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HEARINGS IN SUIT AGAINST CO-OPS OPEN

Tri-State Tobacco Growers' Co-Operative Ass'n., to Show Cause Why it Should Not Be Declared Bankrupt

Raleigh, March 29.—(AP)—A plea in abatement alleging "fraud, conspiracy and misrepresentation of facts" in securing plaintiffs to file proceedings against the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Co-operative Marketing Association was filed here today. The plea was made as a portion of the answer of the Association on the injunction proceedings seeking its dissolution. Five Virginia tobacco growers, members of the Association, are named as plaintiffs in the proceedings.

Court recessed shortly after eleven o'clock until two thirty this afternoon in order to give the plaintiffs' attorneys time to prepare an answer to the charges contained in the plea of the abatement.

The hearings opened with a motion by the plaintiffs' attorneys to add 72 Virginia members of the Association to the bill of complaint as plaintiffs. This motion was resisted by Aaron Sapiro, counsel for the Association on the ground that the Association would enter a plea in abatement charging fraud and misrepresentation in securing the five plaintiffs, who signed the original complaint. Judge I. M. Meekins presiding took the motion under advisement. The answer of the defendant Association then was read through the plea in abatement when court was recessed.

The plea in abatement charged that in two particulars the plaintiffs' attorneys had practiced "fraud, conspiracy and misrepresentation of facts in obtaining plaintiffs for the action."

It was alleged that the complaint was drawn without knowledge of who the plaintiff would be and then sent to Virginia where one of the counsel secured five signatures. It was further alleged that the five plaintiffs did not read the bill of complaint or know the nature of its contents. The second ground was that the five plaintiffs had already broken their condition with the Association and therefore had no rights in court as plaintiffs. In support of this, contention figures were quoted showing that in 1922 the five growers had marketed a total of 56,000 pounds of tobacco through the Association, while in 1925 they had marketed an amount slightly greater than a thousand pounds.

DEMOCRATS TO STRIVE FOR MORE SEATS IN SENATE

Shaver Asserts Congressional Campaign Approaching With Excellent Outlook for Democrats

Washington, March 29.—(AP)—Presidential appointments, the Aluminum Company of America in which Secretary Mellon is a stockholder, the tariff commission investigation, and tax reductions, will be emphasized in the Democratic campaign to gain control of Congress, this fall. This was made clear in a statement issued today by Clem Shaver, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, who asserted that the Congressional campaign is approaching with excellent outlook for gaining that will mean Democratic control in both branches.

"The effort of the President to intimidate and coerce members of boards and commissions by asking for written resignations or he makes appointments is an astounding violation of the principles of free Government the chairman declared.

The resolution to ascertain whether the Attorney General has been expeditious in prosecuting an inquiry of the Aluminum Company of America, was defeated in the Senate in keeping with administration policies but the rising tide of popular indignation of the administration tampering with the tariff lead to adoption by the Senate of a resolution resulting in an investigation now under way.

"The wisdom of the Democrats of the Congress in forcing an annual tax reduction of at least \$60,000,000 more than the administration would have, a long time admitted to be within reason, is manifest. The chief business of the Democratic party this year is the election of its candidates for Senate and Representative in Congress and for state and local offices. All energy should and will be directed to this very essential aim."

LARGE AUDIENCE HEAR LECTURE IN CHAPEL CAR

Father Sweeney Delivered Inspiring Lecture On 'Prayer' in St. Peter's Chapel Car Last Night

Rev. Stephen Sweeney at St. Peter's chapel car, at the Atlantic Coast Line station last night, spoke to a crowded house. Before his lecture he answered a few questions on Catholic doctrine which were presented to him. He explained the work of a Catholic priest and the Catholic lay person, as one of the temporal and spiritual uplift. He pointed out the dangers of bigotry and prejudice. "Those," he said, "who condemn the Catholic church, do not know her. They start out with the assumption that she must be wrong and therefore there is no need to study what she teaches. There are those who would deprive you of the greatest possible blessings that can be granted to you, by teaching you all manner of lies about the Catholic church. I am a priest for nearly eleven years, I have listened to thousands of sermons, discourses and lectures, in our churches. Never once have I heard a word spoken from our pulpits that was antagonistic or hurtful to any non-Catholics.

"We preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ and only that. We do not disseminate lies against any creed, denomination or sect as we are often accused of doing. The work of the church is for human souls. We are not interested in political schemes, in petty rivalries or in anything that spread animosity and hatred. The more you know of the Cath-

REVIVAL SERVICES CHRISTIAN CHURCH WELL ATTENDED

Dr. Albert R. H. Miller to Preach This Evening on Subject, "The Outcast"

Two large audiences greeted Dr. Miller yesterday at the opening of the revival services at the Christian church. His sermons were full of the revival spirit and were very much enjoyed. In the evening Mr. Spruel Strain rendered a beautiful solo.

In the morning he preached on "Watching for Christ." He showed the danger of going to sleep in our Christian life. Like the foolish virgins many depend upon others for their salvation. They depend upon the good works of their relatives, or upon the weakness of other people. Thus they excuse themselves. Many of our churches are like an army which must keep busy keeping itself awake, so that it has no time to fight the enemy. The foolish virgins lost their opportunity to serve. So many well-meaning Christians lose a real chance of serving when they refuse to work in the church and fail to do many little things that might amount to a great deal for Christ. He said, "Many a boy goes to jail because someone failed to use the opportunity to guide him in the right path. Many go to the gallows because Christians were indifferent. The sins of society are in part a reflection of the sins of neglect on the part of those who should have been watching."

He further said, "If the church in Europe had been awake in 1914 the World War would have been avoided. They were 'asleep in Jesus' while Satan took the time to hell. The church needs prophets like Savorarola, who, when the Pope offered him the red hat of a cardinal in order to get him to stop preaching against the sins of the church, said, 'I want a red hat, a hat red with blood.' They burned him at the stake. We need loyal soldiers of Jesus of the Savorarola type."

In the evening he spoke on "The Crown of Love." He showed that it was the love of Christ that caused him to give his life upon the cross. This love in turn changes our paths of wickedness into the highway of the service of love. We become kings and priests unto God because of the sacrificial love of our Master. Tonight he will preach on "The Outcast."

The meetings start at 7:45. The public is cordially invited.

Historians of the year 3,000, writing today's history, would want information about people, not about steel factories or bank balances.

Friady's performance in the electric chair at Milledgeville, Ga., would interest them. Ted Coggeshall, in his teens, "flipped away a cigarette to permit guards to tie his hands in the electric chair. His father and younger brother were in the death room watching. Two charges of electricity were needed to kill the youth, and his father proudly said to the executioner: 'He was a good man, and you found him hard to kill.'"

Floyd McClelland, another boy, was executed at the same time. Both are said to have confessed murder.

Future historians will be interested in the five, "cake eater gunmen." Thus police describe five boys that "swaggered into court grinning," three of them seventeen one of them eighteen, and one nineteen years old, each with a young woman of his age following him and evidently proud.

These boys are on their way to the electric chair for shooting Angelo Maharis, a restaurant owner. One boy killer brushed the murder aside, saying, "When I pointed my gun at him, he pushed me, saying, 'But that thing away, so I had to shoot him.'"

This crime will not surprise his torious when they learn that prohibition had caused laws and the constitution to be treated as a joke by "respectable" people of the United States.

Have you been buying European bonds, tempted by high rates of interest?

Those buyers of European bonds may regret the buying. Washington and high finance yesterday were agitated by Senator Reed Smoot's statement tucked away in a speech of 35,000 words, to the effect that Europe will never be able to repay the millions lent by American investors through American financiers.

Senator Smoot, who understands finance, said, "I sit without hesitation that the loans which we have made to foreign countries and that we are making to foreign countries cannot be paid."

That statement won't help poor old Wall Street, which had another fit of the financial blues yesterday.

Some time ago this column was warning readers against buying Russian bonds that the czar and his grand dukes were then unloading by the bale in the United States. Those bonds are worth now whatever first-class waste paper is worth.

There are plenty of chances to invest in the United States. Invest here.

This country is very rich, no body dreams the amount of wealth below the ground. Even the Sinclair oil people two days ago bought in a well now gushing at the rate of 1,000 barrels an hour. If that doesn't start foolish people buying "wild cat" oil stocks, it is because Barnum was wrong.

Harvard limits the next freshman class to 1,000, announcing that "personality and character" will count in an examination test, and a photograph of every applicant must be sent.

This in plain English means a determination to exclude Jewish students above whatever number the faculty thinks desirable.

A great university would show more courage if it declared its plan frankly, without camouflage.

21 SUPERIOR COURTS IN SESSION DURING THIS WEEK

13 Regular Terms Open With a Special Term in Johnston County; Seven Terms Continue From Last Week

Raleigh, March 29.—(AP)—Twenty-one Superior courts will be in session in as many counties in North Carolina this week.

Thirteen regular court terms open today; in Johnston county a special term will begin a two-week's session; and court terms previously begun will be continued this week in Lee, Duplin, Wake, Pender, Cleveland, Watauga and Yancey counties.

Governor McLean has named W. F. Carter of Mount Airy, as emergency judge to hold the Johnston special term. It is for the trial of civil cases only. The court will continue into the second week.

Judges Harding and McElroy, Webb and Lane, and Devin and Nunn are in exchange again this week. As a result of these exchanges, Judge Harding will hold court in his home county of Mecklenburg, and Judge McElroy goes to Buncombe; the Caswell term will be held by Judge Lane; and Judge Devin will go to Alamance county, with Judge Nunn holding in Jones.

The terms in Buncombe, Jones, and Caswell are for one week each. Both criminal and civil cases will be tried at all these courts. In Alamance, a one-week civil term is on the calendar. The Mecklenburg term is strictly civil. It will continue for two weeks.

Another exchange in effect this week is that of Judges T. B. Fawcett and Thomas J. Shaw, of North Wilkesboro and Greensboro, respectively. By virtue of this exchange, Judge Shaw will hold the Stokes county term in lieu of Judge Fawcett. It is a one-week criminal term.

Judges Michael Schenck, of Hendersonville and A. M. Stack of Concord, in exchange for the past several weeks, return to their respective districts this week. Judge Schenck will preside at the one-week mixed term opening today in Stanley county.

Civil terms of two weeks each open in Robeson and Edgecombe counties, with Judge Thomas H. Calvert, of Raleigh, presiding in Edgecombe, and Judge F. A. Daniels, of Goldsboro, holding the Robeson term.

The terms in Chowan, Northampton and Cherokee are mixed. The court will be in session a single week in Chowan, and two weeks in the other two. Judge H. A. Grady, of Clinton, will preside in Chowan. The Northampton term will be held by Judge E. H. Cranmer, of Southport. And Judge John M. Oglesby, of Concord, goes to Cherokee.

The Randolph term is, for one week, for the trial of criminal cases only. Judge T. D. Bryson, of Bryson City, will preside.

Chapman's Renewal of Fight Fails to Reach Dist. Court

New Haven, Conn., March 29.—(AP)—Gerald Chapman's renewal of the fight to escape hanging at state prison next week did not reach the United States District Court today before the court adjourned, as counsel for the condemned man had forecast.

Federal Judge Thomas, sat in court to hear the criminal docket and shortly after noon adjourned the session. No attorney representing Chapman had appeared and after the session was over Judge Thomas said he knew of no application to be made to him for a writ of habeas corpus. All he knew of the contemplated action was what he had read in the newspapers.

Ray M. Wiley, of Chapman's counsel, who passed through Hartford this morning and came here for a writ of habeas corpus did not appear at the court before court adjourned.

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MISINTERPRETED!

The Curtis-Reed Educational Bill has aroused much opposition in certain circles as has every progressive measure introduced in the history of the country, and this is not surprising nor unlooked for because it seems to be an instinctive trait of man to dislike any change. The argument is "let well enough alone." If there had not been some men in history who were brave enough to withstand opposition and public opinion, mankind would perhaps be still living in caves, eating raw meat and roaming the woods in an uncivilized state. In every instance where a people have become satisfied with their status, content to stay in the rut, they have tended to retrograde and decline, as was manifested by the disintegration of ancient world powers.

In the case of the Education Bill the main arguments advanced by the opponents of this measure are that the present educational system with a commissioner at its head is sufficient, that the proposed department would give the federal government control of education and interfere with the rights of the states, that it would exist solely for the narrowing influences of federalized or standardized education.

These points are advanced by those who either have not made a study of the bill or, being prejudiced against it, wish to give the wrong impression and purposely misinterpret the measure. That the present system is far from adequate has been clearly manifested. It is stated that millions of dollars are wasted each year because the expenditure of money is seldom protected by adequate systems of school accounting. Local school boards often lack the information that would prevent waste, and poorly planned, unsafe and unsanitary buildings too frequently result. The Department of Education would provide an adequate agency to which local school boards could turn for expert advice. It would serve as a clearing house for the best accounting procedure and would collect information necessary to prevent waste in school building construction.

It would not curtail the rights of the states, but rather serve as an effective agency for the collection and dissemination of the best educational information

and practice to the educational departments of the states. The state and local boards should continue to control their schools as this is sound, democratic doctrine, and agreed to by the very proponents of the bill. There is a need for an agency through which the best educational thought may be pooled and the Education Bill creating a Department of Education, while leaving the actual control where it now rests, would provide means for this.

Instead of standardization of education this department would be enabled through its wide scope of information and research, to realize the particular needs of each section. It would provide federal aid to encourage the states to correct educational weaknesses that constitute a national menace; it would materially decrease illiteracy; Americanize the foreign-born; equalize educational opportunities for all; and promote the physical education and training of teachers.

"CEMETERY PETERS" TO BE PUT IN JAIL

New Bedford, Mass., March 24.—(INS)—Indignant over "cemetery peters" who make love on the tombstones at Rural cemetery, Mrs. Alex Tripp, who lives a few yards from the graveyard, has complained to the police.

She asserted that young couples come over every night to the

cemetery after the watchman has gone home and she requested the police to arrest the love makers. Watch has been set, and all graveyard lovers will be given cells in the county jail.

FORMOSA ASKING JAPAN FOR OWN LEGISLATURE

Tokyo, March 27.—(INS)—A petition, signed by more than 2,000 influential residents of Formosa, asking the Japanese government to establish a provincial legislature in that island and dominion has been submitted to the Japanese diet. The petitioners claim that Formosans should be given the right to legislate for themselves in all matters affecting solely their own interests.

Although professing sympathy with the legitimate aspirations of Formosa, government officials in Tokyo do not consider the time opportune for granting the island the desired legislative autonomy, hence it is unlikely that any action will be taken on the petition at the present session of the diet.

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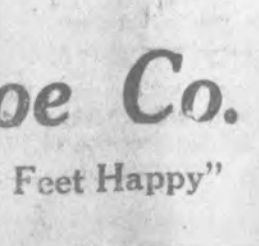
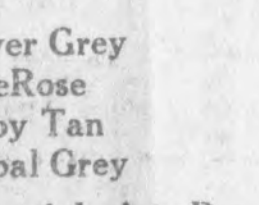
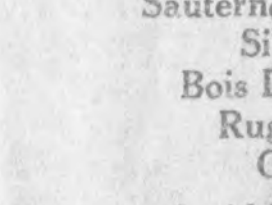
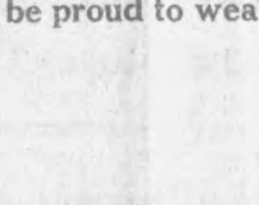
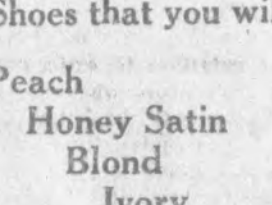
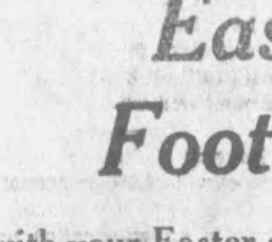
