WILL INVESTIGATE CHARGES AGAINST H. HOYLE SINK

Special Inquiry to Be Held Into Charges of Trafficking in Pardons Alleged to Have Been Made Against Commissioner of Pardons

Raleigh, Apr. 1.—(AP)—After an adjournment without definite action of the board of trustees of State's Prison shortly before one o'clock today Attorney General Brummitt, who attended as representative of Governor McLean, announced that he would hold a special inquiry into charges of trafficking in pardons alleged to have been made against H. Hoyle Sink, Commissioner of Pardons.

The board of trustees found that Mr. Sink was not an employee of the prison department which had no jurisdiction to investigate charges against him. With regard to similar charges alleged to have been made against George H. Pou, prison superintendent, the board, through its counsel, announced at the closing of the meeting that information impugning irregularity in the securing of pardons for convicts had been presented by Mr. Shacklette, but that as he declined to testify as to the source of this information the board sitting as a committee was helpless to proceed further. Mr. Shacklette, through his counsel, declined to amplify the information contained in his statement given to the board a week ago in executive session, said that the matter was not in sense a charge but was information furnished in line of duty but he refused to divulge its confidential authors, prison convicts, unless he received assurance, which he claimed the board had given him only today, that witnesses would be protected from intimidation and corruption. Mr. Brummitt, in reading a letter from Governor McLean requested his attending an investigation in the interest of the administration, asked for an immediate inquiry into charges against Mr. Sink, but Mr. Bailey contended that the governor had no power to demand an investigation in five minutes notice.

Raleigh, Apr. 1.—(AP)—A meeting of the Board of Trustees of State's Prison here today to hear testimony regarding alleged charges of trafficking in pardons against George H. Pou, Superintendent, and H. Hoyle Sink, Commissioner of Pardons, adjourned without taking any action in the matter.

However action came from an unexpected source when Attorney General Brummitt, representing the state and at the instance of Governor McLean, announced to the board that a special investigation would be held Tuesday afternoon, April 6, to investigate the charges said to have been preferred against Mr. Sink. Mr. Sink is an appointee of the governor and is responsible only for the governor.

Decision that it had no authority to investigate any charges, no matter what their nature, made against Mr. Sink was announced in a statement read for the trustees at the opening of the meeting. The board said further that Prison Chaplain, W. S. Shacklette, who is alleged to have placed the charges against Mr. Pou and Mr. Sink, denied that he had made any charges against Mr. Pou. It added that Mr. Sink was not under the authority of the board and the board therefore felt it could not investigate any charges against him because of lack of jurisdiction.

Mr. Shacklette, whom the board says furnished information that led to the investigation, declined to testify before the committee today, stating through his counsel, J. W. Bailey, that the matter he furnished the board was in no sense a charge against anyone, but was information furnished in the line of duty, that its sources were confidential and that he could not divulge them without assurance, which he claimed was furnished him only this morning, that such sources had witnessed announced

"GOD'S GREATEST GIFT TO WORLD" SUBJECT LECTURE

Father Sweeney's Lecture Last Night On the "Betrayal of Christ by Judas" Heard By Large Audience

Father Stephen Sweeney last evening spoke to a crowded house at St. Peter's chapel. Before his lecture he answered a few questions. One which is commonly put, he said, by non-Catholics. Why do not Catholics read the Bible? Father Sweeney said: "Catholics do read the Bible. There has never been a time when Catholics were not only permitted but exhorted by their priests to read the Bible. In fact the Holy Mother Church grants her children special spiritual blessings for 15 minutes reading of the Bible each day.

"No one reads the Bible as often as does the priest. Priests say our office daily and also Holy Mass. Both office and mass are mostly compiled with prayers from the Bible. What we do not allow our people is private interpretation of the Bible. The church has her appointed interpreters, of the Bible in her Bishops and Priests who have made a careful study of the Scriptures. Civil law has its interpreters in those who have made a special study of the law. It is probably because we have always denied the right to read anything one wishes into the word of God that we Catholics have been accused of denying the Bible to our people."

Father Sweeney's discourse was upon the Betrayal of Christ by Judas. The lesson he drew from the graphic description of the traitor's life was the evils that follow from an uncontrolled passion. "Jesus Christ," he said, "has always taught us the necessity of doing personal violence to one's self. The necessity of conquering in the warfare in which we are engaged. The kingdom of heaven suffereth violence and only the violent shall bear it away, says Jesus Christ. And again he says, 'If any man will come after Me, let him take up his cross daily and follow Me.'"

LONGWORTH OUTLINES LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM TO PRES. COOLIDGE

Washington, Apr. 1.—(AP)—Speaker Longworth outlined to President Coolidge today a tentative legislative program for the House for the next week or two which would include conditions of aviation legislation, American German claims and Spanish War pensions.

Farm relief, the speaker said, holds an indefinite status as to priority because the House Agricultural Committee has not reached a decision on the principal bills before it. The Spanish War pensions measure would affect invalid and incapacitated veterans and its cost has been estimated at \$10,000,000 a year after the beginning, running to a maximum of \$18,000,000 and then decreasing. Indications were, Mr. Longworth said, that the Naval Aviation program could be provided without any additional drain on the Treasury by adjustments within the Navy budget. This measure will be the first aviation legislation taken up probably next week.

OMNIBUS FLOOD CONTROL BILL IS APPROVED BY HOUSE

Washington, Apr. 1.—(AP)—An omnibus flood control bill was approved today by the House Flood Control Committee which would authorize preliminary survey, among others, of the Noose River in North Carolina.

Another bargain day in Wall Street. Agitated gamblers threw overboard 2,964,000 shares of stock yesterday. Wise, quiet gentlemen picked up bargains.

Long ago Russell Sage, who made one hundred million dollars by keeping his head in Wall Street—not easy to do—said to this writer: "Everybody has at least one chance in his life to buy Western Union at 50. When your chance comes don't miss it."

If the Wall Street scare continues there will be better bargains than "Western Union at 50" lying around.

But don't gamble. If you do your turn will come to be shaken out.

Appearing for Archbishop Curley, of Baltimore, and stating that he represented 20,000,000 Catholics, Charles W. Carr, with Morgan J. O'Brien of the Catholic club of New York City; the Reverend Michael J. Little national director of the Holy Name Society; Sister Margaret Semple, Mother Superior and others well known appeared before the House Foreign Affairs committee yesterday. They urged that the United States break with Mexico.

The Government of Mexico seems little influenced by United States protests concerning religious matters, retroactive land laws and Japanese colonization. President Calles, who announces his determination to run Mexico and let Calvin Coolidge run the United States, has promulgated without any change, the land laws to which United States interests have objected strenuously.

It was decided to put a "sports day," beautiful window of colored glass, in the \$25,000,000 Protestant Episcopal Cathedral of St. John the Divine, in New York.

As originally planned, the "sports window" for the cathedral included a picture of live birds released from a trap and shot dead for the amusement of "sport."

That has been eliminated at the request of the Audubon Society, which seems reasonable, as trap shooting in the state of New York is a crime.

If, however, a modern Christian cathedral really needs a sports window, why not have a nice stained glass picture of Jack Dempsey, knocking out Mr. Willis, the colored man? That, at least, is legal in the state.

Led by Elihu Root, formerly in Theodore Roosevelt's cabinet, the Republican party of New York demands of the legislature a "wet referendum" to let the people say what they think about light wine and beer. This will complicate President Coolidge's political problems and cheer Governor Al Smith, wet candidate of the Democratic Party.

Europe's international steel trust will be more powerful than the British rubber trust that caused such agitation over here. The formation of such a trust should enlighten Americans that would limit the size and power of business units in the United States.

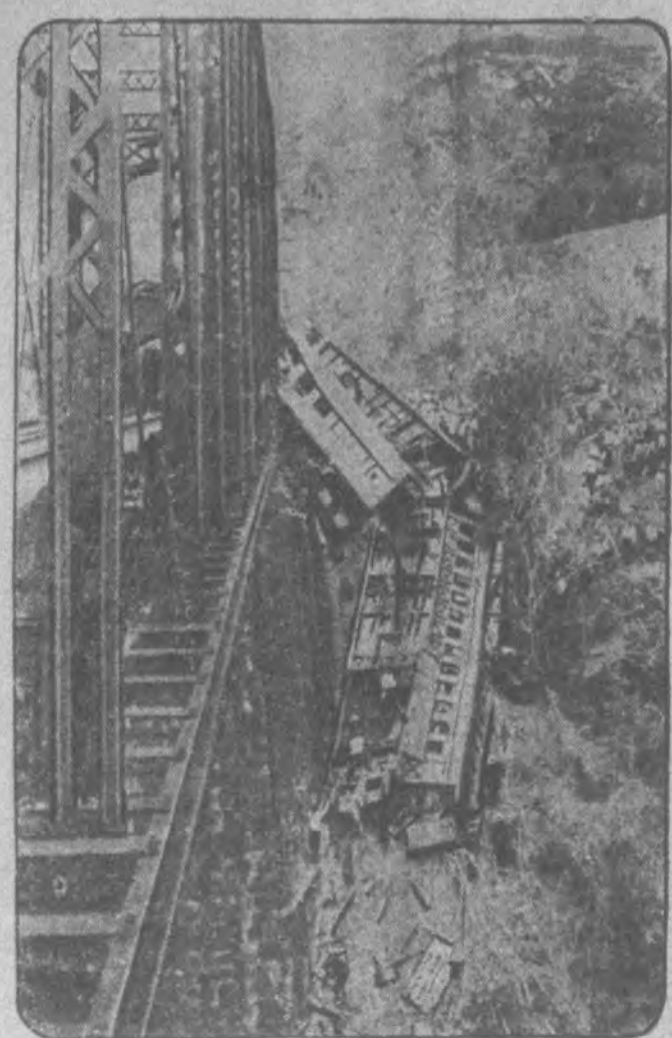
Fortunately this country need not fear Europe's steel trust. We have plenty of steel and coal and, most important, we have the tariff. If it came to a fight we could do some dumping of steel products all over the world that would surprise the European combination.

Aviation engineers in Berlin plan a ten-hour flying service between Hamburg and New York, a thing that will be a commonplace of transportation within a generation.

The German plan includes a suggestion printed several times in this column, namely, establishment of an air route six or seven miles up in the air where there are no vertical squally fogs, blizzards, hurricanes, cyclones or high winds of any kind.

FORMAL BID FOR "MODERN PILATES" SUBJECT SERMON TO BE PRESENTED CHRISTIAN CHURCH

American Cyanide Company's Bill Be Presented to Committee Monday

Washington, April 1.—(AP)—The first formal bid for Muscle Shoals will be submitted next week to the Joint Congressional Committee negotiating a lease. The committee stands in adjournment until Monday when the bid of the American Cyanide Company will be presented.

On Tuesday Representatives of the Union Carbide Company are expected to come forward with a bid and during the week other bidders are understood to be prepared to bring in proposals.

The resolution of the Committee fixing noon of April 10 as a dead line, is expected to speed other bidders who are known to have been holding back until next April 26, when the committee is required to close its hearings and report to Congress. The committee declared that two weeks will be required to digest the bids in order to make recommendation for release.

With authorization of the committee to spend \$5,000 it is believed that a private engineer and Major General Beach, former Chief of Army Engineers, will be employed to advise the Committee.

DECLARES FACTS GIVEN JUSTIFY NAMING RECEIVER

Presentation of Evidence Continues in Federal Court in Co-Ops Case; Buford Opens Argument and Reviews Case

Baltimore, Apr. 1.—(AP)—Presentation of evidence continued in Federal Court here today in the Tri-State Tobacco Growers' Cooperative Marketing Association case in which the association is resisting involuntary bankruptcy proceedings. Judge I. M. McKim presiding announced late yesterday he expected both sides today to answer his summary of what he believed to be the law as to the powers of the Federal Court in the proceedings.

Counsel E. P. Buford, of plaintiff counsel, opened the argument today and spoke for more than two hours. He reviewed the entire case from the plaintiff standpoint and argued that the facts presented justified granting the request for appointment of a receiver.

At the close of Colonel Buford's argument Aaron Sapiro, of counsel for the association, addressed the court with the remark he intended to dispute every statement made by Mr. Buford. Mr. Sapiro then launched into his rebuttal argument and at one o'clock still was speaking.

BRITISH TANKER RESCUES CREW OF STRICKEN VESSEL

Another Brilliant Chapter Added to Thrilling Rescue at Sea During Storms of Winter

New York, April 1.—(AP)—Adding a brilliant chapter to the long tale of thrilling rescues at sea during the storms of the winter, the British tanker Shirvan, was enroute for England today with 28 seamen rescued from the British freighter La Leham.

The Shirvan, racing to the side of the stricken freighter in a gale 400 miles off Halifax, last night beat the liner Mauretania, which also had swerved from her course at the cry for help. The Mauretania resumed her course for New York after Captain A. H. Rostrom had relayed brief dispatches of a rescue by the Shirvan.

Captain Rostrom, who was in command of the Carpathia when she rescued the survivors of the Titanic in 1912, reported that the La Leham was nearly on beam ends and all her life boats had been carried away. Messages gave no details except that the La Leham was sinking rapidly. The storm, which raged over the entire North Atlantic coast, also imperiled the American freighter Blair, which sent out an SOS call yesterday. The call was not repeated, leaving her fate at uncertainty. The Blair is due in New York April 6th.

The storm caused the death of one seaman swept overboard from the coast guard patrol boat 169. A number of other vessels were reported to have ridden safely through the fury of the elements.

WILL APPEAL TO SUPREME COURT STAY EXECUTION

Counsel for Gerald Chapman, Sentenced Be Hanged April 6, Appeals to Justice of Supreme Court

Washington, Apr. 1.—(AP)—An appeal for a stay of execution of Gerald Chapman, the mail bandit under sentence to be executed April 6 for the murder of a New Britain, Conn. police, will be made today to a Justice of the Supreme Court.

Ray M. Wiley, of Springfield, Mass., of counsel for Chapman, reached Washington today to make the appeal. The Supreme Court is in recess and the case must be handled individually with the Justice. It is understood that grounds are that Mr. Wiley wants to bring up for review some new phases which recently have arisen in the case. It is within the power of the individual justice to grant a stay of execution pending the submission of the case to the court.

Granting a stay would depend upon the ability of counsel to satisfy the justice that there has been a development in the case sufficient to warrant it, since a writ of the review was recently denied Chapman by the court.

Should a stay be granted it would be impossible for the court to pass upon any petition until it resumes April 12.

Prince of Wales Not to Be Guest At Celebration

Elizabeth City, April 1.—(AP)—His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, will not be a guest at the celebration of Virginia Dare Day at Roanoke Island, on August 18.

Though the Prince appreciates the invitation which was tendered him by the homecoming committee which is sponsoring that phase of the event, he reverberates that he will not be in the United States at that time.

TOO MANY

WASHINGTONS

Several months ago when
the town of Washington, N.
C., demanded that our na-
tional capital change its
name, we endorsed the pro-
posal. At that time, we
pointed out that Washing-
ton is a very poor name for
a city dedicated to the in-
terests of jobholders, since
our first President was only
an indifferent jobholder,
having on several occasions
resigned his job; and under
the circumstances we sug-
gested that Penrose, being
the name of a man who was
never pried loose from a
job by anything short of
death, would be much more
appropriate. Strange to
say, nothing came of our
suggestion.

We are moved by a dis-
tressing episode, however,
to put it forward again, and
even to enlarge it into a de-
finite plan of action. It
seems that an elderly pil-
grim got off the train in
another Washington, in New
Jersey this time, and forth-
with asked to be shown the
way to the White House.
Does not this indicate that
the time has come to end
such intolerable confusion?
We believe it does, and we
accordingly submit the fol-
lowing constructive idea:
Let all towns bearing the
name of Washington band
themselves together into the
"Little Washington As-
sociation" and urge on their
Congressmen that the name
of the wonder city by the
Potomac be changed.

There are twenty-six such
towns, and they dot the
landscape from the rock-
bound coast of Maine to the
sun-kissed hills of Califor-
nia. Singly they are help-
less, but when they are or-
ganized? When they are
organized the imagination
is staggered to conceive
what they might accomplish.
They have the ears of many
many Congressmen, and all
these ears are to the ground
—whereas Washington, D.
C., as we all know, has no
Congressmen at all, and no
prospect of getting any. We
believe, in the light of our
experience with such things,
that if our plan is put into
execution much might be
accomplished.

Of course, after the nec-
essary legislation is enact-
ed, there might be an intra-
organization fight to deter-
mine which Little Washing-
ton is to retain the covered
name; but that, as Steve
Erodie shouted to the boy
on the burning deck, is a

bridge we shall cross when
we come to it.—New York
World.

OPEN FORUM

DOES GREENVILLE NEED A
CITY MISSION?

To the people of Greenville:
For several months now an or-
ganization known as The Faith
Mission has been carrying on work
in this city. This Mission was
organized to meet what several
considered a great need here. It
was organized to systematically
care for worthy cases of need,
and to render spiritual ministry
in neglected places.

That there is a need for some
kind of an organization to do
the first named work few deny.
Jesus Christ said, "The poor you
have with you always," and we
have learned by experience that
this applies to our city and sur-
rounding country. We have the
poor—two classes, the worthy
and the unworthy. Those who
are in need because of misfortune
or sickness or adverse circum-
stances; and those who are in
need because of their own worth-
lessness. Faith Mission may
sometimes minister to the second
class because of innocents who
suffer on account of the guilty,
but the special objects of our
ministry are found in the first
class. And just to show the need
here, let us give here the calls re-
ceived in one day: One widow
with children asks for help. Wor-
thy case. One family is without
food and fuel, the father bed-
ridden, no source of income. One
blind woman with no one on
whom to depend is without food.
One sick woman needs money for
medicine; one child needs medi-
cal attention. This all in one
day.

Now, with reference to the
second kind of work mentioned:
There are many who believe that
this work should be done through
the churches. We admit that it
is church work, but what church
can effectively do the work? Take
the jail and the county home, for
instance. Every church in Greenv-
ille; every church in the county
would feel some responsibility
for giving religious instruction in
these two institutions. Suppose
that ALL should determine to
minister here regularly. What a
duplication of effort! What an
inefficiency! Could an effective
minister to these institutions? Will
any pastor admit that all the in-
mates are of his flock? Then
there is the cotton mill village.
There is no church in the vil-
lage, yet those people are en-
titled to religious help and serv-
ice. Every denomination is rep-
resented there. Every church
therefore, is responsible. These
people must have a Sunday School
—suppose every church conducts

one? What one church can ef-
fectively conduct a Sunday
School there?

The writer of this article is
desirous of having the religious
leaders of Greenville consider
these facts, and would like to
hear some expressions. We are
not asking for an endorsement
of Faith Mission; we are asking
that the religious leaders in
Greenville consider the ideal back-
ground of Faith Mission, the crying need,
and if this ideal is worth and
the need real, and the ideal could
best be realized, and the need
best met through another organ-
ization, why could not such an
organization be effected and sup-
ported by the people of our little
city in the name of Christ?

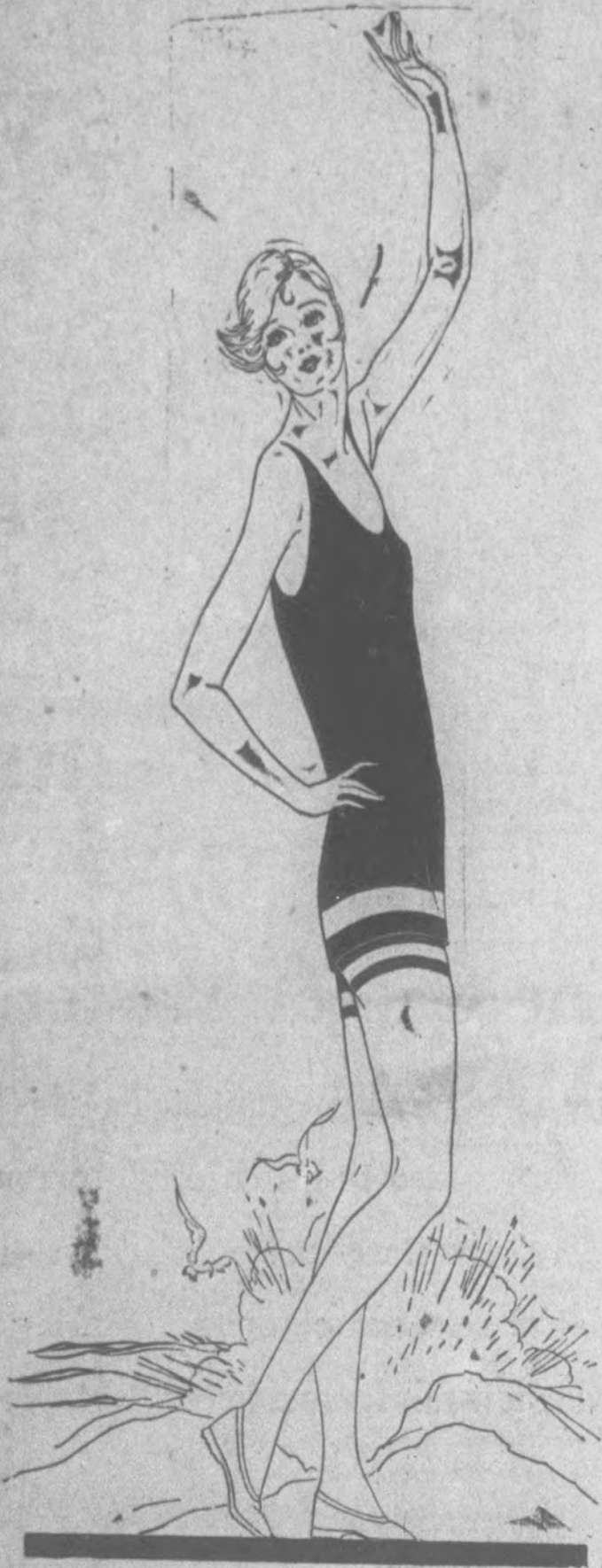

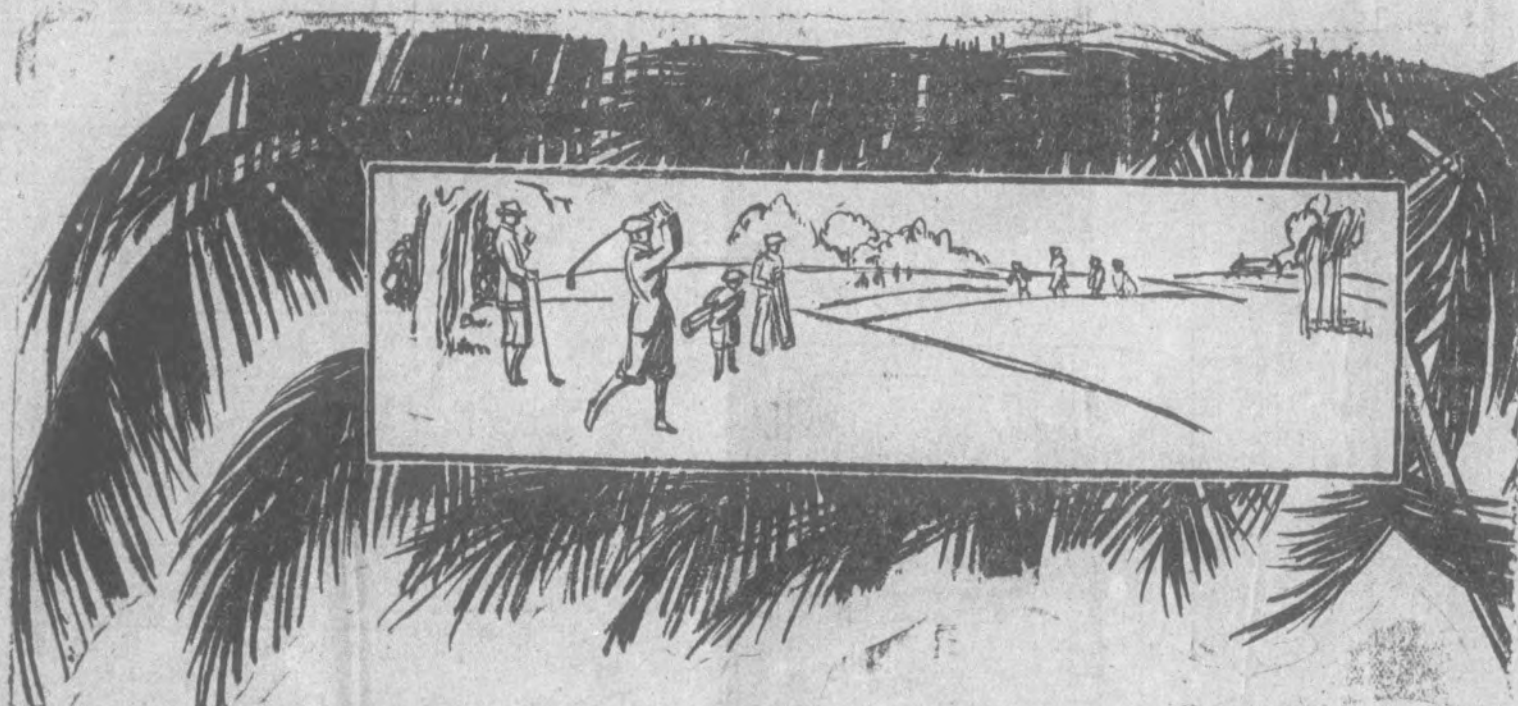

CABLE LETTER

London, March 27.—The Prince of Wales and his mother, Queen Mary, are meeting more frequently these days at Marlborough house, which is being made over to be the prince's town residence than under the parental roof of Buckingham palace. Both are much interested in the transformation of Marlborough house, and frequently are seen in consultation with builders, decorators and furnishers.

The queen has entrusted her son with looking after the practical side of the building, such as arrangement of closets, placing of new entrants and passages, and the installation of an elevator. The prince is much interested in up to date labor-saving devices, and spends much time watching demonstrations by salesmen in order to get their products placed in his residence. Queen Mary, an expert on antiques, is choosing the locations for the prince's more valuable pieces.

Aerial tours of Great Britain are to be offered American visitors this summer. An English aircraft company is building a fleet of four and eight seater planes to meet the American demand for speed. Three, four and seven seater planes, with landings at the principal places of interest, are to be offered. Some of the machines will be seaplanes

equipped to descend on lakes and rivers designed especially for tours of the lake country and the coastal towns. It is planned to keep the cost of such tours at about the same level as the cost of touring by train or motor car. Machines also will be rented for private tours of Great Britain and the continent.

"Beware of the hungry forties" is the warning Dr. Elizabeth Sloan Chester gives to persons who are inclined to obesity. Dr. Chester, who is inclined to obesity herself, says that the cause of stout middle aged persons often is due to dilated or congested digestive organs which need fasting, rest and re-education. Dr. Chester asserts, "Babies suffering from over-eating are often put on a diet of a bumper water for several days, and what suits a baby will not hurt a well nourished, over-plump adult." Dr. Chester says, "When obesity has overcome a man or woman, fasting is usually necessary at the beginning of a cure. No food for three or four days with pints of orange and lemon juice, will eliminate a fair quantity of poisons from the systems."

Real jewelry is likely to become very unfashionable in London this year. Artificial jewels of enormous size are being worn now by the Mayfair set and are so large that real gems could not hope to keep up with them. The artificial stones are not confined to evening wear. Recently a society matron set a new fashion by wearing at a luncheon a necklace of artificial rubies almost as

large as bantam eggs. Artificial jewels are being worn as wristlets and ear rings but the most popular fancy is to wear a large bright colored gem in a ring.

Paris, March 27.—(AP)—Armand Briand, now premier of France for the ninth time, will celebrate his 64th birthday tomorrow.

M. Briand's public career had a late start, but progress since then has been rapid. He won his first seat in the chamber of deputies when he was forty years old and after he had suffered four defeats. Once elected, however, he mounted rapidly and steadily. Within four years he was a minister and within seven years premier. He was originally elected as a socialist at a time when the socialists were looked upon much as the communists are today.

Until the Locarno conference M. Briand, undoubtedly regarded his work in steering a bill for the separation of church and state through parliament as the greatest achievement of his career. It is noteworthy that his action at that time does not keep him from being today a strong advocate of continuing diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

Discussions of peace plans will play an important part in the program of four women's gatherings of international interest scheduled to take place in Europe this summer. They are the tenth congress of the women's international suffrage alliance in Paris, May 30 to June 6; the fourth conference of the international federation of university women at the University of Amsterdam July 27 to August 2; the women's international league meetings to be held at the national university of Ireland in Dublin, July 13 to 14, to discuss peace projects and the English peace makers' pilgrimage which will begin in May and culminate in Hyde Park, London, June 19. On that day will be held a demonstration for peace similar to the termination of the suffrage pilgrimage held in London in 1912 when thousands of English women who had walked, ridden and driven from all parts of England and Scotland came together to protest en masse

against their delayed franchise. At the suffrage congress in Paris the last day of the program will be set aside for a peace demonstration at which Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt has been asked to preside.

UNIVERSITY N. C.
TO CONDUCT STATE
SPANISH CONTEST
Chapel Hill, April 1.—Announcement was made here today that the Spanish department and Extension Division of the University of North Carolina will

conduct, with cooperation of the participating schools, a contest in Spanish for high school students participation being open to accredited North Carolina public high schools. It will be the first time such a contest has been held in this state.

The contest will be held over the entire state on April 22, although permission may be granted individual schools to defer the date. It will be conducted under the direct supervision of the superintendent, the principal, or some teacher in the school.
