MEMORIAL DAY EXERCISES HELD THIS MORNING

Address By Hon. F. C. Harding and Dinner for Veterans Were Features of Day's Program

Confederate Memorial Day was fittingly observed here today with a parade and speaking, followed by the annual dinner for the old Confederate Soldiers.

The parade, led by the high school band, and composed of pupils of the high school, troops of boy scouts, members of the United Daughters of Confederacy and the surviving veterans of the sixties formed at the court house and proceeded to Cherry Hill Cemetery where the graves of Confederate Veterans were decorated and brief memorial services held. The procession then returned to the court house where Hon. F. C. Harding, of this city, delivered the annual Memorial Day address.

At the conclusion of the exercises at the court house, the United Daughters of Confederacy were hosts at a dinner for the veterans.

20 Superior Courts Will Be in Session During This Week

Raleigh, May 10.—(AP)—Twenty superior courts will be in session this week in as many North Carolina counties.

Superior court terms opened today in 13 counties: Wilson, Craven, Craven, Franklin, New Hanover, Robeson, Orange, Rockingham, Guilford, Stanley, Yadkin, Mecklenburg and Rutherford.

And in seven counties terms previously begun will continue this week. Beaufort, Bertie, Rowan, Catawba, Buncombe, Haywood, and McDowell, are the latter, seven.

The new terms in three counties—Chatham, New Hanover, and Mecklenburg—are criminal. Each of them is for one week.

Civil terms are those in Craven, Robeson, Orange, Guilford, Stanley and Yadkin. The terms in Robeson, Guilford and Yadkin are for two weeks each, while those in Craven, Orange and Stanley are one week terms.

The Wilson term is for two weeks, the first week to be devoted to the criminal docket, and the second to civil cases. Judge Thomas H. Calvert, of Raleigh, will preside.

The mixed terms are those in Franklin, Rockingham and Rutherford, the first two for one week each, and that in Rutherford for two weeks.

By virtue of the exchange of Judges J. L. Webb, of Shelby, and A. M. Stack, of Monroe, Judge Webb will preside in Rutherford and Judge Stack in Rockingham. Another exchange places Judge Thomas J. Shaw, of Greenville, in his home county and Judge T. B. Finley, of North Wilkesboro, in Yadkin county.

Judge W. F. Harding, of Charlotte, will hold court in his home county of Mecklenburg, as a result of having exchanged with Judge P. A. McElroy, of Marshall, all, who are appearing on the court calendar as presiding judge this week in Mecklenburg.

The court in Chatham will be held by Judge N. A. Sinclair, of Fayetteville; that in Craven by Judge W. A. Devin, of Oxford, and the Franklin term by Judge M. V. Barnhill, of Rocky Mount.

Judge G. E. Midyette, of Jacksonville, will hold court in New Hanover; Judge F. A. Daniels, of Goldsboro, goes to Robeson; in Orange, Judge Romulus A. Nunn, of New Bern, will preside; and the Stanley term will be held by Judge Michael Schenck, of Hendersonville.

MR. J. J. COREY DIES FOLLOWING A LONG ILLNESS

Funeral Services Conducted Sunday With Interment Taking Place in Allen's Burying Ground

Mr. Joseph J. Corey, 62, died Saturday night at 7 o'clock, at his home on Evans street, following a long illness. Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon by Rev. D. A. Windham, assisted by Rev. W. S. Harden. Interment took place in the Allen burying ground with services at the grave being in charge of the Withlacoochee Tribe of Red Men, of which the deceased was a chartered member.

Mr. Corey was born in this county on September 8, 1864. He was well-known throughout the county and possessed a large number of friends. He was a member of the Universalist Church and attended its services as long as health permitted. His wife died about three months ago.

182 Students Enrolled Training School Lay Workers

Chattanooga, Tenn., May 10.—(AP)—One hundred and eighty-two students were enrolled in the training school for lay workers of the Presbyterian church in the United States during the school year 1925-26, according to the annual report of the board of trustees of the institution, to be presented at the general assembly of the church in Pensacola May 20, and made public here today.

The various students enrolled at the school, which is located at Richmond, Va., are listed in the report as follows:

Seniors, 52; juniors, 75; electives, 7; summer school, 18.

The students came from the following 27 states and countries:

Arkansas, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, District of Columbia, Africa, Brazil, Canada, China, Japan, Korea, Mexico, and Porto Rico.

"There is a growing demand for our graduates," declares the report. "There is an especial demand for those who have personality, a good educational background, and real promise of usefulness as Christian workers."

Forty Killed, 189 Injured During Week

Forty persons were killed and 189 injured in the week ended last night in traffic accidents, it was shown today in a survey of eleven southern states made by the Associated Press.

Florida and Tennessee occupied the head of the list of states in the number killed with eight each. Georgia led in the number of injured with 47.

North Carolina reported seven killed and eight injured.

20,000 Women Will Visit Atlantic City for Meeting

Atlantic City, May 10.—(INS)—Between 15,000 and 20,000 women are expected to gather here May 24-June 4 for what is expected to be the largest convention ever held by the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Women from every state and from half a dozen foreign countries will attend and take part in proceedings of which the American Home is to be the keynote.

Presided over by Mrs. John D. Sherman of Estes Park, Colo., and Washington, D. C., outstanding woman leader, sessions will be addressed by experts in all lines of thought and by many of the best known authorities in this country.

Three sessions will be held daily in Atlantic City's great auditorium. The State Federations of New Jersey and Pennsylvania are to serve as joint hostesses.

Mrs. Thomas A. Edison is among the honorary hostesses, and wives of the governors of the two hostess states and wife of the mayor of Atlantic City will assist in official capacity. Chalfonte-Haddon Hall will be headquarters for Mrs. Sherman and her board of directors, who will hold a pre-convention session.

Following up a national survey launched by Mrs. Sherman through the Department of the American Home in co-operation with government agencies and now in process of being completed, the clubwomen are expected to initiate a nationwide campaign for both urban and rural home betterment and to take action on all problems affecting home life and therefore citizenship.

MEMORIAL DAY SPEED CLASSIC NOW UNDER WAY

Sixteen Daredevil Drivers Roar Away in Start of Annual Automobile Race at Charlotte

Charlotte, May 10.—(AP)—Sixteen automobile races of American roared away at 2:05 this afternoon on the 2.5 mile championship drive here.

Harry Hartz was the first to cross the starting line and he others followed in quick succession around the mile and one quarter pine hill. Many thousands were on hand to see the Confederate Memorial Day race, while other thousands still were passing thru the turn stiles and it appeared that the attendance would pass the record of approximately 40,000 which attended last May.

Ralph Hepburn was the first to retire when he stopped at the eighth lap and turned over his car to De Paola, who had exchanged with him prior to the start. De Paola lost only a few seconds in changing cars. Hepburn's entrance had been doubtful until the last minute as he suffered an injury to his eye several days ago tending up for the race.

Poland and Russian Roumanian Treaty

Moscow, May 10.—(INS)—Confirmation received here of the fact that the recent Polish-Roumanian pact contained a clause guaranteeing the borders of the two countries and thus assuring Polish help for Roumanian retention of Bessarabia has definitely ended the conversations which had been carried on between Poland and the Soviet Union with a view to closer rapprochement and a trade treaty between the two countries.

According to a high foreign office official here, the chances for stock up liberally with 'extra dry' good, but have now faded completely out of the picture. The Soviet Foreign Office regarded the report of a Polish guarantee of Bessarabia with some scepticism at first, since it was not clear what a advantage Poland would receive in return for so hazardous an undertaking. Now, although the motive of Poland is not clearly apprehended here, the facts are considered definite.

TROOPS NOT TO BE USED FIGHT FOREST FIRES

Thunder Showers in Western Part of the State Give Forest Fire Fighters Brief Rest

Raleigh, May 10.—(AP)—Federal troops probably will not be sent to Western North Carolina to combat the forest fires that have raged there, in view of telegrams received here by Governor McLean.

One is from D. S. Elias, of Asheville, who had previously requested Mr. McLean to ask the Secretary of War to send troops to the fire area. Mr. Elias now believes the 'forest fires are under control.'

The other one is from Secretary of War Davis, to the effect that troops will not be sent to the area in view of a report from the Department of Agriculture representative sent to the scene of the fire to the effect that 'the crisis has passed.'

The War Department would have no authority to send troops to fight the forest fires except upon request of the Secretary of Agriculture, and 'when serious or emergency is such that local means of combating fire are inadequate and loss of life appears eminent or threatened destruction of forest property disastrous,' the governor was advised.

TODAY (Copyright 1926) A World Court Lesson. No Good News, No Knives, Pistols, Bombs, Saklatvala, the Parsee. By ARTHUR BRISBANE

Another lesson for the World Court idea. Senator McKinley, who favored putting this country into the World Court, League of Nations back door, was defeated for renomination in Illinois by the biggest vote ever cast at a primary in that state. Senator Watson of Indiana, also Republican, who voted AGAINST the World Court, now carries Indiana, in the state's biggest Republican victory.

The people want Coolidge, but don't want the World Court, and they knew that, before these semi-revolutionary troubles in Britain, and before Kemal, of the Turks, invited Italy and the whole world to come on and fight.

Uncle Sam was to have accepted the mandate for Turkey, under the League of Nations, Woodrow Wilson scheme, you remember.

No one knows what will come of Europe's troubles, or what kind of World Court might be the outcome. But we do know that the court would be ten to one against us, in the sincere conviction, that whatever happened, we ought to pay the bill. And where there's a will, there's a way.

The President and all Republicans may thank Secretary Work for his effective trip through California and Arizona. He made clear the administration's sincere interest in the Boulder Dam project, and its determination to put it through.

The West feels that Calvin Coolidge will build the dam, and it will show appreciation in 1928. If Mr. Hughes had had in California such an advance agent as Mr. Work, Woodrow Wilson would have missed one term, and history might have been changed considerably. Europe, perhaps, would owe us less money.

No better news from England, except that the Government is said to have conferred, unofficially, with Thomas, head of the railway unions that have tied up the country. Baldwin says "no conference, until the strike is called off." The latest is a threat to call out engineers and firemen from all ships, cutting off Britain from outside food supplies. Let union men must eat that probably would not last.

Other countries could send ships and food, but many would be afraid of the effect on their own workmen. Europe's workers are closely united in the conviction that labor is right and should rule.

Here capital, and 'things as they are' are protected by lack of homogeneity of race language, and beliefs.

Five million strikers in Britain, means five million Britishers all speaking the same tongue and thinking about the same thoughts from birth. There could be no such unanimity here, where locomotive engineers, for instance, have refused to back other railroad men on strike. Any attempt at a nation-wide labor movement here would construct a house divided against itself.

Great Britain's enemies, will be disappointed if they expect this so-called British 'revolution' to develop the horrors of other revolutions. The British do not use knives or pistols, and as for bombs, British labor like British capital, looks upon them with horror.

And professional bomb experts from Russia and other parts of the continent, that have always found a refuge in England where political opinion, not made a crime, will hesitate to close up that sanctuary.

Mr. Saklatvala, parsee gentleman from India recently barred from this country, for communistic agitation in London, is much less important than some correspondents think him. But in his native India, ruled by Britishers, thousands of miles away, where one hundred thousand Englishmen hold down three hundred million Hindus and Mohammedans, THE THOU-

ENGLAND ENTERS SECOND WEEK OF GENERAL STRIKE

Troops Used in London to Transport Supplies; Forty Persons Hurt in Rioting Saturday Night

London, May 10.—(AP)—An official Government Communique issued tonight says the country is quiet with few disturbances, but that where these occurred they threatened to become sharper. The police are in full control of the situation.

London, May 10.—(AP)—Great Britain today entered the second week of the general strike with peace apparently as far off as ever and with the Government making increased use of military forces to assure the food supplies.

The outstanding development of the week end was the successful conveying of food trucks by cavalry and armored cars from the Victoria Dock to the distributing centers in Hyde Park.

The strikers' newspapers denounced this use of troops as 'reactionary and unnecessary' and said it was 'done to create belief that the strike has reached violence, revolutionary aims.'

The Government in a statement at noon today said introduction of the military conveyers insured ample food supplies for London. The military demonstrations of the last few days, it was considered, have greatly disheartened the Trade Union Congress and have created the deepest impression among the population of London's Dockland.

The Government spokesman in his noon statement said the general situation of the country after the country after the week end was quiet, the most serious trouble thus far reported being the attack last night on a bus operated in London in which 40 persons were injured. A police sergeant was also struck with a hammer and a special constable was stabbed in the back. Most of London suburban railways are providing skeleton services, and it is said the volunteer workers are exceeding the demands of the present time.

The Government steps to maintain order and to include the parking over in South London District of a number of heavy tanks with a detachment of guards in steel helmets and full equipment ready to move at a moment's notice.

London, May 10.—(AP)—The most serious disturbances, thus far in the general strike so far as casualties are concerned, occurred last night in London when a crowd attacked a bus, manned by volunteers. A Government spokesman said today that 40 persons were sent to hospital, and a number of arrests were made.

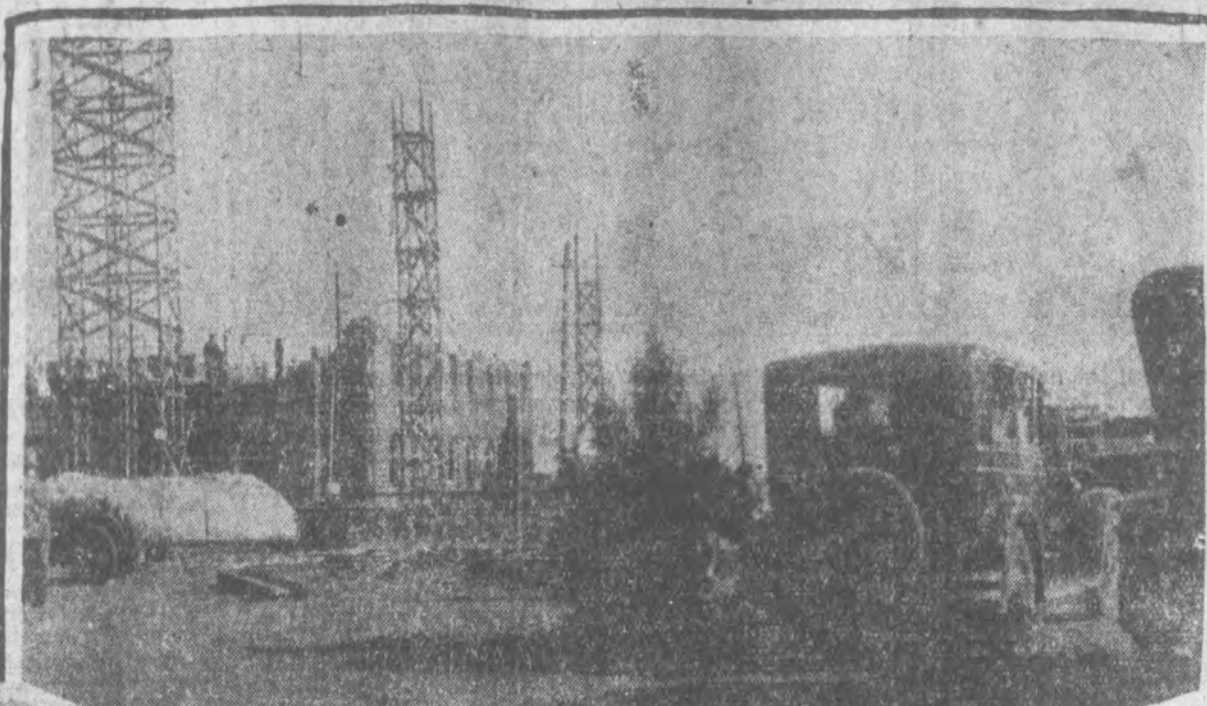

WEARERS OF THE GREY

While the gathering of the Old Soldiers here today was again an inspiration scene, bringing to memory those deeds of valor of sixty years ago, the fewness of the numbers touches a spot in the hearts of all and brings forth the realization that as the years speed past the Confederate Veteran is passing from existence and soon there will be only memories and historical records to bring to mind the days of the "Sixties."

The part these now bent figures played in the building of the great South and the nation can well be imagined through perusal of accurate history of the various localities. They fought for a cause which they thought to be right and just and it is fitting that on this day each year we should pay homage to those who fell in the cause and those who still remain to live over again and again the memories of those eventful days under Lee and Jackson.

Conditions have altogether changed since the day when these loyal sons of the South withdrew from the Union and took up arms against their brothers of the North. In the intervening years of reconstruction and industry in the South the once existing enmity has gradually been forgotten and as the ranks of the grey grow thinner each year so is the memory of the cause which prompted the fray buried in the archives of the dead.

We love these old veterans, who fought for a cause they thought was right and the people of the South pay homage to them each succeeding year, thankful that they have been preserved as living memorials to the bloody conflict that bound together forever the states of our great country.

BYRD AT THE NORTH POLE

In any assemblage the world over the name of Lieutenant Commander Richard Evelyn Byrd, Jr., today is a magic one. It recalls an intrepidity of spirit and reflects a glamor of romance that belong to the epics of the ages. The story the cables carried yesterday was epoch-making. It heralded man's mastery of the air. It told of pioneering that was at once unique and successful. It revealed an Anglo-Saxon and a Virginian who had lived up to the best traditions of his race.

Years before Byrd Peary had reached the North Pole blazing a difficult trail in Arctic exploration. Dr. Cook

aid claim to the distinction, but was discredited by scientists. It may be that he missed only by a hair's breadth the exhilaration of "sitting on top of the world." Amundsen recently came with a few miles of reaching the farthest North. In each of these cases, however, the element of romance was at a comparatively low ebb. The explorers of other days depended upon time-worn means to attain their ambition.

Not so with Commander Byrd. He was a splendid dreamer. There came to him a vision of flying across unknown wastes, into the teeth of an unfriendly atmosphere, to hover over the earth's northernmost point. That dream has come true. Today Commander Byrd stands alone among the aviators of the world. He has accomplished what others regarded as impracticably imaginary. Once more a Virginian is the pre-eminent pioneer.

The story of Commander Byrd's successful flight thrills a world. It is an epic of these times. Nowhere does it stir the heart as it does in the capital of Virginia. Here are the boyhood friends of Dick Byrd. Here is his own mother, who waited with peculiar anxiety of mothers for word of her boy from the far North. Here are his devoted brothers, one of them Governor of the State. It may be said that Richmond was the center of interest in this uniquely romantic expedition, and Richmond today stands proudly before the world in the reflected glory of a lionhearted Virginian.

To the far corners of the earth men regard with wonderment the intrepid spirit of Commander Byrd. They marvel at the courage that carried him, fearless, into the face of danger he could not combat, except with his peculiar knowledge of Arctic conditions. Virginians, however, did not wonder at the thing the aviator had braved. They knew the Byrds. Here the prevailing sentiment was that of the commander's mother, who said she knew in her heart that the flight had been successful, because she knew Dick could not fail.

Commander Byrd has added nothing to the domains of the United States. He may not have made a great contribution to science. But, in the revelation of intrepidity "above and beyond the call of duty," he has shown once again that he is the same Dick Byrd of other days and he has written a brilliant chapter into the history of Anglo-Saxon pioneering. — Richmond Times Dispatch.

GERMANY TRYING TO RE-ESTABLISH PRE-WAR TRADE

U. S. Government Advised of the Strenuous Effort Being Made to Build Teutonic World Commerce to Old Magnitude

Washington, May 10.—(INS)—The German government is sparing no pains to win back the country's foreign trade, according to advice to the Department of Commerce from Assistant Commercial Attaché Douglas Miller, at Berlin. "Its activity in this direction is carried on largely by the Foreign Office, and in expanding in this service great attention has been paid to the policy of the American Government, the Foreign Office working in many cases along the American lines," Miller said.

In spite of the depression just now affecting German business, there is an increase spirit of confidence noticeable in all branches of industry and trade, according to Mr. Miller.

The average person in Germany seems to feel that the worst of the crisis has been experienced and that there is only one turn for conditions to take—that is toward gradual improvement.

"There is no doubt," Miller continued, "that the weeding out of capital from uneconomic enterprises, the discharge of superfluous workmen and the reduction of wholesale prices by about 7 per cent in the last six months have put German industry in a more competitive basis for gaining a larger export trade."

The government has increased heavily its budget item for the promotion of Germany's foreign political and commercial relations. Another government attempt to increase export trade takes the form of reducing the tax burden laid upon German business. In the 1926-1927 budget, Miller said, the turnover tax will be cut from 1 per cent to .75 per cent, and the luxury sales tax on certain articles will be abolished altogether. The Reichsbank discount rate has been reduced from 8 to 7 per cent and a further reduction is believed to be in prospect.

"When the provisions of the Versailles treaty relative to special customs treatment of the goods of certain nations were no longer to be applied, the German government immediately entered upon negotiations of important commercial treaties," Miller said.

"Last year agreements were concluded with the United States, Great Britain, Italy, Belgium, Spain and Russia. Although no treaty has yet been signed with France, there is a provisional agreement between the two countries providing for mutual favorable rates on certain important products of both parties."

In addition to this indirect support the German government is preparing to set aside 10,000,000 marks from the funds devoted to unemployment relief. This money will be used to reimburse exporters who have suffered losses through non-payment by their foreign customers. The government is to assume one-third of the risk in normal cases and two-thirds in sales to countries where business is being done at special risk. This is a form of government export insurance somewhat similar to the trade facilities act put into effect

in Great Britain sometime ago."

The German government has announced its intention to give a guaranty on about one-third of the value of the Russian purchases of German agricultural implements and machinery. The amount of the guaranty is about \$75,000,000. Credits are to be extended up to four years in the case of installation of heavy machinery and two years in other cases.

Recently a bank credit of 75,000,000 marks was granted to the Soviet government by the Deutsche Bank and the Berliner Handelsgesellschaft, with the approval of the German government, the money being used for the purchase of machinery in Germany. The first quarter of the loan has been repaid.

Miller added: "Another aid to exports has been the import drawback system, which has allowed grain exporters in eastern Germany to receive import permits for the introduction of equal quantities of grain duty free into western Germany. This practice greatly stimulated grain exports from East Prussia and the district around the Oder, and acts as a sort of export bounty on grain."

Miller pointed out that it is necessary for Germany to increase its foreign sales, not only to pay for indispensable food imports but to compensate for the loss of invisible exports of pre-war. Furthermore, the export balance must be sufficient to carry the reparations payment under the Dawes plan.

NEW MISSOURI NATIONAL MILITARY PARK TO SHOW HOW ARMIES FOUGHT

St. Louis, May 10.—(INS)—The valor of the man of the Southwest on the Westport, Missouri, battlefield, where Southern armies made their last supreme effort in the trans-Mississippi territory during the Civil War, would be memorial-

ized by the establishment of the Westport National Military Park if the Senate's action in authorizing a \$600,000 appropriation for the purpose is followed by the House and President Coolidge.

A bill has been prepared for introduction in Congress providing for all states having troops in the battle to mark the lines of battle of the troops on the grounds of the new park.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

London, May 10.—(INS)—A vision of the world twenty-four years hence is provided by Professor E. E. Fournier D'Albe, the world famous scientist, physicist and publicist, in an absorbing article in the Observer here.

Metaphorically speaking, the globe is shrinking daily with the increasing advent of new speed

records by airplanes and automobiles, by the ever growing use of radio, and the tremendous possibilities of television, according to the professor.

"A score of years has sufficed to give us the automobile, the airplane and the oil driven liner. What new marvels will the next generation bring forth?" asks the professor, who then proceeds to try and supply the answer.

"The world of 1950 will have more light than the world of today," he writes. "And not only will our nights be brighter, but the light will be more agreeable to the eye."

"The time will come when artificial light will spring from the walls and ceilings themselves, and when its color and tints will be controlled by switches to match

the complexions and dresses of the festive company.

"Radio broadcasting has covered the globe like an avalanche. Two or three years have sufficed to bring this new form of publicity into universal operation. Who can gauge its tremendous potentialities? Already the new educational and artistic stimulus has influenced and molded the younger generation in a manner unapproached by the schools, while countless homes have been brightened and cheered by entertainments formerly beyond their reach. A powerful transmitting station can make its voice heard throughout the earth, and such are the marvelous complexities of this new power.....that one trembles to think what might happen if this new resource were turned to unworthy use."

"Much work will have to be done before the different wavelengths are sorted out and allocated, and many national ambitions and jealousies may have to be appeased and reconciled. But when that is done the race will enter upon a rich heritage. Mankind will have provided itself with 10,000 tongues and 10,000,000 ears, each of a world wide range."

"Nor will this be the end, for the world-war will be matched within the world-eye, and television will bring the most distant happenings within range of our eyes. Already we have in England, France and America, the first beginnings of this achievement.....The solution of the problem involves a new union between two branches of science, both fraught with endless possibilities, and both growing in strength and recourse every day."

"Their marriage will be fruitful of more things than television for many invisible things will be made manifest, ranging from the germ of cancer to those invisible clouds and air pockets which the eye cannot see."

"One of the most far-reaching changes will be the disappearance of medicine as a specialized craft. When the laws of health are taught in all the schools, when the action of the really few 'specific' drugs is common property, and when every adult can tell the symptoms of ordinary ailments, the calling of the medical practitioner will have to be come obsolete. His only remaining function will be to attend us at birth and death.....Medicine will be dead by 1950."

"Surgery, on the other hand, will be gloriously alive. It will have added prodigiously to its triumphs.....Surgery can never be democratized, since it is a matter of individual skill, which can only be acquired by specializing in its processes and operations."

"The progress of chemistry and physics will be eclipsed by that of biology, the science of life. The practice of eugenics and the sterilization of the mentally unfit will tend to level up the population towards the standard of the Aristol, the best of our people....."

"Soon it will be possible to trace parentage and ancestry faultlessly by means of blood tests. This may seem an innocent amusement for the researcher, but its social significance can hardly be exaggerated."

"The year 1950 may not bring us to Utopia, but we shall be well on the way. It will be a gate opening upon yet fairer visions."
