

D. O. K. K. TAKES GREENVILLE BY STORM

GREAT BRITAIN'S
STRIKE CONTINUES
FUNCTION TODAY

Although the General Strike is Theoretically Over Many Unions Continue to Stand Out

London, May 13.—(AP)—Great Britain's general strike theoretically is over, but practically is still continuing to function this morning more or less as it has for the last nine days.

Throughout the country there is a disposition thus far on the part of many Unions to stand out. There are various reasons for this. Among them are the men's desire in some instances to take advantage of the strike to exact better terms of employment; sympathy with the miners who are still on strike; refusal of some employers to discharge volunteer workers to make room for the old employees, and the edict issued by other employees that they will not take back the workers until they have torn up their Union cards.

This situation is possible, because the Trades Union Congress in calling off the general strike, issued orders that the men are not to return to work pending instructions from their individual unions.

Comment was heard today that it was far easier to start a general strike than to halt one. There was some improvement in conditions this morning, but the citizens who retired last night with the thought that his troubles were ended, was amazed today to find that he still had to walk to work and endure other inconveniences. The authorities predicted that these would begin to right themselves forthwith although it would take considerable time before conditions approached anything like normal.

As far as the miners are concerned their strike against lower wages and longer hours continues and nothing is expected to develop before their national meeting of delegates probably later this week.

One of the first visible indications to the public that the general strike has ended should be the re-appearance of the news papers. Only two London papers were able to issue in their usual form today.

In view of the happenings of recent days there is a movement in some newspaper headquarters against the employment of Union printers in the future. How far this movement will succeed cannot be predicted, but the owners of a group of four prominent Glasgow papers already have announced that in the future they will hire only non-Union labor.

There are indications that the leaders of the miners are angry at the council of Trade Union Congress for accepting the Samuel memorandum calling off the general strike on the basis that negotiations would be undertaken on the strength of this memorandum.

Some of them bitterly criticized the Trades Union Congress action as a betrayal of the miners. It is even said that some of the miners' leaders urged the cutting loose from the Trade Union Congress.

An official of the railway men's union said today that in view of the difficulties surrounding the reinstatement of strikers, the executives of three of the railway unions have called up all railway men to continue the strike until they have received satisfactory assurances from their employers.

BALKAN POLITICS
IN UPROAR OVER
THREATS OF WAR

Reported Military Plans of Italy and Greece Seen as Menace to Turks

Sofia, May 13.—(HNS)—Balkan political circles are greatly worried as a result of the recent war-like talk and reported military preparations of Italy and Greece. It is generally believed that an "understanding" has been arrived at between the two countries in furtherance of the Greek desire to oust Turkish sovereignty from Thrace and the ambition of Italy to obtain possession of the long-coveted Smyrna vilayet.

Politicians think that such a movement as that described above would at once affect the whole of the Balkan States by virtue of their geographical position, and it is also regarded as doubtful that they would remain passive in the face of such trouble in the southern part of the Peninsula.

All agree that an attack on Thrace by Greek forces would create a first-class political imbroglio, the results of which none dare to foresee or gauge. In some quarters the position is likened to that of twelve years ago, when the attack on the Austrian Arch Duke at Sarajevo precipitated the World War.

The smallest incident in the heated atmosphere now prevailing in the Balkans may be the signal for a huge conflict. The prevailing anxiety and uncertainty is reflected in the Balkan financial and economic situation, which in consequence of all these forebodings is very bad. Bills by the thousand remain unredempted, and all sides predict an even worse situation and a financial crisis unless the situation improves.

In Roumania the Lei has depreciated to a great extent, while in Bulgaria there is a financial depression almost unparalleled in the history of the country with business laboring under a depressing money deadlock. The Bulgarian Government is being urged to petition the League of Nations to abolish or diminish the Bulgarian indemnity payments in order to save the country from utter financial collapse.

It is reported here that Greece has mobilized six classes of recruits, and is refitting and arming her Navy in conjunction with Italian military preparations.

MacDonald Opens
Debate on Strike
Situation Today

London, May 13.—(AP)—Opening the debate in the House of Commons on the strike situation former Premier Ramsay MacDonald, the Parliamentary Labor leader, said more men were out today than yesterday. This was because the employers had proposed terms that would make it impossible to continue industry under peaceful conditions.

Mr. MacDonald said that if any attempt were made to smash the miners' leaders, it would be a foolish person in this country thought that after the strike he could scrape the face of the Trade Unionists in the dust. He was very much mistaken.

W. H. Hearst discussing the British strike says: "The cost of the general strike to the nation would buy the coal mines every day, and only the dullest, most selfish exponent of a conservatism that is dead and buried would hold his prejudice against public ownership of more importance than the disaster to the nation which public operation of coal mines would avert."

In our Civil War, to have bought and freed the slaves would have cost much less than fighting about them, and the South instead of being ruined for years, would have built prosperity with the proceeds of the sale. But unfortunately it is in human nature to fight as long as you can, and settle on a common sense basis only when you must.

Socialists, and others who urge and foster "class consciousness," want the class at the bottom to realize that it is at the bottom and unite to get up higher, or at least pull down the toe.

Britain shows how class consciousness works, at least in the beginning.

The British upper class always "class conscious" has felt that it was the nation, and to a large extent, it was. The upper class of intelligence invented modern machinery. The working class united to smash the machines, and they had to be hidden in forts. The working class knows now that machinery has doubled and tripled wages, even if it doesn't make things perfect.

In the British situation, class consciousness causes those at the top to prevent what they feel to be stupid activity by a mob that should carefully "take what it gets."

These at the bottom mistrust the upper class consciousness quickly becomes class hatred.

It is not a pleasant situation, but good will come of it.

First of all, when they get over this trouble, and resume control of the nation, as they will, the men of intelligence and power will work to make the nation independent of coal, and the mine owners will find themselves owners of coal that won't sell for what it cost to dig.

Buying up oil territory everywhere, Britain has already started her emancipation from coal power. Development of water will complete the job.

If the British Government had completed development of the power of the tides at the mouth of the Severn that one enterprise would now supply light and power to the six biggest cities in England.

Both top and bottom British class conscious groups may find a surprise they won't like coming out of this strike. Intensive development of automatic machinery to take the place of human hands—machinery cannot strike—will worry labor. And compulsory experiment with government management and government ownership will worry the ruling power of organized capital, which has for its golden rule, "the people cannot do anything for themselves."

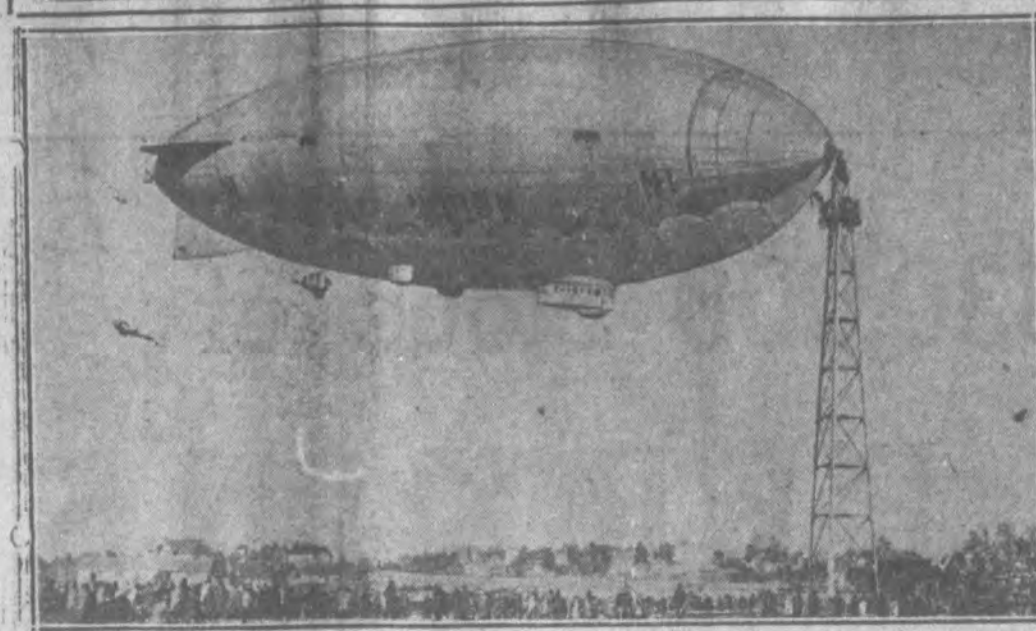
Contrast Henry Ford's methods with British coal mines where men are nothing, the aristocratic owner never seeing the inside of a mine, or the face of a miner.

Only a few years since, English women, working in shafts too long even for mules or donkeys, dragged out the little coal carts, slowly, painfully creeping on their hands and knees. A strap or chain around the neck, passing under the breast, was fastened to the car behind them.

And not long ago a regular business in England was starving little boys that they might remain small enough to go down narrow chimneys and clean them, they were beaten if caught secretly eating. They died young, but the mothers provided plenty more.

Summer time is typhoid time. For the past several years typhoid fever has been on the wane in Pitt county, but there are still too many cases. In 1924 there were 100 cases in Pitt county. In 1925 there were forty cases. In each case we found that they had never taken the treatment which is practically a sure preventive. Of course, one must observe sanitary rules and be careful about eating and drinking places which are unsanitary, and drinking water from open wells.

In order to give each person an opportunity to take the treatment, clinics have been and will be arranged in various parts of the county to give treatment. You can get the treatment from your doctor or at the Health Office on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Take the treatment before you go on your vacation. You might have to drink water, the purity of which you are not sure. See your doctor or come to the Health Office.

We have arranged a clinic to begin in the Greenville schools on Friday, May 14th. Pitt Co. Health Dept.

Revelation of Earth's
Last Territory Depen
Men Aboard Norge

New York, May 13.—(AP)—Revelation of the earth's last great territory today depended on the seventeen men bound for Nome, Alaska, aboard the dirigible Norge. Roald Amundsen, commander of the vessel, announced before his departure from Spitzbergen on Monday in an attempt to sail over the Pole and go from Norway to Alaska that if any land were found in the million square miles of unexplored area between Alaska and the Pole he would claim it for his native Norway and might cruise over it. The Norge was expected at Point Barrow at 8 o'clock last night Eastern Standard Time, provided it did not deviate from its course for exploration purposes.

A radio message to Rome from Commander Nobile, designer and pilot of the Norge, said that when observations of the sun's rays through a mist indicated the ship was over the Pole it descended close to the ice fields. A brilliant ray of sun light made the ice glimmer like a mass of jags. The temperature was ten and four tenths degrees Fahrenheit.

Five flags were dropped, one American, one Norwegian and three Italian. This partly in view of Perry's prior claim of the Pole for the United States had less significance than Amundsen's plan for dropping a flag on any land further south as an air base of inestimable value connecting Europe, Asia, and North America.

Olso, Norway, May 13.—(AP)—Latest reports received here say the Polar dirigible Norge will arrive in Nome, Alaska, at nine o'clock tonight. The airship was cited off Point Barrow early this morning. All on board are well.

Nome, Alaska, May 13.—(AP)—11:30 P. M.—The dirigible Norge has not reached Nome up to this hour. Owing to the difference in time it was 5:30 A. M. May 13, Eastern Standard Time, when the forthcoming dispatch was filed.

The gathering is one of the largest of a fraternal nature ever before entertained in Greenville, and the public did their part in helping entertain the large number of visitors.

The program got well under way at eight o'clock this morning with registration of candidates at the Pythian club rooms. After registration was completed the Dokies fell in line in front of the Pythian club rooms and paraded through the principal streets of the city. The parade was headed by the Dokie band and the degree team of Zeta Temple, Rocky Mount, followed by visitors and candidates.

After completing the program at the warehouse the Dokies will go to the Co-operative warehouse where a banquet will be served. London, May 13.—(AP)—The Trades Union Congress has no alternative but to resist to the utmost "any attempt to impose humiliating terms on the workers." A statement to this effect was issued by the Trades Union Congress today after a special meeting called to consider the failure of employers to re-engage workers throughout the country.

"Our resisting power is unimpaired," the statement continued. "We cannot tolerate the imposition of conditions designed to destroy Trade Unionism. Peace without vindictiveness is impossible unless the attacks are ended immediately. The workers will not surrender their hard earned gains."

SETTLING THEIR OWN DISPUTES

Only a few hours before
Great Britain found its way
out of the general strike
which had all but rent it
asunder, the United States
Senate passed a measure
which promises to go far in
making impossible or at
least improbable, such a
labor upheaval in this coun-
try. Perhaps many of the
Senators who voted for the
Watson-Parker bill had in
their minds the terrific or-
deal through which Great
Britain was passing and were
influenced by the hope that
their action would make in-
dustrial peace more certain
here. The Watson-Parker
bill, which provides for the
voluntary settlement of rail-
way labor disputes, already
had passed the House and
it now goes to the President.

The White House has made
it clear that it is not an ad-
ministration measure but
there is no indication that
the President will refuse to
sign it.

Under the terms of the
Watson-Parker bill the Rail-
road Labor Board is abol-
ished, the Newlands law,
which provided for mediat-
ion, conciliation and orbi-
tration, is repealed, and new
machinery is set up for the
settlement of differences be-
tween the railroads and
their employees. The Rail-
road Labor Board, from
which so much good was
expected, had proved almost
totally inefficient, due large-
ly to the fact that by a rul-
ing of the Supreme Court
it had been denied the pow-
er to enforce its decrees and
so was left all but helpless.
The new peace machinery
comprises a board of ad-
justment, appointed by the
railroads and their employ-
ees, a board of mediation
to be appointed by the Pres-
ident for a term of five
years, a board of arbitra-
tion for the adjudication of
individual differences, and
an emergency board to be
named by the President in
case all other means fails
to settle any dispute which
may threaten interstate
commerce. All amendments
to the measure were defeat-
ed overwhelmingly and it
went through the Senate
practically as it had been

written by the railroads and
the railroad workers. The
vote by which it passed—
59 to 13—is evidence of the
confidence the Senate had
in its soundness as an in-
dustrial peace measure. Ob-
jection had been raised on
the point that no provision
had been made for public
representation and that
without this check the meas-
ure might mean higher
wages and higher rates.
There need be little appre-
hension on that score for,
while the Interstate Com-
merce Commission has been
denied the right to review
of its own volition any de-
cision or dispute between
the railroad workers and
their employers, it still will
function effectively should
the public interest be threat-
ened by unjust rates and
upon higher rates naturally
higher wages would depend.

It was a memorable day
in the history of American
capital and labor when the
rail carriers and their em-
ployees joined hands for
the peaceful settlement of
their own differences. It is
a treaty of peace now rat-
ified by the Congress, which
eventually removes the
threat that 3,000,000 rail-
road workers might some
day quit their posts to en-
force a labor demand. While
it is not an absolute guar-
anty against strikes the pro-
cesses set up for settlement
remove them from the
field of probability. And
without the railway work-
ers no general strike like
the one which threatened
to paralyze Great Britain
can menace America.—
Richmond Times Dispatch.

TAXATION GOVERNS FUTURE FORESTS

Forty years ago President
Cleveland admonished the
national to pause and con-
sider the future of its tim-
ber. Every President since
then has had something to
say about preserving the
forests. If the forests were
suddenly wiped out, our
land would be uninhabita-
ble. No substitution can be
made for the forests.

Vegetation and timber
growth are essential to the
storage of water. They hold
moisture in a natural reser-
voir and allow it to run off
gradually. Thus, they pre-
vent periodical floods and
dry periods.

"It is essential that our
watersheds be protected
not alone by sane and eco-
nomic logging practices, but
also by a well developed
and farsighted planting
program," says the Aber-
deen, Washington, Daily
World. "Cutover lands must
be replenished and protect-
ed. Fire destroys the young
growth, and burns out the
natural elements in the soil
which are necessary to the
growing trees and vegeta-
tion."

The burden of taxation
causes many timberland
owners to cut forests which
they would rather hold—
but if they held them pres-
ent tax laws their value
would be confiscated in tax
payments.

Also, many owners of cut-
over land would like to hold
it with young growing trees
on it, or replant it; but with
heavy annual taxes this is
impossible, for its entire
value is wiped out in tax
payments.
For this reason it is im-
perative that a taxation
method be worked out,
which permits a tax pay-
ment when the timber is
marketed, and not contin-
uously while it is growing.

BUFFALO MAYOR TELLS LONDON OF HOTEL DE GINK

Schwab Urges British to Build Beggars' Hostelry to Aid the Unfortunates

Buffalo, N. Y., May 13.—(INS)—Mayor F. N. Schwab, of Buffalo, thinks London needs a Hotel de Gink.

The institution of that name, which he founded in Buffalo, was described by Schwab to London municipal authorities, and he has urged the establishment of at least one beggar's hotel there as an experiment.

Mayor Schwab went to England with a group of American hotel proprietors, but the do tuxo dinners and flashy streets of the West End didn't attract him as much as London's dark and dismal by-ways, which he took the trouble to investigate before suggesting that London should allow Buffalo's method of looking after the down-and-outers.

"If all classes of crooks were helped out of their difficulties before they had slipped too far," Mayor Schwab said in a statement explaining how he would "clean up Britain" "a large percentage would become good, honest, law-abiding British citizens. They should not be condemned and cast out for their first little sin."

Make life worth while for the down-and-out. Cut out the stigma of the workhouse. Let thieves and dope-fiends and street women feel that there is hope for redemption.

Every crook knows it is best to act on the square. "Give them that chance."

"Society bewails the fact that crooks are getting more desperate and reckless. People who do not think talk wildly of revolution and strikes are threatened with exasperating frequency. I am convinced the whole trouble is caused by discontent."

"I would say to England—gather your wealthy people together and say: 'What are you going to do about it? Help a man before he has gone far enough to become a cat burglar and steal your pearls.'"

Schwab said if a Hotel de Gink is formed in London he will undertake to train the executives in his own hobo's hostelry in Buffalo.

Occupations of New Yorkers Range From Duster to Sea Crab

New York, May 13.—(AP)—Of the many strange ways which people have found to make a living in New York City, perhaps the strangest is that selected by Bill Smith. Besides being a porter with the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, Bill is a champion duster, and confines his activities to gold bullion.

The gold stored in the underground vaults of the bank must be kept just as clean as the floors and office furniture in other parts of the building. Accordingly it is dusted whenever the vaults are opened. This may be every month, every three months, or even every six months, depending upon how fast Uncle Sam spends his money.

On these occasions it is nothing for Bill to grasp his trusty duster, step into the vault, and flick the grey coating from several billion dollars worth of gleaming gold bars in an hour or two.

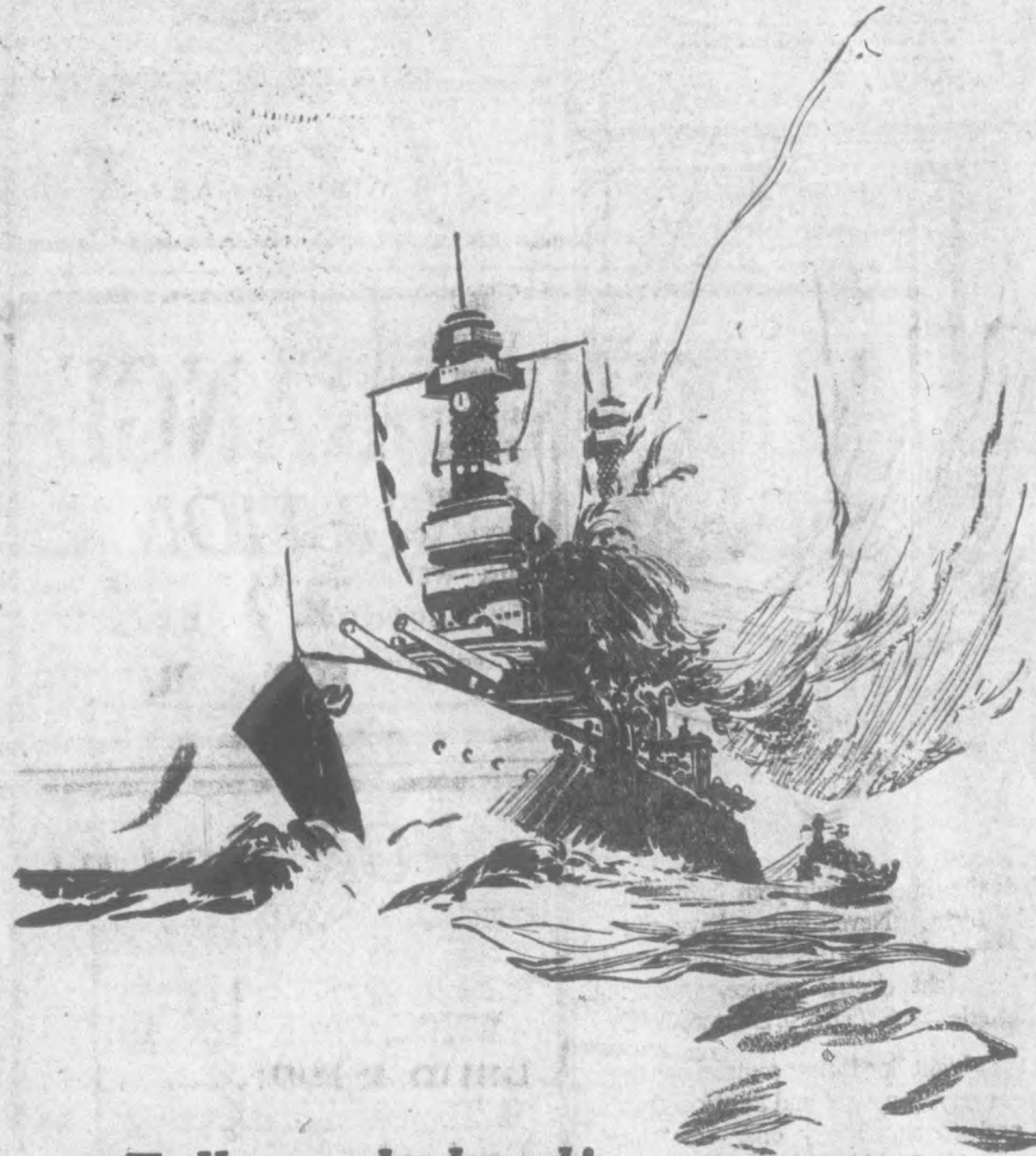

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Paris, May 13.—(INS)—The cost of living in Paris is approximately five times higher than it was before the war, according to figures just issued by the Service of General Statistics. Using 100 as the base for the cost of twenty important foodstuffs in 1914, the 1922 indices are given as follows: wholesale, January, 531; February, 535; March, 537. Retail indices are: January, 480; February, 495; and March, 497.

And with the cost of living ever on the increase, the population of the Ville Lumiere is gradually growing smaller and smaller. The census which has recently been taken shows that there are 2,838,416 souls living within the corporate limits of Paris, a decrease of 25,017 inhabitants over the figures of the preceding one taken in March, 1921.

As was to be expected, the most populous of the twenty

wards, or arrondissements, into which the city is divided, was found to be the eighteenth (Monmartre) with 271,509 inhabitants. Next in order comes the fifteenth on the south-west side, with 230,030. The low mark is attained by the first ward (Louvre) where the houses are for business rather than residence.

Increasing hazard of motor traffic and the difficulty, almost amounting to impossibility, of finding family apartments, are given as the two main reasons for making people leave the city for suburban districts. Figures for these parts are expected to show some 400,000 people living within commuting distance of the city.

There may soon be no more jazz on the banks of the Danube. Kansas City Plans a Fifth Avenue of West, Report

Kansas City, May 13.—(AP)—The merchants of Kansas City have set out to transform their main street into a middle western Fifth Avenue.

Sinclair Lewis' "Carol Kennicott" failed in her attempt to make over the Main street of Gopher Prairie, Minn., but the Kansas City business men are using different methods and the progress so far is evidence of their success.

In 1922, Komert Greer Cooke, president of the Fifth Avenue Association of New York, came to Kansas City and told of the improvements that had been made on the most fashionable street in America through the cooperation of its property owners and leaseholders. The Kansas City merchants adapted the program to their own Main street and just recently announced its purposes as follows:

To cooperate with property owners, lease holders, and tenants in maintaining cleanliness, upkeep and improvements of property.

To eliminate overhead signs and other obstructions.

To check illegal bill-posting.

To constantly study to improve traffic conditions.

To bring about architectural betterment and conduct of building operations.

To prevent sanitary violations

and noises and nuisances generally.

The first step was a request that all overhead advertising and other insignia of the up-and-at-em school of merchants of yesteryear be taken down. The members complied. The street railways company took down its yellow signals and a number of other small contributions made the general effect a worthy improvement. Almost overnight the street assumed a "dressed-up" appearance.

Success in the first campaign inspired the organization to a greater campaign, which now calls for an elaborate street and building renovation. "Follow the leader" became the game and the Walnut Street and the Grand Avenue Associations are under way, with the McGee street merchants shortly to follow. These groups are located on the principal downtown thoroughfares.

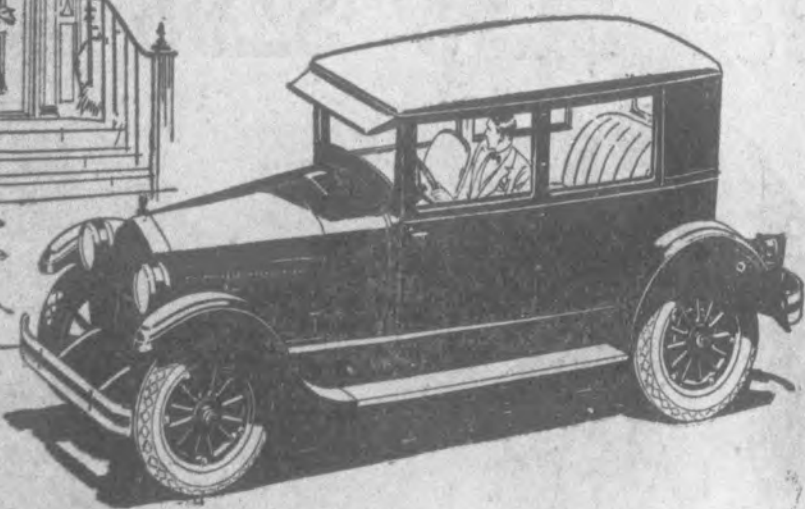

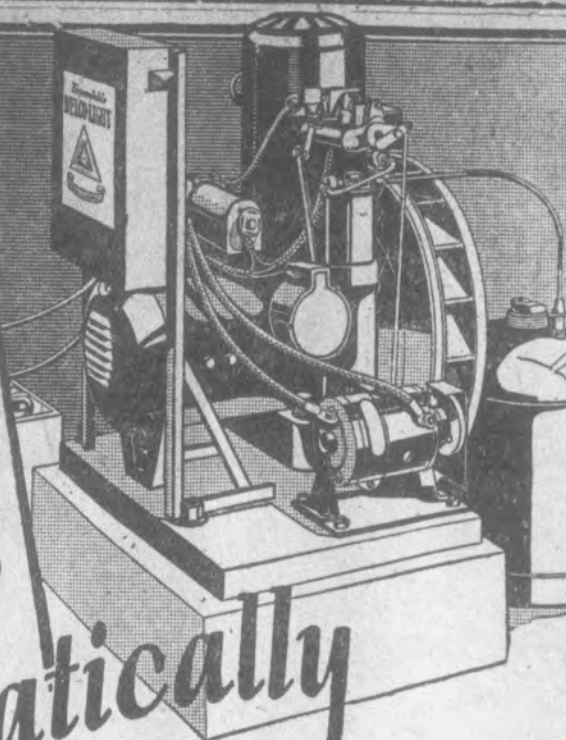
