SAYS CITIZENSHIP IN AMERICA IS PUBLIC FUNCTION HERE

President Coolidge Addressing D. A. R.'s Declares Whole System Government Rests On Ballot Box

Washington, April 20.—(AP)—Citizenship in America is not a private enterprise, but a public function, President Coolidge said in an address tonight before the Thirty-fifth Congress of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution during which he urged the people to exercise a greater interest in their government by going to the polls on election day.

"The whole system of government," he declared, "rests on the ballot box. Unless citizens perform their duties there, such a system of government is doomed to failure."

Making a passing reference to law observance as it relates to the duties of citizenship, the President said that it "cannot be denied that in the splendor and glimmer of our life the moral sense is sometimes blinded."

"It cannot be disputed," he said, "that in too many quarters there is a lack of reverence for authority and of obedience to law. Such occurrences are sporadic and produce their own remedy. When society finds that its life and property are in peril from evildoers, it is very quick to organize its forces for its own protection. That can not fail to be done in our own country, for our people as a whole are thoroughly law abiding."

The President held, however, that it was not in violence and crime that the greatest danger lies, for these evils were quickly apparent and could be suppressed. A far more serious danger, he said, lurks in the shrinking of those responsibilities of citizenship, where the evil may not be so noticeable but is more insidious and likely to be more devastating.

The address was delivered on the anniversary of the battles of Concord and Lexington, and after referring to the form of government set up as a result of the Revolution, Mr. Coolidge said:

"If we are to keep our representative form of government and to maintain the principle that the majority shall rule, it behooves us to take some drastic action to arouse the voters of this country to a greater interest in their civic duties on election day. Many remedies have been proposed, from disfranchisement to criminal action. The most practical, I believe, however, is for all bodies of men and women interested in the welfare of this country to join together under some efficient organization to correct this evil."

"It was hoped that giving the vote to women would arouse a more general interest in the obligation of election day. That has not yet proved to be the case. The presidential election in 1920 was the first after the adoption of the universal suffrage amendment. There is no way to divide the total vote cast by men and women. But, after that election some rather complicated calculations were made based on the assumption that the accession of women might be presumed to double the vote. The calculations reached the conclusion that of the approximate 27,000,000 votes cast only 37 per cent represented votes of women. Some say that the percentage of feminine vote was greater in 1924. Others say it was less."

"I am not disposed to accept these conclusions as altogether fair to the women. And it stands to reason that it would take some time for them to become used to exercising the privilege which had belonged to the men of this country for many generations."

"It is not my purpose to draw any distinction between the men and women as to the extent to which they take advantage of their privilege and perform their duty at the ballot box. But rather it is my idea to call your attention to the startling fact that in the last two presidential elections barely 50 per cent of those qualified to vote have done so. In the senatorial elections in off years the voting percentage is much smaller."

The perilous aspect of this situation lies in its insidiousness. (Continued on page 6)

Greenville to Have Community Players

The community day or home talent dramatic movement has recently spread over the civilized world from end to end in a most remarkable way.

In our issue of last Tuesday, April 13, we printed an official dispatch from London, telling of the situation in England, where amateur theatricals have grown to such an extent that the professional stage has been compelled to ask assistance from the government in order to exist.

In America, though not interfering with the profession, the movement has likewise found great favor. Ten years ago there were perhaps less than a dozen permanent organizations of this nature in the entire country, while today there are registered approximately five hundred active groups, with North Carolina alone supporting forty of that number, many of which are fostered and sponsored by colleges, civic clubs, woman's clubs and various other local bodies, while others are entirely independent and self-supporting.

Greenville has recently come in for its share of the benefits to be derived from such organizations by the formation of the Community Players here. The local organization is under professional direction and already rehearsals for the first performance are under way. The first of a series of such plays, will be presented in the near future at White's Theatre. A list of the plays and players will be made public at an early date.

Wanted, a Movie Plot.
And It Does Not Exist.
When Ford Earned \$100.
Stars—Rhinoeros Meat.

This is written in Los Angeles where pictures are made for America and all creation. Most encouraging is the fact that the entire world depends on this country for moving pictures and automobiles.

We make automobiles by the million and sell them for less than it costs Europe to manufacture them, despite our higher wages. Efficiency explains that.

But pictures can be made more cheaply abroad than here, yet foreign nations refuse their own cheaper product and demand American pictures. That also is easily explained. American producers work ceaselessly, with terrific energy and unlimited expenditure, to make pictures better. The best of this year is out of date next year.

There is only one explanation for any success, one mixture, ten per cent inspiration, ninety per cent perspiration, as Edison puts it.

Producers are looking for "the next step" in moving pictures, some way to make photography more effective, to crowd into an evening's use of the eyes and the brains more entertainment, instruction, emotion and excitement.

The picture excels the written word, in expressing thought and action, as our alphabet excels ancient hieroglyphics, but pictures, is still held down by the slow speed and action of written books and plays.

The first automobiles were made with dashboards, although there were no horses' hoofs to kick up mud. Men could not change at once to the new idea. They have not yet done so with motion photography, and pictures are still the old stories told in the same way. If you have the new idea you can change it for gold.

There are endless opportunities in moving pictures and everything else, more in this age than ever. Young gentlemen who wish they might have been here in the gold days are reminded by the Los Angeles Examiner that in 1901, sixty-two years after the gold rush, Henry Ford was working for \$100 a month. He is doing well now, making one hundred millions or so annually, and what is more important, paying good wages to 200,000 workmen, distributing three million cars a year.

One of the ablest and most earnest picture producers has been working for three years on a picture plan, and has not really started. He wants to make a picture with a meaning that would appeal to the whole world and be useful in every part of it, either by promoting peace, making war hateful, arousing interest in religion or in some other world-wide useful way. Could you outline such a picture?

If you got exactly the right plot for Portland, Maine, they would not know what it was all about in Tangier or Timbuktu. A religious revival suited to Dayton, Tenn., would not do for Rome or Oxford. A peace plan that would suit the Y. W. C. A. exactly would make Mussolini laugh and make Trotsky groan.

The world is interested only in things that the world has been doing for thousands of years, things that are part of every subconscious mind. Kill a criminal struck by lightning in a lethal chamber, or with an elephant's foot, and all the world will pay attention.

For one man or woman, deeply interested in the plan to harness tide power in the Bay of Fundy, there are 1000 more deeply interested in Miss Peggy Hopkins Joyce's announcement of what she calls "My little engagement," the same being a prelude to her fifth marriage.

King Solomon had many marriages, very informal. Catherine of Russia had dozens of "little engagements" that never came to anything. Our alleged half monkey ancestors were much interested in "little engagements," and that interest lingers. They never have ceased a tide or wanted to. Such (Continued on page 6)

LITTLE MINISTER TO BE FEATURE OF CHAUTAUQUA

Chautauqua President Assures Committee This Year's Program is Best Ever Presented Here

Chautauqua patrons in this section are to see Sir James M. Barrie's famous play "The Little Minister" this summer, according to an announcement by Dr. Paul M. Pearson, President of the Swarthmore Chautauqua Association, who visited here last night and attended a meeting of the local committee to lay plans for the Chautauqua for the coming summer.

"We have had an ambition to present this play in which Maude Adams starred," said Dr. Pearson, "and Sir James Barrie has finally granted us special permission to present it on this circuit. Fortunately, we have secured two stars of the first magnitude for the leading roles. Rut Nugent, who is now playing the lead on Broadway in 'The Troupers' is to be our 'Ladv Babbie' and Alan Buncie, the star of 'Laff That Off' another Broadway production, will play the 'Little Minister'."

"The Little Minister" was first played in the United States by Maude Adams and in England in 1897 by Winifred Emery and Cyril Maude. The popularity of the play needs no comment. In book form it was universally read a score of years ago, and as a drama it is sure to meet with a hearty welcome in the hearts of the Chautauqua circuit, most of which have never had the play presented in their own theatres.

Dr. Pearson assured the local committee that the play would be given here by a New York cast of professionals with adequate scenery, costumes and lighting effects.

Other outstanding events on the Chautauqua program are "Applesauce," modern comedy drama; Elsie Baker in an artist's recital; Dr. Toshi H. Ishi, "The Teddy Roosevelt of China"; and the old fiddlers' contest on the closing night. Chautauqua opens in this city this year on Tuesday June 29.

ORDERS SURVEY CONDITION OF WOMEN WORKERS

Governor McLean Assigns Work of Making Survey to Child Welfare Commission

Raleigh, Apr. 20.—(AP)—Governor McLean today ordered that a survey of working conditions of women in industry in the state be made. He assigned the work of making the survey to the Child Welfare Commission.

In making known his decision on the matter, Governor McLean asserted that he expected to ask the manufacturers and other business employing women to give co-operation to the commission in making the survey and he felt confident this would be given. He expressed the opinion it was not necessary to call upon a Federal agency as had been suggested to make the survey. He felt the state agencies were competent for the work and the commission had promised to handle the matter.

The survey is the outgrowth of the agitation which started when the University of North Carolina as a part of its research work, asked the textile manufacturers to allow them to make a survey of working condition of women in their mills. This request was refused by the manufacturers.

Following this various women's organizations of the state and the State Federation of Labor urged the Governor to order a survey either by State or Federal forces.

These requests were followed by conferences between the Governor and representatives of women's organizations at which the Governor held his decision in abeyance.

Chief of Police Lester Jones, captain of the local National Guard Unit, stated today that 55 of the 60 required members had been enlisted in the local unit. It is believed that the other five will soon be enlisted, after which the local unit will receive recognition from the Federal Government.

DIGNITARIES OF CHURCH CONTINUE BATTLE FOR DRYS

Dr. C. F. Wilson Says Board is Satisfied With Result of Prohibition and Thinks Politics Cleanest in History

Washington, Apr. 20.—(AP)—High dignitaries of the church carried the brunt of battle for the drys again today as they pressed forward to the close of their case for the Volstead Act.

William F. McDowell, presiding Bishop at Washington, of the Methodist Episcopal church, appeared as the first witness in a list of eight called before the Senate prohibition committee when it resumed its session this morning. Bishop McDowell is president of the Board of Temperance Prohibition and Public Morals of his church.

He read a prepared statement declaring against any weakening of the Volstead Act. In the course of his brief statement the Bishop declared the proposition to amend the dry statute had originated with bootleggers, booze dealers and booze consumers, who have steadily broken the law. When he concluded, Senator Reid, Democrat, of Wisconsin, the one wet on the committee, asked the witness whether he thought "any of those who have been here advocating a change in the law is a law violator?"

"I have not said that," said Bishop McDowell.

"What you say here has indicated that," returned Reid.

"I am not indicating anyone who has appeared here," said the Bishop. "What I have said about lawbreakers not being law violators is perfectly sound doctrine."

Dr. C. F. Wilson, general secretary of the Methodist Board of Temperance Prohibition and Public Morals, followed Bishop McDowell, but did not read all of a long paper he had prepared.

Senator Reid objected to the filing of the statement without opportunity for cross examination, but Dr. Wilson said he wanted to save time so the court let the statement into the record.

"We are well satisfied with the result of prohibition, all things considered," Dr. Wilson said. "We have broken the hold of the liquor traffic or nominating conventions, and we think we have today the cleanest politics in all history."

Elder C. F. Denny Dies in Wilson

Elder C. F. Denny, pastor of the Wilson Primitive Baptist Church and brother of Elder S. B. Denny, who preaches in this city, died Sunday evening at 8:49 o'clock, after an illness of some three months, from an affection of the heart.

Elder Denny was born in Surry County, the 14th of March, 1860. Early in life he joined the Primitive Baptist Church and was ordained to preach twenty years ago. He had served churches in Durham, Macon, Ga., Greensboro, Hartsville, and Wilson, where as a watchmaker, he earned his living and Sunday preached to his flock.

Elder Denny comes from a remarkable family of ministers and business men. His father is still living and is a Primitive Baptist minister at an advanced age. He leaves two brothers who are ministers and several of them are jewelers and watchmakers.

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon from the Primitive Baptist Church at 4 o'clock, with Elder C. B. Hall, of Hillsboro, and J. C. Hooks, of Fremont, officiating.

PRESIDENT SAYS SEEK HIGH BIDS MUSCLE SHOALS

Suggests That Commission Bargain With Bidders for Better Bids on Property

Washington, Apr. 20.—(AP)—President Coolidge suggested today to the Muscle Shoals Commission that it summon before it the bidders for the property and bargain with them for better bids.

In a conference with Senator Deneen and Representative James, Republican members of the commission, the President made it clear that he desired that the bidders be assured the production of fertilizer, the distribution of surplus power and the payments of an adequate fund to the Government for the power.

He proposed that the commission call the bidders before it and tell every one of the other's offers received by the commission for the property and determine if any of the bidders desire to make a new and better offer.

The President is desirous that if the bid is accepted by the commission it should not involve any additional expenditure on the part of the Government in the Muscle Shoals property.

Agreement for Funding French Debt is Reached

Paris, Apr. 20.—(AP)—It is intimated in Government circles that the principles of the agreement for funding France's war debt to the United States already have been agreed upon and as soon as the United States Senate has concluded discussions of the Italian debt question, the few remaining details will be disposed of rapidly. Official circles have the impression that a settlement will be reached within a few days. Finance Minister Peret is endeavoring to bring the negotiations with the Washington Government to a speedy conclusion. It is reported to be his intention to go to London for discussion of the British war debt as soon as the decks have been cleared at Washington.

Williams Will Know Fate Within a Few Weeks

San Diego, Apr. 20.—(AP)—Colonel A. S. Williams should know within two or three weeks whether he is to be dismissed from the Marine Corps, reduced in rank, or dropped to a lower file on the promotion list for being drunk at a dinner party he gave in honor of Colonel Smedley D. Butler.

NEW YORK VOTES REFERENDUM ON PROHIBITION

Bill for State Referendum on Prohibition Modification in the Hands of Governor Smith

Albany, N. Y., April 20.—(AP)—A bill for a state referendum on prohibition modification passed by the legislature was in the friendly hands of Governor Smith today. Prohibitionists threatened to refrain from voting on the matter if the governor signs the bill.

The Assembly last night passed the bill 87 to 62. It was passed by the Senate last week and became law if signed by the governor. Governor Smith is known to favor a referendum although he refrained from commenting on the bill while it was before the legislature.

Just before its passage the Rev. R. O. Miller, Superintendent of the New York Civic League, warned Republican leaders that its passage might cause the defeat of the Republican candidate next September.

Draw Ten Years Sentences For Highway Robbery

Charlotte, April 20.—(AP)—Sentences of ten years each were imposed by Judge Harding today in Superior Court on Jim Knott and Oscar Martin after they had submitted to highway robbery charges. Knott and Martin were charged with attacking and robbing an aged woman. The charge of an attack was continued until a later term of court after they had submitted to the robbery charge.

Six Arrested When Officers Raid a Negro Game

A raid by officers, Whitchard, Brewer and Fulford on Saturday night, resulted in the arrest of six negroes, the wounding of one negro and a general rough-house. The raid was made in the section south of the Norfolk Southern Railroad, which the negroes were engaged in a game of chance.

Upon entrance of the officers, the negroes became demoralized and a rough-house resulted. The lights were turned out, and a number of shots were fired. When things were cleared up, it was ascertained that one negro, who came here from South Carolina, had received a bullet wound. He was carried to Skinner & Spith's hospital, where an X-ray picture was taken. Upon being informed that the bullet would have to be removed, the negro, in the absence of the physician, who was in an adjoining room arranging for the operation, jumped thru the window and succeeded in making his get-away.

A check-up after the shooting showed that only one shot had been fired by the officers. It is not known whether this or some other shot wounded the negro.

Negroes Staged Free for All Fight Sunday Evening

On Sunday evening a crowd of Rocky Mount negroes visited a crowd of Greenville negroes, and retaliated for an alleged wrong, by staging a free-for-all fight on Fleming street. Several implements of warfare, such as pistols, knives, bricks and sticks were used most effectively, with the result that several participants from both towns were wounded.

In the midst of the battle, Chief of Police Jones arrived on the scene and succeeded in quelling the rebellion. The wounded were carried to the police station where they were given medical attention.

FOREIGN TRADE TO BEAR DOWN ON RUSS CREDIT

Economic Pressure Is Now Forcing Big Change in Ideas of Soviet Government

London, Apr. 26.—(INS)—Economic pressure is steadily forcing a change in the attitude of the Russian Soviet Government toward foreign capital and her private creditors, both American and British, according to the opinion of well-informed financial circles here.

Many of foreign companies against the Soviet for plant and equipment seized and diverted to the uses of the Government by the Communists will continue to exercise an important influence on the policy of other countries toward Russia so long as compensation is not forthcoming, but it is now seen Russia's creditors since they can virtually control the outside financial assistance which the Moscow Government requires, are being placed in a position where they can compel their demands to be given more serious consideration than in the past.

Among British business leaders who believe that a change is afoot, shortly in Russian policy is Leslie Urquhart, the oil operator, who is one of the largest claimants against the Soviet for property confiscated in the Revolution. Urquhart sizes up the situation thus:

"Under present economic conditions in Russia, the Soviet Government is finding itself in a very tight circle. Its only source for the necessary development of industry is its exports, of which preponderance must be given to agricultural products, but to be able to get possession of these products the Government must supply to the agricultural population the desired manufactured goods, of industrial enterprise, by the import of the needed equipment from abroad.

"The only possible way to break this vicious circle is to obtain the necessary funds for paying for the goods coming from foreign countries in these countries themselves."

It is Urquhart's opinion that the anticipated change in the Soviet attitude would have taken place earlier had not adventurous business men in foreign countries under took to deal individually with Russia.

BANNING TOBACCO, ROUGE, AND PAINT, TIBETAN WOMEN USE BLACK

London, April 26.—(INS)—The Tibetan women do not smoke. They use neither powder or rouge, but cover their face with a black pigment to protect the skin from wind and sun, according to Chen Lha-Mo, a Tibetan woman, in a book just published here.

"The average European," says Lha-Mo, "is not good-looking, according to our ideas. We consider their noses too big, their ears too large, and the eyes and eye-sockets too deep, like Simians."

"She discloses the fact that old mounds do not exist in Tibet, because there are no women who go through life unmarried in that country."

Thirteen Carloads Hogs Shipped to Richmond Market

New Bern, Apr. 26.—(AP)—The first trainload of hogs ever to be shipped out of North Carolina co-operatively, was sent from New Bern to the Richmond market recently.

There were 13 carloads of them. They were raised and fattened by farmers in Craven and Pamlico counties.

Eleven of the cars contained 877 hogs, all of which were raised by 32 Craven county farmers. The hogs averaged 180 pounds, and were estimated by County Agent C. B. Farris, as having brought in to the farmers co-operating, nearly \$19,000.

The greater part of the hogs were raised in the county. Mr. Farris stated, only one and one-half carloads, having been brought in from outside points for fattening. He believes that fully 85 per cent were fed according to the methods outlined by the swine extension office at State College.

The animals were put on feed during January and February, to be sold on the early April markets. Some of the hogs gained an average of two pounds a day, according to the county agent.

DOCTOR'S WHISKERS UNDER SANITARY BAND; ARE GERM DISPENSERS

Chicago, April 26.—(INS)—Beards are no longer the professional mark of a physician, according to Madame Berther, "for beards were the professional badge of the physician, and moreover, they lent an impressive and experienced air."

"But times have changed since father was a boy. One seldom sees a bearded physician today, for the science of sanitation has banned the beard as a germ dispenser. The modern physician is as free from beard as the bond salesman, the lawyer, or the plumber."

MYSTERY FISHING SHIP BEING BUILT AT HULL

London, April 26.—(INS)—A mystery fishing ship which, it is claimed, will revolutionize the fishing industry, is now being built at Hull, England.

Sixty per cent of persons committed to the metropolitan workhouse during the past year were drug addicts, according to a report made public by Scherz. In an effort to be cured of the drug habit, 320 persons were committed to the workhouse at their own request, the report revealed.

The cost of treating 901 cases was \$270,300.

DAVEY CROCKETT'S FAMOUS RIFLE NOW IS PROPERTY OF FEMALE DESCENDANT

Little Rock, Ark., April 26.—(INS)—Davey Crockett's old hunting rifle, handed down from oldest son to oldest son for three generations, is now for the first time in the hands of a female descendant, Miss Beth Crockett, of Little Rock, and two states—Tennessee and Arkansas—are seeking this relic of the frontier days.

Mr. Loftis has had extensive correspondence with officers of each group recently and announces that he has about completed the first details of the meeting.

The idea of holding a joint convention of the association has been under discussion for some time, it was added.

Master Model Stone Mountain Memorial Accepted

Atlanta, Apr. 20.—(AP)—The master model for the central group in the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial was presented to the board of directors of the Memorial Association today by Augustus Lukeman, the sculptor. Plans were made to let contracts for the reproduction.

The model, in a general way, is an enlargement of the sketch model submitted and approved several months ago and contains the figures of Jefferson Davis, Robert E. Lee, and Stonewall Jackson. In accepting the master model, the directors adopted recommendations by Mr. Lukeman that the work be executed on the mountain by contract under his supervision. The executive committee was instructed to advertise for bids.

Rescuers Hear Three Taps From Entombed Men

Quincy, Cal., Apr. 20.—(AP)—Three distinct taps were heard today by the rescuers, who are digging away the cave-in that entombed six miners, late Saturday night in the Grizzly Creek tunnel near here. The rescue squad had twelve feet of rock and dirt to remove. It reached the place in an area where the miners were working.

The rescue crews are proceeding carefully because of the possibility of finding some of the victims in the twelve feet that remain to be pierced. Due to these precautions and the necessity of timbering against more slides it probably will be late today they reach the Chamber in which the men are trapped.

Britain Staging So Much Golf That Big Dates Clash

London, Apr. 20.—(INS)—So extensive, and so intensive is the competitive golf to be played in Britain this summer that it has been found impossible to prevent some of the big events from clashing.

Championships, matches and big tournaments follow in swift succession, and the season looks like providing one whirl of excitement after another—and great golf.

The American professionals are due here in time to take part in the Northern championships at Forbury, but in any case they will take part in the novel tournament to be held at Wentworth and Weybridge. After a three-day interval will come the championships and after that, Gleneagles.

The most interesting fixture of all—the match between Abe Mitchell and an American, still remains to be arranged. But all hope that it can be fixed.

Fight to Save Migratory Birds; Many States Rally

Washington, Apr. 20.—(INS)—The Department of Agriculture and one of its principal bureaus, the Biological Survey, are shortly to be held in the spotlight in the fight over the Copeland-Merritt Bill in Congress, which would still further reduce the bag limit of a single day's shooting of wild ducks, geese, brant and other migratory game birds.

Hearings on this measure are to be held in the near future. In the Senate it is Senate Bill 3580 and its sponsor is Senator Royal S. Copeland of New York, while a House Bill 10,433 the same proposed act was introduced in the House of Representatives by Representative Schuyler Merritt of Connecticut.

The Copeland-Merritt Bill cuts the present federal daily bag limit (during the open season, of course), on wild ducks from twenty-five birds to fifteen, on

"A certain amount of shaping is permissible in the new eyebrow styles. Wild scattered hairs, which are a disenchanted feature, are taboo."

"Eyebrows are a decorative detail of the human face. For a woman to lose them completely would be a calamity. They give expression. They indicate emotions. A slight movement of the eyebrows may convey ideas better than words."

GERMAN WOMEN DROP STUDIES TO GO TO WORK

Berlin, Apr. 20.—(INS)—German women leaders are gravely concerned about the steadily decreasing number of women students. As a result of the present economic plight the rising generation of intellectual women takes little interest in women problems, politics or international co-operation of women.

This is due to the fact that the average woman student is compelled to finish her studies as quickly as possible, in order to make a living.

SLEEPING SICKNESS CURE BY ULTRA VIOLET RAYS IS CLAIM OF BRITISH CLINIC

Nottingham, Eng., Apr. 20.—(INS)—That the dreaded disease known as sleeping sickness, which is on the decided upgrade in Britain—can be definitely cured by the employment of ultra violet rays, has been established by the Nottingham Sun-Ray Clinic.

Several pronounced cases have

been treated. Two of the victims were practically paralyzed. They could not speak, stand or walk.

After a week's sun-ray treatment, they are regaining muscular power, the power of speech, and ability to look after themselves. They are able to do light work, and are well on the way to becoming normal citizens.

Success is also claimed in the treatment of phthisis. One man has been cured in the early stages after only nine exposures to the rays.

A woman has been cured of tubercular pyngitis, after losing her voice for six months, after eight treatments.

The clinic is, entirely free, having been presented to the city by Julien Cahn, a local philanthropist, for the use of poor people only.

FRANKFURT-AMERICA WEEK CELEBRATED IN GERMANY

Frankfurt, April 20.—(INS)—"Frankfurt-America" will be the name of an exhibition to be held here in the Municipal Historical Museum this year at a date to be fixed later. It is chiefly meant to represent the various relations between the city of Frankfurt and the United States during the past centuries.

The exhibition will contain an interesting collection of privately owned documents, letters, pictures, and other pieces of art, as well as the collection of the Museum itself.

Among other historical documents there will be shown the address forwarded by the United States citizens to the Frankfurt National Assembly in 1818, seven years after the American War.

One section of the exhibition will deal with the relations between Frankfurt and Wall Street. There will be a festival week during which Wagner's "Siegfried" will be performed.

FRENCH INVESTORS ARE FLEEDED IN NEW SCHEMES

Paris, Apr. 20.—(INS)—Swiss and Dutch Ponzi have been fleecing French investors so regularly with their "snow ball schemes" that the Ministry of Finances have published against all such operations.

"All such schemes are a national danger insofar as they drain the national currency for the profit of a few foreign unscrupulous speculators."

The financial circular also reminds French investors that they can be prosecuted for violating one of the most stringent emergency measures, which punishes drastically all exportation of capital.

ENGLISH TENNIS PLAYERS PREACH PREPAREDNESS

London, Apr. 20.—(INS)—The English Lawn Tennis Association is the latest organization to be converted to the "gospel of preparedness" so long wanting in British sports.

The men and women competing in international tournaments will not be chosen haphazard this year, as hitherto. Instead trial matches will be held for men at Wimbledon in April, and for women in May. The successful contestants will furnish the teams.

A cable communication has been received from the U. S. A. Lawn Tennis Association, approving of the date, June 17 and 18 for the Wightman Cup—American versus British women—at Wimbledon.

The Council of the British Association has instructed its delegates at the meeting of the international Lawn Tennis Federation to support any resolution excluding lawn tennis from the program of the Olympic Games.

the United States is each
year getting on a firmer
foundation and becoming
more and more useful to its
home community.

It is the home newspaper
which boosts the town, year
in and year out, which takes
the lead in every enter-
prise which has for its pur-
pose the upbuilding of the
community.

We frequently hear it
said that the old-time inde-
pendent spirit of the news-
paper is gone, that its edi-
torial policy is now subserv-
ient to the business office.
Yet this is not true. There
is more unselfish idealism
in the average local news-
paper than in any other
business enterprise. It fre-
quently speaks out in the
way which it believes will
be for the good of the na-
tion and of the community.
regardless of what the con-
sequences may be from a
business standpoint.
The local newspaper is

the principal booster for the
community, and it does its
boosting often without hope
of material reward. Un-
fortunate is the community
which neither appreciates
nor supports its local news-
paper.—Wisconsin State Jour-
nal.

Farms in State
Increase in Five
Years 13,719

Raleigh, Apr. 20.—(AP)—
With the number of farms in
North Carolina increasing in five
years 13,719, the number of
farms operated by tenants in-
creased 10,795, in other words,
more than three-fourths of the
new farms are operated by ten-
ants. The percentage of farms
operated by tenants increased
from 43.5 to 45.2, an increase
of 1.7 per cent.

This is shown by a prelimi-
nary announcement made by the
census bureau of the Department
of Commerce of the 1925 farm
census. The announcement, just
received here, was released for
publication today.

In 1920 there were 269,763
farms in North Carolina, as com-
pared with 283,482 in 1925. The
number of farms increased from
151,576 in 1920 to 154,805 in
1925; the number of managers
increased from 928 to 423; and
the number of tenants grew from
117,459 to 128,254.

For the country at large, the
number of farms decreased from
3,448,343 to 3,371,017. The
percentage of farms, for the
country at large, operated by
tenants was less than the per-
centage in North Carolina. For
1925 the percentage in the Unit-
ed States was 38.6 per cent, as
compared with 45.2 in North
Carolina.

Lyceum, as does Lady Constance
Childie Pemberton who practices
one to two hours daily.

Chronometer Clocks
Speed of Baseball
Being Thrown

New York, Apr. 19.—(AP)—
Speed, always a factor in major
league baseball, this year has
been put to new tests in the
training camps through introduc-
tion of a chronometer to time
the flight of the thrown ball.
It was found that six-tenths of
a second were required by catch-
ers to throw to second base, while
the same time was consumed to
shoot the sphere from first to
third bases. Shortstops took
five-tenths of a second to throw
to first base and second basemen
required four-tenths to send the
ball to the same bag.

The flight of a fast ball from
the pitching slab to the catcher
was three-tenths of a second.

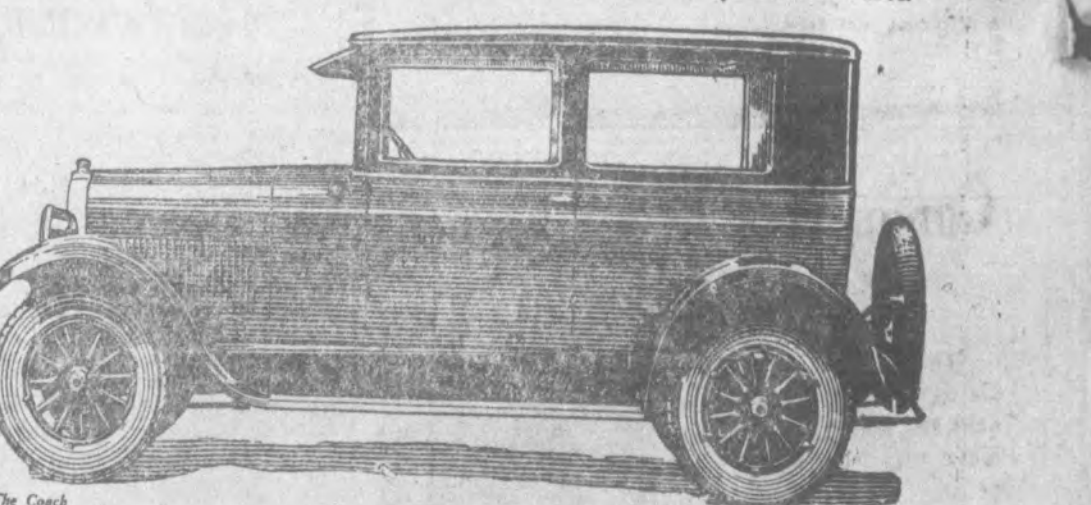
