DELIVERS LECTURE ON THE PRACTICE OF CONFESSION

Services at St. Peter's Chapel Car Continue to Attract Large Crowds

Last evening Father Stephen Sweeney, the Priest of the Passionist Order, who is conducting services in the chapel car, at the Atlantic Coast Line station, delivered a very enlightening lecture upon the practice known in the Catholic church as "Confessions of Sin."

Father Sweeney said in part: "What a horrible practice is confession. I would never confess my sins to any man, I would never lower myself so far as to permit any person to know what takes place in my innermost soul. I think such conduct is unbecoming any person." Thus speak those who do not understand the wonderful sacrament of confession. Tens of thousands of people outside the church who do not know the greatness of O. B. L.'s work, in the Catholic church accuse Catholics of practices so revolting that we wonder at the ignorance or malice of our accusers.

"When confession is understood, it as once appears to be a most necessary and beautiful practice and one of the greatest advantages both to individuals and to the state.

"Confession is the telling of one's sins to a Priest for the purpose of obtaining forgiveness from them. O. B. L. himself instituted confession as a sacrament and conferred upon the Priests this power. After O. B. L.'s resurrection. He said to His Apostles: 'As the Father hath sent Me, I also send you.' He then breathed upon them and said, 'Receive ye the Holy Ghost whose sins you shall forgive they are forgiven them; whose sins you shall retain they are retained.'

"This power given by Christ to His Apostles every Priest receives at his ordination to the Priesthood.

"We do not confess our sins merely to a man, but to one who has been divinely appointed to act in the name of and through the power conferred upon him by the Son of God."

Father Sweeney then went on to show how through the confessional Catholics are the greatest benefactors to society. It is in the confessional that the Priest requires that everyone receive what is due to them. That the violated rights of our fellow men are restored.

ANDREWS SAYS NEW BEER TONIC IS PERMISSIBLE

Declares That By No Stretch of Imagination Could It Be Regarded As Beer

Washington, March 31.—(AP)—Sale of the new 3.75 per cent beer tonic was defended today by Assistant Secretary Andrews in charge of the prohibition enforcement as "practicable and reasonable."

Although issuance of a permit for the new preparation has been declared a mistake by the Anti-Saloon League and attacked as illegal by the Father of the AV-Stein Act, General Andrews declared in a public statement that the new product not only was entirely permissible but also of such a character, that by no stretch of the imagination could it be regarded as beer.

The statement follows: "In the matter of our policy in granting permits to manufacture and distribute malt and wine tonics. This policy was adopted after thorough consideration of the question and amounts to this—agreements are being entered into with the reliable houses to restore to the markets certain well known and established tonics on the basis that the manufacturer accepts the responsibility for the distribution for legitimate purposes and agrees to watch this closely and withdraw the product from any market where it appears that the tonic is being sold for use as a beverage.

"This is practicable and reasonable and is done for the purpose of making these tonics available to those who need them. A malt tonic containing 25 per cent of solids is by no stretch of the imagination, a beer. If the public attempts to use it as a beer it can be instantly withdrawn from the markets.

"The Departments believe this to be a reasonable regulation and for the best interests of the public it is confident that the public will so consider it and treat it."

Fire Threatens Four Industrial Plants Today

Statesville, Mar. 31.—(AP)—Four industrial plants and more than 1,000,000 feet of lumber were threatened by fire that started at 10:30 o'clock today and which gained headway rapidly. The blaze started in a fertilizer house in the Diamond Hill section and fanned by a high wind it spread fast to stacks of lumber nearby. A shortage of water also handicapped the fire fighters, who rushed all available men and summoned aid from nearby towns. Workers were engaged in getting enough lumber out of the path of the fire to break its progress.

Health Dep't. Reports Number Cases Measles

The Health Department wishes to call attention of the general public to the fact that there are quite a number of cases of Measles in the town of Greenville and the surrounding territory.

Measles is probably the most contagious disease with which we have to deal, so if your child has not had it and is exposed, you may be pretty sure he will get it. A few of the symptoms are these: Cold in the head with a hacking cough hard to control; fever and inflamed eyes as first signs; rash in three or four days afterwards. Mild cases are more dangerous than a severe attack so far as after results are concerned. Main after effects are: damage to eyes, middle ear, throat and lungs with pneumonia. Parents are urged to be extremely careful and to follow the doctor's instruction in regard to the treatment.

Measles being an acute contagious disease, parents are required to report to the Health Department where no doctor has been in attendance. Please help to control the disease by observing the rules and regulations.

Revival Services at Christian Church Growing in Interest; Dr. Miller Preaching Splendid Sermons

The revival services at the Christian church are growing in interest. Mrs. Albert Miller sang very sweetly "The Lost Sheep." Dr. Miller said in substance: "By faith Moses, when he was grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter; choosing rather to share ill treatment with the people of God." Moses was a prince by adoption. Later proved himself to be prince by nature. As all peoples have their outstanding heroes, so Moses was the leading Hebrew savior. He had received the highest education possible for his day. Egypt was the leading nation of that day and had a good civilization. A crown lay in his reach, but he chose "to share ill treatment with the people of God."

Many have waded through blood in order to grasp a crown. Saul sought David's life because he feared his crown. Absalom fought his father for the crown. Brother has murdered brother, sister has murdered sister, children have slain their parents, and parents their children—all for a crown. Yet Moses refused it when the call of duty summoned him.

He refused worldly honors, yet Alexander the Great wept because there were no more worlds to conquer. Nebuchadnezzar ordered no gods to be worshipped that they might worship him. Alexander Hamilton and Andrew Jackson fought duels for honor, and nations have gone to war for honor, but Moses refused it in order that he might serve God and his people.

Although Moses belonged to the richest nation on earth, and his family was the wealthiest family in the world, it did not keep him from heeding the call of God. Many a man has sold his Lord for thirty pieces of silver, but Prince Moses would not sell Him for an empire.

The pleasures of the world lay at Moses' disposal. Many dissipate their fortunes and ruin their bodies for pleasure. Moses, like Francis of Assisi, renounced mere worldly pleasures that he might serve God. He has taught us that there is something more to life than a crown, honor, wealth and pleasure. At times there are causes to be served, and ideals to be upheld.

This column has repeatedly warned Americans against buying European bonds with which high finance has flooded the country. As this has been repeatedly stated here, such bonds are dangerous, and now Senator Smoot, head of the Senate Finance committee, says bluntly "These bonds WILL NOT BE PAID."

What everybody might have known, now scares Wall Street into a deep blue Monday, because Senator Smoot says what every child should know. 125 stocks drop to new low records for 1926.

Billions of good American gold dollars have gone to Europe and will never come back. That is sad, but it doesn't hurt American values or furnish any good reason for throwing American stocks overboard as some silly holders are doing.

MEEKINS HOLDS HE IS EMPOWERED NAME RECEIVER

Under Opinion That Federal Court In Which Co-Op Case is Being Tried, Has No Jurisdiction

Raleigh, Mar. 31.—(AP)—Judge Meekins holds that he is empowered to appoint a receiver for the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Co-Operative Marketing Association without any proof as to fraud or mismanagement if such appointment appears to be for the best interest of the association and its members and he rather inclines to the opinion that under an opinion of the United States Supreme Court the Federal Court, in which the case is being tried, has no jurisdiction.

These two announcements were made from the bench today just prior to recess for luncheon. The first was directed as a suggestion to the defendant and the second to the plaintiff with the request that they be prepared when court reconvened to express their opinions.

"In my mind," said Judge Meekins, "a Federal Court sitting as a court of equity has large discretionary power that would empower it in the absence of either fraud or mismanagement to appoint a receiver if it appeared wise."

In his comments on the contrary to the counsel for the plaintiff he suggested that under the Supreme Court opinion cited there was no diversity of citizenship required to enter a Federal Court because members of the association by law are considered the citizens of the state of which the co-operation is a citizen at law.

Centering their attacks on the charge of fraud and misrepresentation in organizing the association the attorneys for the five plaintiffs produced a mass of evidence in court today in their efforts to have the association declared insolvent.

When court recessed for lunch there was every indication, unless some ruling along the line of one of the two statements set forward by Judge Meekins was made this afternoon, that the presentation of evidence must continue at this afternoon session.

The plaintiffs today quoted voluminously from the report of the Federal Trade Commission made two months ago on the activities of the association. Admissions from the defendants in answer to the suit also were quoted as substantiating the assertions of the plaintiffs.

NATIONAL GUARD UNIT BE GIVEN TO GREENVILLE

Organization at Hendersonville is Transferred to This City; Chief Lester Jones Commissioned Captain

Raleigh, March 31.—Effective April 1, the 117th Field Artillery unit of the 117th Field Artillery, North Carolina National Guard, which has had its headquarters at Hendersonville, will be moved to Greenville, according to announcement made yesterday by Adjutant General Metts, who stated that the Pitt county capital had been awarded the organization which has represented the mountain city for nearly two years.

The Hendersonville company is now in process of disbandment, stated the adjutant-general, and F. E. Kavenaugh, a representative of the adjutant-general's department, is now in Hendersonville making a physical check of all government property, including a number of large cannon, tractors, gun carriages and other paraphernalia, preparatory to shipping the material to Greenville.

F. H. C. Rust, who commanded the Hendersonville unit, resigned a few days ago on account of the military duties conflicting with other work, and that the adjutant-general pointed out, was instrumental in the organization leaving Hendersonville.

Lester Jones, chief of police at Greenville, has been commissioned captain of the new outfit, and ordered to proceed with the organization of his unit.

Wilmington, March 31.—(AP)—J. W. Bell, free-lance dry raider, of Wilmington, died in a local hospital shortly after noon today from gun shot wounds, which he suffered while investigating the location of a whiskey still which he had discovered in a swamp seven miles from the city. Bell was found lying in a swamp yesterday afternoon with both eyes shot out and his face horribly burned by powder. He had been missing from his home for over 24 hours when a search was instituted.

The full program for the opening day of the Eastern Carolina Exposition has all now been arranged and nothing is lacking except for the time to roll around. Hon. J. B. James has been selected to handle the very important job of platform manager during the week. Mr. James will have charge of each program twice daily and will see that everything is pulled off on schedule time.

The program for the opening day is as follows: Parade at 2 P. M., led by Governor McLean and Will Rogers. Music for the parade furnished by the Benson N. C. brass band. Immediately following the parade, the exercises on the inside of the Exposition building will begin. President John W. Holmes, of Farmville, will open the Exposition as the president of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, the parent organization of the Exposition.

Mayor D. M. Clark will deliver the welcome address on the part of Pitt county and Greenville. President Holmes will respond for the organization in a short address and formally turn the gavel over to the platform manager, J. B. James, who will in turn be in full charge of the Exposition program for the entire week. Governor McLean will make an address in behalf of the State of North Carolina, followed by Will Rogers and the Dereszké Male Quartette. Paul Scheel's orchestra, direct from New York, will play for the afternoon program and night. The program will open at 7 P. M. for the night program. This query is more or less a question of state-wide interest, and of special interest to property owners, and local people will be given a chance to decide on which side they stand on Friday night in the Greenville High School auditorium at eight o'clock.

The affirmative side of the question being upheld by Greenville debaters, Misses Oda Orton

Moore and Elaine Johnson. At the same time the Greenville negative team will go to Washington and contest with their affirmative—Greenville, being represented by Joseph Dinsbach and Harry Perkins.

There is no doubt as to the fact that North Carolina needs a more efficient system of schools, but the question is whether or not the property tax is the best way of supporting this issue. The result of these speeches will largely assist in the victory or defeat of the property tax to do the work accorded it.

Greenville has been placed in a triangle with New Bern and Washington, New Bern negative versus Greenville affirmative and Greenville negative against Washington affirmative in Washington. All teams have been in training for some time and promise each

other to give the other team a close run for the decision. Effort and skill is required to win the award.

Should both of Greenville's teams win, the debaters are to be sent to Chapel Hill where the University of North Carolina offers a cup to the state's four best debaters, and Greenville is anxious to bring home the cup to care for it throughout next year.

Greenville High School team has been carefully selected and trained for the event, and will give a clear explanation of the question from both viewpoints.

love, devotion or spiritual hopes. The soil, dumped in an apronful or basketful at a time, was conveyed from distant points, which would indicate, in the opinion of the men of science, that the people had leisure for the work and were not given to the practice of war.

Relics found indicate that they were fond of the chase, were traders, artists and engineers. Some authorities advance the theory that they were directly connected with, or were the descendants of, the enterprising Myriads of prehistoric days.

The fact that these mounds served as burying places in the main would indicate that here is a religious or fraternal significance in the care and attention given their dead. Carefully they erected an altar, built there a charnel house and covered this, over with a royal canopy of woven fabrics, after the bodies of rulers or loved ones had been laid on an altar with tokens and gifts from the living.

Always the heads of the deceased members of the tribe were placed to the east and where more than one body was interred they were placed at equal distance from each other.

In some cases, interment was made in tiers, indicating that after the first burial and a building of the mound that part way, a second altar, over the charnel house of the first, was constructed and another ritualistic service held before the mound was completed.

Evidence of fires over the remains is taken to mean that some sort of sacrificial ceremony predominated the service of interment and building.

That these people believed in some sort of existence after death is indicated in the artifacts deposited with the bodies such as pipes, artistic designs carved on mica and sea tortoise shell, probably obtained in barter; flint-like objects that were probably symbols of a celestial and scores of other trinkets in gold and silver that could only be furnished by a wealthy people.

U. S. Agriculture Is Normal After War Expansion

Washington, Mar. 30.—(INS)—Indicating that agriculture in America is gradually returning to normal from the war-time expansion, Bureau of Census figures show that there was a reduction of 75,735 in the number of farms operated

in 1925, as compared to 1920 being the total January 1, to 6,372,263.

Farms under cultivation number practically the same as in 1910. Factors contributing to the reduction were given by an official census bureau statement as follows:

- (1) Ravages of the boll weevil in some of the cotton states.
- (2) Migration of negro farm workers north.
- (3) A succession of dry seasons in parts of the Northwest.
- (4) Consolidation of farms.
- (5) General recession from the war-time expansion in agriculture which was persistent in 1920.

The net decrease of 1.2 per cent in the number of farms is a result of considerable drops in some sections of the country, partially offset by increases in other districts, the bureau said.

Increases have resulted from the opening up of new lands in parts of the West; from the subdivision of ranches and large farms for more intensive operation and from the development of orchards and truck and poultry farms.

The establishment of small truck and poultry farms, especially near the cities, accounts for most of the increase shown for New England and some other sections of the East.

Texas, by reason of its enormous area, exceeded all other states in the number of farms with a total of 406,395. Other states ranged as follows:

North Carolina 238,492; Mississippi, 257,227; Tennessee, 252,600; Ohio 244,702.

Rhode Island with 3,911 farms and Nevada with 3,913, were at the bottom, as agriculturists.

In the District of Columbia were 13 farms.

Bedford County, Mississippi with 12,573 farms, took the national title among counties of the country. Los Angeles County, California, had 12,380 farms; Fresno County, California, 10,463, and Lancaster County, Pennsylvania 11,457.

A decrease in the number of farms in the South, as compared to the last census in 1920, was shown in Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Tennessee, Mississippi and South Carolina, while the number in Florida, North Carolina and Texas was higher.

In the Middle West farms decreased in numbers in North Dakota, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Missouri; Iowa and Kan-

Scientists On Search for New Specimen

New "Valley of Kings" is to Be Dug Up for Tomb of Lost Race; Dezens of Ancient Graves Yield Bones and Relics of Prehistoric Days

By BRYANT HARBERT, INS Staff Correspondent.

Chillicothe, O., Mar. 29.—Early summer will see the return of scientists to this section of Ohio, known as "Ros County's Valley of the Kings," in search for a "100-per cent American King Tutankhamen," believed to have been buried in this center of classical culture left by the prehistoric mound-builders.

Encouraged by their discoveries late last year, archaeologists will continue their excavations with the hope of learning more of the culture left by these prehistoric people.

Dozens of mounds, varying in size, believed to have been the seat of the mound-builder's government or have formed a Mecca where great and significant ritualism was performed, are located in this vicinity and are expected within the next few months to give up the secrets, locked in their underground cavities, probably for many centuries.

The task of raising these mounds to huge proportions was herculean. It required patient toil, born of

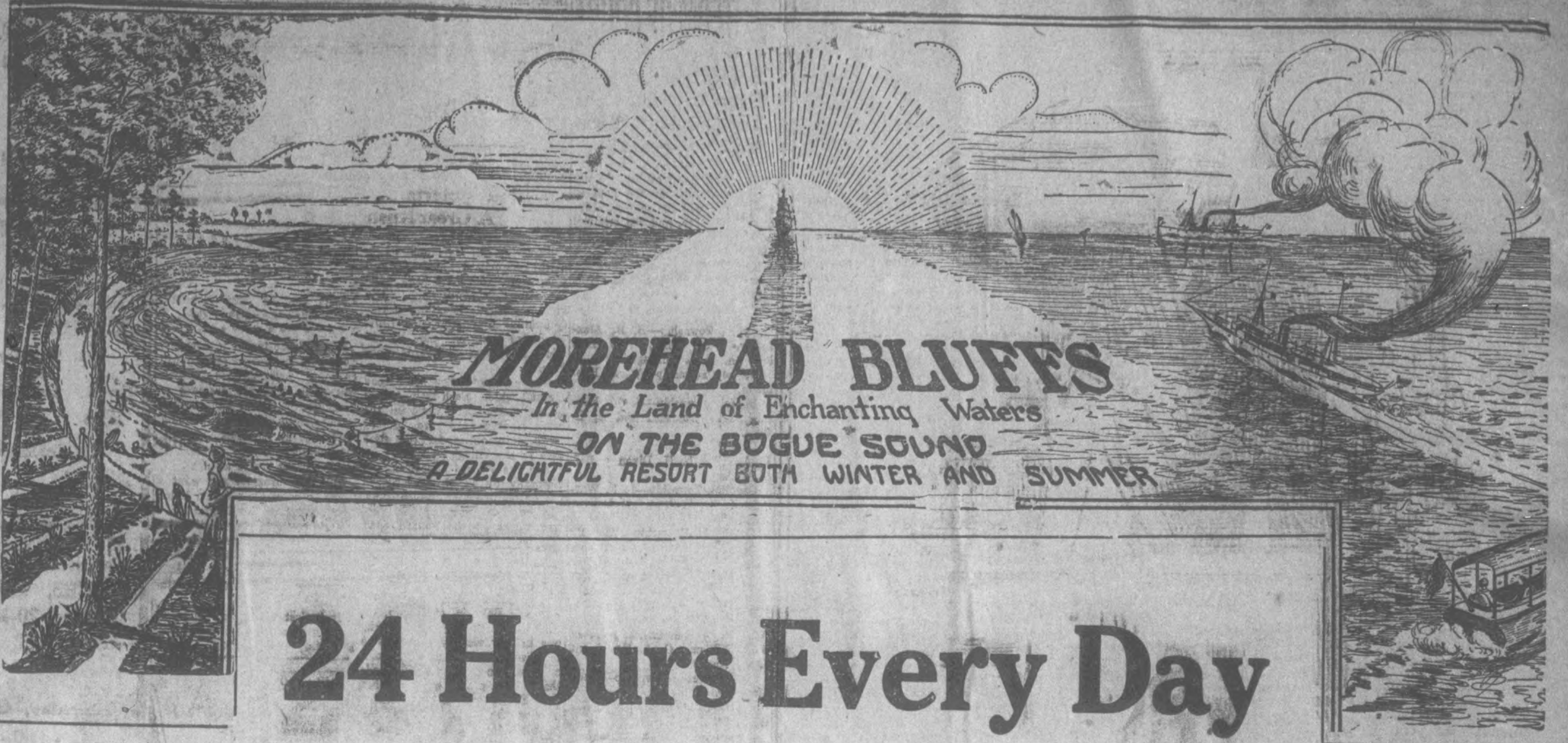

Carolina Gold Find Starts A Great Rush

Burnsville, N. C., March 31.—(INS)—Fortune hunters and prospectors, who have been pouring into this picturesque little mountain village lately, are eagerly awaiting a report by the United States mint on the "gold" which has been discovered near here.

News of the "strike" has spread far and wide. Each train brings in new prospectors, while all the roads leading here are dotted with automobiles for the first time in the village's history.

The "vein" was discovered accidentally by L. M. Edwards, a mining engineer of Spruce Pine. The engineer, passing the pottery works of the Pollard Clay Company while workmen were engaged in blasting, was startled to see glittering ore richly peppered in the clay. He also found some small nuggets, it is said.

C. A. Baldwin, of Toledo, O., one of the mining experts who was in the vicinity at the time the discovery was made, reported he said to agree with Edwards that gold in paying quantities has been found and that somewhere back in the hills reposes the mother lode. He is making a detailed investigation.

Real estate values around here have jumped to boom prices overnight.

The reported strike is the first evidence of valuable deposits in the mountains of this section. It has been known for many years that there was gold in North Carolina and several mines at one time were operating in this state.
