KIWANIS CLUB HOST TEACHERS OF CITY SCHOOLS

Interesting Program Featured By Short Talks and Musical Selections Greatly Enjoyed

Last night was Teachers' Night at the Kiwanis Club. The club entertained the teachers of the city schools, and they were all there.

The program, which began at 6:30 P. M., was in charge of Bob Fitzgerald. Burt James, who appeared to be a sort of unofficial publicity agent and advertising attorney for the city school board, preferred charges charged against a certain teacher in town whose hands seem to have been held and gave very much out of the city school system of the city, and that no more such persons would be employed or tolerated.

Charlie Forbes gave a very interesting account of an educational tour through Virginia and North Carolina and brought in some interesting and instructive geographical and sociological knowledge. He also gave certain members of the organization a chance to demonstrate their musical ability in the presence of company.

Ed Griffin sang "Let Me Call You Sweetheart." No comment is necessary. J. E. W. Cook sang "Why Did I Kiss That Girl?" His technique in oratorio, and voice range were simply wonderful. He sang up whole octaves and spans the gamut of the human voice with ease and harmonic skill. Troy Rouse rendered "Last Night on the Back Porch" very beautifully. Berry Bostic was the converging quintessence of cuteness in his role of "I Want to Go Where You Go." C. B. Rowlett in his deep bass profundo rendered "Are You Sorry?" to the delight of the guests. Bill Bradshaw closed the musical part of the program with "Always" in his usual good style.

Next came the exhibition of the successes and failures of the teaching force of the city of Greenville dissected by certain erudite doctors and nurses of the surgical profession. It is needless to say that the successes far outnumbered the failures.

This is an occasion to which the Kiwanians look forward from year to year. It is one of those times when they have a good excuse to leave their wives at home and vice versa fearlessly feast their eyes upon a diversity of fair femininity without the conscious fear of furtive glances, piercing flits of assertive countenances and the fear of what will happen when they get back home.

Tilson Outlines House Program for Remainder Session

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—The House program for the remainder of the session outlined today by Representative Tilson, of Connecticut, the Republican leader, included farm, rivers and harbors, coal, veterans, judiciary and civil service legislation.

He expressed hope that the House would agree upon an economically sound farm relief bill which at the same time would give as much relief as can be given by legislative action. The judiciary legislation will include both the judges' salary increase bill and one for the creation of a number of additional districts. Among the veterans bills is one that would extend the time for conversion of war risk insurance which has already passed the Senate.

LITTLE CHANGE IN STRIKE SITUATION ENGLAND TODAY

Fifth Day of Strike Finds Disorders Fewer But No Definite Indication of Settlement

London, May 8.—(AP)—Amid charges and denials of an attempt to wreck the state and talk of a movement looking toward the settlement of the general strike persisted today. Whether hope was the sole basis for the report of a possible peace movement could not be ascertained. The strike is now in its fifth day.

The British Gazette, the government organ, said there was no foundation for the report that Premier Baldwin and J. H. Thomas, secretary of the Railwaysmen's Union, had a conference at a late hour Thursday night at which it was assumed a solution of the general strike crisis was sought. It was added that there had been no secret meetings between members of the government and the labor leaders.

The government last night in an official statement declared no serious disorders had yet occurred in any part of the country although intimidation both by disorderly crowds and pickets had been in progress in many places and might occur soon in many more. The communication referring to "criminal obstruction" then told of the intention to recruit a special constabulary in all parts of the country and bring the number in London to fifty thousand as quickly as possible. Other measures to increase the forces at the disposal of the government and to enable widespread protection were also being taken, the statement said. The strike was described as an organized attempt being made to starve the people and wreck the state.

On its side of the Trade Union Congress in its organ, the British Worker, denied the charge that calling the general strike was an attack upon the constitution. The sole aim of the congress is to secure for the miners a decent standard of living, said the Trade Union's statement. There is no constitutional crisis.

Generally speaking the strike situation apparently has improved, disorders reported yesterday being fewer than on Thursday. In some isolated instances it was reported that strikers were returning to work but not in any numbers which would be significant of a general weakening of the rank and file of the workers. The government reiterated today that the food situation was good and there were ample supplies at normal prices.

Local Boy Given Appointment to West Point

Congressman Lindsay Warren announced the appointment to West Point of Robert G. Mayo, of this city, as principal; Daniel R. Taylor, of Bethel, as first alternate and Wilmer Ballard, of Elizabeth City, as second alternate. The principal, if successful, will enter the Academy on July 1st. The vacancy was occasioned by the failure of the last appointees to qualify on the examinations.

Mr. Mayo is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Mayo and holds a position with the Bank of Whiteakers. He is popular with a host of friends who will be delighted to learn of the honor which has been bestowed upon him.

Conference Pleads for Restoration of Peace in England

Memphis, Tenn., May 8.—(AP)—The general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in session here today paused amid a mass of business to plead for peace and brotherhood in England. The action came after a resolution had been introduced asking that the conference take notice of the strife in England which may result in civil war.

DEMANDS GRADY RESIGN AS HEAD OF KU KLUX KLAN

Grady Issues Challenge for Audit of His Books as Grand Dragon of North Carolina

Asheville, May 8.—(AP)—A challenge for an audit of his books as Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in North Carolina was issued today by Judge Henry A. Grady of Clinton, in commenting on a resolution adopted by Asheville klansmen. The resolution demanded that Judge Grady resign immediately as Grand Dragon and C. P. McIlwain resign as Grand Klaliff.

Judge Grady, who is holding court in Washington, N. C., issued his challenge in a statement requested by the Asheville Times. Meanwhile J. D. Gillis, of Asheville, secretary of the committee, appointed to investigate the financial affairs of the Klan; issued a statement declaring that the objects of those who instigated the investigation of Judge Grady and McIlwain was simply to oust the two from office and was not to make war upon the Imperial organization.

LOCALS DEFEAT SCOTLAND NECK

Wins Ninth Victory of Season by One Sided Score of 9-3

Bob Forbes hurled the locals to their ninth victory of the season yesterday when he let the strong Scotland Neck team down with four scattered hits. Greenville, winning by a one-sided score of 9-3. The game started off by a clean single by Harrington, followed by a sacrifice by Forbes, West getting a free pass scoring Harrington on a grounded ball. This ended the scoring for the locals until the seventh frame when they opened up the fire works proper, scoring four runs, and counting for 3 more in the eighth.

Greenville goes to New Bern Tuesday for a return game and ending the season Thursday in Kinston.

Insurance Men to Hold Confab In Asheville

Asheville, May 8.—(AP)—Approximately 300 insurance men from throughout North Carolina will assemble here May 19 and 20 for discussion of problems paramount in their association.

An extensive program of business meetings for the two day session has been mapped out and is intermingled with numerous social events. P. R. Allen, general chairman of the Asheville Insurance organization, is in charge of local arrangements.

An automobile tour for the women delegates on the morning of May 19, a banquet at a local hotel, and a reception at one of the country clubs are some of the entertainment features on the program.

Sam Ruffin, secretary and treasurer of the North Carolina Association of Insurance Agents, will arrive in Asheville several days before the convention to cooperate with Mr. Allen, the latter said.

One Person Killed In Strikers' Riot

Chicago, May 8.—(AP)—A striking foundry worker was shot and killed and another man was wounded in a battle of bullets and bricks today between strikers and strike breakers in Cicero. The affray occurred not far from the Greenlee foundry where the men were employed.

FIGHT AGAINST EVOLUTION TO BEGIN SUNDAY

Beginning of Campaign in This State Will Be Marked by Addresses in Three Cities

Charlotte, May 8.—(AP)—The first fire of the Anti-Evolution League of America in North Carolina will be scattered in three cities of the state tomorrow. Dr. T. T. Martin, field secretary of the organization, has announced that the drive against modernism will be launched in Charlotte, Raleigh and Brevard during the day.

Dr. Martin will speak here. Dr. Andrew Johnson, president of the Fundamentalism Association of Kentucky, will deliver an address in Raleigh, and Prof. J. F. Halley, of Texas, will open the campaign in Brevard. The field secretary said the state had been divided into districts with headquarters here and every section of the state would be reached.

Dr. Edwards Dies At Hookerton Home

Kinston, May 8.—Dr. Grandison Christian Edwards, 68, of Hookerton, died at his home last midnight after an illness extending over a period of three months. Heart trouble was attributed as the cause of death.

Surviving the deceased are his widow and six children. He was well and favorably known to thousands of persons in this section. Funeral services will be conducted from the home at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon and interment will be made in the family burial ground. Rev. Mr. Broom, of Ayden Methodist Church, and Rev. Mr. Harrison of the Hookerton Methodist Church, will officiate.

Two brothers, J. A. and H. C. Edwards of Kinston, also survive Dr. Edwards.

FOREST FIRES IN NORTH CAROLINA UNDER CONTROL

District Foresters Advise State Headquarters That Fire at Grandfather Mountain Halted

Raleigh, May 8.—(AP)—The forest fires in Western North Carolina are now under control, generally speaking, according to telegrams received here today by Assistant State Forester W. C. McCormick. The telegrams added that weather conditions were still such as to make the situation dangerous.

A telegram from District Forester Seabring, reports that the fire near Grandfather Mountain, in the Boone division of Pisgah National Forest, is about out. Six thousand acres burned and 150 fighters at work on the fire. Conditions otherwise are better. No large fires. The telegram added that it was still dry and windy.

Another telegram received stated that weather conditions were still favorable for fires, but showers were predicted for tomorrow.

CLINIC CRIPPLED CHILDREN TO BE HELD ON MAY 20

Children From Ten Counties Eligible for Treatment at Orthopedic Hospital

A free clinic for the purpose of examining crippled children in ten counties, Bertie, Jones, Pitt, Greene, Wilson, Edgecombe, Martin, Beaufort, Craven and Lenoir, will be held in Greenville on Thursday, May 20th under the joint direction of the State Orthopaedic Hospital at Gastonia, and the Children's Bureau of the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare.

Mr. K. T. Futrell, superintendent of welfare in Pitt county is in charge of all arrangements for the clinic, which is the nineteenth of a series of crippled children's clinics, instituted in 1922, following a state-wide survey to determine the number of crippled children in North Carolina.

Any crippled children of sound mind, will be examined by Dr. Oscar L. Miller, chief surgeon of the State Orthopaedic Hospital, in order to determine whether or not they may be helped by free treatment at that hospital, which treats children under sixteen. The new negro ward, given by Mr. B. N. Duke, will care for negro crippled children. No treatment will be given at the clinic, since it is for examination only, and any who are considered eligible will be put on the waiting list.

Notices have been set out asking those who have already received treatment to report for re-examination. Dr. Hugh Thompson, orthopaedic surgeon, of Raleigh, will assist in making the examinations. Miss Emeth Tuttle, head of the Children's Bureau of the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, will direct the making of case histories. Various community organizations are cooperating with Mr. Futrell in arranging for the comfort of those who come to the clinic. The Greenville Kiwanis Club has been particularly active in making the arrangements.

The Big Strike.
Why Not Arbitration?
Too Many Caves? Never.
29 Times 3 Million.

Lloyd George is opposed to Baldwin's conservative government, but declares that the majority of Britishers stand behind it, and against five million organized workmen and the national strike.

The question in England today is "shall the empire be ruled by the people or by one-eighth of the people enrolled in labor unions." The British as a nation will respond to Baldwin's appeal to "co-operate in measures undertaken to preserve the liberties and privileges of the people of these islands."

No sound reason can be given for permitting any one group, whether unionism, free masonry, some particular church, or any other body to take charge of the nation.

On the other hand, the workers properly object to including among "the liberties and privileges of the people of these islands," the privilege of a small group of coal mine owners arbitrarily to reduce wages, thirteen and one third per cent, and add one hour to the working day.

Union labor has no right to force starvation upon the whole people. The coal mine owners have no right to force semi-starvation upon the thousands of mine workers.

It is probably that this strike will be settled in a short time. But "the liberties and privileges" of the coal mine workers will have to be considered in the settlement.

With an entire nation tied up because mine owners and workers can not agree on wages, why not submit the question to an impartial jury if such can be found.

The British ask us to join a league in which all nations would submit their wars to arbitration. Why not experiment with one little industrial war at home for a start.

The Hon. Sankarvala, M. P., who came to England from India to give the British lion's tail a twist, is now in jail for telling soldiers they ought to join the strike, and make a complete job of social chaos in England. The British judge did not approve of the idea.

Russian trades unions sympathizing with the British strike send \$125,000 to help. You cannot feed three or four million families long on that sum. Even \$2,000,000 would be raised in Russia by taxing all workers one quarter of a day's pay would not so far.

The strikers must win, lose or compromise before long. Compromise is the probable outcome, so arranged as to let labor leaders say "we won" and government "we did not give in."

The falling franc causes predictions that France will not be able to carry out the proposed settlement of the debt to America, which amounts to a reduction of about one-half in principal and interest.

Possibly some settlement of the debt problem would be the best thing to increase the strength of the franc. The pound sterling went up steadily after Britain had arranged to pay her war debt.

Henry Ford proves that big business of the right kind is good for owner, public and consumer. He makes about \$20 profit on each automobile. If he didn't make millions of cars a year, he would lose heavily on each, at the present prices. He makes a comfortable fortune yearly by saving from dust that ordinarily escapes from his tires. J. D. FLEMING DIES OF INJURIES IN AUTO ACCIDENT

P. O. Baker, Held in Connection With Death, Released Under \$2000 Bond; Funeral Services to Be Held Sunday

Mr. J. D. Fleming, who on yesterday afternoon suffered a crushed skull and other injuries when his automobile was overturned in collision with a car driven by Percy Baker, died yesterday at 5 o'clock in the Pitt Community Hospital. Funeral services will be conducted from his late home on the Evans farm near this city, on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Rev. Albert R. H. Miller, of the Eighth Street Christian Church. Interment will take place in the Fleming burying ground, with services at the grave being in charge of the Greenville Lodge 284 A. F. and A. M.

Mr. Fleming was born on June 15, 1878, and was a son of Joseph and Mary Spear Fleming. His mother died when he was quite young. Mr. Fleming was a farmer and was held in high esteem. He was twice married, his first wife being Miss Martha B. Holton and his second, Miss Eva Moyo, both of this county. About twenty-eight years ago Mr. Fleming affiliated himself with the Christian Church and was one of its most loyal members. He was a member of the Greenville Lodge 284 A. F. and A. M.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Fleming, accompanied by an old negro man, by the name of Daniels, was returning home from some point north of Greenville, when the fatal accident occurred. According to information he turned to his left to leave the highway at Fleming's Cross Roads, when a car, driven by Percy Baker, young white man of this city, ran into the Fleming car, overturning it. Mr. Fleming and the negro occupant of his car were caught underneath. The injured men were rushed to the local hospital, while Baker was arrested and placed in jail, to await the outcome of the injuries.

The coroner's jury, composed of John McKelthan, A. B. Ellington, C. L. Roebuck, Penn Watson, C. B. West and Lee Hannah, returned the verdict, "that Mr. Fleming came to his death by being struck by the Star touring car operated by P. O. Baker in a careless and reckless manner."

Following the verdict Baker was released under a \$2000 bond. He will be given a hearing in the nearest term of criminal court.

The deceased is survived by his wife and ten children, Misses Maricha Bell, Agnes, Eva Moyo, Blanche, Doris Mae, Edith Ray, Henry P., David, J. D., and Norman Fleming; his father, and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Fleming; one half sister, Miss Ella Isabelle Fleming; four half brothers, L. D. Fleming, Atlanta Ga., D. M. Fleming, Greenville S. C., R. V. and L. B. Fleming, of this city.

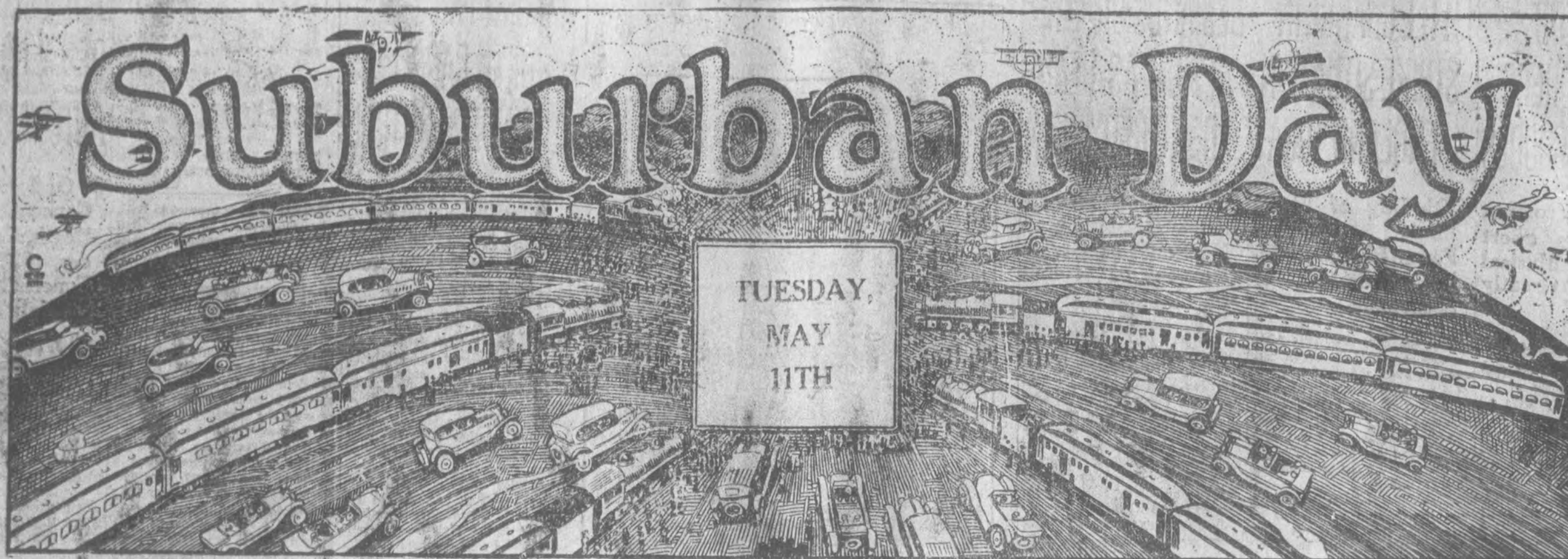
Small Bird May Keep Hepburn Out of Memorial Race

UNCLE SAM WANTS YOUR EXPERIENCE

If You Are Interested in Lightning and Its Effects, You Can Do the Weather Bureau a Good Turn by Forwarding Any Facts Relating to Lightning Stroke.

Washington, May 8.—(INS)—If you are interested in lightning and its effects you can do the United States Weather Bureau a good turn by forwarding any facts relating to lightning stroke.

"Although many accounts have been written of the effects produced by lightning, important details are usually omitted, making a scientific analysis of the available information difficult." Weather Bureau experts said. "It is desirable that there be placed on record in an appropriate institution, such as the Weather Bureau, any facts relating to lightning stroke."

It is necessary in making such observations to note carefully many details that often escape attention it was pointed out. Assuming that the object struck is a tree, a plan of the surroundings showing the location of various other trees and objects, their heights, and the position of fallen pieces of the tree struck should be made.

If possible photographs should be taken from different positions, showing the nature of the damage. All holes, furrows and other irregularities on adjacent ground should be noted, and their size included. If the tree is splintered, notes should be made of the positions of the most distant splinters, as well as of the large ones. The nature of the splintering should be noted, as an indication of the path of the lightning.

Pictures of the bark should be searched for, even if they are very small. They often show whether the tree was affected by a mechanical force acting from within, outward or the reverse. The nature and location of all damage to the bark and sapwood should be noted. Nothing should be removed until everything of interest regarding the original effect of the stroke

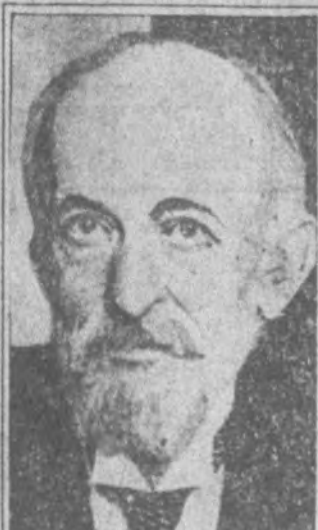

Prohibition Problem Worries Finland; Press Campaign On

Helsingfors, May 7.—(INS)—A philanthropic initiative from the United States has reached Finland embodied in the person of Miss Helvi Haathi, who for three years has studied the problem of delinquent children in America. Miss Haathi took course at the Smith College for Social Work and the Illinois Institute for Juvenile Research and has just returned to Finland where she intends to put into practice some of the useful things she has learned. The young Finnish lady has been appointed director of the Socialpaediatric division of General Mannerheim's Association for the Protection of children and has started her experiments already by forming two classes for the education of neglected children in Helsingfors. It is her noble ideal to try and save children who are charged with unfortunate hereditary tendencies and for this purpose she has established cooperation with the Joint Committee on the method of Preventing Delinquency in America.

In a lecture delivered to the General Mannerheim Association the other day, Miss Haathi developed how the work was carried on in the United States and how similar efforts might be made in Finland. Miss Haathi is characterized as being exceedingly well suited for the work she has tackled and possesses even scientific qualifications as demonstrated in the thesis she wrote for her doctor's degree while studying in Chicago and which was published in full in the esteemed magazine "The Welfare."

INSULTING CARICATURES MAY LEAD TO DISCOVERY OF HEIRS TO FORTUNE

Manchester, Ky., May 7.—(INS)—A collection of caricatures of relatives, each bearing insulting remarks about the person portrayed, are likely to lead to the discovery to a fortune of \$350,000. The money was left by Miss Anna Jones, an eccentric recluse who died recently in a squalid room in Manchester, surrounded by bags of money, bank notes, pile of tin cans, and tissue paper containing valuable securities. The caricatures were found in an envelope among papers which appeared to be receipts for small sums loaned. It appears from the drawings, which were made by her father, John Jones, that Miss Jones had more relatives than was supposed at first. Surnames are written over some groups of drawings, and from these may be found a clue that will lead to the discovery of the heir. Names mentioned are Milward.

Hewart, Higgins, Holland, Twigg, Oakhill, Bowler, Williamson, and Phoenix. Slight indications point to the fact that the descendants of some of these may be in the United States.

RIFFS AIR ORDERS WORRY FRENCH FORCE

Fez, May 8.—(INS)—The order, emanating from Abd el Krim headquarters near Ajir, which has been passed all through the Rif battle front, "Don't fire on the red planes," has caused a great deal of speculation in the centers of the French and Spanish armies. It is believed that the Rif aviation has finally emerged from rumor to reality.

MOTHER'S DAY

Isaiah 66:13:—"As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you."

It was in the year 1914 that Miss Anna Jarvis, of Philadelphia, Pa., requested the Hon. J. Thos. Heflin to introduce in the House of Representatives a joint-resolution to the effect that the President of the United States should designate by annual proclamation the second Sunday in May, as "Mother's Day." The late beloved ex-President Woodrow Wilson was the first to issue such a proclamation on May 9th, 1914.

The observance came in to immediate popularity, because "mothering" has been the highest calling of women from the beginning of our race, and it will be their leftmost mission to the end.

Rare and unhappy is the home in which the children and their mothers are, as Lord Houghton has it, "strangers yet!"—"After childhood's winning ways, After care, and blame, and praise, Counsel asked, and wisdom given, After mutual prayers to Heaven, Child and parent scarce regret When they part—are strangers yet!"

It is sadly true, of course, that there are exceptions to the general sympathy existing between parents and children; and that Townsend had grounds for saying:—"Kindred are oft but kin by name, Out thoughts they never knew."

But these exceptional cases only emphasize the fact that the world owes a debt to its mothers which it can never discharge. We, in this Christian country, naturally trace our love of Mother back to the example of the Saviour who committed the care of Mary, His mother, to the disciple John. And, doubtless, that act has done much to elevate the position of mothers in the world.

But, heathen writers have also recognized their mother. Horace sang:—"Pia mater

Pius quam se sapere, et virtutibus esse priorem "Vult."

Which we may translate: "An affectionate mother wishes that her offspring may be wiser and better than herself."

"With sage advice and many a sober truth

The pious mother molds to shame the youth."

There is no sweeter word in the English language than the word MOTHER. Her life has been the inspiration of the race. I doubt if you could name me any great man, who had not a great mother; and whose greatness was not the result of her influence and teaching. It is "meet and right" that we celebrate this day in her honor.

Motherhood has not been ever thus exalted. As late as the year 1646 George Fox wrote in his "JOURNAL":—"After this, I met with a sort of people who held that women have no souls (adding, in a light manner), no more than a goose. But I reproved them, and told them that was not right: for Mary said, 'My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour.'"

There are some who assert today that home life is dying out in America, and with it respect of parents. Father deals with the outer life of the family in our modern civilization. He must support the home. To the mother falls the conservation of the home-life. She is the best companion of youth; and her sacrifices are only counterbalanced by the virtues of her children. Beauty and melody should surround her ever.

As Mrs. Browning sang, in one of her latest poems—"What if God has set her here Less for action than for Being?

For the eye and for the ear.

Just to show what beauty may, Just to prove what music can."

It may be that many of the mothers of our readers have passed away, and are now only a sainted memory. Let us endeavor to make some other mother happy today. And if your mother is living, send her a wire—it will cost only a few cents—and tell her that you love her still.

Some day your mother will pass over to the Other Life, and you will miss her tender care sorely. In that day remember the gracious promise of our Heavenly Father, "As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort thee."

"And while my soul retains the power To think upon each faded year,

In every bright and shadowed hour.

My heart shall hold my mother dear."

CABLE LETTER

London, May 8.—(AP)—Shakespeare Inns on a chain system are new aspects of English life that may be introduced in the United States.

American hotel managers, who "did" England on their way to attend the triennial conference of the International Hotel Association, in Paris, were greatly impressed with the picturesque small town inns of this country and talked of trying them out at home, especially at cross roads along the main automobile routes.

"Organize a chain of Shakespeare Inns and I believe the idea would pay," said E. M. Statler, the well known American hotel owner.

"The English country hotels with their odd names are most attractive," said Eric V. Hauser, Multnomah hotel, Portland, Ore.

gon. Leroy Linnard, Fairmont hotel San Francisco, believed the village inns he had seen would make a fortune for any promoter, if they could be lifted intact and set down near almost any American city.

C. W. Smith, hotel Aynonne, Lima, Ohio, thought the Shakespeare Inn at Stratford-on-Avon so impressive that he plans to have something of the kind near his home town, either as a hotel or as a residence for himself after retirement.

"Why don't artists paint Miss 1926?"

This question is raised by E. Easton Taylor in the London Evening News and has appeared repeatedly in other journals within the last few months. Galleries, where modern paintings are shown, display few pictures of girls in the latest fashions. Several portraits of young women in scant clothing have provoked considerable comment, most of it unfavorable, in spite of the excellent reputation of the painters who tried to make the modern flapper into a masterpiece. Older painters, for the most part, say modern fashions are so inartistic it isn't possible to make a discriminating public accept them on canvas.

For the first time in the history of the historic river Thames an annual boat race will take place this year for the Duke of York's international gold trophy.

The course will be over the Putney to Mortlake boat race stretch and six laps will be covered. At present four countries have signified their intention to compete—the United States, Great Britain, France and Canada, and it is hoped that Italy and Germany also will enter. The races are scheduled to begin June 26, England won the trophy in 1924 and 1925, last year's winner being Captain Woolf Barnato, who has again entered.

Paris, May 8.—(AP)—Dancing masters of two of the largest hotels in the city of Nice have barred the Charleston from their floors because they feel that a hotel dining room is no place for a "circus act."

The Charleston was practically unknown on the Riviera until the around the world cruisers began to disembark devotees of the new dance. The dancing masters, despite their evident dislike of the new dance and the loudly voiced disgust of the older generation, could find no reasonable excuse to interfere until an American woman fainted while dancing and had to be carried from the floor. One dancing master then barred the dance, stating that "it appears to be a most dangerous form of pleasure," while others said "it is a gymnasium exercise, not an aesthetic exhibition."

Special matinees at theatres, to allow "the profession" to see a play, are common enough in Paris, but Cahries Dullin, the manager of the Atelier company, which appears at the little Montmartre theatre, has found a new variation.

He has given a matinee for people connected with the press whose duties prevent their going to the theatre in the evening—copy readers, make-up men and linotypers. Over three hundred accepted the manager's invitation to a Saturday afternoon performance of Marcel Archard's "I Don't Love You," which had been running two months.

Berlin, May 8.—(AP)—The late Fritz Ebert, who, starting life as a saddle maker, and then was thrown out of the radical saddle maker's union because of the charge that he had lapsed into conservatism, has posthumously been reelected to membership in the union.

The union resolution, striking from the records all mention of Ebert's expulsion, was passed at the recent saddle makers' convention in Hamburg. It declared among other things, that "in the course of time the union's members have come to regard events of the past revolutionary period in a different light."

The events referred to were President Ebert's declaration of martial law in Saxony and sending federal troops to quell a Communist revolt. The expulsion, coming after Ebert's life-long devotion to the workers cause, hurt him deeply and is regarded as a contributing cause of his death.

Berlin, May 7.—(INS)—Forty thousand marks damages were claimed by Edward Trautmann, Breslau butcher, who had been found guilty of manslaughter, sentenced to twelve years in the penitentiary, and served his full term,

JAPANESE DRY FORCES WARN AGAINST LIQUOR

Tokyo, May 7. (AP)—Failure of the Japanese Diet to pass a bill increasing the juvenile prohibition age limit from 21 to 25 years has been followed by an intensive campaign by the Japanese W. C. T. U. against the use of liquor by minors.

More than 25,000 sets of posters describing the evils of drink and its ill effects on growing boys and girls recently were distributed in the primary schools of Tokyo by the Local Temperance League, a subsidiary of the W. C. T. U.

Principals of all the schools, under the instruction of the Department of Education, delivered lectures warning the students against the liquor habit.

METRODIST CHANCELLOR OF SYRACUSE IN POKES FUN WET, DRY REFERENDUM

Syracuse, N. Y., May 7. (INS)—Chancellor Charles Wesley Flint of Syracuse University says that the "wet and dry" referendum in New York State, is a "political all summer sucker," a "gold brick sold to the wets" or in other words a "simpler much" proposition.

In a lengthy statement, Chancellor Flint, an upholder of Prohibition, is convinced that the Legislature of the Empire State has sold the voters a gold brick which will keep them from asking pertinent questions of candidates for office.
