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OPENING PROGRAM OF EASTERN CAROLINA EXPOSITION A SUCCESS

American Legion and Auxiliary Float Takes First Prize; Will Rogers' Performances Please Thousands of People; Junior Queens to Be Presented Wednesday Afternoon

The Fourth Annual Eastern Carolina Exposition opened yesterday with one of the largest and most orderly crowds in the history of Greenville, in attendance.

The Exposition was officially opened by a parade which was featured by a number of beautiful floats. The American Legion and Auxiliary float was awarded the first prize, the Eastern Carolina Teachers College float, second prize, while the third prize was awarded to Tarboro. Participating in the parade were the marshals, Will Rogers, the world's greatest humorist, who was the feature of yesterday's program, afternoon and evening, the Queens, City and Exposition officials, Commissioner of Revenue, R. A. Doughton, the principal speaker of yesterday, Congressman Lindsay Warren, of Washington, and other distinguished guests. The line of the parade was as follows:

Chief marshal, D. J. Whitehead, lieutenant marshals, Julian White, W. L. Whitehead, R. W. Gorman, Dr. A. M. Schütz, Graham Flanagan, James Little, Doll Laughinghouse, Curtis Perkins, and Francis Bowen; the Benson Band; City and Exposition officials, and notables on the program; Queens; and floats as follows: Sans Souci Book Club, E. C. Teachers College, W. C. T. U., Bethel; United Daughters of the Confederacy; End of the Century Book Club; Woman's Club; Greenville Floral Company; American Legion and Auxiliary; Tarboro; Robinsonville; Greenville Kiwanis Club; Greenville Tobacco Market, two floats, depicting the market twenty-five years ago and the present; Round Table Book Club; and L. F. Hill.

Following the parade the doors of the large Exposition building were opened, and the brief formal exercises were staged. Rev. James E. W. Cook, Rector of the Episcopal Church, offered prayer. Mayor D. M. Clark, in a brief but appropriate manner, welcomed the thousands of visitors to the city. His welcome was responded to by President J. W. Holmes, of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce. Mr. J. H. James, master of ceremonies for the week, in his usual eloquent and graceful manner, introduced the Queens. The acclamations accorded the young ladies was proof enough that the Queen's contest is an attractive feature of the week's event.

The De Reszke Singers delighted the large audience with their repertoire which consisted of songs, piano solos, trios and duets. Each of the singers were splendid in their respective roles and gave to the large audience some of the best music ever heard from the Exposition stage.

Mr. James in a pleasing manner introduced Commissioner of Revenue, R. A. Doughton, who delivered the principal address of the afternoon. Mr. Doughton brought greetings from Governor McLean and in a few brief words told of the progress which North Carolina is making along all lines. He expressed great pleasure at being present and congratulated the city and Exposition officials upon the wonderful manner in which they were conducting the Exposition.

Will Rogers, the world's greatest humorist, and the screen idol of millions of people, put on a performance, which it would be useless to attempt to find words adequate to do justice. Just the name Will Rogers is sufficient to let the world know that a real notable appeared on the Exposition platform yesterday. Will's jokes are unusual. They knock without hurting and at the same time bring food for thought. He is one of the country's best read men, and is posted on every matter which directly or indirectly affects this great country. He has touched elbows with the world's greatest men, been in their homes, and made friends with them. He is at home on any American stage, whether city or village, and always makes an indelible impression upon his audiences. He was great and his performance was greatly enjoyed.

Last evening's performance was opened by a concert by Speech's Orchestra. This orchestra which will be here for the entire week, is

splendid. Seldom have the people of Eastern Carolina heard better music.

Following the concert Mr. James again presented the Queens and as Will Rogers said, "They couldn't be beat." A more beautiful selection of young ladies could not be found anywhere.

The De Reszke Singers appeared in their second performance of the day, followed again by Will Rogers. Both performances were as enjoyable if not more so, than the afternoon performances.

The evening's program was brought to a close by the Exposition dance. Music was furnished by Speech's orchestra. An attractive feature of their part of the program being an exhibition of the Charleston by Mr. Conklin, leader of the orchestra.

They are real musicians and their music was greatly enjoyed. The dance was largely attended and a number of dancers participated.

This afternoon was American Legion afternoon. The exercises were opened with a parade which formed at the court house and marched down Dickinson Avenue to the Exposition building. The large number of legionnaires and their friends were addressed by Hon. Tasker Polk, Col. Merrill and L. Hoyt, Fort Bragg, and I. P. Davis, Warsaw.

Tomorrow's program will be as follows: In the afternoon the Junior Queens will be presented. Everybody in the audience will vote for the Junior Queens. The Eastern Carolina Teachers College program follows the Queen's voting contest.

In the evening the mammoth style show with beautiful living models will feature the program.

An Appeal for Family in Need

Thinking the good people of Greenville and community would be glad to make a contribution to the case of Mr. W. C. Cobb, whose house was burned in the fire, give information below for their consideration.

On March 18, Mr. W. C. Cobb had his house and entire contents burned. His wife, who was a semi-invalid with T. B., was severely burned and died three days later. Cobb was burned badly and will be confined to his bed for about two weeks longer. W. C. Cobb, Jr., aged 14, Alton, age 10, and Susie, age 6, were severely burned. The latter stayed in the hospital at Rocky Mount about two weeks. Cobb owns a farm of about thirty-eight acres but is in debt \$1,000 on it. By reason of his wife's sickness, Cobb has been in bad circumstances for the past several years, and that, in addition to the fire, has completely broken his spirit and purse.

The people in Bethel raised \$100, and other individuals have given money amounting to about \$75.00. A church in Tarboro, of which he is a member, is paying the burial and hospital expenses of his wife.

A bill meanwhile is pending before Congress to reduce the membership to four commissioners. It was sponsored by Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, Democrat.

Landing Rum in U. S. Gives the Sailors a Thrill

London, Apr. 6.—(INS)—Exciting adventures off the coast of the United States while engaged in the rum-running trade were described by Alphonse Grare, of Antwerp, Belgium, and second mate of the Belgian steamer Gertrude, on his arrival at Liverpool aboard the line Matarose.

Grare stated that the Gertrude was chartered at Antwerp by a party of Americans who supplied a big whiskey cargo for America. "The ship's papers were cleared for Vancouver, via the Panama Canal," said Grare.

"She carried a mixed crew, including three Dutchmen, one German, two Russians, and fourteen Belgians. We found rum-running a very exciting experience—especially off the American coast. We had to display all our wits in seizing the right opportunity of getting past the coast-guard."

"During the rough weather, a drunken mutiny broke out among the crew, but it was settled on the men becoming sober. The voyage in all took 240 days."

These are exciting Easter days in Jerusalem and the Angel Gabriel keeping track of us all, has one of his busiest weeks.

CHARGES AGAINST SINK ARE BEING INVESTIGATED

Charged With Bribery in Connection With Granting of Pardons and Paroles

Raleigh, April 6.—(AP)—At the direction of Governor McLean the charges of bribery in connection with the granting of pardons and paroles alleged to have been made against H. Hoyle Sink, Commissioner of Pardons, by Prison Chaplain W. S. Shacklette, were to be investigated today by Attorney General Brummitt. The hearing, which was announced for 2:30 o'clock at the attorney general's office, was to be public, it was announced.

The charge against Mr. Sink, said to have been made in connection with a pardon granted by the Governor to W. W. Greene, negro army officer serving a sentence for an attack, was not investigated by the prison board at its meeting a few days ago, that board taking the attitude that it had no authority to investigate an appointee of Governor McLean.

The governor already has directed Mr. Brummitt to investigate the alleged charge as it applied to Mr. Sink. The charge was made by Mr. Shacklette to B. E. Everett, one of the directors of the state prison, and Mr. Everett reported the matter to the prison trustees. Mr. Shacklette denied in part what Mr. Everett attributed to him and refused to comment upon the remainder.

PERPETUAL MOTION INVENTORS NOT ALL DEAD; HERE'S ANOTHER

Orangeburg, S. C., April 6.—(INS)—Has it been left to an inventor of Bowman, a small South Carolina town, to stumble upon a device which inventors for ages have tried and failed—a perpetual motion device to generate sufficient power to operate a sewing machine?

The Bowman inventor claims that his contrivance generates enough power to operate even larger machines.

The machine is made up of wheels, small iron balls and a "jack." 22 balls in all being required to furnish the power. The balls drop into cups on a wheel and cause the wheel to revolve. As the balls arrive at the lower side of the wheel, they drop out and then roll in position for the "jack" to lift them to the point where they again drop into the cups.

The wheel is geared with the "jack" to lift the balls, and when the machine is once set in motion, it will continue to run indefinitely, its inventor claims.

MOVIE CAMERA TO RECORD VIVISECTION OPERATIONS

Paris, Apr. 6.—(INS)—The movie camera is going to do away with repeated vivisection if the plans of a group of eminent French surgeons and scientists can be carried through.

Repeated vivisection of cats, dogs, rabbits and guinea-pigs will be unnecessary in the future. There will be only one and the cinema camera will do the rest. Films will be made showing in clearest detail each phase of numerous operations which have been performed perhaps some time previous. There is no necessity for a poor animal to be sacrificed every time some information is desired. BRITISH WOMEN FIGHT TO KEEP TENNIS CUP

London, April 6.—Strong efforts are being made by British women lawn tennis players to retain the Wightman Cup in this year's contest at Wimbledon.

CHARGES MARVIN USING GAG RULE CONDUCT DEBATE

Commissioner Dennis Says Gag Rule Being Used in Debate On Tariff Commission

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—The gag rule is being used by Chairman Marvin in conducting the debate on the Tariff Commission, Commissioner Dennis, a Democrat, charged today before the Senate Tariff Committee.

Under the present procedure, he said, two-fifths of the time allotted to debate is consumed by Commissioner Glassie, one-fifth by Chairman Marvin, and one-fifth by Commissioner Costigan, leaving only one-fifth for the other three members.

"I protested to the Commission on this slipshod method of conducting debate," he said.

Mr. Dennis declared he had been criticized by Chairman Marvin for writing President Coolidge at Swampscott about the stratagem while at the same time Chairman Marvin wrote the president about Tariff cases without the Commission being advised.

Martin Appears Before the Muscle Shoals Committee

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—Thomas W. Martin, President of the Alabama Power Company, appears today at two o'clock at the executive session of the joint congressional committee negotiating for a lease for Muscle Shoals. Mr. Martin planned to discuss terms of a bid which the company expects to submit Saturday.

OHIO ENGINEERS STUMPED FOR REASON OF HOLE IN GROUND THEY CAN'T FILL

Rittman, O., April 6.—(INS)—The best engineers in Ohio confess themselves baffled by the mysterious sinking of ground southeast of this village. More than 1,000 carloads of dirt, gravel and timber have been dumped into a hole at the Baltimore and Ohio right-of-way in a vain effort to fill it.

Occasionally the surface sinks at the rate of two feet in five minutes, though usually much slower. The land for five acres around the sink-hole has bulged up five feet, engineers declare.

Drillers have endeavored to locate a possible underground lake. They have gone down to great depth, but invariably their bits strike solid rock.

The hole was discovered by railroad engineers engaged in the construction of a double track for the road. They have been trying for months to fill the depression, but whatever is dumped into the hole soon vanishes with what has gone before.

15,000 LEPERS IN JAPAN ACCORDING TO CENSUS

Tokyo, Apr. 6.—(INS)—There are 15,400 lepers in Japan, according to a census conducted by the Home Office. This represents a decrease of 861 as compared with the previous census taken in March, 1919.

LEADERS OF WET CAUSE SEEK PROVE ENDS CAREER ON PART INDICTMENT GALLOWS TODAY

Resume Their Questioning Before the Senate Prohibition Committee and Ask About Corruption in Prohibition Forces

Washington, Apr. 6.—(AP)—By the testimony of General Andrews, the Government's chief enforcement officer, leaders of the wet cause, sought again today to prove at least a part of the indictment they have brought against prohibition. Resuming their questioning before the Senate Prohibition Committee they asked the General about corruption in the prohibition forces, diversion of alcohol, blind tigers, drug stores, and many other elements which the witnesses freely conceded to be involved in the enforcement situation, but he insisted that steps were being taken and would be taken to minimize the objections against practices of the dry regime.

As he replied to the question of Julius Codman, of Boston, chief counsel for the wets, General Andrews slouched down in the big witness chair and occasionally puffed at a cigarette.

The examination dealt first with the 875 employees of the prohibition unit who have been discharged. Of these 121 went out on charges of "bribery and extortion." 80 others for falsifying expense accounts, and 21 for making false statements in applying for positions.

In the field of alcohol diversions General Andrews said that 300 establishments had been established. "I regard these as bootlegging establishments," he said. "There is no economic necessity for them and it is from them that alcohol is diverted."

He told also how so-called "druggists" going into business were seriously injuring the business of the honest druggist. "I am working on a law now that will enable me to control medicinal liquor."

"You mean you hope it will enable you to do it," broke in Senator Reid, Democrat of Missouri.

"I think it can be demonstrated," said the General.

"Possibly," said Reid.

Textile Workers and Police Stage Free for All Fight

Pasadena N. J., April 6.—(AP)—50 local police today battled one thousand or more textile strikers at Wallingford Bridge, arresting ten leaders and receiving in return a prolonged shower of rocks and stones. Police used their clubs on the leaders who included Nancy Sandowsky, known as the strikers' Joan of Ark. She has been arrested several times. Mary Stanzinger, member of the strikers committee which went to Washington recently, also was arrested. The clash occurred after strikers, who had picketed Botany Mills and marched into Wallingford to meet forces of several hundred, which picketed Hatfield Mills.

The combined forces then attempted to return to Pasadena through Wallingford to picket either mills. They were met at the bridge by Pasadena police.

Naval Officers to Appear Before Court Martial

Washington, April 6.—(AP)—Commander Louis J. Gulliver, Lieutenant William McK. Reifel, and navigating officer respectively, of the Navy Cruiser O'Brien when she piled on a shoal of the Virginia Cape December 2, 1923, were ordered today to appear before a court martial on charges of negligence and culpable inefficiency. Captain Reginald R. Bell, commanding the Hampton Roads operating base will be the president of the court and commander H. B. Michael on duty in the Norfolk Naval District will be the judge advocate. The court will sit at Norfolk.

Murderer and Bandit Pays Penalty for Life of Crime Which Began at 16 Years of Age

Wethersfield Prison, Conn.—Apr. 6.—(AP)—Gerald Chapman, notorious robber, who waged a bitter fight until the end to escape the noose for the murder of a New Britain policeman during a robbery October 10, 1924, died on Connecticut's new hanging machine early today. The machine was sprung at 12:04 and Chapman was officially pronounced dead at 12:13.

Calm and unmoved to the end, Chapman, whose career of crime had become almost legendary, walked to his death without even the consolation of dying within sight of a crucifix.

Chapman, whose real name was George Chartres, the son of a respectable family, walked quietly to his place in the blue chalk circle on the floor where the noose was adjusted. A few moments later his life, which had encompassed some of the most sensational crimes of the past decade, ended.

Father Michael P. Barry, the spiritual adviser of his last weeks on earth, accompanied the notorious bandit to his death, after spending the last four hours alone with him in the death cell. Father Barry did not explain why he did not carry a crucifix, according to the usual custom.

The witnesses took their seats shortly before Chapman entered the death chamber but the medical examiner and prison physician moved over to the corner and stood beside the warden. There was a moment's delay, only when the door of the chamber across the hall opened as Chapman, with a guard on either side came out, followed by Father Barry and other guards.

The priest walked to the side of the room. Chapman uttered no sound. He looked quickly around. His eyes swept first the group in the warden's corner, then the witnesses on the bench, and finally rested on the right-hand corner where the enclosure hides the hanging windlass is hidden. Those glances were piercing. They suggested those of a wounded animal at bay. It was but an instant, for the noose, which was looped up on the wall behind him, and which he could not have seen, was taken down by a guard. Just as the black cap was drawn over his head from behind, shutting out the bright lights of the room and the faces of those in front of him, his legs were strapped. Almost the same instant the guards stepped back and the harsh rasp of the plunger was heard simultaneously with the whirr of the hanging machine. Chapman's body was whisked upward as the slack rope became taut.

Father Barry, who claimed the body, ordered it removed at once to a mortuary chapel.

Chapman's funeral will be held from here this morning. A guard on either side seized his legs and steadied the body until it became almost motionless. Deputy Warden Starr nodded toward the windlass, closest and the body slowly was lowered until the feet were near the floor.

The room was in absolute silence for a minute, and then the tension was broken by a rough cry from one of the witnesses and the faint sound of pencils scratching on papers as newspapermen made notes.

Two guards removed the straps from the dead man's legs and arms while the prison physician checked Chapman's pulse. Fifteen or twenty minutes later the medical examiner also nodded the death warrant, which he whispered to the deputy warden. Chapman was officially dead in 7 minutes and 5 seconds after the second jerk.

Hartford, Conn., April 6.—(AP)—In a plot of Mount Mansfield, the body of Gerald Chapman, notorious bandit, was hanged today.

This speaks well for the citizens of this and other communities who gathered together here for one of the biggest days Greenville has ever known.

AS WE ARE SEEN

The following editorial from the News and Observer, will be read with interest and pride by our citizens:

"This is the week when the eye of the State will be upon the city of Greenville, capital of the great county of Pitt, nestling on the banks of the Tar river. It is the host of the Eastern Carolina Exposition, and it is now ready with true Southern hospitality to welcome the throngs of business men and visitors who are packing their bags for the notable gathering.

"It is to be a coming together of the most enterprising representatives of the commercial, industrial and agricultural interests of the largest section of North Carolina to exchange views as to the best means of promoting the development of the richest section of the State of North Carolina. There are many evidences that, in addition to the faith and quickened interest in

development by the people who live in the rich lands and in the wide-awake towns and cities, the eyes of investors and settlers are turned to that fertile section. The fertility of the soil and the ability to grow everything from strawberries and early truck to cotton and tobacco and peanuts, to mention only the largest staple crops, together with the big lumber industry, have largely commanded the efforts and the capital of that section of the commonwealth. However, the industrial and manufacturing establishments are much larger than is generally known, and they are growing in number and size. And what is better: new factories are being projected and constructed in the surrounding territory, promising to bring larger and larger returns to investment.

It is fortunate that as North Carolina stands upon the threshold of the largest expansion and prosperity in its entire history, that the Exposition, showing samples of what has been produced, is held in the capital of Pitt county. That is the largest county of the coastal section of the State. It produces more bright tobacco than any other county in the State and as a tobacco market ranks among the best in North Carolina and Virginia. Its production of cotton is large. Agriculturally, it is one of the most fertile counties in the country, and it can be truly said that it has advanced as rapidly in agricultural development as any county in the United States, with the outlook for even larger diversification and enlargement.

There are no less than 11 different soils, but the ones that give Pitt county distinction are the fine sandy loam on which the fine bright tobacco is grown.

"The cultivation of tobacco in Pitt is comparatively a recent agricultural departure. And yet it leads all other counties in the production of bright tobacco, and Greenville is the second largest tobacco market in North Carolina. It has seven large warehouses in which were handled 46,297,880 pounds of tobacco this season, \$12,007,459 being paid to farmers for bright tobacco sold on that market. This did not represent all the tobacco sold in Pitt county markets, for 12,105,116 pounds were sold in Farmville, one of the best towns in Eastern North Carolina.

The population of Greenville has doubled within the past five years. This does not include the 700 young women matriculating in the East Carolina Teachers' College, which ranks among the best schools for training teachers in the whole country. That institution is the pride not only of Greenville and all Pitt, but also of all Eastern North Carolina.

In point of health the record of Greenville and Pitt county is one which attracts settlers. There was a time when it was supposed people in parts of Pitt county were subjected to attacks of malaria. It has gone. "There never was as much as we thought," says Dr. Charles O'Hagan Laughinghouse. "It used to be that everything that couldn't be traced to typhoid or an abscess was malaria." Drainage and quickened interest in

development by the people who live in the rich lands and in the wide-awake towns and cities, the eyes of investors and settlers are turned to that fertile section. The fertility of the soil and the ability to grow everything from strawberries and early truck to cotton and tobacco and peanuts, to mention only the largest staple crops, together with the big lumber industry, have largely commanded the efforts and the capital of that section of the commonwealth. However, the industrial and manufacturing establishments are much larger than is generally known, and they are growing in number and size. And what is better: new factories are being projected and constructed in the surrounding territory, promising to bring larger and larger returns to investment.

"For part of two generations the spirit of progress in Greenville and Pitt county have been voiced in 'The Reflector,' established by D. J. Whichard and continued as a live and influential journal by his son, David J. Whichard, Jr., editor and proprietor. It began as a small weekly and is now one of the best afternoon dailies in the State, stimulating and aiding in every movement having the good of the town and county at heart.

"In its strong banking and business institutions, Greenville is particularly blessed and its enterprise and spirit will be in evidence to all the visitors who are fortunate enough to attend the Exposition."

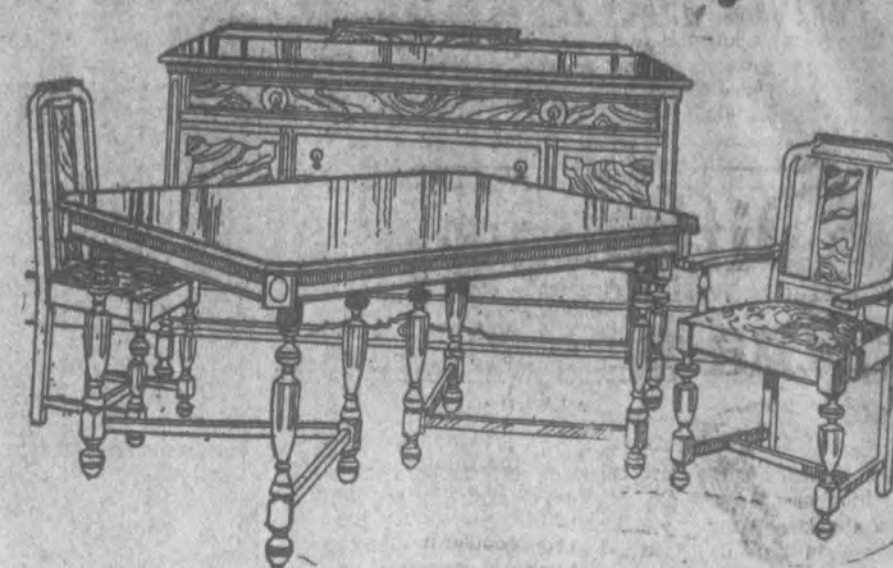

CABLE LETTER

London April 3. (AP)—Even queens some time a visiting to unannounced without any flurries, frills or formalities. The Queen of the Belgians came to London for a visit the other day and arrived at the railway station without representatives of King George's household or the foreign office to greet her. The government knew nothing about it. The queen, accompanied by Crown Prince Leopold, was whisked off to a hotel in a taxicab and it was not until

hours afterward that Whitehall or Buckingham Palace was aware of the presence of the royal visitor from across the channel. She came over to do some Easter shopping. After completing her shopping, the queen of the Belgians packed her grip and went back home again—also without telling the British government anything about her plans.

English girl, keenness for athletic and field sports has robbed them of the grace essential for such occupations as that of mannequin, say some of the fashion experts, and as a result there is a certain dearth of models for the

spring dress parades. There are about 20,000 mannequins in London, but this number is not sufficient for the rush season.

The big stores handling smart gowns have been advertising for models, but many of the applicants have been turned away for the reason that they are too well developed. As a result of this dearth of models, professional free lance mannequins who supplement the permanent staffs of the fashion houses, are reaping a harvest in cash. They get about two pounds a session and are able to do two sessions a day. The rate of pay is four or five pounds weekly with meals. Junior mannequins received from two pounds to two pounds and a half a week.

Paris, April 3. (AP)—A crusade to introduce fasting as a cure for most human ills, being preached in Paris by Dr. Lipinska and supported by six prominent physicians, has caused Parisians to ask if science is to deprive life of its last pleasure.

"Life is not so gay," remarked one commentator. "It will hardly be worth living if science is going to deprive us of one of its last pleasures. Love is full of disillusion; success, never satisfies ambition, and fortune brings a crushing load of taxation. Nothing is left but the table and friends, that is good friends around a good dish, washed down by a good bottle. Are we going to invite our friends to a fast?" Madame Lipinska, the doctor heading the crusade, is preaching the marvelous effect of a fortnight's fasting on the intelligence, the memory, the imagination, the will and even the physical beauty in the disappearance of wrinkles, clearness of complexion, suppleness of the body, etc. The doctor herself is a wonderful example of will power. Blind for many years, she has refused to allow the loss of sight to interfere with her studies, research work and travels.

French confectioners have a grievance against the calendar and earnestly hope the league of nations amends it so that Easter Sunday never falls so near the first of April as this year.

Easter Sunday is marked in French by presents of chocolate eggs, while chocolate fish are the traditional gift for April fools day. The candy sellers find that when these days occur in the same week their sales diminish seriously.

Paris expects a lively session of the women's international suffrage alliance when it meets here for its tenth world congress May 30 to June 6, with French women pleading for the vote and English women heatedly demanding equal voting rights with Englishmen.

It was indicated that women of 43 nationalities will take part. The United States delegation, headed by Miss Anne Morgan, expected to advocate the most complete program for the equalization of men and women yet presented to the alliance. Mrs. Marjorie Corbett Ashby, president of the International Suffrage Alliance, who will preside, is leader in the English cause of equal franchise rights. At present the English women cannot vote until the age of 20, although the suffragists point out, they may legally marry at the age of 12.

The last day of the session will be set aside for a peace demonstration at which Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, until 1923, president of the alliance, will preside.

Berlin April 3. (AP)—More than 200 modern cave dwellers have been found in the ash and refuse dumps on the outskirts of Berlin amid surroundings more squalid than those of primitive man.

Poverty stricken families, some with as many as four children, evicted from homes for non-payment of rent, have survived the winter in one or two underground rooms furnished entirely from rubbish heaps. Discarded steel cots were used as beds. The cooking utensils consisted of patched up pots and pans. Shredded carpets covered the dirt floor. Logs and pine box boards have been hewn into rafters, which kept the dirt from caving down on the occupants. City authorities have undertaken to find new abodes for the colony. There is a jobless village of more than 2,000 inhabitants living in one room tenement shacks on city property.

(Continued from page 1) at Wethersfield prison just after midnight for murdering a policeman.

No priest went with the body to its final resting place, and there was no service of the Roman Catholic Church. The body was claimed by the Rev. Michael P. Barry, Roman Catholic Chaplain of the prison, who had said he would see that Chapman was given a burial such as he would desire a friend to have. Father Barry, however, did not go to the cemetery, he had already departed on a vacation of two months, leaving no word of what had transpired during three hours he was in the room across the entry from the death chamber with Chapman. It had been thought that perhaps the priest would tell something about the murder, that there might be something that he could reveal of the singular character with whom he had come to live on friendly terms, something which would not encroach on the privacy of the relation of priest with the man. But Father Barry had said that he would say no word and answer no question, for to him the life of the man was a closed book. The burial took place shortly after sunrise.

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Moscow, April 6.—"Is America a alarm?"

This strange addition to the world's stock of foolish questions has aroused a new controversy between Russian Communist leaders which threatens to banish their interest in the world revolution to the back page.

So far Leon Trotsky has done valiant defense of America's reputation as the most efficient country in the world, and has won a large majority of popular votes. He has confirmed the well-founded Russian intuition that America is no false alarm, but a regular three-beat fire, requiring constant attention from the chief himself.

Only for a moment was the confidence of the Russians in general all-round technical superiority of America shaken. It is one of their favorite beliefs, and the wavering was only temporary when "Professor" Valerian Vassilievitch Ossinsky, one-time Soviet ambassador to Sweden, and now chief statistician of the government took the platform and endeavored to prove that America is after all, a backward country, just a sort of tank-town nation.

"Professor" Ossinsky had just returned from a six-month tour of America, made for the express purpose of "dispelling the popular illusions" which paint that country in rosy colors even in the land of the clear-eyed Bolsheviks. He came back completely satisfied with his findings and reported them to a packed house in the Polytechnic Museum, which, however, unfortunately for him, contained a large number of persons who had also been in America.

"We know America chiefly from romantic novels, and our ideas about it are fantastic," opened the "Professor." We think that American technique is perfect, but take their soap for example. It is rotten. And their safety razor blades! Why, Americans have to

use a new one every morning. "I wore an American suit of clothes six months. It was wretched."

"When I bought matches, they gave me a box marked 'made in Latvia.' You see, they can't even make matches in America."

"American railroads are rarely on time. During my travels, 75 per cent of the trains were late, from ten minutes to three hours. And the trains started with such a jolt, they almost broke my neck."

"American telephones are abominable. You have to scream, shout, and then send a telegram."

"And what about those workmen in America who own their own automobiles? Why, while I was there, a lot of these workmen lost their jobs and went around begging gasoline for their cars!"

The "Professor" was perfectly serious at this point, but the laughter nearly broke up his audience. Proceeding obviously, he said: "The psychology of the pioneer in America has disappeared. The old folks do nothing but play golf, the silliest game in the world, and the young ones are corrupt."

"The best thing in America is Russian art. Ninety per cent of all the art, music, acting, and painting in America is foreign, and 50 per cent is Russian."

"All art in America is very low, except the jazz bands."

A few days later Leon Trotsky, idol of Moscow, answered the "Professor." In a speech before an audience which paid from \$3 to \$15 a seat and packed one of the largest theatres in Moscow.

Trotsky, as is well-known, has also been in America. But not, as he was careful to emphasize, as a tourist.

He laughed at most of the more absurd observations of Comrade "Professor" Ossinsky. But a few he took the trouble to refute.

"It's no use harping at America," said Trotsky. "What we ought to do is to learn from her. The industry of the United States stands far higher than that of any other country in the world. America owns 60 per cent of the world's values. In fifty years she has organized the most wonderful industry in the world."

"If a train is late now and then in America it will be understandable if you remember that there are 250,000 miles of track in the United States, with a proportionate number of trains, compared to our 42,000."

With her help the circulation of books and calls for reference as well as the many phases of regular routine will be cared for in an efficient manner.
