TIME FOR SALE MEMORIAL COINS EXTENDED APRIL 1

Coins Will Not Be Recalled From Banks Until April 1st, In Compliance With McLean's Request.

Chairman for North Carolina, Mr. Cameron Morrison wired the Stone Mountain Memorial Association at Atlanta as follows: "Inasmuch as North Carolina has responded so wonderfully in the short time allotted us to sell our quota of Stone Mountain Memorial Coins, I feel that it is only fair to the people of this state to give us until April 1st. If you cannot do this, North Carolina will in all probability lead every southern state anyway, we are just like that in North Carolina."

To which reply was received March 12 as follows: "Your wire. You may have to April first as we will not recall coins from banks there until that date."

This will be splendid news to the many cities and towns in North Carolina who really need more time to sell their quotas. Already in North Carolina over 100 towns are organized and at work. The city coins are being sold at prices of a higher average than any southern state.

After April 1st, all coins will be withdrawn after which date no Stone Mountain Memorial Coin can be purchased at the old price except by special order. On April 15 price advances to \$2.

Appeals Brazil Not To Oppose Election Germany

Geneva, March 15.—(AP)—A supreme appeal to Brazil not to oppose the election of Germany for membership in the League of nations in a permanent seat in the league council, is being addressed to Rio de Janeiro by the council.

All of the council members, including the president, drafted the cablegram this afternoon in consultation with the Brazilian delegates, but it is understood that it is going as a message from the council and not from the delegates.

S.O.S. SENT OUT TO PRESBYTERIANS

On Account Of Shortage In Receipts a Veritable S. O. S. Call Is Sent Out.

Atlanta, Ga., March 15.—(AP)—A veritable S. O. S. has been sent out to Presbyterians of the South by the four executive committees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States on account of shortage in receipts for this year.

The church year will close on March 31 and the latest figures show a shortage of \$1,471,001 in the total budget of \$2,705,000 for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Christian Education, Ministerial Relief, Publication and Sabbath School work. The shortage amounts to 53 per cent of the budget.

The shortage for Foreign Missions is \$788,274,000. Home Missions, \$446,000; for Christian Education and Ministerial Relief \$224,643 and for Publication and Sabbath School Work, \$12,078.

34 Killed In Traffic Accidents During Last Week

Dixie yielded one of the lowest tolls during the week just ended that has been recorded in several months—34 killed and 231 injured. The figures were revealed in a survey conducted today in eleven southern states by the Associated Press.

North Carolina was at the top of the column with six deaths and Florida ran a close second with five. Kentucky brought up the rear with no deaths and was the only state having this record for the week. Georgia led in the injured column with 55, while North Carolina had 39 injured.

British Exchequer Wants Film Profits

London, March 15.—(AP)—A big effort to make in, for the benefit of the British Exchequer, profits made in England from American plays and films is now under consideration.

Theatrical circles have represented to the British Treasury that foreign authors, whose works are played in Britain, escape British income tax, as do also the majority of cabaret artists and vaudeville players.

They estimate that \$50,000 weekly is being paid to American playwrights and composers, not a penny of which goes to the British income tax.

NEW AIR MAIL ROUTE TO OPEN IN FEW WEEKS

Will Cut Time Of Trip Between East And West By At Least Eighteen Hours.

Los Angeles, March 15.—(IN)—Time will turn backward more than three quarters of a century next month when the United States air mail takes flight on the new Los Angeles - Salt Lake City schedule.

Seventy-seven years after the followers of Brigham Young began their slow march from Utah's desert like prairies into California's "promised land" of gold and golden sunshine and fruits, mail planes will make the same trip in seven hours.

And over the famous Arrowhead Trail, long famed in southwestern legend and history, will the speedy air planes wing their jaunt with the mails.

The trail, rich in the history of Mormonism and early California, leads directly east from Los Angeles to San Bernardino and thence eastward across the state of Nevada and on to Salt Lake City. The only stop made by the dashing mail planes between Los Angeles and Salt Lake will be at Las Vegas, Nevada.

The fleet of planes to be used in the service is now being completed at the Douglas aircraft plant in Santa Monica, near here, and inauguration of the flights is assured for the first week in April. The new planes will be improved models of the Douglas type used in the epochal American routing the world flight in 1925.

Los Angeles mails will reach New York eighteen hours faster when the new air service is started. Actual flying time to Salt Lake City a distance of 620 miles, will be seven hours. The twenty-hour delay in air mail service at present, created by the necessity of shipping to Los Angeles mails by rail to San Francisco, where they are loaded on planes which meet the federal carriers in Salt Lake, will be entirely eliminated.

As the concern handling the Salt Lake mail route is licensed as a common carrier, passengers and light freight, in addition to mail, will be carried over the route.

Will Rogers To Be Heard Here Monday, April 5

Will Rogers and the De Reszke Singers who will be heard at Eastern Carolina Exposition, Greenville Monday evening, April 5, two performances, matinee 3:30, evening 8:30, have proved a novel as well as successful combination. Rogers with his distinctly American comments on everything under the sun and the De Reszke Singers with their almost completely classic repertoire are a great contrast. A Shaky League.

Have you the latest news about that beautiful League of Nations, that was to give the world peace and forever end strife. One pro League newspaper gets this dispatch from Geneva, "The League is tottering as Germany rejects Briand compromise."

On page three of the same newspaper a Washington correspondent marvels at the power of small nations to mixup the League, describing Washington as "concerned over the misuse of the League for personal ambitions."

The New York Times, now describes the League situation as "very near the breaking point," with "the fate of three governments in the balance."

Would it not be wise to keep the fate of this government out of any such balance, out of the League of Nations and the world court, which is an annex and back door to the League?

Prohibition is startled by results of nation-wide poll on the Volstead Act and prohibition.

The vote, overwhelmingly against the Volstead Act, stood yesterday with 449,913 wanting the prohibition law changed to admit light wines and beers, or abolished entirely.

Only 76,585 would keep prohibition as it is.

Earnest dries, urging President Coolidge to declare for prohibition on the present basis, evidently feel that there is a crisis and danger of the wet tide's return.

President Coolidge probably will think over carefully the fact that the public appears to favor some change by 10 to 1.

MR. J. Q. ADAMS FOUND DEAD IN WOODS SUNDAY

Death Believed To Be Due To Exposure While Deceased Was In Intoxicated Condition; Still Located Short Distance From Body.

Mr. John Quincy Adams, 54, who lived on the McGowan farm, a few miles of this city, was found dead late yesterday afternoon in the woods on the Mills farm. Coroner Wilkinson was immediately notified. The coroner's inquest has been continued until further evidence, but it is believed that death was due to exposure while the deceased was in an intoxicated condition. Funeral services were conducted from his late home this afternoon at 2 o'clock, with interment taking place in the Mills' burying ground.

According to information Mr. Adams went home Friday night in an intoxicated condition. His wife insisted that he retire, but instead of complying with her request he left home and did not return until between 3 and 4 o'clock Saturday morning. About breakfast time he was apparently sober and went to look for a mule. He did not return all day Saturday nor yesterday, and was found late yesterday by two of his neighbors, Mr. Mills and Mr. Ed Smith.

Mr. Mills and Mr. Smith told the coroner that about a week ago Mr. Adams had told them that there was a still in the woods in which his body was found.

Yesterday while visiting the neighbors' plant beds, the men decided to investigate and ascertain if Mr. Adams' story was true. Before reaching the still, however, they found the body.

Mr. Wilkinson, after carrying the body home, with several men, a cart and mule, went back to the Mills farm in search of the still. Several yards from where the body was found, the still was located. It showed signs of recent operation. 1,200 gallons of beer in four vats, were destroyed while the still was completely demolished.

It is believed that Mr. Adams had visited the still, and was returning home when he died.

The deceased is survived by his wife and six children. He was a splendid farmer and made good crops.

178 Killed When Train Jumped Track Sunday

New York, March 14.—(AP)—178 persons were killed and 75 injured when an extension train on the Costa Rican Railroad jumped the tracks on a bridge over the Varrilla River yesterday. This information is contained in a wireless dispatch received by the United Fruit Company, which is owner of the railroad.

Three cars at the rear of a six-car train left the rails and plunged down a 50-foot embankment into the river.

TWO WEEKS TERM OF CIVIL COURT CONVENES HERE

Seventeen Superior Court Terms Open In North Carolina Counties; Judge Nunn To Preside Here.

Two weeks' term of Superior Court, for the trial of civil cases convened here today, with Judge Romulus A. Nunn presiding. Judge Nunn exchanged with Judge W. A. Devin, of Oxford, who goes to Orange county for a one week mixed term. A large number of cases are on docket for the two weeks' term.

Judge Nunn was appointed to succeed Judge Albion Dunn and this is his first visit to Greenville in the capacity of Judge.

Sixteen other terms of court opened today in as many North Carolina counties. Fourteen of the terms are regular; one—that in Mecklenburg—is a special term.

The Mecklenburg term is for two weeks, for the trial of civil cases. Judge W. F. Harding, of Charlotte, will preside. Emergency Judge G. V. Cowper was originally named to hold this court, but Judge Harding was unable to complete some important cases last week, and so will continue in Mecklenburg.

Judge Cowper will go to Gaston county, for a two weeks' civil term.

The Surrey two weeks' civil term which opened today, conflicts with the Forsyth term which opened last Monday. Governor McLean has named emergency Judge C. C. Lyon, of Elizabeth town, to hold the Surrey term, and Judge H. P. Lane, of Reidsville, will continue in Forsyth county.

Judges N. A. Sinclair and F. A. Daniels, of Fayetteville and Goldsboro, respectively, will be in exchange this week. Judge Sinclair, therefore, will go to Cumberland county, while Judge Daniels will preside in Chatham county. Both are civil terms. The Cumberland term is for two weeks, that in Chatham for one week.

Due to exchanges, Judge A. H. Stack, of Monroe, will preside in Richmond, in lieu of Judge Michael Scherck, of Hendersonville; and Judge P. A. McElroy, of Marshall, will hold court in Buncombe in lieu of Judge Harding. The Richmond term is for one week, civil; that in Buncombe is for one week, mixed.

Mixed terms opened in Pasquotank and Martin. In Pasquotank, the court will be in session one week, in Martin, two. Judge H. A. Grady, of Clinton, will preside in Pasquotank; Judge Thomas H. Calvert, of Raleigh, will hold court in Martin.

The Halifax term is for two weeks, for the trial of civil cases. Judge E. H. Cranmer, of Southport, will preside.

Judge G. E. Midyette, of Jackson, goes to New Hanover, where he will hold a one-week criminal term.

A two weeks' civil term opened in Guilford, with Judge T. B. Finley, of North Wilkesboro, presiding.

In Davie and Graham counties the terms are mixed. The Davie term is for one week, with Judge Thomas J. Shaw, of Greensboro, presiding. Judge John M. Oglesby, of Concord, will hold the Graham term, which is for two weeks.

Judge T. D. Bryson, of Bryson City, goes to Randolph county, where he will hold court for two weeks. The Randolph term is for the trial of civil cases.

In Sampson, Wake, Forsyth, and Burke counties courts previously begun will continue this week, this making a total of 21 court terms in session.

DEMANDS HAYES BE PROSECUTED PERJURY CHARGE

Senator Walsh Makes Charges Against "Surprise Witness" In Montana Trial Of Senator Wheeler.

Washington, March 15.—(AP)—A demand that the Justice Department prosecute for perjury George B. Hayes, of New York, the "surprise" witness for the Government in the Montana trial of Senator Wheeler, Democrat, of Montana, was made today in the Senate by Senator Walsh, Democrat of Montana.

As a spur to the Department he introduced a resolution, directing the Attorney General to advise the Senate whether it is his purpose to submit Hayes' testimony to the grand jury with the view of obtaining an indictment against him. Declaring that the story of the prosecution of Senator Wheeler makes a "black chapter in the history of American jurisprudence," Senator Wheeler said it was of "transcendent importance that the attempt through perjured testimony to silence a member of the body and overwhelm him in ignominy, should not pass unnoticed."

Reviewing the events at the trial in Montana last year at which Senator Wheeler was acquitted of the charge of accepting money for prosecuting oil leases by Interior Department, Senator Walsh said Hayes' testimony on its face was incredible. Hayes had told a story that Wheeler had conferred with him in New York and offered to split the fee with him for prosecuting the oil case of Gordon Campbell of Montana.

Recalling that Senator Wheeler himself denied the charge on the stand; Senator Walsh presented as was with her husband's "PB 521" further refutation an affidavit from Mrs. Wheeler asserting she was with her husband in New York throughout the day Hayes mentions and that he did not see Hayes.

Launching into an attack on the surprise witness himself, the Montana Senator said proceedings were pending against him before the courts of the state of New York as well as the treasury department. He also asserted that Hayes had been guilty of "falsifying" his income tax returns, and that four judgments had been entered against him for an aggregate sum of \$302,944 even before he went to Montana to testify against Senator Wheeler.

Senator Walsh said the prosecution against Senator Wheeler had followed his initiation of a Senate investigation of the administration of Harvey M. Dougherty. "We are led to believe," he said, "that in other countries men in public life, who have made themselves obnoxious to the powers that be run the

Prof. Frank Jeter Delivers Address On Subject "Co-operation Between Farmer And The Business Man."

Little Miss Pattie Hodges Whitehurst, aged eight years, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. H. Whitehurst, is confined to her home on Ninth street, suffering painful injuries, which she received Saturday night when her father's automobile, of which she was an occupant, collided with a car driven by Mr. Jack Moe on Dickinson avenue at the intersection of the avenue and Greene street. The little girl's face was so badly lacerated that eight stitches were required under the chin and three under the nose. One of the jugular veins was severed, and a quart of blood was lost before the flow could be stopped.

Mr. Whitehurst is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Z. M. Whitehurst, Sr., and recently moved to this city from Arkansas.

According to reports, Mr. Whitehurst and Mr. Moe were going in opposite directions. 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CAN'T LEGISLATE STATIC

David Sarnoff, vice president and general manager of the Radio Corporation of America, urges need of a nationwide system of radio broadcasting, with facilities powerful enough to span the oceans when desired. The exchange of international programs by radio, upon an organized basis, must wait largely upon the creation of a broadcasting system in the United States which can make the voice heard regularly across the Atlantic.

The greatest problems presented by broadcasting, he declares, are beyond the mandate of legislative action. "We cannot eliminate static by congressional vote. We cannot remove the cow from the track of progress by legislating against the speed of the railroad train."

HE OUGHT TO KNOW

Guy Huston, who is one of the country's largest dirt farmers, as well as being chairman of both Kansas City and Southern Minnesota banks, and president of both the New York and Chicago joint stock land banks, declares that "the bad spots in our agricultural situation that have held the farmer down since 1921, have been definitely corrected by improvement of our farm prices and restoration of agricultural purchasing power."

He believes that by next summer the farmers will have reached a position of financial security and a movement will start to increase their holdings.

A NEW RECORD FOR IMPORTS

The value of our imports in January exceeded that of our exports by \$15,000,000. This compares with a surplus of exports in January, 1925, of \$100,000,000. The data indicate a continuation of certain tendencies noted in our foreign trade during the past year. For the whole of 1925 imports increased 16 per cent. in value over those of the preceding year, while exports increased only 6 per cent. During the past month imports showed an increase of 20 per cent over January, 1925, while exports showed a decline of 10 per cent.

Seasonal influences at this time are conducive to expanding imports and diminishing exports, but these explain only in part the import surplus of the past

month. Since May, 1925, imports have been increasing month by month, and during last autumn they failed to exhibit their seasonal tendency to slacken. Last month's imports were the largest for any month since 1920, and at that time the figures were swollen by price inflation.

This recent expansion reflects the larger receipts of foreign raw materials incident to the high rate of industrial activity in this country. Higher prices of some imported materials, notably rubber, have likewise affected the figures to some extent. It is quite probable that our new status as a creditor nation is also stimulating our import trade, though this is difficult to demonstrate statistically. In any event, there is nothing in the trade figures to indicate that the larger volume of imports is a result of increasing competition from foreign manufacturers.—N. Y. World.

ERECT STATUE TO DISCOVERER OF ETHER AS AN ANESTHETIC

Atlanta, March 15.—(AP)—Bridges led Dr. Crawford W. Long to the National Hall of Fame.

His statue will be unveiled in Washington March 30, on the eighty-fourth anniversary of his discovery of ether as an anesthetic. Inhalation of ether for its exhilarating effects and the subsequent discovery of bruises or other painful wounds on his person which he had no recollection of receiving, led him to the conclusion that ether was valuable as an anesthetic.

Governor Walker and a delegation of Georgians will accompany the statue to Washington for the ceremony.

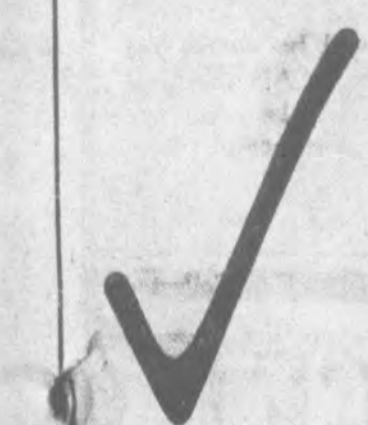

LIBRARY NEWS

We have prepared a report of the past four months' work done by the Greenville Public Library.

In addition to the report we have classified all books and with Miss Flournoy's help we have placed the classification number on each book of non-fiction and fiction in the library. We are now making a shelf list of each book, also title and author cards, which work we hope to complete this month.

Following is the report:

November—Fiction 1440; non-fiction 7; from State University, State Library and State Library commission, 4.

December—Fiction 1139; non-fiction 14; from State University, State Library and State Library commission, 11.

January—Fiction, 1409; non-fiction 215; from State University, State Library, and State Library commission, 20.

February—Fiction 1602; non-fiction 348; from State University, State Library, and State Library commission, 50.

Total—Fiction 5,590; non-fiction, 584; from State University, State Library and State Library commission, 85; grand total 6,259.

Of this number 3,452 represents adult book circulation and 2,807 represents the junior reading, 90 per cent of non-fiction and all of the 85 pieces from outside sources were for adult readers.

Reference Work

During November and December reference work done in the library was not sufficient to warrant a daily record of the approximate estimate was around 36, about the middle of January a daily record was begun with 33 for January and 153 for February. The greater part of work done in the library is by adults or people over 16 years of age.

Readers

November—74 new members, 4 renewals.

December—39 new members; 6 renewals.

January—71 new members; 4 renewals.

February—65 new members; no renewals.

Total new members, 263; total renewals 14; grand total 263.

We are asking all members of former years to make out renewal applications for reading in order that we may have an accurate number of persons using the library. But we shall keep the renewal's marked, so we shall be able to note each month the number of new readers.

While Miss Flournoy, of the State Library commission, was in Greenville many of you met her and we regret that more could not enjoy that privilege, so we asked Miss Flournoy to say a word to Greenville about the library through our Library News.

She makes the following response which is especially worth while to Greenville since it comes from the State Library commission, which knows the status of all libraries in the state and which

also knows those towns that support libraries and those that leave the library out of their program of civic institutions:

The library certainly lives up to its slogan, "Let the Library Serve Greenville."

It has been a stimulating experience to note the high grade service given. There is a constant flow of reference requests such as any large city library might have. These requests extend over the field of genealogy, biography, science, and general information. It is interesting to note that the library patrons get the information they desire, if it is not to be had immediately, it is obtained within a short time through inter-library loan.

The excellent library service is made possible because the city of Greenville has realized the value of a library and has given municipal support which is the most desirable form of library organization.

Several days ago a stranger came to the library and asked what the cost would be to join. The librarian replied, "There is no charge. This is a free public library." There was no red tape, a card was signed and a book taken out. It ought to be possible for every town in North Carolina to offer to its citizens this privilege.

There is in the state now a keen interest in library development. There are at present four large towns working toward municipal supported libraries. Many of the requests that come to the library commission in regard to establishing public libraries have come from business men, and some from chamber of commerce secretaries, showing that along with the industrial and economic development they realize the necessity for the intellectual development of the community as a whole.

Greenville is to be congratulated on its library.

"Man is naturally a combative animal," said the Harvard executive, who added that the increased respect and co-operation manifest between the different Christian sects has reacted in a lessened interest in religion by church followers who now stay at home on Sunday mornings.

By way of illustration, President Lowell remarked that if there were fewer intercollegiate football games attendance at the colleges would also fall off.

Harvard originally was founded to produce ministers, and at were ministers, the speaker said, one time half of the graduates continued, realize the possibilities for a career in the ministry, chiefly because they believe they will meet only the limited few who belong to one religious sect.

In concluding, he urged those present to go in to the ministry.

U. S. Spends More For Gum And Candies

St. Louis, March 15.—(INS)—More money is spent by Americans for ridiculous things than is spent for education and religion, according to Charles A. Lee, State Superintendent of Schools.

"For every \$100 spent last year," he said, "\$8.25 was for prosecution of criminals, \$22 on luxury, \$11 on investments, \$14.50 wasted, \$24 on living, \$13.50 miscellaneous and \$4.50 on government."

"The people last year spent less than half as much for education as for automobiles and tobacco. They spent less for education than they did for soft drinks, ice cream, chewing gum and candy."

Just recently experts in antique furniture and students of early life in America were employed at a studio to prepare the sets for a picture to be made of a story of Pilgrim life from the pen of Nathaniel Hawthorne.

Considerable research work was required before the experts agreed on just how church, homes and streets in early New England must have looked.

In many of the scenes in the film, genuine antiques were used. One woman residing near the studios reaped a tidy sum by loaning some of her collection to the studio.

Every month screen directors are finding it more difficult to film pictures—exteriors—in and near Hollywood and joints to nearby California cities are becoming more common.

The use of the Spanish motif in Hollywood architecture is one of the reasons for the temporary exodus of Hollywood's players. It is increasingly difficult to find authentic New England and Southern Colonial settings in Southern California, for generally in the midst of houses representing the proper types of a home of Spanish design is found. A location selected one month will be found two months later to be dotted with stucco bungalows of Spanish architecture and surrounded by palm trees.

Many Los Angeles streets are now so well known to patrons of the movie, that they are carefully avoided by directors making new pictures. Boulevards lined with palm trees are especially not desired in these days, for they have been made too ordinary in hundreds of pictures produced in recent years.

Cameramen are now being sent to new sections of the city. Often street scenes, however, cannot be taken to show sufficient crowds and traffic unless they are filmed on palm-lined streets, and then it is necessary to carefully eliminate the trees by means of photographic processes.

Says Newspapers That Poison News Poison Themselves

Chicago, March 15.—(AP)—A newspaper "can no more afford to poison its news than a dairyman can afford to put prussic acid in his milk," Harper Leech and John C. Carroll say in their new book on the newspaper, "What's the News," just published.

"The newspaper which poisons its product poisons itself. Suppression of important or pertinent facts in the interest of popularity, class, gang, clique or self interest is the equivalent of a death warrant if persisted in. Of this the toll of dead newspapers is sufficient testimony."

All phases of the newspaper's relation to the myriad activities of

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modern life are touched on in the book, which describes news as "accidental literature," and the newspaper as an institution "which is writing literature as the clock ticks."

The authors are members of the staff of the Chicago Tribune. Leech is known as a writer on economic topics under the pseudonym of "Scrutator," while Carroll also is an instructor in the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University.

The writers declare that newspaper men long have had a triple classification of news based on the themes of money, love and religion. "To be more specific and probably more enlightening, news interest as disclosed by the word in review as it tumbles day or night upon the copy desk from wires, cables, hot from the reporter's typewriter or cooler from the mails, seems to be summed up thus:

"Life and death, desire for amusement, curiosity, ambition and cupidity, wealth and poverty, religious hope, generosity and stinginess, honesty and dishonesty, heroism and fear."

While crime is called "the most interesting of all news themes—judged by circulation gains and popular interest," the authors assert that as the cost of publishing has increased and the volume of crime has increased the proportion of all crime that wins a place in the news has waned until it is less than one half of one per cent in the larger dailies.

"The most sensational newspapers are less sensational than their readers. Strive as they may to tickle Demos, the mechanical and economic limitations on newspaper space are such that they constitute one of the least sensational forms of letters. Per thousands of type or pounds of paper, they run less to crime and tragedy than most of the great classics."

"The idea that the suppression of crime news would lessen crime ignores the fact that newspapers are by no means the only methods for the dissemination of information. They have never superseded the gossip and the grape vine telegraph."

Likewise the authors find that comparatively little of available sex news is printed, although citing the subject as one of wide interest.

"Sex will disappear from the news when newspapers are written and read by Robots. Men and women and their problems as such always have been the theme of accelerated literature as of nearly all other sorts."

"But just as in crime, the very abundance of sex news in time forces a process of selection, until a very minute fraction of sex news ever gets into the newspapers and that is usually selected because it carries with it some unusual feature or appeal—exactly as the sex of great literature is always something vastly more than sex."

The relation of advertising to newspapers is commented upon. "It has become conventional to say that a newspaper lives on its by-product advertising." The authors deny this, saying:

"It probably is true today that the great majority of newspaper advertisers are as dependent on the newspapers as they are on the railroads, the postoffice or the telephone for their continued existence and functioning."

Expects Congress To Devote Week To Prohibition

Washington, March 15.—(AP) Prohibitionists general and enforcement directorship for the District of Columbia, Maryland, Delaware and Kentucky, specifically are attacked in statements here today opening a week that is expected to see congress devote considerable attention to the subject.

The statement came from the board of temperance prohibition and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church, repeating its contention that prohibition enforcements in many cases rests in unsympathetic hands, and from Representative Phillips, republican of Pennsylvania. The congressman charged that "under the rule of the dregs, the constitution is fast becoming a scrap of paper, the jury system junk, justice a joke, and the government through its agents the greatest law breaker. The board of temperance's statement declaring that while the recently organized group of men to combat misuse of the alcohol permit system would prove helpful when "anti-prohibitionists weher inefficient men are maintained in positions of responsibility, the confidence of the people is shaken."

The senate judiciary subcommittee will meet this week to consider pending bills to modify the prohibition law and decide whether it will recommend that public hearings be held. At least one address on prohibition will be directed during the week in the senate by Senator Bruce, democrat, of Maryland.

248 Killed In Wreck On Costa Rican Railroad

San Jose, Costa Rica, March 15.—(AP)—Two hundred and forty-eight persons were killed and 93 injured in Sunday's disastrous train wreck on the Costa Rican railroad. Three cars were demolished, one fell to the bottom of the Varilla river from the bridge over the stream, and two others were left hanging from a 190 foot precipice.

State Experiences Coldest March Winds In Years

Charlotte, March 15.—North Carolina shivered over the week end with one of the coldest March winds in years and today a promise of warmer but cloudier weather was welcomed. Yesterday was the coldest March 14 on record at Raleigh when the mercury slid to 15.9 degrees. At Asheville the minimum temperature for the day was ten degrees. The cold wave coming immediately behind Saturday's snow caused streets in many cases to be slick with ice, which was thawing away today.

Believes Germany Should Enter The League And Council

Geneva, March 15.—(AP)—The chief delegates of all the Latin American countries excepting Brazil and Uruguay, meeting today, voted that Brazil should not exercise the right of veto against Germany and that the Latin Americans believed Germany should enter the league and the council immediately.

Cambridge Boat Crew Is Training Hard

Henly-On-Thames, March 15.—(INS)—Cambridge University boat crew, just approaching the final stage on their four months' training for the great race against Oxford, have no false notions on the subject of prohibition.

Modern training is not on too heroic a basis. Advocates of to-

tal abstinence as an essential to physical fitness may be disappointed to know that this crew of young giants—average weight 183 pounds—are allowed not only to drink beer with their meals, but also to have a glass of port after dinner and, even, after a very strenuous spin, a glass of champagne. Only tobacco is entirely barred. As for the diet, this is on

old-fashioned English lines—hot joints, fish, vegetables and fruits. Made dishes, hors d'oeuvres and sweets are ruled out. But they can eat just as much as they like of the food provided.
