Signed Statement Also Charges Members of Crew Donned Life Preservers Ahead of the Passengers

New York, May 18 .- (AP)-Seventeen of the passengers of the Clyde Liner Seneca, who were among those taken from the steamer when it went aground at Miami, Fla., Sunday morning, upon their arrival here today signed a statement, charging that some of the crew were under the influence of

The signed statement also charged that members of the crew donned life preservers ahead of the passengers, thereby causing much concern to the women on board. Although the statement criticized men.bers of the crew the Seneca's commander, B. W. Leak, was highly praised.

F. A. Edwards, of Brookline, Mass., gave newspaper men the statement which read in part as follows,

"We the undersigned helpg passengers aboard the steamship Seneca bound from Miami to New York, leaving May to at four p. m., hereby certify that the following statements are true in the affair of the Seneca being in a ainking condition the night of May 15. and 16 and passengers being removed in life boats to wir:

"1-Liquor was sold openly on the Seneca.

"2-A portion of the ship's crew were under influence of liquor. "Men were taken ushore on Passes House large rugs while many ladies were forced to use small life boats. "4-Many members of the crew

Is Shown In Recent Booklet

Washington, May 18-(AP)-A eassuring glimpse of progress in the island republic of Haiti is afforded the outside world through circulation of an illustrated booklet, showing in graphic fashion the strides made in recent years in many lines of endeavor.

The booklet, printed in French, has found its way through official channels into many foreign countries. Copies of it have been passed about here by the Haitian lega-tion. It contains upwards of 100 pictures of improved roads, mod-ern buildings, and other construc-tion projects in the island.

In the last ten years, more than 1,000 miles of paved roads have been laid, replacing highways that had deteriorated until they were little more than trails. A concrete highway connecting Port-au-Prince, the Haitian Capital, and Santa Domingo, capital city of the Dominican Republic, has been completed by the Haitians up to the border. When the Dominican portion is completed, the trip between the two capitals may be done in hours, where formerly it

This progress has been particularly notable during the administration of the present chief exe-cutive, President Borno, said a report in the booklet made by the Haltian minister of public works. His administration also has seen the construction of 14 schools, 13 hospitals and 11 lighthouses; installation o fan automatic tele phone system, and material progress in irrigation and canals. According to Hector C. Bywater the well known naval expert, who says he has his information from eliable sources, the Washington Government will propose the reetriction of all combatant tonnage on the basis which already applies to battieships and air-

craft carriers. This would mean that the British and the United States pavies would be on a footing of equality in every type of vessel, that Japan would be restricted to three-fifts of her common quota of tonnage, and that France and Italy both would be cut to little more than half the Japanese to-
