LOCAL LEGION

POST HOLDS A SPLENDID MEET

Program Featured by Short Talks; Copies of Revised Roster Presented to Members

The Pitt County Post of the American Legion met in regular monthly session last night, and the meeting was largely attended by a number of interested members.

The committees which were appointed at the last meeting to make arrangements for decorating the graves of the ex-service men on Memorial Day, May 30, reported that all plans have been perfected and the graves of those who made the supreme sacrifice will be decorated throughout the county.

Chief Jones, captain of the National Guard, reported that the piece of Austrian war artillery, a trophy of the late World War, had arrived and had been placed in the National Guard armory. The piece will be thoroughly gone over after which it will be placed on the court house square. On next Armistice day it will be presented with appropriate exercises, to Pitt County by the members of the American Legion post.

A feature of the meeting was a short talk by Sargeant Duncan, of the State National Guard, who is here to inspect the local unit of the National Guard. He congratulated the Post on being such a live organization and expressed great pleasure at being a guest of the Post.

A committee appointed recently to prepare a revised roster of the Pitt County ex-service men, reported that they had completed the work and one hundred copies of the roster were presented to the Post.

D. L. Turnage and J. L. Evans explained the importance of ex-service men continuing their war risk insurance or renewing same if policy has been dropped. They stressed the fact that the final date for re-instatement and conversion of war risk insurance would be July 2, and urged every ex-service man to attend to the matter immediately because if they waited until after July 2 it would be too late.

A number of visitors enjoyed the hospitality of the Post and several new members were added to the roster.

It was decided that a prize of \$20.00 in gold would be given to the first member who procured 20 new members.

The meeting was one of the best held in several months and was greatly enjoyed.

Predicts Federal Collections Will Total \$190,000,000

Raleigh, May 19.—(AP)—With federal tax collections for the first ten months of the present fiscal year running ahead of those in any other ten-month period in the history of the State Revenue Collector, William Grison predicted today that federal collections in North Carolina during the fiscal year ending June 30, next, would total \$190,000,000. Tax collections to date this fiscal year total approximately \$165,000,000 and are greater than during any previous twelve months period.

British Foreign Office Undecided On Steps to Take

London, May 19.—(AP)—The British Foreign Office is considering whether it shall make representation to Soviet Russia in connection with statements reported to have been made by Soviet officials in support of the recent general strike in Great Britain.

The attitude of the Foreign Office is that the alleged statements are inconsistent with the friendly relations which officially exists between the two governments. Austin Chamberlain, the Foreign Minister, answering a question in the House of Commons said that he was awaiting further information before deciding what, if any, steps should be taken.

JEFFERSON CENTENNIAL ELECTION IS ATTRACTING STATE-WIDE ATTENTION

Mrs. Cameron Morrison, wife of former Governor Morrison, has subscribed \$1,000 to the Jefferson Memorial fund, and has the distinction of being the first Monticello in North Carolina.

The announcement of the subscription of Mrs. Morrison to be credited as 10,000 votes for the Charlotte candidates, was made by Mrs. I. W. Faison, chairman of the Charlotte election, before a notable gathering of the members of the State Committee of the Jefferson Centennial election and the Charlotte committee of the same body, when Walter Murphy of Salisbury, State chairman, and Miss Grace Axtell, State director, declared the election, on so far as North Carolina is concerned, at a luncheon at the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce.

In announcing the gift from Mrs. Morrison, Mrs. Faison explained that the Governors of the Jefferson Memorial Foundation have established the honorary title of Monticello to be bestowed upon those individuals contributing one thousand dollars or more to the purchase of Monticello. The names of such donors will be preserved in bronze at Monticello. Special honorary guests cards are given to all Monticellos.

The meeting revealed high enthusiasm and indicated that when the balloting for the candidates actually gets underway, with the daily announcement of their standing, the election will be one of the most interesting state-wide events of the kind held in years. Social leaders, business men and women, professional men, and conspicuous people in many other walks of life attended the final conference before all nominations were declared in and the balloting declared ready to begin throughout the state.

Mrs. I. W. Faison, chairman of the Charlotte Centennial election committee, presided at the meeting, and presented Mr. Murphy, State chairman, who recalled that it was citizens of Mecklenburg county who, on May 20, 1775, signed the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, starting the movement in America that resulted in independence and gave the world what the late Lord Gladstone, premier of Great Britain said, was the "greatest document ever penned by the hand of man."

Mr. Murphy harked back to the part played by Washington, John Marshall, Madison, Hamilton and Jefferson, but said it was Jefferson, the genius and the patriot, who gave the ideas of democracy, that prevailed in the formation of the nation and that have served to win him recognition as the greatest statesman of all time.

Miss Grace Axtell, State director of the election, who came from New York headquarters to help direct the campaign in North Carolina, delivered a brief address, explaining the terms of the election, and showing how each city will get full credit for the votes cast for its candidates, at the same time taking their place in the state rating.

Miss Julia Alexander, only woman member of the North Carolina legislature and a member of the election committee spoke briefly. So did Mayor Abernethy, C. C. Griffith, of the Charlotte Realty Board, nominator of one of the candidates, and others.

DISCUSS PROGRAM HOSPITALIZATION DUKE ENDOWMENT

Only a Possibility of Financial Assistance From the Commonwealth Fund of New York

Charlotte, May 19.—(AP)—There is only a possibility of financial assistance from the Commonwealth Fund of New York in the hospitalization program of the Duke Endowment but an interchange of ideas in prospect which will be "almost equally as welcome." Dr. W. S. Rankin, director of the hospitalization program, announced today. Dr. Rankin returned to Charlotte last night with H. J. Southmayd, director of the Commonwealth fund. The two had spent a couple of days visiting communities in North Carolina which are in need of hospital facilities.

Early this year \$350,000 from Commonwealth fund was appropriated for the establishment of hospitals in rural sections. The hospitals are to be erected at the rate of two a year, according to Mr. Southmayd, with Farmville, Va., selected as the site for the first.

"In Armenia" says Henry Ford, "ten tractors ploughed one thousand acres in eleven days." In the old Armenian way that plowing would have required one thousand oxen, with five hundred Armenians saying "ge haw," in Armenian.

What a blessed change that must have seemed to Armenia, for centuries, since the days of Caesar and long before, Armenians were accustomed to having people come from all over the earth, expressly to butcher them.

At the mere appearance of Nonophon, and his remaining handful, the Armenians dived down through holes in the earth, to their queer houses underground. They never expected kindness.

Now from Detroit comes an individual inventing a tractor that enables ten men with ten machines to do the work of a thousand oxen, and five hundred men, and produce food in quantities.

That fine Christianity, the Armenians are Christians. Henry Ford says he intends to do as much for the "Asiatic masses" and improve living conditions among them.

That also would be good Christianity. We should help all our brothers, white, black, brown, yellow or red.

If Henry Ford succeeds in feeding all the people that are born in Asia, he will with his food, and the Rockefeller Institute with its medicine, will soon add several thousand millions to the yellow population of the earth.

That would present an interesting problem for the whites that breed less rapidly.

A heavy spear, with a sharp iron point at one end, a Norwegian flag at the other, was thrown onto the North Pole, from the dirigible "Norge," says the courageous Mr. Amundsen, therefore the North Pole and all the land around it belong to the King of Norway.

The statement is to some extent poetic. The exact location of the North Pole was in all probability not calculated within twenty miles, unless by accident. And there might be some question as to whether throwing a spear at property establishes ownership.

The only human being that ever landed on North Pole territory, and came back to tell about it was an American, Peary, and he left the stars and stripes.

However, there are more serious things to worry about than ownership of the North Pole.

In Paris, for instance, they worry about the knees of beautiful ladies. Fashion seeking to change dresses, that foolish wives may buy new ones frequently, says dresses must go higher (the knees must be shown).

That seems silly, but fashion tends in a useful direction. The knee cap, a most ingenious contrivance, is not particularly beautiful. If fashion demands that ladies show their knees, knocking together or far apart, straight and dimpled or with a sort of bulging protuberance on each side, like a "dog spavin" on a horse's hock, the ladies will obey fashion.

They will also try to develop well shaped knees and that is possible. There is no doubt that the races of long ago in Greece when no skirts or anything else was worn, by men or women, developed extraordinarily beautiful human bodies that Greek art has immortalized.

Religious war continues in Mexico, the authorities are determined to control everything, including religion.

The Papal Muncio, Monsignor George Joseph Tarrana, expected from Mexico, will probably leave today. He denies the charge that on entering the country he made a false declaration of his birth, profession and religion to immigration officials.

Mexico will learn what history has proved a thousand times that it is as stupid for government to control religion as it is for religion to meddle with and attempt to control government.

SAYS MEN WHO FOLLOWED LEE WILL 'CARRY ON'

General Freeman Astonished at Idea of a "Last Reunion," and Question Will Probably Not Come Up

Birmingham, Ala., May 19.—(AP)—The men who followed Lee will "carry on as long as two or three can travel," General W. B. Freeman, Commander in Chief, said here today in his keynote address at the opening session of the 36th annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans.

"Away with the talk of a limping army of old men; nonsense this talk about the 'last reunion,'" he shouted.

General Freeman's attitude, coupled with the sentiment of many of his followers, appeared to have successfully fought the movement in certain quarters as to dissolving the organization of veterans. In fact today the sentiment seemed so well crystallized that the question will probably not come to the floor of the meeting.

ONLY PEACE TIME ARMAMENT CAN BE LIMITED BY NATIONS

Geneva, May 19.—(AP)—Only peace time armament can be limited by any conference of nations.

This provisional agreement was reached at today's session which decided that it was impracticable at the present moment to think of reducing the ultimate war strength of countries.

In ratifying this conclusion, however, the commission agreed to a significant reservation by M. Paul Boncour, of France.

Not only economic and population factors must be taken into consideration but also according to the reservations, concrete reductions must depend to a considerable degree on the extent of which effective aid can be rushed to an attacked state through operations of a scheme of mutual assistance. The commission decided to appoint a drafting commission, which, after further general discussion, will recast and clarify the agenda and endeavor to separate technical military questions from purely political problems.

Locarno Security Pact Be Program of New Cabinet

Berlin, May 19.—(AP)—Strict adherence to Germany's foreign policy as laid down in the Locarno security pact will continue to be the program of the new cabinet, Chancellor Marx told the Reichstag today upon his appearance as successor to Chancellor Luther.

Mrs. Owens before her marriage was Miss Annie Brown, of Edgecombe county. She was married in 1912.

Mrs. Owens was one of Fountain's most popular and beloved women. She possessed a lovely Christian character, and was a friend to everybody. She was well known in this city, having visited here a number of times.

The deceased is survived by her husband, two step-daughters, Misses Velma and Tribby Owens, and a large number of relatives. She was an aunt of Mrs. E. L. Brown, of this city.

W. E. D. STOKES DIED TODAY AT NEW YORK HOME

New York, May 19.—(AP)—W. E. D. Stokes, financier and hotel owner, died this morning at his home here.

The history of William L. Dodge Stokes is chiefly the history of his litigation—both divorce and civil—which kept him almost constantly in the courts and the limelight.

His marital career, consisting of two marriages, one divorce and an unsuccessful attempt for five years to divorce his second wife Mrs. Helen Elwood Stokes, attracted wide attention.

Stokes was born in New York in 1833 and inherited from his father, James Stokes, property valued at \$11,000,000. Figures revealed by his second wife when she sued him for divorce rights showed that his net estate was \$7,238,000.

James J. Gossett, of Williamston, S. C., was elected first vice-president, and George S. Harris, of Atlanta, second vice-president. W. D. Adams, of Charlotte, N. C., was re-elected secretary-treasurer of the association.

Mr. Everett is a member of the General Assembly of North Carolina and is an excellent speaker. He has made a number of visits to Europe and is well prepared to speak on the subject he has chosen to discuss.

HUNG JURY NOW APPARENT IN WAREHOUSE SUIT

Two Days of Civil Court Devoted to Suit of Mrs. Elsie Foxhall Against McGowan-Cannon

Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of civil cases convened Monday and Tuesday's sessions were devoted to the trial of Mrs. Elsie Foxhall against McGowan and Cannon, warehousemen of this city. The suit is the result of failure to make amicable settlement following the death of Mr. F. D. Foxhall, who was a member of the firm of Foxhall, McGowan and Cannon.

The case was long drawn out and was given to the jury late yesterday. Shortly after noon today the jury had not returned its verdict.

Warren Urges Lower Shipping Rate on Beets

Congressman Lindsay Warren is endeavoring to aid the shippers of Eastern Carolina before the Interstate Commerce Commission to secure a better rate on beets.

The Atlantic Coast Line rate from Washington, N. C. and other points in that section to Philadelphia is 68c car lots, while the Norfolk Southern rate is 92c. In conjunction with W. W. Melbhenny, Mr. Warren has induced the Norfolk Southern to meet the Coast Line rate but the Interstate Commerce Commission will not permit same to go into effect until June 15th, at which time the shipping season will be over.

On account of the fact that deliveries can be made quicker over the Norfolk Southern, Mr. Warren is urging the Commission to treat the case as an emergency, and put the lower rate into immediate effect.

Anderson Re-elected Secretary Board of Education Today

Memphis, Tenn., May 19.—(AP)—Dr. Stonewall Anderson was re-elected Secretary of the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at today's session of the general conference of the church. Dr. Anderson's election was on the first ballot with 185 out of 341 votes cast.

The re-election of Dr. Anderson ended efforts on the part of fundamentalists in the conference to oust him because of his liberty views. Dr. E. L. Todd was re-elected general secretary of the Board of Finance.

Bodies of Couple Found Under a Pile of Sawdust

Stouenville, Oh., May 19.—(AP)—What is believed to be another brutal double murder, the second in Jefferson county within three months, was uncovered west of here today when bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Omar Miller were found hidden under a pile of sawdust near their home. The Millers had been missing since Monday night. A message from Berghata, the scene of the crime, shortly before noon today, said authorities had not determined how the Miller couple met death. No shot wounds were found and there were no outward signs of violence. A poisoning theory is being followed.

AS FLORIDA SEES US

What another great state,
the development of which
has amazed the world,
thinks of North Carolina, is
shown in the following from
the Palm Beach, Fla., Times.

"In all the splendid re-
naissance of the South today
there are two southern states
which stand forth as the
first and foremost flowers of
this re-birth. And in the
case of each of them the se-
cret of their mighty success
is the coupling of good gov-
ernment and good roads and
good people with natural
blessings of climate and re-
source."

This is the tie that binds
Florida and North Caro-
lina today in mutual help
and admiration and under-
standing. Floridians have
been told of many beautiful
places to spend the summer
but the great majority of
those who are persuaded to
spend it anywhere else than
in their own comfortable
summer climate are appar-
ently resolved upon North
Carolina.

North Carolina today is
experiencing a development
and an increase in popu-
lation and values which, in
many respects, compares to
that of Florida. This de-
velopment is in some mea-
sure the reflection of Flori-
da's own vast progress but
it could not have occurred
without much to offer on its
own part. There are, of
course, other summer lands
of charm and beauty but
none so accessible to the
people of the South or to the
prosperity which has recent-
ly come to those people. But
North Carolina is more than
this. It is already one of
the first agricultural and in-
dustrial states in the Union.
Its manufactures of furni-
ture rank second only to
those of Michigan; its to-
bacco growth is the greatest
in America; its cotton mills
rival in size and number
those of Massachusetts; its
mineral resources, timber,
and water-power are assets
of untold value. And it has
established for itself an in-
tegrity of government, an
educational system, and a
network of highways which
have secured and enlarged
all of its national blessings.

"But, what is most impor-
tant of all, North Carolina
has people. People of re-
finement, of public spirit,
of kindness, of perseverance
and dauntless ability. In
these people all of the graces
and background of the
old South are linked with
all the promise and vitality
of the new."

Chorus Girl's
School Provides
Steady Work

New York, May 19.—(AP)—
"Chorus Girls for Hire" might be
the sign hanging on the establish-
ment of Allan K. Foster, whose
business is providing dancers for
musical comedies and revues.

For many years he was a stage
director and some of his experi-
ences led him into his present en-
terprise.

Under his system, Foster takes
girls and trains them free of
charge, for a period of six or eight
weeks. Those who have developed
and show promise of a good fu-
ture, he then places under five
year contracts, with salaries which
mount until \$100 a week is paid
the final year.

Forty weeks employment a year
is guaranteed and one of the con-
tract provisions is that every girl
must save at least ten per cent
of her salary. The average chorus
girl, working independently, has
employment twenty weeks. It is
estimated, and is not paid while
rehearsing.

Smoking and drinking, as well
as stage door "Johnnies," are pro-
hibited. Chaperones are provided
to care for the girls socially and
morally.

Early in their training the girls
are taught all forms of dancing,
swimming, riding and fencing.
Four hours each week are given
over to learning new dances and
specialties. At rehearsals, the
girls wear blue dancing costumes,
all uniform.

Foster now has eight troupes—
sixteen girls in each—playing in
revues, vaudeville and motion pic-
tures in this and foreign coun-
tries. He contracts for their ser-
vices with producers and it is
from the latter that he makes his
money. For example, he now has
a troupe in one of Shubert's revues
under contract for two years.

One of Foster's troubles as a di-
rector was to have a girl become
ill, often making it necessary to
replace her with someone unfa-
miliar with the show. Another was
to have about half the girls drop
out when it was decided to send
the production on the road.

Under his system, he is ready to
replace any one of the trouper
with another trained dancer and
all of them are under contract to
go any place in the world.

EXCAVATIONS DISCLOSE
OLD FILIPINO CULTURE

Manila, May 18.—(AP)—Dis-
coveries showing the customs and
culture of the Filipinos of 700
years ago have been made in the
excavations for the Novallches
Dam. They include old bits of
pottery of curious design, weap-
ons, beads, bits of opal, old gold,
jade, agate and glass utensils.

Paris, May 19.—(INS)—Following the departure of Cardinal Cerretti for Rome, Baron de Giffier d'Hestroy, the Belgian Ambassador, becomes the dean of the French Diplomatic Corps. Although the Cardinal's appointment only dates from August 6, 1921, by special courtesy to the representative of the Vatican, he has always been considered the Dean of the Corps. The oldest diplomatic representative in France is the Minister from a little Central American Republic, Costa Rica. The Marquis de Peralta has been representing the Central American country since March 7, 1887. He is probably the oldest in the vocation, which has been ennobled by a Talleyrand, a Metetrnich, a Franklin, Prince Samad Khan, one of the most inveterate of Parisian first nighters, has been the Peralta envoy since April 17, 1906; Norway's representative comes next in seniority, the Baron de Wedel Jarlsberg being in the service in Paris since April 18, 1907.

Your name on a Paris street is no sign of immortality. During

the recent session of the Municipal Council the names of more than ten streets were changed.

Soldiers whose bravery dated from 1887 or from 1789 were discarded in favor of modern poets and politicians. Anatole France and Pierre Loti have both been commemorated by streets named after them. At a recent meeting of the City Fathers of Versailles it was decided to acknowledge the gift of a million dollars for the restoration of the Chateau by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., by baptizing one of the principal streets of the town—la Rue de Rockefeller. There has been some agitation recently to change the name of the Avenue President Wilson to something a little less reminiscent of the war and what the French have always considered—its bitter lessons. Immediately after the Armistice had been signed, each one of the allied leaders and chiefs were petitioned to permit their names to be bestowed on a Paris street. This accounts for the Avenue President Wilson, the Avenue George V, the Avenue Victor Emmanuel, and the cour Albert Premier.

In spite of the falling franc and the political mess in which France finds herself, the little country is a pretty nice place after all, judging from the demands for naturalization papers which are piled up before the employees of the Ministry of Justice. For some months the number has been steadily increasing and the immediate cause is thought to be the new rent law which refuses foreigners the benefits of the prolongation law. Buffalo, N. Y., May 19.—(AP)—The problem of teaching the American public to pay for what it gets, and take only what it pays for, will be tackled by the American Water Works Association at its annual convention to be held here June 7 to 11.

Conservation of the public water supply is one of the foremost tasks confronting the industry, said Harry F. Hoy, of Buffalo, president of the association.

"Hardly any city has access to a inexhaustible water source, and a great many cities are faced every year with a water shortage that annually becomes more serious," he declared.

Neither Senator George W. Pepper, who is supported by the forced lead by Secretary of Treasury Mellon, nor Governor Pinchot the dry candidate, conceded defeat however.

Returns from 6,329 of the 8,281 districts in the state gave Vare a plurality of 118,116 over Pepper. The vote was Vare 545,800, Pepper 427,684, and Pinchot 270,498.

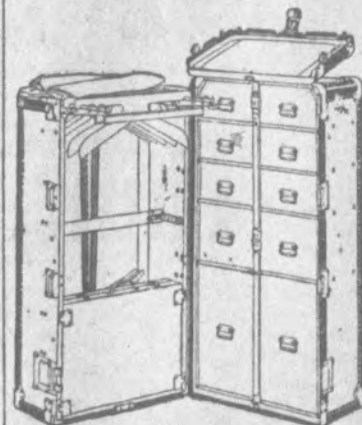
