VANDERBILT NEEDS LOAN AVERT CRASH NEWSPAPERS

**Willing to Pledge a
Patrimony of \$1-
500,000 for Loan of
\$300,000; Family
Withdraws Financial
Support**

New York, Apr. 29.—(AP)—Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., heir to the Vanderbilt millions, today was looking for a loan of \$300,000 for which he is willing to pledge a patrimony of \$1,500,000 to avert the crash of his chain of newspapers. His family has withdrawn financial support, but the 28 year old publisher, though handicapped by ill health, is confident of this to prevent disaster for the 5,000 stockholders in his \$5,000,000 newspaper enterprise. He is prepared in the face of a definite break with his father, Brigadier General Cornelius Vanderbilt, to "fight it through."

A statement by Dudley Field Malone who, with Clarence Darow, has been retained as advisor to the youthful head of the Vanderbilt newspaper incorporation, says that unless \$300,000 is forthcoming the chain of newspapers in San Francisco, Los Angeles and Miami will be threatened with disaster in six months.

Mr. Malone said that the Vanderbilt family has paid over \$1,000,000 into the corporation to meet operating cost but had "recently assumed the right to cease further financial aid to his newspapers, an assumption of right with which Cornelius Vanderbilt Jr., is at variance." He added that the money invested by the Vanderbilt family belonged potentially also to young Vanderbilt, since he is the only son.

Mr. Vanderbilt blames mismanagement on the part of aides, a mistaken policy of over-expansion, and "plain mistakes" for the crisis. He started as a cub reporter six years ago in New York and three years later began founding tabloid newspapers.

Road Builders' Efficiency Same As Other Contractors

Washington, Apr. 29.—(AP)—Although investigations made by the Bureau of Public Roads indicate that the average highway contractor does not operate above fifty per cent efficiency, Thos. H. MacDonald, chief of the bureau, declared today that the highway builders are no less efficient than contractors on railroad work and other construction.

One hundred per cent efficiency, according to Mr. MacDonald, is not obtainable on work of this character, detailed observations indicating from eighty-five to ninety per cent to be the best practical performance.

The difference between the maximum obtainable efficiency and the average performance is largely from numerous small losses, the importance of which is not sufficiently appreciated by the foremen and superintendents who direct the labor employed on large construction projects.

Red Lake, Ont. Prospectors Face Difficult Mining

Red Lake, Ont., Apr. 29.—(AP)—Ontario's newest gold discovery is in quartz formation and any successful "prospecting" will be done by an intelligent direction of the diamond drill.

Heavy expenditure is necessary before a dollar's worth of gold can be taken from quartz. The prospector and his "grub-staker" in this little field face a trial of faith and endurance. Whereas the gold adventurer in many sections of Alaska required only a pan, pick or shovel to work his claim, the prospector at Red Lake needs equipment and experience to meet a different type of mining.

DEMOCRATS HOLD CONVENTION IN RALEIGH TODAY

W. C. Seimster Delivers Key Note Address; McLean Given Tremendous Ovation

Raleigh, April 29.—(AP)—The State Democratic convention opened in the city auditorium here this afternoon at 12:25 o'clock. When Governor Angus W. McLean, breaking precedent by attending, entered he was given a tremendous ovation. The convention was opened with prayer by Dr. T. W. O'Kelley, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Raleigh.

All state officials were requested by Chairman J. D. Dawson to come to the platform. He likewise extended the invitation to former Governor Cameron Morrison and O. Max Gardner, former Lieutenant Governor, and regarded as the leading candidate for gubernatorial honor in 1928. Mr. Gardner responded and was given an ovation. The call of counties followed and a forum present was declared. The reading of district reports was dispensed with and the vice presidents of the convention from the various districts were requested to come to the platform.

W. C. Seimster, of Newton, the key note speaker, was introduced by Chairman Dawson, as the temporary chairman of the convention, and immediately began delivery of the key note address.

Frequently interrupted by applause, W. C. Seimster, of Newton, opened the State convention here today with an impassioned attack upon the policy of the Republican Party, State and National, and the glowing tribute to Democracy.

Tribute was paid especially to North Carolina's two Senators, by delegation in the House of Representatives and to the Democratic administration in North Carolina for the past 25 years.

At the close of his address, he was given a tremendous ovation lasting several minutes. After naming a permanent chairman, approving two resolutions and hearing from one or two speakers the convention recessed shortly after two o'clock until four o'clock this afternoon.

Rufus A. Doughton, State Revenue Commissioner, was called to the chair. Former Governor Cameron Morrison was given a rousing ovation when he came to the platform to second a resolution offered by R. O. Everett, of Durham, in honor of the late William Jennings Bryan. A beautiful tribute was paid to the great Commoner by Mr. Morrison.

The resolution was unanimously adopted to the suggestion of Mr. Morrison "by a rising vote and with bowed heads." The crowd then demanded "Gardner, Gardner, Gardner," and refused to listen to O. Max Gardner's suggestions that the convention recess for lunch without any more speeches. The Shelby man kept the crowd laughing by his references to his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Governor in 1928. He paid tribute to the past several Governors of North Carolina and the name of each drew applause from the convention. He suggested that he would like to write a scenario of North Carolina progress under Democratic administration.

A call for "McLean" at the confusion of Mr. Gardner's speech was declined by the executive. A resolution paying tribute to the late Governor Locke Craig, of Asheville, was unanimously adopted. The convention then adjourned for luncheon.

MR. L. C. MOORE DIES FOLLOWING A SHORT ILLNESS

Funeral Services Conducted Yesterday From Home in Carolina Township

Mr. L. C. Moore, 80, died at his home in Carolina township on Tuesday night following an illness of two weeks. Funeral services were conducted yesterday afternoon from his late home with interment following in the family burying ground.

Mr. Moore was a Confederate veteran and one of Pitt county's most prominent citizens. He was a successful farmer and was held in high esteem by a host of friends.

Mr. Moore was interested in the county's development and especially in the progress of his community. His advice was sought on various issues concerning the future of the county, and he was always ready and willing to assist in any undertaking which helped promote better conditions in this section of the state. He saw four years' service in the Civil War and was a brave and courageous soldier. He was never married.

The deceased is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Joseph Fleming this city; and Miss Ellen Moore, of Whitakers; one brother, Mr. Zeno Moore, of Whitakers.

Dill Radio Bill Approved Today

Washington, April 29.—(AP)—Ignoring President Coolidge's warning to Congress against establishing any more independent federal agencies, the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee today approved the Dill Radio Bill providing for a commission to have control of air communication. The commission would have supreme power in its field, the committee having eliminated no provisions for appeal to the court to compel the issuance of broadcasting licenses or to prevent the revoking of them. The committee also proposed that the commission have five instead of three members on salaries of \$12,500 each.

The White House disclosed recently that President Coolidge was inclined to favor a bill already passed by the House placing the control of radio to the commerce department instead of independent commission.

Peking Suffers Coal Shortage as Trans Fail to Run Now

Peking, Apr. 29.—(INS)—Little discomfort is suffered by the civilian population of Peking by the Chinese and foreign, despite the fact that it is the capital of a warring nation for many months of every year, even to the point of keeping the city gates closed to prevent the fighting armies from entering it.

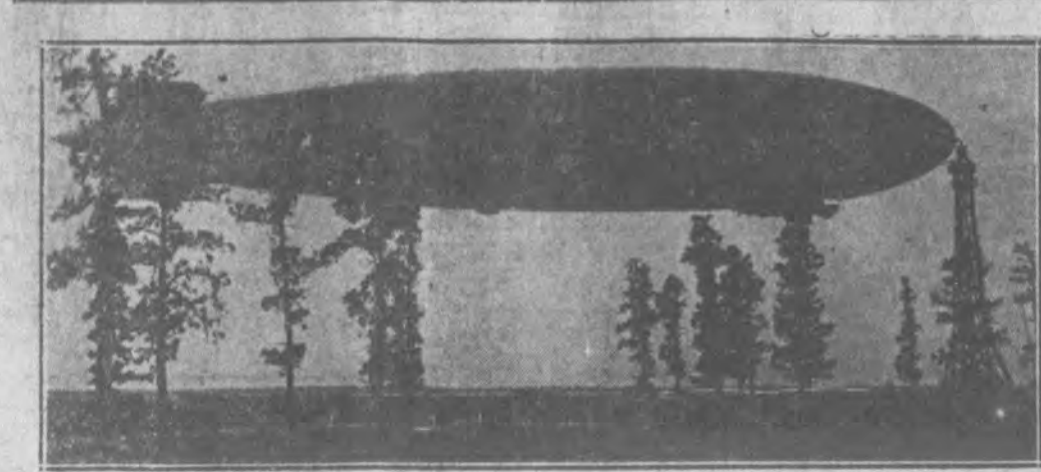
Troops, military trains of long lines of camels and Mongolian carts, many of drawn by bullocks, and pack animals, are continually to be seen on the main streets, coming or going to the numerous fronts where Chinese are killing each other at the bidding of ambitious militarists. With it all, however, life goes on much the same except for an increased wave of rumors.

Just now, however, railway transportation has been practically nil for months and has caused a shortage of coal.

As a result the company supplying electric light and power to Peking has inserted the following notice in the local papers: "For many months the supply of coal from our principal sources has been very irregular and lately it has ceased altogether. High government authorities have been fully apprised of the situation and we are confident that all that is possible will be done to ameliorate conditions. Meanwhile we most earnestly request our consumers to economize in every possible way in the use of electricity to a still in tiding over this very difficult period."

TOBACCO BOARD OF TRADE MEETS

**Four Sets of Buyers
Will Be On Market
Next Year With
Eight Warehouses in
Operation**

The Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade met in regular monthly session today and discussed the plans for next season. It was definitely decided that four sets of buyers will be on the market, and eight warehouses will be in operation.

The warehousemen will make every effort possible to make it the best season in history of the market and have set for their goal 65,000,000 pounds of tobacco. Nearly 50,000,000 pounds were sold during the past season and with more warehouses and four sets of buyers, the number of pounds sold next season will in all probability reach the desired goal.

Southern Methodists Expect A New Unification Discussion

Memphis, Tenn., Apr. 29.—(AP)—Further discussion of the question of unification will be one of the principal issues before the twentieth session of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, which begins here May 5.

The conference is the ruling body of the church and is composed of both clerical and lay leaders, many of whom expect a controversy over the proposed appointment of a new unification committee to deal with a similar body from the Northern church.

Bear Hunting Season In Alberta Is Getting Into Full Swing

Banff, Alberta, Apr. 29.—(INS)—Arnold Borton, veteran trapper hunter and guide, has started his annual spree—but it's not an alcoholic one.

The season for bear hunting in the environs of Banff is getting into full swing. Bruin, shuffling out of his hibernation den has a brand new coat. Hunters by the hundreds are here to try and annex one of these glossy coats, and it is through the hunters that Borton gets his "kick."

The woodsman likes to pilot his expert hunters over the mountains and along the track of bear or other game, but gets more pleasure perhaps out of the campfire circle, which follows a day's tramp. Then he begins to expand, recalling for his hearers some of his experiences when dude sportsmen didn't clutter up the landscape, and although he recounts them casually enough, they're hair-raising from the viewpoint of Easterners unaccustomed to the ways of the wild mountains.

KICKAPOO INDIANS ASK
PRES. CALLES FOR HOMES
Mexico City, April 29.—(AP)—Former American Kickapoo Indians are making their last stand in a protest to President Calles. When their hunting grounds in the United States became restricted by the invitation of the government, for years they roamed the vast ranges of Coahuila, hunting and living a life of contentment. Now the lands which they considered theirs are being gradually closed as farm after farm is established.

Foreign Trade Council Discusses European Situation

Charleston, S. C., Apr. 29.—(AP)—Trade with the Far East and South Africa dominated discussion in the second day's session of the Foreign Trade Council at the thirteenth annual convention in session here today, with the European situation coming in for a share of the limelight.

Dr. Jeremiah J. Jinks, President of the Alexandria Hamilton Institute, of New York, and E. H. Low, Trade Commissioner of the Union of South Africa, both touched on Far Eastern and South African trade. South Africa is now an up-to-date country.

Low told the convention, and asserted that the United States ranked sixth in South African trade. He said that what is most needed is to stimulate trade between the Union of South Africa and this country is an effective representative of American firms pointing out that some British and at least one Australian firm had established branch factories there.

European finances were viewed in the light of having reached a turning point by H. M. Robinson, President of the First National Bank of Los Angeles. He pointed out that within two years German currency has been stabilized, the Reichstag Gold reserve increased and bank accounts and average wages increased.

Mr. Robinson said the first step in checking the depreciation of French currency had been taken by balancing the budget, but that it remained to be seen whether the taxes levied would be collected. Other countries, for the most part, he said, were in good condition.

Wilkins Lands at Point Barrow In Good Condition

New York, Apr. 29.—(AP)—The North American newspaper alliance announced today that Captain George H. Wilkins, leader of the Detroit Arctic Expedition and his pilot Ben Edeeson had landed in the plane "in good condition" at Point Barrow. This was the first direct word they had heard from them thirteen days. The aviators left their base at Fairbanks for Point Barrow with a heavy load of supplies. Considerable anxiety had been expressed for their safety when the radio contact with them was lost.

BRITISH WOMAN WINS IN OPEN GOLF TOURNAMENT

London, Apr. 29.—(INS)—Miss's supposed superiority over woman in sport was dealt another severe blow when Miss H. C. White, a local player, won the North Foreland Golf Club's Victory Cup, and thus was the first woman in the history of competitive golf to win an open tournament.

She beat Cardell Martyn, Sonningdale champion, and the senior final winner, by 2 up in the final for the Cup.

MEXICO TO ESTABLISH 250 WEATHER STATIONS

Mexico City, April 29.—(INS)—Two hundred and fifty weather observation stations are to be immediately installed throughout the Republic. Orders for the necessary equipment have been placed in the United States.

Until now the only weather observation has been made in Mexico City and was, of course, unreliable, because of the lack of data, with the tremendous increase in the number of airplanes and the stimulus to agriculture through the opening of a farm loan bank and the beginning of several irrigation projects, reliable weather forecasting has become a necessity.

CLINIC WILL BE HELD MAY 30TH

**Kiwanians to Sponsor
Clinic for Crippled
Children, Both the
White and Colored,
From Seven Counties**

A diagnostic clinic for the examination of crippled children, both white and colored, will be held in Greenville on Thursday, May 20. The local Kiwanis club is sponsoring the clinic under the direction of the State Orthopaedic Hospital and the State Board of Public Welfare.

This is the 19th of a series of clinics held throughout the state. To this clinic will be brought children for a re-examination that have been treated at the Orthopaedic Hospital, as well as children who have never been examined. Applications to the Orthopaedic Hospital will be filed for those who are found eligible for treatment.

Dr. O. L. Miller, surgeon of the State Orthopaedic Hospital, will examine the children and a member of the State Department of Public Welfare will be here to make out records of the children. This clinic will serve Pitt, Craven, Edgecombe, Martin, Beaufort, Jones and Lenoir counties. Something like one hundred children will visit the clinic. The Kiwanis Club is using every effort to make the clinic a success and give to crippled children a chance to get examination and advice as to treatment.

NEW ENGLAND WOMEN FIGHT "STUPID" BARONS

Boston, April 29.—(AP)—New England housewives are once again in rebellion against the dominion of King "Spud."

With the retail price of the mulberry vegetable having reached the highest price since the close of the war, ranging from 80 cents a bushel to \$1.25 per bushel, women's organizations have banded together to push potatoes to the table.

The cause for the war-time price is attributed to the greed of potato barons. According to the State Commission on Necessities of Life, there is at present a surplus on hand and points out that there are 1,000,000 bushels more on hand than at the same time a year ago.

To combat the annual "going up" on commission on necessities is advocating a campaign to encourage more potato planting, nearer home as the only sure way to keep the price within reach.

AUSTRALIA TO ESTABLISH MODEL NATIVE STATE

Melbourne, Apr. 29.—(INS)—The proposed establishment of a model native state for the preservation of the Australian aborigine is being discussed here.

The main suggestion, which is supported by many eminent Australians, is that a large tract of country should be rigidly reserved for the rapidly-decaying race, and that a native Tribunal assisted by a Federal Government Resident, should govern the territory.

Mr. Work's Useful Talk.
New Orleans Flying Field.
We Talk, Russia A.C.S.

Secretary Work talked plainly and usefully in Los Angeles. Telling the big power men, who think they should control the Colorado water and power, that some jobs are too big for them. Mr. Work is not hostile to big business of the right kind. He knows it has built this country, our government confining itself largely to politics and to running for office.

But the secretary of the interior makes it plain that some of America's undertakings are too big for anyone but Uncle Sam. The great Boulder dam project is one of them. The Panama Canal was another, even the French, masters of engineering, could not manage that.

Mr. Work suggested that those interested in Colorado waters, for irrigation or power, should make their bids, at a definite price. The idea is to have facts to put before Congress, proving that the scheme will pay. Such facts may be necessary to convince some unwilling or dull congressmen, but they ought not to be necessary. In the case of a great gold mine, congress would ask only for proof that the gold was there, then the digging would begin.

The Colorado offers a sure mine of power, fertility and wealth greater in value than all the gold mines ever found in California. Every congressman of intelligence not interested in anybody's private exploitation scheme, will be for the Boulder dam.

Thanks to the Young Men's Business Club which holds its "Aeronautical Week" parade today, and to other energetic citizens of New Orleans. That great and important city is about to inaugurate an "air field" with ample accommodation for postoffice, army and civilian planes. Every city should possess such a field and invite Uncle Sam to send his postoffice airplanes there. Postmaster New and the President will be found eager to cooperate in every way.

The New Orleans flying field is especially important, because of New Orleans' strategic position. An adequate flying field there, with the possibility of establishing a military air base in an emergency would be most important to the protection of the Panama Canal. Mr. Raoul Jordan, mayor of action, describes most hopefully New Orleans' intense interest in aviation.

It is comical—especially in the eyes of high finance—but it is true that this glorious republic, where a dollar receives the respect to which it is entitled, can actually learn from Bolsheviki Russia. We talk about the British rubber trust that multiplies the normal price by four. We talk, and Mr. Hoover almost sheds tears. The Soviet Government buys in South America enough rubber trees to plant a square mile, and will make experiments in rubber production. We think of Russia as filled with fur coats and wolves galloping after sleighs, but they have every sort of climate, and if the Soviet man's agents continue to show the spirit of Peter the Great, and insist that Russia can produce everything, they will surprise our respectability, most painfully.

Mr. Haldeman-Julius, one of the very few that have ever made a success of book publishing, is said to have "beaten the stock market" to the tune of \$185,000 in a few weeks.

Do not let that hurry you into stock gambling, at which you will always lose in the end. The story of Mr. Haldeman-Julius is still to be told. Wait until you hear it. If he dies first, he will have millions of little books to think, not the stock market.

Henry Ford's admirable series of letters "The Great Today and the Greater Tomorrow," add to his permanent reputation, and to public enlightenment, every day. Mr. Crouther has rendered real public service in persuading Mr. Ford to contribute to that work.

MANY THEORIES GIVEN AS MOTIVE TRIPPLE SLAYING

**The "Beer Racket"
Supplants all Theories
Behind the Slaying
of Three Men by
Gangsters**

Chicago, Apr. 29.—(AP)—The "beer racket" today had supplanted all other theories as to the motive behind the latest triple slaying by machine gun gangsters of W. H. McSwiggan, of the State's Attorney's staff, James J. Doherty and T. Duffy. The death of the youthful prosecuting attorney however, brought one of the most energetic campaigns against gangs ever waged in Cook county.

Almost every scrap of information in the hands of police pointed to the fact that the killing of Doherty was long planned by rival bootleggers from whom Doherty, who was a rum runner, was wresting control of business in Cicero, and that McSwiggan and Duffy were killed merely because they happened to be in Doherty's car; any when the machine gunners pumped 100 bullets into Doherty's automobile.

The theory that McSwiggan was out seeking evidence for the trial of Martin Durkin, was abandoned and likewise the theory that he was slain in revenge for his activities as a prosecutor. He was friendly with Doherty and Duffy and their presence together was merely social.

There was persistent effort today to ferret out the killer, or more important men who hired the killers and armed them with the deadly Thompson Machine Gun.

All enforcement agencies of the city and county have been enlisted in the search, but after hours of investigation not a single clue to the identity of the actual slayers had been found. Numerous raids resulted in 200 arrests and the seizure of many arms and much ammunition.

Approves Plan for \$25,000,000 Bryan Foundation

Toronto, Can., Apr. 29.—(AP)—The World Christian Fundamentals organization today approved the plan put forward by President James Luckey, of Houghton College, New York, for a \$25,000,000 Bryan Foundation.

The purpose of the foundation will be to establish colleges throughout the United States and Canada for the advancement of Christian Fundamental Education.

Appointment of trustees of the foundation will be made at the meeting of the Orthodox College Association in Chicago next week.

"Chair Part" In Movies Indication of Recognition

Hollywood, Cal., Apr. 29.—(AP)—A "chair part" is something for which every newcomer in the movies hopes.

It means that the actor so distinguished is gaining recognition and with continued progress may become a star.

A "chair part" is so called because when the player arrives on the set he or she is given a portable chair. The name of the actor is inscribed upon the chair and no one else is allowed to touch it.

Hundreds of persons have worked before the camera many years without reaching a "chair part." On the other hand, there have been occasional "quick successes."

When Doris Hill arrived on the set to play the leading role opposite Syd Chaplin in "The Better Ole," now in production, she had never before appeared before the camera and had experienced only six months work as a dancer in theatre productions.

Chaplin and his director arranged a "chair part" for her, which has won her two dollars, but means as much in the ranking of players.

WHAT DO TAXES BRING?

Ever since the day the American colonists protested against the tax on tea which very few drank) op- position to taxes has seem- ed to be inherent in citizens of this country. We have talked more about the amount of the tax than about what taxes brought to us. Every dollar of tax money wasted or spent ex- travagantly or needlessly should bring forth protest and action to secure a dol- lar's worth of benefit for every dollar's worth of tax collected. If people are as- sured of government eco- nomically administered and they are getting the worth of their money, you hear no general complaint.

The Smithfield Herald says there is no kick com- ing when we get the worth of our money, and adds:

"It is refreshing occa- sionally to come across a person who is not kicking on account of the higher taxes. Such a man dropped into our office recently who had just paid his taxes, and we were interested in his attitude. Were they as much as last year or more? we inquired. 'Well, more,' he replied. Then he told us how recently he had been looking over some old papers which he kept in a little trunk bought for the pur- pose of preserving valuable records, and came across his tax receipts for 1903. The amount was a little more than three dollars. Twenty-three years have passed and last week he paid about eighty dollars tax. In the meantime he had acquired just half an acre more land than he had in 1903. But now he has an automobile. He has plenty of feed for his stock, more valuable stock and better farming utensils.

"When asked if he would go back to 1903, if he could he gave an emphatic nega- tive answer. Then he told how he used to haul fertil- izer in the spring and often had to unload his fertilizer to get his horse and wagon out of the mud. And the school. He has a child completing high school and others headed for the same thing. He appreciates the fact that a long-term school means the saving of a year in every three.

FEWER FARM DWELLERS

A continued decrease in farm population in the United States is reported by the Department of Agricul- ture, which estimates that there were 479,000 fewer people on farms January 1 this year than on January 1 a year ago.

The department estimates the farm population at 39,665,000 on January 1, 1926, compared with 31,134,000 on January 1, 1925, a de- crease of 1.5 per cent. These figures include all men, wo- men and children living on farms.

The movement from farms to cities, towns, and villages in 1925 is estimated at 2,035,000, and the movement to farms at 1,135,000, a net movement away from farms of 901,000 persons. Births on farms during 1925 are estimated at 710,000, and deaths at 288,000, leaving a natural increase at 422,000 which reduced the loss due to cityward movement to 479,000.

The figures for 1924 show- ed a net loss in farm popu- lation of 182,000 persons. The gross movement from farms to cities in that year was 2,075,000, and the gross movement back to farms was 1,396,000, a net movement not counting birth and deaths, of 679,000 persons.

The large gross movement from farms to cities, which has been at or slightly above the two million mark since January, 1922, apparently decided over balances the gross movement from cities to farms plus the increase on farms due to excess of births over deaths.

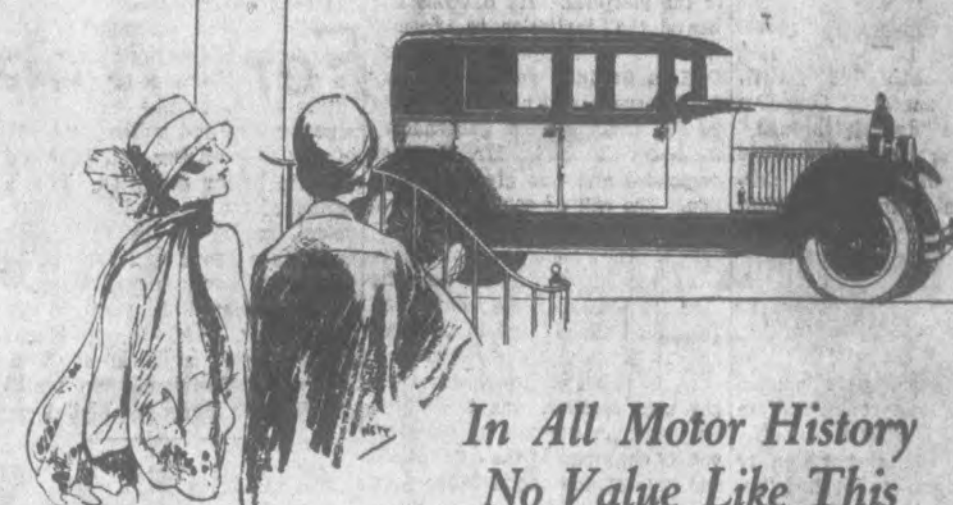

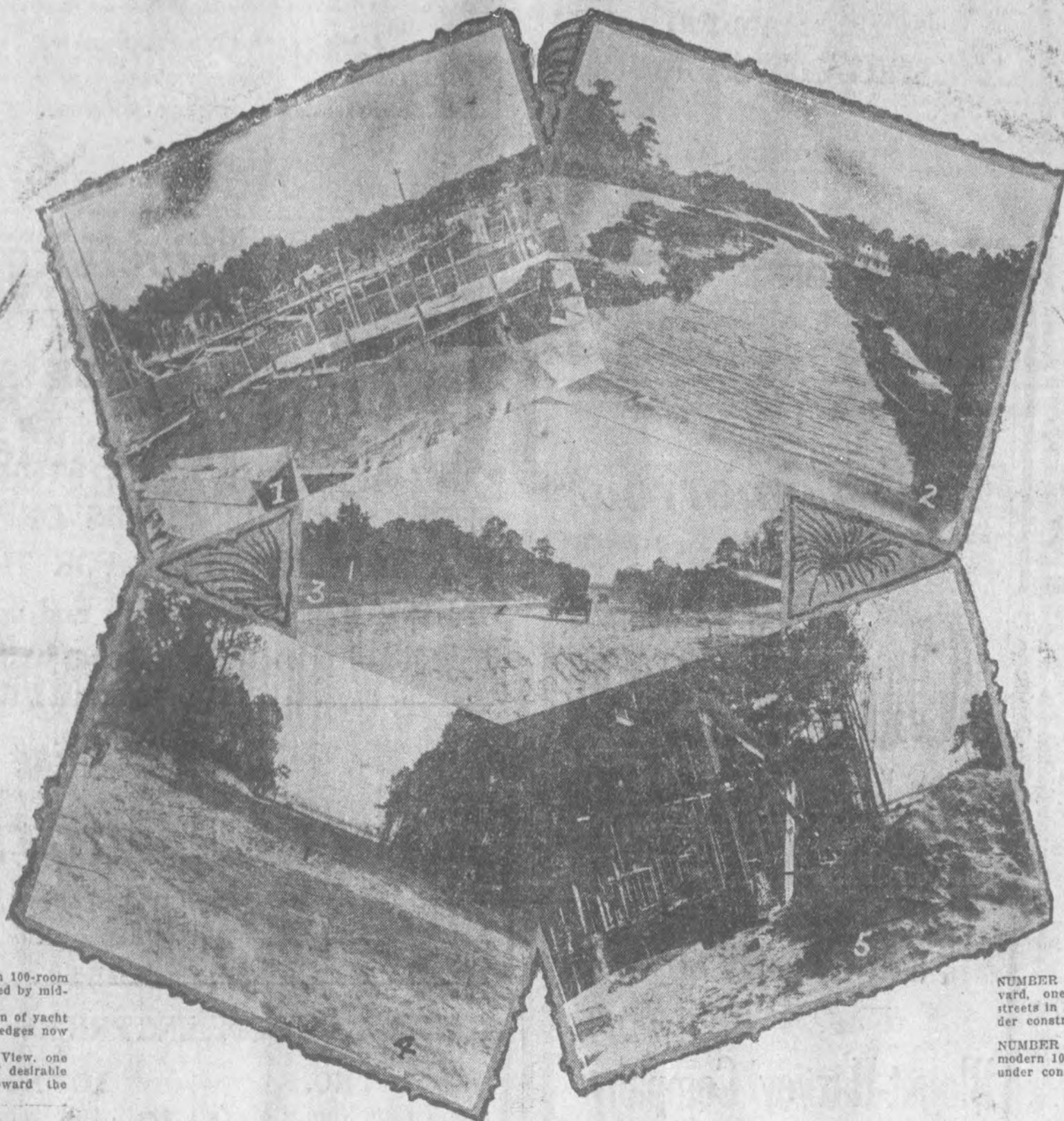

CHEYENNE MADE AIR MAIL STOP CITY TO DANCE

Inauguration of Service to Denver and Pueblo to Be Celebrated; Wyoming's Lady Governor to Greet Big Colorado Officials On Landing

Cheyenne, Wyo., April 29.—(INS)—Inauguration of air mail service between Cheyenne, Wyo., and Pueblo, Colo., with stops at Denver and Colorado Springs, is to be recorded elaborate recognition in this city when the first planes carrying United States mail on the new route depart from here and arrive from Pueblo in a few days. It is at this point that connections will be made with the transcontinental air mail route long in operation between the two oceans. Plans have been perfected for a public reception at the aviation field here, where Governor Nellie Taylor Ross will greet Governor Torrey of Colorado, and Mayor C. V. Riner of Cheyenne, will welcome Mayor Ben Stapleton of Denver, and the mayors of Pueblo and Colorado Springs. Other distinguished civilian officials will be present, as well as Brigadier General John M. Jenkins, commanding officer at Fort Russell, Cheyenne, accompanied by a number of military officers of high rank. It is expected that Governor Torrey of Colorado, and Mayor Stapleton of Denver, will fly from the capital city to the airport of Wyoming on this occasion. High officials of the United States air mail service will be present to greet the distinguished visitors and to observe the inauguration of this new air line. Following the reception at the field a dance will be held in one of the big hangars in which the planes are housed. The Union Pacific of Cheyenne will entertain the occasion with outdoor music, while the famous orchestra of the 76th United States Field Artillery will provide music for the dance within the hangar. It is expected that Denver's postmaster will also be present in Cheyenne on this occasion, as well as other postmasters from points along the line of the new air mail route.

GIVES INTERESTING REMINISCENCES OF WOODROW WILSON

Staunton, Va., Apr. 29.—The inauguration of Woodrow Wilson's baseball field by the erection of a new building on the campus of the Staunton Military Academy, and how Woodrow Wilson, when Governor of New Jersey, slipped away from Trenton, without announcing his destination, for the purpose of re-visiting Staunton, the city of his birth, were among the interesting personal reminiscences told a member of the Woodrow Wilson Birthplace Memorial Committee by Colonel Thomas H. Russell, head of the Staunton Military Academy.

"Governor Woodrow Wilson paid an unexpected visit to Staunton in 1910," said Colonel Russell. "He phoned me early one morning, saying, 'This is Mr. Wilson. Would you like to visit your school?' Without knowing or thinking or knowing what Mr. Wilson it might be, I told him to come on up. A few minutes later a gentleman walked into my office, saying, 'I am Woodrow Wilson. When I was a youngster the campus of this Academy was one of my play fields. I would like to go over the ground again.' We made a trip of inspection over the whole plant, and from the roof of one of the buildings where a good view of the whole campus could be obtained, Mr. Wilson noticed a new dormitory. He pointed to it and exclaimed, 'Oh, you have ruined my ball field! That is where I used to play baseball with the other boys. I used to spend nearly every summer in Staunton until I was fifteen years old, though my parents moved away when I was still very young. I shall never forget the good time. I have had on this ground. It is my hope to come back to Virginia some day and spend a peaceful old age here.'"

Drama League to Discuss Aid for Ailing Shows

New York, Apr. 29.—(AP)—The badly ailing road show will receive expert attention at the Drama League of America convention here, May 5 to 8.

John Golden, the producer, will be one of the chief physicians and officials predict he will offer a plan under which the decrease in number of traveling productions will be checked and an increase substituted.

In this connection, the hard-ship of actors on tour also will be taken up and Frank Gilmore, executive secretary of the Actors' Equity Association, will be one of the principal speakers.

Likewise will the high price of theater tickets come in for discussion. Hatcher Hughes, of Columbia University, and A. M. Drummond, of Cornell, will talk about the theater in the colleges. Many stars of current production managers and critics also are expected to speak.

No Man's Land May Make Big School Funds

Oklahoma City, Apr. 28.—(INS)—"No Man's Land" may become "Oil Man's Paradise" and Oklahoma's public school endowment reach an almost incredible figure, if what the geologists assure the State Board of Land Commission proves true.

When Oklahoma Territory was opened to white settlement in 1889, the Federal Government set aside certain tracts, roughly 1,280 acres in each six square miles, to be sold or rented for the benefit of the future state's common schools. Other tracts were set aside to create endowments for certain State schools, and still other lands became state property when the commonwealth was erected in 1907.

In addition, the Government presented the State with \$5,000,000 as a nucleus for the permanent school fund. This fund, swelled by the proceeds of land

sold outright, has been loaned to farmers at a low interest rate, the principal remaining intact, the income divided annually on a basis of the school population in the various counties.

Out of the semi-arid Panhandle, three counties which extend north of the Texas Panhandle to a junction with Colorado and New Mexico, the State owns 200,000 acres, hitherto considered valuable only for grazing. It is in the vicinity of that stripe that the land lies that forty years ago was literally "no man's land," through surveying rumors.

Here, almost in the shadow of the Rocky Mountains, the oil geologists have found the "surface" indications of a new field, and some of the petroleum world's best known wildcaters have contracted with the state to sink test wells.

Riga, Apr. 28.—(INS)—With the alleged idea of cleaning the

Soviet's hands in the judgment of history, the Peoples Commissaries' Council, according to a report from Riga, has decided to appoint a committee to draft a report on all the details in connection with the murder of the Czar's family.

Calif. Lightweight Boxer Learns How to Keep Slim

Los Angeles, Apr. 28.—(INS)—Mushy Calahan, the Southern California lightweight, has apparently solved the familiar problem of weight control.

Calahan's recipe for curing obesity sounds like a "faith cure" testimonial. "I don't diet or over-exercise," he declared today. "My manager told me I was going to be the next lightweight champion of the world. Everyone thought I was going to develop into a welterweight. But I believed Ed die Sears, my manager, and I kept thinking 'I mustn't get

heavy and be a welterweight.' And I started losing weight then and cake make 135 pounds now without effort."

The former local new boy is the only boxer who has ever knocked out Pal Moran, Mushy accomplished this feat in three rounds at Vernon.

Mushy's record also includes two decisions over Ace Hudkins, the "Nebraska Wildcat," by a more or less controverted margin.

His only appearance in the east resulted in a draw with Archie Walker at New York.

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Paris, April 28.—A landscape done by the bartender of the Hotel Crillon has been accepted at the Salon of the Independent Artists. Georges Perdriel is as skillful with the palette and brush as he is with a cocktail shaker. His jovial manner and his imitable Bronx's were known for the past twenty years to American visitors, but his artistic talents were a secret until the list of the exponents at the Salon was published.

Georges' proudest possession is, however, his "Book of Gold," containing the autographs and wise cracks of world celebrities. Prizefighters, politicians, generals,

actors, have all united to do justice to Georges' deft touch, which is often claimed could even transform the taste of bootleg gin.

Lloyd George heads the list of singers, closely followed by Theodore Roosevelt, General Pershing, Eddie Rickenbacker, Douglas Fairbanks, Jackie Coogan, Mary Pickford, Due Denezes, Tom Mix, Reginald Vanderbilt and ex-Governor Whitman.

The death of the Duc d'Orleans, Pretender to the throne of France, has stirred up not a little comment in the French press concerning the law of exile.

To banish a good friend of the country because he happens to be the son of his father who happened to be a member of royalty, is nothing short of folly—that is the opinion of prominent journalists. From the time when he crossed over the border and presented himself at the bureau of recruitment of the Seine, making known his desire to fulfill his military service, like all good patriots, until the day he died with the little sack of French soil he always kept with him at his side, the Duc d'Orleans was one of France's best citizens and one of her most popular figures, always retaining much of the youth, gaiety and quiet courage of his ancestor, Henri IV.

"The real enemies of France—the ones who are really dangerous," says Clement Vautel in "Le Journal," "are the very ones for whom we open wide our gates, as for instance the Soviet Ambassador, or, who is installed in one of the finest of Parisian palaces."

"American women were very pretty in 1915 when I visited the United States," says Jean Mahlis, well-known Parisian journalist. "I don't know that I shall conclude that they are very, very, very (three times) pretty today just because the New York Hairdressers' Association states that there are 30,000 beauty institutes with 170,000 employees earning \$300,000,000 per year."

The important thing about this statement he thinks, is to put it to working to stabilize the falling franc and fill out the gaps in the government budget. The Finance Minister, Raoul Peret and Henry Berenger, ought to see to it that Beauty Institutes for American tourists are opened up all over France and that an army of beauty specialists be delegated to the United States letting France acquire a beauty culture monopoly along the lines of its tobacco monopoly.

In passing, the French journalist gives a word of praise to the

American men who seem quite as good-looking as the women to him because they shave carefully, are neatly dressed and wear handsome hats. They all look like fine athletes and have the features of Adonis, he thinks, and only the millionaires are below standard. Whether stout and wearing shell-rimmed spectacles, or lean, with piercing eyes, they will need generations to develop toward the American ideal of beauty.

Fire Destroys Document Telling of Ruril's Death

Prague, Apr. 29.—(AP)—The only official document dealing with the Meiering tragedy in which Archduke Rudolf, the Emperor Franz Josef's son and heir to the Austrian throne, and Marie Vecsere met their deaths under circumstances never yet explained, was destroyed in a fire which consumed the mansion of Count Taaffe at Elischau.

The document, which is understood to contain the only authentic account of the deaths, was given to Count Taaffe's father, then Prime Minister, by the Emperor. Neither he nor his son would ever consent to its publication, and kept it carefully locked up in a safe in the library at Elischau.
