MARY G. FLANAGAN

One of Greenville's Most Beloved Citizens Succumbs to Infirmities of Old Age; Interment in Cherry Hill Cemetery

Mrs. Mary Gaskill Flanagan, one of Greenville's oldest and most beloved citizens, died at her home on Greene street Saturday afternoon from infirmities of age and a short illness. Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 4 o'clock, from the Memorial Baptist church, by her pastor, Rev. H. Frederick Jones, assisted by Rev. James E. W. Cook, of the St. Paul's Episcopal church, and Rev. W. S. Harden, of the Presbyterian church. Interment followed in the Cherry Hill Cemetery.

Mrs. Flanagan was born in Beaufort county, August 24, 1841, a daughter of the late Captain and Mrs. John S. Gaskill. When about nine years of age, she accompanied her mother to a Philadelphia hospital and while there her father's ship went down at sea and her, with the entire crew were lost. The sinking of the ship was one of the mysteries of the sea, as nothing was ever found that could throw any light on the tragedy.

Following her father's death, she and her mother returned to Washington, N. C., where, on December 5, 1855, she was married to Mr. John Flanagan, member of that city, but who in 1866 moved to Greenville and was the founder of the John Flanagan Buggy Company. He preceded her to the grave by twenty-four years.

Mrs. Flanagan possessed a heart of friend and to know her was to love her. Always cheerful, always happy, one was made to feel better after having known and talked with her. She lived a Christian's life and as long as health permitted was always going about doing good. Possessing a charming personality, a lovely Christian character and a wonderful disposition, she was beloved by people in all walks of life. As a mother, she was perfect and the bonds of love that existed between her and her children were beautiful and sacred. As a friend she was staunch and true, always thinking of something that would make those less fortunate than she, happy. In early childhood she became a Christian and after moving to Greenville affiliated herself with the Memorial Baptist Church and was one of its oldest and most devoted members. She loved her Master with all her heart, and was always happy when talking of His wonderful love for His children.

Her advice was sought by all who knew her, and even at the age of 84, her mind was as clear and bright as ever.

Time was good to her and she lived to see five generations of her family. Only a few years ago her health began to fail and each passing year left her weaker physically, but stronger spiritually. Her unselfish disposition, her devotion to her friends and family and her interest in her community won a niche in the hearts of people which no one else can fill.

She was ready and prepared to go when the final summons came. She will be greatly missed and her passing has caused great sorrow throughout the community.

The funeral was largely attended and the floral tribute was one of the largest and most beautiful ever seen in this city.

The deceased is survived by four daughters, Mesdames Florence Dancy, E. H. Shelburn, J. F. Davenport, Dot Patrick; two sons, Messrs. R. C. and E. G. Flanagan, all of this city. In addition to her children she is survived by twenty-two grandchildren, ten great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

DECIDES FRANCE
MUST REVISE ITS
FUNDING PLAN

One of the Principal Hitches is How Much France Shall Pay at the Outset, As Commission Desires Higher Payment Than \$25,000,000 Annually

Washington, Apr. 26.—(AP)—France must revise its new offer for settlement of its war debt to this country, the American Debt Commission decided today. The decision was reached at the second meeting of the Commission to study the proposal put forward last week by France's Ambassador Berenger. Secretary Mellon will confer with the Ambassador before negotiations are resumed. Although France will be asked to modify its offer it was emphasized today by the Commission that the latest discussions have not been terminated.

One of the principal hitches is how much France shall pay at the outset, Mr. Berenger proposed initial payments of \$25,000,000 annually but the American Commission is understood to desire higher payments. The Commission hopes to work out an agreement on a trade basis without formally submitting a counter proposal pending submission by the French Ambassador of the new offer.

The negotiations do not depend on the controversial safety clause which will relieve France in its debt responsibilities in the event of Germany to meet her reparations payments. The Commission has expressed itself as firmly against this and Ambassador Berenger is not expected to insist on such a guarantee.

Negroes Liable
to "Fairy Story" and
Are Flimflammed

Wilmington, April 26.—(AP)—200 negroes of Wilmington had returned to their homes today after a short railroad journey—sadder but wiser men. Yesterday they set forth by Seaboard Air Line for Cleveland where they had been promised jobs, paying one dollar an hour and with their transportation to the Ohio city furnished for three dollars.

At Navassa, just across the river from Wilmington, they were put off the train when it was discovered the tickets they held purported to be transportation to Cleveland, were counterfeit. They had been flimflammed by one of their own race. Saturday a negro distributed hand bills picturing in glowing terms the advantages of the dollar an hour position which he could give to negroes in Cleveland and calling them together to tell his proposition later in the day.

The result was a large crowd of negroes heard the negro tell of the opportunities and he sold spurious tickets from Navassa to Cleveland. He explained to the negroes they would have to purchase tickets for a few cents to Navassa but from that point the tickets he distributed could be used. This was necessary, he said, in order that he might not get arrested for violating the North Carolina laws against labor agents.

200 negroes swallowed the bait and paid the man \$3.00 each for the tickets, bought tickets for Navassa yesterday and took the Seaboard train for Cleveland. At Navassa it was discovered they had been victimized and they returned to Wilmington later in the day.

The flimflammer has not been captured.

If the Ants Prayed.
Henry Ford Says.
Billions of New Wealth.
To Reduce the Ocean's Size.

Mr. Sinclair Lewis, assuming that the universe "sort of runs itself," says there isn't any God. To prove it, at a public meeting the earnest gentleman denied God to strike him dead "in the next ten minutes." He wasn't struck dead and believes he has proved that there isn't any God.

It was suggested that ants living along the railroad tracks probably do not believe there is any W. B. Storey, Santa Fe President, who runs the whole railroad. If one ant asked the mythical W. B. Storey "to strike him dead" and nothing happened, that ant would believe that the Santa Fe ran itself.

But W. H. Kindig, of Los Angeles, objecting to that simple wriggle, "You reference to W. B. Storey who runs the railroad, and the ant on the track is good. But for the purpose of seeing the question from all angles, you should also have shown the futility of the ant offering up prayers to Mr. Storey for some special attention."

"How silly it would be for the ant to offer up such a prayer, asking that a few extra crumbs be thrown from the dining car on to his particular table!"

"Perhaps that isn't as convincing as it sounds. Mr. Storey is one would not hear the ant's prayer, but he would hear from the most humble truck walker. And if the truck walker's plea was just, it would get attention."

In any case it couldn't hurt the ant if it did pray and was not heard. Praying would make the ant feel better. It might comfort her when one of her little ants died or got stopped on, and when crumbs did fall from the dining car it would make her feel grateful.

Millions that wouldn't pretend to run a railroad, or build a bridge, have no difficulty in proving that nothing at all, no directing intelligence, no benevolence is required to run this universe with its many suns, planets, railroads and bridges.

"The past is only something to learn from," says Henry Ford, and says a great deal.

To learn from the past, escape from its limitations and do what it never did—that is the modern program.

Ford also says, and helps the United States in saying it, "You can't meet competition by lowering wages. Cutting wages does not reduce costs—it increases them."

Ford proves it. To a man from whom he was buying automobile bodies said, "You must cut your price in two." The man said it was impossible, but he did it.

And while he was cutting his price he had to raise wages, for better men were needed to do the work on a high production basis.

Ford's talk will not please employers generally, but it will help them, making them richer. All that the big man can ever get is part of what the little man earns. The more the little man earns the more the big man gets.

The problem of the age is to make machines and methods more efficient, thus increasing the value of human beings. Ford has done it, grinding down machines, instead of men, and for that reason he is one of the really great men in the history of this country, and in the history of industry for all time.

STATE SUFFERED
HEAVY FIRE LOSS
DURING MARCH

Losses of Approximately \$175,000 Occurred, With 3 Fires in State Property Reported

Raleigh, Apr. 26.—(AP)—Although the fire at the State Hospital for the Insane at Raleigh, with a loss estimated at approximately half a million dollars, overshadowed the earlier fires, the State suffered heavy fire losses in March, it is shown by the March fire loss report of the State Insurance Department, made public today.

Losses to the State of approximately \$175,000 occurred in March, three fire in State property having been reported. They were the loss of a building at the North Carolina College for Women, with a loss of \$89,000; destruction of a building and the negro A. and T. College at Greensboro, \$49,419; and the burning of State property at Samarrand, with a loss of \$34,000.

The State Hospital fire, which occurred on April 10, is, of course, not included in this report, which is for the month of March.

March showed a decrease, both in the number of fire and in the property loss, over March of 1925. Statistics compiled in the Department by Statistician Andrew Joyner, show. Two hundred and fifty fires were reported in the State last month, as contrasted with 267 in March of 1925; the loss last month is placed at \$830,000 while that of the same month a year ago was \$648,279, or more than \$100,000 greater.

Two hundred and three of the fires occurred in towns, with a loss of \$361,621, the remaining 47 fire being in the rural sections and destroying property valued at \$469,369.

There was an unusually large number of fires doing damage of \$5,000 or over—28. Of this number, 14 were in the over \$10,000 loss class. Two hundred twenty-two of the fires did damage, each of less than \$5,000 the average for the 22 being \$435.

The biggest single loss was a lumber plant in Swain county, where fire did damage estimated at \$115,000.

There were 190 dwellings damaged or destroyed in 167 dwelling fires, with a total loss of \$205,177, as compared with a loss of \$122,069 in 133 dwelling fires in March 1925. Of the dwellings, 139 were in towns, with a loss of \$121,668, and 28 were rural with a loss of \$83,509.

Among the dwellings destroyed, said Commissioners Stacey W. Wade, were three notable old colonial homes in Columbia, Chowan, and Halifax counties. The combined money loss was placed by Mr. Wade at \$40,000 while the Annals of the historic and sentimental loss is incalculable.

Local Fishermen
Catch 118 Pounder

The theory that fishing in Tar River at this point is a thing of the past was exploded yesterday when it was found that during Saturday night a sturgeon, weighing 118 pounds, had been caught in the trap operated at the railroad bridge by J. P. Moss and Ed. Moye, of this city.

The trap is of the revolving type and the weight of the fish was so great that the force of the current was not enough to lift the trap from the water, but brought it to a level that made it impossible for the fish to escape. The trap was securely tied in this position and left until yesterday morning at which time the fish had played itself out to such an extent that removal from the trap was no great undertaking.

The fish was brought uptown and placed on the Norfolk Southern freight platform where during the day hundreds of persons went to "take a look" at the "big fish." The fish measured six feet seven inches in length and weighed 118 pounds. The fishermen are today enjoying sturgeon steak.

A NEEDED EXTENSION

Local business men will make an effort to get the State Highway Number Eleven extended into the territory north of Bethel. At present highway eleven ends at Bethel and the hard surfaced highways out of that place run east and west leaving the territory north of Bethel almost entirely cut off during certain seasons of the year when the present roads in that territory are, practically impassable. The extension of highway eleven to Scotland Neck would afford the inhabitants of the territory much quicker and more comfortable access to all points in the eastern section and would be the means of bringing much of the interstate traffic through this section. It is up to the business men of Eastern Carolina to combine their efforts to get this needed improvement put through by the State Highway Commission.

TIME TO PLAY

Again the season of the year has arrived when plans for the summer are being laid and in the plans of everyone is a hope that there will be some time during the hot summer months that he or she might devote to recreation. Last summer, for the first time in the history of Greenville business houses, the merchants followed the lead of the merchants of our neighboring cities and observed half holiday Wednesday of each week during the summer months. With few exceptions, both merchants and employees were well pleased with the arrangement as carried out last summer and it is believed that the businesses profited more by the increased efforts of their employees than was lost during the closed hours, yet apparently there has developed some opposition to the repetition of the program this summer and a meeting of the merchants for the purpose of deciding upon the plans for the coming summer has been called for next Thursday morning

at 10 o'clock.

As stated by Mr. Frank Stockdale in one of his lectures at the recent business institute held here, the half holiday or off-hours proposition is one that is entirely up to the individual merchant but it is to be hoped that for the sake of the employees and in the interest of better business, the merchants will see fit to decide on a definite plan to allot certain hours during the summer months for recreation.

IN THE OLD NORTH STATE

Appearing in Saturday's issue of the New York Sun was a twenty-two page section devoted to North Carolina, which set forth the rapid progress that is being made by this state and the wonderful opportunities that North Carolina has to offer to the home seeker and investor. In commenting editorially upon North Carolina, the Sun says:

But perhaps they are nearer correct who go behind figures and statistics and point to courageous men who lifted themselves up by their own boot straps and pulled their State with them—men who worked out their own destinies and in doing so led their people out of the depths by teaching them the value of hard work and by inspiring them to success."

"Duke and Reynolds, with a few mules and a few pounds of tobacco, laid the foundations of a great industry. Others of their stamp set up the small mills in the cotton fields, and today New England must look to her laurels as the textile leader of the country. Governors like Aycock and Morrison dotted the State with schoolhouses and lined it with modern highways. Another of the Dukes harnessed the streams from the mountains to move the wheels of the tobacco and cotton factories."

"Yes, North Carolina has reason to be proud of her accomplishments, and even more so because she has played the hand alone and achieved her goal by the vision and toil of her own sons."

France Will Begin Pay War Debt Great Britain This Year

London, April 26.—(AP)—France will begin to pay her war debt to Great Britain during the present British fiscal year.

This was one outstanding announcement made by Chancellor of the Exchequer Churchill today in presenting the Budget to the House of Commons. France's total payment will be 4,000,000 pounds.

Mr. Churchill stated that he had received from Finance Minister Poincaré assurances that, without prejudice, France would be ready to

judge to the forthcoming negotiations, France undertook to make an unconditional minimum payment of this sum.

This figure includes nearly 10,000,000 pounds for new expenditures including cruisers, empire marketing and other necessary expenses. The war debt owed on March 31 he reported was 7,616,000,000 pounds. The floating debt was reduced by nearly 38,000,000 pounds during the past year.

Majority Muscles Shoals Commission Approves Bids

Washington, April 26.—(AP)—A majority of the Muscle Shoals Commission today approved the bids of the Associated Power Companies for the property.

Two members of the commission, Senator Heffland, Democrat of Alabama, and Representative James, Republican of Michigan, refused to endorse the majority recommendations. Senator Heffland favors the proposal of the American Cyanamid Company and Representative James is opposed to both proposals. Representative James will file a minority report while Senator Heffland plans to offer to the committee's when it reaches the senate floor.

Holmdahl Flees Mexico to Join Riffs vs. France, Spain

Los Angeles, Apr. 26.—(INS)—The last of a daring band of "punchpunch" "I" "ing" "ing"—American soldiers of fortune, who have made world history while in search of excitement, was on his way to Morocco today to don the turban and flowing robes of the Riffian followers of Abd-el-Krim.

Capt. Holmdahl passed through here on his way from Mexico to the scene of hostilities in North Africa. His departure from Mexico was necessitated by the suspicion of followers of Pancho Villa that he had had a part in the decapitation of the body of the famous Mexican revolutionist.

Holmdahl was arrested and tried before a court at Parral. The judge questioned him about a bottle of distilled water that had been found in Holmdahl's automobile.

They were not convinced that the fluid was not embalming fluid until he had drunk the bottle of water to prove that it was harmless.

Holmdahl began his adventurous career by fighting against Aguinaldo in the Philippine campaign when he was 15 years old. He is straight, tall and sinewy, with graying hair and piercing eyes.

He served six years with Villa as chief of infantry, and during the World War was with the British engineers in Flanders.

World Nations Studying Milk From U. S. Data

Chicago, Apr. 26.—(INS)—China, Japan and Siam are learning to take their milk scientifically or leave it alone, according to American methods, and at the same time make surplus money for the farmer of Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin and other great dairy producing states of the Middle West.

They are getting their data through an educational campaign being carried by American organizations at their request, according to report, just compiled by the National Dairy Council, with headquarters in Chicago.

In the last three years the dairy council has furnished literature to twenty-one countries: Argentina, Denmark, Japan, China, India, Siam, France, Russia, Germany, Holland, Belgium, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Sweden, England, Scotland, Ireland, Rhodesia, Canada and the Philippines.

The material has been translated by the council into eight languages and organizations in other foreign countries have prepared their own translations for use on posters, or other forms of material.

In China and Japan, where dairying as conducted in the United States is practically unknown, it has been necessary to import milk products, principally from America, to meet the increasing demand.

In Central European countries and the British Isles it is impossible to increase dairy production to meet a greatly increased demand, and as educational work continues, import of milk products from America are growing in proportion.

Dairy councils now are functioning in England, Scotland, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Belgium, Holland and Sweden, and in each case, the National Dairy Council of the United States, has been asked for assistance in organizing and educational work.

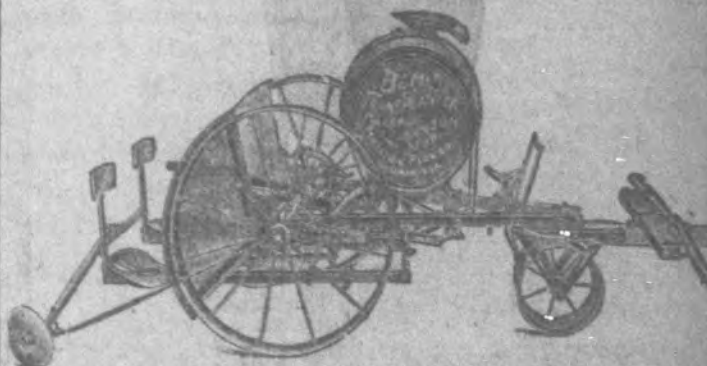

Washington, April 26.—(AP)—The Howell amendment to the Belgium debt settlement provision for the issuance of interest bearing bonds Belgium to cover the indebtedness at the request of the Secretary of the Treasury were rejected today by the Senate.

This figure represents an estimated deficit of 7,041,000 pounds, as the revenue from the tax on the existing basis, of taxation will be 804,700,000.

The damage was caused by the cold weather of April 19 and 20. Many peach growers have felt that the crop was damaged to a greater per cent than that estimated by Mr. Barker, but he believes that a production of 75 per cent of the total is probable.

Raggs, duly appointed registrar, to open the books for registration on April 9th, and to keep open said books for a period of 20 days exclusive of Sunday, at the county court house in the Town of Greenville; for the registration of these citizens, not already registered who desire to register and vote in said election.

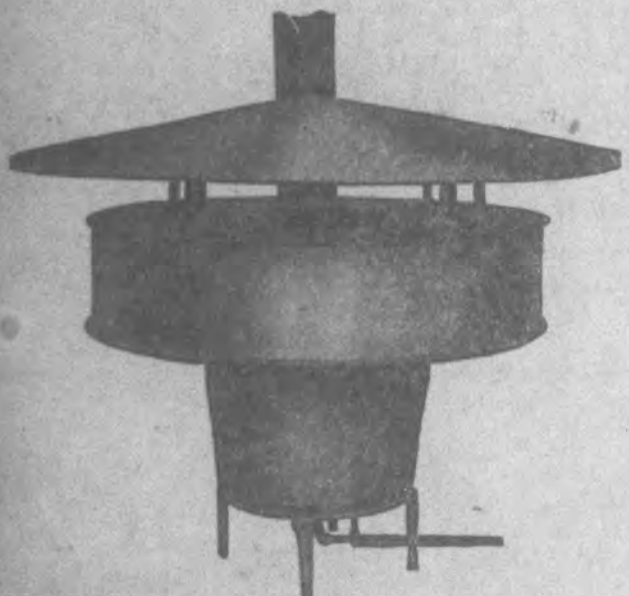

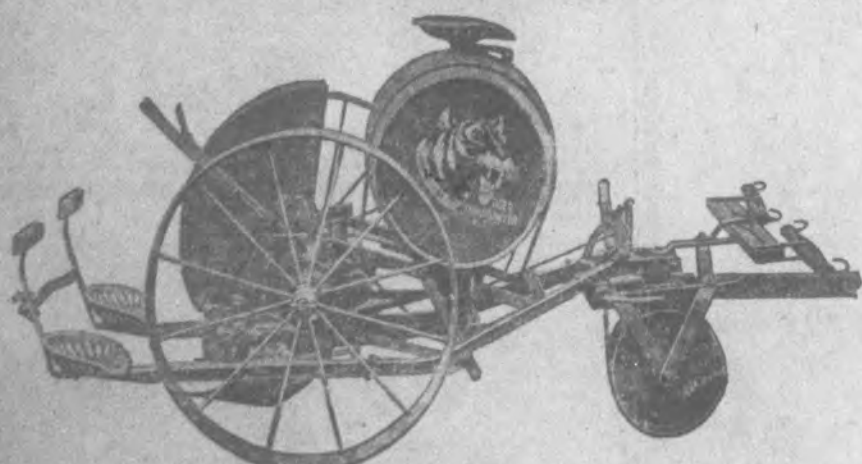
