

World Credit by Foreign Business Fails to Check U. S. Commerce

Washington, Apr. 22.—(INS)—Unnatural efforts of foreign competitors for world trade in extending unusual credit terms should not be accepted as a model for American imitation, according to the Department of Commerce.

In a review of the world credit situation and the attempts of foreign business houses to undermine American business in important markets, the department had the following to say:

"And oft-repeated criticism of American export technique is that it does not make provision for a more liberal credit policy."

"If by this is meant that American exporters do not extend

credit on a sweeping and indiscriminate scale the charge may be allowed to stand.

"Such a course would be a barren of results and disastrous in effect as that of a bank in granting all of the applications for loans that are made to it. Credit is an instrument of trade and has a value; that value must be figured in the transaction as carefully as the freight bill.

"Moreover, it is a privilege to be extended to those who deserve it, and not a right to be demanded by all."

NOTICE OF ELECTION

The Private Laws of the General Assembly of North Carolina Session 1921, as amended by resolution 1925, require that an election for the selection of one member of the board of alder-

men of the Town of Greenville be held on the first Monday, the 3rd day of May, 1926; that the books for the registration of voters who are not already registered for municipal elections or who have transferred from one ward to another, since the last election, shall be kept open for 20 days exclusive of Sunday preceding the first Monday in May; and that all candidates for alder-

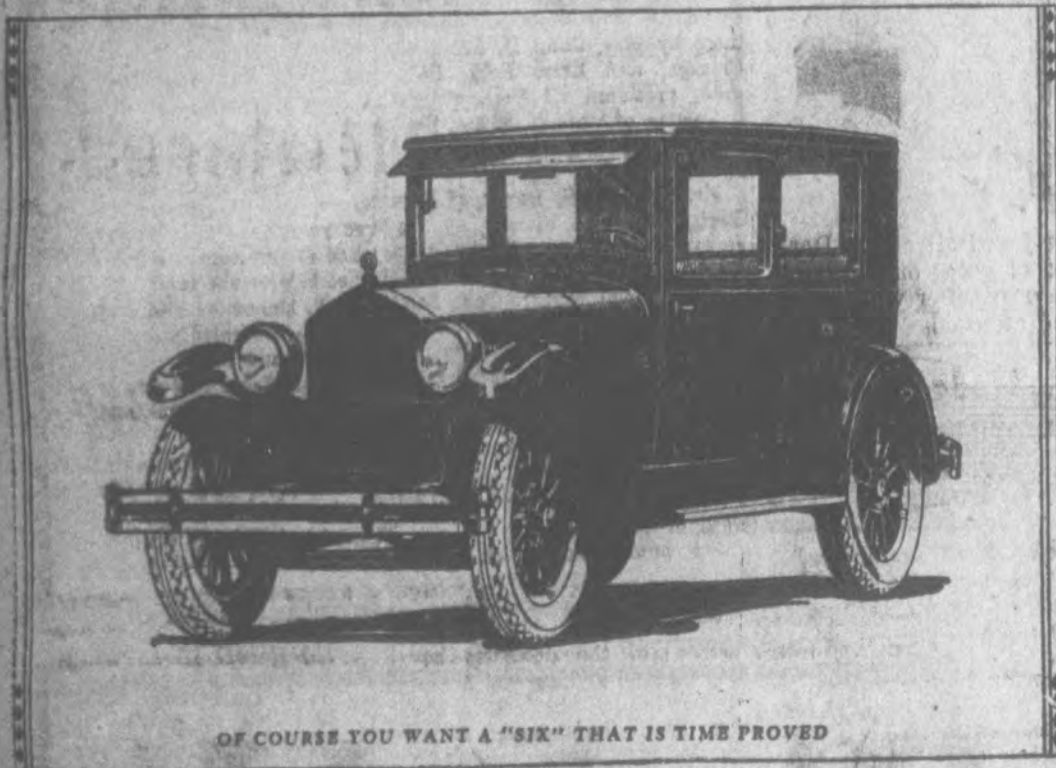

At a meeting of the Board of Aldermen held on the 4th day of March, 1926, the foregoing notice of the election was ordered published and Mrs. H. S. Register appointed registrar, to open the books for registration on April 17th, and to keep open said books for a period of 20 days exclusive of Sunday, at the county court house in the Town of Greenville, for the registration of those citizens not already registered who desire to register and vote in said election.

OUR TOWN

"Our Town"—how much
or how little does it mean
to you?

Some men have nothing
but ridicule and criticism
for the home town. Some
have nothing but flattery.
Some ignore the town and
think only of themselves.
What attitude ought one to
take?

Since the town is really
an enlarged family, why
not act toward it as one does
toward the family?

A sensible person recog-
nizes family faults, but he
does not advertise them.
When one tells others of
personal weaknesses or of
family shortcomings these
failures are likely to be re-
membered even after they
have disappeared, and they
are all too readily recalled
when we wish that others
would forget them as we
have. One should tell fam-
ily faults to the family and
not to outsiders.

Some citizens court public
favor by flattery. It is a
cheap and easy way to make
a triumphal entry into the
mind of the superficial ego-
ist. Knowing that personal
conceit will not meet with
popular approval we satis-
fy the human love of ap-
probation by encouraging
it as a group. So towns and
nations often boast and
flaunt themselves in a way
that they as individuals
would not dare do.

The helpful citizen takes
an attitude toward his town
similar to that taken by a
doctor toward his patients,
a teacher toward his pupils,
an adult member of the
family toward the family.

Our town is not perfect.
We have no miniature
Heaven on earth just yet.
But it is our business to make
our town as nearly perfect
as we know how.

To work intelligently for
town progress one must
have a goal, an ideal. He
must take stock of present
assets and liabilities and
must set standards for fu-
ture growth.

Hence, even though there
is an easy comfort in living
in happy indifference to
town needs, and even though
one may provoke a laugh
by ridicule, or win favor by
flattery, the desirable citi-
zen is the one who sees

facts, and the one who, in
love and hope and faith,
builds for the future.

A dozen citizens can build
a worthy town. Are you
one of the dozen?

**FOREST FIRE MENACE
EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS**

Congress is asked addi-
tion appropriations for fight-
ing forest fires in the West,
during 1926. The light
precipitation of winter in-
dicates a dry and fire-har-
ried summer. The nation
faces a real menace that
must be met with, whatever
expenditure it calls for; or
else the whole idea of fed-
eral conservation falls to the
ground.

But federal and state ap-
propriations will not release
any private citizen from the
obligation to do his personal
best to eliminate fires. Max-
imum penalties will un-
doubtedly be imposed for
every detected violation;
personal cooperation with
intent of the law will be far
more effective in preventing
forest fires, than the most
harsh punishment. It is
everybody's business to
stamp out the fire peril in
this year.

**LOW TAXES INCREASE
BUSINESS**

Income tax collections on
March 15, exceeded by \$60,
000,000 the total for the
same date in 1925, and by
\$100,000,000 the estimates
of the Treasury Department.
This fact may be construed
by those members of Con-
gress, who voted larger re-
ductions than Secretary
Mellon recommended, as
proving that he was too
grudging of relief to the
taxpayers, but it may with
at least equal justice be con-
strued as vindicating his
judgment that low tax rates
are more productive than
higher ones to a larger de-
gree, than he—with the
conservatism which his re-
sponsibility dictates—ven-
tured to forecast.

States and cities which
follow the example of the
Federal Government in low-
ering local tax burdens, will
oustrip their neighbors in
building up payrolls, secur-
ing new investments of cap-
ital and in agricultural de-
velopment. You can't con-
fiscate a man's earnings or
capital by taxation, and still
have him spend money on
constructive undertakings.

The "mikes" are connected to a universal loud speaker circuit, so that orders and responses of each of the ten switch-towers, the train dispatcher, and the tele-master are audible to all twelve.

A dispatcher announces into his microphone, "four cars for track 43 coming." The regular brakeman of the train lifts the drawbar as the four cars cross the "hump" and the switch-towerman controlling track 43 replies "Let the four cars come," as he throws the switch.

The cars roll slowly over an automatic scale which records their weights on a tape, and then down the "hump" to track 42. Automatic brakes along the track at short intervals grip the wheels so that no brakeman is needed to slow up the cars.

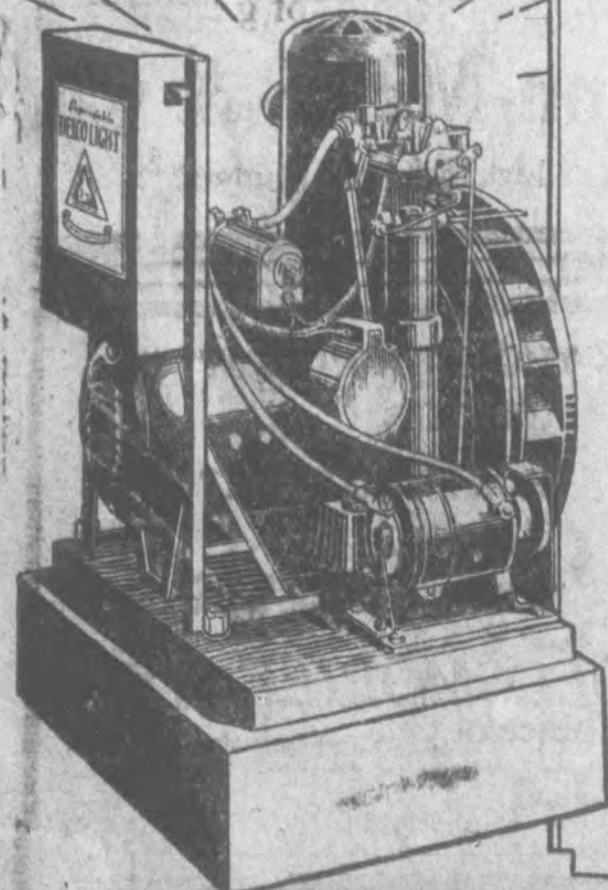

Majority Divorces Remarry, Report
Pitt County Statistics Compare Favorably With Those of Nation and State.
REBEKAH FIRST BRIDE TO WEAR RING
The ration of divorces to marriages in Pitt county in 1924 was approximately one to ten, which compares favorably with the marriage and divorce figures of the nation as a whole. In the United States in 1924 there were seven marriages to each divorce and in North Carolina the ratio was 15.5 to 1.
In Pitt county in 1924 there were actually 599 marriages and 61 divorces, as compared to 471 marriages and 46 divorces in the preceding year. In the entire country, there were 1,178,206 marriages, or about 45,718 less than in 1923. In North Carolina there were 23,190 marriages in 1924 with 1,461 divorces and in the preceding years 24,028 marriages with 1,054 divorces. These figures, available from the government in Washington, were given out by the Traub Manufacturing Company, of Detroit—maker of Genuine Orange Blossom wedding and engagement ring. W. L. Best represents the Traub people in Greenville.
It is the opinion of this firm that probably 90 per cent of divorces remarry. This would seem to indicate that those whom the first marital knot does not tie, still hope for wedded bliss.
June is still the most popular month for weddings, though it now holds a place far less secure than in former years. March is the least popular month of all. The figures for the various months are as follows: January, 7.8 per cent; February, 6.5 per cent; March, 5.8 per cent; April, 7.5 per cent; May, 7.6 per cent; July, 7.8 per cent; August, 8.7 per cent; September, 9.6 per cent; October, 9.1 per cent; November, 9.4 per cent; December, 8.2 per cent; and June 12 per cent.
Dating far back, the third finger of the left hand has always been the finger on which the wedding ring has been placed. The ancient Greek, believed that a vein ran directly from this finger to the heart—the seat of affections, thereby promoting a closer bond between the two. This tradition has come down through the centuries though the average bride rarely reflects on why it is she wears her wedding ring on this particular finger.
Those who have delved into wedding ring lore state that Rebekah undoubtedly, was the first bride to wear a wedding ring. They quote from Genesis to the effect that Isaac was the first man to give a bride a wedding circlet to wear on the day of her nuptials.
