gold and a gold medal. The first prize will be \$1000; second, \$500; third, \$200; fourth, \$150; fifth, \$100; sixth \$50. A five-day eight seeing tour and other entertainments are in store for the winner of North Carolina.

Schools in both city and county have been invited to join the bee and are urged by The Observer to forward their acceptances immediately to the Spelling Bee Editor.

Everything Now Ready For The E. C. Exposition

Mr. N. G. Bartlett, secretary of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce was in Greenville yesterday making arrangements for the Eastern Carolina Exposition and Fashion Show, which will be staged here during April, and which promises to be the best and most successful exposition ever held.

Mr. Bartlett, who has headquarters in Kinston, will come to Greenville the latter part of this month and will remain here until the close of the exposition. He is optimistic over the plans for the event, and stated that everything is in readiness for the splendid program of the week.

White Schools Durham County 8 Months Term

Durham, March 11.—(AP)—For the first time in the history of Durham county, so far as is known, all the white schools in this county will this year be in session for eight full months, according to Superintendent Barbour.

The eight months' term in all the schools is made possible by the sacrifice in some of the schools, Mr. Barbour says, on the part of the teachers. In schools where the money for a full eight months' term is not in the school treasury, the teachers have agreed to fill out the remainder of the term on half pay.

SOVIET TRADING FLEET PLANS STEAMSHIP ROUTE ODESSA - NEW YORK DIRECT

Moscow, March 11.—(INS)—A direct steamship route between Odessa and New York will be established if the negotiations now going on between the Soviet Trading Fleet and foreign shipowners are successful.

The soviet authorities are withholding the names of the foreign interests involved, but it is understood that an American and an Italian company are interested. Grain shipments from Odessa, and return cargoes of American machinery purchased by soviet agents would be the chief freight on the proposed line.

At the same time, soviet merchant marine offices announce the opening in the near future of a new line from Maripol on the Azov to Hamburg, London and Leningrad. Its purpose will be to carry coal from the Don Basin and ore produced by the South Steel Trust.

NEW WAR IN ARABIA AS CHIEFTAINS QUARREL

Jerusalem, March 11.—(INS)—The Imam Yehia, ruler of Yemen, is backing ex-King Ali in his stand to regain the lost Hedjazian throne for the Mashmites. It reports from Arabia are true.

The Imam has an old score to settle with Sultan Idris Saud, the Wahabiah chieftain, who has created a desert empire in little under three years by sheer force of character. The Emir of the Idriisi, another powerful tribal leader in Arabia, will support Idris Saud.

The suggestion that Italy is backing the Imam in his quarrel and that Great Britain will bolster up

Ibn Saud has been officially denied by both governments, who declare that they have no concern in "a purely local trouble."

ILLINOIS DEMS. EXPECT BIG STATE CONVENTION

Springfield, Ill., Mar. 11.—(INS)—Democrats from all over Illinois will hold their state pow-wow in Representatives' Hall at the capital here Friday, April 23. This date was set by the State Committee following the election of Thomas F. Donovan, Joliet, as chairman, to succeed S. J. Griffin, Chicago, deceased.

The number of delegates to the State Convention is expected to be the largest in years.

TWO OF YACHT CREW FOUND TO BE OF RUSSIAN NOBILITY

Branswick, Ga., March 11.—(AP)—When the yacht Valentine I put into this port for repairs it was discovered that the steward was Prince Simon Karsoff, former member of the royal house of Russia.

The yacht had boasted another member of royalty, Baron Vladimir Karsoff von Puchant. The baron, however, left ship's company at Charleston, having found employment more to his liking. Both noblemen have been in the United States about two years.

LAW TO PUNISH THOSE WHO COUNTERFEIT STAMPS

Washington, March 11.—(INS)—A bill has been introduced in the senate by Senator Cummins, republican, of Iowa, to punish all persons who counterfeit U. S.

postage stamps. Senator Cummins would make these counterfeiters subject to fines of \$500 or imprisonment for not more than five years.

The act, however, would not prevent publication of illustrations of postage, providing the pictures were taken from defaced stamps or plates.

ONE OF KREISLER'S HOBBIES IS PLAYING THE STOCK MARKET

Tampa, Fla., March 11.—(AP)—Fritz Kreisler plays the stock market in his idle moments.

A newspaper reported found the noted violinist seated before the blackboard in a broker's office. With him was a friend to whom he referred to as Foley. The latter, he explained, was his official stock buyer and adviser on Wall street matters.

During a conversation, Kreisler divided his time about evenly

between paying tribute to the violin as the king of instruments and conferring sotto voce with Foley as to the advisability of purchasing various stocks. He noted the changing figures on the board as keenly as any of the fifty odd other traders in the room and finally agreed with his companion on the buying for the day.

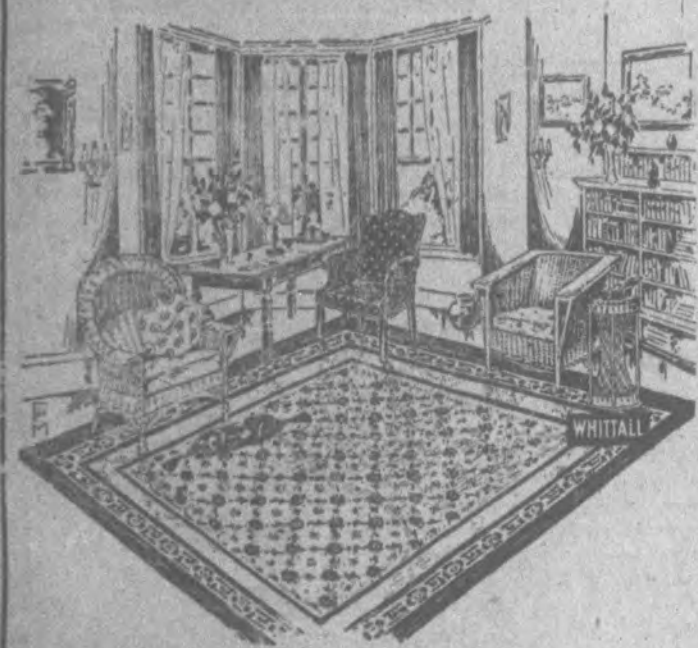

Daily Paper For Every Six Persons In State

Raleigh, March 11.—(AP)—For every six persons in North Carolina there is a copy of a daily paper published in the state.

This is shown by figures compiled by M. V. Atwood, managing editor of the *Times* (N. Y.). Observer-Dispatch, in a survey of North Carolina papers. With a total population of 2,550,123, North Carolina dailies have a circulation of 404,482, Mr. Atwood's survey shows.

There are 10 morning and 29 evening papers published in North Carolina on week days, and 10 papers publish Sunday morning editions. Seven of the Sunday morning editions are published by the morning dailies and three by the evening dailies.

Twenty-nine of the North Carolina papers have circulations under 10,000 each; five have circulations between 10,000 and 20,000; one has a circulation between 20,000 and 30,000; and the circulation of 40 of them exceeds 30,000.

Two papers in the state have editorial and news staffs of 14; one has 12; two nine; one eight; two seven; two six; three four; five three; and two, two.

The salaries of editors and reporters on dailies in North Carolina vary widely. Mrs. Atwood's figures show:

Six papers reported editors' salaries at \$60 per week; four at \$50; three at \$40; one at \$45; one at \$35; one at \$25. Others ranged as follows: \$50 to \$70; \$50 to \$65; \$25 to \$50; \$25 to \$35; \$20 to \$45; \$40 to \$55; \$50 to \$100; and \$30 to \$50.

Six papers pay reporters \$40 per week; one \$50; one \$45; three \$35; one \$25; one \$40; four \$30; and one \$10. Others ranged as follows: \$18 to \$40; \$35 to \$50; \$15 to \$45; \$25 to \$50; \$20 to \$30; \$35 to \$40; and \$35 to \$50.

Reports on the number of line-casting machines in the mechanical departments appear to show that there is a correlation between this and the number of men on staff; the number on the staff of the paper appear to be about on an equal, generally speaking, with the number of line-casting machines in mechanical department.

Murder Case To Go To The Jury Late Tonight

Gastonia, March 11.—(AP)—Closing its case because two star witnesses failed to arrive from Florida in time to testify, the state rested today in the Vanduyke murder trial. Immediately attorneys for Jesse Vanduyke, the defendant, announced that they would rest without putting on a single witness on behalf of the defendant. Former State Senator Carpenter opened the argument for the defense this afternoon. He asked the jury for a verdict of manslaughter. Other addresses by state and defense were to follow this afternoon and it was expected the case would reach the jury late tonight. Vanduyke is charged with killing Chief of Police Painter, of Cherryville.

Microphones To Be Installed In French Chamber

Paris, March 11.—(INS)—Microphones will soon be installed in the Chamber of Deputies, which will enable the Parliamentary debates to be heard in every home in France where there is a radio. An American company has received the contract and the work of making the necessary installation is now going on.

Loud speakers are in almost all French cafes. It is expected that radio fans will find the new addition to the evening's program a very interesting number, particularly as discussions in the French Parliament are waged with lots of bitterness and will provide "good listening."

A columnist writing in one of the French dailies has suggested that microphones be installed in the homes and the cafes and the loud speakers in the Chamber.

"In this way," he says, "the representatives of the people can know what the people think of them."

Nearer You Live Harder To Get In To Monte Carlo

Monte-Carlo, Monaco, March 11.—(INS)—The nearer you live to the famous Casino the harder it is to get in. The Casino houses what is known as the Club of Strangers or "Le Cercle des Strangers." Foreigners only are allowed within its portals.

A resident of the Principality of Monaco is not given admittance. Nor are residents of the French provinces of the Var or the Alpes Maritimes permitted to risk their chance on the spinning wheel of fortune.

This ruling is given as the reason for so much entertaining on the part of residents of these two departments and the Principality. When a friend comes from Paris he may enter the Casino by showing his poll tax receipt. After having once been given a ticket of entrance the bearer may present himself the following day for entrance without renewing his identity.

In this way a visitor to one of the families of the region is the means of gaining entrance for one member of the family for days after who otherwise would not be allowed within the Hall of Chance.

Any nationality other than French is not permitted to show a pass port before being allowed within the doors of the Casino.

Expose Letters Anton Tchekov To His Wife

London, March 11.—(AP)—With the craze for all things Russian, from ballet dancing to Cossack riding, the name of Anton Tchekov, dramatist and story writer, has become a household word in England.

An English translation has appeared of his letters to his wife, Olga Leonardovna Knipper, a German actress, whom he married in 1901. In them, the introspective Russian soul reveals itself in many quaint ways.

"Greetings, my little sweet," runs an ante-nuptial letter. "I embrace you, traitress, a hundred times. I kiss you warmly. Write, write, my joy or when we are married, I'll beat you. You hermit, Ant."

Tchekov liked to poke aly fun sometimes at his wife's nationality. Thus, he once signed himself: "Your husband in all wool pants, the German Ant," and again "Your stern, German husband."

"My darling German Pony" is one of Tchekov's terms of endearment to his wife, whom he addresses variously as: "My crocodile," "My sweet little crinoline without a tail," "My dear little whale," and "My dear goldfish." "Little frog" and "Little bee" are also favorite nicknames.

One letter he began "Greetings, you rascal!" and signed "Your husband, who wears ragged pants but doesn't drink."

Tchekov had to live in the Crimea for his health, while his wife followed her profession in Moscow. He died in 1904, after only three years of married life.
