SIMPLE SERVICE CONDUCTED FOR COL. COOLIDGE

Services Held In Sitting Room Where Oath Of Service Was Administered To President.

Plymouth, Vt., March 20.—(AP)—The little Green Mountain village in which Col. John C. Coolidge lived and died, set aside its ordinary activities today to bury its first citizen. In the adjoining town of Woodstock the President of the United States, a son grieving for his father, waited to pay a final tribute of love. The President came yesterday from Woodstock to spend an hour with Colonel Coolidge's body and today planned to pass several hours at his childhood home before the time set for the funeral.

In the little sitting room where in 1923 Colonel Coolidge administered to his son the oath of office as President there was to be held at two o'clock today a simple funeral service. The Rev. John White, of Sherburne, was to read the Episcopal office of burial and the Plymouth neighbors and as many others as space allowed, were to be admitted. There were to be neither hymns nor eulogy. A force of laborers worked until dark last night clearing a road through great snowdrifts to a little cemetery on a hillside where many Coolidges are buried. Selectman Azro Johnson had the task of preparing the grave in the plot adjoining that in which the President's mother, sister and Calvin Coolidge are buried. The deep snow was shoveled away from the plot and the scene and his assistants cut through the frozen soil, fulfilling a task imposed on him by the colonel himself several months ago. There will be no pall bearers at the funeral, but six body bearers chosen from among the national guardsmen now on duty here will carry the casket to its final resting place. Immediately after the funeral the presidential party will start on its way to Woodstock for the return journey to Washington.

Three weeks ago Colonel Coolidge transferred the ancestral farm with its 225 acres of land and the old White House, to his son, which was the executive's boyhood home. He left no will.

New Stake To Feature 100 Years Kentucky Racing

Lexington, Ky., March 20.—(AP)—One hundred years of thoroughbred horse racing on the historic Kentucky association track here will be celebrated with a new stake the Centennial Futurity, during the spring meet in April.

Fashioned for two year olds, it will be run over the four and one-half furlongs distance. Exclusive of the \$250 starting fee, the futurity already is worth \$14,280 gross, of which \$5,000 was added by the association.

Nominations closed July 31st. Nominations closed last July 1 with 340 horses named for the race at \$10 each. A second payment of \$40 fell due on January 1 and 147 were kept eligible. As stakes of this value are scarce in the spring, a big field likely will favor the starter.

The first recorded public race in Lexington was run in August, 1773. The first organized association, the Lexington Jockey Club, was formed in 1800 and prospered until 1823.

On July 29, 1820, the turfmen again combined "to improve the breed of horses by encouraging the sports of the turf," and organized the Kentucky association. Over the course were run many great races in years gone by. Few sprints were run in the early days, the horsemen favoring the two mile route, which seldom is used these days. Three and four mile races were also popular, with such long distance runners as Lightning, Tompkins, Lexington, Idlewild and others sporting the stunts of the pioneer turfmen.

GREENVILLE WILL BE REPRESENTED HI-Y CONGRESS

Jack Tripp And Kenneth Whitchard Delegates To Attend State-wide Meet In Burlington.

Jack Tripp and Kenneth Whitchard, representing Greenville High School Y. W. C. A., will attend the statewide Hi-Y congress to be held in Burlington the latter part of next week. All Hi-Y and Employed Boys' Clubs in the state have been invited to send delegates. More than a hundred leading older boys of the state are expected to be in attendance.

Explaining the purpose of the Hi-Y congress, at the meeting of the Greenville Hi-Y Thursday evening, C. A. Witherspoon, district secretary, said it was for a double purpose: First, to bring together a group of the leading boys of all Y. M. C. A. One other important and encouraging item of business transacted at Thursday evening's meeting was the receiving of applications for membership from the following boys: Joe Dresbach, Harry Bruce Smith, Withers Harvey and Van Staton. These boys wish to join in the Hi-Y club purpose, which is to create, maintain and extend throughout the school and community high standards of Christian character.

Mr. Witherspoon was called on to lead in the Bible discussion. The purpose and growth of the Y. M. C. A. work was reviewed. The President must find comfort in having made his father's last years happy and proud. Only a few years ago the father was teaching his little boy Calvin, all about farming, how to get up before sunrise each day and finish the day's work long after the sun had gone down.

Father and son worked together on the farm, and while their paths went in different directions later, they were never separated in spirit.

The father lived to visit his son in the White House, where Washington and Lincoln had lived, to talk to his neighbors and friends of "my boy, the President." There is no home on earth greater than that of a father or mother living to witness the success of good children.

16,085,905 BALES ATHLETIC TAG COTTON GINNED DAY TO BE HELD PAST SEASON TUESDAY MAR. 23

Crop In Running Citizens Of Greenville Be Given Opportunity To Help In A Great Work For Boys and Girls.

Tuesday, March 23, has been set for Greenville's first athletic tag day. On this day the people of the city will be given an opportunity to help in a work which will mean better boys and girls and eventually better citizens, for the type of youth greatly determines the type of adult.

This is not a charity call, but a call for the investment of a small sum in the betterment of the physical, mental and moral condition of our young people. Statistics show us that boys and girls who have advantage of physical recreation are more easily controlled than those that are deprived of such privileges, due to the fact that the energy released in a wholesome and beneficial way is not used in thinking up mischief; forms of playfulness is the father of crime; then let us raise to a program which will better equip our athletic association for the great work that is a ready started in our city schools.

The crop was estimated by the Department of Agriculture last December at 15,603,000 bales. The Department forecast during the growing season brought numerous complaints from southern members of Congress and others. The 1924 crop totaled 13,267,936, equivalent to 500 pound bales.

SIXTEEN KILLED WHEN EXPLOSION WRECKS FURNACE

Top Of Furnace Lifted And Molten Metal Spread Over Large Area; 17 Injured.

Birmingham, Ala., March 20.—(AP)—Alabama's mine field today recorded another major disaster when 16 men were killed and 17 others injured in an explosion which wrecked furnace number two of the Woodward Iron company, ten miles west of Birmingham. First reports here conflict with the number of dead, owing to confusion incidental to removal of the bodies from the debris.

The top of the furnace was lifted and molten metal spread over an area of several hundred feet. The men who caught the force of the flaming cloud had no chance to escape. Scores of other employees were working outside the area covered by the scattering metal. The furnace was an iron maker and hundreds of tons of ore in the receptacle, when the explosion occurred, was in the form of a liquid mass.

LAYS PART OF BLAME FOR CRIME WAVE TO THE PUBLIC

Frankfort, Ky., March 20.—(AP)—The public is held by some inmates of the Kentucky state reformatory to be in a measure responsible for the prevalence of crime.

A story in the Mutual Welfare League Courier, a magazine published by the institution, says that the unfriendly attitude of the public toward convicts released on expiration of their term is a great factor in inducing the convict to follow the path of crime, or the line of least resistance.

If people would stop and consider the other fellow, the story declares, give him no helping hand, a friendly smile, the population of corrective institutions would not be so great. There would be less crime and more respect for law and order.

BRITISH ULSTER GRANT MAKE TAXPAYERS MAD

London, March 20.—(INS)—The British taxpayers got mad when a government, urging the claims of economy, airily made a free grant of a million dollars to government servants for a sports ground.

But his rage has turned to frenzy now that Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, has proposed an annual grant of five millions yearly for five years, to Ulster, for unemployment benefits. To make this worse, Churchill proposes this, not as a loan, but as an absolute gift at a time when British income tax ranges around 20 per cent.

U. S. DISPATCHES CAUSES STIR IN EUROPE TODAY

Say Houghton Has Made Pessimistic Observations Regarding European Situation.

London, March 20.—(AP)—A stir has been caused in official and diplomatic circles by dispatches from the United States saying that Ambassador Houghton has made pessimistic observations at Washington regarding the situation in Europe.

Such dispatches caused the issuance at Washington yesterday of the following statement: "The department of state announces that neither Ambassador Houghton nor Minister Gihson has divulged to any unofficial person the nature of their reports to the President or Secretary Kellogg."

The stories which purported to quote Mr. Houghton's views, expressed him as being none too hopeful over the outcome of the preliminary conference of disarmament under the auspices of the League of Nations.

Commenting on Ambassador Houghton's visit to Washington the Daily Chronicle, which traces the government, wrote: "Ambassador Houghton, the foreign secretary, for the 'Geneva flash,' and adds: 'Ambassador Houghton can place his conduct in quite a different light there is every reason to fear that the Coolidge administration, which hitherto has been drawing visibly nearer in sympathy with Great Britain and the League of Nations, will draw sharply away from both.'"

Paris, March 20.—(AP)—Art treasures of the Luxembourg museum will have been wholly rearranged and in part transported to the Louvre by this time American tourists arrive in Paris this spring.

The Luxembourg is supposed to contain the best work of contemporary or living artists, it being understood that the living are not to be reckoned as dead until ten years after they have passed away. Then their work is moved out to make way for that of later artists.

WEATHER BUREAU EXPLAINS "FLORIDA" IN ALASKA

Washington, March 20.—(AP)—The weather bureau takes no stock in suggestions that volcanic activity in the Alaskan territory have caused the recent high temperatures there.

Instead, the bureau declares a peculiar layout of atmospheric conditions have brought warm ocean winds to Alaska and has deflected down through Canada the cold waves that usually pass over the Alaskan-Siberian sector.

"That's all there is to it," say the experts. "Volcanoes may look and act fiery, but the most ferocious one in the world isn't warm enough to heat up even a small corner of a regular cold wave."

On one occasion the temperature in Eagle, Alaska, was higher than that at Jacksonville, Fla.

FIELD VIEW OF FRENCH RACES NOW TO COST THREE FRANCS

Paris, March 20.—(AP)—When the bugle calls the horses to the post for the first race of the 1926 turf season in March, track followers who have been watching the running from the field for the sum of two francs, about eight cents, will be called upon to pay three francs.

The racing societies have decided to raise the prices in the field, while the grandstand and paddock prices were left undisturbed. There was much opposition in the city council to the increase.

NOT OPPOSED TO CONFERENCE TO DISCUSS MATTER

American Government Does Not Object To Conference To Discuss Reservations To World Court.

Washington, March 20.—(AP)—The American government has no objection to a conference of nations to discuss the American reservations to the world court and does not understand that such a conference has been proposed at Geneva would in any way constitute actions on the reservations by the League of Nations.

If the United States should take any part in such a conference it would be on the further understanding that it was not the purpose to consider any reservation or interpretation of the reservations as adopted by the senate. An authoritative outline of official opinion, made available today at the state department included the following observation:

It is not understood that the league claims any power or jurisdiction to pass upon reservations relative to the world court or has attempted to do so.

The situation simply is that the league council has suggested that the nations adhering to the court send representatives to Geneva on September first to discuss these reservations, and this is not understood to be action by the league, but by the nations who must accept the reservations before the United States adherence becomes effective.

If these nations desire to take this course there could be no possible objection. It is immaterial to the United States whether each nation acts separately or acts after council with the others.

R. J. E. W. Cook Assists Conferring Masonic Degrees

The Rev. James E. W. Cook has returned from Wilmington, having assisted in conferring the degrees of Scottish Rite Masons on a class of 31 candidates. These came from all parts of Eastern North Carolina. A large number of visitors were present to witness the work, from Portland, Maine, and New Hampshire in the north; Georgia in the south; Illinois in the west, and several intervening states.

Continues Hold Supremacy Cotton Mill Business

Raleigh, March 20.—(AP)—North Carolina continued to hold supremacy in the cotton-mill business, during February. It is shown by the monthly report of the United States department of commerce received here.

Although Massachusetts has a big lead in the number of active spindles, North Carolina leads that state in the number of active spindles by nearly 150,000,000 spindles. With 8,661,680 active spindles, Massachusetts had a total of 1,818,929 active spindles. North Carolina with only 5,816,274 active spindles, ran up a total of 1,766,643,667 spindles during the month of February. The holder her lead over the Bay state established for the first time a few months ago.

Objection By Blaine Blocks Shoals Action

Washington, March 20.—(AP)—Objection by Senator Blaine, Democrat of South Carolina, blocked consideration today of the Muscle Shoals joint congressional committee to spend \$10,000,000 for expenses.

THE IMMIGRATION QUESTION

The phenomenal growth of this country in population has never been equalled in history. Since the time that Columbus made his mistake and discovered a new continent instead of a new route to India, America has been the dumping ground for the excess population of the European countries. There has been a continuous, ever increasing stream of humanity, from all parts of the world, flowing into the United States.

Most of the earlier settlers came to this country to escape religious and political persecution. They represented some of the best blood of Europe and other lands and were resolved to establish a nation where tolerance of different religious beliefs would be observed and the rights of man preserved. English, French, German, Scotch, Irish and people of various other descents fought for the independence of this country and sacrificed their lives to maintain it.

Out of the intermingling of these and the fusing of the different races sprang the American. Having to face the dangers and hardships of a frontier land, the pioneer was dependent upon his own ingenuity and ability for existence and only the strongest were able to survive. Surrounded by such environments he developed distinct characteristics and although he has different traits inherited from his ancestry, he cannot be likened to any of them. The influx of foreigners during the first two and a half centuries was small enough for them to become Americanized and no serious consequences resulted. The increase of aliens in the last half century has been so abundant as to be a detriment, rather than an aid, to the progress of the United States.

It is reported that the growth in population has been more than 19,000,000 in the last sixteen years. The population now is about 115,000,000 of whom a large per cent are either foreign born or of foreign born parents. Natural increase would mean about 200,000,000 in the year 2,000. Exports in economy, politics, sociology and kindred subjects having to do with the welfare of mankind, agree that the population of the United States should not go far beyond 150,000,000 if American ideals are to be maintained indefinitely. Out of the estimated 14,000,000 foreign born in the country a few years ago less than half were naturalized, about 3,000,000 could not speak the English language, while an equal number could not read it. Some of our large cities are mostly composed of aliens, in the factories large groups are found working together who never speak a word in English, and even the post office department advertises its postal savings system in twenty-four different languages. It seems that the "melting pot" in America has ceased to function. Possibly it has been overworked. But few laws have been passed in the last ten years to lighten its duties.

In February, 1924, an immigration law was enacted by congress limiting the quota of immigrants from each country, and this has done much to help stem the tide of aliens. Yet despite the fact that it has been clearly manifest that these laws need to be even more stringent, bills are being introduced into congress to amend this law. Newspapers proclaim the hardships inflicted by the restrictive ordinance; sentimentalists grieve over the separated families, pilgrims turned back at the threshold. They would have them all admitted, be they criminally inclined, physically disabled or what not. It would be ideal if the bars could be let down, if they could all be welcomed with opened arms, and if the future is to be provided for, if American ideals are to be preserved, it is impossible. The immigrants of today come not so much in search of a permanent home, nor

acted by love of this country, but through the lure of wealth, the belief that they will be able to get rich quickly in the United States. Being disappointed in this belief, becoming poverty stricken, they often turn to criminal means to obtain a living; they fill our penal institutions and are a burdensome expense to the government, a parasite on the people. Socialist organizations find among them fertile fields to promulgate their teachings for the ultimate downfall of American tenets.

It is hoped that congress, in order to keep the United States from reaching the saturation point, to ward off the degeneration of our social and economic life, and thus assure America's posterity of a land of plenty, will enact even more stringent immigration laws.

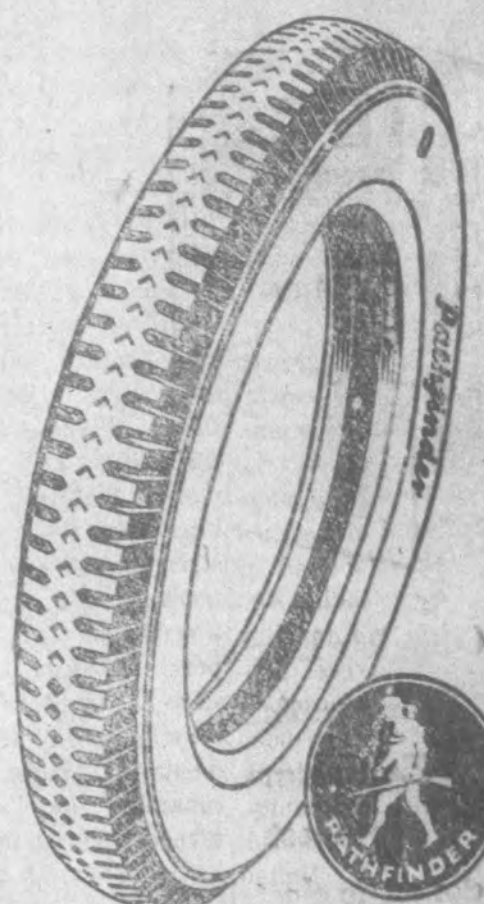

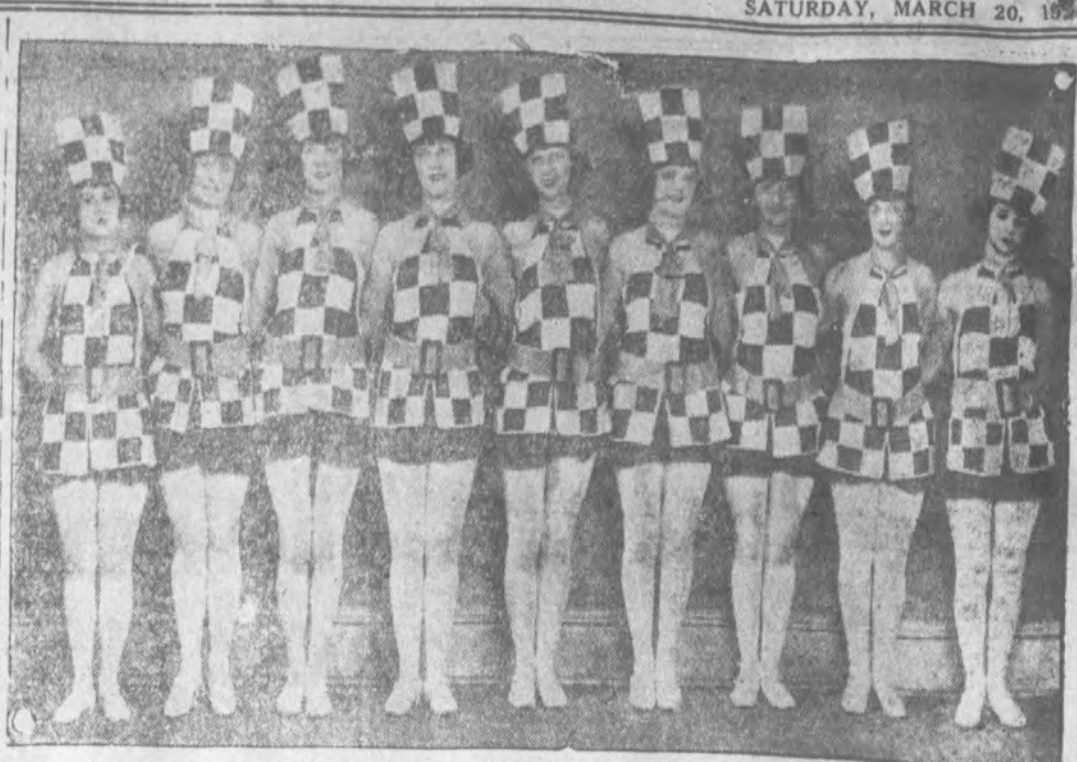

CABLE LETTER London, March 20.—(AP)—The "Buy British Goods campaign" which King George and other members of the royal family have sponsored enthusiastically, has affected the house of commons. To the dismay of the leaders of the campaign, it was discovered that for years the cigars sold in the restaurants of parliament have been imported from the United States. Future supplies are to be obtained from Jamaica or other British possessions. British empire wines from Australia and South Africa, also are to be placed on the restaurant wine cards. The British government, however, does not seem to be able to get along without American typewriters, and does not take very seriously the charge that it has done injury to British manufacturers by buying several thousand machines of American make. Even the king's explosive remark, "scandalous," when he was informed at the British industries fair by a representative of a British typewriter firm that the government was buying American machines in preference to British, does not appear to have greatly affected the situation. After this incident, the question came up in the house of commons. "And what," thundered an opposition member, "are the 24,700 foreign made typewriters in government offices used for?" "For typewriting," was the government spokesman's quiet reply.

Although King George does not talk over the telephone, and it would be a grave social error to attempt to speak with the monarch over the wire, it has been revealed that Queen Victoria was much interested in the telephone. The recently published letters of that conservative old lady, supposed by the younger generation to have been the greatest stickler for the established order in British history, shows this. On January 14, 1879, at Osborne, she wrote in her diary: "After dinner we went into the council room and saw the telephone. Dr. Bell (Alexander Graham Bell) the inventor, explained the whole process which is most extraordinary. It had been put in communication with Osborne cottage, and we talked with Sir Thomas and Mary Bidolph, also hear singing quite plainly."

Sir Harry Lauder, whom the world knows as a joyful entertainer, at the age of 56, and as a canny Scot who saves his pennies, said in a recent interview that the best investment he ever made was the seven shillings and six pence spent for his marriage license. Since the death of their only son in the war, Sir Harry and Lady Lauder have given up their great country estate and when in London live in a modest Bloomsbury hotel. The famous comedian believes in concentrating on one profession. He said when he attempted to combine farming with the stage he found that when he thought he was buying pigs, they turned out to be trees that stung him in the pocketbook.

"I've been cautious with my money," admitted Sir Harry. "I've given some away—a little, for we must have bait when you're fishing. I've spent some and I've 'reached' some and today I've a wee nicker somewhere in an auld stocking leg. I see if there are nae holes in the heel or toe. It's a fine thing to save."

Paris, March 20.—(AP)—Sir Basil Zaharoff, reputed to be the richest man in Europe and popularly credited with being the largest stockholder in the Monte Carlo casino, must bow to the regulations of the Monaco principality in the drafting of which he was greatly instrumental, and cannot remove the body of his wife, who died in February, for final burial at his chateau at Belincoourt, France, until the middle of next month. The ordinance provides that a body cannot be removed from the principality until six weeks after death. It was promulgated to sensational stories about the bodies of gamblers who had committed suicide being smuggled out of Monaco. One of the first to come under application is the "mystery man of Europe."

Brand Whitlock, former American ambassador to Belgium and the Rev. Dr. Shahan, rector of the Catholic university, at Washington, have agreed to serve on the international committee now being constituted to publish an account of the life and character of the late Cardinal Mercier. Raymond Poincare, former president and premier of the French republic and Monsignor Baudrillard, rector of the institute catholique, of Paris, are the

French members of the committee. England is represented by Lord Halifax, one of the anglican church representatives in famous malines conversations looking toward a union of the churches and G. K. Chesterton, the noted author, a Catholic. The committee probably will meet in Brussels or Malines some time during the summer. Berlin, March 20.—(AP)—The organized famine of the war time rationing days is being vividly recalled by a new problem which has been presented to the Berlin police. There is a plague of fasters, who do stunts of going foodless for various forms of money payment, and the police are trying to persuade several hundred men and women that food strikes for money exceed the bounds of sport and scientific research. As the result of profitable exhibitions by several professional fasters, the police have had to deal with scores of other applications for permission to give similar shows. Among the applicants was a woman weighing 250 pounds. Her plea was that she ought to reduce anyhow and that she might as well make some money while she was doing it. Long lines of spectators are now watching two professional fasters, displayed in glass cages on one of Berlin's principal streets. Daily bulletins on their physical and mental condition are posted about the city. Petrus Elsen, Chief Warden of the Berlin zoo and noted lion tamer, said in an interview that beasts of prey recognize human beings not by their faces or their dress but solely by characteristic movements.

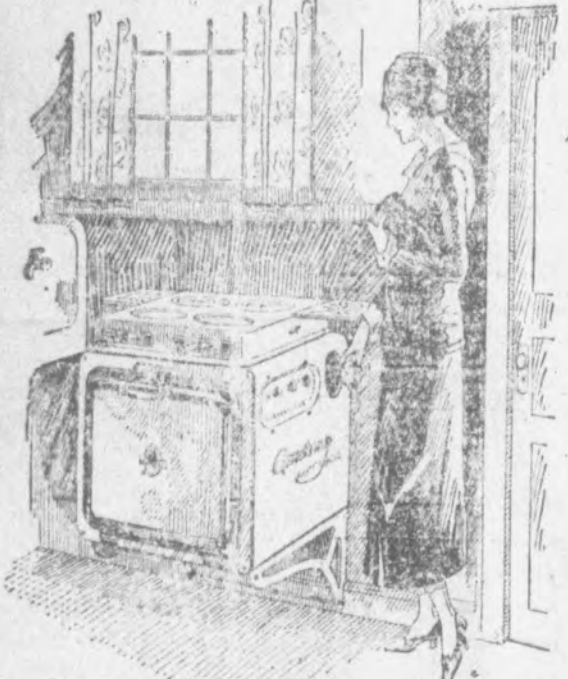

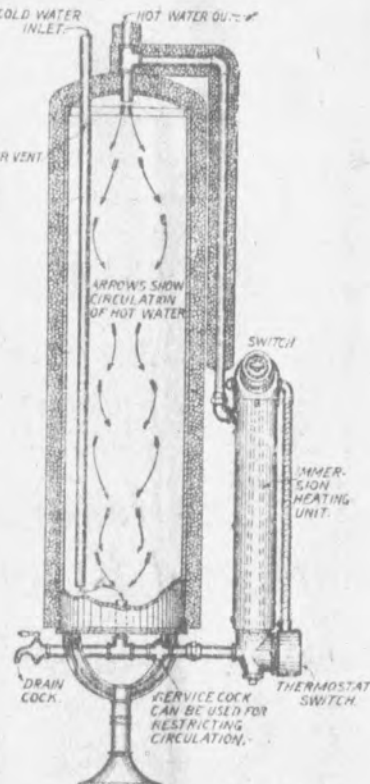

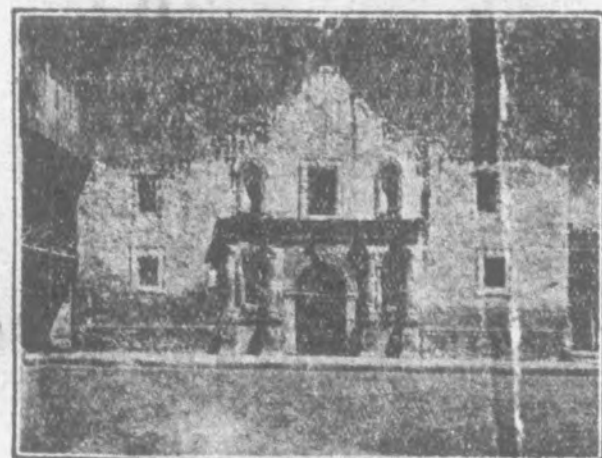

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

London, March 20.—Asserting that there is no limit to the ignorance and credulity of the public in medical matters, Dr. E. Farquhar Buzzard, physician at St. Thomas' Hospital, believes that the best way for physicians to combat quackery is to take their patients into their confidence and explain exactly what is wrong with them.

Quackery in the medical profession, according to Doctor Buzzard, remains undiminished despite the steady gain in the range, accuracy and efficacy of orthodox methods of treatments.

In an address before the Medical Society of London, he urged that standards of practice in properly qualified physicians raise their tion to their knowledge as a means of competing successfully with unqualified practitioners.

Industrial expansion is threatening the destruction of the Roman ruins at Caerleon-on-Usk, in Wales one of the most important historical sites in Great Britain.

The danger has been brought to the attention of the Classical Association, headed by Lord Hewart, which proposes to purchase the site for preservation and archaeological excavation.

Caerleon was the headquarters of the Second Roman Legion from the First to the Fourth Century, and there still remain there the outer walls of the Roman amphitheatre. The site is also closely connected with legends of King Arthur, who is said to have had his headquarters in that locality. Tennyson lived at Caerleon for several months to obtain local color for writing the Idylls of the King.

Extension of the use of the lash as a punishment for crime is urged by Justice Wright of the Manchester Assizes.

Under the present law the lash can only be used to punish robbery

with violence. Judges should be entrusted with wider powers, said Wright, and should be enabled to order a whipping where barbarous and brutal violence has been used in offenses against women and children.

The House of Lords is considering a bill to protect writers of fiction who inadvertently use a real name for a fictitious character.

Authors can now be sued for damages by a person mentioned in a novel, if the character portrayed is damaging to reputation or character. Under the new law it would be necessary for the complainant to show that his name had been used intentionally or maliciously.

The legislation is receiving unanimous support from authors who point out that no matter how hard they try to make a fictitious name someone is certain to show up with that particular name and claim they have been injured.

Insisting that hand-writing was out of date and that it would be much better for his 13-year-old daughter to learn to operate a typewriter, James Daw took her from the public school at Lewes and sent her to a typewriting school.

Hand writing he explained, when asked by the authorities to explain his action, was only fit for printing bills and for Christmas cards. The school board demanded that the girl return to the public school, but Daw refused. The Board of Education backed him up in the end, deciding that attendance at the typewriting school was sufficient instruction.

More than 60 per cent of the men presenting themselves for enlistment in the British Army are found to be physically or otherwise unfit for service, according to an official announcement. In Northern Ireland rejections on account of physical reasons were exceptions.

LONG DISTANCE HIKERS HERE

America is a broad continent and since the days of the discovery of the western world many

are the long journeys afoot that have been celebrated in history and fiction. The Spanish conquistadors marched on expeditions of astounding distance and duration that took them to the far shores of the Pacific. Over vast deserts and areas infested with wild beasts and American pioneers) nothing of traversing the boundless plains on foot in the urge that sent men and their families out to settle in California and Oregon in the days before the yet it is doubtful if any of these equalled the record of 50,000 miles in seven years that is being established by Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Baxter, of Sioux City, La., who arrived in Greenville today, having completed over 46,000 miles of the journey that was started in the city of Washington on December 14, 1921.

Mr. Baxter is a veteran of the Rainbow Division and a member of the Sioux City post of the American Legion. After the war still suffering from wounds received in action he was placed in a government hospital at Minneapolis. At that time, in addition to other injuries, he was unable to use either arm to any extent. He was discharged from the hospital with his condition slightly changed and advised to seek a life in the open.

It was then that a friend of his father's made him the proposition that if he and his wife started with one cent, made all of their expenses on the proposed walking tour, and returned with the original penny he would give them \$10,000, if the trip were made within seven years' time. The conditions of the proposition were that the travelers would not solicit rides, but would accept any voluntarily offered, and would not ride on street cars or trains except within the limits of a city or in order to cross an impassable barrier such as a great swamp or river.

Trip Beautiful

Mr. and Mrs. Baxter are a fine looking couple and from their appearance the trip has been of much benefit to them. They carry equipment for outdoor sleeping in the summer time, but in the winter are burdened with little but extra clothing and a postmark book and autograph album. The postmark book contains the signatures of nearly 10,000 post-

masters of towns they have visited, thus testifying to the territory covered on the hike. While in Greenville, the Baxters are the guests of Pitt Shoe Company, who sells Arch Preserver shoes worn by the couple on the journey. Incidentally, the wearing of these shoes afford part of the revenue for the expenses of the trip as the hikers are remunerated for the advertising feature by the manufacturers.

Many Adventures

Mr. Baxter gives his wife credit for making him hold to the proposition and he says that now he wouldn't take a million dollars for the experiences that they have had, as the trip has been replete with interest and adventure. Their wanderings took them to the quaintly delightful land of Mexico, our neighbor republic, across the Rio Grande, a place where existence is startlingly uncertain, and from their accounts they were lucky to ever get back.

For having in their possession a camera and a pistol, they were, put in jail for two days, and were hardly free from the discomforts of the place when they were accosted by bandits of the highway and divested of all that they had. Dressed in rags left them by the marauders, they made fast time for the border and crossed it with sighs of relief. In New Mexico they were caught in a sandstorm that lasted several days and resulted in considerable pain and damage to their eyes.

In California, owing to a miscalculation as to their food and water supply, they were two days in Death Valley without sustenance and were rescued by motor tourists after their condition became pitiable. In Canada's far northwest they were treed by a band of timber wolves and forced to remain aloft some nine or ten hours before they were set free by woodsmen who put the animals to rout.

Rare Autographs

Mr. Baxter has attended every national convention of the Legion but one, since the founding of the organization and he hopes to make Philadelphia this year. The travelers estimate that they will finish their journey and claim their reward by September. Mr. Baxter also said that he expected to attend the Paris meeting of the Legion in 1927.

His autograph book is one of Mr. Baxter's proudest possessions. The list includes practically a governor or former gover-
