URGE INCREASE
SCHOOL TERM TO
EIGHT MONTHS

Also Recommends
That General As-
sembly '27 Be Asked
Provide Funds Erec-
tion Of Five Normal
Schools In State.

Raleigh, March 19.—After a morning spent in the discussion of specific and technical problems of the teaching profession in group meetings, the North Carolina Educational Association in its 42d annual session here convened at 2:20 o'clock for what was expected to be one of the most important meetings.

At the afternoon session the report of one of the important committees of the organization—the legislative committee—was expected to be made. This report was to be definitely launched to fight on the part of the teachers for the proposed state-wide minimum eight months school term.

The North Carolina general assembly of 1927 will be asked to call an election on a constitutional amendment to increase the minimum school terms in North Carolina from six to eight months, if the recommendations of the legislative committee of the North Carolina Educational association are followed.

The committee, whose report was made today to the association in session here, also recommends that the next general assembly be asked to provide the funds for the erection of at least five more normal schools in North Carolina, to provide means of securing more trained teachers for the state.

"Practically every problem with which we are confronted in education today is largely solved by a longer school term and better trained teachers," the report declares. "We therefore recommend to the delegate assembly of the North Carolina Educational association that at its March, 1926, meeting, it provide the authority, through necessary action of this assembly, to place these major legislative problems before the governing powers of the state and before the 1927 session of the legislature."

The report quotes school term and enrollment figures for the city and rural schools to show that 47 per cent of all children in rural schools do not have school advantages that every normal child should have. Taking the state as a whole, only 59.6 per cent of all white children have a school term that every educational authority, all experience and common sense indicate is necessary for the normal development of the average child.

This is putting our best foot forward, for all figures relate to white schools only. If the negro schools are considered, the showing is very much worse.

The report continues: "The shortness of the term is by no means the only discrimination the great state of North Carolina is permitting in its efforts to educate these 219,000 children in the country districts. But the short term is the basis of all discrimination against them. They are taught by the poorest trained teachers who work in the state. It is impossible to get a trained teacher to go into a six months' school. The trained teacher has spent money and time in preparation, and cannot afford to work just half the time, when living expenses continue the year through. That is not all. These children, nearly a quarter of a million white country boys and girls, are not only taught by the most poorly trained teachers in the shortest term schools, but they are housed in buildings that are no credit to a state that can buy 171 million dollars worth of automobiles in one year's time. In addition to the inadequate and uncomfortable buildings, these poorly trained teachers, who need all the teaching help possible, have little or no equipment or tools with which to do their work."

"An analysis of the results of this policy reveals an appalling situation. A normal child, making a grade a year, will complete the elementary school in seven years, of 6 months. He should

KILLS SIX, THEN
TAKES OWN LIFE

John Goins Hears
Wife Is Seeking Di-
vorce And Begins
His Round Of Kill-
ing.

Pacerville, Cal., March 19.—(AP)—John M. Goins, a Stockton real estate dealer, killed six persons yesterday and then ended his own life as he was being chased him over dangerous mountain highways. With his pursuers close on his trail, Goins sent a bullet into his head as his automobile plunged over a mountain cliff near Eldorado, a few miles from here, ending a day of tragedy in the upper San Joaquin valley.

Goins began his round of killing when he heard that his wife was seeking a divorce. Going to his home he killed his wife and his wife's sister. Then he sought the lawyer who was advising his wife and unable to find him, he found his wife and killed her. He then went to the office of another friend of the family, 24 miles away, and killed a man, his wife and daughter, with whom he had had a disagreement some years ago. He then fled to an adjoining county where he was trailed after radio warnings had been sent out for every one to be on the lookout for the killer. As he saw his pursuers closing in, he hid himself in a man's house and fired a bullet into his brain and his car left the road and plunged over a cliff.

Names Committee
To Serve "Board
Of Strategy"

Savannah, Ga., March 19.—(AP)—A committee of five to serve as a board of strategy for the Georgia National Guard, Georgia, Florida, North and South Carolina, was named today by M. O. Dunning, collector of the port here and prohibition enforcement co-ordinator for the four states. Captain Phillips D. Lauriat, of the United States coast guard, heads the board, which includes B. H. Sharpe, of Charlotte.

In addition to the present coast guard equipment for the states, two torpedo boat destroyers, six 75 foot patrol boats, and eight sea planes will be assigned to the district, Mr. Dunning said. He signified that a general conference of the superintendents of the anti-saloon league in this territory soon would be called.

WILLIAM A. HART
DIES SUDDENLY
HOME IN TARBORO

Prominent Cotton
Manufacturer And
State Highway Com-
missioner Succumbs
To Heart Attack.
Funeral Arrange-
ments Not Announc-
ed.

Tarboro, March 19.—(AP)—William A. Hart, cotton manufacturer and state highway commissioner of the first district, died suddenly today at his home here.

The manufacturer died at 5 o'clock this morning when he suffered a heart attack. He is survived by Mrs. Hart and one son, B. M. Hart. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

W. A. Hart was appointed a member of the state highway commission in 1921 by Governor Morrison after a successful life as a builder of his section of the state. A president of the Tarboro cotton mills, Mr. Hart was a prominent figure of his section and was an active contributor to every worthwhile cause.

His interest in agriculture was a matter of record and in 1926 he was elected president of the North Carolina Agricultural Society, which operates the North Carolina State Fair. He at once turned his energies to this new endeavor and had planned during the coming year to devote considerable time to upbuilding the state fair on its new site when it was selected. He was in his sixty-third year.

A Fighting League.
Chinese Chaos.

The League of Nations, unable to settle its internal fight, has adjourned SINE DIE, with Germany out of the League.

President Coolidge and the Senate please notice. A league that cannot maintain peace in its own assembly at Geneva will hardly maintain peace among nations scattered over the face of Europe.

This nation should keep out of the League's front door and out of the back door called "the World Court."

Our League of Nations forty-eight states, reaching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, should satisfy us.

Peking is said to be in a "near-chaos condition," and "Japan is gravely concerned," for good reasons.

If China goes to pieces and cannot buy or sell goods, that will be bad for business, Japanese and European.

China might be better left alone sufficient for business purposes—but there are the Bolsheviks. Japan fears that Bolshevikism may back the Chinese agitation, and remembering that the allied nations of Europe combined were unable to coerce Russia, Japan would not care to undertake that job alone.

Eugene C. May, highly educated, has left this earth in disgust. Years ago he learned the location of a schooner sunk in a few fathoms of water on its way from the Australian gold fields with \$30,000,000 in gold on board.

TAX RETURNS
SHOW INCREASE
OVER LAST YEAR

Returns To March 18,
Total \$4,174,348.54,
As Compared With
\$2,919,965.74 Of
Last Year.

Raleigh March 19.—(AP)—State income tax collections this year are running more than one and one-quarter million dollars, or approximately 40 per cent ahead of collections for the same period last year. This is shown by figures compiled today at the office of the State Department of Revenue.

Income tax collections from January 1 to March 18 inclusive 1925, totaled \$2,919,965.74 as compared with \$4,174,348.54 for the same period this year. The 1925 figures represent an increase of \$1,254,382.80.

Today's collections up to noon amounted to \$242,329.94 as compared with \$165,782.88 on March 19th, last year.

Mrs. W. C. Cobb and daughter, who live about two miles of Cooneto, are in the Park View hospital, Rocky Mount, suffering serious burns which they received yesterday when their home and its entire contents were destroyed by fire. Mr. Cobb and other members of the family suffered minor burns.

According to information: one of the boys started a fire in the stove with kerosene oil. The stove exploded and before the flames could be extinguished, the entire house was burned. Mrs. Cobb had been ill for several days and evidently received her burns while being removed from the house. The other members of the family were burned in an effort to save the house and Mrs. Cobb. It is not believed that the injuries will prove fatal.

Seeking Traces
Of Old Races In
Many Regions

New York, March 19.—(AP) In efforts to reveal secrets of the human race long hidden by time and to bring new specimens of life to this country, scientists of the American Museum of Natural History are working in many lands, some in the far stretches, beyond civilization.

Not all the work is being done in foreign countries, however, for out in Arizona Erich Schmidt, of the department of anthropology, has made valuable archaeological discoveries.

COL. J. C. COOLIDGE
DIES FOLLOWING
A LONG ILLNESS

Father Of President
Succumbs While Son
Is Rushing To Bed-
side; Funeral Serv-
ices Be Conducted At
12 O'clock, Noon,
Saturday. Interment
Will Take Place In
Family Burial Plot.

Plymouth, Vt., March 19.—(AP)—Colonel John Calvin Coolidge, father of the President, is dead, and his son lost a race to bid him farewell.

The end came at 10:41 o'clock last night to the country merchant, justice of the peace and staff upon whose humble rural former member of a governor's career special attention had been focused from the time when he administered the Presidential oath of office to his son by the light of a kerosene lamp. This was the time when President Harding died.

Colonel Coolidge was the only father of a President to have such a distinction. In two weeks he would have been 81 years old.

Leaving Washington in the afternoon when news came that the end of his father's illness was in sight, the President was between New York and Bridgeport, Conn., on a special train when his father died. The news was given to the train at Bridgeport about an hour after death occurred and was in the form of a telegram from Secretary Sanders at the White House. The President, plainly grieved, received it in silence. At Northampton, Mass., today, John Coolidge, the President's son, joined the train for the trip to his grandfather's home. A long and valiant struggle with illness and age ended when Colonel Coolidge gave up the work of life after a week of steadily failing strength.

A heart attack early yesterday proved to be the beginning of the end. His passing was without pain and very peaceful.

In the white farm house where the President spent his boyhood days, a faithful guard watches today by the bier of the "Squire of Plymouth." Deputy Sheriff Angus MacAvay, who acted as body guard for Colonel Coolidge since his health failed, remained at his post. Few of the neighbors came to pay their respects also.

Plymouth, Vt., March 19.—President Coolidge came home to Plymouth today. At 10:10 o'clock, the President arrived at the farm house where his father, Colonel John Calvin Coolidge, lay dead. He was driven to Plymouth from Worcester, accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge, and ran, John Coolidge, Attorney General Sargent and Major James F. Coughlin, the White House physician.

The Presidential party arrived in sleighs, having left their automobiles for the last seven miles of the journey over snow covered roads. A military guard saluted the Executive as he turned from the main highway into the road leading to his old home.

At the farm house the President was the first to enter and was followed closely by Mrs. Coolidge and John. A battery of cameras mounted on snow heaps beside the porch clicked as the party entered the house.

The Attorney General and Major Coughlin followed the President and his family into the Coolidge home. Across the road in front of the general store the entire population of the village stood in silence.

Major Coughlin emerged from the home a short while later to announce that the funeral would be held from the home at twelve o'clock, noon, tomorrow. Reverend John White, Episcopal clergyman, of Shelburne, will officiate. Burial will be in the little cemetery here where many members of the Coolidge family lie.

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FARMING AS A BUSINESS

"Legislation can help ag-
riculture help itself," Gov-
ernor McMullen declared in
an address before delegates
attending the convention of
the Federation of Nebraska
Retailers at Grand Island,
Nebraska.

The governor declared
that the farmer does not
ask the government to step
in and manage his affairs,
but does ask that he be aid-
ed in working out his own
problems. He urged less
talk, less thoughtless oppo-
sition, and above all, some-
thing tried.

"Agriculture is not a lo-
cal industry, in which only
the people of the farming
communities are directly in-
terested," Governor McMul-
len said. "It is national in
its scope."

"It represents an invest-
ment of over \$8,600,000,-
000. In economic matters
agriculture must be taken
for what it is, namely, our
basic industry, and our
largest industry. If it can
be helped through legisla-
tion or other industries are
helped then the help should
be forthcoming."

If the tariff system bene-
fits industry then it should
benefit agriculture. But
agriculture must first put it-
self in position to receive
such benefit. As it is now,
it is helped by the tariff
only in form instead of in
fact. Its protection through
the tariff is on paper instead
of on the farm. But that is
not the fault of the tariff.
It is the fault of agriculture
itself. One obstacle in the
way of help through the
tariff has been crop surplus-
age.

"So long as there is a sur-
plus of any crops, the sur-
plus must be sold in compe-
tition with world produc-
tion, and the world price
received for the surplus is
the price that has been ac-
cepted for the major portion
of the crop. That is wrong
and in every way is unbusi-
nesslike. It's the tail wag-
ging the dog."

"Agriculture is not ask-
ing special favors of the
government and it is not
asking the government to
step in and manage the
farmers' affairs. It simply
wants help to which it is
entitled, the same kind of
help the government has
given industry, labor and
finance. And there is an-
other thing agriculture
wants: It wants less talk,
less criticism, less thought-
less opposition and more ac-
tion. It wants something
tried."

COMMENDATION DUE
SENATE

A movement has been
started in the United States
senate to curb the "habit
of the senate" of embracing
upon numerous investiga-
tions.

There is a feeling that
congressional and senate in-
vestigations are in many in-
stances largely for political
effect and that as such,
they upset sound industrial
conditions, with resulting
loss and inconvenience to
the public.

We have legal, judicial
and regulatory departments
of our government, which
should be capable of carry-
ing on proper investiga-
tions and hearings where
the facts warrant. Such du-
ly authorized proceedings
might not be as sensational
in character as the "shows"
the senate stages, but they
would be as effective in get-
ting results and far less ex-
pensive for the taxpayers.

ELIMINATE INTERNAT-
IONAL MYSTERIES

This world in which we
live has changed so materi-
ally in the last few years
that many of our viewpoints
and judgments have had to
be revised. The rapid
 strides of transportation
and communication have
given us new neighbors.

No matter what anyone
may say, science is so com-
prehending the world that we
as a nation, cannot isolate
ourselves. It is too small
for us to be isolated from
each other, and avoid irri-
tation through want of con-
tact. Why talk of isolation
when the people of Berlin,
Chicago, New York, Lon-
don and Paris danced to
the music of the same or-
chestra on New Year's night?

We have got to learn
whether we want to or not,
how to live together under
these changed conditions.
New problems must be
solved.

One of the first steps, and
it does seem the most logi-

cal one, is to provide the
machinery to get the facts
on these problems and sit-
uations. Just such an agen-
cy is the Walter Hines Page
School of International Re-
lations. When this organi-
zation is started next fall
at Johns Hopkins University
it will probe world affairs
with the object of ascer-
taining the facts. It will do
in its field what graduate
schools have already done
for medicine and law—
provide a more systematic
method for the study of in-
ternational relations and
better trained men to deal
with international prob-
lems.

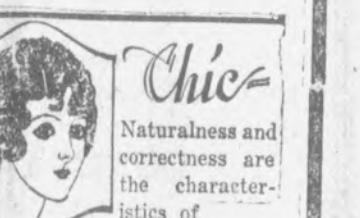

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

London, March 19.—(INS)—The shipbuilding trade in Britain, which for some years past, has been in the doldrums, is likely to be rejuvenated if a report issued by the Joint Committee of Shipbuilders and Shipyard Trade Unions is adopted and acted upon.

The report is a striking endeavor to break down the restrictions and hampering trade union restrictions on shipbuilding, which although petty in themselves, have had the effect of proving an important factor in the decreased orders received by British yards. It contains startling facts about foreign competition, and shows clearly why orders are placed in yards abroad instead of in British yards, and to remedy this state of affairs the British shipbuilders propose to arrange for a canvass of shipowners with the object of obtaining new orders.

"Electricity for all" will soon have become an accomplished fact in England.

The British Government has adopted the scheme put forward by Philip Snowden, when Chancellor of the Exchequer in the Labor Government, and will pass an act to bring it into force.

Snowden's scheme favored the "standardization of frequency" and the erection of large super-stations.

Standardization of frequency is to a scheme of electrical development what a standard gauge is to a railroad system. It enables current to be transmitted from station to station by interlinking cables.

Cheap electricity will thus be at the disposal of all industrial undertakings. The cable will also run through all rural areas so that the tiniest hamlet will have its lighting and power supply.

To avoid war in the future, the world must be taught that it is actually possible to adjust international disputes without resorting to bloodshed. Therein lies the secret of world peace, according to Viscount Grey of Falloden, former Minister of Foreign Affairs, in a statement in which he declares that "another great war may be the of 1914," said Lord Grey, can mean of completely wrecking modern civilization.

"A recurrence of the catastrophe only be avoided if future generations are brought up with a conception of war that takes account of the experience and lessons of the last great war. Previous generations were, indeed, educated to look upon war as an undesirable thing; to be avoided if possible; but history taught them that war was a frequent occurrence in human affairs, and that although it was bad to be vanquished, it was glorious to be victor. The heroisms of armies and navies could protect the nation, and recovery after victory was certain. The fruits of victory might even compensate or more than compensate for the suffering and cost of war.

"In the light of recent experience this conception of war must be changed. For this purpose it is essential that each new generation be made in warfare."

ENGLISH TIME EXPERTS ON THE WAY TO RUSSIA

Moscow, March 19.—(INS)—English engineers have arrived here hard on the heels of the ratification by the Council of Peoples' Commissars of the concession agreement granting the English firm Amur Mining Industrial Joint Stock Company extensive rights in far eastern Siberia.

They have already laid out plans for the first of a series of sixteen iron ore and thirty silver, zinc and lead mines in the Premorski government near Tschusun Bay, Olga, Vladimir and Tetche.

Under the terms of the concessions, the company must sell all its production to the government, provided the government desires to purchase. During the first three years of the agreement, which terminates at the end of thirty-six years, the company obligates itself to spend not less than \$200,000 equipping its mines.

HAS NEW LEASE ON LIFE SINCE TAKING KARNACK

COLONEL J. C. COOLIDGE
DIED TODAY

Coolidge, suddenly sprang from the obscurity of a quiet, little Vermont town to national prominence. Up to that time, the father of the new president, although he had been actively interested in public affairs, for many years, scarcely was known or heard of outside his native state.

Not many of the 29 men who were fathers of presidents lived to see their sons inducted into the highest public office, and among those who did Colonel Coolidge had the distinction of being the only one to administer the oath of office to his son. It was this more than the mere fact that he had become father of the president that caused the attention of the nation to be directed to him.

It was only a few weeks before that the son, then vice president, with his family had returned to the paternal homestead for a vacation. In the midst of this family reunion and holiday came the death of President Calvin Coolidge.

It was near midnight when the news reached the Coolidge home in the little mountain village of Plymouth remote from the railroad, and immediately plans were made for swearing in the new president.

The ceremony was delayed only long enough to receive from Washington the official form of the President's oath and when it arrived in the early morning hours the stage was set for one of the most solemn and dramatic inductions of a President in the history of the country.

Colonel Coolidge, he obtained

his motor from service on the staff of Governor Stacey, of Vermont, always lived in Plymouth, where he was born March 31, 1845. The fact that his son became President did not change his mode of living with the exception that he was obliged to spend considerable time greeting tourists who passed to get a glimpse of the place where Calvin Coolidge was born and spent his boyhood. These tourists came by thousands during the months when snow did not hinder motor traffic to the village. The colonel took a great pride in showing them the table where the president signed the oath of office, the kitchen lamp, and the Bible used in the administration of the oath. He also prized highly his visitors' register, a series of notebooks containing the signatures of thousands of persons from all parts of the country.

After his son became the occupant of the White House, Colonel Coolidge made occasional trips to Washington, but always appeared glad to get back to his farm and the life to which he had so long been accustomed.

Although naturally proud of the success of his son's career, the father never was heard to take any credit for it. "When Cal was in school," he once remarked, "I thought he would make a good doctor, but his main thought was a youth was to get a good education, and I did all in my power to help him. As a boy he always went with me to the town meeting, town caucus and such things, and always when we had a public examination for school teachers. He was always interested in such things. The point of it is, whatever he had to do he attended to it and did it the best he knew how, whether he liked it or not, and I think that's what he has always done."

Colonel Coolidge, although primarily a merchant during most of the years of his active life, was a man of many interests. After his schooling at Back River academy at Ludlow, which his son later attended, he worked for the village wheelwright cutting timber until he was 22 years of age. Then he rented the general store at Plymouth and conducted it until 1918, when he sold the business to devote his time to insurance interests and his duties as an officer of the Ludlow Savings Bank and Trust Company.

He was one of the organizers of the latter and a charter member of the board of directors.

At the age of 27 Colonel Coolidge was elected to the Vermont legislature and was the youngest representative in the session. He served six terms as representative and one as state senator. In his home town he was tax collector for 38 years, a deputy sheriff for more than 40 years, and school director for a long period. He also served as moderator for the town meeting and was assistant postmaster for 49 years. In the last named position it was said in the village that he was the only person there who was sufficiently familiar with the forms of the postoffice department to make out correctly the detailed reports required. His services also were in demand in the settlement of estate.

Colonel Coolidge in 1868 married Victoria Josephine Moor. They lived in a tenement in the rear of the store, where President Coolidge was born, until 1878, when upon the death of his father the colonel moved into the latter's home, the present Coolidge's homestead. Mrs. Coolidge died when Calvin was 12 years old. The colonel's second wife was Carrie A. Brown, who died in 1920.

The death of Calvin Coolidge, Jr., son of the president, greatly affected the colonel, and his friends said that he never fully recovered from the shock.

be 13 years old when he is in the seventh grade, provided of course his teachers are trained so that this factor of poor teaching does not enter as a retarding factor. If these quarters of a million children in six months' schools were taught by trained teachers, equipped with the fundamental tools of instruction, such as maps, charts, globe, and some library books and if they did not forget during the six months' vacation, much of what was learned in the six months' school, it would take nine and one-half years to complete the elementary grades. Such a child would then be 15-18 years old, instead of thirteen.

"These ideal conditions, however, are sadly lacking. We sin-

cerely believe, out of abundant experience in school work, that the poor training of the teacher and the pitiful lack of equipment and good working conditions will account for at least one month's yearly loss to the average child. He will then get but the equivalent of five months schooling a year. Under these conditions it would take the average child 11 years to get through the seventh grade. By that time he would be 17 years old.

"The average child in the rural districts, of course, does not complete the grammar grades. Long before he can complete these grades he has become discouraged at the progress made and has dropped out of school altogether. The truth of this statement is evidenced in the high school enrollment of children from the country districts."

The argument that the average farmer would not send his children to school longer than six months, even if the longer term were provided, is answered, the report asserts, by the overcrowded conditions of the consolidated schools, most of which are running the longer term.

The committee expresses the opinion in its report that "nothing short of this constitutional amendment, for an eight months' minimum term, will solve the problem in a manner that will be equitable to all sections of the state."

The report then quotes figures with reference to the qualification of teachers, the figures tending to show that the preponderance of poorly trained teachers are in the rural schools, and that the demand for about 2,000 new teachers annually is being met by the present normal schools with about 200 each year.

"Your legislative committee," the report concludes, "believes that the combination of a longer school term with better trained teachers in all schools will, within a reasonably short time, save more than the total cost of both the increased term and the capital outlay necessary for the building of a number of new normal schools. For this reason the committee urges the delegates assembly to ask the 1927 session of the legislature to provide funds for the erection of at least five more normal schools in North Carolina. The building of these normal schools should begin as early as possible. The la-

ation should be at strategic points, where the best interests of the state will be served and where practice teaching can be provided. The appropriation should be sufficient to provide adequate accommodations and thorough teaching for at least 2,000 additional students."

DRUGS AND COCKTAILS
FOR GIRLS IS NEW
DANGER TO OUR RACE

London, March 19.—(INS)—The modern girl's alleged craving for excitement and pleasure, and her too free indulgence in champagne, cocktails, whisky and sodas, and drugs, has once again been drawn into the spotlight of public attention here.

Addressing the Institute of Hygiene, Dr. J. S. Risien Russell, considered to be one of the most eminent nerve specialists in England, fiercely attacked the young girls and women who spend their days this way, as-

serting that they had too much freedom of action, which was fraught with more than one danger.

"Whether or not the World War is to be blamed for the change," Dr. Russell said, "the fact remains that the girl of the present day, even when still in her teens, has a liberty which is fraught with danger."

"The chaperone is, in the main, a thing of the past, and young girls are free to go out with the young men not only to dances and restaurants, but to all kinds of unsavory night clubs, with no sort of restriction and no limit of time when they return home."

BALLOTS IN STECK
BROOKHART ELECTION

Washington, March 19.—(AP)—A discrepancy of several thousand between the number of ballots in the Steck-Brookhart election contest received in Washington and the number issued to the voters was alleged today by Senator Stephens, Democrat of Mississippi, who is preparing a minority report recommending that Senator Brookhart retain his seat.
