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## LEONARD SPEAKS MERCHANTS BODY IN GOLDSBORO

### Declares Educational Program Should Not Be Financed Thru a Sales Tax

Goldsboro, May 18.—(AP)—"It now appears that the educational forces will endeavor to finance the eight months school term through a sales tax or some other special tax to be collected from the merchants of the State and the merchants may be put in the position of opposing an eight months school term if they oppose sales taxes."

Such was the declaration here today before the North Carolina Merchants Association of J. Paul Leonard, of Statesville, secretary of the association, in his annual report.

In this effort, the educational forces have "the avowed support of at least one organization with many votes and much real or imaginary political strength," Mr. Leonard added.

"His convention should not only go on record against sales taxes and their kind, but should immediately inaugurate an active campaign against such, and should get into politics to the extent of seeing that the right kind of men are sent to the next General Assembly. The character of the personnel of the next Legislature is of more than usual importance because of the progress that has already been made toward putting the State's affairs on a business basis under the leadership of our present Chief Executive. . . . Nothing should be allowed to retard or hinder this progress."

Mr. Leonard referred to "the defeat of the special merchants taxes and sales taxes proposed during the last General Assembly" as "the greatest service that our Association has rendered the merchants of the state," and pointed to the fact that "you were warned in your last convention by no less personage than the great business Governor of the State of the danger of further attempts to place the burden of sales taxes on another special tax upon you."

Mr. Leonard next referred to the so-called "bad-check law" passed through your efforts during the last Legislature, and pointed out that "two Superior court judges have declared the law unconstitutional, but that, due to the way the cases have come before the Supreme court, that body has not yet passed upon the validity of the law. If there is real danger of the law being declared unconstitutional, it should be strengthened in the next General Assembly," Mr. Leonard recommended. He added that he had no fear of the law being declared unconstitutional "if the spirit of our constitution rather than the letter is considered by the Supreme Court."

The secretary recommended that the merchants should give hearty support to the proposal in Congress looking to the "endless 'rain selling system,' and as emphatically recommended that House Bill 10, providing for the metric system of weights and measures, be opposed.

The report reviews the 10 years since Mr. Leonard assumed the post of secretary, and told of the association's growth from 12 local associations with a membership of 710 to 33 local associations today with a membership of more than 2,000. It also told of some of the accomplishments of the Association during the decade, and reviewed the reasons for the organization.

Mr. Leonard has assumed a "militant" attitude on a number of subjects during the year he told the association. "One tax fight made during the year is significant because the winning of that fight saved the merchants of the state handling electric fixtures, between \$30,000 and \$50,000. Your association was largely responsible for the securing of a new ruling from the Attorney General and the State Commissioner of Revenue which relieved stores not actually engaged in the electrical business from the payment of the license taxes imposed upon electricians. In another instance, I challenged and condemned statements given national publicity by the head of a national . . .

## YOUNG PEOPLES' SERVICE ATTRACTS LARGE AUDIENCE

### Rev. E. L. Hillman Appeals to Young People to Live Clean Lives and to Let God Enter Their Hearts

The service for young people which was held last night in the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church was largely attended, and Rev. E. L. Hillman preached a splendid sermon from Rev. 3:20. "Behold I Stand at the Door and Knock. Mr. Coston sang 'He Wants a Poor Sinner Like Me.'"

In developing his sermon Mr. Hillman declared that "Christ is standing at the doors of our hearts knocking. He wants to get in. He further stated that it seems that we would be at Heaven's door knocking, but the picture is turned around—Christ is at our heart's door."

It is a peculiar call God is bringing to young people. Young people are made of the same thing as the fathers and mothers who have gone before. Older people haven't left everything good for the younger people. "Some fathers and mothers are not seeking to follow God," said Mr. Hillman. "The devil is using many parents to damn the young. Young folks shouldn't have all the blame for their wrong doings, declared the speaker."

Mr. Hillman appealed to his hearers to help in cleaning up the impurities of today, the amusements, inspire reading matter. God stands at the heart and urges us to live clean lives.

An appeal was made to let Jesus come into our lives and drive out impurities. There is no need of uncleanliness about the young people if God is given a chance in their lives.

The hope of the world, declared Mr. Hillman, rests in young people coming to the front and demanding a better life. Jesus, the greatest friend man ever dreamed of, wants to come in and dwell with us here and dwell with us yonder. All friends of the world cannot compare with the friendship of Jesus.

Mr. Hillman, this morning, preached on "Christian Enthusiasm," taking his text from Corinthians II—13-15. The speaker declared that Paul had so much of Christian enthusiasm that folks called him mad. If there is any one thing we need, it is Christian enthusiasm. Paul bore the testimony that folks could not fail to understand. Paul did not mistake him. Mr. Hillman pleaded for more enthusiasm in the work of God, and like Paul, be men of conviction, willing to bear persecution and to testify for God.

What seems laziness, lack of attention, often means energy, waiting for something worth while. To that truth, as LaFontaine would say, two brief stories, shall bear witness.

You know about the Michigan farmer, who knew that two of his boys would come out all right, but worried about the third boy. He would say to the boy's mother, "I am worried about Henry." It was unnecessary worry, for that absent minded boy, not interested in pigs or cows, was Henry Ford. His mind was on something else.

Story number two, giant sloths were brought from South America that Rockefeller scientists might study their strange psychology, and perhaps discover a "germ of laziness." Sure enough, a stop watch test showed that it took the high sloth two minutes and fifteen seconds to turn around. But when the scientist came closer it took the same sloth less than half a second to bite his finger to the bone.

Your apparently worthless son may be waiting for work worthy of him.

Mrs. Leslie Carter says, "I intend to live to 150." She will not, but she might. In the human machine, as in the automobile, any one of a dozen parts, going wrong, can stop the engine. Heart, lungs, kidneys, especially since they are overworked—arteries, even the quill pancreas, can send Caesar or Alexander to his tomb. Unfortunately, the human engine has no hood that can be lifted, to see what is wrong. Surgeons do put in spare parts, glands, etc., but they are not guaranteed. There is no spare heart. To be safe, take care of your machinery. BEFORE it wears out.

Mrs. Carter says dogs have qualities lacking in men. "They never talk back, they keep secrets, they are never unfaithful." Madame De Sevigne said it first, but it is true. On the other hand, no dog can say to a lady, "you are the only absolutely perfect woman in the world," and make the poor things believe it. That's a drawback.

Employers, with rich men, men trying to get rich, should learn by heart nine words from Henry Ford's statement on wages. "SMALL PAY HURTS BUSINESS MORE THAN IT DOES LABOR." A worker earning barely enough to keep himself and his family alive, cannot add to general prosperity, and big fortunes are based on SURPLUS WAGES. THE MONEY THAT WORKERS EARN, ABOVE THE BARE COST OF LIVING.

"Low wages," says Ford, "will break business far more quickly than they will break labor." Few rich men understand that, which proves that you can get rich without possessing much intelligence. Many are rich, because lack of imagination has kept them from thinking about anything except money.

You read of American hi-jackers that take by violence, whiskey that bootleggers smuggle in by cunning or bribery USUALLY BRIBERY. They sell you the whiskey, then break into your house, and take it back.

But learn from Joseph Toplitzky, who teaches the real estate business to many, that American hi-jackers are mere amateurs, compared with China's product.

"In China," says Toplitzky, "the priest in the temple sells you, secretly, for half its value, the ancient work of art that you covet, bronze buddha, wonderful embroidery, anything. You pay, start down the hill, a gong sounds faintly, indignant servants of the temple rush out, take away your lot, but don't hurt you. The Chinese however are honorable in business, even hi-jackers in the temples. When you have bought the same thing three times and paid for it three times you are allowed to keep it, the gong does not ring.

Paying half its value three times, you pay fifty per cent more than it is worth, but that is better than you get from bootleggers or hi-jackers in America."

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## TOBACCO CO-OPS IN ANNUAL MEET RALEIGH TODAY

### Adjourn With- out Taking Any Defi- nite Action On Further Operation, or Voluntary Disso- lution

Raleigh, May 18.—(AP)—The members of the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Co-operative Marketing Association in annual session here today adjourned without taking any definite action looking toward further operation, voluntary dissolution or otherwise.

Throughout the general discussion of the situation, however, it was made clear that the idea uppermost in the minds of the members and directors was that of the best way by which the association could pay its indebtedness and cease to function.

The 1925-26 tobacco season has not been a successful one, from the standpoint of the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Association. This statement was made to the membership in annual meeting here today by the committee which has had charge of affairs since the resignation several weeks ago of R. R. Patterson, as general manager.

The committee, composed of George A. Norwood, of North Carolina, Bright Williamson, of South Carolina, and E. G. Bagley of Virginia, submitted its report in the form of a statement which was read to the membership immediately after the meeting opened with a small attendance.

The statement declared the Association had received about \$3,000,000 pounds of tobacco this season which constituted a total of only 14 1-2 per cent of the crop over the area in which it is operated. It further declared after their debts had been paid that in the 74,000,000 pounds on hand as of May 1 with a valuation of \$16,908,360.99, the growers had an equity of \$9,557,843.36. The report concluded with the declaration the committee had found no demand for its tobacco stock at this time and that no sales were being made, that the number of employees had been greatly reduced and that warehouse space had been leased. On the basis of these facts, no plans had been made to handle the 1926 crop and that this was a matter for today's meeting to decide.

Definite action with reference to the future of the organization is expected to be taken at the next meeting of the new board of directors which will be held at Raleigh on June 1. At that time the feeling of growers as ascertained by trips throughout the three states will be reflected in the action of the board, an official said today.

## Says Eyes of the World Turning on Eastern Carolina

New Bern, May 18.—Oscar W. Lane, prominent business man of this city, who resigned the presidency of the Eastern Bank and Trust Company Friday, to devote his entire time and attention to his duties as secretary and treasurer of Morehead Bluffs, Inc., and the Beaufort Realty Corporation, big real estate development companies of this city, started to work yesterday in new offices and expressed his utmost faith in the future of this section of the state.

"The eyes of the world are turning on Eastern North Carolina," he stated yesterday. "I found that out from banker friends as well as from my real estate experience. I know that we have the resources and advantages here that will attract visitors and investors. I am going to spend all my time now at work on the administration and finances of Morehead Bluffs and the Beaufort Realty Corporation."

Much activity is reported and planned for Morehead Bluffs, including the finishing of the new hotel by July 4, the building here now ready for roofs; the completion of the club house and field office; the erection of white ways, a casino, the laying of streets and sidewalks and the completion of the boat harbors.

## Tobacco Men to Hold Convention In Atlantic City

Richmond, May 18.—Francis H. Sisson, vice-president of the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, has been announced as one of the principal speakers to address the twenty-sixth annual convention of the Tobacco Association of the United States at the Hotel Traymore, Atlantic City, N. J., June 24, 25, and 26. Mr. Sisson will discuss business conditions generally in this country and Europe and its relation to the tobacco industry. He is an attractive and forceful speaker. He will address the convention at the morning session on June 25. Other speakers to appear on the program will be announced shortly.

Indications are that the convention of the Tobacco Association this year will be largely attended and a number of reservations have been made at the Traymore hotel for the event.

Several matters of importance to the tobacco trade will be under discussion during the sessions of the convention, among them being the situation in China and other foreign countries. It is regarded as likely that resolutions requesting the Government to watch closely developments in China will be presented.

Fixing the dates for opening the auction sales markets will be determined by the convention. The committee having this matter in hand is composed of T. W. Blackwell, Winston-Salem, N. C.; chairman; O. C. Gregory, Richmond; W. J. King, Wilson; N. C.; A. H. Bachan, Mullins, S. C.; A. J. Bullington, Durham, N. C.; P. A. Noel, Durham, N. C.; and James Hicks, Richmond, Va.

## Photographic Society to Hold Meet May 24-25

Charlotte, May 18.—(AP)—Approximately 100 photographers from various sections of the state are expected to attend the convention of the Tar Heel Photographic Society, to be held here May 24 and 25. That is the announcement of L. Davis Phillips, of Charlotte, chairman of the committee on arrangements.

Ben Z. Matthews, of Winston-Salem, is president of the society—L. Davis Phillips, Charlotte, is first vice-president; R. V. Goodrich, Henderson, second vice-president; Noel Patton, Fayetteville, secretary; and Robert Barrette, Charlotte, treasurer.

A feature of the meeting will be a banquet on May 24. Several visiting photographers from neighboring states are expected, Mrs. Phillips said.

## Warren's Bill Dare Memorial Passes House

Washington, May 18.—Representative Lindsay Warren's bill for the erection of a memorial on Roanoke Island to Virginia Dare, the first child of English parentage to be born in America was this afternoon unanimously passed by the House. Sneaker Longworth permitted the bill to be called up out of order, so that the memorial may be unveiled when the British Ambassador speaks there on August 18. It is expected that the bill will get through the Senate in a few days. Mr. Warren is highly pleased that Federal recognition is being given to this important event in history.

## Stone Mountain Memorial Assured

Birmingham, Alabama, May 18.—(AP)—With assets of more than \$400,000 and no liabilities the Stone Mountain Memorial to the Confederacy is assured and work on the equestrian figures of President Davis, General Lee and General Jackson will be completed in two years, this report was embodied in an address by Hollis Randolph, President of the Stone Mountain Association before the Confederate Southern Memorial Association at the 36th annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans.

"Starting three years ago with \$185 in the treasury, with no pledges or subscriptions, with debts of nearly \$25,000, the Stone Mountain Memorial Association today has assets of more than \$400,000 with no liabilities or debts of any kind," he declared.

"That is enough, we are officially advised, to carve the first section of the central group on the mountain—that is the equestrian figures of President Davis, General Lee and General Jackson."

"We are now in process of letting a contract to carve that section and we are advised that this carving can be finished within two years. When this is done the carrying of the balance of the central group and the subsequent that will go to make up the grand panorama will follow as certainly as day follows dawn."

## Bids on Twelve State Highway to Be Opened June 29

Raleigh, May 18.—(AP)—Bids on 12 State Highway projects will be opened by the Highway Commission on June 29, and the Commission will meet on July 1 to let contracts, on these projects, according to Leslie R. Ames, chief engineer.

## PASSENGERS SAY SENECA'S CREW WERE DRINKING

### Signed Statement Al- so Charges Mem- bers of Crew Don- ned Life Preservers Ahead of the Pas- sengers

New York, May 18.—(AP)—Seventeen of the passengers of the Clyde Liner Seneca, who were among those taken from the steamer when it went aground at Miami, Fla., Sunday morning, upon their arrival here today signed a statement, charging that some of the crew were under the influence of liquor.

The signed statement also charged that members of the crew donned life preservers ahead of the passengers, thereby causing much concern to the women on board. Although the statement criticized members of the crew the Seneca's commander, R. W. Leek, was highly praised.

P. A. Edwards, of Brookline, Mass., gave newspaper men the statement which read in part as follows:

"We, the undersigned, being passengers aboard the steamship Seneca bound from Miami to New York, leaving May 16 at four p. m., hereby certify that the following statements are true in the affair of the Seneca being in a sinking condition the night of May 15, and 16 and passengers being removed in life boats to wit:

"1—Liquor was sold openly on the Seneca.

"2—A portion of the ship's crew were under influence of liquor.

"3—Men were taken ashore on large tugs while many ladies were forced to use small life boats.

"4—Many members of the crew were in life preservers ahead of the passengers, causing much concern to the ladies."

Miami, Fla., May 18.—(AP)—Vigorous denial of charges by seven passengers of the Clyde steamer Seneca in New York today that members of the ship's crew were under the influence of liquor while the vessel was in distress off Miami Saturday night were made here today by President H. R. Raymond, of the Clyde Line and Captain R. W. Leek, of the Seneca.

"The charge that liquor was sold openly on the Seneca is preposterous. She is not equipped with a bar or other facilities for selling liquor and the Clyde Line never has and never will countenance such a condition," President Raymond declared.

"Had any member of my crew come aboard in an intoxicated condition he would have been left ashore," Captain Leek asserted.

"No boat under my command will ever put to sea with a drunken crew or with a crew whose efficiency is impaired by liquor."

Both said the women and children aboard the Seneca were the first to leave the ship.

## Congress Completes 165,000,000 Public Buildings Bill

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—Congress today completed its approval of the \$165,000,000 Public Buildings Bill under which new federal buildings are to be erected in many cities.

The conference report already approved by the Senate was accepted by the House and the bill sent to President Coolidge who is expected to sign it.

Except for certain buildings in the capital the bill does not specify in what cities the new structures are to be erected. The Treasury Department will distribute the funds, but must have the approval of Congress for the allocations.

## Ralston Escapes From Prison Camp Today

Raleigh, May 18.—(AP)—Ralph Ralston, serving a sentence of from eleven years three months to fifteen years for second degree murder, escaped from the state prison camp at Morehead City yesterday, it has been learned at State Prison today. Ralston was an honor prisoner. The entire group of prisoners at the Morehead City camp is composed of honor men serving without guard.



# BRITISH FASCISTI ARE IN DISPUTE ON MILITARISM

## Members of Council Resign on Account of Slit in Party Ranks

London, May 14.—(INS).—The British Fascist has split up over the question of militarism.

The president of the organization, Brigadier General R. B. D. Blakeley, and four other members of the Fascist Council, have resigned, announcing that a sharp division of opinion arose "between the militant section who believe that they can stand alone, maintain military titles and consider themselves free to resort to unconstitutional action, and the other more steady-going section, who believe that the resources of the British Constitution are by no means exhausted."

The quarrel brought to light the fact that the Home Secretary has declined to accept the enlistment of the Fascists as part of the Organization for Maintenance of Supplies, designed to operate essential public services in the event of great industrial disturbances such as the general strike which has just ended. It was because of the militaristic policy of the Fascists that the government shut it out of the O. M. S.

This led to the resignation of General Blakeley and his associates, who have now formed a new organization to co-operate with the O. M. S. under the title of Loyalists. The remaining Fascists have declared that they will continue in existence under their present constitution, denying that they are under any obligation to any organization of a "political character."

The new society of Loyalists, which General Blakeley is organizing, will make a special campaign against Communism.

# Oxford Girls Who Stay Out Late Call Wire Fence Limit of Absurdity

Oxford, Eng., May 13.—(INS).—The 1200 young women undergraduates of Oxford University are in revolt.

Their displeasure has nothing to do with scholastic matters. It concerns a fence. The fence is ten feet high, and on top of it are five strands of barbed wire, the whole forming a barricade about fifteen feet in height. It is a kind of a fence a girl would look at more than once before she attempted to scale it and get over the barbed wire.

Painted dark green to match the trees and grass, the fence has been erected at various points around the precincts of Somerville College.

Its purpose, according to current rumor, is to prevent girls who stay out after 11 P. M., to return to their rooms without having the lateness of their hours known to the collegiate authorities.

The story is that one of the girls of Somerville College, having occasion to remain out until after midnight with a friend, who is an undergraduate at one of the men's colleges, effected an entry by climbing over a low fence erected temporarily at the edge of the college grounds, where some building operations are going on. The authorities decided that such an entrance was not in accordance with the dignity of the young ladies of Somerville and the high fence, plus the barbed wire, was the result.

# RUSSIAN PRODUCER ASKS THAT LESS RESTRICTIONS BE IMPOSED ON ACTORS

London, May 14.—(INS).—London is much interested at the moment in Theodore Komisarjevsky, the young Russian theatrical producer, whose theory is that the less direction actors receive the better the play will be.

Master of the theatrical technique of Moscow, Berlin and Paris and one of the American movie studios, he has developed a reputation in London as an outstanding exponent of dramatic art.

Komisarjevsky condemns the producers who cancel their players to move about the stage like chessmen at certain signals because it ultimately means that the actor's chief function is that of memory. "Thus," he declares, "his growth as an actor is prevented and his artistic development is completely arrested."

# Millions Are Required to Endow Pure Science

Washington, May 14.—(AP).—A committee of eminent statesmen and scientists believes pure science is on the wane and that 29 million dollars are needed to endow its cause for the future.

This committee, headed by Herbert Hoover, announces a three million dollar start in what it calls the collection of industry's huge debt to science. The industrial structure of the world today, as emerged from the pure science laboratories of yesterday, these men say, and the supreme question for generations to come is how the progress of research in pure science can best be stimulated.

A National Research Endowment of \$20,000,000, yielding an annual income of \$2,000,000 directed by the National Academy of Science, is the means proposed. The committee plans to establish fellowships for research at various American universities, which would supplement the Carnegie, Rockefeller and other foundations in making opportunities for pure scientific study sufficiently attractive to compete with the high salaries and excellent equipment offered in applied science laboratories of the American industrial leaders in industry have been

# The Only Titled Construction Boss in the World

Tokio, May 13.—(INS).—One of the twenty-five foremen employed to boss the laborers constructing the outer garden at the Meiji Shrine, in Tokio, is Baron Kiyo-o Kodama, whose father, Lieut. General Takutaro Kodama, was one of the heroes of the Russo-Japanese war. He is believed to be the only titled foreman of a construction gang in Japan or perhaps in the world.

Baron Kodama succeeded to the title on the death of his father and with it inherited a rich estate. Unfortunate speculations and luxurious living, soon dissipated the fortune and Baron Kodama was reduced virtually to penury. With a family of seven children to support, the Baron, at the age of 38, was compelled to take a job as a day laborer.

For ten years Baron Kodama has worked with his hands to earn his living. As a side-line he peddles albums and stationery. The one break in his routine that recalls his previous state comes when the annual Chrysanthemum Festival is held at the court of the Japanese Emperor. Then he brushes up the silk hat and frock coat which he has preserved from the old days and returns for a few brief hours to the life that he once knew. Next day he is back on the job with the construction gang.

# Immortalized in Song, Reports Self As Live and Well

Tokio, May 13.—(INS).—Ever since the Russo-Japanese war, Sergeant Rempo Uchida has been catalogued as a "dead hero." Recent events, however, have changed his category to that of a "live legend."

In the battle of Laoyang, Manchuria, during the Russo-Japanese conflict, Sergeant Uchida so conducted himself that he won undying fame for gallant exploits. After the battle he was listed as missing and since then his achievements in a musical recitation for the Satsuma biwa entitled "Tachibana Chusa." His deeds likewise were extolled in readers used in the primary schools.

Recently "Tachibana Chusa" was broadcast from the Tokio radio station and next day a protest was filed by a person who declared Uchida was alive. About the same time a 11-year old boy in a primary school at Mejiro, Tokio, refused to accept the tale told in his school books and declared to his teacher that Uchida was living.

These happenings led to an investigation and it was discovered that Uchida is conducting a publication, known as Tetsudo Unyu Shimbun, or Railway Transportation Magazine in Tokio.

Uchida has promised to visit the primary school and tell the pupils how it happened that he

did not perish in the battle Laoyang and others correct an apparent historical mistake. If there is to be a moral to the tale he will tell, it probably will emphasize that it is sometimes desirable for school boys not to believe everything they read in their textbooks.

# MURDERER KILLS JUDGES BEFORE BEING EXECUTED

Warsaw, May 14.—(INS).—A murderer has been executed at Opava, near the Bohemian border, after he killed two judges who attempted to sentence him. The man was taken before a lower court charged with stealing a piece of jewelry of little value. He was released on good behavior and told to report to the judge in two weeks. He failed to do this and when the judge went to question him, the man hit him over the head, killing him.

The peasant was then taken before another court, charged with murder. On entering the court he rushed at the judge with an open knife and stabbed the jurist through the heart before the jailers could pull him away. He was given a hasty trial and sent to death shortly after.

### FOUNDER OF NEW ORLEANS FINALLY TO BE HONORED

New Orleans, May 18.—(AP)—After 200 years New Orleans is proposing to honor Bienville, its founder, by naming a park for him.

For two centuries Bienville has had to worry along with only a street named in his honor, and that street not one of the leading thoroughfares. The Louisiana Historical Society is gaining support in its campaign to have City park rechristened Bienville Park.

Bienville and his party of explorers founded New Orleans in 1718, Bienville obiding out for locating the city on its present site.

### Progress in Haiti Is Shown In Recent Booklet

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—A reassuring glimpse of progress in the island republic of Haiti is afforded the outside world through circulation of an illustrated booklet, showing in graphic fashion the strides made in recent years in many lines of endeavor.

The booklet, printed in French, has found its way through official channels into many foreign countries. Copies of it have been passed about here by the Haitian legation. It contains upwards of 100 pictures of improved roads, modern buildings, and other construction projects in the island.

In the last ten years, more than 1,000 miles of paved roads have been laid, replacing highways that had deteriorated until they were little more than trails. A concrete highway connecting Port-au-Prince, the Haitian capital, and Santa Domingo, capital city of the Dominican Republic, has been completed by the Haitians up to the border. When the Dominican portion is completed, the trip between the two capitals may be done in hours, where formerly it took days.

This progress has been particularly notable during the administration of the present chief executive, President Borno, said a report in the booklet made by the Haitian minister of public works. His administration also has seen the construction of 14 schools, 13 hospitals and 11 lighthouses; installation of a fan automatic telephone system, and material progress in irrigation and canals. Since 1921, there has been an increase of 350 per cent in the number of telephones in use and the telegraph system has been augmented and improved.

In order to foster trade between the United States and Haiti, the present Haitian Import Customs Tariff is being revised.

Some eight hundred American Machines will remain in Haiti, completing their work of reorganizing the native constabulary.

### McGraw Cleaning Giants' House for Pennant Winning

New York, May 18.—(INS)—Unmistakable evidence that John McGraw is about ready to houseclean his Giants as per his five-year custom, was offered in the recent release of pitcher Art Nehf and infielder Heine Groh. To cut loose from this pair three years ago would have meant the loss of the pennant. They were released on this occasion to make the winning of a pennant possi-

ble. When McGraw sees the need for adding fresh speed to his outfit, he never hesitates about letting an old favorite go. One of the abiding reasons for his great success is the fact that he plays the game only in the present and thinks largely in the future. He always is building up and, in order to do this, he must tear down.

Therefore, men like Nehf and Groh, rated among the greatest of the modern generation, were fated to go and McGraw is not one to run contrary to the inevitable. He sent them away without wasting time. He has done something of the kind at five-year intervals since taking over the Giants early in the century.

His teams won in 1904 and 1905 and looked good for more, but Donlin, Seymour, Mortes, Brown, McGann, Bowermann, Dahlen, McGinnity, Gilbert, Taylor and Devlin were gone before the Giants won again in 1911.

This marked the beginning of another great Giant machine and it lasted well on through 1914.

However, the inevitable flop soon was on and in the next few years Merkle, Marquard, Snodgrass, Meyers, Ivey, Demaree, Tetreau and others passed on.

The 1917 champions were a one-year outfit and McCarty, Schupp, Reardon, Holke, Sallee, Robertson, Perritt and Herzog were gone. From time to time others of the old guard disappeared for various reasons, among them Zimmerman, Chase

and Kauff. A year or so later Doyle was released and Fletcher followed. George Burns and Mike Gonzales went to Cincinnati in the Groh deal; Benton and Toney were turned adrift, Phil Douglas was barred from baseball, Dave Bancroft was traded into managerial control of the Braves and Casey Stengel accompanied him, in spite of his ohme runs in the previous world series.

Nehf and Groh apparently have finished the race and may regard their release without surprise or resentment. They have plenty of excellent company, anyhow.

### LOWER MEXICAN DEATH RATE AIM OF U. S. SCIENTISTS

Newark, N. J., May 18.—Reproduction of Mexico's death rate is the goal of a party of American scientists who will spend the summer in a study of that republic and its peoples.

The investigation has the approval of the Mexican government and public health officials and will be directed by Dr. Frederick L. Hoffman, consulting statistician of the Prudential Insurance Company.

Mexico is reputed to have the highest death rate of any country, but, in the opinion of Dr. Hoffman, much of its mortality is within the reach of preventive measures.

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## THE PROBLEM OF POVERTY

The prosperity of the United States at the present time cannot be denied. Wages, according to authorities on the subject, have risen at a faster rate than the price level; the standard of living is higher and on every hand are evidences of progress and plenty. The necessity of sanitation and better living quarters has been realized and partly corrected. Factories have installed modern equipment for ventilation and cleanliness, the working hours have been shortened and the problems of eugenics, unemployment, etc., have been partially solved.

And yet in spite of all these admirable efforts for the elimination of poverty and need, there is in the country today over ten million people who are unable to support their families. The children of these ten million necessarily grow up under conditions which make it impossible for them to have a fair chance in life. They are not responsible for their advent into life, yet from the start, they are handicapped. They, with their undeveloped minds and physical disabilities, cannot be expected to cope with the ones who have had better opportunities, and so we find them unable to derive an adequate income in the industrial fields.

From these come the majority of the criminals, the inmates of asylums and correctional institutions, the anarchists and anti-Americans. They are often imbued with the idea that the world owes them a living and quickly turn to robbery and desperate means to obtain it. They are a parasite on society and a detriment to progress and civilization. The largest problem confronting the nation today is the correction of this evil and it is a gigantic task. How to solve this problem is a question that should be given consideration by everyone.

Economists and philosophers have decided that the quickest and easiest path to solution lies through compulsory education, the further equipment, maintenance and perfection of our public school system. Society should at least give the less fortunate of the population a fair chance. By providing them some means through which to make an honest living by teaching them lessons in thrift and saving by inculcating in them patriotism and love of American tenets and ideals,

they can be converted from their present tendencies into good citizens and strong cogs instead of weak points in the wheels of progress. It is the duty of every true American who is interested in his country and the welfare of society as a whole to do all in his or her power to facilitate the problems of the public schools to expedite the elimination of poverty and illiteracy, and there is no doubt that the new Education Bill is a great step forward and will do much towards the ultimate solution of the problem of poverty.

Boston, May 18.—(INS)—There are lots of people who come "back home and broke" but not Mellie Dunham of Norway, Me., the little old man with the famous fiddle.

"Why," explained Mellie's champion fiddler, "an old man without a dollar. 72 years old, called out of my little Maine town for the first time in my life to travel thru half the country, and going back home to my grandchildren richer by almost \$15,000, all through one little fiddle."

Mellie, as full of "pep" as ever, and Gram, attired in her new and becoming spring coat with squirrel collar, were greeted by friends at the station.

Mellie "lowed" he had learned many lessons on his wonderful tour, but the most valuable of all was a lesson of human kindness.

"I never knew," he said, "how nice folks could be. Gram and I lived in a little town all our life, where we expect folks to be friendly, knowing everybody as we do."

"And here we go to half the big cities in the country, and everyone treats us with such kindness. I guess human nature's just as friendly in the city as it is in the country."

Mellie admits he's homesick. He can hardly wait, he says, to see the seven grandchildren and all the home folks.

"Got a new tune I play these days," he said. "It's 'Show Me the Way to Go Home.'"

**London's Traffic Problems Solved Gyrotratory System**

London, May 18.—(INS)—The traffic problem of London has been practically revolutionized—so far as the difficult points are concerned—at almost a moment's notice.

All the chief congested areas, like Trafalgar Square, Piccadilly Circus, Hyde Park Corner, Blackfriars are now worked on the gyrotratory or roundabout system. In most cases the main streets are being turned into "one-way" streets, which calls for gyration, and although it adds slightly to the distance to be covered by traffic, the speeding-up has been amazing.

At all these congested centers a stoppage is now practically an impossibility. A journey along the Strand which used to average 15 minutes during the rush hours, is now frequently done in four minutes. Waits in three to five minutes which frequently occurred at Trafalgar Square or Piccadilly Circus are now practically eliminated. Teams of police hurlers keep drivers at full tension.

The drawback to the new system is an increased danger to pedestrians. Before, there were parts of the way almost untraveled by fast traffic, where if a devious route was taken, it was always possible to cross the street in absolute safety. But the gyrotratory system has turned almost every street in the heart of London into a racing track—in order to supply the necessary room required by the new method—an old pedestrian now takes his life in his hand every time he crosses a street.

**TO CELEBRATE FIFTIETH JAPANESE RED CROSS DAY**

Tokio, May 18.—(AP)—The section Oriental Red Cross Conference will be held here beginning November 15 and ending November 23. More than 100 official delegates are expected. Red Cross societies invited are those in the Philippines, Australia, China, French Indo-China, India, Dutch East Indies, New Zealand and Siam.

London Will Stage

Political Rights

London, May 18.—(INS)—Reminiscent of the old Suffragette days, a mammoth demonstration in support of Equal Political Rights for men and women has been planned for London Saturday, July 3rd.

Thirty of the most prominent women's organizations in England, both political and religious, have announced their intention of taking part in the demonstration, which will be addressed by many famous speakers.

The demonstration will open with a procession which will march from the Victoria Embankment to Hyde Park. Each group will march under its own colors, and will in many cases display a picturesque decorative scheme.

A pageant of famous women in English and the world's history will have a place in the procession while there will be tableaux representing the work of many of the organizations. Bands, choirs, and decorated banners will also find a place in the procession.

At the close of the meeting a resolution demanding a government measure giving votes to women at the age of 21 on the same terms as men will be put simultaneously from all platforms, and this resolution will be forwarded to members of the Government and members of Parliament throughout the country.

Meanwhile the engineers are investigating claims that Currituck Sound and Back Bay are becoming salty due to tidal lock improvement and that the water grasses on which game subsists is endangered.

Charleston Banned  
In London Halls

London, May 18.—(INS)—London dance-halls and hotels have banned the Charleston.

After sweeping into an instant popularity extending from dock-hands to the peerage, the latest American dance novelty, with "stunt" adaptations, has been widely condemned because of the rows kicked up in the ball-rooms, where the Charleston addicts perform.

The Pleadilly Hotel was one of the first to take a positive stand against the Charleston, a notice being posted in the ball-room that the Charleston, in any form and under any conditions, was prohibited. In hotels such as the Carlton, Berkley and Claridges, the Charleston has not been officially banned, but it is discouraged, and the orchestra leaders seek to provide the kind of music which will make the dance impossible, or at least difficult to the point of exterminating it by slow degrees.

But it is not in these better class and usually more sedate hotels that the real trouble comes with the Charleston. The managers of the big public dance halls say they have the most cause for complaint.

"The trouble with the Charlestoners," according to the manager of a Hammersmith dance-hall, "is that they exaggerate it and make a stunt of it. They stand in one spot on the floor and side-kick. The result is that other dancers are kicked, and the girls have their silk stockings torn. When this happens, they come to me and demand compensation for damages. The only solution was to stop the Charleston entirely."

Injuries to other dancers, and sometimes to the Charlestoners themselves, was the reason given at the Cricklewood Dance Hall for prohibiting the Charleston, while at Brixton, a suburb, a special part of the floor has been roped off and allocated to the Charleston enthusiasts.

"There," said the manager, "they can kick each other as much as they want to and leave other people alone. As soon as we notice a young couple looking like they were about to succumb to the Charleston waver, we shove 'em behind the ropes, and make 'em stay there until they recover."

# AMERICAN PLAN TO CURB NATIVES WORRIES EUROPE

## Experts Tink Wash- ington is Preparing to Present Drastic Program

London, May 15.—(INS)—Admiralty officials view with misgivings reports being circulated in London and on the Continent that the United States is preparing a drastic plan of naval rearmament for presentation to the forthcoming disarmament conference at Geneva.

According to Hec C. Bywater the well known naval expert, who says he has his information from reliable sources, the Washington Government will propose the restriction of all combatant tonnage on the basis which already applies to battleships and aircraft carriers.

This would mean that the British and the United States navies would be on a footing of equality in every type of vessel, that Japan would be restricted to three-fifths of her common quota of tonnage, and that France and Italy both would be cut to little more than half the Japanese total.

The adoption of the reported American plan, designed as a continuation of the scheme of reduction presented to the Washington Conference by Secretary of State Hughes, would involve the abolition of a great many ships completed and not building, especially in this country. One Admiralty official declares that the present British cruiser program and the great Japanese and French building projects would have to be cancelled entirely.

It is apparent therefore, that the American proposals will be strongly resisted by British naval opinion with the undoubted support of France and Japan.

"America herself," says Bywater, "would only have to scrap part of the 280 destroyers which she build during and after the war."

"What she would stand to gain by the application of the 515-3 ratio to cruisers is indicated by the fact that whereas she has only 12 modern cruisers built and being built, we have 50 and Japan has 25."

"In addition to this drastic plan the American delegates will it is understood, propose tentatively that mercantile tonnage shall be rated as a potential war factor in computing relative strength, in which event Great Britain, as the premier shipping power, would be required to forfeit a certain proportion of her

fighting tonnage. The fundamental weakness of America's case is that, having practically no naval construction in hand herself she is not in a position to offer an adequate quid pro quo for the sweeping concessions that other countries are invited to make."

## England Studies

### U. S. Money Plan

Washington, May 13.—(INS)—A study of the American currency system is considered by the Royal Currency Commission of Great Britain, which is now investigating a plan to place India on a gold basis.

"The rise of the rupee during the past two years and the great prosperity in India resulting from a series of four favorable monsoons have again brought to the forefront the need of currency reform," said R. O. Hall, assistant chief of the Finance Division of the Department of Commerce.

The Royal Commission already has held sittings in India and London. The great efficiency of the American money system is expected to be studied before

a definite decision is reached as to India's currency future. For the needs of India's internal trade silver is regarded as the best medium, but in settling foreign balances silver entails the certainty and inconvenience.

A gold exchange system established in 1893 operated successfully until 1920 when a frenzied demand for drafts on London, sold in India, depleted the gold reserve. Since that time the system has been suspended or operated with limitations. The present currency commission is generally expected to stabilize the rupee by the formal resumption of the gold standard.

India is regarded as a "silver sink." Much silver is still hoarded, but in 1924 and 1925 about \$350,000,000 was imported creating in India a "gold sink."

"There is a surprisingly widespread demand for adoption of the gold standard in India," Hall said. "It is advocated by several of the recognized authorities on Indian currency, and chambers of commerce. At the same time nationalists are agitating for the measure—in the legislative assembly, in the press and elsewhere—as a move toward finan-

cial autonomy. The necessity of a foreign loan is being considered to obtain a sufficient additional quantity of gold for a 20 to 30 per cent reserve ration.

of Population.

Paris, May 18.—(INS)—Parisian breed, always famous for its whiteness, will be taking on a grayish tint within the next few months, for the Minister of Agriculture has just signed a decree making it obligatory that the white flour used for making all kinds of bread, contain 8 per cent of rye.

France is trying to make last year's home-grown wheat spin out until the first of this year's crop is ready for milling and the present period of bad weather is liable to retard the date when the first corn of the year will be ready for threshing.

"Don't Waste Bread" signs

are being posted all over in prominent places during this difficult period. Otherwise wheat will have to be bought from abroad at very high prices and this means dearer bread.

Is Paris growing prudish? A poster of a nude dancing girl drawn by the Japanese artist Foujita, to advertise the Bal de l'Aide, Amicale aux Artistes, has recently been prohibited by the Nord-Sud officials who were greatly shocked to find it in the underground station.

The officials declare the poster far too indecent to be seen by the many children who must ride in the subway. Foujita is wondering, it is said, why there are so many nude statues in the public gardens where the children play every day.

The woman poisoner of Saint Gilles is the first one to be condemned to death for a period of thirty-nine years, not counting the many women spies sent to the gallows during the war.

The last one of the fairer sex guillotined in France was a femme Thomas, who assassinated her mother and then tried to burn the body in order to efface all traces of the crime. She was executed in 1887 at Romorantin and Roch, the executioner, said that in all his career of head-cutting, he has never experienced greater emotion than on that day.

With her head covered with the veil of parricides, uttered forth groans louder than those of any lion. It was necessary to bind her hands in order to take her to the scaffold and at the moment Roch seized her she still had the strength to tear open the veil with her teeth and bite his hand fiercely.

Parisian dogs will be benefited by a new municipal decree providing strict regulations regarding vivisection, and changes in the system of dealing with homeless dogs in the Paris pound. From now on, only accredited societies and persons will be allowed to obtain dogs for vivisection.

A special commission will pass upon the fitness of the vivisectionists. Two sales a week will be held at the pound in order to find homes for unclaimed dogs. If a person finds a dog he is obliged to take it to the pound. If the owner does not claim it after a reasonable length of time the dog will be returned to the finder if he cares for it. After he has had the dog in his possession for three years, the former owner forfeits all claim to the animal.

Senator Brookhart, or ex-ecutor as he is now, is going to run for vindication. Some others seem to run merely for exercise or by habit.—Greensboro Record.

Los Angeles brings down from distant mountains water to supply eleven hundred thousand people. Ranchers along the line of the great pipe, declaring that Los Angeles takes water that should be theirs, have been at war with the city for three years. On Thursday they dynamited the pipe line, making a ten foot hole, wasting millions of gallons of water, but not, fortunately, jeopardizing the city's supply.

This bitterness shows the importance of water preservation all through the west, and illustrates man's passion, a determination to protect land that he calls his own. And that should enlighten single tax enthusiasts. Only INDIVIDUAL OWNERSHIP of land has established this civilization, and wiped out the Nomadic Barbarism. Only land OWNERSHIP makes men fight for their country, as the fought at Verdun.

The British strike disorganized business and railroads. Until conditions improve, will need fewer men.

The union says "take back all or none out" and there is possibility of another fight.

Industry and the semi-civilization that it has produced are hard to establish, easily put out of order. No man kicks his watch because it does not keep perfect time. He knows the result, capital and labor will gradually learn that it is dangerous for them to kick each other.

In Britain's coal trouble there are two views, far apart. Your sympathy with either depends on how you have been taught to think. The strike ends on the implied understanding that mine owners will not cut wages and government subsidy will pay the owners in cash the profit that a wage cut would have supplied. Outrageous that all the people should be taxed, to keep up miners wages. The law of supply and demand should work, and the men should get paid accordingly. So says conservatism.

Outrageous that mine owners, never doing a stroke of work should be allowed to put profits a head of decent pay for working men, a decent life for their wives and children. Instead of bribing owners to keep up wages, government should tell them to give fair pay, or government would work the mines. So says labor.

Conservatism's theory is old and respectable. "If you don't like the wages, get out." But that old theory is becoming wobbly. The earth does not "owe every man a living," but those that hire other men to work for them, and take the profit on their labor, owe the workers, ahead of any profit. The demonstration made by British labor will add strength to the fair wage theory. You do not get much in this world, until you prove that you can take it.

tional credit organization which I considered unfair, unjust and defamatory to the good name of the merchants of North Carolina.

The Governor is commended by the report for calling the survey of women in industry, and it is recommended that the agency making the survey be given thorough co-operation. Reference is also made to the opposition by the merchants during the last session of the Legislature to the proposal "to place stores and mercantile establishments under the provisions of the law regulating the hours of employment of women." That action was due, the report says, to the fact that the complaints filed with the legislative committee "were against a class of stores which do not affiliate with local mercantile and commercial organizations."

The Merchants Mutual Fire Insurance Company of North Carolina, which it is expected will develop a hot controversy during the convention, was discussed by Mr. Leonard, who gave figures to show just what the organization has done since its creation.

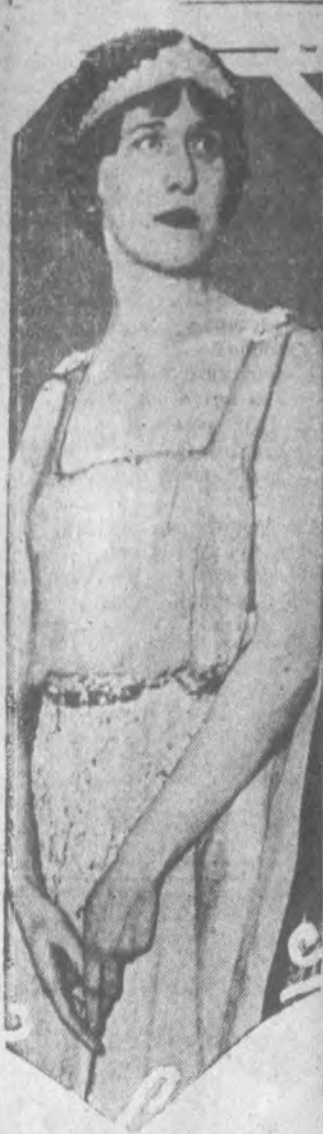
Mr. Leonard concluded his report with an expression of thanks for the courtesy shown him during his 10 years of service.

NEW TYPE OF  
WOMEN IN SPAIN  
TO SEEK RIGHTS

Class of Women Coming to Front Who Are Likely to Be Heard About on Account of Their Achievements

Madrid, May 18.—(AP)—Nobility of birth and character is widespread among the women of Spain, but nobility is scarce. There is, however, a class of women to be heard about on account of their achievements.

One of these new women of renaissance Spain who has, in spite of her youth and humble origin, acquired nation-wide fame is Clara Campoamor, the woman lawyer. After fighting against all the prejudices of Spain where the woman is still subordinate to the man, Madame Campoamor succeeded in gaining recognition for her sex before the courts of law. She met opposition from her father until her majority had been reached or had married the man chosen for her; then from her husband, without whose consent she could do nothing. By her ability, good judgment, learning and power of oratory, she now promises to go far in the struggle for the emancipation of Spanish women.

This Spanish Portia was left an orphan at the age of ten, with several brothers and sisters, and without a vestige of fortune. At twelve she left the primary school and started to work in a factory, where the work was so hard she decided to seek more congenial occupation.

Although much of her energy was sapped by her long day's labor, she spent her few free hours in learning the typewriter and, having acquired skill, obtained employment as office clerk. Then she took up telegraphy and was soon able to enter the government telegraph service, being assigned first to San Sebastian and afterward to Zaragoza.

Her occupation did not prevent a continuance of her studies. She acquired shorthand and became so expert that she was offered and accepted an engagement as teacher of stenography in the national schools of Madrid. As an additional outlet for her indomitable energy she took up newspaper work and soon was recognized as a valuable contributor. At the same time she studied law, and later was admitted to the Spanish Bar. Her first case was the successful defense of a young girl who had wounded a would-be lover while defending her honor.

LILLIAN GISH GETS  
MANY PICTURE IDEAS  
FROM HER DOG

Culver City, Cal., May 18.—(AP)—Animals give Lillian Gish many ideas for her work before the motion picture camera.

Often when she is playing a scene in which the character is supposed to be very happy, she

may be seen spinning round on her feet. She does it because her dog reacts the same way to the same emotion.

"The means of showing emotion are limited on the screen," she said. "We have only facial expression and gestures. Therefore the simplest way of expressing anything is the natural way. We must show what we mean in the elemental way—in the animal way—since we can understand animals although they do not talk to us. They have a great gift of naturalness."

Oswald Moseley  
to Have Hard Time  
Disowning Title

London, May 18.—(AP)—Oswald Moseley, Socialist husband of Lady Cynthia, will have his hands full trying to dodge the title of baronet regardless of declarations that he would not accept the honor at the death of his father.

The son-in-law of the late Marquis Curzon and the former Mary Leiter of Chicago, could only renounce the title by special act of parliament abolishing the baronetcy, say the legal lights, and this would be exceedingly difficult to obtain.

Lawyers also say that Lady Cynthia, who cares nothing for her title, preferring to be addressed as "comrade," could easily establish her claim to a peerage which has for some time been in abeyance in the Curzon family. If she does not want it, declare the lawyers, one of her sisters could accept it.

Confederate Vets  
Gather From All  
Corners of Dixie

Birmingham, Alabama, May 18.—(AP)—From all corners of Dixie there tracked here today that remnant of a once vast host of fighting men who composed the Southern Confederacy. It was to the final assembly. On this point there appeared widely divergent views among the early arrivals for the 25th annual reunion. Proponents of the plan to write funds to the Southern Confederacy as an active, functioning organization, declared that the men who followed Lee and Jackson and the other Southern chieftains are nearing the end of life.

Wants No Action  
Taken on Petition  
Impeach Meekins

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—Recommendation that no action be taken on a petition to impeach Federal Judge I. M. Meekins, of North Carolina, was made today by a House Judiciary subcommittee.

No impeachment offenses were alleged in affidavit filed by D. F. Hickey, former Revenue Bureau employee, the report to the Judiciary Committee said. These charges made last year and repeated recently in a letter addressed to the House included collusion with federal officials for "tax fixing," while Meekins was counsel for the Alien Property Custodian when that office was held by W. T. Miller, now under indictment in New York.

Without touching on these matters the subcommittee report said they have no bearing on Meekins' later judgeship and therefore do not call for impeachment proceedings.

New London  
Tennis Club Has  
65,000 Enrolled

London, May 18.—(INS)—The latest lawn tennis club of London contains 65,000 players.

This is the Club formed by the London County Council, which, in governing London, is also responsible for all open spaces. During recent years the Council has been faced by a problem—how to satisfy ten applications for every court that is available. London is lawn-tennis crazy.

The Council parks contain 721 courts — accommodating, approximately 2,800 players simultaneously. But the demand is infinitely greater. Accordingly, the Council has required everyone who may wish to use its courts to become registered on its books. Presently the registrations number 65,000—99 per cent of whom are young people who can only play after the day's work.

In addition the council has registered 40,000 players for its 320 cricket pitches. And in every unused space it can find it is installing putting greens.

The only tragic feature of this sports enthusiasm is that the council has abolished all croquet

lawns except two, and were it not for the protests of the older generation it would make a clean sweep of the bowling greens also.

SIR GERALD DU MAURIER IS ACTOR FOR THE MASSES  
London, May 18.—(AP)—Sir Gerald du Maurier, the celebrated actor son of the author of "Trilby" again has shocked theatrical high brows.

He declared that his ideal part is the one "that is most successful in the eyes of the majority." This is treason in the eyes of critics and playgoers who think there is no art in any drama while plays to large crowds and affords genuine amusement to the masses.

AUTO BUMPER IS GOOD FOR  
SAFETY UP TO 8 MILES PER

Chicago, May 18.—(AP)—The motorist whose automobile bumper protect him at a speed of more than eight miles an hour is 'just lucky.'

Tests made by the Underwriters Laboratories here for companies handling casualty insurance show that no bumpers can be guaranteed to protect a motor car and its occupants from accidents at a greater speed. Many accidents are prevented by bumpers when cars are travelling faster but the extent of such prevention cannot be calculated.
