### William McSwiggin, Asst. State's Attorney of Chicago, and Two Companions Victims of Gangsters

Chicago, Apr. 28.—(AP)-William H. McSwiggin, youthful assistant State's Attorney, known as the "hanging prosecutor" because of his zeal in conducting criminal trials, was slain last night in a blast of machine gun fire poured by gangsters into an automobile in which he and three other men were riding.

Two of his companions also were killed. They were Janies J. Doherty, reputed leader of beer runners of Cicero, a subarb, and Thomas Duffy, owner of a saloon. The hail of lead came from an automobile which drew up beside the car in which Mc-Swiggin and his companions were

While authorities were delving in a maize of possibilities for the shooting, John Sege, veteran Captain of Detectives, said that the assistant prosecutor was marked to death because of his prosecution of John Scaline and Albert Abselmi, two gangsters under sentence of 14 years for the slaying of two policemen.

Search for the slayers began mmediately under the direction of State's Attorney Robert E Crowe, who dec'ared he was at tounded at the timerity of the killers. A conference of state, county and city officers was called to lay plans for rounding up gangsters who might furnish clues leading to the identity of the ma-

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
