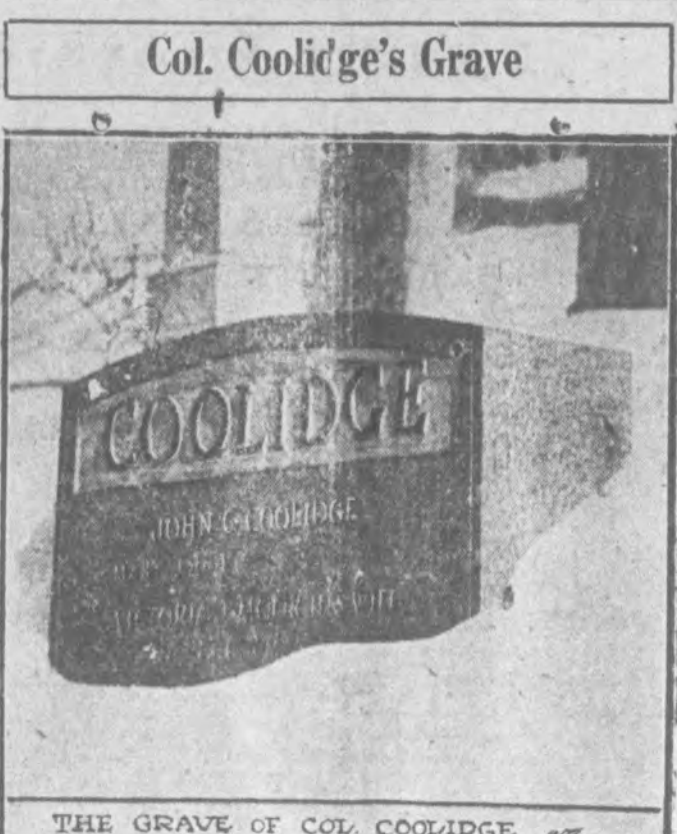

Cabinet Approves Peret's Projects

Paris March 22.—(AP)—The cabinet today approved Finance Minister Peret's projects including an increase in the business turnover tax from 1.3 per cent to three per cent. In informing the newspapermen of this after the cabinet meeting, M. Peret said the Government's intention was to raise revenue by increased indirect taxation especially on tobacco. The Government, he added, also intended to open a special account for voluntary subscriptions, which would be devoted entirely to paying off the short time obligations.

AGREES REVIEW DECISION ON OIL LEASES

Supreme Court to Review Decision Cancelling Leases and Contracts Which Doherty Negotiated With Fall

Washington, March 22.—(AP)—The Supreme Court agreed today to review lower court decisions cancelling the oil leases and contracts which Edward L. Doherty negotiated with Albert B. Falgout, Secretary of the Interior. Involved in the cases are the Elk Hill Naval Oil reserves in California and the contract between Doherty's companies and the Government by which the oil magnate has constructed huge oil reserve tanks for the navy at the Hawaiian naval base at Pearl Harbor.

While agreeing on cancellation, the district court and the circuit court in California disagreed on the question of compensation for the storage tanks. The district court allowed \$10,000,000 but the circuit overruled that decision. Besides this question the Supreme Court is expected to go into all phases of the case and particularly that as to the legality of the executive order issued by President Harding in effect transferring jurisdiction of the naval oil reserve from the Navy to the Interior Department. The civil action at issue grew out of the sensational Senate investigation two years ago into the lease made by Fall with both Doherty and Harry F. Sinclair, the latter involving the Tea Pot Dome Oil Reserve in Wyoming.

Educational Commission in Initial Meeting

Raleigh, March 22.—(AP)—The recently appointed educational commission held its initial meeting here today in the Governor's office and organized. The meeting was an executive session. J. O. Carr, of Wilmington, was unanimously chosen chairman, it was announced after the meeting, and Dr. J. Y. Joyner, of Raleigh, was named executive secretary. If business other than that of organizing was transacted at this morning's session no announcement with reference to it was made.

APPROPRIATION BILL PASSED BY SENATE

Washington, March 22.—(AP)—The \$521,000,000 independent office appropriation bill carrying \$463,000,000 for the Veterans' Bureau and \$23,900,000 for the shipping board was passed today by the Senate. It now goes to conference to smooth out differences between House and Senate provisions.

ABOLITION OF SHIPPING BOARD IS VOICED TODAY

Clerk Would Substitute a Shipping Commission as Provided in Bacon Bill

Washington, March 22.—(AP)—Opposition to the abolition of the shipping board and the fleet corporation and substitution of a shipping commission as provided in the Bacon Bill was voiced before the House Merchant Marine Committee, by Rene F. Clerc, representing the New Orleans Board of Trade. Mr. Clerc also opposed the suggested reorganization of the shipping institution to divorce the shipping board and fleet corporation.

He asserted that the two major problems facing Congress are provision to make possible private ownership of Government merchant vessels whereas the Government is to continue operation provision for an adequate replacement program.

Chairman Scott asserted that virtually all shipping authorities have agreed that no replacement program will be necessary for five years.

SPRING BRINGS DISCUSSIONS PROHIBITION

Busy Week-end Spent in Speeches and Statements Over Subject in Various Cities

New York, March 22.—A flood of prohibition discussions has come with spring, but unlike the balmy nature of the opening of the new season and was nothing mild in the views on the question set forth today as a result of a busy week end of speeches and statements in various cities. The hope of the wetters rose a bit when Emory R. Buckner, federal district attorney of New York city, who has made an extraordinary effort to enforce the Volstead act by padlock, suggested that the law be modified to permit each state to define intoxicating liquor. Mr. Buckner said a partnership for prohibition enforcement and that "we already have different kind of prohibition in different states."

The board of temperance and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church in a statement at Washington discounted results of newspaper's straw votes and asserted that the dries were ignoring them. The best reference on prohibition, said the board, were congressional elections which dries had won with "monstrous regularities by overwhelming majorities."

In New York the Reverend Empringham, national secretary of the Church Temperance Society, which recently came out for modification of the Volstead act, told of disguising himself and visiting speak cases, where liquor could be obtained in an investigation, he said, which convinced him that prohibition was an utter failure.

Public hearings on the prohibition question were ordered today by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Senator Walsh, Democrat, of Montana, alone opposed the recommendation of the subcommittee of five in favor of opening a hearing. The subcommittee will conduct the hearing, giving six days to the wets and an equal length of time to the dries.

No date has been set for the hearings, which will be confined to five modification measures, now before the committee. One would amend the 18th amendment so that states which were wet before the prohibition law would again be wet with the Government manufacturing, selling and distributing liquor.

Three of the other four measures proposed would "legalize beer one for four per cent, one for 2.75 per cent, and the third—beer which is non intoxicating, in fact. The fourth removed the restriction on prescribing whiskey.

Baker Suffers Serious Injuries Auto Accident

Mr. Fresh Water Godwin is suffering minor injuries, while Mr. Jack Baker is in the Pitt Community hospital, suffering serious injuries when they received Saturday night when their automobile skidded on the hard surfaced road at Fleming's Cross Roads, ran into a telephone pole and turned over.

According to information Messrs. Godwin and Baker were going toward Bethel. Another car approached coming to Greenville and Mr. Godwin who was driving was evidently blinded. They thought the approaching car was going to stop at the filling station and turned to their left so the car would have room. The pavement was slippery and the quick turn, in order to avoid a collision, threw the car against the telephone pole. The automobile was a Buick touring car, and was badly damaged.

Efforts today to ascertain Baker's condition failed, but reports state that one arm had been amputated while he suffered other broken bones, bruises and lacerations.

Ladies, that would be thinner, middle aged gentlemen, too, if they'd take the sunshine cure, listen to Mary Garden, that able singing lady, before she sailed for Europe yesterday, a farewell glass or two of champagne, in dry America, discussing thus:

"Doctors said I needed an operation. I didn't want any. I was gaining weight. I didn't want that. I have my villa on the edge of the Mæditeranean. In the morning I put on my bathing suit and swim out half a kilometre. My man rows out to me in a little boat and swims back to the shore, leaving me alone in my glory."

"I climb into the boat, take off everything I have on, absolutely everything, stretch out in the bottom of the boat and take a sun bath for an hour. If the sun begins to burn I dip up the salt water and sprinkle my body. That stops burning."

"Thanks to sunshine, doctors have stopped talking about operations. I have grown thin, as you see. Although I eat and drink what I like, for exercise I play tennis."

Now you know, buy yourself a villa on the Mediterranean, or get a waterfront lot on the Atlantic or Pacific, and take Mary Garden's prescription. If your water is convenient, build a platform on your roof and take sun baths up there.

Actinic rays will do the rest. Begin gradually. Five minutes at first, stretching it out to an hour. Keep your head covered with black or dark green material. Actinic rays that kill disease germs and destroy fat are bad for the brains. That is why the white men cannot endure the sunlight of tropical countries.

We appreciate that which we lack, how many of the earth's sixteen hundred million human beings, especially of those that live in cities, ever look at the sky, or remember that it is there?

SAYS COTTON FARMERS EAGER FOR ALLIANCE

Fulmer Suggests Alliance Between Cotton Growers and Wheat, Corn and Cattle Producers

Washington, March 22.—(AP)—An alliance between the cotton growers of the south and wheat, corn and cattle producers of the west to solve the farm problems was suggested to the House Agricultural Committee today by Representative Fulmer, Democrat, of South Carolina, in interrogating F. W. Murphy, of the American Council of Agriculture.

Mr. Fulmer said the cotton farmers were eager to join in some national plan for relieving agriculture. Mr. Murphy underwent his fourth day of cross examination of the middle western farm bill to finance surplus crops by assessing fees against certain agricultural commodities.

SUPERIOR COURT IN SESSION IN 22 COUNTIES

Ten Courts Previously Opened Will Continue in Session With 12 Opening Today

Raleigh, March 22.—(AP)—Superior courts are in session this week in 22 North Carolina counties.

Ten courts previously opened will continue in session this week, and courts opened this morning in 12 counties—Gates, Lee, Duplin, Wake, Pender, Durham, Forsyth, Union, Cleveland, Watauga and Madison.

Judges Harding and McElroy, Schenck and Stack, Webb and Lane, and Devin and Nunn are still in exchange. By virtue of these exchanges, Judge McElroy will preside this week in his home county of Madison; Judge Schenck goes to Yancey, and Judge Stack to his home county of Union; Judge Webb in Forsyth; and Judge Devin will hold court in Durham county, in lieu of Judge Nunn.

The Madison term is for one week, with a mixed docket. The Yancey term is for two weeks. It likewise is a mixed term. Civil cases will be tried at the one-week term in Union. The Cleveland mixed term is to continue for two weeks. A criminal one-week term is docketed for Forsyth county. The Durham term is also for one week, for the trial of criminal cases only.

Another exchange in effect this week is that of Judge Thomas J. Shaw of Greensboro, and T. D. Bryson, of Bryson City. As a result of this exchange, Judge Bryson will hold the two-week term opening today in Watauga county. Judge Shaw continues to hold court in Randolph.

Judges Sinclair and Daniels, in exchange last week, return to their respective districts. Judge Sinclair, therefore, will hold court this week in Lee county, here a two-week's mixed term opened this morning.

The court terms in Duplin, Wake, and Pender, are all civil, and each is for two weeks. Judge W. M. Bond will preside in Duplin; in Wake, Judge Barnhill will hold court; and Judge Midkiff in Pender.

Washington, March 22.—(AP)—The Coolidge administration has gone "back to the old order of secret diplomacy behind closed doors and under dark lanterns," said Senator Harrison, Democrat, of Mississippi, today in the Senate. Referring to the visit to the President of Ambassador Houghton and Minister Gibson and statements attributed to them regarding conditions in Europe, he charged the Ambassador to Great Britain with starting a "subtle propaganda to tear up the work other than of trying to do."

New York, March 22.—(AP)—The Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company earned \$26.93 a share on the common stock in 1925 after preferred dividends had been paid in contract to \$19.34 a share in 1924, the preliminary annual statement shows. Net income rose to \$18,483,148 from \$13,275,844, the year before.

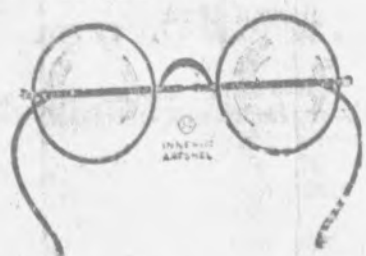

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Paris, March 22.—"Despite the Volstead act in the United States, which cut off our best customer, and the revolution in Russia, which meant the loss of our second best client, the champagne industry is flourishing and developing all the time," declared the Marquis de Polignac, owner of one of the best known brands of champagne and chairman of the syndicate of champagne growers in France. The marquis was showing a party of Americans, through labyrinthine cellars of his company in Reims, which contain the choicest vintages of the last fifty years. "Immediately after the war our orders slumped heavily and

we were prepared for any economic emergency. The American market was closed to us or at least we thought so; Russia, which consumed a remarkable quantity of our fine wines, was starving to death under the Bolshevik rule and even conditions in Europe were far from satisfactory. We made the necessary retrenchments and waited. Slowly the orders came back. They drifted in and naturally when a man pays cash and makes no extraordinary fanciful demands we are all prepared to carry out our part of the contract. We made deliveries to places that formerly had been unknown to us; tiny little islands in the North Atlantic, Canadian villages of 5,000 or 10,000 population, which evidently consumed as much champagne as New York or St. Petersburg in the old days. Late in the year we have been receiving our pre-war orders from old European customers. The American visitors were told.

During the month of January alone 359,528 bottles of extra dry were shipped out of the department of the Marne, which is the famous wine growing region.

In addition, more than half a million bottles of sparkling Burgundy were packed off to foreign countries. A good percentage of these shipments will undoubtedly reach the United States, according to the estimates of the marquis.

The model ten room American home, set up at the exhibition of household appliances and labor in the grand palais, is causing considerable comment among the visitors.

What amazes the French the most is the number of bathrooms. Four in one medium sized house seems quite extravagant to people who have perhaps never had the use of one, for, although modern sanitation is fast spreading throughout France, many are the homes and hotels where the old wash basin is still in use and if a good scrubbing is desired, one must go to some bath house.

The electric refrigerators, the gas water boiler, the washing machine and the drier, as well as the refuse burner all bring forth excited exclamations: "Quel types, these Americans;

anyway they are 'pratiques,' and every housewife wishes she had the same things in her house. The nursery with its quiet charm holds the attention of a good many mothers, and especially the staircase from the mother's bedroom, which leads up to it.

The English who went to see the home felt sure that the steam heat would be remarkable, but would make the rooms entirely too stuffy, and preferred the cozy little fireplaces of their English houses, even if one's back did freeze.

If the famous little French "croissant" continues to rise in price, it may entirely disappear from the French table, or rather from the cafe counters. For this is where the most of the delicious soft crescents are consumed.

A French breakfast without a "croissant" is much like an American one without bacon and eggs. It is the favorite roll for the morning coffee, although it is really much more like pastry than bread. Rich and flaky, shaped like a crescent, baked in the oven until a delightful golden brown, it would melt in anybody's mouth.

BIG GERMAN MERCHANTS TO VISIT UNITED STATES; STUDY AMERICAN STORES

Berlin, March 22.—(INS)—Benefit for German department store business is expected from a trip to the United States of about thirty prominent department store managers from all Germany, scheduled for Easter time.

Detailed plans for the trip have been drafted by a committee of these managers in co-operation and with assistance of the American embassy here. It is said that United States authorities show great interest in the plan and have promised to supply guides and interpreters so as to make the trip a full success.

It is planned that the party will stay a month in New York and afterward, visit several other cities including Philadelphia, Chicago and Detroit. The managers plan to reorganize the German stores on the basis of their experiences gathered in the states.

Captain Richardson is said to be the mainstay of his team. His events are the shot put and the discus, and it is expected that he will break the Missouri Valley indoor record in these events. Co-starring with the captain are Lancaster, pole vaulter, and Potts, high jumper. Both men have been constant point-gainers for the team and are looked to win their events when they meet the California aggregation.

Inspired by their overwhelming victory over the Kansas track team, the Tigers are all ready to take the scalp of the Golden Bears. In the Kansas meet Missouri won every first place but the relay. FLORIDA MAN GIVES U. S. EFFICIENCY TIPS

Washington, March 22.—(INS)—A private citizen stepped into the threshold of the government efficiency business when the senate received a resolution asking that the suggestions of Charles Edwin Hightower, of Jacksonville, Fla., for the improvement of the United States Postal Service, be examined by a senate committee.

The resolution introduced by Senator Trammell, democrat, of Florida, said that Hightower had prepared a list of suggestions for improvement of the service; that he claimed the installations of his suggestions would bring about a greater degree of efficiency, and that certain of his suggestions have already been adopted by the postoffice department.

The committee on postoffices and post roads is instructed to determine the merits of Hightower's new list of suggestions and also to ascertain whether any of his ideas are now in use in the department. If so, the committee will determine reasonable compensation for him.
